Thank you, Rich [Williamson], for those kind words. I could have listened to you go on all day. [Acknowledgements.] It's great to be in Elk Grove, great to be back in Chicago: land of the free -- and home of the Bears. //

You're home to some of this country's greatest athletes. The other night, I saw Michael Jordan win the long jump and the high jump ... in a single game of basketball. //

I brought my mitt today. I should have brought along Barbara and the grandkids -- could have had a whole softball team, complete with subs: Give the term "Bush league" a whole new meaning. //

Someone asked me the other day why I was a Republican. I looked them straight in the eye and said: Free corn-on-the-cob at the Elk Grove Picnic. // Corn, soft drinks, beer -- all for \$5 dollars. Now that's what I call family values. //

We live at a time of tremendous opportunity. The changes we've worked for have come to pass: The end of the Cold War ... the collapse of imperial communism ... a new birth of freedom, from Managua to Moscow. A new world of hope for ourselves -- for our kids.

Something I've thought about many times since I met with Boris Yelstin at the White House: The world we live in is a

safer world -- safer than it was a decade ago / a year ago --
 safer than it was two months ago, when kids walked out of school
 and into summer. I'm proud of the progress we've made in
 reducing some of the world's most dangerous nuclear weapons. //

Let me tell you what that means: Not for Presidents or

The other side seems to be saying "of the government, by the government, for the government." I stand with the great son of Illinois who spoke government "of the people, by the people, for the people."

I trust parents -- not the government -- to make the decisions that matter in life. //

I trust parents -- not the government -- to choose their children's schools: public, private or religious. //

I trust parents -- not the government -- to choose their children's child care. // When the other side says, "government knows best" -- I say: Parents know better. Parents know better than some bureaucrat in Washington, D.C. //

For weeks now, I've been careful not to criticize my opponent by name. But today, it's time to get specific. The American people need to know what the Governor of Arkansas has planned for them -- on one of the most personal of all issues: health care. //

All of us want to see health care reform. But my opponent backs a plan called "Pay or Play" -- a plan for government-run health care. "Pay or Play" would require a new payroll tax of at least 7% Who would pay? It could come out of workers' wages -- out of your paychecks. {For a worker making \$xx,000 a year, that would mean \$x,000 more in taxes.} Or they could try to pass the costs on to small businesses -- the business that create most of

the jobs in this country -- who simply cannot foot the bill. And that could cost 700,000 American jobs. //

I'll tell you: It's enough to make you sick. //

Nationalized health care would be a national disaster. And I call on my opponent to abandon this idea.

Ask anyone: ask anyone who's spent months checking the mail for that income tax refund -- or whiled away a day in line at the DMV -- if they want to put the government in charge of health care. I don't believe the American people want to see the government playing doctor. //

My health care plan will provide access to affordable health care to all Americans -- it will help keep quality high and help keep costs down. And it won't do it on the backs of American workers or the small businesses that employ them.

And that's important -- because the number one issue today is the economy -- it's jobs. That's what's keeping people up late at night -- worrying about how they're going to pay the bills ... put food on the table ... care for their kids ... and still manage to put away something for their own retirement.

These concerns aren't mere matters of economics. Trust matters here, too. I trust you to spend and save your money more wisely than some budget planner in Washington.

Six months ago in my State of the Union, I proposed a common-sense, comprehensive plan to get this economy moving faster -- right now. Tax incentives -- to encourage businesses to hire new workers. A \$5000 tax credit -- \$5000 dollars right

off the income tax you owe -- as a break for young families struggling to scrimp and save and buy that first home.

Think about that. Some lucky person is going to win the \$5000 raffle prize this afternoon. Maybe it'll be someone from Elk Grove or Palatine, from Hanover or Schaumburg. Maybe even from Maine -- that's Maine County, of course. //

Well, my plan would put \$5000 dollars in the hands of every first-time homebuyer: To help you -- or your kids -- reach that American Dream. //

If Congress had acted -- my economic plan would have created half a million jobs.

Instead, Congress sat on my plan -- and sent me one full of new government spending, and new taxes.

You know the story. I sent it back. //

I'm still waiting -- America's still waiting -- almost 200 days later. My economic recovery plan is being held hostage and the ransom note reads, "wait 'till after the election."

There are some signs Congress may be getting the message. Last Wednesday, the Senate Finance Committee approved a package including a tax credit for first time homebuyers of \$2500 dollars. It's half a year late ... half as much as I asked for ... half way through the Congress.

People ask what I think? That's not half bad. //

But what I'm going to say to Congress is: The American people are waiting. They want action. Pass a bill that helps us get this economy growing again. //

Let me close today with a few words from the heart. //

Barbara and I are blessed -- blessed to serve at a moment in history when so many of the old fears have been driven away ... when so many new hopes stand within our reach.

Since the day I took the oath of office, I've made it my duty always to work for what's right for America. //

This election is about the big issues. The issues that shape the world -- and the values close to home: I'm talking about jobs, about family and faith -- about neighborhoods free from crime ... about a world free from fear. About trusting a leader who trusts you.

Today, I say to all the good people of this state: together we've made a great beginning. Give me four more years to finish the job. //

Thank you all for this warm Illini welcome -- and may God bless this great nation, the United States of America.

[ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS] Great to be here in Chicago -- but I have to tell you, after that recent convention in New York -- I think you've lost your claim to the title "The Windy City." \\\

We meet here at an important time. I know there are some who think it's going to be easy to oust an incumbent this year -- but they underestimate how hard someone who's determined to stay is going to fight. But enough about the Cubs. \\\

This afternoon, I want to tell you a story about a young girl -- poor in pocket but rich in hope -- who left her German village to come to America. She came in search of something larger than herself -- a future for her children -- and for their children. Here in Chicago, she married another immigrant. She took in laundry, he sold clothes, they lived in a tiny apartment and never gave up hope that their daughter would have a better future -- and their daughter's son an even better one.

That's how this country was born. And that's how it grew into the most proud, most free nation on the face of the earth. America became great through millions of stories like this -- stories of men and women who left behind their homes in order to take a chance on a dream for their children here in "the land of opportunity." If that young woman I just told you about were here today, she would see how her sacrifice made the American Dream come true for her grandson. And she would see with pride that he

stands here now -- determined to make that same dream come true for all the sons and daughters, the grandsons and granddaughters of Illinois -- Helen Salisbury's grandson: Rich Williamson. \\

You know, Rich and I go way back. As a matter of fact, he and his dog Mac knew Millie before she was a best-seller. \\ So I'm here out of friendship for a good, loyal American. But I'm also here for our country -- because this race has become a referendum on American principles. I'm here to say to every citizen of Illinois: Don't cast your vote on the side of failed, liberal Democratic policies. If you care about your kids' America -- then vote for the good old-fashioned principles we were raised on. But this is a wonderful country -- because mixed in with the hard times is America's precious gift of opportunity. Rich and I can stand here today because this country gave us the chance to become full partners in the American dream.

