SUBJECT: Analysis of Wall Street Journal Op-ed

As you requested, I have reviewed the March 20, 1992 op-ed piece in the Wall Street Journal entitled "What Bush Must Do After His Deadline." The article is thoughtful and constructive. The attached paper briefly summarizes what actions the Administration has taken on the recommendations in the article.

With the exception of administratively indexing capital gains and depreciation for inflation and issuing indexed Treasury bonds, the Administration has implemented virtually all of these recommendations.

The paper does not address the agricultural marketing order program, which is extraordinarily sensitive in California. Although USDA has taken steps to relax restrictions, a deliberate decision was made to distance the White House from these actions.

If you have any questions, or I can help in any other way on this, please let me know.

What Bush Must Do After His Deadline

1. Administratively index capital gains and depreciation for inflation.

Although there is broad and deep support for reducing taxation of capital gains, after careful legal analysis, you were advised that there is not the legal authority to administratively index capital gains and depreciation.

Indexing capital gains is sound economic policy. It would help stimulate additional savings and investment. It is also fair. Why should someone who has built a small business or farm over a number of years have to pay taxes on the inflation that has occurred during that period? Given the unyielding legal advice on this issue, we must continue to work on fixing the capital gains problem at the other end of the avenue.

2. Establish a regulatory budget and cap it.

This is another excellent idea. Your FY 1993 Budget presents a framework for establishing a comprehensive regulatory budget.

We are working on some of the practical accounting problems with implementing a regulatory budget, including improving cost and benefit estimates. Building on a pilot regulatory budget as part of the Clean Air Act Amendments, this year we will test some regulatory budget techniques in selected areas (e.g., the Department of Labor regarding Formaldehyde exposure and the Department of Transportation regarding double hull oil tankers).

3. Extend the 90-day regulatory review process.

On April 29, you announced a 120-day extension of the regulatory moratorium. There is broad support within the Administration to extend the regulatory moratorium again when the current extension expires on August 27.

4. Address the bottlenecks in our financial institutions and liberalize capital requirements by adopting "Basel standards."

Treasury has renewed the Administration's support for sweeping changes in the nation's banking laws. Secretary Brady called for quick action on legislation (HR.4170) that would

remove inefficient and costly restrictions on interstate banking and branching.

On April 1, you announced a broad financial services reform program to reduce regulatory barriers to lending and to eliminate unnecessary regulatory compliance costs. This program includes initiatives to stimulate real estate lending, permit interstate branching by Federal thrifts and reduce regulatory compliance costs for financial institutions.

On June 24, you submitted to Congress the "Credit Availability and Regulatory Relief Act." This legislation would enhance the availability of credit by reducing or eliminating a wide range of excessive costs now borne by banks, thrifts, and credit unions. Among the significant changes proposed in the bill are:

- Relief from regulatory micromanagement standards;
- Requirements for uniform regulations;
- Reductions of audit costs;
- Improved targeting of consumer regulations; and
- Community Reinvestment Act paperwork reductions.

Over 97 percent of all U.S. commercial banks already meet or exceed the Basel standards. On October 8, 1991, bank regulators announced that they would allow greater amounts of preferred stock to be counted as Tier One Bank Capital. This change could result in an increase in bank capital and thus expand lending.

5. Reduce the level of federal spending by submitting rescissions to Congress.

As of August 7, you have forwarded to Congress 128 proposed rescissions totalling \$7.9 billion. The Congress has accepted 25 rescissions totalling \$2.1 billion and has rejected 103 rescissions totalling \$5.8 billion.

6. Issue Treasury bonds indexed for inflation.

Treasury Under Secretary Jay Powell testified on June 24 that, in Treasury's view, issuing indexed bonds would not be in the nation's best interest. Treasury made two central arguments:

- Demand for such bonds may be narrow and limited. Therefore, it is not clear how long it would take for liquidity in this market to develop, and there would be high risks in attempting to foster such liquidity.

- The magnitude of potential cost savings resulting from the elimination of the inflation risk premium charged in conventional bonds are overstated. Therefore, indexed bonds would probably not lower interest costs to the government or result in lower interest rates.

7. Minimize unwarranted affirmative findings under the anti-dumping statutes.

In December 1991, you appointed three new commissioners to the International Trade Commission. These individuals are committed to fair, thorough and objective application of U.S. anti-dumping laws. The Commission is discouraging weak anti-dumping cases, consistent with U.S. trade law and the GATT. Recent cases such as structural steel rails and minivans provide evidence to support this view.

8. Inform workers of their rights under the Beck decision, and revise definitions of "prevailing rates" under the Davis-Bacon law.

On April 13, you signed an executive order and took additional steps, such as informing Federal employees of their rights, to fully implement the Beck decision.

Regulations now define "prevailing wage" as the wage paid a majority of workers in a class.

On January 29, the Department of Labor implemented Davis-Bacon "helper" regulations allowing government construction projects to be carried out at lower costs.

9. Grant appropriate waivers to state governments with respect to Medicaid and other support programs.

In your State of the Union Address, you said your Administration would help states that sought federal waivers to implement welfare reform. Since then, five states have received six waivers.

These waivers allow states to move forward with a variety of approaches to welfare reform: ending the bonus for moving to a higher benefit state; relaxing rules that force young couples to separate to qualify for welfare; and not increasing benefits for additional children born to families already on welfare.

With respect to Medicaid, dozens of waivers to provide home and community based services, link patients to providers, and institute coordinated care have been approved in the last year.

10. Support omnibus legislation to all apply all laws to Congress.

In your March 20 address to Republican Members of Congress and to presidential appointees, you called on the Congress to apply the same laws to itself that it imposes on everyone else.

11. Submit rescissions to reduce appropriations for the legislative branch.

Since March 20, the Congress has not yet sent legislative branch appropriations to you for your approval. The House passed the legislative branch appropriations on June 24. The Senate has not yet approved the legislation.

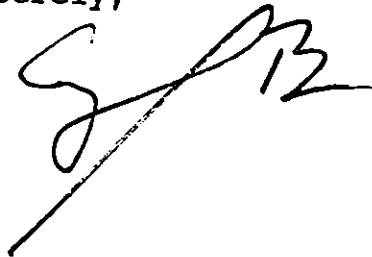

What Bush Must Do After His Deadline

This letter was sent to the White House yesterday:

Dear Mr. President:

In your State of the Union address of Jan. 28, you described the nation's economic ills and outlined a series of initiatives to address them. Quite appropriately and quite courageously, you not only challenged Congress to pass your proposals but gave the institution a specific deadline—March 20. It is now clear that Congress will not approve your proposals, but instead will send you a bill that is wholly inadequate—a bill we urge you to veto.

In that same State of the Union address, you stated that if Congress does not approve your proposals by March 20, "the battle is joined." We urge you to fulfill that promise by taking unilateral action to address the economy and improve the effectiveness and accountability of government in general. We have outlined a series of such initiatives. We urge you to give them careful consideration and commence appropriate action immediately following Friday's deadline.

To decrease tax rates on capital and to stimulate investment, we urge you to:

1. *Direct the secretary of treasury to index capital gains and depreciation for inflation.* For both capital gains and depreciation, the "cost basis" is determined not in legislation but in regulation. The secretary of treasury could cut tax rates on capital simply by defining the cost basis as the original cost adjusted for inflation. This not only would promote economic growth but would end the practice of requiring people to pay taxes on phony gains attributable to inflation.

To reduce the regulatory drag on the economy, we urge you to:

2. *Establish a regulatory budget and cap it.* One recent study estimates the annual cost of federal regulation to be \$400 billion. At least until economic growth is restored, the regulatory drag should not be allowed to increase. Thus, we urge you to direct all agencies to submit their regulatory proposals and then approve them only when accompanied by initiatives to reduce the overall cost of regulation by a like amount.

We suggest that you ask the vice president to administer this regulatory budget program through his Council on Competitiveness and through the Office of Management and Budget's Office of Information and Regulatory Affairs. To accomplish this initiative we suggest that you extend the 90-day regulatory review process and moratorium announced in January (including the targeting of existing rules for review) and request the so-called independent agencies to abide by regulatory Executive Orders.

We also urge you to address the immense bottleneck in our financial institutions. At present, monetary policy to enable or promote long-term growth is hampered severely by unusually stringent capital requirements for banks and savings and loans.

3. *Direct the Comptroller of the Currency, the Federal Reserve System, and the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation to liberalize capital requirements by adopting the "Basel standards."* Following Congress's failure to make fundamental reforms in the deposit insurance system, the financial regulators adopted a too-stringent set of capital requirements, the result being that banks

and S&Ls are unable to expand the supply of credit at an appropriate rate. As Martin Feldstein pointed out recently, adopting the internationally recognized Basel standards "would increase bank lending, stimulate recovery, and help to provide funds for sustained expansion."

Although the effect on the economy would not be as immediate or as direct as in the case of the initiatives listed above, we urge you to endeavor to control the overall level of government spending and eliminate waste. Specifically, we urge you to:

4. *Take initiatives to reduce the level of federal spending.* We urge you to submit a series of rescissions to Congress to eliminate low-priority spending in current appropriations and then work to obtain discharge petitions to force up-or-down votes. We also urge you to announce your intention to veto any appropriations that increase spending by more than the rate of inflation. Even without changes in the tax code, every dollar saved is a dollar that must not be borrowed and on which interest need not be paid.

5. *Direct all agencies not to spend funds in a manner inconsistent with*

presidential policy unless mandated by law. It is clear that appropriations report language does not meet the presentment clause of the Constitution and therefore does not constitute law. Far and away, the most detailed spending directions are found in the committee reports that accompany appropriations bills, not the actual bills that are passed by Congress and signed into law. It is by such means that most "pork" enters the budget. Thus, we urge you to direct agencies not to spend appropriated monies for low-priority programs at the expense of more appropriate projects.

We urge you to consider additional items to improve the functioning of the economy and of government itself. These include:

- (a) directing the secretary of treasury to issue bonds indexed to inflation (to minimize interest cost to the government and to lower interest rates in the economy),

- (b) directing the secretary of commerce to minimize unwarranted affirmative findings under the antidumping statutes (to reduce costs to consumers),

- (c) directing the secretary of agriculture to implement the agricultural marketing order program so as to minimize restraints on the supply of foodstuffs (to reduce costs to consumers),

- (d) directing the secretary of labor to inform workers of their rights under the Beck decision (to increase worker take-home pay) and to revise definitions of "prevailing rates" under the Davis-Bacon law (to reduce government construction costs),

- (e) implementing productivity improvement goals for each federal agency, instructing agency heads to reduce personnel, and privatizing additional programs

- (to reduce costs and improve services),
- (f) directing agencies to grant appropriate waivers to state governments with respect to Medicaid and other support programs (to improve coverage and lower costs), and

- (g) enforcing Executive Order 12606 requiring agencies to assess the impact of their regulations on the family.

Mr. President, the events over the past several months have demonstrated the existence of an additional problem of enormous proportions: the lack of accountability in Congress. Voters may decide on the qualifications of individual candidates, but their ability to affect the accountability of the institution as a whole is indirect at best. Therefore, we believe you should:

1. *Submit omnibus legislation to apply all laws to Congress.* Probably more than any other single initiative, making Congress live by the laws it applies to everyone else would increase the institution's accountability. Such legislation would include not only well-publicized items such as race and sex discrimination, but laws and regulations relating to ethics and conflicts of interest that now apply to persons in the executive branch.

2. *Submit a recession to reduce appropriations for the legislative branch.* A major reason for the lack of accountability in Congress is that over the past two decades the institution has grown in topsy-turvy fashion. It is now rife with warring factions, politicized staff, enormous waste and little regard for the taxpayer. Cutting legislative appropriations would focus the minds of congressmen more on the responsibilities, rather than the accoutrements, of office.

We note with approval the news that the U.S. Attorney for the District of Columbia is investigating reports of congressional malfeasance. If violations of law are uncovered, we believe those responsible should be prosecuted in the same manner as they would be if they did not hold positions of privilege and power.

Mr. President, we respectfully urge you to take quick, decisive action following March 20 to revitalize the economy and secure accountability in Congress.

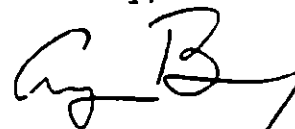
Dear Congressman Dornan:

I am writing to thank you for your July 1 letter to me on the work of the U.S.-Russia Joint Commission on POW/MIAs. I know how important this issue is to you personally.

Given your long history and personal expertise on this issue, I know that you would be a valuable addition to the Commission, especially because it is such a major priority for my Administration. I understand, however, that Congressional membership on the Commission was determined solely by the House and Senate leadership. There is a carefully worked out balance between House and Senate members, Republicans and Democrats. I am told that to change that arrangement now in the middle of the Commission's work would be difficult and that, in any case, it could only be done by the leadership.

However, I do want to continue to rely on your advice on this important issue. I have therefore asked Ambassador Malcolm Toon to contact you in order to give you a detailed briefing on his recent negotiations in Moscow and to seek your advice on the work ahead. And I hope you will be in touch with me again should you have information or advice that you want to share with me personally.

SUBJECT: Response to Congressman Robert K. Dornan on the
U.S.-Russia Joint Commission on POW/MIAs

Purpose

To indicate to Congressman Dornan that, while you cannot appoint him to the U.S.-Russia Joint Commission on POW/MIAs, we will continue to seek his advice on this issue.

Background

You asked that I look into Congressman Dornan's request in his July 1 letter to you (attached at Tab II) that you appoint him to the U.S.-Russian Commission on POW/MIAs. Unfortunately, it would be very difficult for you to meet his request without creating a problem with the Congressional leadership.

We established the Joint Commission in March and worked out U.S. participation in it carefully with the Congressional leadership. We agreed then that the U.S. side would be comprised of nine members, five from the Executive branch, led by Malcolm Toon, and four members of Congress appointed by the leadership which has since turned aside many requests from members to be added to the group.

Your agreeing to Dornan's request to be appointed to the Commission now would anger the leadership, disrupt the Executive branch's numerical majority on the U.S. side, and also disrupt the carefully worked out balance between Congressional Democrats and Republicans, and Senate and House members. Appointing Dornan would also make it difficult for us to turn down requests from the many other members on both sides of the aisle who want to participate.

There is no realistic way to get Dornan on the Commission at this point. We could ask Bob Michel if it would be possible to have him replace the Republican House member, John Miller. But this step would likely create more problems and bad feelings than it would solve. Miller is running for re-election and wants to stay on the Commission.

Attached is a memorandum to the President covering a response to a July 1 letter from Congressman Robert K. Dornan. You will remember that the President sent you a note on July 2 (also attached) requesting that you look into Dornan's request that the President appoint him to the U.S.-Russia Joint Commission on POW/MIAs.

After reviewing this issue with State, we think it would be very difficult for the President to agree to Dornan's request. U.S. participation in the Commission is comprised of five Executive branch officials, led by Malcolm Toon, and four members of Congress who were appointed by the Congressional leadership. Adding Dornan to the Commission now would likely anger the leadership, disrupt the Executive branch's numerical majority, and also disrupt the carefully worked out balance between Democrats and Republicans, Senate and House members. Given the tremendous demand in the Congress to participate on the Commission, appointing Dornan would also open up a Pandora's box which would be difficult for us and the leadership to control.

The only other way to placate Dornan would be to have the President or you ask Representative Michel to replace the House Republican on the Commission, Representative John Miller, with Dornan. That alternative would likely create more problems than it would solve.

Understanding the President's wish to accommodate Dornan's request to be involved up front on this issue, the attached response indicates that the Administration's door will continue to be open to Dornan on this issue. While it states that the President is not in a position to appoint Dornan to the Commission now, it indicates that Ambassador Toon will consult with him this week to report in detail on his recent trip to Moscow, and that Toon will be open to his ongoing advice as work proceeds.

That you sign the memorandum to the President at Tab I.

Dear Mr. President:

I am writing to ask you for a very, very, personal assignment.

As you may know, I have been involved in the POW/MIA issue longer than literally anyone else in Washington - since May of 1965 when my oldest son's Godfather, Captain David Hrdlicka, was the second U.S. pilot shot down over Laos. Since then I have committed a considerable amount of time, world travel, money, and energy investigating the question of what happened to our missing heroes. For instance, the POW/MIA bracelet (5 to 6 million to date) originated on my television show, February 7, 1970. I have circled the globe, again literally, with wives and mothers of the Missing-In-Action.

Given my personal history, I know that I would make a valuable addition to the U.S.-Russia Joint Commission on POWs, ably headed by Ambassador Malcolm Toon. I know this agonizing mission of searching into the fate of Americans from World War II up through the Vietnam conflict who may have been imprisoned in the the former Soviet Union has your personal highest priority. I therefore respectfully request that you appoint me to be a member of that commission. This issue means so much to me and my family that I implore you to make me your own "special" representative on this prestigious group.

George Bush Statements on Roe v. Wade

Press Conference June 27, 1989

Q: Mr. President, you've expressed your strong feelings again on the Supreme Court decision on the flag-burning. But the Supreme Court is expected to make a decision this week on the abortion issue, which is among the most emotional in the country. And I wonder, going into that decision, if you view your role as a healer after this decision, as simply to enforce the law? What is your view, going into that decision as the President, and this very important emotional issue?

The President: It is an emotional issue, and I am firmly positioned in favor of overturn of Roe v. Wade. And that's my position, and I'm not going to change that position. But I don't want to see the divisiveness that that whole issue causes split this country. And yet the decision is going to be--I don't know what they're going to decide. But my position on it is very clear.

