A Mr. Fred Strong, local resident, called on 8/8/92 and on 8/9/92 representing the owner of the Sea Horse Lobster Pound on Langsford rd, Cape Porpoise. RE: DAVID BRINKLEY INTERVIEW WITH THE PRESIDENT

At 5:30 p.m. on Thursday, August 13, 1992, the President will be interviewed by David Brinkley (one-on-one) in the Library located in the residence area of the White House. This interview will be aired on Sunday, August 15, 1992 on "This Week with David Brinkley." To facilitate set-up for the interview, I would like to submit the following timeline detailing set-up procedures:

TIMELINE FOR THIS WEEK WITH DAVID BRINKLEY

11:00 a.m. 2 production trucks will arrive at the Northeast Gate to be inspected by TSD and K-9 Unit.

11:30 a.m. Production trucks will be placed in position outside doors of hall adjacent to library (east side of portico) and will remain there until the conclusion of the interview session.

12:00 p.m. Tours end and ABC crews begin to off-load equipment and set-up cameras in library.
**Set-up continues until 5:00 p.m.

5:00 p.m. Pre-brief session begins in Oval Office for 30 minutes.

5:30 p.m. The President enters Library and begins interview with David Brinkley for approximately 30 minutes.

6:00 p.m. Interview concludes; the President departs Library and tapes a walking shot with David Brinkley on the colonnade. **1 or 2 camera crews, with equipment, will be on the colonnade with them for this shot.

6:15 p.m. ABC News crew begins to breakdown camera equipment and clear library of all equipment.

7:15 p.m. ABC crew completes breakdown, and all ABC personnel and production vehicles depart White House grounds.

Clinton's host at an 8/10 fund-raiser in the key swing Philadelphia suburbs hosted a '90 fund-raiser for the GOP, with guest speaker Dan Quayle.

*1 GOP PLATFORM: PRO-LIFE RULES; BUCHANAN CAMP'S "ALTERATIONS"

Pro-choice GOPers "lost their first battle by a wide margin" when the platform subcmte on individual rights voted 17-3 "to retain the party's strict anti-abortion stance." The vote "was almost anti-climactic" (Cobb, HOUSTON CHRONICLE, 8/11). The language approved for the abortion plank was "almost identical" to the '88 platform, repeating the call for a constitutional amendment outlawing abortion. The vote was "lopsided enough to diminish chances of a floor fight" during the convention next week, which would require the support of 25% of the full platform cmte or majority of support from six state delegations (Nolan, BOSTON GLOBE, 8/11). Pro-choice advocates "had only two allies" on the cmte, '84 Reagan-Bush campaign staffer Mary Weiss of SD and MA delegate Deborah Leighton. Weiss: "I want to appeal to this group to go back to their constituents and ask them about the abortion issue. I feel very strongly about this issue. But I feel even more strongly (about its effect on) the Republican Party." Rep. Henry Hyde (R-IL) "reminded" the group of the "inalienable right to life" asserted in the Declaration of Independence, adding, "a woman who wants to exercise her sovereignty over her body ... conflicts with the right to life." Republicans for Choice pres. Ann Stone "vowed that more efforts will be made" today, when the full platform cmte "is expected to begin consideration of the draft platform" (Shogan, L.A. TIMES, 8/11). The platform language is "actually more rigorous than the position of the president, who says he supports exceptions for pregnancies caused by rape and incest." DE delegate Bobbi Breske spoke to the subcmte, saying "party members in her home state had urged her to work for an exception for victims of rape": "Are we to just neglect them and put their lives in jeopardy in back alleys just because a girl has been raped and does not care to carry it?" (Firestone, N.Y. NEWSDAY, 8/11). Abortion "is the San Andreas fault line of the Republican Party. It is a stress line straining with pressures ready to rend the partisan coalition that Ronald Reagan built" (Sperry, SEATTLE POST-INTELLIGENCER, 8/11). MA Gov. Wm Weld (R) said he intends to be "a walking, talking demonstration that you can be pro-choice and pro-Bush": "I'm going to do my bit at Houston to try to make it abundantly clear that you can be a Republican and a loyal supporter of George Bush and still be pro-choice" (Black, BOSTON GLOBE, 8/11). Ellen Goodman writes, "after the dust has cleared, the platform philosophy will be wide enough for only a pup tent" (Balto. SUN, 8/11). NATIONAL REVIEW's McGurn writes, "Ann Stone is dealing with a press that wants to hear how badly the GOP is divided on abortion." But, "the only thing Stone has been successful at is getting even more publicity for herself" (HOUSTON CHRONICLE, 8/11). N.Y. POST's Pagnozzi writes, "In GOP, 'no-choicers' are the radicals" (8/11). ABC's Cokie Roberts: "It's clear that the anti-abortion forces have the votes here. What's a lot less clear is whether [GOPers] on the other side will support [Bush] come November" (8/10). CBS' Bruce Morton: "In the platform committee hearing rooms ... the anti-abortion forces had the votes" (8/10). CNN's Deborah Potter: "The dissent here is unusual for a [GOP] gathering, but party officials insist they will put it behind them and emerge from next week's convention with a united front. But the cracks that remain below the surface could spell trouble as Republicans try to mobilize for a

tough fall campaign" CNN's Catharine Crier: "To hear some Republicans tell it, [abortion] has been a festering wound within the GOP that's only now coming to life in a big way" (8/10).

BUCHANAN OFFERS HIS OWN PLATFORM: Buchanan forces released a list of "alterations" to the GOP platform they said were "necessary" to bring the party closer to its conservative "roots." Buchanan did not "personally" endorse the proposals but campaign staff and sister/manager Bay Buchanan called for an end to most-favored nation status to China, tougher policies against illegal immigration and a "drastic" reduction in foreign aid. Bay Buchanan said the Buchanan campaign would not withhold its endorsement if the changes were not adopted. Buchanan has only one of 107 delegates on the platform cmte (Garrett, W. TIMES, 8/11). Bay Buchanan, "speaking for her brother," said lawmakers who raised taxes were "irresponsible" for pushing tax cuts without spending cuts (Dodge, DALLAS MORNING NEWS, 8/11). HOUSTON CHRONICLE reports, "the ghost of Ross Perot may have crept into the draft GOP platform" with the words, "we oppose their use of corporate power or individual wealth to intimidate employees through arbitrary and unjustified investigation of their personal lives" (8/11). "The Republicans are so eager to forget their own troubles of the past few months that they gave their biggest applause" to Rep. Bill McCollum (R-FL) "when he said simply, 'This is the first day of the re-election campaign of George Bush and Dan Quayle'" (Perry/Shribman, W.S. JOURNAL, 8/11).

CLINTON -- ECON: The platform drafting session opened by "ridiculing" Clinton and Gore "as tax-and-spend liberals who would create economic havoc and disarm America if elected." NRSC chair/convention keynoter Phil Gramm and ex-OMB dir. James Miller said Clinton's economic plan "would raise taxes, put thousands of Americans out of work, slash business profits and benefit only lobbyists and lawyers." Gramm: "In a country crying out for change, is this the change America wants? I think not. ... We want to resume the change started in the Reagan-Bush revolution" (Mathis, HOUSTON CHRONICLE, 8/11). USA TODAY header: "GOP brands Clinton as 'horror show.'" RNC chair Rich Bond "imagined" a Clinton cabinet featuring Rep. Pat Schroeder (D-CO) as Sec/Def and Jerry Brown as Interior/Sec and declaring "a biosphere in every backyard" (Nagourney/Wolf, 8/11).

'90 BUDGET DEAL REBUKED: A platform economic subcmte unanimously approved an amendment that declared the 1990 tax increases 'a mistake.'" The amendment was offered by retiring Bush co-chair Rep. Vin Weber (R-MN), who called the budget agreement "a bone in the throat" of the GOP and added it was time to "get this issue behind us" (Dionne, W. POST, 8/11). W. POST's Balz writes; "Sensing that Clinton's plan" is "vulnerable in to attack" GOPers "produced a blizzard of reports, rhetoric and statistics" (8/11).

PROTESTS: Pro-life groups "such as Operation Rescue and Houston-based Rescue America" have vowed to "shut down" Houston abortion clinics, "ignoring a court order that they have to remain at least 100 feet from the facilities." Pro-choice activists are "organizing teams to defend the clinics and their clients" (Dyer, HOUSTON CHRONICLE, 8/11). In an "early taste of confrontation" yesterday, "several dozen" pro-lifers gathered outside a Houston Planned Parenthood clinic and "destroyed copies of the judge's order requiring them to keep their distance from the clinics." About 200 clinic defenders "responded by linking arms and chanting," but pro-lifers "did not attempt to breach the

lines, and there were no arrests" (Liebrum, HOUSTON CHRONICLE, 8/11). Republicans for Choice chair Ann Stone: "Women's lives and the freedom of choice are safer at this clinic today -- despite the attack by the Operation Rescue extremists -- than they are inside the Republican Platform committee meeting" (release, 8/10). Beginning at 5:00a this morning, "more than 4,000 men and women were to encircle 30 Houston-area clinics" and "try to shield" clinics from pro-life protesters. Pro-choice clinic defenders "will meet at a secret location at 3:30a each morning to be directed to various clinics where protests are expected" (CHRONICLE, 8/11).

PROTECTIONS: An "expansive and expensive security plan" for the GOP convention includes utilizing "half the Houston police force, scores of Secret Service agents and a smattering of sheriff's and constable's deputies." Abortion clinic protection patrols "are not included in the HPD security plan," but police will be "utilized as needed" to protect the clinics. Sheriff Johnny Kevenhagen "has requested fingerprints of protesters arrested in Buffalo, N.Y., Wichita, Kan., and Milwaukee" -- cities with recent pro-life demonstrations -- because "protesters intent on getting arrested often don't carry identification." The GOP has hired its own security consulting firm, Richardson, Dunn & Associates, which was paid "\$29,000 during April, May, and June of this year, according to FEC reports." The Houston-based firm is run by ex-Secret Service Agents (Milling, CHRON., 8/11).

*2 CALIFORNIA (54): MORE OF THAT GOP HAND-WRINGING

More fretting: According to "numerous" CA GOP leaders -- "including key officials in the [CA] Bush-Quayle campaign organization," Bush is "in danger of losing" the state. One "top campaign official": "Is there a Bush California strategy? If you find out what it is, let me know." Pro-choice state Sen. Rebecca Morgan (R): "I have not heard a message that will sell in California ... It's hard enough being a moderate Republican these days." Assemblyman Tom McClintock (R): "What message? ... He's thrown away the Reagan coalition and substantial sections of it are being co-opted by the Clinton campaign." Until Bush "can make a case for why he deserves a second term, Californians can't put together a campaign for him. As one inner circle participant put it: 'Without crisply drawn national themes coming into California, asking what he's saying here is almost irrelevant.'" GOP strategist Steve Merksamer: "If I were running for president, I'd say I'm going to cut taxes." Outgoing Rep. Tom Campbell (R-CA) said Bush should talk about "the importance of agriculture in our state, wetlands, the endangered species act" and should "emphasis we'll be spending less on defense but that we'll make these changes carefully and cautiously." Dan Schnur, communications dir. to CA Gov. Pete Wilson: "Clinton has tried to separate foreign policy as an issue, like it doesn't matter. But it does, and there's no better place to prove that than in California" (Trounstine, SAN JOSE MERCURY NEWS, 8/10)

*3 FLORIDA (25): MIAMI HEAT -- JEB MEETS THE RODHAM BROTHERS

MIAMI HERALD's Gehrke takes a light-hearted look at Hillary Clinton's brothers/Miami residents Hugh and Tony Rodham, who have "kept a low profile" in the WH race "but are willing to go around the county -- or country" for Clinton. Similar to First Son/Dade Co. GOP Chair Jeb Bush "who will keep the president informed about South Florida issues if [his father] wins re-election," the Rodham brothers provide support local support for Clinton.

Already Hugh Rodham's wife, Maria Victoria Arias, changed her registration from GOP to Dem "because she was impressed with his vision of the country" (8/10).

*4 NEW YORK (33): PEROT SPENDING BIG BUCKS TO GET ON BALLOT

Perot "is continuing to spend hundreds of thousands of dollars" to get his name on the NY ballot. "In the last few days alone, the NY Perot Petition Cmte -- "bankrolled by the Texas billionaire -- has taken full page ads in newspapers around the state urging voters to sign Perot petitions." Papers include N.Y. NEWSDAY, N.Y. DAILY NEWS, W.S. JOURNAL, and papers in Rochester, Syracuse, Buffalo and Albany. Perot spokesperson Sharon Holman "said she couldn't explain why Perot is still trying to get on the ballot in all 50 states" (Goldberg, N.Y. NEWSDAY, 8/11).