For Rich -- it was working in the little family-owned business which passed down jobs for 4 generations. For me -- it was the chance for a kid fresh out of college and the Navy to head down where the jobs were -- to drive my old Studebaker up and down the dusty Texas plains as a salesman. We'll create jobs through tax incentives to help businesses thrive and expand -- and by whacking through the stranglehold of regulations. Rich knows how overregulation can cripple and destroy a small business -- his family's business went bankrupt. We will work so no other family will have to see their hope emptied out and their livelihood boarded up. We're turning the lights back on in America. \\\

As Rich says -- we will "Free the American Spirit." \\\

That's our number one priority -- because the only entitlement every American is born to is opportunity. That's the true American legacy -- the opportunity to inherit your fair share of the American dream -- and enter into a new American partnership.

This year we hear a lot of politicians tell us what they think elections are all about. Well, I think elections come down to just one thing. Trust. You know what I mean. When you go

into that voting booth, when you pull the curtain and put all the hype and the hoopla behind you -- what matters is trust. What matters is knowing that when your country faces a crisis -- you trust the man in the Oval Office because he has the experience -- the seasoning -- and the guts to do the right thing.

But there's something more than just the traditional view of truth. Our whole process of governing is also about another kind of trust -- one that gets right to the heart of what it means to me to be President. To lead a great nation you must first trust the people you lead. Look at our two political parties and the choice couldn't be clearer -- it's between those who put their trust in the average American to make the tough choices -- and those who put their trust in the government to choose for them -- and you know which side we're on! \\\

We must trust the American people. Trust the people to decide whether they want their kids' school to be public, private or religious. Trust the people to decide what kind of child care they want for their own kids. Trust the people to deal with their own lives: don't set up bureaucracy upon bureaucracy to overregulate and dictate. Trust the people to spend their money more wisely than a budget planner in Washington. I will always believe this should be a country not of the government, by the government, for the government: but of the people, by the people, for the people.

America is the greatest country on earth because our people make it the most decent country on earth. One reason I'm so proud of Rich is his dedication to deep-down American values. He's one

of an entire family of Eagle Scouts -- grew up with a father so devoted his kids said: "If we were playing tiddlywinks, Dad would be there." Rich is that kind of father to his own 3 great kids: last January he even led a campout at 20 below. Guess the YMCA Indian Guides don't call him "Screaming Eagle" for nothing!

This man of strong ideals, who'd read the Bible 13 times before he graduated from high school, believes there's something wrong when a kid can get a condom in school -- but can't say a prayer. Rich and I share a strong love of a certain proud American tradition. I want to close by asking all of you to listen again to these familiar words. I believe with all my heart that Americans must join and once again pledge allegiance to the finest vision of the United States of America -- "one nation, under God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all."

That's the country I love -- the country Rich loves -- the country you love. When I ask you to help that country by believing in Rich -- working for Rich -- and voting for Rich, I'm sure you'll answer in the words of the motto of this great city of Chicago: "I will!" God bless you all.

Think about that. Some lucky person is going to win the

\$5000 raffle prize this afternoon. Maybe it'll be someone from Elk Grove or Palatine, from Hanover or Schaumburg. Maybe even from Maine -- that's Maine County, of course. //

The world we live in is a safer world -- safer than it was a decade ago / a year ago -- safer than it was two months ago, when the kids right here walked out of school ... and into summer. I'm proud of the progress we've made in reducing some of the world's most dangerous nuclear weapons. //

The important thing isn't what that means for Presidents or Prime Ministers ... not for historians or heads of state ... but what it means for parents, and for our kids: it means a future free from fear. //

Now we can turn our attention to our jobs, our schools our future. We have done so much the past four years together.

Now that we have changed the world -- it's time to change America. //

Thank you all for this warm welcome -- and may God bless this great nation, the United States of America.

Tomorrow, at 12:15 p.m. you will deliver remarks (9 minutes/teleprompted) at a fundraising luncheon for Rich Williamson in the Hyatt Regency O'Hare Hotel to 600 supporters.

II. DISCUSSION

Bob Teeter has specifically asked, and Sam Skinner concurs, that you make a pitch for your health care proposal. Governor Clinton realizes that his current health care plan is politically and substantively flawed and will attempt to quietly change his plan next week. Therefore, it is important that the press focus on the Governor's existing health care plan on Sunday.

Most of the distinctions in this speech refer to the "other side," which is consistent with last weeks' remarks. On page four, however, there is a specific reference to the "Governor from Arkansas." This is meant to guarantee that the press will pick up the line and use it in newspapers and TV coverage.

Thanks Rich.

[ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS] It's great to be here in Chicago. I was half tempted to call the Mayor while I'm in town. My guess is he was pretty upset by his party's recent gathering in New York. He thought Chicago had the nickname -- "The Windy City." \\\

We meet here at an important time. Some who think it's going to be easy to oust an incumbent this year -- but they underestimate how hard someone who's used to being in the lead is going to fight. But enough about the Chicago Cubs. \\\

This afternoon, I want to tell you a story about a young girl -- poor in pocket but rich in hope -- who left her German village to come to America. She came in search of something larger than herself -- a future for her children -- and for their children. Here in Chicago, she married another immigrant. She took in laundry, he sold clothes, they lived in a tiny apartment and never gave up hope that their daughter would have a better future -- and their daughter's son an even better one.

That's how this country was born. And that's how it grew into the most proud, most free nation on the face of the earth. America became great through millions of stories like this -- stories of men and women who left behind their homes in order to take a chance on a dream for their children here in "the land of opportunity."

If that young woman I just told you about were here today, she would see how her sacrifice made the American Dream come true for her grandson. And she would see with pride that he stands here today -- determined to make that same dream come true for all the sons and daughters of Illinois. Helen Salisbury would be proud to see the next Senator from Illinois, her grandson -- Rich Williamson. \\\

You know, Rich and I go way back. Rich and his dog Mac knew Millie before she was a best-selling author. \ So I'm here out of friendship for a brilliant, dedicated leader. But I'm also here for our country -- because Rich's race and my race have a lot in common.

In the dog days of summer, it's very easy to be attracted to the new candidate -- the one who says the things polls say the people want to hear. But by fall, the American people look more closely and ask -- "who do we trust to change America?" Who has the ideas to carry us forward to a better future."

The other plan will create lines at hospitals so long you'll think they were selling Bears tickets inside. My plan will allow you to get the care you need -- when you need it.

The other plan will put government bureaucrats in charge of setting health care prices -- my plan attacks the root cause of rising costs -- faulty insurance, too much paperwork and far too many frivolous lawsuits.//

Understand what is at stake here. If the Governor of Arkansas is elected with a Democratic Congress -- within a year the government will run health care in this country. Our health care system will combine the efficiency of the motor vehicle department with the compassion of the KGB.

I am not going to let that happen. Give me Rich Williamson in the Senate, and we will fight against those who put government first. We will fight for what works for America! We will fight for what's right for America!

That's what this election is all about. Not about change alone, because change always happen. The question is -- who do you trust to change America?