Statement on the Supreme Court's Decision on Abortion, July 3, 1989

We welcome this decision. By upholding the Missouri statute, the Court appears to have begun to restore to the people the ability to protect the unborn. We continue to believe that Roe v. Wade was incorrectly decided and should be reversed.

Remarks to Participants in the March for Life Rally, January 23, 1989

We are concerned about abortion because it deals with the lives of two human beings, mother and child. I know there are people of good will who disagree, but after years of sober and serious reflection on the issue, this is what I think. I think the Supreme Court's decision in Roe v. Wade was wrong and should be overturned. I think America needs a human life amendment. And I think when it comes to abortion there's a better way: the way of adoption, the way of life.

Remarks to Participants in the March for Life Rally, January 22, 1990

And I think all of you know my deep conviction on Roe versus Wade.

Remarks to Participants in the March for Life Rally, January 22, 1991

As I look back at past years' Rally for Life, I am encouraged by the progress which has taken place. Attempts by Congress to expand funding--Federal funding--for abortions have been defeated, and the Supreme Court has taken welcome steps toward reversing Roe versus Wade.

Questions and Answers in Connection with Nomination of David Souter, July 23, 1990

Q: Mr. President, I'd like to ask you about the phrase you're using. You're opposed to somebody who would legislate from the bench. You're on record as wanting Roe v. Wade overturned. You're on record as favoring a flag burning amendment to the Constitution. Aren't those sorts of issues tantamount to legislating from the bench as well?

The President. You'd have to tell me the case and advise me as to how--I don't think so. I don't think when called upon to answer a constitutional question that that has to be legislating from the bench.

Q: You would not be upset if the Court overturned Roe v. Wade, or if the Court upheld the flag burning law?

The President: No, and a lot of other things, too. I believe in the separation of powers, and I happen to think that there's been many, many things that trouble me--encroachment of micromanagement by the United States Congress on the Presidency. But I haven't asked this able judge about those thing.

Manchester Union-Leader Questionnaire, January, 1992

(1) If the Supreme Court overturns Roe v. Wade, what will you do?

(A) I recognize that the subject of abortion is a difficult, often painful one for most Americans. While sincere persons may disagree, my position is that the lives of both mother and child must be cherished and protected.

Naturally, I am inclined not to comment on any case before the Supreme Court. However, I have long called for Roe v. Wade to be overturned.

I oppose abortion except when the life of the mother is threatened or when there is rape or incest. I am opposed to

the use of Federal funds to pay for abortion except when the life of the mother is threatened. Government and the private sector must be more involved in encouraging alternatives such as adoption.

(filed under President Bush)

If Roe is overturned, petitioners' contention that the Title X regulations burden the right announced in Roe falls with it.

I support a Constitutional Amendment that would reverse the Supreme Court's Roe v. Wade decision on abortion made in 1973. I also support a human life amendment with an exception for the life of the mother, rape, or incest. In addition, I oppose the use of federal funds to pay for abortion except when the life of the mother is threatened.

Frankly, while I have long opposed abortion, there has been an evolution in my thinking on the legal means by which we protect the sanctity of human life. Since the Supreme Court's Roe v. Wade decision in 1973, there have been about 18 million abortions in this country. This is a tragedy of shattering proportions. It brings a renewed sense of urgency to adoption of a Constitutional Amendment to overturn Roe v. Wade and the effort for a human life amendment.

I oppose the Supreme Court's ruling in Roe v. Wade and federal funding for abortions except when the life of the mother is threatened.

AmeriCares Airlift Is First U.S. Effort To Land Emergency Supplies In Sarajevo

SARAJEVO, Bosnia and Herzegovina--July 2, 9:05 A.M.-- Just minutes ago, the first in a series of AmeriCares C-130 military transport jets crammed with more than 32,000 pounds of emergency medicines and medical supplies worth in excess of \$2,700,000 landed at the airport in Sarajevo.

The AmeriCares airlift represents the first U.S. response, governmental or private, of relief supplies for that beleaguered city since the airport was "opened" by the United Nations for humanitarian aid a few days ago.

The supplies, which include desperately needed antibiotics, analgesics, infant formula, insulin and bandages, will be distributed to needy hospitals and clinics. The supplies were loaded onto an AmeriCares DC-8 cargo jet which departed JFK International Airport yesterday for Amsterdam. Accompanying this mercy mission are AmeriCares personnel and four AmeriCares volunteer physicians from its program, Doctors To All People. Once on the ground in Amsterdam, the cargo was reloaded onto the C-130, obtained by AmeriCares from the Norwegian military, to complete the relief mission. Because of the danger surrounding the airport in Sarajevo, only military jets are cleared to land at this time.

"The fighting in Bosnia and Herzegovina is a tragedy," said Robert C. Macauley, founder and chairman of AmeriCares, based in New Canaan, Connecticut. "It is imperative for Americans to demonstrate their support for all of the people -- whether Orthodox, Muslim or Catholic -- who are suffering as a result of this senseless conflict."

AmeriCares has a long track record of being first to deliver emergency supplies to disaster sites the world over. Founded 10 years ago, AmeriCares has delivered more than \$520,000,000 of medicines and medical supplies to people in need.

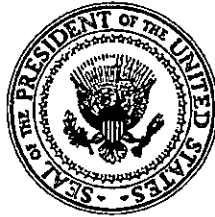
"Conditions in Sarajevo are unimaginable," Mr. Macauley said. "Time is running out. While plans are being made for government intervention, the American private sector must act."

Brady looks to G7 for commonsense solutions

Michael Prowse on the US approach to Munich

MR Nicholas Brady, US treasury secretary, was in fine form as he briefed reporters on next week's Munich summit of the Group of Seven industrial nations.

Running through the main economic items on the agenda – support for Russian reforms, the flagging momentum of world growth and the stalled Uruguay Round trade talks – his manner was that of a plain-spoken businessman looking for commonsense solutions.

A top priority for the US, he said, was to agree measures to strengthen global growth. He implied this was central to all else the G7 leaders might want to achieve. Reform efforts in the former Soviet republics, for example, would be easier if they occurred against a backdrop of buoyant world growth.

He did not quite say "I told you so" but he was evidently gratified that the risk of a global slowdown was now widely recognised. "We're talking about a communiqué that's going to enthusiastically support the concept of a growing world," he said.

He indicated this would mark a sharp departure from previous summits and IMF meetings, when US demands for more stimulative policies had been poorly received, raising doubts about Mr Brady's ability to read the mood in foreign capitals.

He said the US would press for lower interest rates worldwide but that the summit was likely to focus on fiscal measures to support growth. Ignoring the US's decade of record budget deficits, he indulged in a headmasterly review of German and Japanese policies.

Plainly trying to put pressure on Japanese Prime Minister Kiichi Miyazawa ahead of the summit, he lavished praise on the ¥7,000bn-¥8,000bn (£29bn-£33bn) fiscal stimulus proposed at the weekend by Japan's ruling Liberal Democratic Party. He said it could potentially have as big an impact as the historic stimulus announced in 1987, which signalled a shift from export-led to consumer-led growth.

As Mr Brady spoke, however, the LDP plan still had not been endorsed by Mr Miyazawa or the Japanese cabinet.

Turning to Germany, Mr Brady declined to say he was satisfied with Bonn's fiscal policy. But he welcomed recently-announced steps to curb the German budget deficit.

Without a hint of a smile, he suggested that President George Bush's 1990 budget agreement with Congress had shown the world how to achieve lower interest rates. Fiscal restraint in the US, he said, had allowed the Federal Reserve to cut short-term interest rates from over 8 per cent to 3.75 per cent. Other countries could achieve lower interest rates if they, too, put their fiscal houses in order.

On Russian reforms, Mr Brady casually admitted that summit leaders were likely to agree a rescheduling of the

\$65bn external debt of former Soviet republics even though negotiations between Russia and the International Monetary Fund on a standby programme of economic reforms remain bogged down. This will set a precedent because debtors are invariably expected to agree a tough programme of reforms with the IMF before gaining the benefits of a rescheduling deal.

Mr Brady must have been aware his bland statement would increase pressure on IMF negotiators to accommodate Russia. The main hurdle, according to a senior Canadian official, is Russia's belief it deserves different treatment from small Third World borrowers obliged to accept numerous detailed conditions on loans. The Russian view seems to be that a broader commitment to economic reform should be sufficient in the case of a major world power such as Russia.

The Uruguay Round trade negotiations were "enormously complicated" but absolutely vital, Mr Brady said. In 35 years on Wall Street, he had found that the complexity of negotiations increase geometrically according to the number of participants. However, waving a dossier of papers detailing the importance of exports for US growth and jobs, he suggested the US was ready to step up efforts to achieve progress in the talks. If he could wave a magic wand over any one issue at the summit, it would be trade. Achieving freer trade would be among the most important goals for the international community in the post-Cold War era.

*1 HOTLINE ELECTORAL SCOREBOARD: NEW LOOK AT 41 STATE POLLS

The Scoreboard is The HOTLINE's weekly compilation of all known 3-way trial heat data from state polling. Of the states listed, all but IA have appeared in the compiled list before. New polls replace last week's data on AL, IL, LA, MA, NE, PA, OH and WV. Some polls are dated before the full strength of the Perot effort was felt in most areas, and of course, this chart does not yet reflect Perot's slippage seen in recent national polls. Two states, NY and WI, with polls more than 90 days old, have been removed from the chart. Seven states and DC (with 43 electors) are not included -- and, of the polls listed, the sample size/make-up, question asked, margin of error and polling organization all vary widely. The number of electors is listed after state. The symbol (++) indicates who is ahead beyond the margin of error, with (+) indicating a leader within the margin.

MORE ON POLLS: Germond & Witcover write 3-way polls resemble a "roller coaster ride" lately but the timing of the ABC/W. POST poll, showing Clinton's surge into a 3-way tie, was "fortuitous" in this period prior to his convention (Balto. EVENING SUN, 7/1). BOSTON GLOBE's Robinson reports, "to some Republicans, neither Clinton's rise nor Perot's fall are quite as eye-popping as Bush's continuing free-fall" (7/2). More Germond: "The President makes himself more visible and he goes down in the polls" (CNN, 7/1).

*2 ELECTORAL COLLEGE: WHICH STATES BIND ELECTORS?

While it may be the precedent for Electors to vote for the winners in their state for pres. and VP, the Constitution does not require that. Many state laws do require it; but many do not. The following chart is our best effort to summarize existing law. KEY: The number of Electors in each state appears after the state name; BIND means that State law does instruct the Elector; NON-BIND means that State law is silent; CD means that State law provides one Elector from each Congressional District who may vote differently from the two at-large Electors; BALLOT indicates what the laws in binding states say about how the voting will take place; SEE NOTE refers to notes presented after the chart.

COMMENT: The chart indicates that, with 270 Electors needed for the required majority in the Electoral College, fully 240 of the 538 Electors are not bound in any way by state law -- and in most instances there appears to be no penalty involved for ignoring state laws where they exist. While there have been individual "faithless Electors" in the past, a 19th century case found that the states could bind Electors by state law to vote in a certain manner. There are some who believe, however, that the position of the court could be successfully challenged on the grounds that an Elector is an officer created by the US Constitution and cannot be directed to vote a specific way by State law. Other than to specify a day in December when their votes will be cast in their state capitols, the Constitution does not restrict how Electors may vote in any way; it does not even restrict them to vote only for candidates who have run. Nothing in the Constitution seems to prevent a nat'l caucus or convention of Electors after the November Election Day and before the December day for electoral voting in the State capitols. In other words, if no one seems likely to achieve the 270 majority required, all the Electors could gather to determine what to do, before separating again to cast their actual votes in their state

capitols.

*3 VEEP WATCH: CREW CUT BACK IN STYLE THIS SUMMER?

CNN's Gene Randall reported Clinton "is focusing his attention for a running mate on two men": Al Gore and Lee Hamilton. Clinton on 7/1's W.S. JOURNAL report that his list had been pared to Gore, Hamilton, Bob Kerrey and Harris Wofford: "I have narrowed the list, but not to that number." Randall, citing an unidentified campaign source: "While the actual VP list was longer than just two names, things were moving in that direction, to Gore and Hamilton. ... A decision ... could come as early as next week." David Broder: "They're both solid choices, unspectacular. They don't present any kind of a gamble. ... I'm not sure that picking Hamilton or Gore gets him past that idea that he's a politician." Tsongas, on Gore and Hamilton: "Two very good people. There were other names that had surfaced that I was more concerned about" (CNN, 7/1). NBC has Gore, Kerrey, and Hamilton "on the list," also noting Graham and Wofford (7/1). CBS reported the "frontrunners" as Gore and Hamilton (7/1). NEWHOUSE's Benson adds Graham to the W.S. JOURNAL list, noting Bradley, Cuomo and Rockefeller "have taken themselves out of consideration. ... Conspicuously absent are any women or blacks, both key elements of the [Dem] political base. Campaign aides say Clinton could spring a last-minute surprise, reaching out for an unconventional running mate, a woman or someone from the business or academic world, to strengthen his claim as an agent of change" (7/2). N.Y. POST's Orin adds Graham and Atlanta Mayor Maynard Jackson. "Some who should know insist Jackson isn't really in the mix but his name was floated because the others are white males, which looks politically incorrect" (7/2). KNIGHT-RIDDER's Boyd & Karaim write, "For frustrated voters who are angry and disappointed at politics as usual, the safe route could be a letdown. But it may be the prudent thing to do" (7/2). USA TODAY pictures Graham, Gore, Hamilton, Maynard Jackson, Kerrey and Wofford (7/2).

HAMILTON: CNN's Randall: "A source close to Hamilton confirms that the Clinton team is studying a number of Hamilton's documents." They include: financial statements, voting record, & a collection of speeches. Hamilton, who met with Clinton yesterday: "I've been in contact with ... Clinton with respect to the matter of the vice-presidency. ... I've been impressed that ... Clinton is a fast learner and seems to have a very firm grasp of foreign policy questions. ... I hope I would be of some benefit to him" (7/1). Hamilton said he would give a Clinton offer "very serious consideration." Under an IN law passed in '88 "on his behalf," Hamilton can run for VP and re-election at the same time (Balz, W. POST, 7/2). Hamilton on "Today": "I'm interested and I've said to Gov. Clinton that I would give it very, very serious consideration" (NBC, 7/2). BOSTON GLOBE's Wilkie & Pertman, noting Clinton's troubles with Wofford's position in favor of the PA abortion law, concerns over Kerrey's performance in the primaries and the fact that Clinton "has never been close to Gore," write the meeting with Hamilton "immediately fed speculation that [he] is a leading contender." Warren Christopher, who is heading the VP search, "is believed to consider [Hamilton] an attractive candidate" (7/2). Louisville COURIER-JOURNAL's Mike Brown calls abortion an "unknown factor" for Hamilton. He has a "mixed voting record" on the issue. Asked 7/1 whether he is pro-choice, Hamilton "said he would be glad to go over his voting record 'but I'm not going to put a

label on it.'" He backed a bill allowing military personnel to get abortions and legislation to lift the "gag rule." But he also opposed using Medicaid money for abortions in cases of rape and incest and has gone both ways on measures to prevent DC from using its funds for abortions. Asked whether he supports Roe, Hamilton "said he didn't want to comment at this time. He said he planned to make a statement soon" on the Casey decision (7/2). Jack Germond: "Hamilton, besides the fact I love his haircut ... is a guy that has an extraordinary reputation on foreign policy matters and I think is such a striking contrast to Quayle." CNN's Ken Bode: "He's a very solid guy, so what you get is you get good news when you pick Lee Hamilton." Tsongas said he had told someone earlier: "If I were Bill Clinton, I would pick Lee Hamilton, not knowing what the list was." Asked why Hamilton's a good pick, Tsongas: "He's the best handball player in the Congress, and those of us who were defeated by him are still stinged from that experience" ("Inside Politics," CNN, 7/1). N.Y. TIMES' Gelb looks to a "Hamilton Era" on the House Foreign Affairs Cmte, with Hamilton expected to replace retiring chair Dante Fascell (7/2). USA TODAY's Nagourney: "If Clinton is looking to add heft to the ticket, he couldn't do better than Hamilton" (7/2).

GORE: Jack Germond: "I don't know what Gore does for the ticket. Just another pretty face it seems to me" (CNN, 7/1). NEWSDAY's Clifford reports, "Current speculation centers on Gore ... Sources say that Gore, whose work on the environment and foreign affairs complement [Clinton's] perceived weaknesses, would accept the offer to run with Clinton. Gore aides said the senator did not meet or speak with Clinton yesterday" (7/2). N.Y. POST editorial promotes Gore, stating that his "moderate political sensibility would help Clinton in the latter's effort to bring the Democrats back into the mainstream of American political life." On criticism of the all-Southern ticket: "Frankly, that argument carries less and less weight in an age where American regions are increasingly drawn together by telecommunications" (7/2). N.Y. POST's Orin reports a "counter-rumor that Gore is in doubt because his wife, Tipper -- critic of rock lyrics -- didn't suit the more liberal Hillary" (7/2). USA TODAY's Nagourney notes Tipper Gore's rock lyrics crusade "is certainly a good parry to Bush's emphasis on family values" (7/2). ABC's Hal Bruno on Gore: "He may transcend region because he's involved in so many things around the world," ("Good Morning America," 7/2). BOSTON GLOBE's Wilkie & Pertman note Gore's enviro record would "help Clinton defend himself against likely [GOP] charges that his policies in [AR] despoiled the environment there. Environmentalists also represent a key vote in states such as [CA]" (7/2). N.O. TIMES-PICAYUNE's Poe writes, "The guessing here is that Gore ... may very well decline any Clinton proposal if offered" (7/1).

