Thank you and good afternoon everyone.

(Acknowledgments)

It's a great pleasure to be here. For any sports fan, it's a thrill to be with the producers of America's sports trading cards. ((And for me it's a little humbling. I don't dare ask you how many hundreds of George Bush cards you have to trade to get even one Michael Jordan.))

I've come here to talk a little bit about our future ... about the kind of nation we want for ourselves ... and our children. The world has undergone remarkable changes the past few years. Today our kids worry about the usual things ... about school, friends, about such earth-shattering questions as ... where can I get an Olympic "Dream Team" card. But I can tell you one thing they don't worry about any more -- one thing they might have worried about just a short while ago ... the spectre of nuclear war.

Today ... America is safer than ever before. Safer than we were a decade ago. Safer than we were a year ago. Safer than we were just a few weeks ago ... when I sat down with Boris Yeltsin and agreed to eliminate some of the most dangerous nuclear weapons on earth.

Now that we have changed the world ... it is high time to change America. Time to turn our attention to pressing challenges like how to give a pink slip to our slow-growth economy. How to make America's families more like the Waltons, and less like the Simpsons. And how to take back our streets from the crack dealers and the criminals.

This election year, we are told, is about how we can change to meet these challenges. But this election is not just about change, because change has a flip side. It's called trust. When you get down to it, this election will be like every other. When you go into that voting booth and pull the curtain behind you: "trust" matters.

And that's the way it should be. Many times, in the White House late at night, the phone rings. Usually it's a young aide double-checking the next day's schedule. But occasionally, it's another voice -- more serious, solemn -- carrying news of a coup in a powerful country, or the invasion of an ally halfway around the world. The American people need to know that the man who answers that phone has the experience, the seasoning, to do the right thing.

That's trust in the traditional sense. But people who've spent their lives in government forget that trust is more even than that. I'm a Texan -- raised my children there, built my business there. I've learned that our country's heartbeat can be felt in places like Neenah, Wisconsin ... not Washington, D.C.

And so I stake my claim on a simple philosophy: to lead a great nation you must first trust the people you lead.

If you look at almost every important issue we face ... you see a clear choice -- a choice between those who put their faith in average Americans --- and those who put their faith in government.

Let me explain what I mean. Starting with the basics -- home and family.

The most difficult question many parents face is --- "who will care for the kids while we're working?" A few years ago, Washington wanted to help, but their idea was to rock the cradle with the heavy hand of bureaucracy. All the plans boiled down to creating some new kind of government apparatus, like a Pentagon for child care.

I fought for a different approach ... and won. Our landmark legislation allows parents -- not the government -- to decide whether your children are cared for in school, a relative's home, or church.

When it comes to raising children, I say: why not trust the people?

What about our education system? To renew America we must renew our schools, we all know this, but money alone won't do it. We already spend more money per student than almost any other country; and our kids still rank near the bottom in crucial subjects like math and science. Again: a lot of ideas floating around, most of them to pump more tax money into the same system.

I say try something different. Open up schools to competition, and trust you to decide whether you want your kids to learn in a public school, a private school or a religious school.

When it comes to education, again I say: "why not trust the people?"

What about government regulation? Sure, some of it is necessary, even essential. But if you believe that there is a government solution to every problem, an alphabet agency for every issue, than you look at regulation not as a necessary evil, but as a necessary way to rein in people's evil tendencies. The results can be crazy, as this story proves.

The time had come recently for a government agency to update its rules on hard hats. That's right: hard hats. And someone in that agency stumbled upon a potential national crisis --- workers being infected from hard hats. The alarms went off. The bureaucratic blood boiled. One small fact was overlooked. There wasn't a single documented case, anywhere in the United States, of anyone getting infected from someone else's hard hat.

That didn't deter the bureaucrat. So with the best of intentions, the rule was written: every hard hat must be disinfected before one worker passed it to another. Estimated cost to business: \$13 million a year. Measurable benefit: slightly less than zero.

Luckily, this story has a happy ending, but only because we were there to give it one. We found the regulation before it hit

the books, and said: we think America can survive without this particular hard hat regulation.

But can you imagine what might have happened if these enterprising regulators had made their way into the vast, unregulated territory of lunch pails and thermos bottles?//

Some believe the solution to our problems is more government regulation. I take a different view. I've put a moratorium on new federal regulations, to give businesses like this one room to breathe, and grow and create jobs.

On child care, education, regulation, it's a matter of trust --- trusting Americans to make their own choices.

The point is not to let people fend for themselves. Americans are a generous people; and government must never shirk its responsibilities. But programs have to give people a hand-up ... and trust human ingenuity to take it from there.

You'll find a good example of what government can do right here at Outlook. Last April, I challenged the nation's governors to join me in helping our young people enter the world of work. I am particularly concerned about teenagers ... who want to work ... want to learn a skill ... but may be tempted to drop out of school. True to form, Gov. Tommy Thompson is already reaching out to these young people, along with concerned businessmen and community leaders. The youth apprenticeship program will encourage these kids to complete a sound high-school education, while getting on-the-job training at companies like Outlook. This program connects education with the real world of work.

Government can help make that connection -- and I salute Gov. Thompson for helping me create a workforce that's up and ready for the challenges of the next century.

So I believe we can give Americans the tools ... and then it's a matter of trust -- trusting Americans to make their own choices. And when it comes to the most pressing issue of this election year -- revving up our economy -- forgetting this idea of trust is not just a nuisance; it can be downright dangerous.

The revolutions of the past few years herald a new era of global economic competition, with free markets from Siberia to Santiago.

Can the U.S. compete ... now that everyone is playing our game? I know we can. Despite all the criticism you've heard lately, keep in mind a few facts. We are the largest economy in the world. Inflation, the Willie Sutton who robs the middle class of dreams, has been put safely behind bars. The last time interest rates stayed this low, the Brady Bunch hadn't even started re-runs yet. Despite all the stories about our problems, our workers are still the most productive in the world -- more productive than the English, the Germans, the Japanese.

But while our economy is growing, it must grow faster. The question is: how do we do it? The other side suggests a simple two-part solution. First, jack up government spending! And then: raise taxes!

Now as you evaluate their idea, keep this in mind. Here in Wisconsin, whether you like it or not, you already work 126 days

just to pay your taxes -- before you earn a single dime to spend on your family. I don't think I have to ask -- does anyone want to go for 127?//

All this talk of spending and taxes causes me to wonder ... if the other side is a little hard of hearing. Abraham Lincoln spoke of government "of the people, by the people, for the people." But they seem to keep saying ... of the government, by the government, and for the government.

They're hard to dissuade. I'll give you a great example. In January I proposed a common-sense, comprehensive plan to get this economy moving faster, now.

The first sound of a strong economy is usually the sound of hammers pounding away at new homesites. So I proposed tax incentives to build new homes, and a \$5,000 tax break for families who want to buy their first one. Here in Wisconsin, that equals nine months of mortgage payments on the average house.

I understand that private enterprise is the horse that pulls our wagon -- no government program ever created a real job ((although government did keep Johnny Carson in business for 30 years)). So I proposed incentives for businesses to grow and hire. It's estimated those incentives would have spurred the creation of at least half a million jobs ... if they had been approved when I proposed them.

But they weren't approved. Instead, Congress sent back what you might call an "anti-trust" program. New government spending, and new taxes.

So I sent their plan back. I told them to try again. But they still haven't done anything. And it leads me to a theory. In your business, certain numbers mean something. Number 16 is Joe Montana, Number 34 is Nolan Ryan, Number 33 is Patrick Ewing. But there's another number that tells you all you need to know about what's wrong with Washington: Number 38. That's how many years the same party has had control of Congress. I say it's time to trade in old Number 38. Give me a Republican Congress so America can stay Number One.

You see ... it all comes down to a question of trust. I trust you to spend and save your money more wisely than any budget planner in Washington.

This is common sense, and I agree. But there's a certain type of person attracted to government for whom the word "trust" has a strange meaning. Most of them have spent their lives in government, and don't have much experience in the real world.

They say they want to ... "put people first." But if you look closely at what they're advocating ... the people they put first are all on a government payroll.

A leader of a free people must understand that government can not only help, it can hinder. He must have the confidence to say: "I trust you." I trust the people //

Yes, America will change, just as we have changed the world. The question now is: Who will change America for the better? Trust me when I tell you this: it won't be a team of economists from Harvard, or a gaggle of social scientists from a Washington think tank.

If you want to know who's going to change America -- look around you. It's going to be the guy who works an extra shift every week so his son can go to the school of his choice. It's going to be the small businesswoman who takes a risk on a new product. The computer hacker working in a lonely garage, the merit scholar from South Central L.A., the entrepreneur with a future as big as his dreams.

There's your answer: The American people are going to change America.

But only if they have a government with the wisdom to know its own limits, with a leadership who knows where the true American imagination lies. Countries around the world have at long last understood the power of trusting the people. America will change by reaffirming the lesson it has taught the world -- by trusting a leader who trusts you.

Thank you and God bless you, and God bless the United States of America.

I am delighted to be here again with Governor Thompson in a state built on faith, family, and freedom. Wisconsin is an example to America -- just as America is to the world.

In the past three years, America has changed the world. In Berlin, a Wall has crumbled. From Kuwait to Panama, the enslaved are now free. Imperial Communism is a four-letter word: D-E-A-D. Democracy stood fast so that freedom could stand tall.

Go anywhere God's children hate tyranny. They look to America because liberty works. / Well, today I'm glad to be in a place where things like learnfare -- workfare -- and the Parental Responsibility Act -- all tell America: "Watch Wisconsin because Wisconsin works." //

Governor Thompson wants Wisconsin to work even better. That is why he has joined my crusade to reform our welfare system. Let's face it. We know our welfare system has failed. It doesn't lift families from poverty -- it traps them there. Welfare also discourages families from staying together. When a system rips families apart -- it's time to rip apart that system.

Americans yearn to keep families whole / give our kids learning skills / and, yes, track down parents who run out on their kids. They know if America doesn't change the welfare

system for the better -- the welfare system will change America for the worse. / That means trying new plans -- trying new ideas -- trying a new kind of reform. Only then can we break the cycle of dependency. //

In my State of the Union Address, I made a commitment to far-reaching reform. I acted because I trust the American people -- because I believe that what those on welfare really want is a piece of the American Dream: home ownership, meaningful employment, opportunities for their children, and strong, loving families. / Therefore, I am determined to make it quicker and easier for states who choose to reform their welfare systems to get the Federal waivers they need. By asking for a waiver, Wisconsin has said: More important than having an America that helps people in need -- is building an America where fewer people need to be helped.

Governor Thompson and the people of Wisconsin have also taken the lead in another area that requires trusting the people. I'm talking about Wisconsin's Youth Apprenticeship System, which begins today. This historic initiative links workforce training with education reform. It brings business, labor, education, and government together to train students, and create new skills. /

Later today, I'll be going with the Governor to a part of your state that's one of the largest paper-producing areas in the country. I'm told that there, for instance, your apprenticeship system will help 21 students from West Bend and the Fox River Valley area learn the printing trade. //

The power of government is best used to support initiatives like these -- reforms that build on what businesses and communities can do. As long as I am President, I intend to put the power of the government on the side of the people. //

Today, I want to challenge other States to follow Wisconsin's lead in bringing new ideas to our welfare system. Last week, we approved New Jersey's Family Development Program - - whose reforms in the state welfare program reward work and unite families. / I'm confident other States will now do what Americans do best: Bring local genius to local needs. /

In coming months, we will "Watch Wisconsin" to see how "Wisconsin Works." Together, we can help change the welfare system -- and in doing so, change America.

Thank you and good afternoon everyone.

(Acknowledgments)

Americans may not realize it when they reach for cereal on the shelves, but our food industry provides more food for less than any other nation.

This company is one reason we are the world's leader. So I'm pleased to announce that Stu and John Vander Heide have recruited me for a national crusade. Starting today ... I will not only argue passionately that broccoli's benefits are overblown ... but that sugar wafers should be one of the four essential ingredients in a healthy diet.//

This factory is a symbol of change ... changes that have occurred around the world.

I'm told that your company was the originator of something called: "The Survival Biscuit." It was one of the tokens of the Cold War -- a bit of nourishment to fill your stomach as you huddled somewhere in a bomb shelter, in case the unthinkable became tragically real.

While it may not be great for survival biscuit sales, the Cold War is, thankfully, over. Survival biscuits have gone the way of the doomsday clock, "Failsafe" movies, bomb shelters, and "duck and cover drills." Today, America is safer than before.

Safer than we were a decade ago. Safer than we were a year ago. Safer than we were just a few weeks ago, when I sat down with Boris Yeltsin and agreed to eliminate some of the world's most dangerous nuclear weapons.

Now that we have changed the world ... it is high time to change America. Time to turn our attention to pressing challenges like how to give a pink slip to our slow-growth economy. How to make our families more like the Waltons, and less like the Simpsons. And how to take back our streets from the crack dealers and the criminals.

This election year, we are told, is about how we can change to meet these challenges. But this election is not just about change, because change has a flip side. It's called trust. When you get down to it, this election will be like every other. When you go into that voting booth and pull the curtain behind you: "trust" matters.

And that's the way it should be. Many times, in the White House late at night, the phone rings. Usually it's a young aide double-checking the next day's schedule. But occasionally, it's another voice -- more serious, solemn -- carrying news of a coup in a powerful country, or the invasion of an ally halfway around the world. The American people need to know that the man who answers that phone has the experience, the seasoning, to do the right thing.