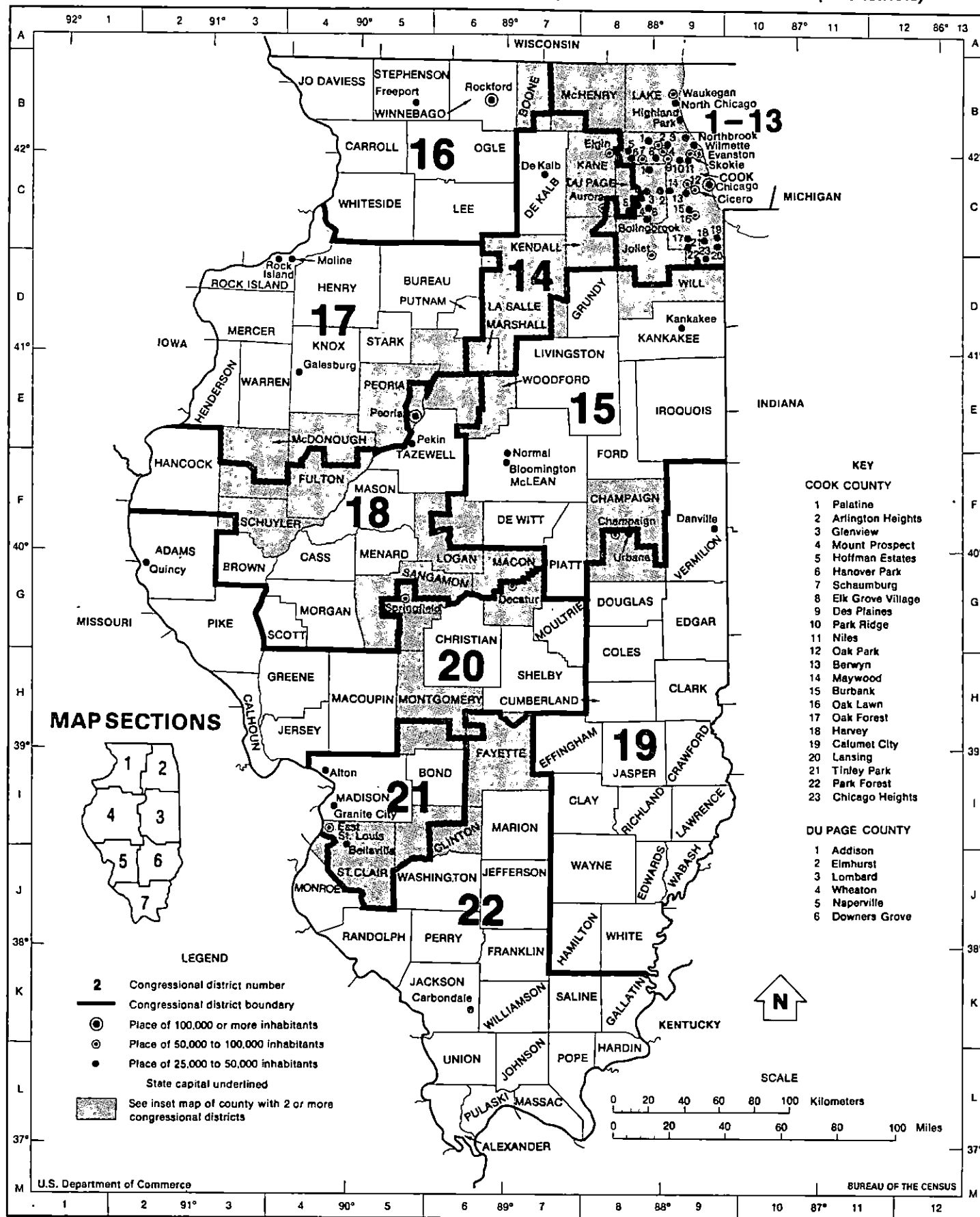

I. CORRESPONDENCE

Palatine Village Mayor Rita L. Mullins and Donna McAllister, Clerk of the Des Plaines City Council, forwarded copies of resolutions calling for an end to unfunded mandates.

A number of leaders from across Illinois have written and/or forwarded copies of resolutions supporting the continued use of ethanol as an alternate fuel source based on the economic and environmental benefits of its use. They are:

State Senator Harlan Rigney (R) forwarded a copy of Senate Resolution 1319 that supports taxation of out-of-state sales.

State Representative Michael L. Weaver (R) forwarded a constituent letter expressing concern over our country's current economic condition.

II. DISCUSSION

A. State Budget

Illinois was able to balance its budget without any tax increases due to the efforts of the General Assembly's Republican leadership and Governor Edgar's use of the line item veto.

Total revenues were down by \$500 million from FY 1992 estimates. In January, the state made \$350 million in emergency budget cuts from the General Revenue Funds. The FY 1993 budget estimates that the state will have to borrow approximately \$900 million.

The FY 1993 budget downsizes state government while funding essential state services. The \$28.4 billion spending plan is \$160 million lower than Governor Edgar's proposed budget due to additional cuts from the General Revenue Fund. A high priority in the budget is the state's elementary and secondary educational system which will receive \$30 million more than last year.

B. Unemployment Rates

For June 1992, Illinois' rate was 8.5 percent, up 1.1 percent from a year before. In the City of Chicago, the May 1992 rate was 7.7 percent compared to 5.9 percent from May of 1991.

C. Crime/Drugs/"Weed" and Seed"

"Weed and Seed": Chicago is one of the 16 "Weed and Seed" demonstration sites. The project will be located within the Chicago Housing Authority's Ida B. Wells Development.

Operation Clean Sweep is an initiative of the Chicago Public Housing Authority (CPHA) that has been widely acclaimed for its anti-drug efforts. In FY 1990, CPHA received a \$3.9 million Drug Elimination Grant from the Department of Housing and Urban Development. In FY 1991, the award grew to \$5.9 million.

Project Triggerlock is a cooperative Federal, state and local law enforcement effort which targets armed violent criminals and which has helped make tangible changes in making Chicago neighborhoods safer by prosecuting serious gun offenders.

Street gangs continue to present a problem in the Chicago area, establishing sophisticated, organizational structures. Cocaine and crack cocaine trafficking and gang violence have both steadily escalated since September of 1991.

Overall, Federal Drugs Grants to Illinois grew from \$33.7 million in FY 1989 to \$73.5 million in 1993.

Please note that, at the Democratic National Convention, Chicago Mayor Richard M. Daley said of the Administration's war on drugs: "All he gave us is a war of press conferences and publicity stunts of tough-sounding slogans and weak action."

D. Education/America 2000

On February 11, 1992, Secretary Lamar Alexander visited Chicago and Springfield to participate in the announcement of Illinois 2000 with Governor Edgar. The Illinois Chamber of Commerce and the Illinois Manufacturers Association have been working in conjunction with the President of the State Teachers Organization to ensure the success of Illinois 2000.