KERREY: BOSTON GLOBE's Wilkie & Pertman cite sources who say Clinton "is concerned that Kerrey's erratic performance as a presidential candidate in the primaries could follow him to the fall campaign. ... Kerrey advocates savor the idea of a debate" between Kerrey and Quayle. "One Kerrey associate said 'the stuff he said in the campaign would represent no barrier' to Clinton, who was his friend when both were governors in the 1980s. But Kerrey has told friends privately he believes" Hillary Clinton "still resents his criticism of Clinton and would 'nip' any consideration of him 'in the bud'" (7/2).

WOFFORD: He "appears to have been under serious

consideration, but his support of the controversial [PA] law that restricts abortion ... has caused problems" (Wilkie/Pertman, BOSTON GLOBE, 7/2). Wofford issued a statement on abortion and the court ruling 7/1. "He said he was opposed [to a] repeal of Roe v. Wade but has supported limitations on abortion consistent with the Roe decision." Wofford said he supports the Freedom of Choice Act. Clinton, asked whether Wofford's abortion position disqualified him: "I have said I would run a pro-choice campaign with a pro-choice ticket" (W. POST, 7/2).

OTHERS: ABC's Hal Bruno included Rockefeller with Bradley as those who had given "firm" statements that they did not want to be considered ("GMA," 7/2). Ann Richards, campaigning with Clinton 7/1: "Absolutely not. No siree." Cuomo aides said he was contacted by Clinton staffers "to explore his interest," but Cuomo spokesperson Anne Crowley said Cuomo "told the committee that he didn't want to be considered, and that ended the discussion" (Ifill, N.Y. TIMES, 7/2). BOSTON GLOBE reports Graham "is up for reelection this year and said earlier he was not interested" (7/2). League of United Latin-American Citizens head Jose Velez said he urged Clinton to pick ex-San Antonio Mayor Henry Cisneros (DALLAS MORNING NEWS, 7/2).

*4 DEM CONVENTION: PLATFORM LEAVES GREENS BLUE

"In a move that took environmental advocates by surprise, the [DNC] struck a phrase opposing oil drilling in the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge [ANWR] from their national platform" (Schulte, STATES NEWS/ANCHORAGE DAILY NEWS). AK Dems "say the anti-ANWR drilling language was removed with the help of top [Dem] officials ... in part, to help two [AK Dems] running for Congress." But "top DNC officials" say the provision "got lost in the shuffle of negotiations" between representatives of Clinton and Brown, both of whom oppose the drilling. "Brown's staff blames Clinton's staff ... Clinton's staff said it was a mistake." Clinton policy dir. Bruce Reed said the omission "had nothing to do with" the AK candidates: "If Bill Clinton was designing his environmental positions to win support in [AK], he wouldn't have said from the opening months of his campaign that he was opposed to [ANWR] drilling ... It's a mistake to read too much into what is an imperfect process and inevitably an imperfect document" (7/1). A majority of AK voters support ANWR drilling, as do Senate candidate Tony Smith (D) and House candidate John Devens (D).

HE DOESN'T HAVE TO CARRY HIS OWN UPLINK DISH THIS TIME: Comic Al Franken will anchor cable channel Comedy Central's convention coverage. Features of their coverage: "Crissfire" featuring antagonists Chris Buckley and Christopher Hitchens; McLaughlin Group featuring John and a panel of political comedians; "Rumor Control": "Charting and analysis of a convention rumor done up with state by state graphics" (Comedy Channel release, 7/2).

SPEAKER UPDATE: ROLL CALL's Winneker reports the DNC "approached" law prof. Anita Hill "about making a speech" at the convention. She turned down the offer. DNC spokesperson Jim Desler: "I don't know anything other than there may have been discussions" (7/2). N.Y. DAILY NEWS' "Apple Sauce" reports 2 HIV-positive speakers are scheduled. They include: Elizabeth Glaser, wife of "Starsky" actor Paul Michael Glaser; Bob Hattoy, who advises Clinton's campaign on enviro matters (7/2).

*5 CLINTON: "MI CASA ES SU CASA"

"Making clear that he intends to go head to head" with Bush on family values, Clinton "lambasted" Bush, saying Bush advocated family values but "does not value families." In an address to the League of United Latin American Citizens, Clinton "completed two days of cultivating support with key portions" of the Dem party. Clinton "took a couple of shots" at Quayle's today's speech to the Little Rock Rotary Club. Clinton said he "anticipated" Quayle to "brand" him a member of the cultural elite. Clinton: "The only way I'm a member of the cultural elite is that I can spell potato" (Pertman, BOSTON GLOBE, 7/2). USA TODAY reports "polls show Hispanics share many Republican principles, particularly on crime and family values" adding it's "no wonder" Clinton criticized the Bush admin. for talking about family values "without promoting policies to encourage family leave or child care" (7/2). LULAC pres. Jose Velez: "Ninety percent of our membership is Democratic, 10 percent is Republican. However, we vote for the person who is going to do the best job for us." Velez added he "felt slighted" that Bush declined to address them. TX Gov. Ann Richards (D) spoke before Clinton and "exhorted" the crowd make their leaders "show you the numbers of what they've accomplished." She added, "I believe that Bill Clinton is that kind of leader who will give you that kind of performance" (Feeney, DALLAS MORNING NEWS, 7/2). Michael Dukakis also addressed the group "lacing his remarks with Spanish." Clinton offered only, "The old adage 'Mi casa es su casa' will be true when my house is the White House" (Decker/Fulwood, L.A. TIMES, 7/2).

SENATE DEMS OFFER ECONOMIC STRATEGY: Dem Senate leaders "brought out a \$22 billion package of bills that they said would revive the nation's competitiveness." Clinton "publicly endorsed" the plan, which included some of the Clinton programs, "notably to expand vocational training and spend more Federal money on civilian research" (Bradsher, N.Y. TIMES, 7/2). W. POST's Southerland writes the Senators "said it goes further in supporting a partnership between government and private businesses than proposals put forward by the White House or the Republican party, which has traditionally been viewed as the party of big business" "Clinton applauded the strategy" (7/2). W. TIMES' Lambro on Clinton's economic proposal: "Clinton had an opportunity to be bold in his tax policy to promote capital formation and entrepreneurial risk-taking. But, sadly, both of these key economic growth ingredients are missing from his second economic plan in six months" (7/2).

MONEY: Clinton's "concentration in June on fundraising has paid off." He collected about \$3M in June, his best month ever, pushing his total fund-raising to about \$17.2 M. His debt likely fell from just under \$4M to about \$2.5M (AP/N.Y. TIMES, 7/2).

HOME COOKIN': ARKANSAS DEMOCRAT-GAZETTE's Stumpe continues the paper's series examining Clinton's record with a look at his economic policies. "[AR] Republicans have been hitting him over the head with the issue since at least" the '90 gov. campaign, "saying little improvement has been made under" his tenure. '90 GOP opponent Sheffield Nelson: "[H]e's tended to go after low-paying jobs instead of high-paying jobs, trying to parlay our low average salaries into jobs." Clinton: "We developed a state economic strategy and worked with the private sector to increase manufacturing jobs while manufacturing jobs in America as a whole were declining." Stumpe reports "actually, there are statistics to back either view" (7/1). The series continues with social issues, examining "two well-publicized cases involving child

abuse and neglect" which led Clinton to "place more resources into the child-welfare system" (7/2).

TSONGAS: Asked if he'll endorse and campaign for Clinton: "I am going to do something next week, but let me not be specific about it. ... The majority of my time will be spent to organize the foundation," the group Tsongas and Rudman are going to start. Crier: "Are you more interested in pursuing your message than helping the Democratic nominee seek the presidency?" Tsongas: "That's a good question, let me try to evade you. ... I got into this race ... because of the message, and that's where my commitment is." On whether he'll have his name up for nomination: "My ego would say yes, but realistically the fact is Bill Clinton won this nomination, ... [so] we've decided to forego that and to then have our issues brought before the convention, even though they will be defeated" ("Inside Politics," CNN, 7/1).

GET READY FOR MORE HOPE: Jeff Greenfield writes, "Clinton's contemporaries and former neighbors talk of Hope as a town where there was no wealthy mansions on top of the hill." He adds when Hope residents familiar with his "dysfunctional household" hear "talk of 'slick Willie" they "think it's a case of mistaken identity." "It might not be such a bad thing for Clinton to trust the voters enough to let them know where he came from - emotionally as well as physically" (N.Y. POST, 7/2). W. POST's Maraniss tells "the central myth" of the Arkansas traveler, which "harks back to the days of hunters and squatters and backwoods fiddlers." The theme of the myth: "what happens when a traveler gets lost in Arkansas and stops at a backwoods cabin for directions." He points out "even politicians as modern and educated as Bill Clinton, trained at Georgetown and Oxford and Yale, have been shaped by the myth. Depending on the circumstances, Clinton has played either role, traveler or squatter." Maraniss gives Clinton's pot-smoking as an example of the myth (7/2).

*6 BUSH: "LIVE! FROM THE ROSE GARDEN, IT'S PRESIDENT BUSH!"

That's the lead-in to Susan Page's N.Y. NEWSDAY piece (7/2). "It was something between a lawn party and a White House news conference, only there was no food and the parts usually reserved for reporters were played by some rather nervous-looking tourists" (Kolbert, N.Y. TIMES, 7/2). "In a precedent-shattering spectacle staged on the White House lawn for a nationally broadcast morning show," Bush appeared "in the Rose Garden, which incumbent presidents traditionally have used as shelter from political rough-and-tumble" and "opened himself up to questions that ... cut to the quick of his present problems" (Jehl, L.A. TIMES, 7/2). "In contrast to his exasperated jousting with journalists, Bush was more relaxed and expansive when answering a wide range of questions from the audience of 125, which was picked at random by CBS from a line of tourists waiting to visit the White House. ... Until recently, Bush has largely avoided spontaneous events on television, a medium that can magnify his sometimes-awkward phrasing and gestures" (Mashek, BOSTON GLOBE, 7/2). Bush was "calm and relaxed throughout the show, in striking contrast to his rambling, almost frenzied behavior" at a 6/29 GOP fundraiser in Detroit "when, his arms waving and his voice rising, he complained he is not getting credit for his accomplishments" (Condon, COPLEY, 7/2). The appearance "reflected his increasingly frantic desire to get his re-election message out" (Hosler, Balto. SUN, 7/2). Bush's "first foray into

breakfast television politics" was "an event that gave a taste of the potency of Presidential imagery but at the same time underscored the narrowness of the domestic agenda on which he is running" (Rosenthal, N.Y. TIMES, 7/2).

ROSE GARDEN REAX: Audience member/WH tourist 11-year-old Lonnie Thomas said Bush was "cool" but longwinded: "He kept going and going and going, like the Energizer bunny" (N.Y. TIMES, 7/2). Bush manager Fred Malek: "This is a great format for him. He should do more, but on a selective basis" (USA TODAY, 7/2). CBS' Charles Kuralt: "Bush is trying to turn his re-election campaign around. Nothing else seems to have been working very well, so ... [he] did what his opponent's are doing. He went on television to take his message directly to the voters." CBS' Susan Spencer: "Desperate to stop his slide in the polls, Mr. Bush ... put aside his disdain for talk shows. ... For an hour and a half he clung to his presidential mode, to some supporters dismay still avoiding any direct attacks. ... The only real fireworks came in questions from the show's hosts. ... Then again, how likely was it that people specially invited into the Rose Garden would be rude?" HOTLINE publisher Doug Bailey: "There are not going to be very many hardballs that are asked, they are going to be softballs. ... In that context, it was to the president's advantage to do it that way." Audience member Gail Whooley: "Well, we don't ask as hard a question maybe, but we were asking good questions, so I'm not going to apologize." Audience member Al Williams: "It showed that he was a real person and he didn't have to have cuecards in order to be able to deal with the people that he's supposed to be representing." Spencer: "Just what the campaign wants to hear, so look for more Bush appearances in your local TV listings. And six months ago, it would have seemed so unpresidential" (7/1). Likening the questions and comments from audience members to "softballs," W. POST's Kurtz writes, "The downside for Bush was that the program lacked drama giving him few opportunities to score points. By contrast, Perot received a much tougher grilling" at ABC's 6/29 town meeting. Clinton "drew tepid responses" on NBC's "Today" 6/30. "The lesson my be that a candidate needs an occasional fastball to hit a home run" (7/2).

STRATEGY: Bush-Quayle's new "two-pronged offensive" of "attack[ing] opponents' character and temperament while showcasing [Bush's] leadership ... debuted" on CBS 7/1. "While some Republicans charge" the B-Q strategy "hasn't clicked," aides and officials "said their plan is a success." "Top" Bush adviser: "Things have worked out well. Perot took away Clinton's momentum and hit Perot last week and now his support has hit the ceiling hard." A Quayle "associate": "Clinton's had a two-week honeymoon. Now that ends" (Bedard, W. TIMES, 7/2). The WH is also hoping "to restore the luster to [Bush's] image as world leader" with a European tour beginning 7/4, although "jittery about voters taking offense at a globe-trotting president, the [WH] has downplayed" it. "The task is a tricky one, requiring him to lead on economic security and military issues abroad as Americans demand his undivided attention" to domestic issues. "Council on Foreign Relations analyst Michael Mandelbaum: "Bush has the same problem going to Europe that he had when he went to Japan. ... He wants to appear to be the international leader without doing the things necessary to lead." USA TODAY used a 1/92 photo of Bush vomiting in Japan alongside this piece (Lee, 7/2).

ECONOMICALLY SPEAKING: N.Y. TIMES editorial on Bush's 7/1

assertion on CBS that he has a program that "controls the growth of mandatory spending ... And we have a program. It's there. It's definitive." Only 2 and a half pages in the 1,000-page '93 budget are devoted to limiting mandatory spending. In an interview last week with the TIMES, Bush also "challenged the idea that only" Clinton has offered a "coherent economic plan" and said his administration has "32 pages of alternative and option up there right now before the Senate." The 32-page plan "turns out to be a booklet advocating the balanced budget amendment" and "consists mainly of charts; only three pages describe policies" (7/2). Economic Policy Institute's Jeff Faux on Bush: "He's going through the difficult routine of trying to distance himself from the conditions he created." Heritage Foundation economist Daniel Mitchell: "To the extent the economy seems to be stumbling out of recession, there's no real reason people have to credit Bush" (USA TODAY, 7/2). Fred Barnes on Bush raising taxes: "Taxes is the issue that unites Republicans ... when you raise taxes as a Republican you divide the party, that's why he had Pat Buchanan running against him." Dem strategist Bob Beckel: "Taxes have haunted George ever since he made that pledge" ("CBS This Morning," 7/2).

AMERICAN TOP FORTY: N.Y. POST's McKenna reports Time-Warner, "already under fire for a record that glorifies cop killing," will soon release a new album by rapper Paris "urging the assassination of President Bush" according to the NY Sheriff's Assn. A photo of the album's cover shows a "menacing Uzi-toting black man about to ambush the president in front of the U.S. Capitol." NY Sheriff's Assn exec. dir Peter Kehoe: "The effect is it will give someone the idea that they can get on an album cover if they kill the president." US Secret Service special agent Timothy Johnson: "Our concern is people with some kind of mental problems being influenced with such things." Time-Warner spokesperson Tod Hullin "denied the picture was from the yet-to be-released album" but "moments later" Time-Warner recording subsidiary, Tommy Boy Records spokesperson Laura Hines "admitted the explosive album cover is under consideration." Hines: "It was a concept but no artwork has been selected yet." Kehoe and another source said the Paris record "includes a song that urges Bush's death, but they couldn't provide the lyrics" (7/2). N.Y. POST's Seifman reports Sister Souljah addressed a predominantly black Queens elementary school graduation ceremony. Some of the children had just received presidential certificates. During her 10 minute impromptu speech (she was spotted in the audience and invited to the stage by the principal) Souljah told the students President and Mrs. Bush were their "enemies": "You've got to watch out for people who give you certificates and say that's good but go back to the White House and pass laws that kill and destroy your whole people" (7/2).

YOU GOTTA HAVE FAITH: USA TODAY's Stone profiles Faith, NC, where Bush will spend part of his July Fourth. The town of 221 households has only 12 headed by women, nearly all residents own their own homes, and church services draw 1,500 on Sundays -- more than 3 times the city population (7/2).

*7 QUAYLE: COMPETITIVENESS COUNCIL FUNDING CUT

"In a pointed rebuke to the Bush administration's environmental and labor policies, the House voted ... to cut all financing" on Quayle's Council on Competitiveness. Quayle, who himself lobbied to retain funding: "This is simply a political

ploy by partisan democrats who want to give power to the unelected Federal bureaucracy instead of to the elected leaders of the executive branch" (Krauss, N.Y. TIMES, 7/2). The total budget for the council was \$86,000. Quayle aide/council spokesperson Jeff Nesbit: "I'm surprised that Democrats in Congress are not more in touch with their constituents. People are sick and tired of rules, red tape and government bureaucracy" (W. POST, 7/2). Rep. Tom DeLay (R-TX): "This is a malicious attack on the vice president." Rep. Henry Waxman (D-CA): "This council is a rouge agency. ... It flouts the laws" (AP/mult., 7/2). USA TODAY's "Our View" and "Opposing Views" editorial and column focus on the Competitiveness Council. "Our View": "Quayle's council unwisely helps business at the expense of public health and safety." "Opposing view" written by Rep. Joe McDade (R-PA): "Congress' assault on the Competitiveness Council is unconstitutional and foolish" (7/2).