That's trust in the traditional sense. But people who've spent their lives in government forget that trust is more even

than that. I'm a Texan -- raised my children there, built my business there. I see America as an endless tapestry of people, families and communities. Our heartbeat can be felt in places like Wyoming, Michigan ... not Washington, D.C. And so I believe in a simple philosophy: to lead a great nation you must first trust the people you lead.

If you look at almost every important issue we face ... you see a clear choice -- a choice between those who put their faith in average Americans --- and those who put their faith in government.

Let me explain what I mean. Starting with the basics -- home and family.

The most difficult question many parents face is --- "who will care for the kids while we're working?" A few years ago, Washington wanted to help, but their idea was to rock the cradle with the heavy hand of bureaucracy. All the plans boiled down to creating some new kind of government apparatus, like a Pentagon for child care.

I fought for a different approach ... and won. Our landmark legislation allows parents -- not the government -- to decide whether your children are cared for in school, a relative's home, or church.

When it comes to raising children, I say: why not trust the people?

What about our education system? To renew America we must renew our schools, we all know this, but money alone won't do it.

We already spend more money per student than almost any other country; and our kids still rank near the bottom in crucial subjects like math and science. Again: a lot of ideas floating around, most of them to pump more tax money into the same system.

I say try something different. Open up schools to competition, and trust you to decide whether you want your kids to learn in a public school, a private school or religious school.

When it comes to education, again I say: "why not trust the people?"

One other example: health care. We have the finest quality health care in the world -- but costs are through the roof. Thirty-four million Americans, a population larger than the state of California, are without coverage today, and millions more are worried about losing the coverage they have.

We have to change the system. Some propose versions of socialized medicine -- letting the federal government play doctor.

I say, take a different way, and I've put forth a plan to bring health costs down. It will give tax credits so people without coverage can buy it, and incentives so that small businesses can pool their resources and cover more of their employees.//

When it comes to deciding, What doctor? What hospital? I say: why not trust the people?

What about government regulation? Sure, some of it is necessary, even essential. But if you believe that there is a government solution to every problem, an alphabet agency for every issue, than you look at regulation not as a necessary evil, but as a necessary way to reign in people's evil tendencies. The results can be crazy, as this story proves.

The time had come recently for a government agency to update its rules on hard hats. That's right: hard hats. And someone in that agency stumbled upon a potential national crisis --- workers being infected from hard hats. The alarms went off. The bureaucratic blood boiled. One small fact was overlooked. There wasn't a single documented case, anywhere in the United States, of anyone getting infected wearing someone else's hard hat.

That didn't deter the bureaucrat. So with the best of intentions, the rule was written: every hard hat must be disinfected before one worker passed it to another. Estimated cost to business: \$13 million a year. Measurable benefit: slightly less than zero.

Luckily, this story has a happy ending, but only because we were there to give it one. We found the regulation before it hit the books, and said: we think America can survive, without hard hat regulation.

But can you imagine what might have happened, if these enterprising regulators had made their way into the vast, unregulated territory of lunch pails and thermos bottles?//

Some believe the solution to our problems is more government regulation. I take a different view. I've put a moratorium on new federal regulations, to give businesses like this one room to breathe, and grow and create jobs.

In child care, education, health care and regulation, it's a matter of trust --- trusting Americans to make their own choices.

And when it comes to the most pressing issue of this election year -- revving up our economy -- forgetting this idea is not just a nuisance; it can be downright dangerous.

The revolutions of the past few years herald a new era of global economic competition, with free markets from Siberia to Santiago.

Can the U.S. compete ... now that everyone is playing our game? I know we can. Despite all the criticism you've heard lately, keep in mind a few facts. We are the largest economy in the world. Inflation, the Willie Sutton who robs the middle class of dreams, has been put safely behind bars. The last time interest rates stayed this low, the Brady Bunch wasn't even on television. Despite all the stories about our problems, our workers are still the most productive in the world -- more productive than the English, the Germans, the Japanese.

But while our economy is growing, it must grow faster. The question is: how do we do it? The other side suggests a simple two-part solution. First, jack up government spending! And then: raise taxes!

Now as you evaluate their idea, keep this in mind. Here in Michigan, whether you like it or not, you already work 128 days just to pay your taxes -- before you earn a single dime to spend on your family. I don't think I have to ask -- does anyone want to go for 129?//

All this talk of spending and taxes causes me to wonder ... if the other side is a little hard of hearing. Abraham Lincoln spoke of government "of the people, by the people, for the people." But they seem to keep saying ... of the government, by the government, and for the government.

They're hard to dissuade. I'll give you a great example. In January I proposed a common-sense, comprehensive plan to get this economy moving faster, now..

The first sound of a strong economy is usually the sound of hammers pounding away at new homesites. So I proposed tax incentives to build new homes, and a \$5,000 break for families who want to buy their first one. Here in Michigan, that would have equalled nine months of mortgage payments on the average house.

I understand that private enterprise is the horse that pulls our wagon -- no government program ever created a real job, (although government did keep Johnny Carson in business for 30 years)). So I proposed incentives for businesses to grow and hire. It's estimated the incentives would have spurred the creation of at least half a million jobs ... if they had been approved when I proposed them.

But they weren't approved. Instead, Congress sent back what you might call an "anti-trust" program. New government spending, and new taxes. —

So I sent their plan back. I told them to try again. And I'm still waiting. But I need your help. Write Congress, tell them you want to get this economy moving again. Tell them you don't want to get the impression, that the only way to get rid of the deadlock in Washington, is by cleaning out a little deadwood in Congress.//

You see ... it all comes down to a question of trust. I trust you to spend and save your money more wisely than any budget planner in Washington.

This is common sense, and I agree. But there's a certain type of person attracted to government for whom the word "trust" has a strange meaning. Most of them have spent their lives in government, and don't have much experience in the real world.

They say they want to ... "put people first." But if you look closely at what they're advocating ... the people they put first are all on a government payroll.

A leader of a free people must understand that government can not only help, it can hinder. He must have the confidence to say: "I trust you." I trust the people.//

And ultimately, you must decide who you trust -- who has the experience -- the ideals and ideas -- to find that delicate balance.

Yes, America will change, just as we have changed the world. The question now is: Who will change America for the better? Trust me when I tell you this: it won't be a team of economists from Harvard, or a gaggle of social scientists from a Washington think tank.

If you want to know who's going to change America -- look around you. It's going to be the guy who works an extra shift every week so his son can go to the school of his choice. It's going to be the small businesswoman who takes a risk on a new product. The computer hacker working in a lonely garage, the merit scholar from South Central L.A., the entrepreneur with a future as big as his dreams.

There's your answer: The American people are going to change America.

But only if they have a government with the wisdom to know its own limits, with a leadership who knows where the true American imagination lies. Countries around the world have at long last understood the power of trusting the people. America will change by reaffirming the lesson it has taught the world -- by trusting a leader who trusts you.

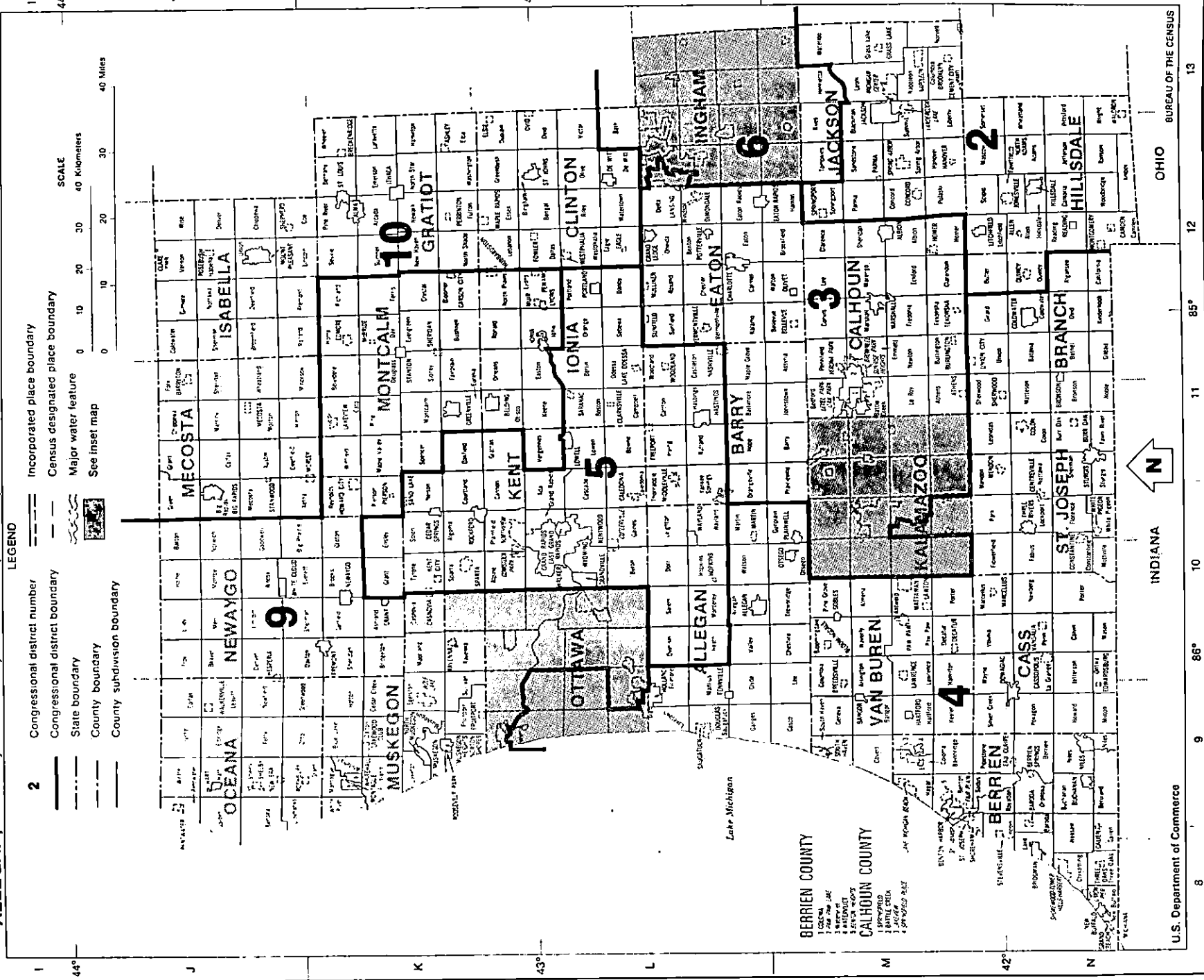

I. PURPOSE:

I. Recent Correspondence

Secretary of State Richard Austin (D) wrote urging you to support S. 250, the "Motor Voter" bill which you have vetoed.

II. Discussion

A. BUDGET

On Tuesday, July 14, 1992, the Michigan Senate adopted the final budget bills to complete work on the FY 92-93 State budget. This represents the earliest date in recent history that the Legislature and the Governor were able to assemble a budget for an upcoming fiscal year. The final state budget is recorded at \$8 billion. The FY 92-93 budget contains no new taxes, maintains the current level of social programs, and contains a slight increase in education funding.

B. UNEMPLOYMENT

Michigan's unemployment rate for May, 1992, stood at 8.8 percent, a decrease of .3 percent over the same period in 1991.

The most recent unemployment figures for Grand Rapids show its unemployment rate stood at 7.1 percent in May, 1992, a decrease of .5 percent over the same period in 1991.

C. STEELCASE EMPLOYMENT

Grand Rapids' largest employer, Steelcase, Inc., called back 700 laid-off production workers in May. Many of these recalls are occurring to help replace workers on summer vacation, but there are signs of a turnaround for Steelcase and the furniture industry as a whole.

D. PROPERTY TAX PROPOSAL

Governor Engler has proposed a ballot initiative that provides a 30 percent across-the-board cut in school property taxes and a three percent cap on annual tax assessment increases. Engler's plan, known as "Cut and Cap," has received 400,000 petition signatures, thus enabling it to be on the ballot in November. This initiative is projected to provide a \$6.5 billion boost to the state's economy.

A Democratic proposal, formulated by House Speaker Lewis Dodak (D), will not be on the ballot because it was denied certification by the Michigan Board of Canvassers.

E. TERM LIMITS

Term limit supporters have delivered to the Secretary of State sufficient petition signatures for a term limit proposal to appear on the November ballot. The petitions have been certified by the Michigan Board of Canvassers.

F. ENTERPRISE ZONES

On July 15, 1992, Governor Engler signed housing enterprise zone legislation to help revitalize distressed urban areas throughout Michigan by creating housing enterprise zones in qualified cities, townships and villages.

Unlike individual tax abatements, this legislation allows anyone within a designated zone to take advantage of lower property taxes, including those who rehabilitate their property as well as those who build new housing.

Currently, some 31 Michigan cities meet the basic criteria for eligibility. To qualify, all but the largest cities must meet the following five requirements: 1) a population of 10,000 or more; 2) high unemployment; 3) high property taxes; 4) largely

older housing stock; and 5) a state equalized value increase between 1970 and 1990 of less than 140 percent. Villages and townships with populations of 5,000 must meet slightly different criteria to qualify.