CLINTON: Unlike Dukakis who "turned over" his NY campaign to Gov. Mario Cuomo (D) in '88, the Clinton camp "has no plans to let New York's top [Dem] party leaders dictate his campaign. ... They will work with Cuomo's people, but not under them." Clinton has kept on NY primary director Kevin Thurm, "a change [which] has delighted at least several groups who were with Clinton from the start." NY Dem chair John Marino: "You will see a number of Cuomo people in this campaign ... Kevin's job is to fly the flag here. ... He'll be working very closely with myself and [NY Deputy Mayor Bill Lynch]. It's one team." One Clinton organizer speaking on conditions of anonymity: "They told us in 1988, 'Hey, it's time to leave.' That led to a lot of hurt feelings. ... Now, with Clinton, there is an institutional memory for who was there before the convention." Sources "insist" Clinton's reluctance in turning the campaign over to Cuomo "has nothing to do with the political and personal feud" between the two. Some believe, that Clinton "not relegate[ing] his campaign to Cuomo and his advisers provides a signal of his management style." Brooklyn Dem Party chair/Assemblyman Clarence Norman (D): Dukakis won the nomination and he fell asleep. Bill Clinton is on top of everything in his campaign" (Precious, ALBANY TIMES UNION, 8/9).

CONNECTICUT (8): A Quinnipiac College poll, conducted 8/3-7, surveyed 657 registered voters; margin of error +/- 4.5% (Quinnipiac release, 8/10). Bush carried CT in '88 52-47%.

Dems have the "strongest" shot at Gov. since 1968 and the Clinton-Gore ticket "has shown heavy attention ... [they] could have received their mail here" since the Dem Convention (8/9). Sen. Bill Bradley (D-NJ), a MO native, campaigned around the state with the MO Dem statewide ticket, including House Maj. Leader Dick Gephardt (ST. LOUIS POST-DISPATCH, 8/10).

MONTANA (3): A Political/Media Research poll, conducted 8/4-6, surveyed 803 likely voters; margin of error +/- 3.5%

*6 BUSH: PRE-CONVENTION PONDERING

N.Y. TIMES' Toner on Bush: "His speeches are getting sharper, more partisan, more laden with red-meat lines and tough-guy attitude. His surrogates are taking on [Clinton] with more gusto and fewer stumbles. ... For his fellow Republicans, it is not a moment too soon." When he is in "campaign mode," Bush "is ready, mentally, to fight, and becomes very, very dangerous" (8/11). BOSTON GLOBE's Wilkie writes, as Bush "struggles through a summer of misfortune, his downward political spiral has haunting similarities to the twilight of [Carter's] presidency" (8/11). GLOBE's Mashek writes the Admin. is "massing a publicity blitz" including interviews, press conferences, and "working the phones." He concludes with the "projected morale booster" of Baker's return, possibly this week (8/11). NBC's John Cochran on whether Baker can move "easily" to the campaign: "Not easily, but he can move. ... What Baker can do ... is simply to say that re-electing George Bush is in the interest of American foreign policy. ... I suspect he'll go to the Bush White House, not to the Bush campaign ... possibly as Chief of Staff" (8/10). W. POST's Cohen casts Baker as a tragic figure like "Godfather" Michael Corleone, who said: "Just when I thought I was out, they pull me back in" (8/11). AEI's Ben Wattenberg offers pointers to the GOP, suggesting foremost that Bush be put "in an isolation booth until he produces a short statement about his political philosophy" (N.Y. POST, 8/11). Both SEATTLE POST-INTELLIGENCER's Hanson and HOUSTON CHRONICLE's Trounson examine Bush's record on foreign policy. Hanson notes, "As the Gulf War victor and the man at the helm when Soviet communism collapsed, George Bush should be enjoying a tremendous boost" (8/11). Trounson's lengthy piece concludes, if Baker leaves in the midst of Middle East peace talks, and "the opportunity ... slips away," it will be "hard to miss the symbolism: Bush's neglected domestic program will have exacted a long-delayed revenge on his foreign policy" (8/11).

BARR NIXES "IRAQ-GATE" PROBE: AG Wm Barr "rejected a congressional request for an independent counsel to investigate whether high-level Bush ... officials violated the law in ... its prewar policy toward Iraq" (Frantz, L.A. TIMES). In "tough language," Barr said "there was no specific evidence warranting" such a probe; his decision "cannot be appealed under the post-Watergate law on independent counsels." Rep. Henry B. Gonzales (D-TX): "Barr is playing a dangerous political game in a desperate attempt to protect the Bush administration" (8/11). B. GLOBE's Farrell: Barr accused Dems of "launching reckless

accusations for political gain." Barr: "We have found those accusations to be hollow ... we cannot allow the criminal process to be used as a political weapon or for partisan purposes" (8/11). USA TODAY header: "Iraq inquiry rejected; Dems cry cover-up" (8/11). N.Y. TIMES' Pear: "The decision may spare ... Bush some political embarrassment" (8/11). ABC's Peter Jennings on Barr's refusal to name an Independent prosecutor: "A decision which is going to be taken as unusually political." Rep. Jack Brooks (D-TX): "It's stonewalling plain and simple, and it leaves all of us ... with one overriding question, 'What is the administration trying to hide in the record of its assistance to Saddam Hussein'" (ABC, 8/10). CBS' Rita Braver examined what the special prosecutor would have looked into (8/10).

RABIN: Bush and Israeli P.M. Rabin "moved toward agreement" on a Israeli loan guarantee package at Kennebunkport 8/10 (Sirica, N.Y. NEWSDAY). Bush also announced that Arab-Israeli peace talks will continue 8/24 in DC (8/11). Many reports noted a boat off the coast carrying a sign supporting assassinated right-wing Jewish leader Meir Kahane -- and Bush's reaction: "I thought this guy was kind of dead" (mult., 8/11).

CLINTON-BUSTING: Sen. Phil Gramm (R-TX) told the told the GOP Platform Committee 8/10: "Clinton's bus tour isn't finished yet. The next stop is deep in the heart of taxes." Bush-Quayle political dir. Mary Matalin: "The only job Slick Willie is promising Americans is a con job" (Bush-Quayle release, 8/10). NEW REPUBLIC's Kinsley examines various calculations of Clinton tax increases by the Bush campaign and others (W. POST, 8/11).

ALSO: CBS' Dan Rather reported sources close to Bush say one reason he is being "sensitive" to negative campaign tactics is the fear Clinton will attack him for business dealings by his children (8/10). Header over USA TODAY's Pesce's report from Midland, TX: "Loyalty fading in president's old hometown" (8/11). W.S. JOURNAL editorial praises Bush's school choice initiatives, calling Clinton "the pet of the teachers' unions" (8/11). OR Gov. Barbara Roberts' (D), in a N.Y. TIMES op-ed headline, "Bush Blows It on Health Care," writes, "Any one of the Administration's misperceptions" about the nixed OR health-rationing plan "could have been corrected with a simple phone call to Oregon. But none ever came" (8/11). Reagan WH adviser Deaver: "This White House doesn't seem understand that television is the medium, that people get all their information from and that takes strategic planning." Reagan '80 manager John Sears: "I really think he has to address himself to the next four years, if the issue continues to be the stewardship of the last four years I think the the polls indicate the people want to vote him out" ("Today, NBC, 8/11). HOTLINE publisher Doug Bailey: "He needs to lay out a picture as to where America is going and how we get from here to there and I think he can do that starting at the convention and if he can do that he wins ... a vision of the future needs to combine a picture of tomorrow's jobs with yesterday's values" ("FOX Morning News, 8/11).

*7 N.Y. POST STORY: BUSH CAMP BLAMES DEMS, CALLS IT "TRASH"

N.Y. POST's front-page sub-head: "Book reveals U.S. envoy set up Swiss hideaway in '84 for Vice Prez & his secretary." Separate pictures of the two are also included on the front page (8/11). When "CBS This Morning" asked Bush-Quayle's Mary Matalin about it, she responded, "the Democrats [have] been peddling this trashy book to many reputable newspapers who have rejected the opportunity to reprint this trash ... this is absolutely,

positively, unequivocally, categorically trash" (8/11).

N.Y. POST's inside headlines: "NEW BOOK: BUSH HAD SWISS TRYST" by Jim Nolan; "The insider who spilled the beans" by Nolan; "For years, prez watchers have groped in dark" by Marsha Kranes. The stories repeat allegations reported in a footnote of a new book, "The Power House," by Susan Trento. The author's husband, Joe Trento (then a CNN investigative reporter and now "broadcast director for the National Security News Service") is said to have interviewed former U.S. disarmament talks Ambassador Louis Fields in 1986, in the presence of William Joyce of the law firm Fields joined after retiring his ambassadorial post. Prior to Fields' death, he was interviewed again (at Joe Trento's request) by CNN reporter Joe Gourley "who corroborated Fields' account to Trento." Gourley is now editor of "a government newsletter, Justice Department Alert." Nolan: "Over the last few days, The Post has spoken repeatedly with Trento, Gourley and Joyce ... All confirmed the substance of Fields' quotes in Susan Trento's footnote." Bush campaign spokesperson Tony Mitchell "denounced the report": "It's absolutely garbage. There's no foundation for it." Nolan: "Bush has never been directly asked whether he has had any extramarital affairs" (8/11).

CBS THIS MORNING: CBS' Harry Smith to Matalin: "Let me ask you about something else. There's a book out, or a book that's just about out that in a footnote names that then-Vice President Bush had an affair with an assistant when he was on a mission in Geneva. Well, that footnote has turned into frontpage news [holding up N.Y. POST], at least in New York, in the N.Y. POST. Albeit a tabloid, it is usually a conservative newspaper. Are you ready to say that accusation is a flat out lie?" Matalin: "It is beyond a flat out lie. It is total trash and I will tell you something, Harry, the viewers might be interested in, the ways of Washington go. The Democrats have -- and this has been reported on TV and this is not rumor mongering here -- the Democrats been peddling this trashy book to many reputable newspapers who have rejected the opportunity to reprint this trash. Furthermore, these accounts have been checked out for over 12 years by every reputable news organization in the country and have been found unfounded, ungrounded. They're total trash and there's nothing more to say about this, Harry, and I'm happy to have this opportunity to say the Democrats are moving this stuff around in their typical negative trashy, sleazy campaigning efforts. Smith: "Is this the pot calling the kettle black?" Matalin: "No it is not. I'll just say again what a bunch of hypocrites these guys are. They just say what a bunch of negative campaigners we are. They've been peddling this piece of trash book -- and the only source they have in that book as a footnote is a source that's dead." Smith: "If your campaign ends up plagued by the same sort of rumors that have plagued Bill Clinton, will this even the playing field." Matalin: "It will not be played out on this field and even it were this is absolutely, positively, unequivocally, categorically trash and there's no truth to this rumor that the Democrats have passed around on the Hill" ("CBS This Morning," 8/11).

*8 CLINTON: ONCE COOL PA RECEPTION TURNS "RED-HOT"

"Brimming with confidence," Clinton spoke at Phila.'s Independence Hall 8/10. "Thousands of people clogged the area, creating what those traveling with Clinton said was one of the biggest, most enthusiastic audiences they had seen" since Clinton received the Dem nomination. Police officials estimated the

crowd at 2,700 and Nat'l Park Service officials said it was closer to 5,500. "One woman burst into tears when Clinton approached, imploring him to 'save the country.'" Clinton, "trying to blunt the inevitable attack" from the GOP convention next week: "In the days ahead, when the Republicans raise their old flag of fear, you tell 'em, 'No thanks, this time we're going to vote on our hopes'" (Seelye/Williams, PHILA. INQUIRER, 8/11). Clinton "challenged" Bush to "reveal where he stands" on the tax-cutting proposal put forth by HUD/Sec Jack Kemp, Bush campaign co-chair/retiring Rep. Vin Weber (R-MN) and other GOP conservatives. Clinton: "Let's ask the president, before he spends all of the next two weeks jumping all over Al Gore and Bill Clinton: Where do you stand on your own leadership? You've got a Cabinet secretary and campaign co-chairman who want to add \$80 billion a year to the deficit." Clinton also stressed the need for universal health insurance, "hitting the theme" that helped Sen. Harris Wofford (D-PA) defeat ex-AG Dick Thornburgh (R) (Lehigh, BOSTON GLOBE, 8/11). PHILA. DAILY NEWS' Goldwyn writes, Clinton departed PA in April "after winning a shrug of a presidential primary from an unenthused electorate," but returned yesterday "with the raw energy of a rock star, the heady excitement of a surfer on the perfect wave" (8/11). L.A. TIMES' Fulwood notes, the Phila. audience "was so notable because it was one of the rare times the campaign has attracted large numbers of enthusiastic blacks" (8/11). "After the tumultuous rally, Clinton appeared at a well-attended fund-raiser" in the heavily-GOP suburb of Radnor. The event was hosted by Dr. Francis Bonner, a registered GOPer who hosted a GOP fund-raiser in '90 that featured Quayle as its speaker (Fulwood, L.A. TIMES, 8/11). The "take" from that and one other event "was at least \$650,000, and each carried a message about Clinton's growing appeal to Republicans and to black Americans." Phila. Mayor Ed Rendell (D), who accompanied Clinton to the events, noted Clinton's response in April was "at best lukewarm. Now the crowds are red-hot" (Goldwyn, PHILA. DAILY NEWS, 8/11). CNN's Gene Randall: "Clinton's emphasis was back where he and his advisors want it -- the economy" (8/10).