NOT A LATE NIGHT GUY: Quayle will appear on ABC's "Nightline" tonight in an interview taped earlier today (W. POST, 7/2).

LAND OF OPPORTUNITY: Quayle arrives in Little Rock today and will speak to the Rotary (Oman, ARKANSAS DEM-GAZETTE, 7/2).

*8 PEROT: FIRST ROUND OF AD BLITZ POSSIBLE IN 2 WEEKS?

Perot dep. manager Charles Leonard says the campaign ad team, lead by Hal Riney, "is preparing a nationwide blitz ... that may begin in a few weeks" (Berkowitz, N.Y. NEWSDAY). The spots "likely will include biographical material," and possibly "testimonials from high-profile personalities." Leonard: "We want to reach those people who are intrigued by Mr. Perot and his message, but want to know more about this man and what he's done with his life." But a source "close to the ad effort said themes and approaches have yet to be decided and very little filming has been done." The campaign's media buyer, DC-based Media Strategies, has begun checking times and prices with the nets; the spots will "likely be longer than traditional 30-second spots," though probably not as long as the half-hour "infomercial" format. Leonard said the timing of the spots "will not depend" on the GOP/Dem conventions, but rather on when the campaign is "satisfied" with the ads; it's "possible" they might even go on before the 7/13 Dem Convention (7/2).

CITIBANK FLAP: Perot started a mini-firestorm on the ABC "town meeting" 6/29, stating that stock in the U.S.' largest bank (not named, but generally understood to be Citibank), in which he has "sold short," is "insolvent" (see HOTLINE 7/1). CNN's Myron Kandel: "You just don't toss off a remark about any bank, much less the country's biggest bank, being technically insolvent without regard to the possible consequences." He blasted Perot on several fronts: "As an investor in Citicorp stock, Perot is even more inept ... He's losing between \$1-2 million -- small change for him, big bucks for most investors. ... Most disturbing to me is the fact that as even an undeclared presidential candidate, he didn't seem to understand the implications of such a potentially damaging remark. ... As an ex-Navy man Perot should realize that loose lips can sink ships" ("Moneyline," CNN, 7/1). COX NEWS' Andrew Glass: "Perot's failure to tell the viewing audience of his market gamble that Citicorp stock would stumble appeared to constitute a conflict of interest." The "full scope of Perot's bet against Citicorp" is unclear, as is the question of whether he had "covered part or all of his short position in the bank stock" before his comments on ABC. Glass notes Perot

"has railed against" speculation on activities such as "short selling" in the past. Perot in 1987 "condemned speculators for having turned Wall Street into a casino, saying: 'There are a lot of folks at the table playing black and red, and not sure why they are there, except they just enjoy it.'" Glass points to another Perot speculation/investment that might have political significance in the future: Like the Citicorp stock, his investments in German marks, Japanese yen, British pounds, French and Swiss francs, and Australian dollars, "are listed on [FEC] forms as liabilities" -- meaning Perot has bet they will fall in value as well (7/2).

VEEP WATCH: JCS chair Gen. Colin Powell repeated to ROLL CALL's Morton Kondracke that he "rules out any participation in this year's election -- either as a candidate or an endorser of candidates," although he was "sounded out" by both Perot and Clinton about being VP. Friends of Powell cite both his desire to become financially secure in the private sector, and his status as a military officer. Powell says Perot hinted to him about being VP, but gave him this out: "... but you're a soldier, so we can't discuss it." Powell reportedly replied: "Right, Ross. I'm in uniform." Kondracke also uses to Powell to back up Kondracke's own attack on Perot: "[Powell] refuses to badmouth [Perot], but he defends in the strongest terms Richard Armitage," whose career "Perot has tried to ruin." Powell on Armitage, a former colleague at the Pentagon: "I would trust him with my life, my children, my reputation, everything I have." Kondracke incorporates Powell's support of Armitage into his own long-running anti-Perot arguments. Example: "Powell ... could not verify first-hand that Perot had spread defamatory tales about Armitage -- although he has heard reports to that effect from others" (7/2).

REVERE WATCH: Paul Tsongas on Perot liking his plan: "I've made no secret of the fact that I will try to convince anybody, whether [Clinton, Perot, or Bush] as to the need for serious economic changes." On whether he could support Perot: "I'm a Democrat, and I think we have to resolve these problems within the two major parties. ... I think Ross Perot serves a purpose of giving both major parties a kind of kick in the pants" ("Inside Politics," CNN, 7/1). CHICAGO TRIBUNE header: "Tsongas' ideas alive in Perot" (7/1).

ALSO: Balto. SUN TV critic David Zurawik takes an in-depth look at Perot's TV appearances, highlighting the networks' higher ratings with Perot, and the evolving "tougher questions" in coverage of Perot now: "The momentum of such coverage has been building. Even Larry King put a little starch in the questions" in Perot's latest appearance 6/24. He notes many callers to local radio shows complained the ABC "town meeting" had been unfairly biased against Perot. ABC producer Tom Yellin: "I don't think we were all that tough on him. We tried to be informational" (7/2). Sen. Alan Simpson (R-WY): "Some of the most pathetic figures that come before us, with their ... requests for assistance, are chief executive officers. They are totally out of touch of what is going on in Washington" ("Larry King Live," CNN, 7/1). W. POST's McAllister reports Billy Hendon, a longtime activist on the POW-MIA issue who was fired by the Senate POW-MIA Select Cmte, said he had "discussed" the cmte's work with Perot up until his 6/19 dismissal. Hendon worked for cmte vice-chair Bob Smith (R-NH), said the entire cmte "had been sharing its information with Perot." A cmte spokesperson denied that, saying all staffers had taken an oath

not to do so in all but a few instances involving cmte witnesses (7/2). W.S. JOURNAL's Noah examines veterans' support for Perot, including Desert Storm Gen. Calvin Waller. On possible GOP attacks on Perot's opposition to the Gulf War: "Just as it's hard to campaign against a candidate for being soft on crime if he is surrounded by policemen, the vets around Mr. Perot may make it hard for any anti-Saddam charges to stick" (7/2).

DING! Many reports note this a.m. that Perot's "60 day" deadline for detailed issue proposals expires today.

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*9 INVESTIGATIONS: SLEUTHS ON THE LOOSE EVERYWHERE

ITEM: OCTOBER SURPRISE: The Senate panel investigating an October Surprise in 1980, has found that "all credible evidence" suggests Bush was not in Paris at the time when negotiations between the Iranians and the Reagan campaign are said by some to have taken place. The finding, reported by House Task Force Chairman [and Clinton V.P. possibility] Lee Hamilton (D-IN), does not end the inquiry into the possibility of the negotiations, which will now include interviewing in Spain, France, Britain and Israel. GOP Task Force vice-chair Henry Hyde (R-IL) "praised the finding, but warned of the 'aroma of politics' in the probe" (mult., 7/2).

ITEM: After the president yesterday on "CBS This Morning" heatedly disputed accounts from a State Dept official last week that he had warned the Administration in late '89 about Iraq using US aid to develop nuclear weapon capabilities, Rep. Sam Gejdensen (D-CT) released newly declassified documents describing such a fear. Bush told CBS' Harry Smith "We didn't know that. The State Department didn't know it." White House spokesperson Marlin Fitzwater said later in the day "regardless of any memo, it didn't happen." But one DoD memo released by Gejdensen "referred to a CIA report on Iraq's strategy to develop nuclear weapons and the potential for diversion of technology from commercial programs to its arms effort. Gejdensen: "The administrations's own documents tell us the president's denials are not true" (L.A. TIMES/N.Y. TIMES, 7/2).

ITEM: VINCENNES INCIDENT: ABC's "Nightline" reported 7/1 that, contrary to assurances given by Reagan administration officials at the time, Admiral Wm Crowe now says that the USS Vincennes was inside Iranian territorial waters when it shot down an Iranian commercial airliner, in a 7/88 incident which killed 290 people. ABC's Koppel: "The United States did so much to insure that Iraq would not lose it's war against Iran, that the Reagan and Bush administration became allies to Saddam Hussein. And when a U.S. ship accidentally shot down an Iranian passenger plane the U.S. government covered up the truth to prevent that alliance from becoming known" (7/1).

ITEM: Senate investigators took a deposition on the POW issue from Perot in Dallas 7/1. Perot, after first agreeing, declined Sen. John Kerry's (D-MA) invitation to testify in DC because of the "politically-charged atmosphere." Perot told a House cmte in 1986 "that he knew prisoners were still alive in Southeast Asia" but provided no details "for fear of compromising his sources." A Kerry Committee spokesperson said Senators would review Perot's deposition before making it public (Jackson, DALLAS MORNING NEWS, 7/2).

ITEM: W. POST's Isikoff reports the Dem Party is spending up to \$30K/year on opposition research on President Bush -- "including delving into the president's personal finances and looking for possible improprieties in government dealings with Bush relatives." The DNC is reported to have hired the DC firm of Denton & Samuel to probe the Silverado S&L story of the president's son, Neil. DNC Research Director Dan Carol admits to DNC plans to hire another firm to examine past Bush finances: "You've had things about Perot from 20 years ago, you've had things from Clinton 20 years, I guess things from 20 years ago about Bush are relevant." The DNC plans to spend \$10K on each of

three firms: Denton & Samuel, the firm looking at Bush finances, and NK Associates of DC (7/2).

ITEM: L.A. TIMES reports two Perot superior officers in the Navy had filed adverse reports on him -- one calling him too "emotionally maladjusted" for a Navy career, and the other concluding he was "too immature to be entrusted with the leadership responsibilities inherent in sea duty." They were in marked contrast with fitness reports of Perot's first commanding officer "describing him as an 'outstanding' and exceptionally intelligent officer." There have been previous stories dealing with Perot's 4-year naval service, including suggestions of severe disagreements with a superior officer over the propriety of the superior's conduct. Perot, through a spokesman, declined comment but navy officials say "he complained vigorously to the Navy" that the TIMES had been allowed to review the documents. "Officials said the Naval Investigative Service has begun an investigation to learn how the documents were disclosed" (Pine, L.A. TIMES, 7/2).

ITEM: N.Y. POST reports that Manhattan DA Robert Morgenthau will announce BCCI charges against Dem senior Clark Clifford one week after the Dem convention in NY. Clifford "is about to be criminally charged" and that his lawyers have been meeting with Morgenthau's office "to work out a possible plea bargain" (7/2).

ITEM: ARKANSAS DEMOCRAT-GAZETTE continues a look at the story of Gov. Clinton and former State medical examiner Dr. Fahmy Malek. Malek made the ruling on a controversial '81 death involving a patient in care of Clinton's mother -- in a case recently reviewed by NBC and the L.A. TIMES. Others in AR have tried many times over the years to remove him, but he left his \$100K position only in late 1991. A spokesperson for VOMIT ("Victims Of Malak's Incredible Testimony"): "For four years, nothing we could do and nothing he did, no mistake he made, was enough to get him out of there. Then Bill Clinton decides to run for president, he needs to get Malak out of the way, he says in September (1991) that Malak needs to go and Malak's out of the Medical Examiner's office a week later." Clinton has denied any relationship to the 1991 case, saying he was out of office at the time. The DEMOCRAT-GAZETTE does list a number of instances when the Governor's office was supportive of Malak through the years, but quotes many saying that Malak's credentials were such that he needed no support from Clinton to keep his job (7/2).

*10 NEW YORK: D'AMATO REACHES \$8 MILLION

Sen. Al D'Amato (R) raised \$750,000 at a 6/30 fundraiser with Pres. Bush, bringing his total contributions to \$8M. NY GOP chair Wm Powers said the total take from the event was estimated at \$1.3M, but half goes to Victory '92, a GOP cmte focusing on federal elections in NY. Nearly 1,700 GOPers, who paid \$1,000-a-plate, were on hand to hear Bush deliver "one of his most combative political attacks of the year." Though AG Bob Abrams (D) predicted he would bring in \$100,000 in two fundraisers earlier this week, he netted \$50,000. The race "could become one of the most expensive Senate races in the state's history." In response to a possible primary challenge to D'Amato by enviro atty Laurance Rockefeller (R) (see HOTLINE 6/29), Nassau GOP chair Joseph Mondello said "If he were serious about this, he would have come out earlier." But GOP consultant John Deardourff notes Rockefeller "is convinced that D'Amato ought to be replaced" (Keeler, N.Y. NEWSDAY, 6/30).

D'AMATO TIES: Columnist Sydney Schanberg connects D'Amato with N.Y. POST publisher Peter Kalikow, "a real estate baron with a reported net worth of around \$400 million." The connection comes through ex-D'Amato "protege"/POST general manager Richard Nasti who was "involved in the multi-layered scandal uncovered" by Manhattan DA Robert Morgenthau. Morgenthau last week brought charges against the POST for "cohabiting with a crime family to do bad things, known as felonies." Schanberg writes Morgenthau "went out of his way to say he had no evidence" that Nasti was involved, adding the D.A. "didn't try very hard" to find any. Schanberg concludes Morgenthau "apparently has chosen not to interrupt any of the senator's controversial activities -- or even those of D'Amato's personal friends. ... It's friends like these who make a certain kind of world go 'round" (6/30).

NEW YORK OBSERVER's Reiss reports Abrams manager Ethan Geto's PR firm, Geto & deMilly "has been working overtime" to "quiet the outcries" of residents who live near a Remtech medical waste incinerator. The public corruption division of the U.S. Atty's office has been hearing testimony on the plant and how Remtech received the environmental permits to build the facility. City officials have said they were "misled" as to the size of the facility which they thought to be much smaller. The incinerator is the largest in the state and is located in a "densely populated" south Bronx neighborhood. Abrams spokesperson Timothy Gilles said Abrams "does not know" who Geto's clients are. Reiss writes, "Abrams is not on anybody's payroll. But his campaign manager's involvement with the Remtech incinerator could leave [Abrams] vulnerable to attack from a self righteous D'Amato -- especially if the [D'Amato's] own campaign manager, his recently indicted brother Armand, is convicted before Election Day" (6/29 issue). Others: Ex-Rep. Geraldine Ferraro (D), NYC Comptroller Elizabeth Holtzman (D) and Rev. Al Sharpton (D). Primary 9/15.

*11 OHIO: POLLS SHOW IT TIGHT; DEWINE POLL PUSHES IT TO TOSS UP

A poll, conducted 6/17-22 by independent P.R. firm Paul Werth Associates, surveyed 550 adults; margin of error +/- 5% (Werth release, 7/1). An internal DeWine poll, conducted "in June" by The Tarrance Group, surveyed 800 registered voters; +/-

3.5% (Cleveland PLAIN DEALER, 7/2). Tested: Sen. John Glenn (D), LG Mike DeWine (R).

***13 REDISTRICTING UPDATE**

MA (0): The House and Senate approved a Dem-drafted remap 7/1, "but by margins that indicated the plan probably could not be passed" over Gov. Wm Weld's (R) veto. The House passed it 93-60, well short of the 2/3 majority needed to pass it if Weld, as promised, vetoes the plan." As the Leg. acted on the bill, negotiations continued between Weld and Dem leaders in efforts to agree on a compromise map and avoid delays that could cause federal courts to step in and redraw lines." Weld: "Maybe we're a little bit farther apart than we were a half a day ago, but I'm still hopeful we can work something out" (Howe, BOSTON GLOBE, 7/2). Under the plan, most CDs will "remain substantially intact. The bulk of haggling will involve" CDs represented by Reps. Brian Donnelly (D-11), Chet Atkins (D-05), Joe Early (D-03) and Gerry Studds (D-10) (GLOBE, 6/29).

***14 HOUSE RACE BRIEFINGS**

GA 04: In this new suburban-Atlanta CD, an internal poll conducted 6/2-15 for state Rep. Emory Morsberger (R), surveyed 320 GOP RVs. GOPers tested: Morsberger, state Sen. Tom Phillips (R), ex-state Rep. John Linder (R), ex-De Kalb Co. GOP chair Ray Miller (R), and businessmen Jimmy Fisher (R) and Richard Robinson (R) (Morsberger release, 6/26). Dems running: State Sen. Cathey Steinberg (D), Dekalb Co. D.A. Bob Wilson (D). Primary 10/3.

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ATLANTA CONSTITUTION endorses Morsberger in the GOP primary, calling Linder, who pulled 48% in losing to Rep. Ben Jones (D-04) in '90, "too rigid" a conservative. Jones is running this time in the 10th CD. On the Dem side, the paper give the "edge" to Steinberg, although it also praises Wilson (6/26). Robinson purchased \$90,000 worth of TV and radio ads that began airing 6/28 (CONSTITUTION, 6/25).

LA 04: The "Louisimander" -- In what would be LA's 2nd black-majority CD (a snake-like creation that runs from Shreveport across the top of the state to Monroe, then down the Miss. River into major cities like Alexandria and Baton Rouge), atty Faye Williams (D) announced her candidacy at England Air Force Base -- which is not even in the CD. The base was cite of a previous campaign incident. On the eve of the '86 election, Williams, then seeking the 8th CD, landed her campaign helicopter in the middle of base activity. She maintains her helicopter was "pulled down." The "negative" publicity some say cost her the election. LA's remap was signed by the Gov. but is yet to receive DoJ preclearance. Williams faces state Sens. Cleo Fields (D) and C.D. Jones (D). Primary 10/3.