The New American Schools Development Corporation has selected the Bensenville Community Design as one of its eleven winners in the national competition for designs to create "break the mold" schools. Bensenville, with a population of 17,000, is at the western edge of O'Hare Airport in DuPage County.

The Bensenville plan is to create an environment where the entire community serves as a campus, using non-traditional learning sites such as government offices and industrial complexes as classrooms. The curriculum will be built around the National Education Goals and the Illinois State Learner Outcomes, which call for the development of positive values as well as academic achievement.

The Illinois State Board of Education has implemented a "watch-list" for schools not meeting certain educational standards. Once placed on the list, schools would be given four years to improve or be subject to take-over by the state. The standards used to assess a school's performance include student test scores, attendance, graduation and dropout rates and a plan of "goals and learning outcomes".

E. Education Referendum

The Illinois Legislature recently passed an amendment that would make the state pay most of the costs for primary and secondary education, potentially forcing a state income tax increase. It must now be approved in a statewide referendum on the November 3rd ballot.

According to Governor Edgar, the measure could force a 50 percent income tax hike if enacted, since the measure would force the state to increase education

spending by approximately \$1.5 billion per year. Currently, the state share of primary and secondary education is 35 percent, but after adoption of the amendment, it would increase to 50 percent.

Please note that voters in various suburban Illinois counties turned down a number of tax increase proposals that were on the ballot in last March's primary election.

F. City of Chicago's Education Funding Deficit

There are 601 public schools in the Chicago School District, with 410,230 students enrolled. 88 percent of the students are minorities. Another 154,250 students are enrolled in private schools.

There is a projected deficit of \$155 million for FY 1993 in the Chicago school system, and Mayor Daley is insisting that the Board of Education begin closing schools in order to eliminate the deficit. The city also faces disputes with the teacher's union, even though Daley averted a school strike last year by brokering a contract guaranteeing a 7 percent increase in teachers' pay.

Daley recently stated that he wanted greater control over the appointment of school board members, saying that he would like to lobby the General Assembly to return to the old system of mayoral appointments without the elaborate screening process imposed by the 1988 School Reform Act. He cites the failure of the school board to develop a cost-cutting plan to close schools, as one of many problems with the current board system.

On May 1st, the Illinois House Executive Committee approved a voucher program sponsored by Rep. Daniel Burke (D-Chicago) that would give Chicago students \$3,000 vouchers useable at any school in the city. The bill is backed by the TEACH America coalition, but a similar bill was defeated in 1991 by the full Illinois House.

G. Housing

Illinois received \$88 million in Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) monies, and another \$40.4 million in HOME funding this fiscal year.

The Chicago Housing Authority (CHA) has been operating in a "troubled" status since 1979. The latest quarterly report showed problems with the financial, occupancy and maintenance functions of the CHA. The vacancy rate was over 16 percent, twice designated failure rate. Thus, HUD has not approved the CHA's 1992 operating budget. However, HUD is working closely with CHA in order to improve the agency's operations.

H. Head Start Program

Illinois will receive a total of \$96.8 million in Head-Start funds for 88,789 slots. The City of Chicago will receive \$50.9 million of those funds to serve 14,075 children and families.

I. Department of Labor Grants

The Illinois Department on Aging recently received a \$3.1 million grant from the Department of Labor to help employ individuals in part-time jobs at senior citizen centers, schools, hospitals and centers for the handicapped.

J. Summer Youth Employment and Training Programs

The state of Illinois' share of the Summer Youth and Employment and Training Program supplemental totals \$25.5 million. The City of Chicago received an additional \$7 million from the same legislation.

K. Proposed Third Airport for Chicago

In June, the Illinois Senate rejected legislation that would have created a bi-state airport authority with Indiana to construct a new airport at Lake Calumet in southeast Chicago. Mayor Daley has declared the project "dead" and has publicly criticized Governor Edgar for failing to deliver the needed votes. The Lake Calumet site was selected by a Bi-State Policy Committee, and it is predicted that the group will be unable to reach a consensus on any other site. Any O'Hare airport expansion projects would encounter opposition from adjacent Republican suburbs, and Governor Edgar has pledged to veto any expansion that does not have reasonable suburban consensus. The Governor feels that sufficient Republican support could be generated to pass the bill during the next legislative session after the November election.

Chicago's O'Hare airport recently received Department of Transportation grants totalling \$14.4 million for a variety of work, including runway and taxiway rehabilitation, airfield lighting and terminal building improvements.

L. Robbins Incinerator

A municipal waste incinerator with a capacity to burn 1,200 tons per day is being proposed for the Chicago suburb of Robbins which is a low-income, minority community. In July, the Illinois Attorney General won a local court decision to validate the plant's siting on grounds of insufficient notice to an adjacent owner. The Illinois EPA is evaluating whether this ruling will require the plant to reapply for its State air permits. Intense public opposition remains, focused in mercury emissions and overall incineration risks.

M. Bartlett Balefill

In January of 1991, the Corps of Engineers denied a wetlands fill permit for the proposed "balefill" (a municipal solid waste facility) near suburban Bartlett. The State of Illinois had issued a permit for the site in November of 1989. A consortium of communities in north suburban Chicago, including Elk Grove and most neighboring municipalities, is expected to submit a revised permit application this summer.

N. Exports

Illinois exports rose to \$15.7 billion in 1990, up 19% from \$13.2 billion in 1989. Illinois' 1990 exports were 80% above their 1987 level. The state's top five exports were computers and industrial machinery, electric and electronic equipment, chemical products, transportation equipment and scientific measuring instruments.

The state's largest foreign market is Canada which bought 33 percent, or \$5.2 billion worth, of the state's exports in 1990. The market with Mexico grew 216 percent from 1987 to 1990 to reach \$881 million.

O. Surface Transportation Funds

Illinois will receive approximately \$570.9 million in FY 1992 compared to, the FY 1991 figure of \$321.1 million. As of July 8, the state has obligated \$375 million of its Federal Highway obligation limitation. Illinois' total apportionment for FY 1992-97 is estimated to be over \$4.3 billion.

P. Energy Issues

The Illinois coal industry is the fifth largest in the nation. It has been heavily impacted by the acid rain provisions of the 1990 Clean Air Act Amendments. As many as 5,000 of Illinois' coal miners, and 30,000 supporting persons could lose their jobs if state utilities switch from high sulfur to low sulfur coal in order to comply with requirements of the legislation.

Governor Edgar has raised concerns that DOE's emphasis on efficiency in the Clean Coal technology selections places a major economic burden on Illinois, especially in its southern regions

Q. Fish and Wildlife Issues

The Fish and Wildlife Service is currently studying three separate areas in Illinois as potential wildlife refuges. All three would benefit migratory birds, endangered species such as the bald eagle and other wildlife. The proposed sites are:

- ▶ Emiquon National Wildlife Refuge, located in Fulton County, comprising approximately 11,000 acres.
- ▶ Yellowbank Slough National Wildlife Refuge, located in Gallatin County, comprising approximately 21,000 acres.
- ▶ Kaskaskia River National Wildlife Refuge, located in Clinton Washington, and St. Clair counties, comprising approximately 10,000 acres.