HOLLYWOOD BILL: "It may not have been love at first sight, but most movers and shakers in Hollywood are now firmly committed to [Clinton] and plan to demonstrate their affection through glittering fund-raisers." 150 people are "expected to pony up \$5,000 each to attend a private dinner [8/13] at the Beverly Hills home of MCA Chairman Lew Wasserman, with Clinton as the guest of honor." The president of the Disney Channel "is putting together a dinner at the end of the month for" Gore. The Hollywood Women's Political Caucus will sponsor a \$1,000-a-ticket event [9/16] at the home of independent producer Ted Field that will feature a rare performance by Barbara Streisand." Clinton fund-raiser Bob Burkett: "Not only has the entertainment community become engaged in this election, but the excitement and enthusiasm is the highest I've ever experienced in any campaign" (Pristin, L.A. TIMES, 8/10).

ENDNOTES FROM THE BUS: Mort Engelberg, producer of such movies as "The Big Easy" and "Smokey and the Bandit," who now advances Bill Clinton's traveling road show: "In a movie if you want to do a scene, you hire 30 extras or 500 extras or whatever, and if it's not right the first time you keep doing it until it's right ... In this business, I think you get one shot at things. The stakes are certainly a great deal higher because this is about something. Movies are about economics." One Clinton aide:

"He's the general." Clinton spokesperson Dee Dee Myers: "He's got great experience and great judgment and no ego" (Brosnan, MEMPHIS COMMERCIAL APPEAL, 8/11). Columnists Germond & Witcover compare the Clinton-Gore bus trip to "Robert F. Kennedy's bus motorcade across northern Indiana in 1968, when he launched his insurgency for the Democratic nomination (Balto. EVENING SUN, 8/10).

DEBATES: According to the bipartisan Commission on Presidential debates, Clinton has accepted a plan for three presidential debates with a single moderator, "but Bush won't decide whether to accept until after" the GOP convention. The plan calls for 90-minute debates 9/22, 10/4 and 10/15, one on foreign policy, one on domestic policy, and one combined. The vice-presidential debate is scheduled for 9/29 (BOSTON HERALD, 8/9).

MISCELLANY: N.Y. TIMES' header: "Clinton's Staff Sees Campaign As a Real War." Subhead: "Top Aides Are Showing a Frenetic Approach" (8/11). W. POST's Walsh profiles House candidate/ex-Black Panther leader Bobby Rush, who is spearheading Clinton's effort "to register and mobilize black, Hispanic and other 'Democratic base voters' in the cities of the industrial Midwest and Northeast and selected areas in the South" (8/11). W.S. JOURNAL's Pearl queries, "Why is blow-dried hair hard to trust? ... In a year when politicians are trying their best not to act -- or look -- like politicians, some people feel Mr. Clinton's well-groomed hair is just not appropriate for the head of state." Bush campaign spokesperson Torie Clarke, who spends 5 min. blow-drying her hair: "I don't think Americans can trust people who spend more time blow-drying their hair in the morning than I do" (8/11). Under header "Clinton, Gore Wrong on Bush's Gulf Feat," columnist Stephen Chapman writes, "Bush doubtless made mistakes, even assuming the war was worth fighting, but it's hard to believe Clinton would have done better. Five months after the invasion of Kuwait, he was still undecided about what the [U.S.] should do" (S.L. POST-DISPATCH, 8/10). NBC's Andrea Mitchell: "The [WH] launched total war today on ... Clinton's economic plan at the same George Bush was under fire by his own rear guard. ... Bush surrogates slammed Clinton's economic proposals on four fronts, on Capitol Hill, at the [WH], at [GOP] convention [HQ] in Houston, and in the daily fax attack" (8/10). BOSTON HERALD's Don Feder: "Gov. Bill Clinton promises to appoint judges who reflect the values of the American people. As my 13-year-old son would say -- Not!" On Hillary Clinton playing an "important role" in the selection of judicial appointees: "Radical feminist lawyer/Legal Services stalwart/emancipate toddlers Hillary picking federal judges? Excuse me while I tear out my hair and run shrieking into the night. ... By all indications, Clinton's choices for the federal bench would be at least as liberal as Carter's selections" (8/10).

*9 QUAYLE AND GORE: VEEPS DEFINE TERRITORY ON GREEN ISSUES

"Staking out a sharply conservative stand on some of the most sensitive environmental issues facing California," Quayle "attacked the Endangered Species Act [ESA], the garter snake, spotted owl, and unnamed 'radicals' who he said would stop growth by cutting off water to ranch lands" (Trounstone, SAN JOSE MERCURY NEWS). Quayle kicked off a 3-day CA swing with a "tour of a cattle range, a barnyard meeting with ranchers, and a few pot shots" at Clinton and Gore. On the ESA: "We do not believe strengthening it is a good idea ... [the] Clinton team apparently

wants to make the [ESA] more restrictive." On the Dems: "They talk about putting people first. Well, they put people first unless there happens to be a spotted owl or a giant garter snake or some other endangered species, and then that needs to have priority ... We must give priority to economic growth and creation of jobs." But Quayle "seemed to entangle himself in the issue ... when he suggested that some birds might have a higher priority": "Obviously, you take the bald eagle and things of that sort ... you're going to take every precaution that you can. But others -- we just need a little flexibility. ... The eagle is obviously very special. [But] I'm not going to get into priorities." Quayle also used the words "rancher" and "farmer" interchangeably, "despite a long history of animosity between the two families of rural people." Quayle: "Ranchers, farmers, it's all the same" (8/11). S.F. CHRONICLE's Wildermuth & Yoachum write Quayle "accused the Democratic ticket of preferring garter snakes to people." He was also "quick to deny rumors that GOP strategists ... have given up [CA]": "Not true at all. Things will turn around here in [CA], you can put that in the bank." Quayle to the ranchers: "If the radicals get their way, they'll take the water away from you, because water means growth, and they don't want growth." He "declined to name names but suggested ... Gore's environmental record bears watching" (8/11). More from the rancher meet: "We're here to let you know that we're on your side" (L.A. TIMES, 8/11).

Gore said he "looked forward to defending his passionately pro-environment book ... against [GOP] attacks": "[It] will be like having a debate with people who think the moon landing took place in a movie lot. It's pitiful how Bush and Quayle deny the existence of any problems. ... Part of political leadership is creating a new way of thinking." Gore traveled to CT, and pitched a program to "build a high-speed nationwide rail network, a suggestion that provoked cheers, as well as environmental projects as potential targets for investments to create jobs" (Wilkie, BOSTON GLOBE, 8/11). But the W. POST header offers another look at the appearance: "Gore Encounters a Tough Crowd." In the "tough-sell" CT crowd, "some of Gore's best applause lines were met with the sound of two hands clapping -- those of an enthusiastic aide" (Goodstein, 8/11). L.A. TIMES' Chen notes many of the defense workers who turned out to hear Gore "seemed unenthusiastic -- even cool -- to his message. Perhaps sensing the mixed reception, Gore reminded the workers" that he and Clinton "had supported the Gulf War," and support force "if necessary" to force Saddam's compliance with U.N. resolutions in Iraq now (8/11). UVA's Patrick Michaels blasts Gore for "creat[ing] a new combination of science, religion, and the state, and then stag[ing] show trials of eminent scientists to prove his point" (W. TIMES, 8/11). Conservative legal activist Bruce Fein also blasts Gore as a "frightening intellectual ingenue" (W. TIMES, 8/11). W.S. JOURNAL's Noah profiles Gore as a "sharp-witted, quick-footed attack dog" for Dems (8/11).

*12 ARIZONA: DEMS VIE FOR TAILHOOK COATTAILS

As activist Claire Sargent (D) "continued to blister" Sen. John McCain (R) for his attendance at Tailhook Assn conventions, Lt. Paula Coughlin, the Navy pilot "who first went public with charges of sexual abuse came to McCain's defense." Coughlin, in a letter released by McCain's office: "Based on his congressional record and my experience with ... McCain, I am confident he did not act dishonorably simply by attending previous Tailhook conventions. ... I found ... McCain to be genuinely concerned and angered about the abuses that I and other women had suffered at Tailhook." Both Sargent and ret. Gen. Truman Spangrud (D), at a 8/6 joint appearance, "charged that [McCain] had attended a previous Tailhook convention and must have known about misconduct typical of the aviators' conventions." McCain "denied and blasted" his Dem rivals saying, they "have set a new political low mark for our state, which is hard to do in [AZ]." Sargent added on 8/7, "if McCain knew about such misconduct at Tailhook ... and remained silent, 'that is unconscionable.'" Spangrud added, that he just wanted McCain to explain his involvement at Tailhook and that, "McCain has answered our questions." McCain said he was "unaware how rowdy the parties on the third floor of the Las Vegas Hilton had become." McCain: "I heard there was drinking going on, furniture sometimes broken and occasional vomiting." McCain added, that he talked to "several people" who attended Tailhook in 1991 and they said "the abuse of women guests 'was unheard of until 1991'" (Williams, ARIZONA REPUBLIC, 8/8).

PROFILES: ARIZONA REPUBLIC's Williams profiles Claire Sargent who has served on the AZ Humanities Council, AZ Action Board for Displaced Homemakers, school board foundations and ran for state House in '84. Sargent on her '84 race: "I obviously didn't win but I got more votes (in the district) than Walter Mondale" (8/11). In a separate piece, Williams profiles Truman Spangrud, who wants to "radically change" the federal budget into an "operating budget" and whom supporters call a "Pentagon insider" (ARIZONA REPUBLIC, 8/11).

*13 GEORGIA: ENDORSEMENT ROUND-UP

Ex-Peace Corps. dir Paul Coverdell (R) and ex-U.S. Atty Bob Barr (R) meet today in a GOP Senate primary runoff. Coverdell was endorsed by the ATLANTA JOURNAL (8/3), ATLANTA CONSTITUTION (7/31), DAILY NEWS (8/9), AUGUSTA CHRONICLE (8/4), and the VALDOSTA DAILY TIMES (8/9). The ATLANTA JOURNAL calls Coverdell a "narrow choice" over Barr, the DAILY NEWS calls Barr a "worthy candidate" but supports Coverdell as the "best choice" for unseating Sen. Wyche Fowler (D). ATLANTA CONSTITUTION chooses Coverdell because Barr "has not been able to bring himself to support" Roe v. Wade or the Freedom of Choice Act (7/31).

***14 IDAHO: KEMPTHORNE HITS STALLINGS ON WATER RIGHTS**

The 8/9 debate between Boise Mayor Dirk Kempthorne (R) and Rep. Richard Stallings (D-02) "revealed stark differences between the candidates" on issues such as term limits, economic aid to the former Soviet Union and health care reform. "About 20 people" attended the televised debate, the third of 8 scheduled meetings (Threlkeld, IDAHO STATESMAN, 8/10).

WATER RIGHTS: Kempthorne "says his opponent ... is an enemy of water rights" because he supported the '89 NV Wilderness Act, but ex-Sen./Kempthorne campaign chair James McClure (R), who "helped guide" the NV bill to passage as the ranking GOPer on the Energy and Natural Resources cmte, "said that's not quite the case." Kempthorne "appears ready to make a major issue" of the vote. Stallings said he "relied on McClure's reputation as a water-law expert and a defender" of water rights when he decided to support the bill (TIMES-NEWS, 8/6). IDAHO STATESMAN editorial gave Kempthorne the Bad Ad award for "trying to fan fire where there's no smoke" in trying "to paint" Stallings as a water rights enemy. The IDAHO STATESMAN notes "water experts agree" Stallings' and McClure's vote set "no particularly harmful precedent" and Kempthorne "ought to drop this one and move on to issues where there is truly a dime's worth of difference" between the candidates (8/10). TIMES-NEWS editorial states Kempthorne is either "cynically exploiting" ID's "nervousness about water rights" or he's "misinformed" (8/7).

BUDGET: Kempthorne "hammered" Congress "for not doing enough to cut the federal budget deficit" and said the budget "should be frozen and that the money now being used to fund the [S&L bailout] should be used to retire the debt after the final bail-out payment is made." Kempthorne "predicted" the budget could be balanced in 5 years if spending growth were limited to 3% per year. "In response" Stallings "pointed out" Boise spending increased 55% and the mayor's staff tripled since Stallings took office in '86 (Woolsey, IDAHO STATESMAN, 8/7).