MA 06: Fed. authorities probing Rep. Nick Mavroules (D) "have subpoenaed financial records -- including his wife's checking account transactions" -- from the Community Credit Union, which has "strong ties" to Mavroules. Mavroules' daughter, Deborah Gerakaris, works as a bookkeeper for CCU, and his cousin and several in-laws are on the board of directors. "One source said two top credit union officials have been called by the grand jury." Among the checks being examined are those written from Mary Mavroules' account to Gerald Gouchberg, the owner of a Gloucester beach house the Mavroules' rent. The former owner of the House said Mavroules arranged the sale of the house to Gouchberg, a North Shore developer who "has received federal subsidies for several projects." Mavroules spokesperson Ellen Marlette said the Mavroules and his attorneys were aware of the information requests: "We are aware of that and are not the least bit concerned. They are not going to find anything. There are no improprieties." Meanwhile, Mavroules atty Francis Bellotti "has yet to receive a response to his request for an investigation of alleged leaks from federal officials examining" Mavroules (Meyers, BOSTON HERALD, 7/1). Primary 9/15.

OR 04: "Nearly six years after environmental groups helped him get elected" Rep. Peter DeFazio (D) "finds himself fighting to save the jobs of their political enemies." Though he faces only "token opposition," his base of support is being changed by the state's economy. DeFazio now represents "the largest timber-producing district in the nation, an area that also is home to some of the nation's most dedicated environmentalists." He has promised loggers and millworkers he will try to save as many jobs as possible, but to do that he must "turn his back on the sweeping conservation legislation supported by the environmental groups he has relied on for years." Many of the labor unions contributing to his campaign also want him to "maintain high logging levels in Northwest forests." DeFazio's attempt to straddle the middle has "backfired" among enviros who accuse him of pandering to the timber industry (Portland OREGONIAN, 6/30).

WV 03: Businessman Ron Foster (R) has withdrawn his challenge to Rep. Bob Wise (D) "because the campaign had put too much strain on his family." Wise: "It doesn't change our game

plan that much. It won't mean any slackening." Foster must notify the state election division to officially withdraw from the race. If the circumstances are "extenuating" enough the division will accept the withdrawal and allow the GOP to appoint a replacement candidate. "Foster said he had not discussed the matter with GOP officials" (AP/CHARLESTON GAZETTE, 6/30).

*15 VIRGINIA: STUDENT DISCLOSES ROBB CAMPAIGN TRANSACTION

College student Albie Flanagan told a federal grand jury 6/30 that in the summer of '89 he gave an envelope of phone records to Robert Nusbaum, an atty for Sen. Chuck Robb (D-VA). The grand jury is investigating how Robb's office obtained the phone records of private investigator Billy Franklin, who was writing a book about Robb. Flanagan used a checking account to help "disguise the transaction, but now prosecutors have at least one of the checks" (Allen, RICHMOND TIMES-DISPATCH, 7/1). Four private investigators also appeared before the grand jury 6/30. Two "said they were asked about ways to obtain lists of telephone calls that supposedly are private records" (Cosco, ROANOKE TIMES & WORLD NEWS, 7/1). The probe is part of "a broader investigation into Robb's involvement with an illegally recorded tape of a car phone conversation of Robb's political rival," Gov. Doug Wilder (D) (Baker, W. POST, 7/1). Although 3 Robb aides have been convicted for their roles in leaking the Wilder tape, the gov't's plea agreement of ex-Robb chief of staff David McCloud "said an unnamed lawyer bought Franklin's phone records for \$2,375, billed the Robb for Senate Committee for 'research services' and was reimbursed a 'legal fee'" (Baker, W. POST, 7/2).

STATEMENT BY THE PRESIDENT

I am pleased that my Administration has approved Maryland's request for welfare waivers. This will allow Maryland to put in place a new system of incentives for welfare recipients to make sure their children receive necessary health care and attend school.

Pregnant women receiving welfare would be required to obtain regular prenatal care or not receive a special additional allowance. Families with young children receiving welfare would be required to obtain preventive health care for their children. This prenatal and preventive health care is available without cost to these families through the Medicaid program.

Maryland's reforms also create incentives for parents to make sure their children attend school. Welfare parents who behave responsibly and fulfill these requirements would receive higher payments than those who fail to see to the health care and education of their children.

While some are talking about welfare reform, we are helping to make it happen. Reform is taking place from the bottom up, with the states constructively serving as "laboratories of democracy." My Administration will continue to work with Maryland and other states in reforming our welfare system.

Discussion

H.R. 4548 authorizes additional appropriations for U.S.
contributions to U.N. peacekeeping activities and international
organizations. The appropriation authorizations are consistent
with the FY 1993 Budget.

For peacekeeping activities, an additional \$350 million is
authorized for FY 1992, to be available until October 1, 1994,
and \$366 million is authorized for FY 1993. (\$201.3 million and
\$72.3 million have already been authorized for FYs 1992 and
1993, respectively.) The additional authorizations are needed
to support new U.N. peacekeeping activities in Cambodia,
El Salvador, and Yugoslavia and for other contingencies.

H.R. 4548 also authorizes additional appropriations of \$53.8 million for FY 1993 for contributions to the United Nations and other international organizations. (\$766.7 million has already been authorized for these organizations in FY 1993.)

Conclusion and Recommendations

In recommending approval, the Department of State advises that it "welcomes the authorization measures the Congress has taken on this most important funding issue." We join the Departments of State and Defense and the National Security Council in recommending approval of H.R. 4548, which passed both Houses of Congress by voice vote.

The Attorney General, Samuel K. Skinner, Nicholas E. Calio, C. Boyden Gray and Constance Horner recommend that you nominate Ilana Diamond Rovner to be United States Circuit Judge for the Seventh Circuit. Since 1984, Judge Rovner has served on the United States District Court for the Northern District of Illinois. Before that, she served as Deputy Governor of Chicago and Legal Counsel to Governor James Thompson for the State of Illinois, 1977-1984; an Assistant United States Attorney for the Northern District of Illinois, 1973-1977; a law clerk to the Honorable James Parson, United States District Court for the Northern District of Illinois, 1972-1972; and a law researcher for Richard J. Phelan, Esq., 1971. She received an A.B. degree (1960) from Bryn Mawr College, an Intermediate LL.B. degree (1961) from Kings College of the University of London, and a J.D. degree (1966) from Chicago-Kent College of Law of the Illinois Institute of Technology. Judge Rovner is 53 years old, married, has one child and resides in Chicago, Illinois. The American Bar Association has reviewed Judge Rovner's qualifications and found her to be well qualified for this position.

RECOMMENDATION:

According to the story in today's Wall Street Journal the so-called comprehensive energy legislation as passed by the House of Representatives represents, according to the Secretary of Energy, "a critical milestone" and "is believed to have the support of President Bush."

The House Bill, unlike the Senate version, bans offshore drilling on the East and West coasts, the Florida Gulf Coast and Bristol Bay in Alaska, at least through 2002. It does not lift the embargo on drilling on the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge.

The only conceivable basis for the ban on offshore drilling is to protect coastal areas from damage or pollution resulting from oil and gas drilling operations. But nothing could be more wrong-headed in furthering this objective.

It is commonly estimated that pollution resulting from oil and gas drilling causes a tiny fraction of the oil spills which might affect our coasts (less than 2% of the total). The real source of oil pollution along our coasts are spills from oil tankers and barges, principally transporting foreign-produced oil under foreign flag.

Furthermore, seaborne transportation generally, next to the American public, is the main source of the dangerous plastics, trash and other waste on our beaches. Little can be blamed on the tightly regulated and monitored drilling activities.

If one is a true environmentalist and cares about the preservation of our beaches and coastal waters, the coastal drilling ban is exactly the wrong medicine. Every barrel of oil or cubic foot of gas produced offshore the U. S. reduces the need for tanker-borne foreign oil, barrel for barrel. The real environmental response is to encourage the discovery and production of oil and gas from our offshore waters and elsewhere, and to minimize in every other feasible way our dangerous and ever growing reliance on foreign oil.

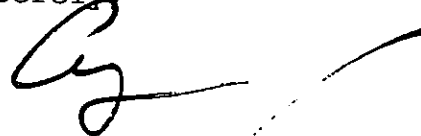

SUBJECT: Personnel Selections - President's Committee on
Mental Retardation (PCMR)

I. Background

The President's Committee on Mental Retardation (PCMR) was established by Executive Order on May 22, 1966, to provide advice to the President and the Secretary of Health and Human Services on the area of mental retardation, to evaluate national, state, and local efforts to facilitate communication between Federal, state, and local agencies, to inform the public about mental retardation, and to mobilize support for promoting self-sufficiency.

II. Term

Members serve a term of three years with no holdover provision.

III. Membership

The PCMR is composed of no more than twenty-one citizen members appointed by the President. In addition, the following six government members serve in an ex-officio capacity: the Secretary of Health and Human Services, who serves as Chairman; the Attorney General; the Secretary of Labor; the Secretary of Housing and Urban Development; the Secretary of Education; the Director of ACTION; and the Secretary of Transportation.

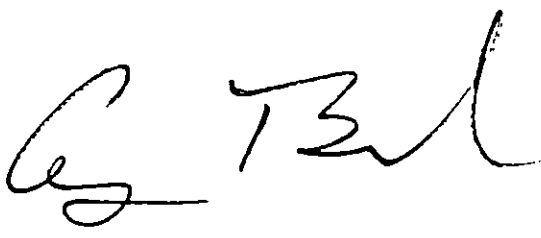

SUBJECT: Personnel Selections - National Council on
Disability

I. Background

The National Council on Disability is an independent federal agency charged with reviewing all laws, programs and policies of the federal government affecting persons with disabilities. In addition, the Council is responsible for establishing overall policy for the National Institute on Disability, the Rehabilitation Services Administration Commissioner, the National Institute on Disability, the Rehabilitation Research Director and other federal departments and agencies as well as, to provide guidance to the President's Committee on Employment of People with Disabilities.

II. Term

Members of the Council serve a term of three years, and until their successors are appointed.

III. Membership

The Council is composed of 15 members appointed by the President and confirmed by the Senate. STATEMENT BY THE PRESIDENT ON NUCLEAR WEAPONS INITIATIVE

In the wake of the momentous changes in what was then the Soviet Union, last September 27 in an address to the nation from the Oval Office I directed that the United States undertake dramatic changes and reductions in our nuclear arsenal and challenged the Soviet leadership to go down the same road with us. In that speech, I directed that the United States bring home from overseas and destroy our entire world-wide inventory of ground-launched theater nuclear weapons. At the same time, I announced that the United States would withdraw all tactical nuclear weapons from its surface ships, attack submarines, and those nuclear weapons associated with our land-based naval aircraft. Many of these are to be dismantled and destroyed.

Today I can tell you that all of the planned withdrawals are complete. All ground-launched tactical nuclear weapons have been returned to U.S. territory as have all naval tactical nuclear weapons. Those weapons designated to be destroyed are being retired and scheduled for destruction.

These historic measures would not have been possible without the full support of our Allies around the world and without the farsighted and courageous leadership of Russian President Boris Yeltsin, Ukrainian President Leonid Kravchuk, Republic of Kazakhstan President Nursultan Nazarbayev, and Chairman of the Supreme Soviet of the Republic of Byelaurus Stanislav Shushkevich. They pledged to honor Soviet commitments to take comparable steps reducing tactical nuclear weapons. It is important that the implementation of these commitments be successfully concluded.

Now I look forward to the prompt ratification of START and to concluding a treaty on the even more far reaching reductions President Yeltsin and I announced at the recent Summit in Washington.

Panel Finds Bush Was Not in Paris On 1980 'October Surprise' Dates

Congressional investigators said yesterday "all credible evidence" contradicts claims that George Bush went to Paris in 1980 to cut a deal with Iran to delay the release of American hostages.

The House task force said it would keep investigating whether the Reagan-Bush campaign conspired with Iran to delay the release of the 52 American captives in an "October surprise" effort to rob then-President Carter of a potential boost toward reelection.

The head of the task force, Rep. Lee H. Hamilton (D-Ind.), said it had interviewed about 50 witnesses, lis-

tened to thousands of hours of FBI surveillance tapes and was sifting through tens of thousands of pages of documents provided by the CIA, the State Department and other agencies.

Several people, among them an Israeli arms dealer and a man claiming to have worked as a pilot on secret government missions, have said they saw Bush in Paris on Oct. 19 or 20, 1980.

But Hamilton said, "All credible evidence leads to the conclusion that President Bush was in the United States" between Oct. 18 and 22, 1980, when as vice-presidential candidate he was alleged to have flown

to Paris for secret meetings with Iranian representatives.

"We are glad that Congress, in a bipartisan report, concluded today what we knew all along—that President Bush had no involvement with any alleged meetings in Paris in October 1980," press secretary Marlin Fitzwater said.

The interim report said investigators had received uncensored logs from the Secret Service recording the whereabouts of Bush and his wife Barbara during the days in question.

Partial Secret Service logs obtained by The Associated Press show Bush on a campaign trip in the New York and Philadelphia areas, returning to Washington the night of Oct. 18, playing tennis at the Chevy Chase Country Club the next day, having Sunday brunch with friends, addressing a meeting in Washington that evening, and campaigning in Connecticut on Oct. 20, 1980.

Hercule Perot

It probably doesn't make sense, but Rotweiler told me that he has a fear of Ross Perot.

I said, "Ross Perot is a great American, and there is no reason to be afraid of a bantam billionaire."

"What scares me is that during his business career Ross kept hiring investigators to check up on people he didn't trust. He even signed up a detective agency to look in on George Bush and his family when Bush was vice president of the United States."

"I'm not worried about Bush. I'm worried about myself. Would it surprise you to know that I think I'm being followed?"

"He may believe I know something he doesn't know. No one knows what Perot knows, so if he finds out what I know he'll claim he thought of it first."

"That's absolutely paranoid. Do you really believe that Perot is going around spying on American citizens?"

"What would you do if you had all his money? Look, he spied on his employees, and he has photographs of American ambassadors with Vietnamese women. How can you guarantee that he isn't going through my garbage right now?"

"Just because he is a

law-and-order candidate doesn't mean that he has no respect for the Constitution. If he's elected there won't be a lot of coddling of criminals or the media. This country is dying for a president on a white horse who will give us back the America we knew. Rotweiler, how often does a man come along who is rich enough to do anything he damn well pleases, without being beholden to all the special interests? Instead of worrying about Perot following you, thank your lucky stars that you have a man who wants to change the way the wind is blowing."

"He doesn't approve of people who fool around."

"Neither does Dan Quayle. The difference between the two is that Perot knows how to spell 'bimbo.'"

Rotweiler kept walking around the room looking for an electronic bug. "He could be listening in on this very conversation," he whispered.

"That's not true. If Perot is going to bug anyone it'll be Bill Clinton."

"Why Clinton?"

"Perot already has enough stuff on Bush."

I felt that I had to defend Perot because if he's elected all of us in the media business will have the time of our lives.

I said, "When a man runs for the highest office in the land he has to expect people to say bad things about him. Perot's honeymoon was over a month ago. Now he has to face the same dirty political mudslingers, but it doesn't bother Ross because he has a mission."

"So did Mussolini," Rotweiler said.

I protested. "You can't compare the two. Mussolini was much fatter and he always wore a uniform."

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White House hopes trip polishes image

President Bush — his foreign policy credentials tarnished by lingering problems in Iraq, Haiti, Panama and China — looks to restore the luster to his image as world leader with a European tour beginning July 4.

But the task is a tricky one, requiring him to lead on economic security and military issues abroad as Americans demand his undivided attention in halting recession and street crime at home.

"Bush has the same problem going to Europe that he had when he went to Japan," said foreign policy analyst Michael Mandelbaum of the New York-based Council on Foreign Relations.

"He wants to appear to be the international leader without doing the things necessary to lead."

One bright spot: Bush earlier this month concluded a sweeping arms pact with Russian leader Boris Yeltsin.

Jittery about voters taking offense at a globe-trotting president, the White House and campaign aides have downplayed the trip. Bush:

- Pays a symbolic visit July 5 to Warsaw.

- Attends the Economic Summit of major industrialized nations July 6-8 in Munich, Germany.

- Goes to Helsinki, Finland, July 9-10 for a European security summit.

"It's about expanding our markets in Japan and in Europe, getting economic growth going there so we can have more exports," Bush explained Wednesday on CBS *This Morning*.

Robert Mosbacher, Bush campaign chairman, says it should help: "It's not a minus politically."

A week in Europe removes Bush from the presidential campaign, allowing him to look presidential when polls show he's in a dead heat with Democratic opponent Bill Clinton and undeclared independent Ross Perot.

Secretary of State James Baker, briefing reporters Wednesday, pointed to nothing on Bush's agenda designed to capture the imagination of voters.

Baker said Bush will concentrate on "pro-growth" economic policies for summit partners — Germany, Japan, Canada, Italy, France and Great Britain — and a downpayment on \$24 billion in aid to Russia.

Bush also will work on a consensus for international intervention to end Yugoslavia's civil war.

But Bush's agenda is more modest than in previous years: The new world order cannot be built in one meeting, say his aides.

One thing he hopes to avoid: embarrassment of the kind he suffered in Tokyo when he collapsed at a state dinner, or in Panama City, where he was exposed to tear gas when Panamanian police tried to break up an anti-U.S. rally.

Bush's job, says Mosbacher, is to make the point that "he's not only a leader but the world's leader."

President Bush leaves on a European tour this weekend, hoping to restore his leadership credentials and put domestic woes behind him.

Pocketbook concerns persist

Bush insists the nation is in a recovery

President Bush said Wednesday — as he often does — that economic recovery has begun.

But when he takes questions from average voters, as he did on *CBS This Morning*, persistent worries about the economy, federal deficit and jobs dominate.

"We're in a recovery now," he said Wednesday. "We've been through the longest, dragging recession in recent history. It has been very difficult to stimulate growth in that kind of an environment."