1992 POLITICAL OUTLOOK

In the March 17, 1992 Illinois Republican Presidential primary, the President defeated Pat Buchanan 76% to 23%, garnering all 85 Illinois delegates to the Republican National Convention. Bill Clinton won the Democratic Presidential primary, receiving 52% of the vote as opposed to 25% for Paul Tsongas and 15% for Jerry Brown.

Illinois will again be a key battleground in the 1992 Presidential election. No Republican has ever been elected President without Illinois' electoral votes, 22 in 1992. Democratic Cook County controls 45% of the statewide vote, while the remaining percentage falls in the Chicago collar counties, Republican Chicago suburbs and downstate Illinois.

On Sunday, March 1, 1992, Governor Jim Edgar, General Chairman of the Illinois BUSH-QUAYLE campaign, announced that all 102 Illinois Republican County Chairmen, all 80 Cook County Ward and Township Committeemen, all 74 Republican members of the Illinois General Assembly, and the 7 Republican Members of Congress from Illinois have endorsed the President's campaign for re-election.

Press conferences were held in eight locations throughout Illinois, including Chicago, to announce the unanimous, statewide endorsement of the President's candidacy. In Chicago, State Senate Minority Leader Pate Philip, Lieutenant Governor Bob Kustra, and Congressman Henry Hyde together released the statement to the press.

The elected officials and leaders of statewide Republican organizations are playing an active role in coordinating BUSH-QUAYLE campaign activities throughout the state of Illinois.

Governor **Jim Edgar** serves as the General Chairman of the Illinois BUSH-QUAYLE campaign, while Lieutenant Governor **Bob Kustra** and Secretary of State **George Ryan** are the Honorary Co-Chairmen. **Gene Reineke** is the State Executive Director for BUSH-QUAYLE '92.

Ross Perot had failed to qualify for the general election ballot in Illinois before withdrawing from the Presidential race. His petition drive stalled after his central campaign office removed two of the four electors whose names appeared on previous Illinois signature petitions, forcing the petition drive to begin anew. However, subsequent to his withdrawal, Perot has submitted a letter of intent in order to be placed on the November ballot in Illinois. His supporters have continued to accumulate signatures and plan to submit 100,000 signature petitions on August 3rd.

The most recent statewide poll on the Presidential race in Illinois was conducted before Perot ended his candidacy. The poll, commissioned by the Copley News Service on July 1-5, showed a statistical dead heat between the three candidates. With a margin of error of +/- 3.5%, Clinton held a slight lead with 30%, followed by Ross Perot with 29%, and the President trailing with 28%. 13% indicated they were uncommitted.

Democratic incumbent U.S. Senator **Alan Dixon** failed in his bid for re-election in 1992, suffering an upset loss in the Illinois Democratic primary to Cook County Recorder of Deeds **Carol Mosley-Braun**. In order to capitalize upon the apparent anti-incumbent fervor raging in Illinois, former Reagan-Bush Administration official **Rich Williamson** announced his candidacy for the seat, in the hope that a divided Democrat party will allow the opening for a successful Republican challenge. **Sam Skinner**, Vice President Quayle, Secretary **Kemp**, Carla Hills, President Reagan, Senator **Paul Laxalt**, **Jeanne Kirkpatrick**, Secretary **Alexander**, and Clayton **Yeutter** have all appeared at Williamson fundraisers this year. Mrs. Quayle attended a Williamson fundraiser on June 23rd, receiving positive press coverage and enjoining women to support the Republican nominee as the best candidate in the race. Governor Edgar will tap into his own political organization to help in the Williamson race.

The latest statewide poll on the Illinois Senatorial race, conducted by Political Media Research on July 1-5, 1992, shows Braun leading Williamson 55% to 20%, with 25% of those surveyed undecided. Braun received a 49% plurality of the state's white vote, an 85% majority of the state's black vote, a 63% majority of the state's Hispanic vote, a 52% majority of the state's male vote, and a 58% majority of the state's female vote. Braun had

name recognition with 86% of those surveyed as opposed to 46% for Williamson. Braun's name identification was positive by a 42% to 14% ratio, while Williamson's was negative by an 8% to 11% ratio. Many attribute Braun's high name recognition throughout the state to the large volume of positive exposure that she received by defeating incumbent Senator Alan Dixon in the Democratic primary.

Braun has raised \$2.17 million since January, according to FEC reports. Williamson has collected just over \$1 million in aggregate receipts during the same period. In the most recent three-month FEC filing period, Braun outraised Williamson \$1.74 million to \$510,000. As of July 1, Braun had \$916,000 cash-on-hand, and Williamson had \$292,000 cash-on-hand.

There are reports that Braun intends to launch a statewide bus tour to develop support in out-state areas.

REAPPORTIONMENT UPDATE

Illinois will lose two Congressional seats as a result of reapportionment. Republicans have been very successful in the redistricting process, forcing Democrats to merge two Congressional districts in Chicago. As a result, Congressman **Frank Annunzio** announced that he will retire next year, avoiding a Democratic primary with Congressman **Dan Rostenkowski**. Downstate, freshman Republican Congressman **Tom Ewing** will face off against incumbent Democratic Congressman **George Sangemeister**. Ewing replaced Secretary of Agriculture **Ed Madigan**. Ewing's district was strengthened in the redistricting process, and he is expected to win in November. Democratic incumbents **Gus Savage**, **Marty Russo**, and **Charles Hayes** were all defeated in their Democratic primaries in March.

STATE PARTY UPDATE

Albert Jourdan serves as the Chairman of the Illinois Republican Party. **Harold B. Smith** is the National Committeeman from Illinois and **Mary Jo Arndt** is the state's National Committeewoman. **Andy Foster**, former Associate Director in the Office of Political Affairs, recently moved back to his native state to oversee the Illinois Victory '92 effort as Executive Director of the state party.

The Illinois Democratic state party, in conjunction with the Clinton-Gore campaign, has launched a multimillion dollar minority voter registration program. The movement has been kept low-key in order to prevent alienation of middle-class white

voters that the Clinton camp hopes to court. The goal of the registration program is to increase minority voter registration and turnout by 25%. The effort will include radio and television advertisement to encourage minorities to vote.

There are two separate droughts ravaging Africa. One is in Kenya, the other in southern Africa. There is an equally compelling humanitarian emergency of tragic proportions in Somalia due to civil strife. We are doing more than our share in each instance, but the international community has been incapable of actually delivering sufficient relief in Somalia where people are dying in massive numbers.

Southern Africa: Normally Zimbabwe and South Africa export food to their neighbors. Now they must import as well -- straining their own economies and limited regional transportation networks.

We have responded quickly, massively and publicly. The total value of our current commitment is \$509,000,000. This includes 1.5 million tons of food, 65 percent of the total donor commitment and 35 percent of the region's estimated needs.

Mrs. Quayle visited the region in May to highlight our concern. We have been praised by regional leaders, NGO's, the press and Congress. (When I met President Chissano last month he went out of his way to compliment U.S. leadership in responding to the drought.)