To be eligible for lower property taxes, new homes within a zone must be an owner-occupied single family or duplex structure and rehabilitated homes must be owner-occupied with a per-unit value of \$60,000 or less. Improved older homes will have their taxes frozen at their unimproved rate. New homes will be taxed at a rate of one-half of the statewide average on building and personal property.

**G. WELFARE REFORM**

Governor Engler outlined his welfare reform plan for Michigan in a speech aired on Public Television on June 2. His plan is designed to strengthen the family with emphasis on responsibility. Incorporating this concept as the cornerstone of his speech, the Governor proposes to:

1. Stress AFDC as a temporary measure and foster the expectation that clients will give something in return for the receipt of assistance. Clients would have three months in which to resolve their situation by finding employment, entering training, or pursuing education.

If the situation is unchanged after three months, the welfare department would enter into a contract with the client whereby the client agrees to look for employment, enroll in an education or training program, or do volunteer work (public agencies would be expected to identify activities in which clients would be involved that would contribute to community improvement). The State's JOBS program, MOST, will assume a prominent role in this effort.

2. Improve child support collection by requiring absent parents to extend medical coverage to their children, deny professional licenses (driver/truck/lawyer/doctor, etc.) to parents who do not provide support, and report failure of support to credit bureaus to render these individuals' credit cards unapprovable at the time of purchases.

3. Encourage employment by changing the 100 hour rule and quarters of work requirement, and exempting the employment earnings of children in the AFDC unit.
4. Prevent the breakup of families through the provision of service programs such as Families First and Communities First.

Governor Engler met with White House and ACF representatives on June 8, 1992, to discuss Michigan's welfare reform plan. A waiver request package is being forwarded to the Administration and legislation will be introduced in the Michigan Legislature. Governor Engler intends to implement his plan effective October 1, 1992.

#### H. EDUCATION

With the arrival of newly appointed school superintendent Dr. Jeffrey Grotsky, the Grand Rapids school system has begun the process of developing a long-range strategic plan. The initial steps have been undertaken by a broad-based community steering committee which began developing strategies in such areas as education outcomes, staff development, finances, community partnerships and employee relations. Ten action teams are now focusing on specific ways to achieve the objectives of each strategy.

Although not currently an America 2000 community, Grand Rapids has attempted to integrate the National Education Goals into its planning process.

#### I. INDIAN GAMING

Seven Michigan tribes (Bay Mills, Grand Traverse Band, Hannaville, Keweenaw Bay, Lac Vieux Desert, Sault Ste. Marie and Saginaw Chippewa) have requested the State to negotiate tribal-state compacts in order to conduct Class III (casino type) gaming.

The State has refused to enter into negotiations with the Tribes for compact approval. The Keewenaw Bay and Sault Ste. Marie tribes have two casino operations. The remaining tribes each have one casino operation.

Currently, at least six of the seven Tribes are presently in litigation regarding the State's refusal to negotiate.

J. ZEBRA MUSSEL

The Zebra Mussel, an exotic species introduced to the Great Lakes by ocean-going shipping, is a major problem in Lakes Erie, Ontario, and St. Clair. It is also beginning to show up in the other Great Lakes, as well as inland waters.

The mussel clogs water intakes, disrupting factories, power plants, and drinking water systems, and has disrupted the food chain in the Lakes. The mussel does, however, provide a limited benefit in that it is a natural water purification device, but can accumulate toxics, which then work their way up the food chain.

Existing removal techniques are costly and have not been very effective. Federal, State and international research is ongoing. EPA Office of Research and Development's budget for FY92 and FY93, for research into Zebra Mussels, is \$1.56 million per year.

K. KELLOGG RAISIN BRAN CEREAL

Much of the Michigan Congressional delegation has been interested in allowing raisin bran cereal to be a food eligible for purchase as part of the Women Infants and Children (WIC) Program, presumably because of the presence of Kellogg in Battle Creek, Michigan. In January, after extensive technical reviews, the USDA's Food and Nutrition Service (FNS) announced that it would not change its nutritional standards for sugar. Thus, Kellogg's Raisin Bran, which exceeds the FNS sugar standard, would remain a cereal not available for purchase with WIC vouchers. This continues to be a sore point with Kellogg, but USDA's decision has been lauded by the nutrition and consumer community.

L. CLEAN AIR ACT IMPLEMENTATION

The implementation of the Clean Air Act Amendments of 1990 continues to be of major interest in Michigan, as evidenced by the announcement in March, 1992 of two regulatory decisions that should have a favorable impact on the automobile industry's economic standing.

The first of these, which you announced in your remarks to the Economic Club of Detroit on March 13, 1992, is EPA's decision not to require, for safety reasons, canister equipment on new cars to control hydrocarbon emissions during the refueling process. Instead, controls will be installed at gasoline pumps in areas

with significant smog problems, an alternative that is safer, more focused, and has more immediate effect in reducing emissions.

In the second decision, under the umbrella of the 90-day regulatory review process, EPA announced that it will publish guidance and criteria for the accelerated retirement of older vehicles. This initiative allows states, cities, and companies the option of scrapping old, high-polluting automobiles and using the resulting emission reductions to satisfy certain emission-reduction requirements in place of more costly controls than are otherwise required under the Amendments. EPA estimates that in addition to reductions in air pollutants, a 5 percent scrapping of pre-1971 cars would result in a reduction in U.S. oil consumption by 1.6 million barrels per year, and an increase in vehicle sales of more than 2000 per year.

The automotive industry continues to be a key player in consultations surrounding implementation of the new Clean Air Act requirements of tighter pollution standards for car and truck emissions as well as new fuel requirements.

1992 POLITICAL OUTLOOK - PRESIDENTIAL

Michigan started off as a very competitive primary for both Republicans and Democrats, but ended up with big wins for the President and Bill Clinton. Michigan has one of the highest unemployment rates in the Nation, and many experts thought that the Bush-Quayle margin might suffer as a result. As it turned out, Pat Buchanan's protectionist, isolationist message went flat. Buchanan had little formal organization, and was no match for the strong Bush-Quayle effort led by Governor John Engler.

Michigan's Democrats dealt a fatal blow to Paul Tsongas, who finished behind Clinton and Jerry Brown. Brown was strongly supported by organized labor, and effectively tapped into the discontent felt by unemployed workers. Tsongas withdrew from the race shortly after the Michigan primary.

The Michigan Bush-Quayle campaign organization is very strong, and ready for the challenge of the general election. Governor John Engler is the Bush-Quayle '92 General Chairman in the state and Tim Leuliette is serving as Finance Chairman. Max Fisher serves as an Honorary National Finance Chairman, with Heinz Prechter on the National Finance Committee. Michigan Republican Party Chairman Dave Doyle and the entire Congressional delegation are campaign Co-Chairmen.

The Presidential election is the only statewide political race in Michigan in 1992. The state will be a key battleground this year with 18 electoral votes hanging in the balance. Most experts expect the election campaign in Michigan to center on economic issues. The three major automakers have experienced financial difficulties recently, laying off thousands of blue and white collar workers, many of whom reside in Macomb County, which was a top target in 1988. Macomb County is an important county due to the high number of swing voters and conservative Democrats. Some fear these swing voters are disenfranchised and disgruntled due to the perceived gridlock both in Lansing and Washington. As in 1988, Macomb County will be a key target for the Bush-Quayle campaign.

Supporters of Texas billionaire H. Ross Perot were very organized in Michigan prior to Perot's withdrawal announcement. The campaign maintained several headquarters state-wide, and many rallies were conducted. Perot had visited Michigan on July 10, less than one week before his withdrawal, in order to submit more than 300,000 signatures to the Michigan Board of Elections, qualifying for the Michigan general election ballot.

The most recent state-wide poll on the Presidential race in Michigan was conducted by the Detroit News on June 2-4, well before Perot withdrew as a Presidential candidate. Ross Perot led in a three-way race with 33%. The President garnered 31% and Governor Clinton trailed in third with 24%. 12% of those surveyed were undecided.

Subsequent to Perot's departure from the race on July 16, Governor Engler, Michigan State GOP Chairman David Doyle, and several Bush-Quayle leaders in the state have conducted outreach efforts to woo former Perot activists into supporting the President. Governor Engler and Chairman Doyle have met with several leaders from Perot's Michigan campaign and are establishing an ongoing dialogue.

The BUSH-QUAYLE ticket carried Michigan's 20 electoral votes in 1988 by a 54% to 46% margin.

REAPPORTIONMENT UPDATE

Michigan will lose two Congressional seats as a result of reapportionment. A state court recently approved a compromise plan that is extremely fair and should allow Republicans a competitive chance in this year's election. As a result of redistricting, Republican Congressman Carl Purcell announced his

retirement because he would be required to move his home and compete in a more Democratic district. Republican incumbent **William Broomfield** has also retired. 11th District Republican Congressman **Bob Davis**, the third worst offender on the Congressional Bank check kiting list, has retired and former U.S. Representative **Phil Ruppe**, a member of the George Bush for President Steering Committee in 1980 and 1988, has announced his bid to win the GOP nomination in a contested primary.

A favorable redistricting plan for districts in the state legislature will give Republicans an opportunity to take control of the state house. Currently, Republicans hold a 20 to 18 majority in the state senate. Democrats hold a 60 to 50 margin in the state house, but the new plan is expected to make at least 20 seats very competitive.

STATE GOP UPDATE

The Michigan Republican Party, considered one of the best party organizations in the Nation, continues to grow under the leadership of Governor Engler and Party Chairman David Doyle. Doyle succeeded **Spence Abraham** as GOP Chairman after serving as the party's Executive Director. Abraham, currently the Executive Director of the National Republican Congressional Committee, originally left Michigan to serve as Vice President Quayle's Deputy Chief of Staff. Michigan Republicans gathered at their state convention on May 30. Elections were held for National Committeeman and National Committeewoman. National Committeeman **Chuck Yob** won re-election without opposition. However, incumbent National Committeewoman **Ronna Romney** was challenged and defeated by **Betsy DeVos**. DeVos edged out **Andi Fischer** on a second ballot vote. Insiders attribute Romney's loss to her apparent lack of commitment to party functions and activities.

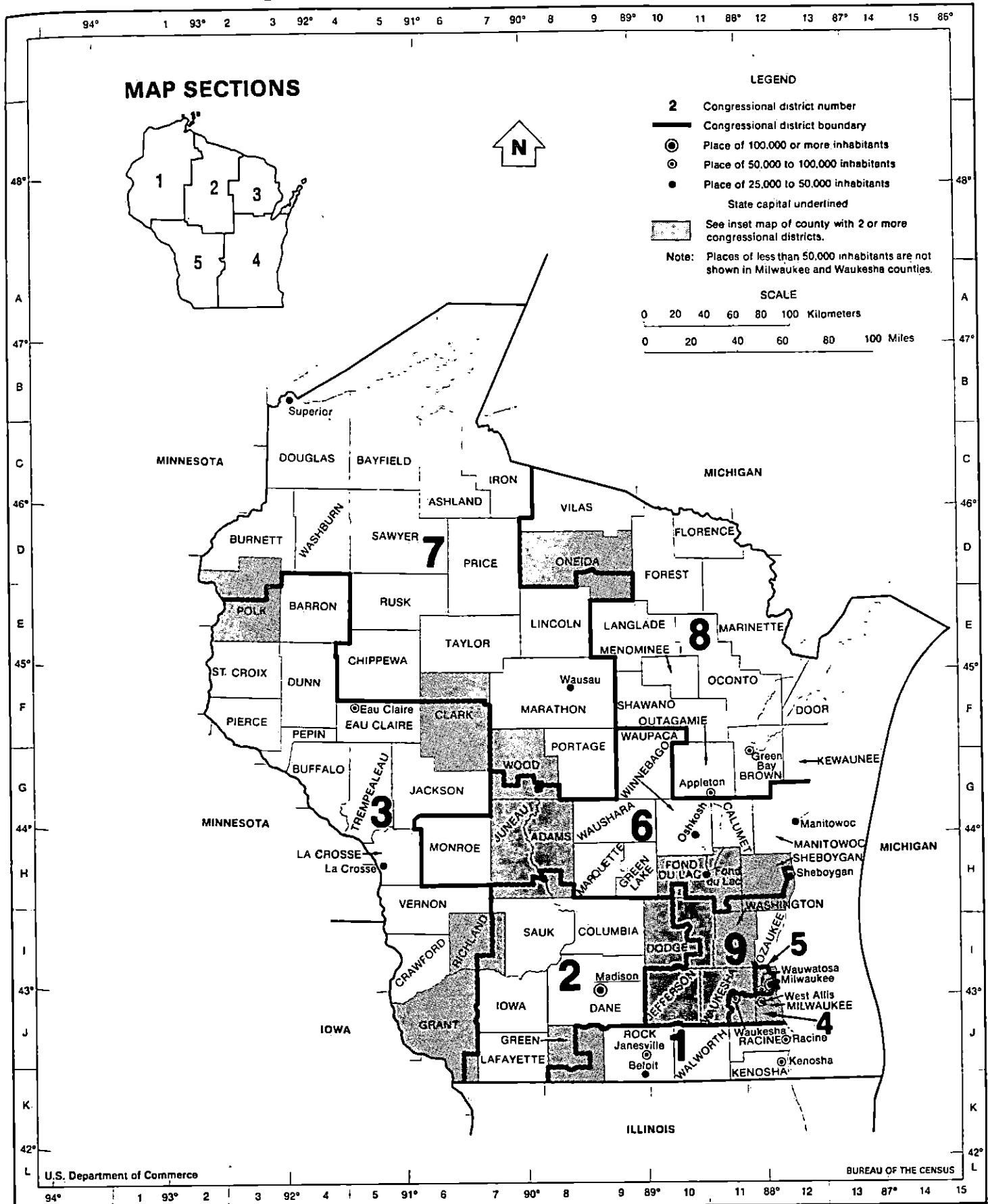

I. PURPOSE

To announce Wisconsin's second Welfare Waiver which will enable the State to implement a two-tier welfare benefit.