But pocketbook concerns are a campaign issue that won't go away. Sometimes he blames Congress for blocking his recovery package, sometimes he just insists all is well.

Monday in Detroit, he blamed the media, griping that "92% of the news" on the economy has been negative despite a fragile recovery.

Actually, said Robert Lichter of the Center for Media and Public Affairs, 94% of networks' evening news economic stories from last December through March were negative.

"That helps explain why people are so sour on the economy," Lichter said.

Yet even on Wednesday, Bush acknowledged an ongoing

problem, suggesting lower interest rates would help.

The pressure puts Bush on the defensive, and he admits people don't feel the improvements he's touting. On Tuesday, he said there's "a gap between reality and perception."

He also knows his political fate is linked to those perceptions. "Look, I understand the discontent that's out there," Bush said at a June 19 forum in Newark, Calif., where voters peppered him with money worries. "This economy has been in the dregs."

Reports on manufacturing

and construction spending Wednesday signaled continued economic weakness.

The recovery isn't "fast enough (nor) long enough so that most people really have a sense that it has actually happened," said Bush campaign manager Fred Malek. "The good thing about a slow pace is it's likely to be a sustainable pace."

Bush said Wednesday, "Long run, as they say in the old commercial, I'm bullish on America. . . . We're poised longer run for a very vigorous recovery."

The real question is wheth-

er "longer run" means before the election — and whether he'll get any credit.

"To the extent the economy seems to be stumbling out of recession, there's no reason people have to credit Bush," said conservative Heritage Foundation economist Daniel Mitchell.

Jeff Faux of the Economic Policy Institute, a labor-backed think tank, has little sympathy: "He's going through the difficult routine of trying to distance himself from conditions he created."

Prez says Roe's got to go

WASHINGTON — President Bush — who angered conservative supporters when he praised the Supreme Court's abortion decision — yesterday did the politically correct thing and called for the court to overturn the landmark Roe vs. Wade decision.

During a live, 90-minute TV interview on "CBS This Morning," Bush said the high court acted wisely Monday in upholding provisions of a Pennsylvania abortion law that mandates a 24-hour waiting period, requires teenagers to obtain parental consent and imposes other restrictions.

Asked whether he supports Roe, the 1973 decision that legalized abortion, Bush replied: "I am not in favor of Roe vs. Wade, and I would like to see a decision go the other way on it."

But he said he would not try to seek out a prospective justice who agreed with him if he again had to fill a vacancy on the Supreme Court. He insisted he applied "no litmus test" to judicial nominations.

Gary Bauer, a leading conservative who worked in the Reagan White House, said, "There is a lot of anger (among conservatives) about the way the White House responded" to the court's decision, which upheld Roe but gave the states sweeping power to restrict abortion.

"People noticed that in his statement Bush did not call for the overturn of Roe. He said he was pleased with the decision," Bauer said, adding that conservatives also are angry that Bush put Justice David Souter on the Supreme Court without knowing his views on Roe. Souter defended Roe in Monday's decision.

The high court's action "could end up being the worst day of the Bush presidency," Bauer said, because it may energize conservative voters who blame Bush for Souter and might conclude they would be better off with another presidential candidate.

In such a situation, the likely beneficiary would be feisty Texas billionaire Ross Perot, who appeals to conservatives despite his pro-choice views.

In a related development, the Senate Labor and Human Resources Committee yesterday voted, 12 to 5, to approve legislation guaranteeing abortion rights. The bill is similar to the Freedom of Choice act approved by the House Judiciary Committee on Tuesday.

The action by the Senate panel all but insures a veto showdown between Bush and congressional Democrats on the issue this summer.

Ordinary Americans question President before TV cameras

The questions, politely presented, cut to the quick of Bush's problems. He stayed 22 extra minutes.

WASHINGTON — In a precedent-setting spectacle on the White House lawn, dozens of Americans yesterday got their first chance to confront President Bush with the face-to-face, on-camera questions that have become a hallmark of the 1992 campaign.

Appearing in the Rose Garden, which incumbent presidents have traditionally used as a shelter from political rough-and-tumble, Bush opened himself up to questions that — while respectfully asked — cut to the quick of his present problems.

And his responses during the 82-minute encounter with individuals plucked from a White House tourist line offered a look at the frustration and bewilderment, but also the plain-spoken confidence that shape Bush's outlook on what he calls a "crazy" election year.

Asked by a deputy sheriff from California why Americans should vote for him, Bush stumbled through a response trumpeting his domestic programs before reverting to a surprisingly humble theme that is fast becoming the bottom line of his re-election campaign.

"I think in the final analysis people are going to say, 'Who has the experience, who has the temperament to take on these big problems day in and day out?'" he said.

"... Not that I'm perfect," he continued, "but that I have a proven record of being tested by fire, and I think that's a good qualification. I think that's a good reason to ask for some more time as president."

The appearance was arranged and broadcast live by CBS television as part of its *This Morning* program.

In his debut in this year's talk-show style politics, Bush was treated relatively gently by the audience of 125 tourists seated in folding chairs in the Rose Garden. Adjacent to the Oval Office, the Rose Garden is usually reserved for official news conferences and presidential ceremonies.

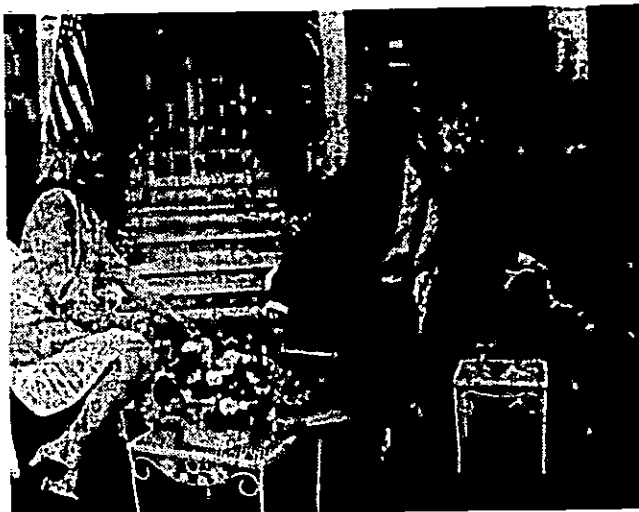
Both undeclared candidate Ross Perot and Gov. Bill Clinton of Arkansas, the presumptive Democratic nominee, have made the talk-show tour a staple of their presidential campaigns. Until yesterday, Bush had resisted such appearances as demeaning to his office.

But he conceded to staying on the air for 22 minutes beyond the agreed-upon hour, and afterward mingled with the audience and took the children among them for a tour of the Oval Office.

While Bush has submitted to similar questioning in events organized by his re-election campaign, the unfiltered composition of the group and its intrusion into off-limits White House terrain made for a rare exchange between President and public.

Several times Bush found himself confronted with questions about broken 1988 campaign promises. Thrown on the defensive over abandoning his read-my-lips, no-new-taxes vow, he offered a puzzling new rationale for his decision to do so in the summer of 1990:

The United States was "moving forces to the Persian Gulf at the

time," Bush said, and when a stand-off developed with Congress over taxes, he backed down on his pledge because "I was determined to keep the funding going" for the military effort.

What was puzzling about this explanation was that Bush broke the no-new-taxes pledge on June 26, 1990 — nearly a month before the Iraqi invasion of Kuwait, which came in August of that year. He apparently confused his June retreat on the no-taxes promise with his October 1990

decision to accept a budget compromise with Congress that included higher taxes.

Bush nevertheless made clear that he would not reissue the no-taxes promise during the current campaign.

"You think I'm going to go in and trap myself again and get to go through all that?" he asked. He conceded that those who had been skeptical about his ability to make good on the pledge had been "proved right."

Democrats Hire Firms to Investigate Bush

Move Reflects Growing Use of 'Opposition Research' by Both Parties

The Democratic National Committee is spending up to \$30,000 this year on private investigators and outside researchers in a wide-ranging effort to find information that might undermine President Bush's record—including delving into the president's personal finances and looking for possible improprieties in government dealings with Bush relatives.

The inquiries are part of the DNC's "opposition research" operation and mark the first time the

DNC is known to have employed such outside firms. It is one sign of the escalating resources both parties are devoting to digging for negative information—to release themselves or pass to the news media—that will damage their political rivals.

The search for such information has become a staple of modern presidential campaigns and has become so energetic and extensive that each of this year's candidates now is trying to embarrass the others by exposing the extent of their research efforts.

Media reports that independent

candidate Ross Perot employed private investigators in the past, pursued damaging information about Bush and once passed along to the president allegations of questionable behavior by two Bush sons, erupted into a major campaign issue last week. Bush charged that investigations of his family were "beyond the pale," while Perot shot back that the media reports themselves were the product of "a group called Opposition Research in the Republican Party . . . generally known as the 'Dirty Tricks' crowd."

Since then, Republican and Dem-

ocratic campaign officials have strongly defended their opposition research units, insisting that they were engaged in entirely legitimate inquiries into the public records of their opponents.

"Anything in search of the record is part of the process," said Betsey Wright, who is overseeing research for the campaign of presumed Democratic nominee Bill Clinton. "That's different from dirty tricks."

The Democrats believe that the record of administration officials involved in cases relating to Bush relatives may provide particularly fertile ground. Interviews with participants and Federal Election Commission reports show that the DNC earlier this year hired Denton & Samuel, a small Washington-based firm that, according to a brochure, specializes in "professional and discreet" investigations for labor unions involved in litigation or collective bargaining disputes. The firm includes associates who are "former law enforcement and intelligence officers."

The DNC wanted the firm to probe allegations that the government's 1988 shutdown of the Silverado Savings and Loan in Denver was influenced by political considerations relating to past service on the thrift's board by Neil Bush, the president's son. FEC reports show the DNC paid the firm a total of \$5,000 in March and April, listing the payments as either "compensation and fees" or "prof serv/consulting."

"I've hired outside assistance to look into whether the [Silverado] case was handled properly, whether the case was treated differently than other cases relating to S&L crooks," said Dan Carol, DNC research director and chief of the party's "oppo" unit. "Would we be doing it if it didn't involve Neil Bush? Obviously not."

Carol said the DNC is planning to use another outside firm, not yet identified, to investigate aspects of the president's finances and past business affairs that Democratic officials believe have not been given adequate attention by the news media. "You've had things about Perot from 20 years ago, you've had things from [presumed Democratic nominee Gov. Bill] Clinton 20 years, [so] I guess things from 20 years ago about Bush are relevant," he said.

As part of the party's Silverado inquiry, an investigator for the Denton and Samuel firm flew to Kansas in April to track down current and former federal regulators involved in the case. The investigator, who asked not to be identified by name, said in an interview that he described himself to those he contacted as both a free-lance journalist and a researcher working for a "client" in Washington, D.C.

"Specifically, I said I was doing research [and] I'm not at liberty to say for who," the investigator said.

The opposition research departments of both parties—known as "oppo" in campaign lingo—consist largely of relatively junior staffers mining a wide array of computer data bases and public documents in search of inconsistencies, flip-flops,

and past votes or public statements that could serve as ammunition against a political rival.

David Tell, 32, the chief of opposition research for the Bush-Quayle campaign, said he has been specifically barred from searching for personal information about either of the president's opponents, and that anybody on his staff of six will be fired for doing so. He added: "The Bush campaign does not employ private investigators—never has, never will."

But current and past officials say a high level of sensitivity surrounds oppo efforts. For example, both the RNC and DNC opposition research units have used law firms or "research" firms to file Freedom of Information Act requests of government agencies, collect court documents or search presidential archives when they don't want it to be known they are the ones doing the searching.

Campaign finance records show that the RNC has paid \$23,470 this year to Benchmark Research of Sacramento, Calif., a firm headed by former Reagan White House communications deputy Joe Rodota, whose specialties include collecting documents for political campaigns. Rodota did not return a telephone call. Gary Koops, press secretary for the RNC, said that Benchmark "helps on a lot of different projects" that include "everything from research, communications strategy to issues briefings."

Carol said the DNC has used a Washington law firm—Harmon, Curran, Gallagher & Speilberg—to file Freedom of Information Act requests with federal agencies in order to avoid politically motivated delays. "It would be foolish, in filing a Freedom of Information request, to send a letter from the DNC," said Carol. "We'd never get anything."

The increased emphasis on opposition research is largely the result of the extraordinary effectiveness with which the Republicans have used negative information about their opponents in recent campaigns.

A little-known opposition research team in the 1984 reelection campaign of Ronald Reagan uncovered irregularities in the financial statements of Democratic vice-presidential candidate Geraldine Ferraro, and business "connections" between her husband John Zaccaro and organized crime figures—most of which was fed to journalists on the eve of the election, according to John B. Roberts, a former White House domestic policy staff aide

who spearheaded the effort for the Reagan-Bush reelection committee.

Roberts said in an interview that his research efforts were aided by two former Internal Revenue Service officials, who scrutinized Ferraro's tax returns, and New York law firms, which conducted title searches of properties managed by Zaccaro. The campaign developed a "map of Zaccaro-managed properties" and looked for "matches" with mob figures identified in reports from a New York state organized-crime commission. A steady stream of tips also was provided by the late Roy Cohn, a New York lawyer who had represented organized-crime figures and who reported regularly to an aide to former White House aide Michael Deaver. Roberts said.

As Election Day approached, Roberts said, the campaign "carefully selected" a major newspaper and turned over its findings on a confidential basis. "We told them . . . 'We'll tell you what we've got, what our sources are and how we got it,'" but stressed that the campaign wanted the paper to confirm the information on its own, Roberts said. It did, and much of the GOP findings appeared across the country prior to election.

Roberts—now a consultant with Sawyer/Miller Group, a public relations firm—said the existence of the Ferraro opposition research was so sensitive that even campaign manager Edward Rollins—now a top aide to Perot—was informed "only in the most general sense" about its methods and findings. The campaign feared news of the research efforts would leak out and backfire.

"We wanted to keep a tight lid on everything," Roberts said.

The 1988 campaign saw perhaps the best-known product of Republican opposition research in Willie Horton, the black convicted murderer who raped a white woman after being furloughed from a Massachusetts prison by Gov. Michael Dukakis, the Democratic nominee. The Horton case had been extensively reported by the Lawrence (Mass.) Eagle Tribune in 1987. But the "discovery" of Horton—or more precisely, the idea of using him as a campaign issue—has been largely credited to Jim Pinkerton, the research director for the Bush campaign. Pinkerton has said he first got wind of the case when Sen. Albert Gore Jr. (Tenn.) briefly referred to it during a Democratic primary debate the following April.

But there have been persistent, if unconfirmed, reports that Republican oppo in the campaign went considerably beyond that. Edmund J. Pankau, a former Internal Revenue Service special agent who heads a Houston investigative firm called Intertect Inc., said in an interview this week that in late 1986 he was retained by a Washington law firm to conduct secret surveillance of then-Democratic front-runner Gary Hart to determine if allegations of marital infidelity were true.

Pankau said his investigators trailed Hart off and on for several months and ultimately "developed" information about the candidate's relationship with aspiring actress Donna Rice, secretly videotaping the two of them together. Pankau

declined to discuss what he did with the information. He also refused to identify the law firm that hired him but said he suspects the ultimate client was a top Republican campaign official.

Although Pankau said that he conducted similar investigations during the last three presidential campaigns, no reference to him or his firm has shown up in FEC reports. "Whenever we're retained a campaign, it's by a law firm cause you want to maintain the confidentiality of the work product," said Pankau.

"We didn't snoop on anybody," said Pinkerton, now a counselor at the Bush-Quayle reelection committee, when asked about Pankau's allegations. "I never heard of him never heard of Intertect . . . I never heard [Lee] Atwater [the now deceased 1988 Bush campaign manager] refer to him. It doesn't make sense."

The Republican success with opposition research in large part spurred the DNC to develop its capability during this year's election. From a two-person unit, it mainly did speechwriting in 1988 the DNC's research department grew into a staff of six with a budget more than three times its former size, said Carol, 34, a former congressional budget analyst.

Carol said that "the Willie Horton issue" was a watershed event in the evolution of oppo because it showed how one piece of a candidate's record can be used adroitly to bolster the broader message a campaign was trying to send the voters.

The Democrats this year seeking to identify Bush and the publicans as the party of privilege and favoritism, Carol said. Therefore, any information showing government favors for members of the Bush family could be highly important. "It fits in with the picture George Bush as someone who well-to-do and takes care of himself," said Carol.

Last month, The Washington Post contacted the DNC while pursuing its own story about the business affairs of Bush's family. In course of reporting the story, the newspaper learned of the par use of private investigators and outside researchers. At that point, the newspaper questioned Carol at them in on-the-record interview.

Carol said the DNC is using outside firms so far: the Denton Samuel investigative firm and Associates, a Washington-based position research company headed by Bob Norris and Jeff Kluefer, former researchers for the Democratic Congressional Campaign Committee.

The DNC plans to spend at \$10,000 on each of these firms as well as another \$10,000 for a third firm whose duties will include investigating Bush's finances, said Carol. He said he could not identify the firm because its contract with the DNC has not been signed.

But Carol defended each of the arrangements and distinguished them from snooping into the private lives of candidates. "This is look at how Bush's government worked," he said.

Dear George,

I thought that your speech at Pearl Harbor on Saturday morning was not only the best you have ever delivered, but the best one I had heard anyone give.

Your words transcended the immediate moment, touched the chords of history, and affected something deep in the American national character.

When you spoke of the calm waters of the Pacific one Sunday morning wrapping themselves around that fine generation of young Americans, I don't see how there could have been a dry eye among your audience. There certainly was not here.