Kenya: Kenya has been hit with an influx of refugees and the worst drought in 50 years in its nomadic northeastern region. Drought has seriously affected crops throughout the country. Unfortunately, both the Government and the international community were slow to recognize the scope of the disaster. About 600,000 Kenyans are suffering now, and this may increase to 1,000,000 by the fall. The UN has issued an appeal for \$97,000,000 to cover drought needs. Fully energized, our emergency assistance to Kenya now totals \$15,725,000.

Somalia: The problem in Somalia is not drought but famine. And the famine is manmade. As many as 5,000 people a day may be dying.

The major problem is not food and money, but delivering relief in the midst of armed anarchy. The U.S. alone has supplied \$63,000,000 worth of relief -- more than we have provided in

Yugoslavia. However, while the need is 30 tons of food per month, the international community is only delivering 15 tons.

Relief can get into Somalia via three routes: air; cross-border; and the port of Mogadishu. We need all three to deliver the amounts needed, but very little is moving through Mogadishu where armed and hungry teenagers steal at every opportunity. The UN has been trying to get 50 military monitors into Mogadishu and that may happen soon. There is a second stage plan -- 500 armed UN guards to protect food shipments. However, the UN is beset by bureaucratic turf fighting, and there have been disputes over the UN's capacity to run a bigger operation in Mogadishu, especially one that could eventually require a significant military component in a volatile environment.

Obviously, more must be done to get the relief where it is needed. We also need to impart a sense of importance and urgency to counter criticism (domestically and internationally) that the U.S. and its allies are acting decisively in Yugoslavia but not in Somalia, where more people are dying. At a minimum, we will want to send a clear message to the Security Council and the Secretariat that we attach a high priority to this. We have money available as a voluntary contribution to help fund a more robust UN operation in Mogadishu. State and AID are looking carefully to see if there are some options we could push at the UN, and I will continue to monitor the situation.

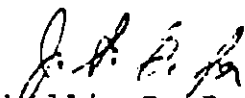

STATEMENT BY THE PRESIDENT

Today, I am directing the Secretary of Agriculture to make available American produced pork products to the former Soviet Union under the Export Enhancement Program. This initiative will enable exporters to sell up to 30,000 metric tons of U.S. pork products at prices competitive with subsidized competition. The initiative will enable an otherwise competitive U.S. industry to fight unfair competition and establish its presence in a potentially vast market.

Export Enhancement Program Initiative for Pork

FACT SHEET

Today, the President directed the Secretary of Agriculture to make available American produced pork products for the former Soviet Union (FSU) under the Export Enhancement Program (EEP). This initiative, which is designed to fight unfair foreign competition, could result in the export of 30,000 tons of pork. It is pro-farmer, pro-jobs, and pro-trade as it fights unfair foreign competition.

The Problem

U.S. pork producers face subsidized competition from the European Community (EC), preventing them from being competitive in the large market of the former Soviet Union.

The President's Proposal

The President has directed the Secretary of Agriculture to make available up to 30,000 tons of pork under the Export Enhancement Program. If used by the FSU, this initiative will enable an otherwise competitive U.S. industry to fight unfair competition and gain an important market share in a potentially vast market.

This initiative is consistent with the President's commitment to using the EEP aggressively when there is unfair foreign competition. The U.S. is an efficient producer of agricultural products, including pork, and we have a meritorious case for participation in the world market. However, care is taken to minimize the impact of this program on non-subsidizing competitors in the targeted market.

Pork EEP

This is the first time that pork has been approved under the EEP. The approval was based on the particular circumstances of

pork trade with the FSU. Other commodities that have been made available to the FSU under the EEP include wheat, vegetable oil, wheat flour, barley, and rice.

This initiative will make available to the FSU up to 30,000 tons of pork. According to a report from the University of Missouri, a pork sale of this magnitude represents:

- The use of 3.7 million bushels of corn.
- The use of 600,000 bushels of soybeans.
- The expenditure of 30,639 eight-hour days of U.S. labor.

With 300 million consumers, the FSU is a major meat consuming nation that is presently experiencing declining meat production. Total meat production fell four percent last year and is expected to decline an additional three percent this year. Meat imports to the region are significant and have increased steadily for several years. The FSU's pork imports were 171,000 MT in 1989, 217,000 MT in 1991, and are projected at 272,000 tons in 1992. The FSU is traditionally the world's third largest importer of pork.

U.S. pork exporters would have an opportunity to make sales to the FSU but for subsidized competition from the EC. The EC subsidizes the export of pork through a combination of EC and member state subsidies that typically approximate 50 percent of the U.S. sales price. The level of subsidy required to sell 30,000 tons of U.S. pork is dependent upon the assessment of prices offered by subsidized competitors and the review of bids received.

Export Enhancement Program

This announcement will be the 133rd initiative under the Export Enhancement Program. The EEP enables U.S. exporters to meet prevailing world prices for targeted commodities and destinations. Under the program, the U.S. Department of Agriculture pays cash to U.S. exporters as bonuses, allowing them to sell U.S. agricultural products in targeted countries at prices below the exporter's costs of acquiring them. The program is used to help U.S. farmers meet competition from subsidizing countries, in particular the EC. Major objectives of the program are to challenge unfair trade practices, expand U.S. agricultural exports, and encourage other countries exporting agricultural commodities to undertake serious negotiations on agricultural trade problems.

Since its inception in 1985, \$4.6 billion has been expended in support of the export of \$15.3 billion of U.S. agricultural products. The EEP program will operate at \$1.2 billion in FY 1992, up from \$917 million in FY 1991. There are similar but separate export programs for dairy products and sunflower and cottonseed oils.

Export of High Value Products

Today's initiative is consistent with the Administration's efforts to promote U.S. exports of high-value products. Over the past decade, U.S. high-value product exports have grown and now surpass the value of our bulk commodity exports. The U.S. has now reached 15 percent of the world market share in trade of these products in the face of subsidized competition from the European Community. Exports of meat, vegetable oil, eggs and dairy products have all grown significantly. Products designated as "high-value" now receive about 29 percent of the total support provided by our agricultural export programs.

Currently, 25 of the 56 EEP initiatives with outstanding balances are for high-value products and, if fully utilized by importing countries, over 32 percent of EEP bonuses awarded would go to promote such products. One billion dollars in high-value agriculture exports supports 27,000 jobs.

How the Program Will Work

All sales under the EEP are made by the private sector, not by the government. U.S. exporters will contact and negotiate a sales contract, including price, quantity, quality, time of delivery, and other terms, with an importer. The contract may be contingent upon USDA's approval of a bonus. Each prospective exporter submits a bid to the USDA requesting a subsidy--or bonus--that would allow the sale to take place at the agreed price.

USDA reviews all bids for the competitiveness of the bonus value requested, and compares the bids with offers from other U.S. exporters and sales of competitor countries.