***15 NEW YORK: LIBERAL LAW INTERPRETATION URGED FOR ROCKY**

"At stake" in today's state Board of Elections hearing is enviro. atty Larry Rockefeller's (R) petition to force Sen. Alfonse D'Amato (R) into a primary. Although Rockefeller submitted only 774 more signatures than the 10,000 required and D'Amato is challenging more than 6,000 of the signatures, five "good-government groups urged" the elections board to use its discretion to "liberally interpret" the ballot-access law. Rockefeller is also challenging the ballot-access law in Manhattan federal court. A procedural hearing in that case is scheduled for 8/13 (Lombardi, N.Y. DAILY NEWS, 8/11). Presiding over the election board hearing will be Owen Smith, an ex-Nassau Co. official "who served at the same time" D'Amato did. Political insiders say D'Amato and Smith "had never been close and came from two different wings" of the GOP. One GOP official: "Al came from the South Shore working-class Italians and Owen was more like a North Shore elitist." One Rockefeller aide said the ties between D'Amato and Smith "were not a matter of significant issue" because a separate decision from the case over the signatures will override the ruling of Smith and the elections board. Rockefeller spokesperson Carole Florman: "I don't really know enough about him [Smith] to make an assumption that we won't get a fair hearing." Florman on Rockefeller's challenge to the 10,000-signature rule: "I think that ultimately we will be on the

ballot" (Riley, N.Y. NEWSDAY, 8/11). '90 Conservative Line gov. candidate/NYU dean Herb London on D'Amato: "As I travel around this state and talk with many [GOP] leaders, I've been somewhat astonished by how many of them aren't that keen on D'Amato" (N.Y. POST, 8/10).

DA DEMS: AG Bob Abrams's (D) aides "still refuse to say precisely when they'll unleash their imminent media attacks" on front runner ex-Rep. Geraldine Ferraro (D) for the 9/15 primary, "but they are making the central campaign theme known." Abrams "will attack" Ferraro "for being too moderate on key social and political issues" as he expects a "lower-than-usual" turnout of "very, very liberal voters." Abrams strategist Ethan Geto: "We believe that when people find out that Abrams is more liberal ... they will rush away from" Ferraro (Dicker, N.Y. POST, 8/10).

*16. OHIO: GLENN FIVE DOLLARS CLOSER TO RETIRING '84 PRES. DEBT
"Depending on whom you talk to" the contributions to Sen. John Glenn (D) and LG Mike DeWine (R) "represent what's wrong with the two campaigns." DeWine spokesperson Curt Steiner said Glenn is "out of touch with Ohio and depends too much on outsiders" like donor Jackie Kennedy Onassis while Glenn spokesperson Dale Butland said DeWine lives on in-state "fat-cat contributions." Butland: "All I would say ... is that the reason [DeWine] is the leader in in-state contributions is because he's also the leader in fat-cat contributions." Steiner: "The bottom line is that it shows [DeWine] has more support in Ohio." Akron BEACON JOURNAL's Hershey notes Glenn "hasn't rejected money from the people Butland calls fat cats" (8/9). In a companion piece Hershey revisits Glenn's \$3.1M '84 presidential campaign debt for which he "has raised little money this year." FEC reports show Glenn has raised only \$5.25 toward retiring that debt in '92. Univ. of Akron political scientist John Green: "It's a colossal embarrassment." Millionaire Glenn cannot retire the debt with personal funds because the campaign accepted federal matching funds (8/9). Butland, noting the '84 debt is owed to banks, small businesses and individuals who extended cash and credit to Glenn: "Nodoby hates the fact that a lot of little guys have been hurt more than Johnn Glenn doe, and he hates the Catch-22 that keeps him from doing anything about it" (Miller, AP/ Cleveland PLAIN DEALER, 8/11). Toledo BLADE's Torry notes Glenn "will raise far more money this year than in any of his three successful election campaigns" but DeWine "has raised more money" than Glenn's GOP opponents did in '80 and '86 (8/4).

*17 PENNSYLVANIA: CANDIDATES PUT SPIN ON ENDORSEMENTS

Sen. Arlen Specter (R) and women's fundraiser Lynn Yeakel (D) "feverishly announced endorsements from education groups and labor unions, each attempting to top the other" 8/6. Yeakel announced the PA State Education's (PSEA) endorsement noting Specter received its support in '86 and calling it "the second setback in as many days for Specter" because the PA AFL-CIO announced it would not make an endorsement. Specter "countered" Yeakel's PSEA endorsement with one from the American Federation of Teachers and pointed out PSEA actually endorsed him in '80 but endorsed his opponent in '86 (Weisensee, PHILA. DAILY NEWS, 8/7). Specter "had also claimed" the AFL-CIO non-decision as a victory because it usually endorsed Dems. Yeakel also received the endorsement of Council 13 of the AFSCME (Zausner, PHILA. INQUIRER, 8/7). Noting NARAL "hasn't yet decided whether to endorse Specter," Washington-based writer Sally Steenland in an

INQUIRER op-ed: "Given a legislative score card ... Specter has been a friend to women." Which "means a lot to incumbents whose campaign coffers are enriched by groups using the score card as a guide" (8/9). NPR's Sam Zeff on Specter receiving state Sen. Hardy Williams' (D) endorsement: "This represents a major raid on the base of his challenger Lynn Yeakel, who must do well in the black community to win. Some party officials say that if Specter gets 20 to 25% of the black vote Yeakel loses" (8/10).

"REGAINING THE INITIATIVE": "After spending weeks on the defensive, frequently reacting to events," Yeakel "is trying to regain the initiative." The "first step" was taken when new communications director/ex-Rep. Charles Schumer's (D-NY) press secretary Robert McCaron "accused the Specter campaign of improperly using Senate staffers" in a "very real, concerted effort on the part of the Specter campaign to assassinate Lynn Yeakel's character." Complaints from the Yeakel campaign "are not new, but have not previously been made in the tough biting language" McCaron used. McCaron offered a campaign-related fax sent from Specter's DC office as "evidence" that attacks were done at gov't expense. Specter aides "could not explain that incident" but "dismissed McCaron's accusations as either untrue or disingenuous protests." McCaron also alleges a "large portion of the opposition research" is being done in the Senate office (Gorenstein, PHILA. INQUIRER, 8/11).

NPR: NPR's Zeff: "One of Specter's biggest problems in Pennsylvania is the top of the ticket. George Bush continues to slip in the poll so Specter has spent an estimated \$1 million in the past month in radio and TV spots aimed at putting space between him and President Bush. ... This race between Specter and Yeakel is very close and Specter knows if the top of the ticket does poorly his chances of holding on to his job diminish." Zeff on black vote and suburban Republican vote: "This race may be decided on which way that vote breaks in November. [Ex-AG Dick Thornburgh (R)] split this block of crucial votes and Harris Wofford was elected" ("All Thing Considered," 8/10).

*18 WASHINGTON: HILL GETS SMOKED BY OWN TOBACCO ACCUSATIONS

Having "criticized" Rep. Rod Chandler (R-08) for accepting \$14,000 from a tobacco company, King Co. exec. Tim Hill (R) was "embarrassed to learn that one of his campaign contributors works" for Philip Morris Co. Hill says he will return the \$500 he received from Martin Durkan Jr., who is "currently trying to convince" the King Co. Board of Health, of which Hill is a member, "to kill a controversial anti-smoking measure" (Westneat, JOURNAL AMERICAN, 8/8). WA reporters were "tipped" to "an item on Chandler's federal financial disclosure that might suggest a cozy business relationship arising from his role as chairman of the powerful state House Ways and Means Committee. ... the item turned out to be explainable, but the Chandler camp immediately turned their guns" on Hill aide Rollin Fatland. Chandler telephoned Hill to complain, and Hill said Chandler "went ballistic" during the call (Wallace, SEATTLE POST-INTELLIGENCER, 8/8). A JOURNAL AMERICAN editorial on Chandler and Hill: "In reality, neither of these candidates has ever seen a cash donation they didn't like" (8/1).

DEM: State Sen. Patty Murray (D) won the "sole endorsement" of the WA Rainbow Coalition 8/8, "despite the declared candidacy of a longtime Rainbow Coalition member, Mohammed Said," who failed to be certified for the ballot (SEATTLE TIMES, 8/9). But

Rep. Jolene Unsoeld (D-03), "the state's most prominent woman officeholder, has given \$200 and a calculated, limited political blessing to ex-Rep. Don Bonker" (D). While Unsoeld endorsed both candidates, the dual endorsement "is sure to add bite to Bonker's campaign" (Connelly, SEATTLE POST-INTELLIGENCER, 8/7). Primary 9/15.

*19 SPEAKER FOLEY: SHORES UP SUPPORT AMONG DEM MEMBERS

Under header, "Talk of dumping Foley as speaker simmers down," SEATTLE POST-INTELLIGENCER's Hanson reports aides to the Speaker "are voicing optimism that he won't be challenged for re-election as speaker in December." With polls showing Clinton "and a solid majority of of Democratic House candidates faring well, the dump-Foley talk has simmered down." Over the past 8 weeks, "a Foley aide said," the Speaker "has met in small dinners or one-on-one with nearly every Democrat in the House. The aide said Foley is convinced he has the overwhelming support of the House, including solid backing of major committee chairmen" (8/10). Under header, "House speaker on rebound after long year under the gun," USA TODAY's Hasson writes Foley "may be the real comeback kid in this political season. Rep. Sam Gejdenson (D-CT), who is running Foley's campaign for Speaker, said re-election "is nearing a mathematical certainty" (8/11). Under subheader, "Deft Politicking, Absence of Alternative Erase Threat," W. POST's Cooper reports Foley "has restored his standing with most [Dem] members and appears headed for reelection to his leadership post without a serious challenge." Foley "has benefited from the uneven impact of the House Bank ... the absence of a plausible alternative as speaker and the emergence" of Clinton. Some critics still remain -- Rep. John Bryant (D-TX), who called on Foley to step down in the midst of the House Bank affair: "It's a question of whether a person is an instinctive leader, and he is not." Conservative Rep. Charles Stenholm (D-TX), "rumored" as a challenger, said he wouldn't run for speaker, criticizing his colleagues: "They're already pledged, and it's business as usual. It's not comforting" (8/11). Rep. Tim Penny (D-MN): "too many things are still drifting" (USA TODAY, 8/11). ROLL CALL header: "Foley Confident He'll Be Re-Elected Speaker" (8/10 issue).

*20 TODAY'S PRIMARIES/RUNOFFS

CO 03: State Rep. Scott McInnis (R) and LG Mike Callihan (D) are unopposed for nominations in the open seat to replace Rep. Ben Nighthorse Campbell (D) who is running for U.S. Senate. Both candidates have good name recognition in the CD. Observers say the fall race is wide open since the CD has been represented by Dems and GOPers in the recent past.

CO 02: Rep. David Skaggs (D) faces a primary challenge from Univ. of CO student James "Flash" Harrington (D), who has run a "low key, but interesting" campaign. Harrington whitewashed a fence to symbolize what he says is Skaggs "whitewashing of the defense industry" and in the "truest Tom Sawyer tradition, accepted rats on a string and half-eaten apples" from people who wanted to help. In the GOP primary: pastor Brian Day and ex-Clear Creek Co. chair Sharon Klusman are running (Thomas, Longmont TIMES-CALL, 8/9).

GA 02: Although Rep. Charles Hatcher (D-02) has to face an anti-incumbent mood and 819 bounced checks in today's runoff against state Sen. Sanford Bishop (D) in the new majority-black CD, he "may face a more daunting issue ... race." Although Hatcher "insists race is not an issue," Macon NAACP chapter pres. Bill Lightner said, "I don't believe we can afford to have someone elected other than a minority." Hatcher won 40% against five challengers, four of them black, in the 7/21 primary. The

four black candidates won 56%, 22% going to Bishop (AP/ Jacksonville FLORIDA TIMES-UNION, 8/7). VALDOSTA DAILY TIMES endorses Hatcher, citing concern that Bishop "would favor the interests of the district's urban areas over the southern and more rural locales." DAILY NEWS also endorses surgeon Jim Dudley over businessman Thomas McGinley in the GOP runoff (8/9). "Give Hatcher a slight edge because white Southwest Georgia farmers are likely to vote in large numbers" (BILL SHIPP'S GEORGIA, 8/10).

GA 11: ATLANTA CONSTITUTION endorses state Rep. Cynthia McKinney (D) for today's runoff against ex-Waynesboro mayor George DeLoach (D), noting McKinney "would become the first African-American woman to be elected" to the House from GA (8/10). "By many accounts, Ms. McKinney is the candidate to beat in the runoff and in the November general election. But Mr. DeLoach has lived in the area all his life, and one of his black supporters said there is resentment to the newcomer McKinney" (ATLANTA CONSTITUTION/JOURNAL, 8/2). Bill Shipp on McKinney: "Despite their dislike of her, she'll inherit enough votes from state Rep. Michael Thurmond and state Sen. Eugene Walker to win the runoff" (BILL SHIPP'S GEORGIA, 8/10).