I found myself recalling that Sunday afternoon in 1941 so clearly although I was only a boy four years old at the time. My thoughts went back to the two cousins I lost in the war in the Pacific. I believe they would agree that your words honored them well.

One is tempted to draw analogies between your speech and those of Franklin Roosevelt and Winston Churchill, given the Second World War connection. But, the historian within me, looks farther back to an earlier age when Lincoln dedicated the cemetery at Gettysburg. His words were brief, simple, and eloquent and are now forever etched in the national consciousness. So were your words on that Saturday morning and so they will be.

So, George, the next time some of the more shortsighted pundits in the media begin getting on to you wrongly for being short on perspective or inspiration, I hope you will remember what a friend of yours for over thirty years here in Houston felt that Saturday morning and that he most certainly is not alone.

BAD NEWS. For the second month in a row, the civilian unemployment rate rose 0.3 percentage points. At 7.8 percent, it is now the highest since early 1984. Private analysts had expected the unemployment rate to fall by 0.1 percentage point. There was a particularly large increase in the unemployment rate for teenagers.

In a separate survey, nonfarm payroll employment declined 117,000, about half of that in manufacturing. Private analysts had expected a small gain of about 95,000 jobs.

I would much rather have been wrong, but unfortunately this unambiguously confirms what I have been trying to convey for the last few weeks: the economy has turned much softer. The optimism about the short-term course of the recovery widely shared among economists and the business community early in the spring, at least for the time being is not justified. Also, business profits can be up because costs are reduced, e.g., by layoffs, and that can cause some in the business world to say "business is better," while working Americans become more concerned about jobs. So I hope the "plan for the worse case scenario" and be pleasantly surprised if things go better becomes the operational norm from top to bottom in the Administration and the campaign.

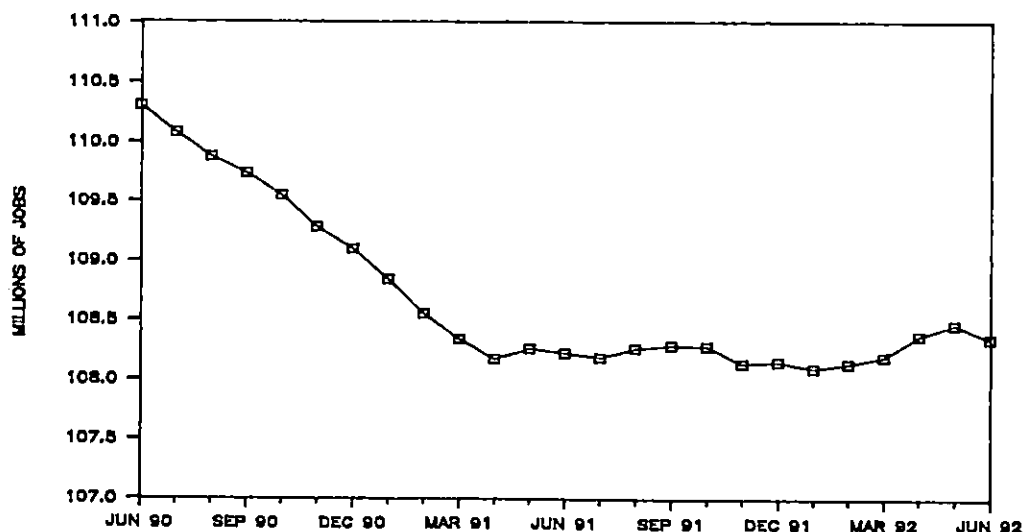
The civilian unemployment rate rose to 7.8 percent in June from 7.5 percent in May. The last time the unemployment rate was this high was March 1984. Private analysts had expected the unemployment rate to fall to 7.4 percent.

The number of nonfarm payroll jobs fell 117,000 in June, following four consecutive monthly increases that totalled 370,000 jobs. The large decline is a surprise; private analysts had expected an increase of 95,000 jobs in June. The decline in jobs was widespread across industries, with government and transportation and public utilities showing the only increases. Total goods-producing employment has now declined for 25 of the past 28 months.

Average weekly hours fell 0.3 hour in June to 34.3 hours for total nonfarm private business. In manufacturing, average weekly hours fell to 41.1 hours in June from 41.3 hours in May. Despite a decline in June, aggregate weekly production hours in the second quarter were up 0.7 percent at an annual rate from the first quarter.

The graph below shows that nonfarm payroll employment has shown very little improvement over the past 15 months, following the decline that occurred during the recession.

Floor Action: In the last day of work before the July 4 recess begins, House and Senate leaders plan to complete work on a measure (HR 5260) that would extend an emergency unemployment benefits program.

If Congress completes its work today, the Senate will begin an 18-day recess and the House will be out of town until next Tuesday.

But lawmakers first want to send the jobless aid bill to the president. Emergency benefits approved by Congress earlier this year are set to expire on July 4, and members want to greet constituents during the recess with news that Congress has provided additional benefits.

Conferees met late last night in an effort to have something ready for the floor today. The Senate measure would provide 26 to 33 weeks of coverage, while the House measure would provide 20 to 26 weeks of additional benefits.

Enterprise Zones. House Democratic leaders also want to pass a measure (HR 11) that would create up to 50 enterprise zones in poor rural and urban areas. The bill is designed to lure business investment into financially distressed areas through tax breaks.

The \$14 billion measure would also extend a dozen tax breaks that expired on Tuesday and repeal a 1990 tax on yachts and other luxury items and scale back a luxury tax on expensive automobiles.

Defense Budget. The House may also consider a \$252.7 billion fiscal 1993 measure (HR 5504) for the Defense Department, although the volume of other legislative work could push it off until next week.

If the measure is taken up, the Strategic Defense Initiative anti-missile system and B-2 stealth bomber are likely to be the targets of attempts to cut funding. Members may also consider an amendment to require U.S. allies to bear more of the costs of American troops overseas.

Russian Aid. If the Senate did not

finish work on a Russian-aid measure (S 2532) last night, members will try to complete action on the bill today.

The measure would authorize an unspecified U.S. contribution — estimated to be about \$5 billion — toward a \$24 billion aid package proposed by President Bush and U.S. allies.

The bill also includes a \$12.3 billion increase in the U.S. contribution to the International Monetary Fund. The funds would be used for loans to Russia and the other former Soviet republics.

START Treaty: The Senate Foreign Relations Committee will mark up the Strategic Arms Reduction Treaty (START), which would make substantial cuts in the long-range nuclear arsenals of the United States and former Soviet republics. The treaty was signed in July 1991.

START would allow the United States to deploy about 8,500 warheads. The Russians would be allowed to maintain about 6,100. All strategic nuclear weapons in located in Ukraine, Kazakhstan and Belarus — the only other former Soviet republics that have nuclear weapons — would be removed to Russia.

Currently, the United States has more than 13,000 warheads deployed on long-range delivery systems. The former Soviet republics have almost 11,000.

The treaty would also establish extensive verification procedures, including on-site inspections of deployed weapons and the monitoring of missile production facilities.

An agreement to institute additional cuts — leaving each side with between 3,000 and 3,500 warheads — was worked out by President Bush and Russian President Boris Yeltsin at a summit in June. There was speculation that the committee would wait until the details of this new agreement were hammered out before considering START. But the panel is expected

HOUSE FLOOR: Budget-cutting marks work on Treasury-Postal bill.

U.S. presidents' expenses were targeted by lawmakers for cuts during House consideration yesterday of the fiscal 1993 Treasury-Postal Service spending bill (HR 5488). Members were nearing completion on the measure at press time.

Members voted 330-87 to reduce the budget for the Executive Office of the President by \$17.9 million. Some Republicans criticized the amendment, offered by Bob Wise, D-W.Va., but Democrats countered that it was part of an overall budget-cutting strategy that many GOP members have pushed.

Andrew Jacobs Jr., D-Ind., tried but failed to sharply reduce the budget for former presidents. His amendment to cut \$1.6 billion from the allowances for former presidents was rejected by a 202-205 vote. The amendment would not have affected the pensions for the four former presidents or Mrs. Lyndon B. Johnson.

The budget for Vice President Dan Quayle's Office was also the focus of the House, as members rejected, 183-236, an amendment that would have allowed fiscal 1993 money to be used for the Council on Competitiveness, which is chaired by Quayle.

The council has come under Democratic attack for its role in shaping federal regulations. The Appropriations Committee cut \$86,000 from White House operations, the amount Vice President Quayle requested for the salaries of two staffers on the council.

Mental Health. The House approved, 358-60, the conference agreement on legislation (S 1306) that would restructure federal mental health and alcohol abuse programs, clearing the bill for the president.

The measure would transfer the

to vote on the treaty today, and it will likely win the committee's approval.

China Trade Status: The House Ways and Means Committee will mark up legislation (HR 5318) that would make the continuation a year from now of most-favored-nation (MFN) preferential trade status for China conditional on an improved human rights record, more open trade policies and a commitment to nuclear non-proliferation in that country.

All past congressional efforts to attach strings to renewal of MFN status for China have failed. The sponsors of HR 5318 therefore made it narrowly focused to apply only to Chinese state-owned industries. Private companies and joint ventures would not be affected.

The change was made to counter arguments that a blanket denial of MFN would do more harm than good by undercutting those sections of the Chinese economy most likely to press for government reforms.

But the administration is still opposed to the bill.

The measure was approved by voice vote by the Trade Subcommittee on Tuesday, and quick full committee action is expected.

Tribal Waste: The Senate Indian Affairs Committee will mark up legislation that would establish a system for Indian tribes to regulate solid-waste disposal on their reservations.

Solid waste is deposited at 650 sites on Indian lands. Of these sites, only two comply with Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) waste requirements.

The measure (S 1687), a substitute that incorporates minor changes made to address concerns raised at hearings earlier this year, would authorize \$25 million for fiscal years 1993-97 to provide grants and technical assistance to help tribes develop waste-management programs.

Bill sponsors John McCain, R-Ariz., and panel Chairman Daniel K. Inouye, D-Hawaii, say the legislation is necessary because state environmental laws do not apply on Indian lands. Also, because tribes are not considered states, they lack the authority to enforce the Resource Conservation and Recovery Act (RCRA), the nation's main law governing the management of solid and hazardous wastes.

Under the legislation, the EPA would be responsible for reviewing and approving tribal waste-management plans and helping tribes follow through with them.

Indian tribes would be given five years to bring waste sites up to the standards of RCRA. But, under certain conditions, such as inadequate funding, tribes would be able to waive this requirement. ■

three research agencies affiliated with the Alcohol, Drug Abuse and Mental Health Administration to the National Institutes of Health.

Agriculture Spending. Late Tuesday, the House passed, 312-99, a \$59 billion fiscal 1993 spending bill (HR 5487) for federal agriculture and nutrition programs.

In a move that would save about \$60 million, members approved, 214-191, an amendment that would reduce the administrative budgets of federal agencies covered by the bill by 10 percent. Only the Food and Drug Administration was exempted.

The House also scaled back a program that provides financial support to companies to promote U.S. commodities overseas. The 331-82 vote reduced funding for the Market Promotion Program to \$75 million from \$200 million.

Price-Fixing. Also on Tuesday, members rejected, 175-225, a conference agreement on a measure (S 429) that would make it easier for discount stores to bring price-fixing lawsuits against manufacturers and other retailers.

The negative vote was due, in large part, to the fact that the compromise version negotiated with the Senate did not include a House-passed provision that would have protected small businesses from price-fixing suits.

President Bush and other Republican opponents contend that the bill would result in more lawsuits, not lower prices for consumers.

Olympic Coins. By voice vote, the House on Tuesday passed legislation (HR 3654) that would authorize the minting of a special set of coins to commemorate the 1996 Olympic Games to be held in Atlanta.

SENATE FLOOR: Balanced budget falls, Russian aid debated.

At press time last night, the Senate was working on legislation (S 2532) that would provide various economic and technical assistance to the struggling republics of the former Soviet Union.

The measure would authorize an unspecified U.S. contribution to the \$24 billion international aid package to the Commonwealth of Independent States, a loose federation of formerly communist republics.

The bill also authorizes a \$12.3 billion boost in U.S. contributions to the International Monetary Fund, which could be used to make more loans to Russia and the other independent states.

Members agreed, 92-2, to an amendment that would suspend aid to Russia if it did not show "substantial progress" in removing troops from the Baltic nations of Latvia, Lithuania and Estonia.

Earlier in the day, the Senate re-

jected a GOP proposal to require a constitutional balanced-budget amendment.

Supporters of the amendment failed to gather the 60 votes needed to cut off a Democratic filibuster. The vote to limit debate was 56-39.

An identical vote to limit debate was cast late Tuesday evening. An agreement reached last week allowed supporters two chances to cut off debate and proceed to a vote on the budget amendment. The agreement also bars senators from offering another balanced-budget amendment for the duration of the year.

The budget amendment was offered as an amendment to unrelated legislation (S 2733) that would expand federal oversight of government-sponsored enterprises (GSEs), such as the Federal National Mortgage Association.

After the budget amendment fell, the Senate passed S 2733 in a 77-19 roll call. The bill would establish a new office in the Department of Housing and Urban Development to regulate activities of GSEs.

Education Aid. A bill (S 1150) to expand financial aid to middle-class students moved a step closer to the president's desk when the Senate gave voice-vote approval to the conference report on the legislation late Tuesday.

The measure would raise the maximum family income level permitted for students to remain eligible for Pell grants, the government's basic college student aid program.

The provisions are part of a broad bill reauthorizing programs under the 1965 Higher Education Act.

Manufacturing Technologies. By voice vote, the Senate passed a measure (S 1330) to promote the development of advanced manufacturing technologies.

The bill would launch a joint industry-government project to develop generic computer-controlled manufacturing systems. The measure also would create a National Quality Laboratory to serve as a clearinghouse for new manufacturing techniques.

TRANSPORTATION spending bill moves on to House floor.

The House Appropriations Committee gave its approval to a \$13 billion fiscal 1993 transportation spending bill (HR 5518) yesterday that essentially remained unchanged from the version approved by the subcommittee on June 11.

Spending for the bill, which makes appropriations for the Department of Transportation and related agencies, falls about 10 percent below the fiscal 1992 level. The one area of the bill over which members expressed some concern was Coast Guard funding, which was basically frozen at the fiscal 1992 level of \$3.3 billion.

The committee rejected, on a 15-16 show of hands, an amendment offered by Dean A. Gallo, R-N.J., that would have

frozen any increase in pay for the Federal Aviation Administration's director and staff of the noise pollution office. Gallo said he has been trying to deal with the FAA for the past five years to get an environmental impact statement on the noise level allowed at the airports in New York and New Jersey.

Calling the "arrogance of the FAA unbelievable," he said the staff there has been uncooperative in dealing with this problem and that this amendment was the only way to get their attention.

But Transportation Subcommittee Chairman William Lehman, D-Fla., said the committee needed to find out the FAA's position on the issue before proceeding with the amendment. Gallo said he might return to the issue in conference, if no movement on the problem was made by the FAA before then.

The committee also defeated, by voice vote, an amendment by Robert J. Mrazek, D-N.Y., that would have removed a section of the bill providing that no money can be used to fund a prototype of a magnetic levitation train, which rides on electromagnetic fields rather than rails. Mrazek said funds were authorized for the project in last year's major surface transportation bill and that the spending bill "goes too far" in removing all funds.

But Lehman countered that there is no money for such a large project with "no immediate pay out."

D.C. SPENDING bill gets quick OK from House Appropriations:

The fiscal 1993 appropriations bill for the District of Columbia sailed through the House Appropriations Committee yesterday with no amendments and only one addition to its report language: The measure (HR 5517), approved by voice vote, would provide a \$624.9 million federal payment to the city to reimburse it for the cost of hosting the federal government. It also would give a one-time payment of \$30.8 million to help support the city's efforts to reduce crime.

The spending bill also authorizes the city to spend \$3.9 billion of its own locally raised funds.

The bill states that no federal funds in the measure can be used for an abortion except to save the woman's life, but places no restrictions on the expenditure of local funds.

In past years, the bill has been vetoed by President Bush because it did not bar the use of locally raised funds for abortions.

District of Columbia Appropriations Subcommittee Chairman Julian C. Dixon, D-Calif., said that again this year he did not include the restriction on use of local funds because he believes the District should have the right to make its own laws, like every state.

The committee, by voice vote, added non-binding report language directing the D.C. court system to be more responsive to crime victims.

LABOR, COMMERCE bills see subcommittee action.

At press time, the Labor, Health and Human Services Subcommittee was nearing approval of its draft measure in a closed-door session. The panel had \$61.7 billion in discretionary spending authority to dole out. This funding level is about \$1 billion more than current appropriations, but is not enough to keep funding levels for programs at pace with inflation.

On Tuesday night, also behind closed doors, the Commerce, Justice, State and the Judiciary panel approved its draft measure. The panel had been given \$22.7 billion to work from, about half of which goes to the Justice Department budget.

ABORTION-RIGHTS measure heading for Senate floor.

Legislation that would bar states from imposing most restrictions on abortion before fetal viability won the approval, 12-5, of the Senate Labor and Human Resources Committee.

The measure (S 25) is similar to a bill (HR 25) approved on Tuesday by the House Judiciary Committee.

Unlike the House measure, however, S 25 specifically states that the bill is not

designed to provide abortion rights beyond what the Supreme Court provided in the 1973 ruling *Roe v. Wade*.

Action on the measure comes on the heels of Monday's Supreme Court ruling, *Planned Parenthood of Southeastern Pennsylvania v. Casey*, in which the court upheld the right to abortion but allowed states to place certain restrictions on it.