II. BACKGROUND

Wisconsin's second Welfare Waiver was signed today by Jo Anne Barnhart, Assistant Secretary, Administration for Children and Families at the Department of Health and Human Services. Wisconsin's "two-tier" Demonstration Project is designed to provide definitive information concerning "in-migration", the movement of out-of-state residents into Wisconsin for the purpose of receiving Wisconsin's higher welfare assistance. The project will hopefully answer the question of whether recipients move from state to state for purposes of receiving greater Aid to Families with Dependant Children (AFDC) benefits.

The Governor believes new Wisconsin residents have relocated there to receive benefits that have traditionally been higher than in other states. Wisconsin's AFDC is currently the 11th highest in the nation. The State's Medicaid program is the broadest in the nation and the general relief benefits are the most generous in the mid-west region.

The waiver that was signed today provides that, during a six month period, AFDC benefits for a new arrival in the State would be paid at the level in that person's State of origin, regardless of whether the state of origin's rate is higher or lower than Wisconsin's.

After the state receives the necessary waiver, Wisconsin's Attorney General will ask the State Supreme Court to rule on the constitutionality of the demonstration project. The state is permitted to implement the pilot if the Court either approves the project or fails to act within nine months.

On April 10, 1992 HHS signed the first welfare reform waiver for Wisconsin to implement the Parental and Family Responsibility Demonstration Project (PFR). PFR provides a series of incentives and will evaluate the effects of those incentives on patterns of assistance payments (AFDC and Food Stamps); employment and earnings; number and timing of pregnancies; and the effects on children.

The waiver signed today is the sixth such waiver that has been approved since you promised in your State of the Union address that the Administration would expedite the process of obtaining Federal waivers for welfare reform activities.

SUBJECT: WISCONSIN

I. Recent Correspondence

Governor Tommy Thompson (R) wrote expressing his concern about the effect on Wisconsin of the Department of Defense's Force Reduction Plan for the Army National Guard. He also wrote urging approval by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) of the currently pending ANR Company/Coastal Corporation settlement.

Senator William Berndt (R-River Falls) expressed his concerns regarding EPA's proposed regularity standards for radon in drinking water. —

Representative Cloyd Porter (R-Burlington) requested Wisconsin be released from the 10 year set-aside land requirements under the Conservation Reserve Program.

Senate Chief Clerk Donald Schneider forwarded a copy of the Enrolled Senate Joint Resolution 64, which urged you to prepare a national plan of action to implement the goals of the World Summit for Children Declaration.

Assembly Chief Clerk Thomas T. Melvin forwarded to you a copy of the Assembly Joint Resolution 107, which calls upon Congress to provide for federal establishment of benefit levels for aid to families with dependent children.

II. Discussion

A. Appleton, Wisconsin

The nearest major city to Appleton (population of 65,695) is Green Bay, which is approximately 35 miles northeast of Appleton and has a population of 96,000.

**B. Economy**

1. Unemployment Rates - Seasonally adjusted for the U.S.; the rates for Wisconsin and Appleton are not adjusted.

2. Economic Conditions

There is a strike planned at the James River Corporation, a paper mill located in Menasha, Wisconsin, on Thursday, July 23rd. Approximately 700 people will be involved.

In the Appleton area, Air Wisconsin has laid off 50 employees; the closing of Ron and Lloyd's Pick 'n Save will cause 150 worker layoffs; and the Zwicker Knitting Company closing will cause a loss of 137 workers.

Recently announced plant closings in the state include Milwaukee Machine Products which will idle about 50 workers when the business is consolidated with Spengler Corporation of Loves Park, Illinois in about a year.

Most of the state does seem to be improving economically. Recent buyouts of K.W. Muth Company of Sheboygan and Nicolet Instrument Corporation near Milwaukee appear to be leading to employment growth in the near future. The Muth Company, now called Masland of Wisconsin, has already added 25 jobs and expects a 50% increase in business over the next 18 months.

**C. Education**

1. America 2000

On November 21, 1991, Governor Thompson and Chief State School Officer Herbert Grover joined together to kick-off Wisconsin 2000, the 25th statewide initiative to join the AMERICA 2000 effort. Since that time, over 15 communities across Wisconsin have initiated the AMERICA 2000 effort in their areas.

## 2. Education Issues

A wide-ranging school reform program announced in January by Governor Thompson has been approved by the state legislature. The program, worked out by the Governor, union leaders, school administrators, and the chief state school officer, was attacked by Democratic lawmakers who said the program was inadequate. Included in the reform initiative are new standardized state-wide testing plans, competency standards, incentive for lengthening the school year, and grants to districts for establishing school-based management programs.

Governor Thompson has recently formed a State Education Goals Committee, co-chaired by himself and state schools superintendent, Herbert Grover. The committee, which met for the first time the week of July 13, also includes representatives from the schools, the business community, and employee groups. The work of the committee will focus on coordinating education outcomes with the state's new assessment program.

Four out of five Wisconsin school districts will participate in the first year of a new statewide student testing program. The state will spend about \$700,000 to buy the initial set of eighth and tenth grade tests from American College Testing (ACT). This fall the testing program is voluntary, but beginning in 1993-1994, it will be mandatory for each of the state's 427 school districts. This new program will save money because it repeals old reporting and testing requirements.

## D. Drugs

### 1. Alliance for a Drug Free Wisconsin

In 1989, the Alliance for a Drug Free Wisconsin was created by the Governor, the Attorney General, and the Superintendent for Instruction in an effort to further enhance local community alcohol and drug abuse efforts. The state now has 71 members of the State Alliance that are dealing with the alcohol and drug problems in their communities. The Alliance promotes grass roots efforts which stress community leadership and responsibility.

2. General

Cocaine is the drug of choice in the Green Bay area. California and Texas are the primary sources for the cocaine. Crack and heroin are emerging on the streets of metropolitan areas. Marijuana is available to a limited extent. Although most of the marijuana is of Colombian or Mexican origin, numerous outdoor and indoor growing operations have been discovered. The state does, however, have an effective eradication program. Drug related murders set a record in 1990 and were even higher in 1991.

E. Exports

Wisconsin ranks 18th among all 50 states in total value of exports. Wisconsin's exports rose 22 percent in 1990, increasing to \$6.1 billion from \$5.0 billion in 1989. Wisconsin's top export industry in 1990 was computers and industrial machinery (\$2.4 billion).

Wisconsin's biggest export market is Canada, which in 1990 bought 36 percent (\$2.2 billion) of the state's total exports. Exports to Mexico -- the ninth largest trading partner of the state -- have grown 77 percent since 1987. In 1987, a total of 135,400 Wisconsin workers were employed by exports.

F. Recent Department of Labor Grants

On July 1, 1992, Secretary Martin provided \$63 million in grant funds for employment and training programs that are administered by qualified Native American tribes, groups, or organizations. These grants are aimed at helping Native Americans who are economically disadvantaged, unemployed, or underemployed, prepare for and retain productive jobs.

On June 25, 1992, Secretary Martin announced a Senior Community Service Employment Program grant for approximately \$2 million to the Wisconsin Department of Health and Social Services. Funds are to be used to promote the creation of part-time jobs in community service activities for jobless, low-income persons who are at least 55 years of age and have poor employment prospects.

On June 30, 1992, Secretary Martin provided \$76.5 million in grants to help combat chronic unemployment and substandard living conditions among migrant and seasonal farm workers and their families. Approximately \$1.4 million was awarded to the Department of Industry, Labor and Human Relations in Wisconsin. These funds will provide training and supportive services to farm workers who seek alternative job opportunities in order to remain economically self sufficient.

To date, Wisconsin has received a total of \$5.9 million, out of the additional \$500 million distributed nationally for the 1992 Summer Youth Employments and Training Program.

**G. Fort Howard Paper Company Sludge Lagoon**

The Appleton and Green Bay areas are home to several paper mills. Many of the area's citizens are concerned about the dioxin waste released as a byproduct in the paper bleaching process. Although the Fort Howard Paper Company was a supposed Superfund site in the late 1980's, the site did not go on the list.

As a result, EPA, the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources, and the Oneida Indian Tribe worked out a consent agreement with the company to conduct an investigation of the site's environmental hazards.

Phase I of this investigation, which was recently completed, focused on sampling for PCB's, dioxin and paper product volatiles. Phase II of the investigation, which is scheduled to begin August 3, will deal with off-site problems, including discharges from the site into the Fox River.

But the agreement with the company does not obligate it to clean-up the site, which arouses deep concerns among the Oneida Tribe since part of the area under investigation affects Indian land.

**H. Winnebago Mental Health Institute**

On July 9, 1992, the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) issued a termination notice to Winnebago Mental Health Institute for non-compliance with the Special Staffing requirements. The facility is a 315 bed state owned accredited psychiatric hospital, with an average daily census of 264 patients.

The timing of the action presents a problem since the legislature is not in session until September. The state is concerned that Winnebago will be unable to hire necessary staff by the termination deadline of September 28, 1992, given the requirement that the Legislature's Joint Conference Committee must approve new staff positions before Winnebago may hire.

The state questioned and argued against HHS's decision to release a termination notice. But HHS stood behind its action, and refused to delay or rescind the termination notice that the Department issued. As a result, state officials advised HHS that Governor Thompson would probably raise the issue with Secretary Sullivan.

I. Surface Transportation Funding

The State's 1992 apportionment is estimated at \$315.8 million compared to \$210.8 million in 1991. Through June, the State had obligated 97.7 percent of its Federal-aid highway limitation. The new legislation designates over \$2.3 billion for Wisconsin from FY 1992-97.

J. Clean Coal Technology

A Department of Energy Clean Coal Technology project is located in Wisconsin. The Babcock & Wilcox Company is sponsoring a demonstration project to evaluate the applicability of reburning technology for reducing NOX emissions from a full-scale coal-fired cyclone boiler. The project involves retrofitting an existing 100 MW cyclone boiler currently in operation at Wisconsin Power & Light's Nelson Dewey Station in Grant County.

The total project cost is approximately \$13.1 million, with the Department of Energy providing about \$6.2 million. The demonstration operation for this project began in December 1991 and will continue for another year.

K. Green Bay Mass Balance Study

EPA's Great Lakes National Program Office, in cooperation with the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources, is concluding its Green Bay Mass Balance Study. The Study, initiated in 1987, will develop an understanding of the sources, pathways, and fates of certain pollutants within the Great Lakes ecosystem.

Initial findings of the study will be presented at a formal conference in October.

This effort will provide improved water-quality models for toxic substances in the Great Lakes, and a design of more cost-effective monitoring programs to assess toxic substances and reduce pollution.

L. Glacial Habitat Restoration Area

A partnership developed to restore a patchwork of grasslands and wetlands over an entire rural landscape will restore and protect valuable fish, wildlife, and water resources in east-central Wisconsin in an area known as Wisconsin's Glacial Habitat Restoration Area. The partnership involves Wisconsin's Stewardship Fund, the Fish and Wildlife Service's Partners for Wildlife Program, U.S. Department of Agriculture conservation programs, private conservation organizations, and private landowners. The effort will also protect the integrity of Horican Marsh, an internationally recognized significant wetland.

1992 POLITICAL OUTLOOK-PRESIDENTIAL

Wisconsin's Presidential caucus was held on April 7, 1992. Because the primary was "late" in the process, it received little attention. The President won the Republican Presidential caucus quite handily, receiving 78% of the vote compared to 17% for Pat Buchanan and 3% for David Duke. Consequently, the President received all thirty-five Wisconsin delegates to the Republican National Convention. Bill Clinton won the state Democratic Presidential caucus, garnering 38% of the vote, compared to 35% for Jerry Brown, and 22% for Paul Tsongas.

Wisconsin has a tradition of supporting Democrats in Presidential elections with its eleven electoral college votes. However, this year could be different. Republican Governor Tommy Thompson is considered one of Wisconsin's most popular incumbents in recent history, and U.S. Senator Bobasten's re-election campaign will increase voter participation in this year's election. Additionally, Wisconsin has the strongest economy of any of the major midwestern industrial states and the lowest unemployment rate in the Great Lakes region. Governor Thompson has attracted a significant amount of economic development to the state over the past six years, and Wisconsin businesses enjoy a strong export market. In addition, Wisconsin's large agricultural base contributes to a well-balanced economic profile. These factors should bode well for the President's re-election strategy in the Dairy State.

**Ross Perot** did not qualify for the general election ballot in Wisconsin before withdrawing from the Presidential race. The latest statewide poll on the Presidential race in Wisconsin was conducted by ARG on June 12-July 2, 1992, before Perot ended his candidacy. The poll showed Perot leading all contenders with support from 37% of those surveyed as opposed to 29% for the President and 15% for Governor Clinton.