NY 23: NYC Mayor David Dinkins (D) yesterday endorsed Nydia Velazquez (D), one of Rep. Stephen Solarz's (D-13) Latino primary challengers for the new majority-Hispanic CD. Velazquez previously headed the Puerto Rican government's NY office. "Velazquez said her poll shows her beating Solarz, a non-Hispanic white, and ... the other six Latino candidates." Solarz has been endorsed by the Queens Dem organization. Ex-Assoc. of Puerto Rican Exec. Directors head Elizabeth Colon (D) and ex-Puerto Rican Legal Defense and Educ. Fund head Ruben Franco are also running (Liff, N.Y. NEWSDAY, 8/11).

will be stressed as the campaign continues (Ludwick, Missoula MISSOULIAN, 8/9). News From the Hill

HOUSE FLOOR: Chinese student bill grants permanent residency.

Chinese citizens who were in the United States at the time of the 1989 Tiananmen Square massacre would be allowed to apply for permanent residency under a bill (S 1216) passed by voice vote by the House yesterday.

In all, the House passed two dozen non-controversial bills yesterday. (*Complete list of bills, p. 17*)

S 1216 would affect about 80,000 Chinese, mostly students, who have been protected from deportation by an executive order issued by President Bush. That order will expire Jan. 1, 1994. The measure would allow the Chinese to apply for residency starting July 1, 1993.

Veterans' Benefits. The House passed, by voice vote, a bill (HR 5008) that would increase the monthly payment to survivors of veterans who died of service-related injuries.

The monthly payment would increase from the current rate of \$636 to \$750. The \$71 monthly payment to dependents would also increase each year, to \$200 in fiscal 1995.

DES Research. Legislation (HR 4178) that would expand federal research into a pregnancy drug later found to cause

cancer passed the House by voice vote.

The drug, DES (diethylstilbestrol), was prescribed to prevent miscarriages from 1938 to 1971.

Under the bill, the National Institutes of Health would establish a research program to diagnose and treat conditions related to the drug.

Transportation Bill. The House also passed, by voice vote, a bill (HR 5753) that would make "technical corrections" in last year's surface transportation authorization act (PL 102-240).

The measure would authorize \$33.3 million for five projects left out of last year's bill.

SENATE FLOOR: GOP prevents vote on \$1 billion SDI cut.

The Senate set aside the \$274.5 billion defense authorization bill (S 3114) yesterday when backers of the Strategic Defense Initiative (SDI) refused to permit a vote on an amendment to cut \$1 billion from the \$4.3 billion that would be authorized for SDI.

The schedule for debate on the SDI amendment and other key amendments — including those dealing with abortion in military hospitals, funding for the B-2 bomber, and support for democracy in Cuba — were the subject of lengthy negotiations yesterday. But, after Senate leaders thought they had an agreement to vote on the SDI amendment this afternoon, Republican Malcolm Wallop of Wyoming objected.

Armed Services Committee Chairman Sam Nunn, D-Ga., warned his colleagues that the delay on the defense bill could seriously threaten chances for action on the measure at all this year.

Majority Leader George J. Mitchell, D-Maine, then brought up a sense-of-the-Senate resolution (S Res 330) urging President Bush to seek a U.N. Security Council endorsement for the use of force

Today

Senate Floor: Senators will continue work on S Res 330, which would urge President Bush to seek United Nations authorization for a multinational use of military force in the former Yugoslavia to assure the flow of humanitarian aid.

The Bush administration yesterday said it endorses "all means necessary" to get food and medical supplies to the victims of the bloody conflict, but that force should not be used to try to open detention camps.

Under an agreement that specifies certain amendments to be offered, the Senate could spend much of the day on the matter.

Other possibilities for floor action include a renewed effort to deal with the defense authorization bill (S 3114) or consideration of a massive tax bill (HR 11).

House Floor: Members will take up the conference agreement on a \$60.5 billion fiscal 1993 spending bill (HR 5487) for federal agriculture and nutrition programs.

The final version includes about \$1.5 billion more than the House-passed bill. The compromise bill would provide \$28.1 billion for the food stamp program, \$1.4 billion more than the House appropriated. The funding level for food stamps would be \$4.7 billion higher than the current level.

The measure also includes \$150 million — double what the House voted to provide — for a program that offers grants to U.S. companies to promote their products overseas.

Airline Competition. A measure (HR 5466) designed to foster competition within the airline industry is also slated for House action.

Sponsors say that American and United airlines, which control two of the nation's four computer reservation systems, steer customers to their airlines.

The measure would prohibit discrimination by any of the computerized reservation systems, which provide flight schedules and rates.

Futures Regulations: House and Senate negotiators are expected to complete work on the first two sections of legislation (HR 707) that would reauthorize the Commodity Futures Trading Commission (CFTC).

Over the past few weeks, conferees have informally agreed on new regulations for dual trading, conflict-of-interest standards, broker and transaction fees, and insider trading prohibitions. The new regulations are designed to help the commission prevent market manipula-

tion like that uncovered in the Chicago futures exchanges in 1989.

Today, members will give final approval to these new rules.

But the House and Senate remain far apart on portions of the bill dealing with regulatory jurisdiction for relatively new financial futures products — dubbed “swaps” or “hybrids” in the industry. A dispute over whether the products should be overseen by the CFTC or the Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC) has stalled reauthorization of the CFTC for years.

Negotiators will address these issues at a later meeting.

WIPP Conference: Conferees will try to reconcile competing versions of a bill (S 1671) that would pave the way for the opening of a billion-dollar nuclear waste dump in New Mexico.

Energy Department officials are eager to open the facility, the Waste Isolation Pilot Plant (WIPP), but they oppose the House bill, saying that it would unnecessarily delay the opening of the project, which would hold low-level nuclear waste from the nation's weapons plants.

The administration favors the Senate bill, which has fewer environmental requirements than the House version of the measure. The Senate bill includes considerably more money for New Mexico.

Before WIPP can open, the facility's site must be transferred from the Interior Department to the Energy Department, which will oversee the project. The Energy Department tried to take control of the site by administrative order last year, but the state of New Mexico blocked the attempt in federal court.

A key sticking point is House bill language that would delay the opening of WIPP until the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) reviews the Energy Department's plans to test the safety of the facility. EPA would also have to issue long-delayed nuclear waste regulations before the project could open under the House bill.

Local Aid: Legislation that would channel \$3 billion to more than 39,000 local municipalities will be marked up by the House Government Operations panel.

The measure (HR 5798) is aimed at providing money for social services and road and bridge maintenance projects that city governments have been forced to cancel because of the lack of funds. The localities themselves would decide how the money was to be spent.

Funds would be allocated through the use of a formula that takes into account factors such as an area's per-capita income and unemployment rate.

An earlier version (HR 5259) that

would have authorized \$5.4 billion was rejected by the panel, 20-20, on June 3. Opponents said the bill would increase the deficit and might not boost the economy as intended.

Committee Chairman John Conyers Jr., D-Mich., is expected to offer an amendment that would require all funding authorized under the bill to be taken from existing programs.

According to a House Republican staffer, the bill will probably have enough support among Democrats to win committee approval.

The bill will first be considered by the Human Resources Subcommittee.

Commerce Markup: Attempting to clear its plate before the August recess, the Senate Commerce Committee will mark up a host of bills, including a bill (S 2642) to reauthorize the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA).

The bill would authorize about \$10.2 billion for the FAA in fiscal 1993, rising to \$11.3 billion in 1995. The measure would also impose more stringent de-icing procedures at the nation's airports and earmarks additional money for noise reduction projects.

The committee will also mark up:

• S 2297, which would reauthorize the Landsat Remote-Sensing Satellite Program. The Landsat satellite collects images of the Earth from space that are used for environmental management and national security purposes.

• S 3150, which would reauthorize the Federal Trade Commission (FTC). The FTC's 1,000 employees oversee the nation's markets and enforce antitrust and consumer protection laws.

Digital Audio Technology: Legislation (HR 3204) that would compensate music performers and publishers for home copying made by using new digital audio technology will be marked up by the House Judiciary Committee.

Digital audio technology allows users to make much higher quality copies of original recordings than can be achieved using other technology. This has raised concerns in the music industry that its widespread use would result in a significant loss of revenue — if many copies were made from one original.

The bill would add a 3 percent royalty fee to the price of blank digital tapes and a 2 percent fee to the price of new digital recording equipment. The royalties would be paid to musicians, recording companies and music publishers to cover financial losses from the copying of original recordings.

In addition, the measure would require manufacturers of digital recording equipment sold in the United States to install an electronic device that would prevent consumers from making more

than one copy of a recording.

The measure is expected to be approved by the committee.

Foreign Entry. The panel will also take up legislation (HR 5555) to speed the processing of foreigners entering the United States.

HR 5555 would require the Immigration and Naturalization Service to establish six pre-inspection stations at foreign airports to process people with U.S. entry visas before they depart.

The bill would also make permanent a pilot program that allows people from selected countries who stay no more than 90 days to enter the United States without a visa.

Manufacturing Technology: The House Science, Space and Technology Committee will attempt to complete action on a manufacturing bill (HR 5231) that has proved exceedingly troublesome for the panel.

The legislation would authorize funding for the National Institute of Standards and Technology for fiscal 1994-97 at an overall funding level of \$1.9 billion. One new program under the bill would coordinate federal efforts to improve the international competitiveness of U.S. businesses by establishing an information network with updates on technology information.

Panel Republicans, led by their ranking member, Robert S. Walker, Pa., stymied earlier efforts to push the bill to the House floor.

Last month when the panel first approved the measure, a quorum was not present. House leaders, fearing that the bill's opponents could raise procedural objections on the House floor, sent the measure back to the Science panel.

There, in two attempts to mark up the bill last week, Republicans laid additional procedural roadblocks. On Wednesday, Walker argued that members had been presented with a different version of the bill with no advance warning. And on Thursday, in response to GOP complaints, the House parliamentarian ruled that an open roll call did not constitute a quorum.

The bill is expected to gain approval today but will not reach the House floor until after the August recess.

D.C. Crime: The House District of Columbia Committee will take up several crime and judicial bills.

Panel members will consider two competing crime measures.

One bill (HR 4096) supported by D.C. Mayor Sharon Pratt Kelly would give the D.C. Corporation Counsel the authority to try juveniles age 14 and up as adults in felony trials. Currently, the D.C. Corporation Counsel does not have the authority to prosecute adult felony cases.

The other crime bill (HR 4396) sponsored by Thomas J. Bliley Jr., R-Va., would leave the authority to prosecute such cases with the U.S. attorney. It would also make a number of changes in the D.C. criminal code and calls for a public referendum on the death penalty for certain offenses. Democratic panel members oppose the Bliley bill.

The panel will also consider a measure (HR 4721) to create a Supreme Court for the District of Columbia.

Gasoline Marketing: A bill to protect independent gasoline retailers from unfair pricing practices by oil refiners will be marked up by the House Energy Committee's Energy and Power Subcommittee.

The bill (HR 2966) would block refiners from engaging in price discrimination, under which refiners charge their affiliated gasoline stations less than they charge independent retailers. Independents claim such pricing practices are an attempt by refiners to drive them out of business.

The bill would also prohibit refiners from imposing caps on the gas prices charged by their independent customers.

The widely backed measure has 136 cosponsors, many from rural areas where independent gas stations thrive.

Radon Standards: Federal efforts to reduce radon in homes, schools and public buildings will come under scrutiny today when the House Energy and Commerce Subcommittee on Health and the Environment marks up legislation (HR 3258) extending federal radon programs.

The Environmental Protection Agency regulates radon testing programs.

The bill aims to ensure that schools and federal buildings are free of the gas and that the public is informed about the dangers of radon and ways to prevent the gas from polluting indoor environments.

In addition to renewing radon programs through 1994, the legislation would require certification of contractors who test for radon and testing of the devices they use, mandate that schools regularly check for radon, extend a grant program that provides funds to state governments to reduce radon in public buildings, and set up a presidential commission to educate the public on the dangers of the gas.

The measure is substantially similar to one passed by the Senate last March. But the House language would not require radon testing in federally owned housing.

Radon is a naturally occurring gas that has been linked to lung cancer. It can seep into buildings and homes through the floor and walls but is detectable through rather simple testing devices. ■

in the civil war in the former Yugoslavia.

At press time, senators were debating the resolution.

IRAQ INQUIRY request by Hill rejected by Attorney General Barr.

Attorney General William P. Barr yesterday rejected a request from House Democrats to name a special counsel to investigate whether the Bush administration broke any laws in its policy toward Iraq before the Persian Gulf War.

In a statement, Barr said that the request "contains no specific information or allegation concerning any person. It also does not specify any conduct that is alleged to constitute a crime." Democrats had been seeking a special investigator under a 1978 independent counsel law that applies to top administration offi-

cials.

House Judiciary Committee Chairman Jack Brooks, D-Texas, called Barr's decision "stonewalling, plain and simple" and said that it raised questions on what the administration was trying to hide.

Brooks and 19 other panel Democrats had made the request for an independent counsel on July 9. Under the 1978 law, Barr had 30 days to report to Congress on whether he had decided to conduct a preliminary inquiry that could have led to the appointment.