In what is a likely harbinger of floor action on the measure, some Republican opponents of abortion rights offered amendments to place restrictions on abortion similar to those in the Pennsylvania law upheld by the court. But the amendments were rejected.

A GOP member also temporarily delayed action on the measure by objecting to the panel's meeting.

When the bill comes to the floor, probably in late July, abortion foes are expected to mount a filibuster. Asked whether the measure's proponents had the 60 votes needed to cut off the filibuster, Chairman Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., answered, "It's going to be very, very close."

ORPHAN DRUG bill would curb federal incentives.

The Senate Labor and Human Resources Committee yesterday took aim at companies making huge profits on so-called orphan drugs, approving by voice vote a bill (S 2060) that would curb federal incentives for drug manufacturers to

develop medications to treat rare diseases.

The 1983 Orphan Drug Act granted drug companies tax credits and exclusive marketing for up to seven years in an effort to encourage the development of new drugs. Orphan drugs are typically medicines for ailments that afflict fewer than 200,000 people.

While all agree that the law has worked well, some members complain that in some cases companies are reaping financial windfalls that the law never anticipated. Some drugs have turned out to be highly profitable, either because the companies are charging high prices, or because the drugs turn out to have broader markets than originally envisioned.

The measure would terminate a company's monopoly for any drug that tops \$200 million in sales. Drug companies and the Bush administration oppose the measure, arguing that the sales cap would deter companies from taking the financial risks involved in developing orphan drugs.

LSC AUTHORIZATION OK'd by Senate Labor despite veto threat.

The Senate Labor and Human Resources Committee yesterday quickly approved a bill (S 2870) that would reauthorize funding for the Legal Services Corporation (LSC), which was created in 1974 to provide legal assistance to the poor.

S 2870 would authorize such sums as necessary for the LSC for fiscal 1993-97. In fiscal 1992, Congress appropriated \$350 million for the agency.

The measure is similar to a bill (HR 2039) passed by the House on May 12.

The Bush administration has threatened to veto the bill, objecting, in part, to the system that favors re-funding of current LSC grantees.

The committee's ranking Republican, Orrin G. Hatch of Utah, said under the current system, grantees have little incentive to increase their productivity or competency. Although not offering any amendments to the bill, Hatch said he had other objections to it that he hoped could be worked out before it goes to the Senate floor.

'BABY BELLS' to gain market access under Judiciary bill.

The House Judiciary Committee yesterday, approved a measure (HR 5096) that would allow the regional Bell telephone companies to manufacture telecommunications equipment, provide long-distance service and offer information services without imposing a waiting period that had been in the bill.

After AT&T was broken apart in 1984, its local phone business was divided among seven regional companies. The so-

called Baby Bells were prohibited from entering certain communication-related businesses where their monopoly power might be used to eliminate competitors.

The bill, approved 24-9, would remove those restrictions but also would set up high judicial hurdles blocking Bell entry into those areas.

The committee approved, 18-15, an amendment offered by ranking Republican Hamilton Fish Jr., N.Y., that eliminated any waiting period before the Baby Bells could enter these other businesses. The bill would have required the companies to wait three years before offering information services, five years before manufacturing equipment and seven years before providing long distance services or electronic publishing. The amendment would allow the companies immediate access to these markets.

One waiting period would remain, however. John Bryant, D-Texas, won an amendment by voice vote that would require the Bells to wait five years before entering the burglar alarm business.

Still, applications to enter the markets would have to be approved by the U.S. attorney general. That shifts the issue from District Court Judge Harold H. Greene, who has monitored Bell behavior since 1984, to the entire federal court system. Under the bill, a competitor could easily protest any attorney general's decision to let the Bells into the markets by bringing a challenge in federal court.

CHILD SUPPORT delinquency would be punished with fines, jail.

The House Judiciary Committee yesterday approved, by voice vote, legislation (HR 1241) that would impose federal criminal penalties on parents who have missed child-support payments for more than a year.

Under the measure, non-custodial parents convicted of failing to pay child-support could be punished by up to six months in jail and a \$5,000 fine. Potential penalties would increase to two years in jail and a \$250,000 fine for a second conviction.

Supporters of the bill contend that making child support delinquency a federal crime is necessary because few states have passed laws to punish parents, mostly men, who have failed for at least one year to make payments. Furthermore, by the time a case is developed under state law, the offender has often fled to another state.

The committee rejected, by voice vote, an amendment that would have allowed the government to punish only those offenders who had fled the state that convicted them of child support delinquency.

JFK FILES disclosure bill OK'd by House Judiciary Committee.

Legislation that would require the

federal government to release thousands of documents relating to the assassination of President John F. Kennedy won the voice vote approval of the House Judiciary Committee yesterday.

Under the measure (H J Res 454), a five-member review panel would be appointed by a federal court to screen all material held by federal agencies. Documents reviewed by the board would be made public within two years as long as they did not jeopardize national security, constitute an invasion of privacy of anyone living, or identify any current intelligence agent or intelligence methods.

The committee rejected, by voice vote, an amendment that would have required the members of the review board to be appointed by the president and confirmed by the Senate. In opposing the amendment, John Bryant, D-Texas, told his colleagues that "the entire purpose of the bill is to dispel any conspiratorial theory that is out there." Bryant went on to say that giving President Bush, a former CIA director, the authority to appoint the review board would feed into conspiracy theories.

HOUSE RCRA markup inches along; 'bottle bill' rejected.

A proposal that would have effectively imposed a nationwide "bottle bill" was defeated yesterday as the House Energy and Commerce Committee continued to mark up revisions to the national solid waste disposal law.

The amendment, offered by Edward J. Markey, D-Mass., would have required a 10-cent deposit on all beverage bottles and cans. Despite the support of Chairman John D. Dingell, D-Mich., it failed by a 16-27 vote.

The amendment would have exempted states in which 70 percent of beverage containers are recycled or reused, but states without mandatory bottle deposits have been unable to achieve such rates.

The committee approved, by voice vote, an amendment by chief bill sponsor Al Swift, D-Wash., that scales back the bill's packaging recycling provisions. Under the original bill, all packagers would have had to adhere to standards of recycling, re-use or package size reduction standards laid out in the measure. The new amendment limits the applicability of the provisions to cans, bottles and jars.

The committee also approved, 32-10, an amendment by Dingell that would require that newsprint contain 35 percent recycled paper by 1995 and 50 percent by 2002. Some newspapers already use paper that contains more than 40 percent recycled paper.

The markup was again halted by a procedural move by bill opponent William E. Dannemeyer, R-Calif., who says the measure would impose excessive regulation and costs on businesses. And

protesters from Greenpeace, which says the bill is too easy on industry, briefly disrupted the meeting.

"One side says we're not doing enough, and the other side says we're doing way too much," said Swift.

FAA CIVIL PENALTIES bill gains Public Works approval

The House Public Works Committee yesterday approved, by voice vote, legislation (HR 5481) that backers say will protect the rights of aviation-sector employees who have been assessed civil fines by the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA).

Under current regulations, aviation-industry employees, such as pilots and flight engineers, can appeal civil fines only to the FAA administrator's office.

Bill backers say the potential for a conflict-of-interest exists since the FAA administrator may be reluctant to overturn fines levied by an FAA official.

The bill would allow pilots and flight engineers to appeal any FAA civil fines to the National Transportation Safety Board (NTSB). Under the bill's original language, other aviation workers would not have this right.

But members agreed, 30-26, to an amendment that would extend the right to appeal fines to the NTSB to aviation mechanics and repairmen. Opponents of this amendment argued that the right to appeal fines to the NTSB should be extended to all aviation-sector employees and to airline companies.

• The committee also approved, by voice vote, a bill (HR 3243) that would require the FAA to publish charts for general aviation pilots detailing safe routes through heavily congested air traffic control areas.

AIRLINE COMPETITION bill gets full committee backing

The House Public Works Committee yesterday approved, by voice vote, legislation (HR 5466) that would prohibit airplane reservation services from steering customers to a particular airline.

There are only four computerized reservation systems in the country, and bill backers say two of them — owned by American and United airlines — control 70 percent of the market.

The other two reservation services have charged that American and United discriminate against competing carriers by steering passengers to their parent airline. HR 5466 would prohibit this kind of discrimination among all computerized reservation systems, which provide flight schedules and rates.

• The committee also approved, by voice vote a bill (HR 5465) that would reauthorize the federal War Risk Insurance program that is used to insure the flights of commercial planes that are called up for military use in times of na-

tional emergency.

Insurance companies, by practice, do not underwrite flights of commercial carriers into war zones.

The insurance program authorization expires on September 30.

FIRE, PIPELINE safety bills approved by Public Works

The House Public Works Committee yesterday also approved legislation that would require new federal buildings to be equipped with automatic sprinkler systems and smoke alarms.

By voice vote, the committee approved the bill (HR 3360), which would also require installation of fire safety equipment in housing for government employees and in new federally subsidized high-rise apartments.

The committee also approved, by voice vote, a bill (HR 1489) that is designed to lessen potential damage to the environment from natural gas and hazardous liquid pipelines.

The bill would require the Transportation Department to consider potential harm to the environment when it determines safety requirements for pipelines. The department currently devises safety requirements with the consideration of protection of life and property.

MERCHANT MARINE panel approves wide range of bills

The House Merchant Marine Committee marked up a slew of mostly non-controversial bills yesterday, including measures that would protect dolphins, create an urban wildlife refuge and make it illegal to abandon barges.

Dolphin Protection. The dolphin protection legislation (HR 5419) calls for an international agreement to ban the practice of catching tuna with large purse seine nets. Despite significant improvements, the method annually kills thousands of dolphins who swim alongside the tuna.

The measure, approved 32-12, would also give Mexico and Venezuela incentive to agree to such an accord by giving the administration the authority to lift an existing embargo on tuna imported from those two nations.

Wildlife Refuge. The committee also approved, by voice vote, a bill (HR 1435) that would create a wildlife refuge in much of the land now occupied by the Rocky Mountain Arsenal, which is home to both bald eagles and a former nerve gas factory. The site, located only 10 miles from Denver, contains a wide variety of wildlife, even parts of it are extremely polluted.

Abandoned Barges. Also by voice vote, the committee approved a bill (HR 5397) that would make it illegal to abandon barges, which have become significant environmental and safety hazards.

In other action, the committee approved:

• HR 2919, which would soften a proposed 50 percent cut in the allowable harvest of New England groundfish, such as cod and haddock.

• HR 5013, which would ban imports of critically endangered exotic birds.

• HR 5257, which would bring so-called "voyages-to-nowhere" under merchant marine laws that require U.S.-flagged ships and U.S. crews.

CUBA EMBARGO bill approved by House Merchant Marine

The House Merchant Marine Committee approved, by voice vote, a bill (HR 5323) that would block ships that have taken part in trade with Cuba from entering U.S. ports.

The bill was approved by the Foreign Affairs Committee on June 4.

The Merchant Marine Committee has jurisdiction over the maritime trade section of the bill, which would allow the president to apply sanctions on any nation that provides aid to Cuba.

The measure would also give the president the discretion to impose penalties on U.S. corporate subsidiaries abroad that do business with the Cuban government.

The aim of the bill is to increase pressure on Cuba to move towards a more democratic government.

PACIFIC YEW tree to be protected under Senate Energy bill

The Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee approved a host of bills yesterday, all by a 20-0 vote, including one that would provide for the management of the Pacific yew tree, the source of a promising anti-cancer drug.

The bill (S 2851) would ensure that the yews on federal lands be harvested before the area is opened to loggers. Yew bark contains a substance called taxol that has shown potential in treating ovarian, breast and lung cancer. The House is considering a similar bill (HR 3836).

The committee also approved:

• S 2656, which would strengthen the hand of service station operators in their dealings with oil companies by barring an oil company from proposing stringent contract terms that make it impractical for an independent operator to retain a franchise.

The bill's supporters argue that oil companies offer such terms in franchise-renewal negotiations because they want to force out independent service station operators and replace them with more profitable company-owned stations.

• HR 3359, which is aimed at preserving the Old Faithful geyser at Yellowstone Park by imposing a moratorium on federal geothermal leasing within a 15-mile radius of the park.

HEALTH REVISIONS still being hashed out by Ways and Means.

The House Ways and Means Health Subcommittee continued work in a closed-door session yesterday on a draft measure designed to reduce the costs of medical care.

Besides reducing health-care costs for both employers and individuals, the measure aims to expand access to health insurance and overhaul the Medicare program.

At press time yesterday panel members were considering several dozen amendments to make changes in the Medicare and Medicaid programs.

FEDERAL WORKERS' job complaints addressed by bill.

The House Post Office and Civil Service Committee approved, 17-0, legislation (HR 3613) yesterday that seeks to provide federal workers with a more fair and and speedier system of resolving discrimination and sexual harassment complaints.

"Finally today we bring in federal employees who have been left out in the cold for almost thirty years," Del. Eleanor Holmes Norton, D-D.C., told the committee.

A key provision of the bill would change the procedure for investigating discrimination complaints. Currently, the investigations are conducted by the agency that employs the worker. Under the bill, alleged violations of equal employment opportunity laws would be adjudicated by the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission.

The legislation would also require agencies to respond to complaints more quickly and simplify filing requirements.

TECHNOLOGY POLICY for businesses endorsed by panel.

Legislation that would require the Commerce Department to develop a national information network to help small- and medium-sized companies become more technologically competitive was approved by voice vote by the House Science, Space and Technology Committee yesterday.

The measure (HR 5231) seeks to bolster and coordinate federal efforts to improve the international competitiveness of U.S. businesses. The information network would provide businesses with information on modern technology and its applications.

The National Institute of Standards and Technology would be authorized for fiscal 1994-97 at an overall funding level of \$1.4 billion.

Members rejected a substitute amendment by Robert S. Walker, R-Pa., that would have expanded the measure to provide tax breaks and ease some anti-trust restrictions on business.

Another bill (HR 4400) that would funnel more federal research money to small businesses was approved by the Science panel by voice vote.

Federal agencies would be required to increase the amount of their R&D contracts awarded to small businesses. The amount would rise to 3 percent of an agency's R&D budget.

BUSH CLEARED by House 'October surprise' investigators.

A special House task force cleared President Bush yesterday of allegations that he met secretly with Iranian officials in October 1980 in an attempt to delay the release of U.S. hostages until after the November presidential election. The panel is investigating charges that the Reagan-Bush campaign team sought to prevent an 'October surprise.'

"All credible evidence leads to the conclusion that President Bush was in the U.S. continuously during the Oct. 18-22 time period, and not attending secret meetings in Paris, France," said Lee Hamilton, D-Ind., chairman of the task force of Foreign Affairs Committee members.

The finding was included in an interim report, and Hamilton said that the task force would continue to investigate whether the Reagan-Bush campaign conspired to postpone a release of the hostages.

The panel has not reached a decision on other allegations, and Hamilton and Henry J. Hyde, the ranking Republican on the task force, said there was no guarantee that it would by the November election.

Hamilton said he was still probing whether the Reagan campaign made contact with the Iranian government and whether anything, such as arms sales, was done to influence the timing of the release of the hostages. "The conclusion that Mr. Bush was not in Paris in October 1980 does not resolve all of the many other allegations under investigation by the task force," the report states.

REDWOOD PROTECTION bill gets House Interior's approval.

The House Interior Committee approved, 25-18, legislation that would expand the Six Rivers National Forest in northern California to protect a 2,900-acre grove of ancient redwood trees, some of which stand taller than the Statue of Liberty.

As approved by the panel, the bill (HR 2274) would authorize the Forest Service to buy a total of 29,000 acres from the Pacific Lumber Co. for inclusion in the Six Rivers Forest. The area includes the ancient grove which is home to the marbled murrelet. The bird has been proposed for federal protection.

The bill aims to halt the lumber

company's stepped-up logging in the area.

Robert J. Lagomarsino, R-Calif., called the purchase costly and a low priority. But the panel rejected, 27-17, his amendment to ensure that other land acquisitions would not be placed on hold because of the redwood purchase.

The panel gave voice vote approved to a number of other bills, including:

- HR 5492, which would authorize the Environmental Protection Agency to provide consolidated environmental grants to Indian tribes to help them address water and air pollution on reservations. The bill aims to reduce administrative costs to tribes of handling multiple grants.

ALABAMA VOTERS, in runoff ballot, nominate George Wallace Jr.

George C. Wallace Jr. took a big step on Tuesday toward entering a political arena his famous father never did: Congress. Wallace, the son of longtime Alabama Gov. George C. Wallace, won a runoff to capture the Democratic nomination in the 2nd District.

Wallace got 57 percent of the vote against Fay Baggiano, a former state official. Wallace had just missed winning the necessary 50 percent of the vote during the June 2 primary, forcing the runoff.

Wallace will now face newspaper executive Terry Everett, the GOP nominee.

In a battle of state senators, Earl Hilliard won 50.8 percent of the vote to narrowly beat Hank Sanders for the Democratic nomination in the 7th District. In this newly created black-majority district, Hilliard seems a sure bet to become the first black elected to Congress from Alabama in this century.

Republicans chose farmer Kevin Jones in a runoff, but he is not considered a threat to Hilliard.

In the 6th District, Spencer Bachus, a former state party chairman, won 59 percent of the vote to capture the GOP nomination over Marty Conners, a former party official. ■

Not As Scheduled

Lacking a quorum, the Senate Governmental Affairs Committee yesterday called off its scheduled markup. The agenda included legislation (S 20) that would establish performance standards for federal agencies.

The bill, which was expected to win committee approval, would require Congress and the agencies to set standards and goals for the government services provided to the public.