The President's re-election campaign is under the strong direction of Governor Tommy Thompson, who serves as General Chairman. **John MacIver** is the Wisconsin Bush-Quayle Chairman. MacIver was the President's Wisconsin Chairman in 1980 and 1988. U.S. Senator Bob Kasten is the campaign's Honorary Chairman. Lt. Governor **Scott McCallum**, State Treasurer **Cate Zeuske**, and Congressmen **Tom Petri**, **Jim Sensenbrenner**, **Steve Gunderson**, and **Toby Roth** are Honorary Co-Chairmen. **Fred Luber** is the President's Wisconsin Finance Chairman.

The 1988 BUSH-QUAYLE ticket was defeated in Wisconsin by a 51% to 47% margin.

1992 POLITICAL OUTLOOK-SENATE

Wisconsin Republicans are bracing for another tough U.S. Senate battle with incumbent Bob Kasten. Kasten was elected in 1980 with just over 50% of the vote and was re-elected in 1986 with 51%. The 1986 race, which pitted Kasten against Democrat **Ed Garvey**, was one of the most negative Senate races in recent history. The Democrats consider Kasten one of the most vulnerable Republican U.S. Senators in 1992.

1992 finds Kasten in a somewhat stronger political position -- he is gaining seniority and is a member of Senate leadership (Secretary of the Republican Senate Conference). Democrats accuse Kasten of paying too little attention to the state, and charge that his conservative voting record is out of step with progressive Wisconsin.

Three Democrats are currently vying for the right to challenge Kasten: Congressman **Jim Moody** (CD-5), State Senator **Russ Feingold**, and businessman **Joe Checota**. Moody is considered the early favorite because he ran in the Democratic primary for Senate in 1988, and because his seat on the powerful Ways and Means committee is an advantage to fundraising. Feingold is the longshot -- with little money and low name recognition. Checota, a former Democratic state party chairman, has already contributed \$2 million of his own money to his campaign and has no record of public service to defend. However, allegations of improper

financial dealings have recently hurt Checota's campaign. He has been accused of diverting business funds for improper use and for arranging improper low-interest loans for several subsidiary firms that he owns. The primary will be on September 8, 1992.

While Kasten has a tough challenge ahead, he should win. The race will cost approximately \$5-6 million, and to date, Kasten has over \$1.8 million cash-on-hand, having raised \$4 million in aggregate receipts. Moody, the likely Democrat nominee, has a very liberal voting record that will not inspire rural or suburban voters. Most experts agree that if Kasten works hard and spends a lot of time in Wisconsin, he should win.

REAPPORTIONMENT UPDATE

Wisconsin will not gain or lose any Congressional seats in 1992.

STATE GOP UPDATE

David Opitz was elected Republican Party Chairman in December, 1990. Opitz hopes to continue to build upon Governor Thompson's successes of 1990 and capture more seats in the State Legislature. Currently the balance is 14R - 19D in the State Senate, 41R - 58D in the State House. The main mission for 1992, however, is Senator Kasten's re-election and the President's re-election campaign.

The Republican National Committeeman for Wisconsin is Mike Grebe. Grebe also serves as Chairman of Senator Kasten's reelection effort and was Co-Chairman of the Bush-Quayle '88 effort in Wisconsin. Mary Buestrin will become the new National Committeewoman from Wisconsin in August when Helen Bie steps down after 13 years of service to the state GOP.

The Wisconsin state GOP convention was held on June 5-7, 1992. The thirty-five delegates selected to attend the Republican National Convention are all loyal Bush supporters. Governor Thompson was elected Chairman of the delegation. Mary Kohler and Derrick Kenner were elected to the Republican National Platform Committee. State Senator Margaret Farrow and Governor Thompson will serve on the Republican National Rules Committee.

Key Activity, Week of July 20

- o **Energy.** The Senate failed to invoke cloture on the motion to proceed to the Energy Bill, 58-33. Senator Malcolm Wallop (R-WY) led the fight against cloture because no solution had been reached on a Rockefeller (D-WV) proposal providing health benefits for retired mine workers. Wallop and other key Senators have since agreed to a compromise, but others have raised objections. Particularly if an acceptable compromise can be achieved, the bill is expected to be brought back to the Senate floor early next week.
- o **Waste.** The Senate passed Senator Dan Coats' (R-IN) Interstate Transportation of Municipal Waste bill, 89-2. The bill allows states to block the import of waste intended for disposal within their borders. While the Administration opposed the measure, our main concern remains the possibility that the bill could become a vehicle for broader, highly objectionable amendments to RCRA (the Resource Conservation and Recovery Act) that have already passed committees in both houses.
- o **China MFN.** On Tuesday, the House passed both: a Solomon (R-NY) resolution, revoking China's Most Favored Nation status entirely, 258-135; and a Pease (D-OH)/Pelosi (D-CA) bill that would revoke MFN from state-produced goods if a variety of stringent conditions is not met, 339-62. As before, we will be looking for veto strength to the Senate, where your veto of a China bill was sustained earlier this year with 33 Republican and 5 Democratic votes. The Finance Committee is expected to mark up China legislation next week, with the possibility of Senate floor action before the August break.

- o **Cable Television.** On Thursday, the House passed legislation re-regulating the cable television industry, 340-73. Your senior advisors have recommended veto. Prior to passage, the House defeated a Lent (R-NY) substitute that was supported by the Administration, 144-266. The House bill now goes into conference with a similar bill that passed the Senate last year, 78-18. Proponents of re-regulation claim it is pro-consumer; because of those arguments, it currently appears unlikely that we would be able to sustain your veto.

#### Key Upcoming Activity

- o **Growth.** On Tuesday, the Senate Finance Committee will mark up H.R. 11, a bill that extends expiring tax provisions, includes several of your seven short-term growth proposals, and establishes Enterprise Zones. Chairman Bentsen's mark is expected to change the House-passed version of Enterprise Zones to eliminate the 50% capital gains exclusion in favor of credits on wages. We will be working hard for not only an adequate Enterprise Zones provision that includes capital gains, but also other elements of your growth proposals, including First-Time Homebuyers' Tax Credit, Investment Tax Allowance, and IRA provisions. Currently, it appears that we have a good chance of getting all of these provisions included in the bill. Enterprise Zones, particularly the capital gains aspect of it, will be the hang-up.
- o **Appropriations.** The House Appropriations Committee this week marked up the last three of the thirteen appropriations bills for consideration next week on the House floor, where expected fights include:
  - **VA/HUD:** a Traxler (D-MI)/Green (R-NY) amendment to eliminate funding for the space station; and a possible DeLay (R-TX) amendment to restore funding for the National Space Council.
  - **Commerce/State/Justice:** a possible Rogers (R-KY) amendment to strike objectionable language reauthorizing the Legal Services Corporation.
  - **Labor/HHS:** an amendment to prevent the Labor Department from implementing its Beck decision regulations.

The **Energy and Water** appropriations bill is scheduled to reach the **Senate** floor next week, where fights are expected on: nuclear testing; and the Superconducting Super Collider, whose funding the House bill would eliminate but which the Senate Appropriations Subcommittee funded at \$550 million.

- o **Abortion.** Late next week, the Senate is expected to begin consideration of the Freedom of Choice Act, which would restrict states' ability to restrict abortions in most circumstances. While we do not currently have the votes to block consideration of the bill, we consider it likely that we can demonstrate veto strength.
  
- o **Freedom Support Act.** House floor action on your Freedom Support Act, aid to the former Soviet republics, which passed the Senate earlier this month, now appears possible as early as the week of August 3. Following on Ambassador Strauss' House visits this week, State officials and we will be pressing hard next week to build support.

**Other Significant Congressional Activity**

**Week of July 20**

- o **Bilingual ballot.** On Friday, the House approved the Voting Rights Improvement Act, 237-125. The bill, which the Administration supported, extends the bilingual ballot requirement for 15 years.
- o **Chinese students.** The House Judiciary Committee approved by voice vote legislation that would permit thousands of Chinese students to apply for permanent residency in the United States in 1993. The bill is similar to legislation you successfully vetoed in 1989.
- o **White House travel.** Subcommittee Chairman Paul Kanjorski (D-PA) resumed hearings on White House expenses, accusing the Administration of not being forthcoming with information on travel expenses. In often heated exchanges, Ranking Member Dan Burton (R-IN) countered with charges of political theatrics and noted that the White House has turned over hundreds of pages of documents.
- o **Vincennes.** Testifying before the House Armed Services Committee, retired Admiral Crowe denounced as "preposterous and unfounded" allegations that the Navy attempted a cover-up of the facts surrounding its downing of an Iranian civilian jetliner four years ago.

**Week of July 27**

- o **Voting Rights.** The House is likely to take up next week the Voting Rights Extension Act, which would require advance Justice Department approval for innumerable state and local decisions. Your senior advisors would recommend veto.
- o **Tariffs.** The House is also expected to take up a miscellaneous tariff bill, most of which is non-controversial. The bill includes, however, a provision, strongly opposed by the Administration, that would increase the customs duty on many sport vehicles and minivans to 25%.

- o **Fetal tissue research.** The Senate Labor and Human Resources Committee is scheduled next week to mark up new NIH Reauthorization legislation that is a modified version of legislation you successfully vetoed last month. The bill would overturn in 1993 the Administration's moratorium on federal funding of fetal tissue research and contains lower authorization levels than the bill you vetoed. Senator Orrin Hatch (R-UT) is continuing to try to work out an acceptable bill, but so far, Chairman Ted Kennedy (D-MA) does not appear interested.
  
- o **Family and Medical Leave.** Both houses are likely soon to appoint conferees on the Family and Medical Leave Act, which last year passed the House by 253-177 and the Senate by 65-32. You have threatened veto on both bills. A conference report could reach both floors before the August break.

July 30. Release of figures on new home sales in June (Commerce). New home sales dropped by 5.6 percent in May for a fourth straight monthly decline. Markets anticipate an increase in June.

July 30. Release of data on import and export prices for the second quarter (Labor). The less comprehensive monthly figures showed prices of both imports and exports rising by 0.3 percent in May.

July 31. Release of food stamp participation figures for May (Agriculture). The department anticipates no appreciable growth in participation figures.

July 31. Release of personal income and outlay figures for June (Commerce). Real disposable income edged up by 0.1 percent in May after a 0.2 percent drop in April. Real consumer spending rose by about 0.25 percent in each of the last two months. Markets anticipate a similar performance in June, with real income down slightly and real spending up by about 0.25 percent.

July 31. Release of figures on manufacturers' new orders and inventories for June (Commerce). Factory orders fell by 0.8 percent in May after four straight monthly gains.

The 1992 Democratic Convention attracted a three network total of 31% share compared to 40% share in 1988. The three networks averaged 415 minutes of total convention airtime compared to 624 minutes in 1988. Similar trends should follow at the Republican Convention.

Whereas the networks numbers were dramatically down, other sources profited. C-Span (which is not rated) offered uninterrupted gavel-to-gavel coverage. CNN's ratings doubled from 1988 to an average of 1,787,000 households. PBS joined forces with NBC and doubled its normal prime time viewership.

These results further demonstrate the decline of the networks as a delivery system of news, and the broadening of choices for viewers to non network sources. Our media strategy in Houston should reflect this ever changing marketplace.

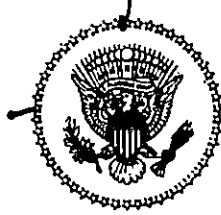

Purpose

To assist Russia's transition to a market economy and advance U.S. commercial interests by creating favorable conditions for U.S. investment in the Russian Federation.

Background

Secretary Baker has forwarded the Bilateral Investment Treaty (BIT) between the U.S. and the Russian Federation for your transmission to the Senate, requesting its advice and consent to ratification. Attached for signature is your transmittal message (Tab A), which forwards the State Department report (Tab B) and the Treaty with protocol and exchanges of letters (Tab C).

The Treaty, signed during President Yeltsin's State Visit in June, will assist Russia's economic transformation as well as U.S. commercial interests by creating favorable conditions for U.S. investment. This is the first BIT with a newly independent state of the former Soviet Union to be submitted for Senate consideration. The United States has also signed a BIT with Kazakhstan, and BIT negotiations are underway with several of the other newly independent states of the former Soviet Union.

That you sign the Transmittal Message asking the Senate to give its advice and consent to the BIT with the Russian Federation (Tab A).