Among the allegations Democrats want an independent counsel to investigate is whether the White House sought to delay or influence the Justice Department's criminal investigation of an Atlanta bank that provided hundreds of millions of dollars in U.S.-backed loans to Iraq. Barr said, "We have found those allegations hollow." ■

REPUBLICANS REPUDIATE TAX INCREASE

HOUSTON -- A Republican Party buffeted by low poll ratings began the task of writing its platform Monday by repudiating the 1990 tax increase signed by President Bush and, after a passionate debate, voting to stay on record as firmly opposed to abortion.

By a 17 to 3 vote, a subcommittee adopted an antiabortion platform plank nearly identical to the one four years ago, declaring that "the unborn child has a fundamental right to life which cannot be infringed."

Another subcommittee signaled how much damage Republicans think Bush did himself in breaking his "no new taxes" pledge when it unanimously approved an amendment that declared the 1990 tax increases "a mistake." It blamed them on Democrats in Congress and called for their repeal.

The tax amendment was sponsored by Rep. Weber, who called the tax increase "a bone in the throat of the Republican Party." Weber said it was time to "get this issue behind us."

Anxious to avoid any fights, the Bush campaign gave its blessing to Weber's amendment after Weber conferred with Charles Black. Black rationalized the move by saying that the platform was already committed -- in the long run -- to tax cuts. Weber's amendment, he said, simply moved the 1990 taxes near the top of the list of those that should be cut.

The abortion issue is expected to be debated again on Tuesday, though the result is virtually certain to be the same. However, Black held open the possibility that some way might be found -- perhaps through a resolution by the Republican National Committee -- to emphasize the party's openness to people of a variety of viewpoints.

No To Abortion And Taxes, But Not Without Dissent

HOUSTON -- Republicans called for repeal of a 1990 tax hike signed by President Bush and stood firm Monday against pressure to soften the party stance against abortion as delegates worked on their 1992 platform.

Before buckling down to work on a plank called "Family: The Home of Freedom," one panel distributed an article criticizing Mrs. Clinton, who has written that children should be able to sue their parents in extreme cases where medical treatment or education is at stake. The family section condemns "vocal advocates" who believe "children should be able to sue their parents over decisions about schooling, cosmetic surgery, employment and other family matters... this is the ultimate agenda of contemporary socialism."

Two leaders of the abortion-rights contingent, Mary Dent Crisp and Ann Stone, accused party officials Monday of heavy-handed tactics. "The intimidation is so intense. There is a real sense of fear," Crisp said.

Bush Loyalists Repel Foes Of Abortion-Ban Plank

HOUSTON -- A Republican platform committee dominated by delegates loyal to President Bush Monday repelled attempts to soften party support for a constitutional amendment banning abortion.

"We're going to do everything we can to bring this fight to the convention," said Mary Dent Crisp. But she conceded her forces have no chance of staging a floor fight.

Pro-life delegates used a parliamentary maneuver to head off a pro-choice amendment during Monday's proceedings before the party's Subcommittee on Individual Rights, Good Homes and Safe Streets. The amendment would have given the party's blessing to abortion in instances of rape or incest.

"Are we to just neglect them and put their lives in jeopardy in back alleys?" Delaware delegate Bobbi Breske asked the subcommittee, referring to victims of rape or incest. "Can we not show them compassion and concern?"

Throughout the day, pro-choice Republicans lobbied delegates to allow abortion language that at least acknowledged differences of opinion exist. (Major Garrett, Washington Times, A4)

GOP Drafting Stand For Total Ban On Abortion

HOUSTON -- Republicans began writing a party platform Monday that advocates a constitutional amendment outlawing abortion and embraces a variety of other conservative doctrines, including a repeal of the tax increases President Bush signed two years ago....

Rich Bond kicked off the party's two weeks here Monday morning with a rousing speech about "what a horror show a Clinton presidency might be." He suggested that Rep. Schroeder would become Secretary of Defense, Jerry Brown would be Secretary of the Interior and Mario Cuomo would get the first nomination to the Supreme Court. Schroeder's first recommendation, Bond asserted, would be "to stop referring to naval vessels as 'she.'"

Sen. Gramm accused Bill Clinton of supporting the largest tax and spending increases in the nation's history, steps that Gramm said would drive the country and countless businesses into bankruptcy.

"In a country that comes out for change, is this the change America wants?" Gramm asked. "I think it is not."

**REPUBLICANS PAINT CLINTON
PROGRAM AS ANTI-GROWTH**

In a coordinated effort to shift the terms of the presidential debate, the Republicans opened an assault on the economic program of Bill Clinton, hoping to paint Clinton as an opponent of economic growth whose policies would mean the loss of more than 2 million jobs over four years.

The Republicans said Clinton's claims of deficit reduction, growth and new jobs were "spurious" and that his plan would have a destructive effect on the economy. "We simply believe that this plan doesn't hold water in any facet of the projections," said Clayton Yeutter.

The Republicans have criticized Clinton's economic plan for several weeks. But Monday's orchestrated attack represented a dramatic increase in intensity that reflected GOP anxiety over the large lead Clinton has opened up against Bush in the polls.

The Republicans say Clinton's call for \$150 billion in new taxes on wealthy individuals and corporations represents the largest tax increase in U.S. history. The Clinton camp said that honor belongs to Ronald Reagan for the 1982 tax bill he signed, which they said had a first-year cost of \$220 billion.

Clinton aides said second place goes to Bush for the \$164 billion tax increase that was part of the 1990 budget summit agreement. Clinton advisers also said the governor's tax increases would be offset by \$83 billion in tax cuts.

Clinton Economic Plan Compared To Term Paper

The White House charged Monday that Bill Clinton's economic plan was on the level of a "college term paper" and that if implemented it would cost 2.5 million Americans their jobs.

"I consider it a reasonably good college term paper on the economy," Clayton Yeutter said at a White House news conference. "I don't even believe it constitutes a plan. We look for a job impact of 2.5 million or so job loss rather than net job creation under the Clinton economic plan."

On Capitol Hill an hour later, Republicans on the Joint Economic Committee put out their own report, concluding Clinton's proposal would cost more than 1.8 million jobs the first year and "could easily exceed 3 million" jobs lost over four years. Their figures differed from the Bush-Quayle campaign's because they relied on different economic assumptions.

The biggest killer of jobs, the Republicans said, would be Clinton's plan to charge employers for a new national health care plan, which by itself would cost 712,000 jobs.

"Clinton's campaign slogan should be 'Tired of your job? Vote for Bill Clinton,'" said Rep. Armey.

**TEXAS POLLS GLOOMY
FOR BUSH**

The political news in President Bush's sometime home state is hardly reassuring one week before he goes there to accept his party's nomination: Bill Clinton has jumped to a substantial lead over him in Texas, according to two statewide polls.

The Texas Poll released Monday showed that if the election were held today, Clinton would get 49% of the votes cast and Bush 35%. Six percent of 715 likely voters surveyed said they would vote for neither of the candidates and 10% were undecided.

In a poll published Sunday in the Houston Chronicle, Clinton was favored by 43% of 835 voters questioned, and Bush by 29%. Twenty-four percent said they were undecided, and 4% backed Ross Perot. (Politics, Washington Post, A6)

And like most people here these days, she blames the current bust on "hometown" boy George Bush, who made his first million in Midland.

"We like Bush but we don't like that he didn't help the oil industry," says Heaton. "He could have done something."

"Pat will do nothing to harm the Republican Party," Bay Buchanan, the commentator's sister and campaign manager said Monday. "Pat will tell his delegates Monday night to go with Bush.... Pat will be extremely effective in bringing his 3 million voters home."

On Monday, Buchanan's supporters arrived in Houston and presented their vision of what the Republican Party should stand for. Their vision keeps the GOP's strong anti-abortion language, calls on the U.S. military to stop illegal immigration, does away with laws that require affirmative action, opposes all tax increases, freezes government hiring and spending, calls for term limits for politicians, allows tuition vouchers for private schools, closes down the National Endowment for the Arts, weakens the Endangered Species Act, phases out foreign aid and plays "hardball" in trade negotiations with Japan and other nations.

"He's got a great jump on the competition already," said Republican activist John Buckley. "Apparently, he's not going back to 'Crossfire.' He's just going to run for four years."

Bill Clinton noticed the difference right away. "Well, its not the bus," he said as he prepared to board Amtrak's Metroliner No. 113 in New York's Pennsylvania Station Monday for the trip to Philadelphia.

Speaking to several thousand people gathered in the square in front of Philadelphia's historic Independence Hall, Clinton accused President Bush of evading responsibility for the nation's economic woes and of preaching fear about the Democrats.

"President Bush says that the buck stops somewhere else and you ought to be afraid of my opponents, they might be worse," Clinton told the cheering crowd. "Let's ask the President, before he spends all of the next two weeks jumping on Al Gore and Bill Clinton, where do you stand on your own leadership? What are you going to do for America if you win?"

Speaking to workers at the Textron Lycoming plant in Stratford, Conn., Sen. Gore stressed converting defense manufacturing to civilian production. The plant has lost 700 jobs since January 1991.

But in this tough-sell crowd, some of Gore's best applause lines were met with the sound of two hands clapping -- those of an enthusiastic aide. "I think the majority of the people are pro-Republican here," said Rich Brink, a Textron employee.

Clinton Dismisses Charge He Will Ruin The Economy

PHILADELPHIA -- Bill Clinton told voters Monday at one of America's most cherished historic sites not to believe the Republicans' claims that a Democratic Administration would devastate the economy.

President Bush's re-election campaign in Houston said Clinton's plans for defense cuts, health care, business tax increases, a payroll tax for education for workers and tougher car efficiency standards will cost 2.6 million jobs, with his defense cuts and health plan alone estimated to cost 1.7 million jobs.

But Clinton addressed those criticisms. "The same people that got us into the fix we're in now, all those Republicans that quadrupled the debt over the last 12 years," Clinton said heatedly. "They quadrupled the debt, reduced investment and nearly bankrupted the economy, so they don't like my plan. They want to be with what they've got," Clinton said on "CBS This Morning" Monday.

A woman, noting the reports of extramarital sex that dogged Clinton early this year, asked him to convince her that he would take his presidential oath seriously. "Well, if I haven't convinced you now, I don't know that I can," he said. Clinton, noting that he has kept his marriage intact despite past marital problems, told the woman he doubted either presidential ticket had a perfect marriage.

The question, in many different forms, has dogged Clinton on the campaign trail during various town meetings. The lingering questions seem to reflect doubt among some voters about his character.

Clinton Says GOP Conflict On Economy Promises Higher Deficit

PHILADELPHIA -- Bill Clinton asserted Monday that President Bush had abdicated responsibility for the nation's economic troubles and that conflict between the President and his fellow Republicans promises larger federal budget deficits.

A week before the Republican National Convention convenes in Houston, Clinton is seizing on any signs of weakness in his opposition. Monday's opening was provided by a memorandum sent to the President on Friday by Secretary Kemp and six Republican members of Congress urging Bush to include a call for tax cuts in the party platform.

Clinton said such a move would drive the deficit higher and that voters should force Bush to say where he stood on the proposal. Clinton said such measures would "recreate the Reagan revolution" by eliminating the capital gains tax.

"They want another round of tax cuts for the wealthy," Clinton said. "They want to add \$430 billion more to the deficit" over five years.

**CLINTON CITES GUARD
AS HIS BASIC TRAINING**

Bill Clinton Monday said he was qualified to be commander in chief of the U.S. military because he was in charge of Arkansas' National Guard for 11 years.

"I have had to command the National Guard in some very difficult positions," Clinton said on "CBS This Morning." He cited sending guardsmen in 1986 on a training mission in Honduras.

Clinton received several questions on the two-hour program about his national security qualifications. One questioner asked what "moral authority" Clinton would have as president to send troops into combat since, as a 23-year-old, he argued that the government should not have the power to force its citizens to fight a war they oppose.

"The young men and women who join the service today do so with the full knowledge that they may go into combat or be put in a dangerous position... and they join. We don't have a draft," he said, adding that the Vietnam period was vastly different.

Sen. Gore said that several governors have risen to become president and commander in chief, most recently Ronald Reagan. Torie Clarke seized on the Clinton-Reagan comparison.

"Ronald Reagan had far more experience overall. California has been one of the top 10 economies in the world," she said. "Bill Clinton has next to no experience on the foreign policy front, no military experience, and cannot by any stretch of the imagination equate sending the National Guard to Central America for training exercises, as many governors did, with being commander in chief," she said. **CONNECTICUT, MICHIGAN FOR
CLINTON IN POLL**

Bill Clinton has built leads of 20 percentage points in Connecticut and 17 points in Michigan over President Bush, according to polls released Monday.

The Connecticut survey, taken last week by the Quinnipiac College Polling Institute in Hamden, found 50.9% of those questioned saying they favored Clinton and 30.4% supporting Bush.