Any or all bids may be rejected. If accepted, the exporter and USDA enter into an agreement, with bonus being paid upon proof that the commodity has been exported to the targeted country under the terms of that agreement.

SUBJECT: IMMUNOSUPPRESSIVE ILLNESSES WITHOUT EVIDENCE OF HIV VIRAL INFECTION



Sam Skinner recently suggested that you would be interested in a status report on AIDS-like disease that does not appear to be associated with either of the two viral types, HIV-1 and HIV-2, that are characteristically present in AIDS patients. The concern, of course, is that cases of this nature might signal the outbreak of a totally new form of the AIDS disease based on a virus that is not detectable by any of our current tests.

The press has prominently featured reports of a number of persons with such immunosuppressive disease without evidence of HIV infection. (Please see the attached example.) This press interest was in part, stimulated by reports presented at a recent international conference in Amsterdam. Government credibility as well as the safety of our nation's blood supply and the validity of HIV testing have been called into question in these press reports worldwide.

Without minimizing the seriousness with which all Government authorities view such reports, it is critical that these observations be kept in perspective. At present, there are not more than 25 to 35 cases known to have occurred worldwide. Contrast this to the occurrence to date of 230,000 cases of AIDS in the U.S. and an estimated 1,000,000 persons infected with HIV and it is apparent that the problem (if there is a problem) is, at present, minuscule. Efforts are being made by CDC to elicit additional reports, if any.

The cases to date have been characterized by an abnormally low count (<300 per ml^3) of the so-called "CD-4" white cells (infection fighting cells which are commonly low in AIDS patients) and, sometimes in patients having opportunistic infections of the type observed in AIDS patients. None of these patients have shown the presence of antibodies to HIV or the presence of the virus itself. Some of these unusual cases have occurred among high-risk groups (drug abusers and homosexuals) but some have occurred in individuals without known high risk exposures. The patients report onsets of illness beginning at least as early as 1983. There are no apparent "outbreak" cases in any single geographic area or occurring over any particular short span of time.

What is not clear is whether the occurrence of such cases represents a new phenomenon or whether such cases may have been occurring sporadically over many decades. Such a determination is especially difficult because measurement of CD-4 cell levels did not begin until the late 1970's.

If there is, in fact, an unusual occurrence of such cases, a second question arises -- "were they caused by a virus?" Three investigators reported at the Amsterdam meeting that they had detected unusual viruses in certain of these unusual patients but available information suggests that each had identified quite different entities. From available information, it seems probable that two of the three laboratories (Gupta at the University of California-Irvine and Lawrence at Cornell University) are describing contaminants in their virus cultures, a not unusual problem in this field rather than new HIV-like viruses as they have suggested. Further information is awaited from the third laboratory.

Both the National Institutes of Allergy and Infectious Diseases and the Centers for Disease Control believe that the reports deserve careful scrutiny and have embarked on special programs to elicit additional reports of cases of the type noted, to conduct special virological studies on such patients, and to evaluate the nature of the viruses purported to have been isolated. A special meeting of leading scientific investigators will be convened by CDC within the next 10 days to permit public presentation and evaluation of all available data.

The personal, professional judgment of my Associate Director for the Life Sciences -- Dr. D. A. Henderson, an internationally renowned expert in the field of public health and the one person given the major credit for the elimination of smallpox from our planet -- is that the reports of occurrence of cases such as those described in the recent international meeting, otherwise lacking unusual or spectacular developments, generated an unwarranted level of media attention far out of proportion to the significance of the observations. Responses to media queries, unexpected and impromptu, failed to provide needed perspective or reassurance.

It is important now to proceed deliberately to make widely available such information as is available, to pursue appropriate epidemiological and virological leads, and to reassure the public, as may be appropriate, regarding the credibility of testing measures being used to protect the blood supply and to test individuals for infection. Such efforts will be orchestrated by CDC through the above mentioned public meeting, and through frequent published reports. Meanwhile, Dr. Henderson and I believe that it is appropriate to say that there is, at present, no substantive information which causes us to question the safety of our nation's blood supply or to question the validity of current routine testing procedures for HIV infection.

C.D.C. Is Embarrassed By Its Tardy Response To AIDS-Like Illness

AMSTERDAM, July 27 — For officials of the Centers for Disease Control and other Federal health agencies, the international AIDS meeting here last week was an embarrassment because they had overlooked two fundamental principles of public health.

These principles are swiftly investigating mysterious cases of an illness to determine their cause and rapidly communicating with the public and with scientists to allay alarm about the perceived threat.

The cases involve an AIDS-like illness without evidence of infection with H.I.V., the human immunodeficiency virus, which causes AIDS. The alarm centers on a threat to the nation's blood supply from what may be a new AIDS-like virus and alarm over how such a virus might spread.

From the meeting, it was evident that the C.D.C., the Federal centers in Atlanta responsible for tracking AIDS and other communicable diseases, waited too long to issue a call to doctors to report such cases. The centers had collected six cases over the last two years, and their only report on them had been given last spring at a Colorado conference that severely restricted news coverage.

In their brief summary of the cases for the spring meeting, the C.D.C. authors, Dr. Thomas J. Spira and Bonnie M. Jones, said that "H.I.V. may not be the only infectious cause of immunodeficiency. But they did not find a cause, and their abstract was not read by many researchers who knew of such cases and who were hot on the trail of a potentially new virus."

The C.D.C. has earned high marks for solving a myriad of epidemiological puzzles. A celebrated one was the discovery of the bacterium that causes Legionnaire's disease.

But in recent months, the C.D.C.'s image has been tarnished by its handling of major AIDS issues. For example, after announcing that it would issue a new definition of AIDS, the C.D.C. quietly shelved the plan in June, infuriating many state health officials, the very people whom the agency needs to work with most closely. At the time, officials said they needed more time for consultations before changing the definition.

Also, the C.D.C. has come under severe criticism for its handling of the issue of health-care workers infected by H.I.V.

In 1990, it published in its weekly report a small number of cases in which H.I.V. had been transmitted to patients of a Florida dentist who had AIDS. The C.D.C. then published guidelines calling on health-care workers infected with H.I.V. to stop performing certain procedures or to tell patients they were infected, an announcement that would be tantamount to ending a career.

The criticism came from the C.D.C.'s chief supporters, among them key infectious-disease specialists and leaders of other professional groups, who said it was impossible to draw up a list of procedures in which transmission of H.I.V. might occur.

The C.D.C. revised the guidelines but abandoned them after failing to gain approval from Health and Human Services officials in Washington.

Despite the setbacks, the criticism shouted by participants at the AIDS meeting here was astonishing.

It started after Dr. Jeffrey Laurence of Cornell University Medical School in New York City not only reported five cases of an AIDS-like illness but also said he had tantalizing clues suggesting that a new virus might be among them.

Dr. James Curran, the C.D.C.'s leading AIDS expert, followed, adding the agency's six cases. He asked aloud whether the C.D.C. should have published them earlier in its widely read weekly report, and he also put out a call for doctors to report additional cases. Participants shouted, "Yes!" because earlier reporting could have speeded up the recognition and investigation of the problem.