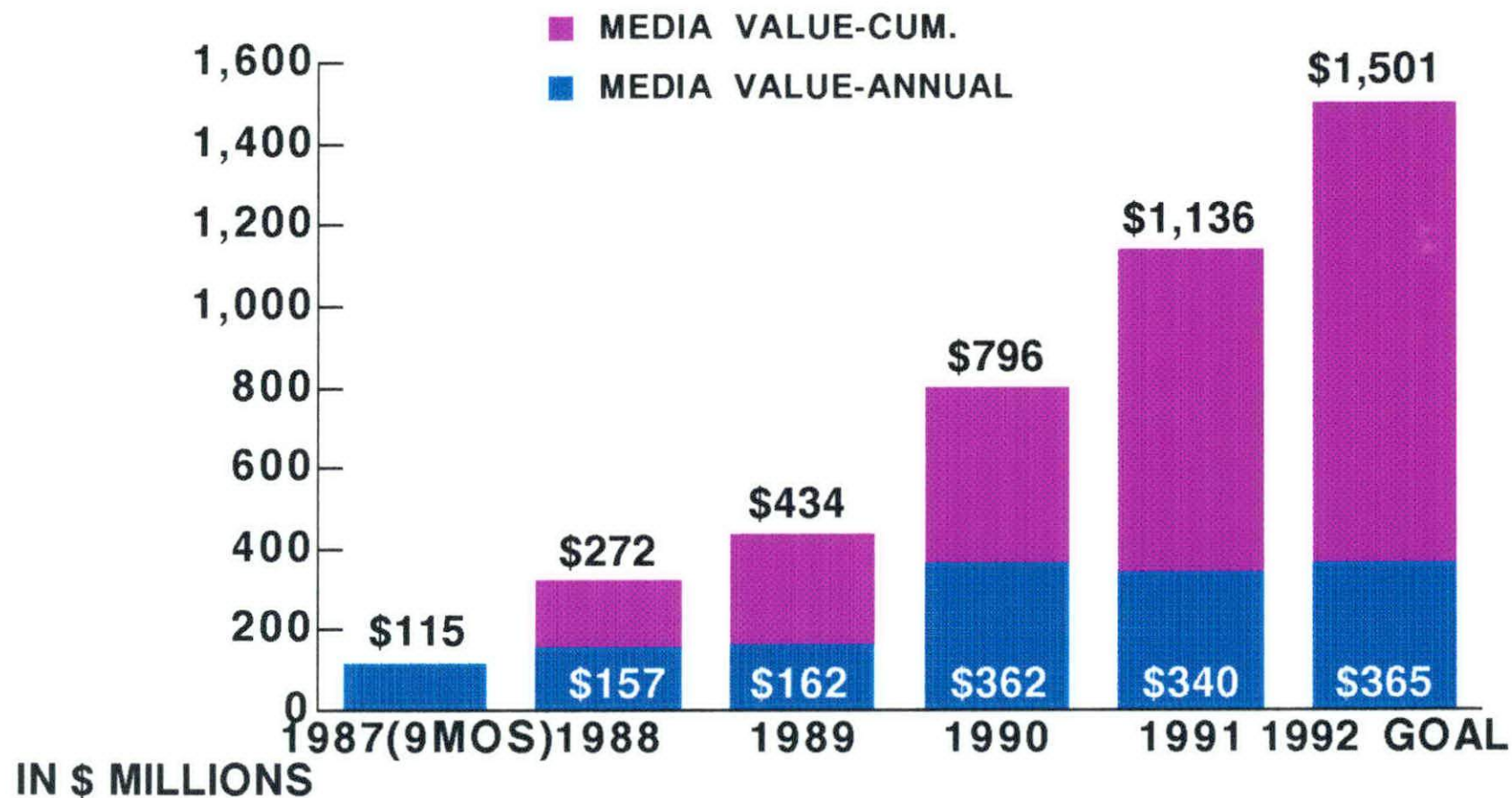

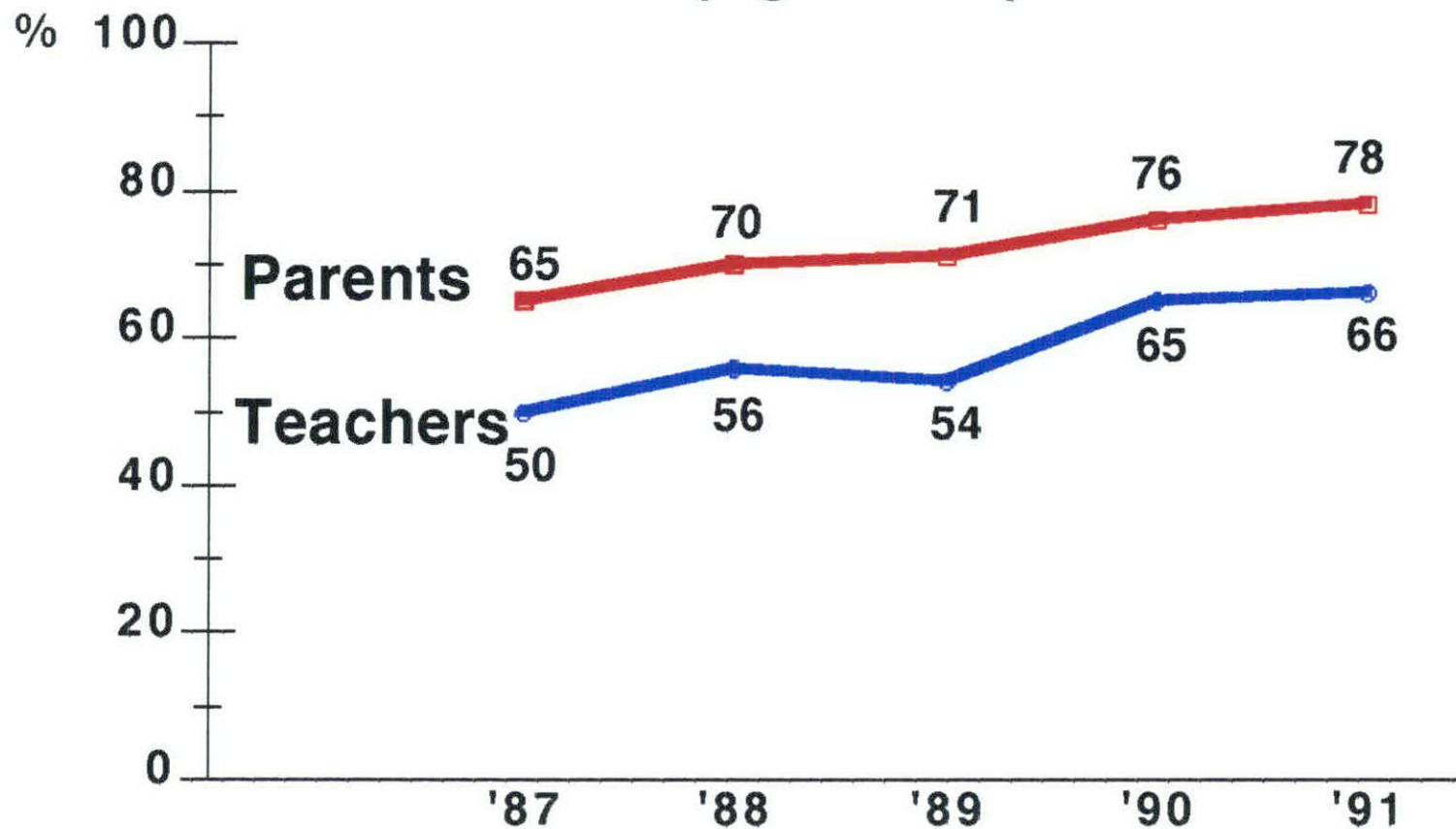

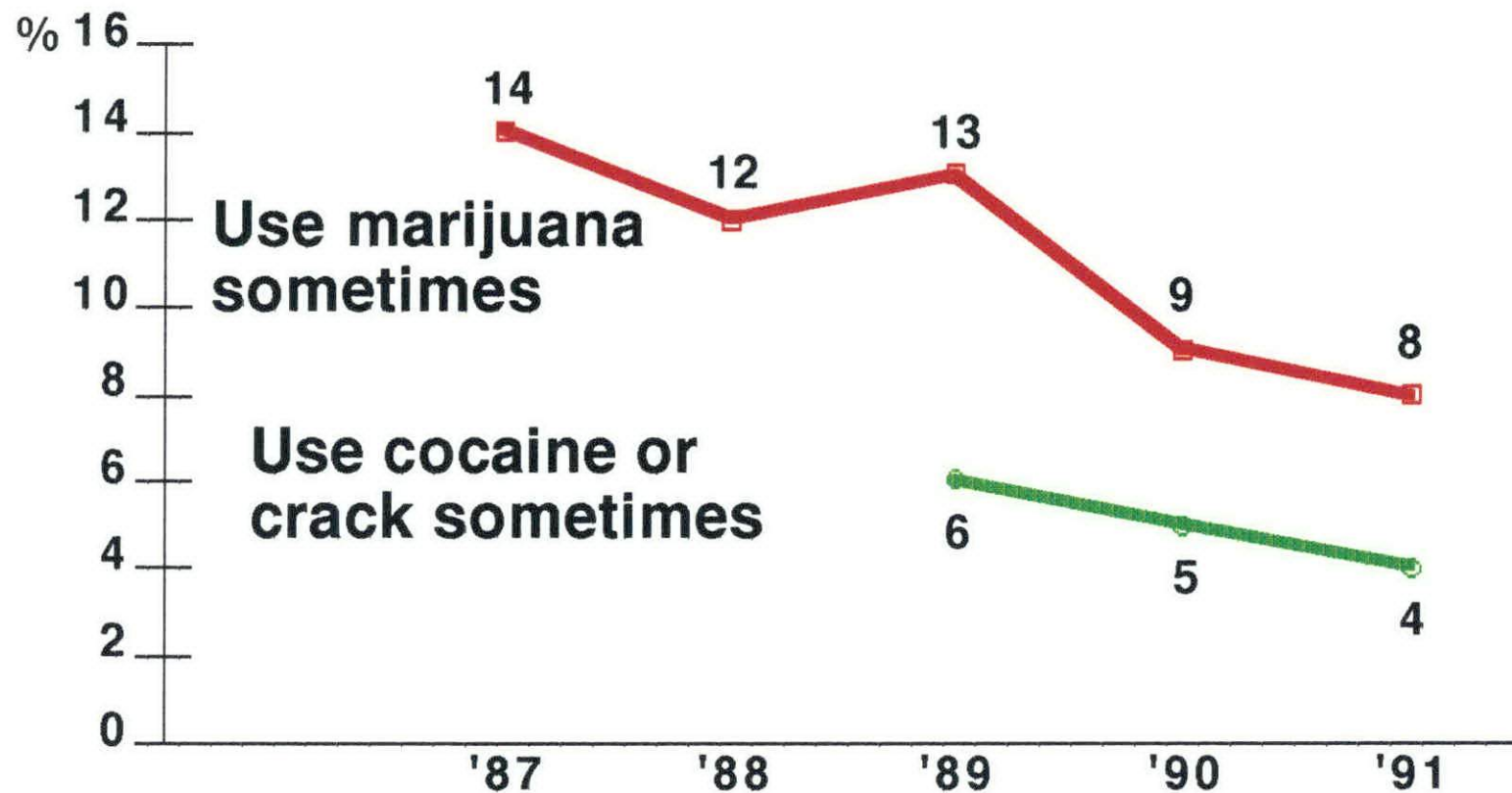
# Dialogue with Parents and Teachers (Age 9 - 12)