Public Sector Consultants of Lansing, Mich., said that its Aug. 1-4 telephone poll of 500 Michigan residents showed 49% of the respondents either definitely for or leaning toward Clinton, compared with 32% for Bush. (Nation, Washington Times, A2)

**CLINTON STEALING BUSH'S
FOREIGN-POLICY THUNDER**

Foreign policy was supposed to be Bill Clinton's weakness, but so far he has conceded not one inch of territory on the issue to President Bush.

The Clinton forces say they are playing on Bush's foreign policy turf because they think he is vulnerable. "Bush is the typewriter repairman in the age of the computer," said Michael Mandlebaum of the Council on Foreign Relations. "His vaunted experience is in the world of the Cold War."

Pointing to Clinton's effort to endorse White House action on Russian aid and Israeli loans, he added: "Every time he tries to make something a bipartisan issue, Bush bites him."

On Yugoslavia, Clinton was able to hold his own because of Bush's natural caution. Once reports surfaced of Serbian concentration camps, Bush was forced to play catch-up.

"It's almost the kind of thing you can't win," said Marshall Goldman of Harvard's Russian Studies Center. "I sympathize with Bush because you don't want another Vietnam." Noting that the President "was more timid on this than he was on Iraq," Goldman said that if Bush had toppled Saddam Hussein, it would have added to his "credibility" in going slow on Yugoslavia.

**LAWYERS AT ABA CONVENTION VOTE TO
TAKE STAND FOR ABORTION RIGHTS**

SAN FRANCISCO -- Lawyers meeting here for the ABA convention voted by a wide margin Monday in favor of taking a stand for abortion rights and rescinding a "neutrality" position adopted two years ago.

The 659-340 vote signaled the will of those attending the convention but is not binding on the ABA's policy-making House of Delegates, which will address the issue next. It angered some members who felt it and other recent actions by association officials have politicized the group and antagonized the Bush Administration.

Meanwhile, the ABA failed to find an agreeable time slot for an appearance by Vice President Quayle, who had asked to address the convention Monday morning. Taken together, the actions "confirm my opinion that unfortunately the ABA has become increasingly politicized and simply an adjunct to the left wing of the Democratic Party," said William Kristol, Quayle's chief of staff.

ABA President Talbot D'Alemberte said such charges are "silly and unfounded." President Bush had been invited to speak, but declined, and other top Administration officials are on the program, D'Alemberte said. He said he didn't want "to quibble with the Vice President's office" over logistics of Quayle's appearance, adding, "We would have liked to hear what the Vice President had to say."

**NUNN WARNS OF
DEFENSE BILL IMPASSE**

Sen. Nunn warned Monday that Congress will not be able to pass a defense authorization bill for next year unless the Senate can break a bitter deadlock over spending for SDI.

If the impasse continues, the Pentagon might have to be put on stopgap funding for the fiscal year starting Oct. 1, without cost savings, military conversion initiatives and other programs that the defense bill proposes for the year, Nunn said.

Nunn told the Senate he could see "no use" continuing work on the \$275 billion defense bill after Republican conservatives led by Sen. Wallop balked at a final vote on proposed funding for the "Star Wars" anti-missile defense system. In a surprise vote Friday night that reversed years of support for SDI, the Senate refused, 49 to 43, to derail a proposal to trim \$1 billion from the Armed Services Committee's SDI allocation of \$4.3 billion.

BUSH AGREES TO SUPPORT ISRAELI LOAN GUARANTEES

KENNEBUNKPORT -- President Bush agreed in principle Monday to support Israel's request for \$10 billion in U.S. loan guarantees, and he and Israeli Prime Minister Yitzhak Rabin instructed aides to work out details in time for a Tuesday announcement, according to U.S. officials.

A senior U.S. official said Bush heard in some detail from Rabin about his plans to curtail settlement activity in occupied territories and was "satisfied" with how Rabin intends to proceed. Bush has now decided he "wants the loan guarantees to go forward," said the senior official.

Administration officials said a number of details remained to be worked out Monday night, including how certain housing units would be defended and what amount would be deducted from the loan guarantees if settlement activity continued.

One U.S. official said the President wants specific understandings on these issues so that any loan guarantee legislation would not have to address each detail and so "misunderstandings" could be avoided.

Bush, Rabin Close To Formal Agreement On Loan Guarantees

KENNEBUNKPORT -- President Bush held an informal seaside summit Monday with Yitzhak Rabin that produced an agreement in principle on a multi-billion-dollar loan-guarantee package.

Bush welcomed Rabin to his Walker's Point vacation home with a conspicuous display of friendship and informality that was in contrast to the proper but reserved treatment he gave Yitzhak Shamir several months ago at the White House.

The U.S. announced Monday that the sixth round of Arab-Israeli negotiations will begin August 24 in Washington.

Some Jewish leaders see Monday's talks between Bush and Rabin as assuring better relations with Israel whoever wins in November. Jason Isaacson of the American Jewish Committee said the important thing about the talks here is "the evident desire on the part of the President to start fresh in the relationship with the new prime minister."

Bush, Rabin Spend Somber Day Together

KENNEBUNKPORT -- President Bush and Yitzhak Rabin were thwarted on land and sea as they searched Monday for symbols to dramatize what the visitor called their "more intimate relationship."

Rabin ducked a tennis match. Fog canceled his ceremonial helicopter arrival. They talked in candlelight because the power failed, and their planned speedboat ride was scrubbed without explanation despite a delightful afternoon.

At one point, Bush and Rabin were together on the oceanfront patio when a sailboat rented by followers of the murdered Meir Kahane cruised toward Walker's Point carrying a sign that said, "Rabin is a traitor." A high Israeli official who was there said Bush rushed into a meeting of aides, waved binoculars and called out: "Everybody out. Look, there's a Kahane protest. I thought this guy was kind of dead."

Officials said that, as expected, Bush agreed in principle that the U.S. will guarantee all or most of an estimated \$10 billion in Israeli loans. But negotiators had so much trouble with loan conditions that officials on both sides decided not to say whether anything was decided until the leaders hold a news conference here Tuesday before flying to Washington.

If the loan agreement is announced Tuesday, as expected, news coverage would appear just as Rabin meets with Bill Clinton.

**BARR REFUSES TO SEEK
SPECIAL COUNSEL ON IRAQ**

Attorney General Barr Monday denied a congressional request for an independent investigation of whether Bush Administration officials broke any laws in trying to contain political embarrassment over its Iraq policies, a decision that Democrats vehemently protested.

In a pointed, 14-page letter, Barr told the House Judiciary Committee that the Justice Department was perfectly capable of determining on its own whether anyone committed a crime in an effort to limit the political fallout from U.S. support of Iraq before it invaded Kuwait. He said the committee's July request that he seek an independent counsel amounted to "no more than an unsupported assertion that some unnamed person may have violated a number of listed statutes."

Rep. Brooks said Barr was "stonewalling, plain and simple" - acting as if Congress had to "present a signed and sealed indictment of criminal wrongdoing for the U.S. prosecutor to simply execute the next day." Rep. Gonzalez said Barr "is misusing his office and damaging the integrity of the Justice Department." Bill Clinton, campaigning in Philadelphia, also expressed disappointment, saying "it appears there is a lot of evidence there... to go on."

Barr said the only questions worthy of criminal investigation are whether Administration officials deliberately altered Commerce Department documents to conceal military sales to Iraq and purposely misled Congress about Iraq policy.

Barr Rejects House Appeal For Special Counsel On Iraq

Attorney General Barr Monday refused a request by a House committee to appoint an independent counsel to look into allegations that Bush Administration officials violated the law in supporting Iraq before the Persian Gulf War.

Saying there was "no basis" for such an investigation, Barr - in surprisingly strong language -- told the House Judiciary Committee, which sought the appointment in a letter last month, that the request was too vague.

Democrats responded by accusing Barr of a political cover-up, saying the attorney general's refusal to appoint an independent counsel would become a campaign issue. Republicans on the House Judiciary Committee charged that the partisan request was an election-year ploy.

Rep. Gekas said Barr had made the "proper decision" in turning the request down, adding that it was aimed at trying to "hurt President Bush during an election year."

"The Justice Department and several congressional committees have already investigated this subject in depth," Gekas said. "An independent counsel investigation will add nothing to any of this except millions of wasted taxpayer dollars."

**U.S. TOLERATED IRAQI
FRONTS, GONZALEZ SAYS**

The U.S. government knew an Iraqi network of front companies was buying equipment for weapons of mass destruction before the Persian Gulf War but "decided to tolerate its activity," Rep. Gonzalez charged Monday.

Gonzalez said Iraqi ownership or control of some companies was detected by U.S. intelligence agencies more than a year before the Treasury Department's Office of Foreign Assets Control moved to halt their U.S. operations. He said his statement was based on CIA reports reviewed by his staff during a year-long investigation.

Treasury Department spokeswoman Claire Buchan responded that "we do regard our Office of Foreign Assets Control as a high priority," and added that the office staff was "beefed up" to investigate Iraqi front companies after the August 1990 invasion of Kuwait. Buchan said the department's work is continuing and more firms will eventually be added to the list of front companies.

**U.N. MEETING ON IRAQI
RIGHTS ABUSES REQUESTED**

KUWAIT CITY -- Aiming to increase pressure on Iraq to fully comply with the U.N. Persian Gulf War cease-fire demands, Britain, France and the U.S. Monday requested an urgent meeting of the U.N. Security Council to discuss Baghdad's continuing repression of its civilian population.

The three council members have asked that the meeting be attended by Max Van der Stoep, the U.N.'s special investigator of human rights abuses in Iraq. Last week, Van der Stoep issued a report on the government's campaign against the Shiite population in the marshes and repeated his earlier call for urgent U.N. action to stop it.

It is not known what specific demands the council might make of Iraq during the upcoming discussion. When asked if a resolution could be expected British Ambassador to the U.N. Sir David Hannay said, "I don't think anybody has prejudged that yet."

**CAMP REVELATIONS SPUR ALLIED
ACTION ON BOSNIAN RELIEF**

U.N. -- The U.S., Britain and France have reached agreement on a U.N. Security Council resolution that would authorize use of military force in Bosnia in the event Serb militia forces oppose international deliveries of humanitarian aid to Sarajevo and other civilian centers in Bosnia.

The resolution, which diplomats here said was deliberately vague in defining the military means to be used, calls on the international community to "take all measures necessary... in coordination with the United Nations" to facilitate the delivery by humanitarian agencies of relief "to Sarajevo and wherever needed in other parts of Bosnia-Herzegovina."

"Basically this gives authorization to the Western European Union and NATO to coordinate procedures and to provide assistance," said a Western diplomat, referring to the two organizations grouping the U.S., Canada and Western Europe. Left unclear was the structure and potential cost of such an ambitious operation and the number of troops that might be needed to enforce it.

In a parallel effort, the U.S., Britain and France agreed on a separate draft resolution that would punish all combatants guilty of war crimes in the Balkan fighting. This document calls upon all nations and humanitarian organizations "to collate substantiated information in their possession... relating to violations of international law, including grave breaches of the Geneva Convention" and to make this information available to the Security Council.

U.S., Europeans Agree On U.N. Use Of Force Resolution For Bosnia

The U.S., Great Britain and France have agreed on a U.N. Security Council resolution authorizing military force to ensure the delivery of humanitarian relief to Bosnia-Herzegovina and calling for inspections of detention centers.

Richard Boucher said Monday that the Administration wants the U.N. Security Council "to move forward rapidly" on a second resolution to form a panel to investigate war crimes in the former Yugoslav republic.

U.S. officials, who declined to specify what military action the resolution will envisage, said that NATO, the Western European Union, the U.N. and individual countries were reviewing viable military options. "We're moving ahead with this resolution and we're doing the planning to see what's the best way to implement it given the current circumstances," a State Department official said.

Boucher cautioned, however, that military action would be the last resort. "The point of the resolution is to say that (humanitarian relief) is very, very important and it has to continue and that we're willing to look at other necessary measures, if that's necessary, to ensure that the deliveries occur," Boucher said. (Sid Balman, UPI)

U.S. Supports Force In Bosnia

The U.S., Britain and France agreed Monday on a sweeping U.N. resolution that authorizes the use of "all means necessary" to provide humanitarian assistance in Bosnia. But it does not authorize the use of force to open detention camps, diplomatic sources said.

Russia has agreed to co-sponsor the resolution, State Department sources said.

Bosnia's U.N. ambassador, Muhamed Sacirbey, welcomed the resolution but complained that it failed to say anything about halting aggression and "ethnic cleansing," AP reported.

But Milan Panic, Yugoslavia's premier, warned "intervention could lead to disaster." Panic, in an interview with AP on his jetliner during a trip to Greece and Albania, said Western intervention "could trigger a full-scale guerrilla war in Bosnia and a second Vietnam in the Balkans."

The issue of prison camps is dealt with in a separate part of the resolution and the threat to use force does not apply to them, State Department officials told AP. Security Council sources told AP that a separate, more detailed resolution dealing with the camps was being drafted. (Martin Sieff, Washington Times, A1)

LIMITS OF U.S. ROLE

As the Bush Administration considers possible military intervention in the Balkan war, it seems determined to minimize the American role, convinced that the conflict represents neither the time nor the place to use military power in a world no longer dominated by the Cold War.