Then a number of European and American scientists stepped forward to report even more cases. The number was small, about two dozen. But the C.D.C.'s embarrassment was now huge because the agency had lost control over the dissemination of new information in the field of AIDS.

Medical Journals Are Warned

Also criticized were university scientists who had uncovered clues pointing to a potentially new AIDS-like virus but who had not shared that information with health officials because they were holding it for publication in scientific journals. The scientists were criticized for appearing,

to put the desire for credit for their work ahead of public-health concerns.

Dr. Anthony S. Fauci, the head of the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases, a Federal agency in Bethesda, Md., sternly warned scientists and medical journal editors against continuing the practice.

Many journals penalize authors who disclose information before it is published. Although journals say they exempt information concerning public health, scientists are keenly aware of instances in which researchers provided the C.D.C. with data only to see their reports rejected by prestigious medical journals. For example, The New England Journal of Medicine refused to publish the first report of a case of AIDS from a blood transfusion because the case had already

been reported in the centers' weekly report. Now Dr. Fauci was telling scientists to hold journal editors to their pledge to waive such rules in matters of public health.

If a new virus was on the loose, what about the safety of the blood supply? reporters asked.

The questions drew responses of reassurance from Dr. Curran and a number of other health officials, including Dr. James Allen, who directs the National AIDS Program Office in Washington, and Dr. June Osborn, the co-head of the National Commission on AIDS.

There is no cause for concern, Dr. Osborn and Dr. Allen said repeatedly, because blood banks have systems to screen out potential blood donors who are at risk for H.I.V.

But Dr. Curran said that the risk factors for the AIDS-like illness were unknown. He and others cautioned scientists and reporters not to invoke the AIDS model by assuming, without scientific evidence, that the AIDS-like cases were caused by a virus that is spread like H.I.V.

"It is so easy to slip into this AIDS mentality because we are talking

about it at an AIDS conference and we have AIDS researchers doing the work," Dr. Curran said, adding, "This is not AIDS caused by something else."

But when health officials acknowledged under the pressure of repeated questioning that there was a gap in their logic and that they had no scientific evidence to support their contention that such a virus was not being spread through the blood supply, they changed their tune. A scientific investigation is now a high priority, Dr. Curran said. They continued to say that the blood supply seemed safe because the number of cases reported is small, about 30, and most independent experts agreed.

Last winter, C.D.C. officials said to this reporter that Dr. Sudhir Gupta of the University of California at Irvine had told them he might have found a new virus among such cases but that he had declined to share the data with them until his paper was published. At the time, Dr. Gupta also refused to discuss his findings with this reporter because Dr. Gupta said it would be improper to do so until the paper was published in a peer-reviewed journal.

His report is due to appear next month in The Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences, which is not a peer-reviewed journal in the usual sense because papers are sponsored by members of the organization. But, responding to Dr. Fauci's plea, the editor released the paper last week. In it, Dr. Gupta said he had detected a virus in a 66-year-old woman with an AIDS-like illness and her healthy 38-year-old daughter.

Dr. Gupta raised the issue of transmission of the virus through blood because the mother's only risk factor was a transfusion in 1949 or 1950. Experts at two news conferences here scoffed at the prospect of a four-decade interval from infection to AIDS-like symptoms.

But most scientists would have scoffed at a 10-year incubation period before AIDS was discovered, the experts were told, and they conceded that a very long interval could not be dismissed so readily without an investigation.

The situation was reminiscent of 1981, when AIDS was discovered after the recognition of fewer than a dozen cases of a puzzling syndrome of Kaposi's sarcoma, an unusual cancer, and immune deficiency in gay men. At the time, no C.D.C. or Federal health official predicted the huge worldwide epidemic of AIDS.

Dr. Curran insisted that the analogy was incorrect. The new cases, he said, were not clustered in time or concentrated in a particular region or in distinct groups, as were the first cases of AIDS that were recognized among gay men in New York and California.

Some participants suggested that Federal health officials were striving to avoid any controversies related to AIDS during a Presidential campaign.

For every 10 preliminary reports of what seems to be a new epidemic, only one usually turns out to be real. The only way to rule out the nine false ones is to investigate all suspect reports as soon as possible.

Because quick communication goes far in calming public anxiety, health officers usually start by calling a news conference to tell the public how they plan to check out a problem.

Dr. Jonathan Mann, the conference co-chairman and a state epidemiologist in New Mexico, said: "The worse thing you can do in an epidemic is say, 'Relax, don't worry, we are sending a team next week' because the perception is health officials don't care, and rumors get out of control."

Bush didn't come back but chief of staff Sam Skinner did.

What we want is to get a focus on their program and his program and I think then we'll see there's a real option and there are real differences of opinion."

He said the campaign in Ill. "hasn't focused on the issues.../ obviously there's a major difference on philosophies."

On Braun: Her primary bounce has been "like none we've ever seen in Ill."

Also: "What you have here is probably a woman who is probably one of the most liberal in philosophy than anybody running for the Senate this year. Rich is obviously on the other side of the spectrum. He's more moderate and towards the conservative side. That's what the differences are in this race."

He discounted that the Thomas nomination will drive women to vote for women. Skinner also said the TV ads starting Monday will be "positive ads." He called Ill. "a very important state" and said "we can't wait to get to Houston and get on the campaign trail."

Upon concluding his remarks, Bush walked to the front of the stage and jumped to the ground, supported by police at his side. He spotted a baby girl in the crowd and picked her up and held her next to his face. Photo ops with the girl and a man (presumably her father). Bush then worked his way around the crowd in front of the stage shaking hands and saying hellos. Eventually he climbed the stage again, stripped off his rain coat and again waved hellos, before once more jumping off the stage and working his way back to a picnic table under a yellow and white tent.

Bush ate at a small wooden table with Edgar on his left and Rich Williamson on his right. Across the table were three women of varying ages and one girl with braces (identities not known). Bush ate quickly but voraciously, attacking a plate of corn on the cob and a rib sandwich. At one point a woman came up from behind and towled off his head (still soaked from the rain). Another threw him a red t-shirt which read "Elk Grove Republicans."

Toward the end of his quick meal, the crowd started chanting "Beat Slick Willie" and "Four More Years." Acknowledging the support, the President stood up on the table and thanked the crowd and said he hoped the scene would be a "preview of coming attractions."

Before leaving in the motorcade, the President had his photo taken with Republican congressional candidate Don Manzullo and his wife (Manzullo is running in Illinois's 16th district). Other photos were taken, but identities of the others were not known. ~~THE~~

The entire event was run under very rushed and at times confused conditions, as the organizers did not appear to have a contingency plan for the rain and events were rushed together. The President did not respond to questions related to the anti-Bush editorial in the Orange County paper.

The motorcade back to O'Hare was uneventful. Before departing, Sam Skinner came back briefly and said of the event, "You can say you got drenched, or you can say the rain stopped when the President came out... The glass is half full or half empty."