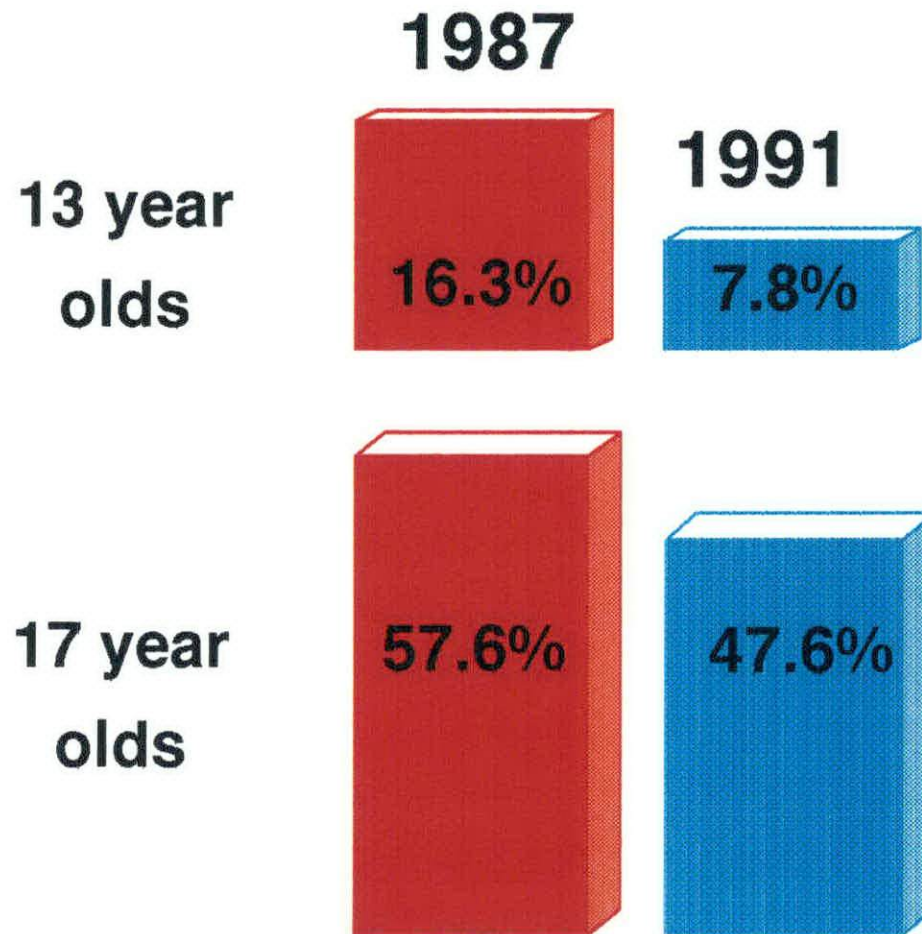
# Drugs Use by Friends

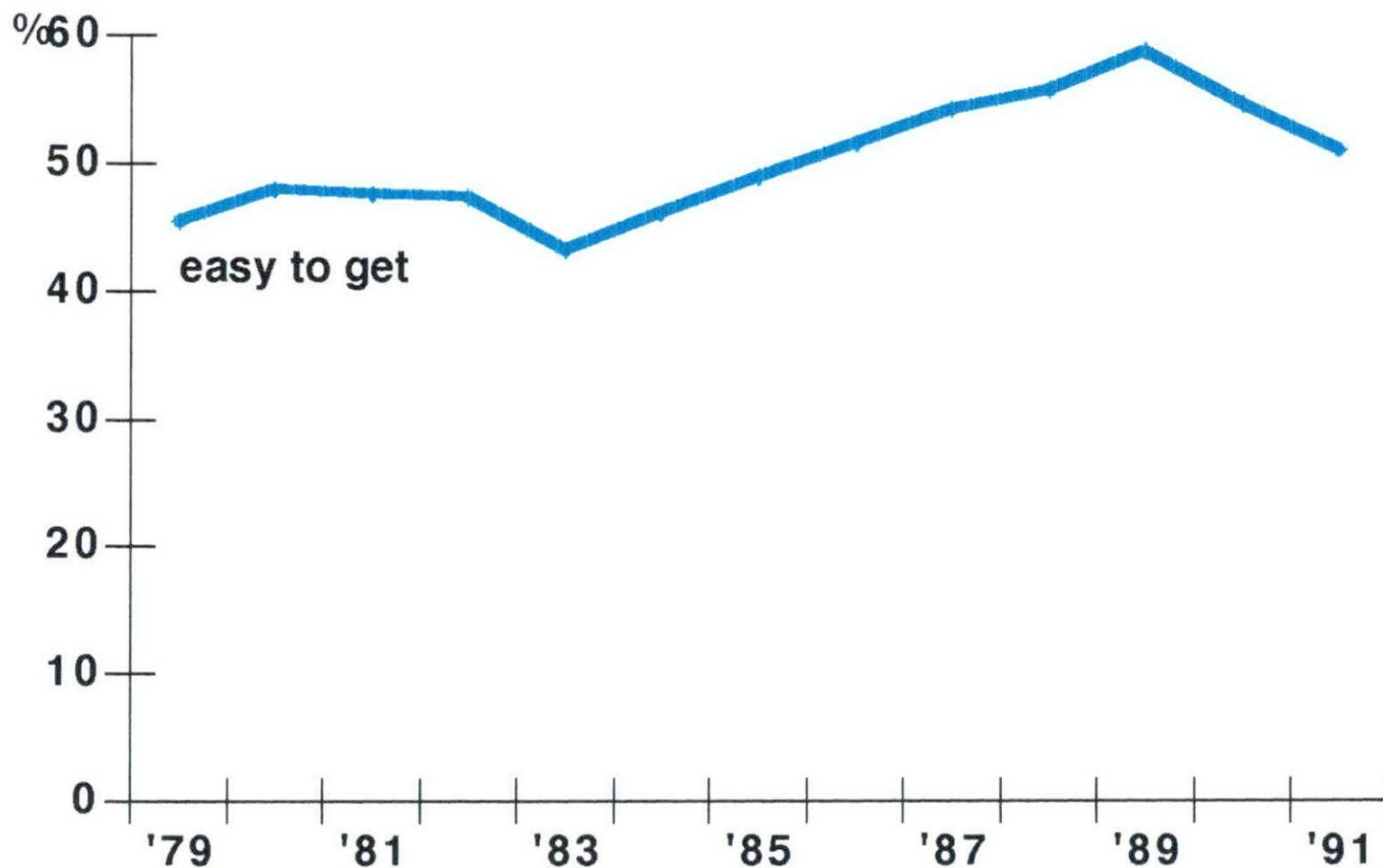
# Teen Trial of Marijuana

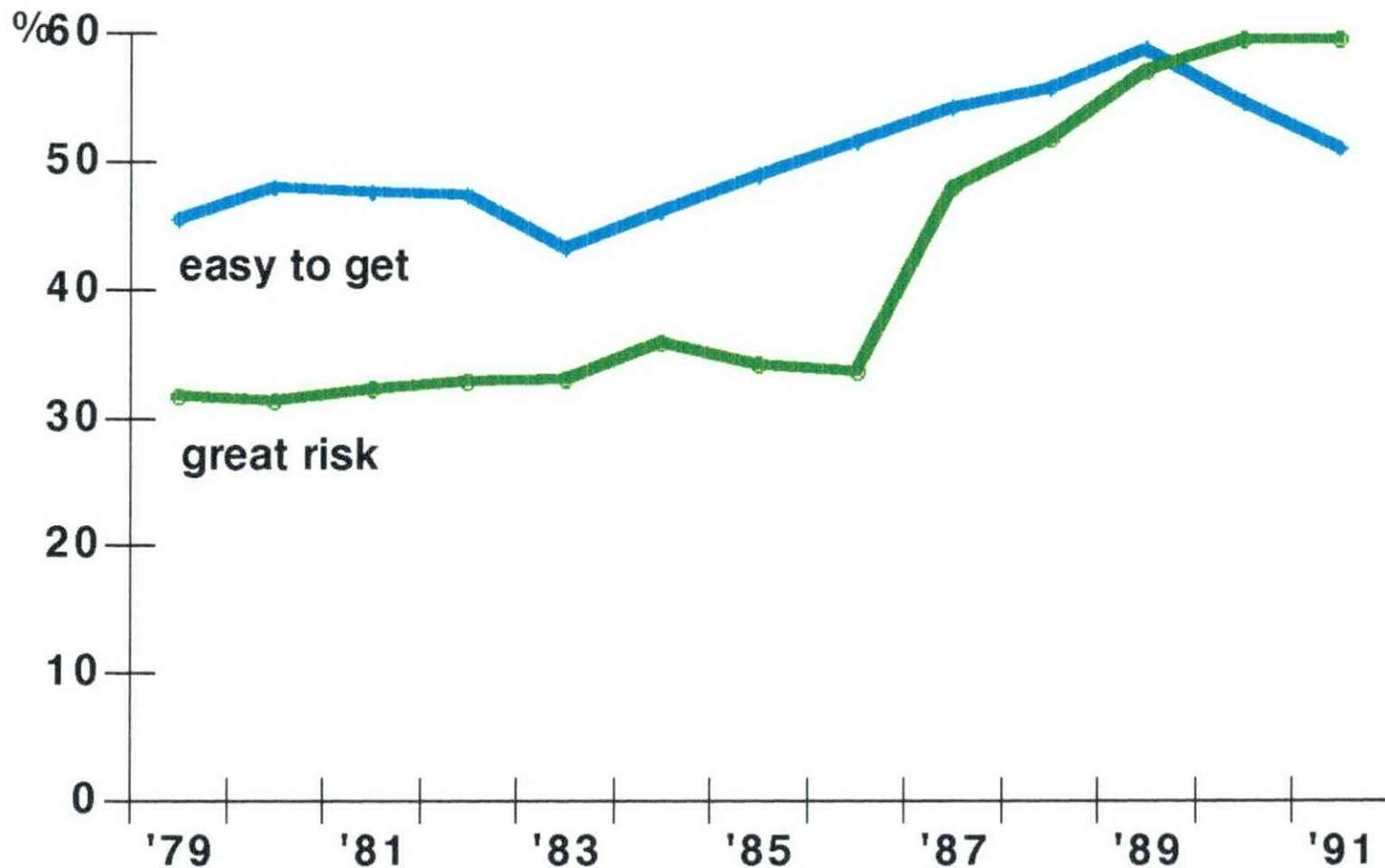
## Perception of risk/availability

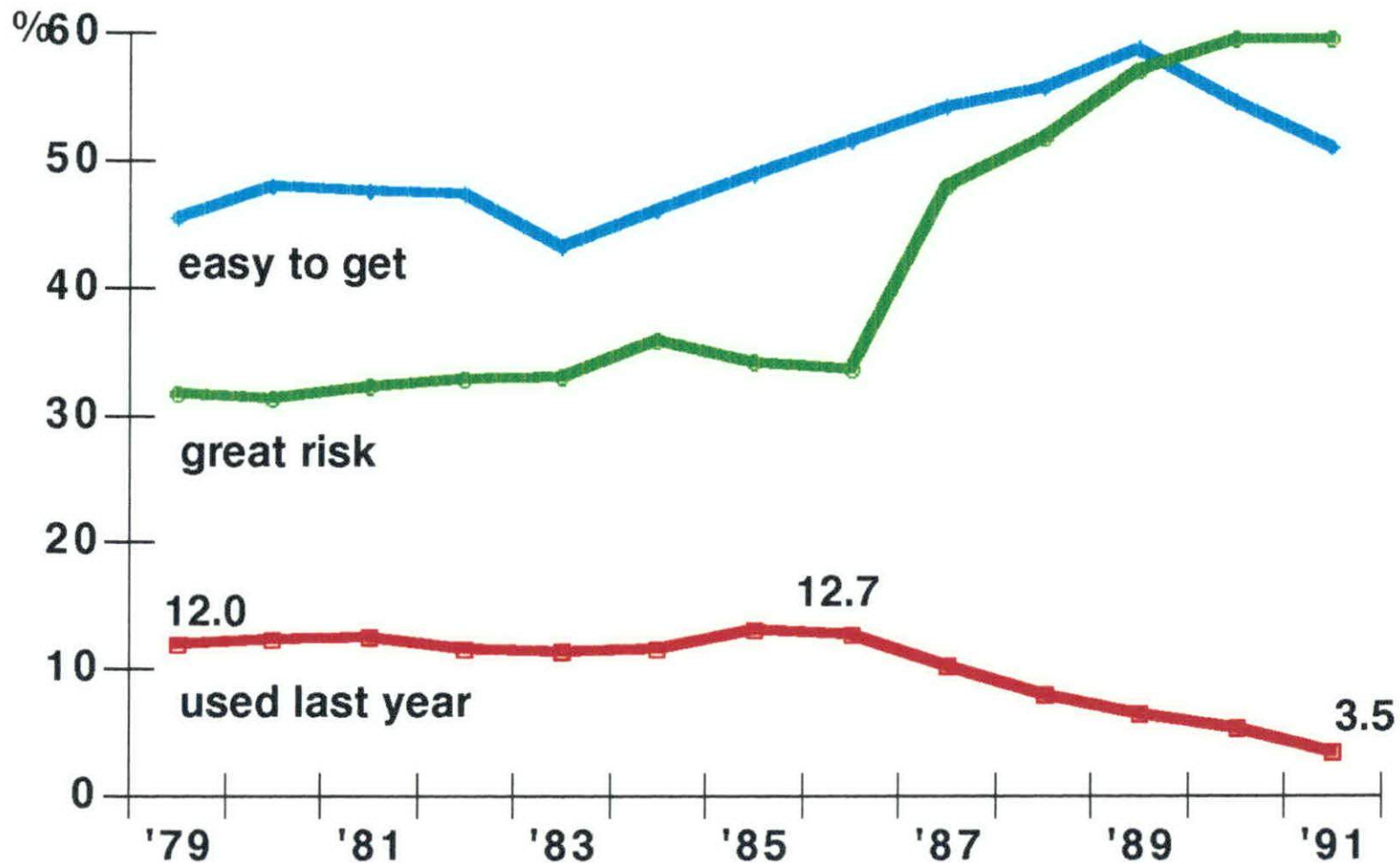
## Perception of risk/availability

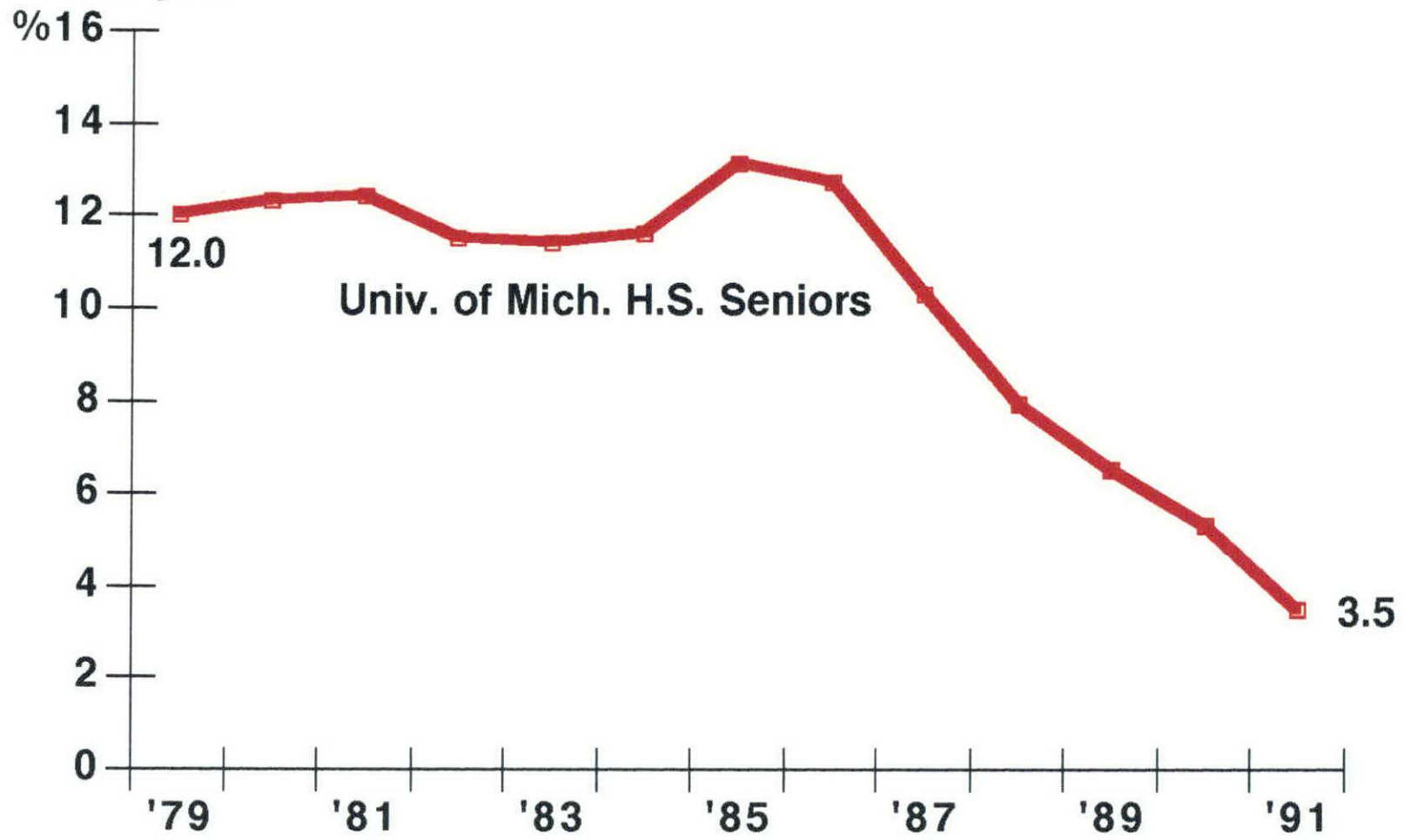

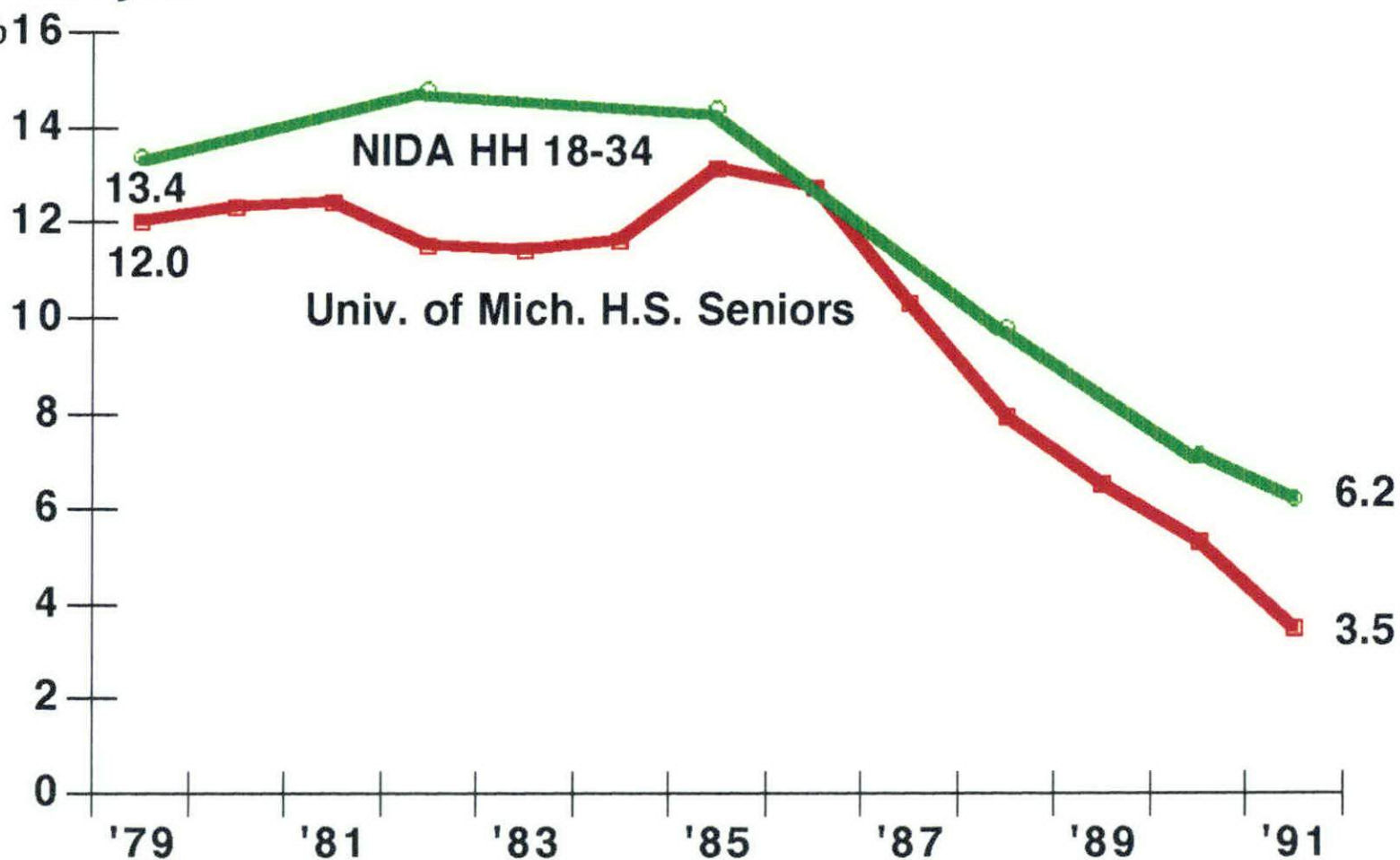

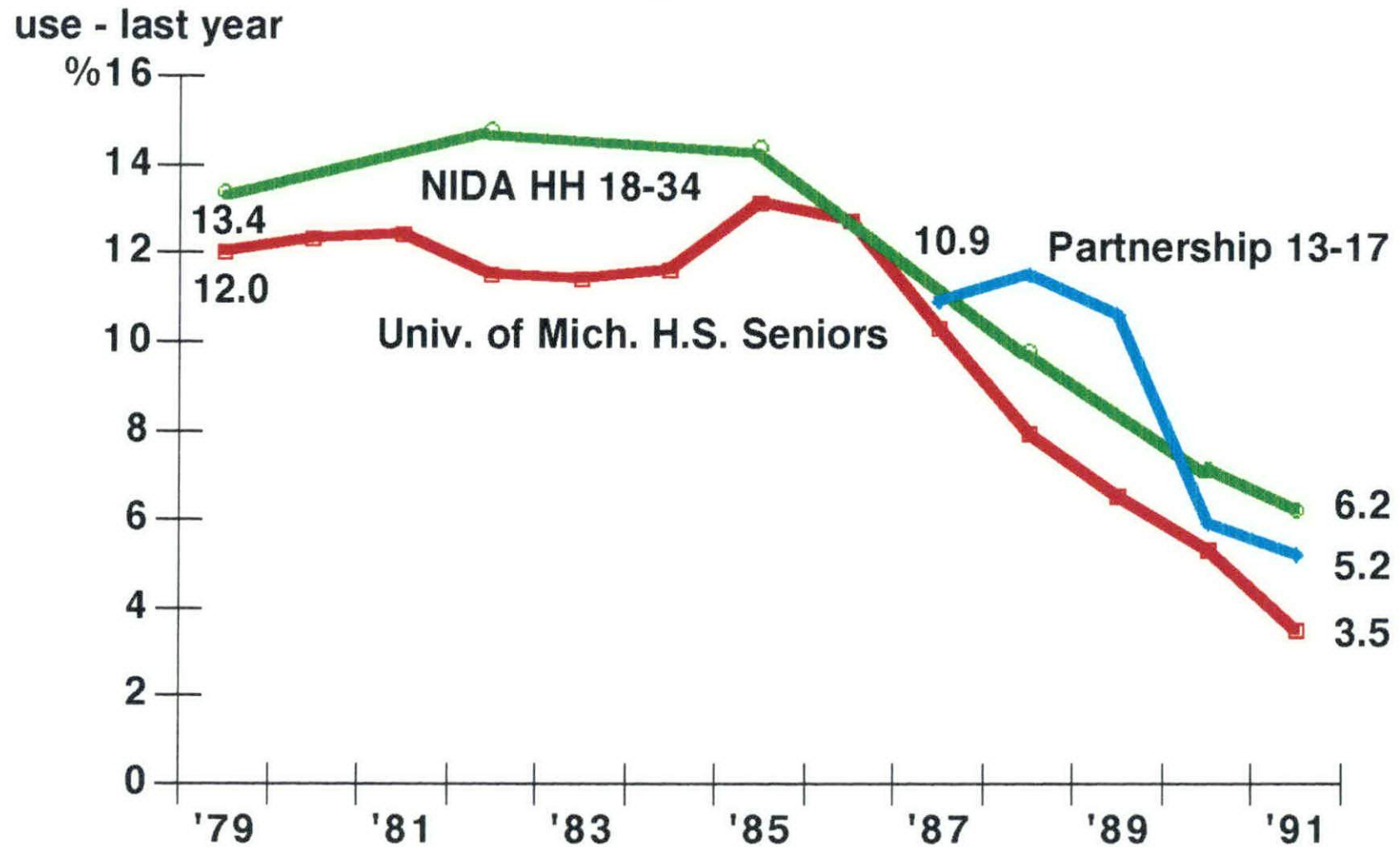

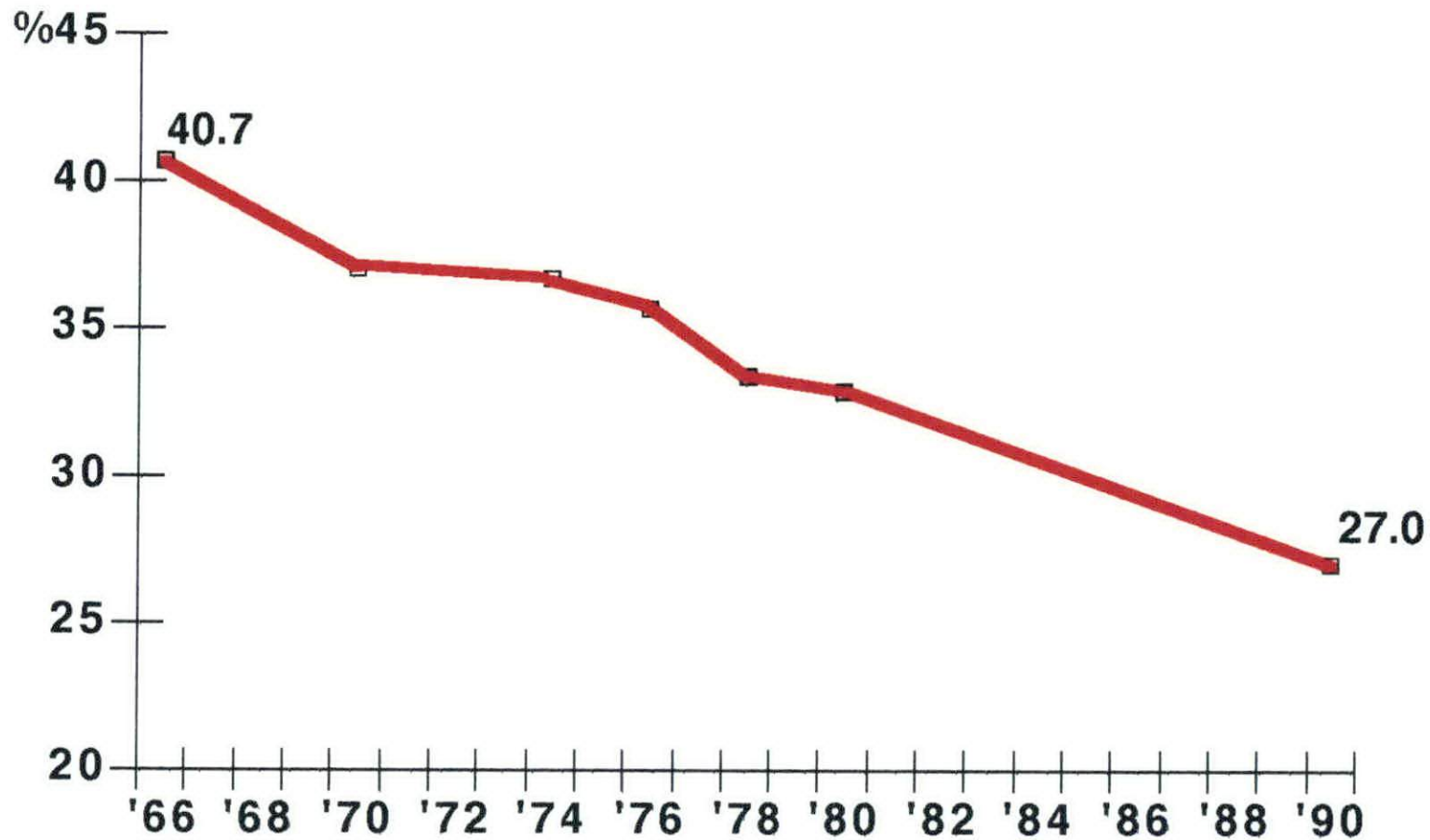