By defining American and Western aims as guaranteeing the delivery of relief aid, the Administration appears to be ruling out the use of American force to quell the fighting in Bosnia and Hercegovina and force the warring parties to negotiate a cease-fire. Officials have remained largely silent on whether outside forces should be used to insure access to Serbian detention camps in Bosnia, taking a cautious stance that is generally echoed by Washington's European allies.

Some critics complain that the Administration and its Western allies have allowed themselves to become paralyzed by the all-or-nothing school of military thinking and the possibility that limited measures may not succeed. Limited military objectives, they say, can be precisely defined. And while such steps might not bring about a quick end to the fighting, they say, it would be better than inaction.

PANEL AWAITS AGENT'S STORY
ON POW SWAP

Bush Administration officials are trying to stop a Secret Service agent from corroborating for a Senate committee a statement by a top Reagan official that Vietnam offered to exchange live U.S. POWs for \$4 billion in 1981.

The agent said Monday he overheard the 1981 meeting described by former National Security Adviser Richard Allen in a June 23 deposition to the Senate Select Committee probing POW/MIA issues.

In a letter to Sen. Kerry, Secretary Brady said allowing the agent to testify about that would have a "lasting effect" on the Secret Service's efforts to "provide necessary and appropriate protection for... our country's leaders." Brady said in his letter to Kerry that he was having Secret Service Director John Magaw prepare a memo detailing specific ways the agent's testimony would hurt the agency. "I urge you to reconsider your action," he wrote.

ABORTION/REPUBLICAN CONVENTION

ABC's Peter Jennings: We're going to begin on this Monday night in Houston, Texas, the site of next week's Republican Convention, where today Republicans were wrangling in the most serious way about what their party's position should be on abortion. In some respects, today's debate -- which was among party activists about the party's platform -- was a foregone conclusion. But it is certainly not a unified Republican Party on this issue.

ABC's Cokie Roberts reports anti-abortion activists and counter-protesters took to the streets of Houston, reflecting the argument raging in the halls outside the drafting sessions of the platform. Activists on each side accused the other of hurting the party's prospects in the fall.

(Phyllis Schlafly, Republicans for Life: "It helps the President to have a strong, principled, pro-life stand in the platform, as we've had in before. And I think what these mischief makers are doing is hurtful.")

But the mischief makers insist they're the ones looking after the best interests of the party. Their attempt to change the platform language failed miserably.

(Rep. Hyde: "Whether we lose or whether we don't, it's the moral high ground, and I'm proud of my party for staying on the moral high ground.")

(Ann Stone, Republicans for Choice: "What they're trying to do is deal with this issue by not dealing with it. They figure if they don't talk about it, it will go away and that's wrong.")

It's clear that the anti-abortion forces have the votes here. What's a lot less clear is whether Republicans on the other side will support the President come November. (ABC-Lead)

ABC's Tim O'Brien reports the general assembly of the American Bar Association spent the day working on a resolution opposing laws that would restrict a woman's right to have an abortion. Some threatened to resign if the ABA supported abortion rights. But the margin was 2-to-1 to oppose all state and federal restrictions on abortion, sending a message to lawmakers at every level. (ABC-2)

CBS's Dan Rather: As for President Bush's position on abortion, there's more evidence today that this could be a sore point at the party's convention and with a lot of voters on election day.

CBS's Bruce Morton reports the pro-choice Republican caravan drew sparse crowds on the road and was outnumbered upon arriving in Houston. In the platform committee hearing rooms, the anti-abortion forces had the votes. Abortion-rights leaders claimed intimidation.

(Mary Dent Crisp, National Republican Coalition for Choice: "The heavy-handedness, the intimidation is so intense. There is [inaudible] from fear.")

Morton continues:

But one abortion rights delegate on the platform committee said she wasn't intimidated. And there was some subcommittee debate.

(Bobbi Breske, subcommittee member: "We want to support an ideal. But the realities of life sometimes are very ugly and we're not addressing it in any way. We're glossing over it.")

(Hyde: "No matter how horrible the circumstances of the pregnancy, human life ought to outweigh those other considerations.")

(Schlaflly: "There is a certain group of pro-abortion, rich Republican women who are pushing this issue. But they just don't have the votes.")

She may be right, though the fight will go to the full platform committee, maybe to the convention floor. The economics subcommittee pulled a surprise, voting to put the party on record in favor of repealing the 1990 tax increase, the one that got so many Republicans mad at President Bush. The White House apparently approved of the move. (CBS-2)

NEGATIVE CAMPAIGNING/CLINTON ECONOMIC PLAN

Rather: On another front, the issue of negative campaigning. President Bush has been forced onto the defensive again during the past 72 hours. When one of his campaign aides was asked about harsh personal criticism of Gov. Clinton, she said she had not apologized for it, and indeed the President had praised her. The President then repeated his support for deputy campaign manager Mary Matalin and said this about her tactics.

(President Bush, Kennebunkport: "For nine months, the other side has been hammering me. We put one toe in the water to fight back and they start yelling, 'Negative campaigning.' We are going to hit them hard legitimately on issue differences and on their record. And that's going to happen. And we've got a very good bulldog doing that in Mary Matalin. She's going to keep doing it. One little error in that -- because of interpretation, where we got across the line that I want to cross, and that is an area that I would term as a sleaze area -- she understands it and that's not going to happen again.")

Sources close to the President tell CBS News that one reason the President is being sensitive, as they put it, about negative campaigning is more practical than anything else. According to these sources, Mr. Bush is worried about reports that the Clinton campaign may begin attacking questionable business deals made by Bush's children, and the President doesn't want to do or be seen doing anything that would encourage such attacks. (CBS-3)

NBC's Tom Brokaw: With just a week now until the Republican Convention, the Bush campaign is trying to sharpen its attack on Bill Clinton's economics.

NBC's Andrea Mitchell reports the White House launched total war on Clinton's economic plan. At the same time, Bush was under fire from his own rear guard. In Philadelphia, Clinton tried to shield himself from the incoming fire.

(Clinton: "They're going to tell you every reason in the wide world you ought to be afraid of Al Gore and Bill Clinton.") And they did. Bush surrogates slammed Clinton's economic proposals on four fronts -- on Capitol Hill, at the White House, at convention headquarters and in the daily fax attack.

Mitchell continues:

Today's fax claimed Clinton's plan would slow down the economy, costing 2.6 million jobs over four years. Republicans in Congress came up with a different number -- 1.8 million jobs supposedly lost in the first year alone. In Houston, Sen. Gramm tried to label Clinton a tax-and-spender.

(Gramm: "In simple terms, it adds up to the largest spending increase in American history, the largest tax increase in American history.")

Democrats at the Capitol brought out their own charts, disputing the Republican figures. They also seized on Bush's latest problem in his own party -- prominent conservatives pushing him to adopt their supply-side agenda. While Bush was in Kennebunkport, Secretary Kemp, Rep. Gingrich, Rep. Weber, Sen. Mack and others leaked a memo telling him that to save his candidacy, he needed to adopt a radical plan of across-the-board tax cuts and possible Social Security cuts.

(TV coverage: President Bush at Kennebunkport restaurant.)

(Mack: "I'm afraid that if there's not something done dramatically with respect to the economy, that it would be very difficult to win in November.")

(Clinton: "You've got a Cabinet secretary and a campaign co-chairman who want to add \$80 billion a year from the deficit or cut Social Security. Where do you stand on it?")

Bush stands embarrassed, because the last thing he needs the week before the Republican Convention is a rebellion in his own party, especially if it includes talk of cutting Social Security.

(NBC-4)

BOSNIA-HERCEGOVINA

Jennings reports the U.S., Britain and France have agreed that they might use military force to guarantee that food and medicine are delivered.

ABC's Walter Rodgers reports Serbs opened a few detention centers to journalists. In Manjaca, the camp commander said the facility met all Geneva Convention requirements. Privately, Serbian officers seemed embarrassed by the conditions. Serbs allowed journalists to interview the camp doctors, but not visit the infirmary. The commander of another camp said earlier pictures of beaten prisoners were made up by British TV reporters. It's hard to tell what happened, because of the 3,000 men once confined at one camp, all but 175 have been transferred or disappeared. At the Omarska camp, the prisoners -- with the guards looking on -- said they were being treated well. But some prisoners who had passed through the camp earlier said it was a death camp. (ABC-5)

Jennings: Late today, Serbian leaders in Bosnia said they will close two of the detention camps this week, including the one in Omarska. Just as it was obliged to do with the Kurdish revolt in Iraq, the Bush Administration is now being forced to deal with the powerful images emerging from Bosnia-Herzegovina.

ABC's Barrie Dunsmore reports that when the Serbs began shelling Sarajevo, the U.S. was adamant about not getting involved militarily.

Dunsmore continues:

(Margaret Tutwiler, State Department: "Where is it written that the United States government -- whether it's this Administration or other Administrations who came before us, who will come after us -- is the military policeman of the world?")

Despite that, the U.S. has been steadily pulled in.

(TV coverage: President Bush meeting with foreign leaders last month.)

(Margaret Thatcher, "This Week With David Brinkley": "We really must not be as faint-hearted as to say, 'What if, what if?' It's a moral case and we must help.")

(Deputy Secretary Eagleburger, "Face The Nation": "If we are not careful about how we deal with it, we will find ourselves enmeshed in what -- I do not apologize to say -- what could become another Lebanon or another Vietnam.")

The Bush Administration's dilemma is that doing something about Bosnia is the popular thing to do. But doing something which would make a real difference, such as committing ground forces, could become very unpopular. (ABC-6)

CBS's David Martin reports on the resolution proposal before the Security Council.

(Sir David Hannay, British ambassador to U.N.: "There is in the resolution on the delivery of humanitarian supplies, there is a provision which would make possible the delivery of medicine and food supplies to all the camps.")

(Richard Boucher, State Department: "The Bosnian Serbs claim they will make it possible for the ICRC to visit Omarska, one of the camps where abuses have been reported.")

The former commander of U.N. peacekeepers met today with Secretary Cheney and Gen. Powell. And NATO began drawing up contingency plans for using military force to deliver relief supplies. One senior U.S. general said the Bush Administration's rush to do something in Yugoslavia is being fueled by the need to keep Clinton from seizing the high ground on this issue. From a military point of view, this general said: I can't give the President high odds we can succeed at any of this. (CBS-4)

Brokaw: One week before he arrives at the Republican National Convention in Houston, President Bush has a crowded foreign policy agenda. Tonight, he announced that the Middle East peace talks will resume in Washington two weeks from today. At the same time, the Administration has worked out a plan with France and Great Britain that would allow force, if necessary, to get relief to Sarajevo.

NBC's John Cochran: At the urging of President Bush, the United Nations is about to get into -- it knows not what. While the President was conferring with Israel's Prime Minister Rabin on the old Arab-Israeli conflict, U.S. diplomats were putting together a U.N. resolution to deal with a newer conflict. The carnage and atrocities in Bosnia.

(TV coverage: President Bush walking with Rabin in Kennebunkport.)

(Boucher: "The resolution would enable the use of force, the use of all necessary means to create the conditions so that humanitarian assistance can be delivered to those who need it.")

Cochran continues:

Then, a shock. The State Department spokesman indicated force could be used to open up detention camps, which Bosnians claim are death camps.

(Boucher: "The resolution that we're working with now deals with a provision of humanitarian assistance into Bosnia, including to places of detention, if that's necessary.")

But after the briefing, the spokesman backtracked, saying the resolution doesn't answer the question of whether force is authorized to open the camps. It's not specifically authorized. It's not authorized because President Bush has had a hard enough time getting allies to approve force to protect relief convoys. Getting approval to open detention camps may be impossible. Former British Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher is one of the few Europeans eager to bomb Serbia into submission. Her successor, John Major, is much more cautious. Listen to him on Saturday.

(Major: "Most of the options are difficult. Some of those options are very difficult indeed.")

Sources tell NBC News it took a call later that day from President Bush to persuade Major that the situation is hopeless without some threat of force. Bush now believes the U.N. Security Council will pass a resolution protecting road convoys taking supplies to Sarajevo and elsewhere. But Bosnians want more than food and medicine. They want the U.N. to stop the killing.

(Muhammed Sacirbey, Bosnian ambassador to U.N.: "Civilian population of Bosnia-Herzegovina, under the present anticipated resolution, is being fattened up before the slaughter.")

And to further complicate the situation, both U.S. and U.N. officials believe that if they order airstrikes to knock out those big Serbian guns above the airport in Sarajevo, then the Serbs will retaliate by going down and massacring those U.N. ground forces already there.

Brokaw: Tonight, the Serbs are announcing they are closing two of their most notorious detention camps. You've got the Middle East peace talks going on and then this situation in Bosnia. Can Jim Baker, as the secretary of state, now move easily to the President's reelection campaign?

Cochran: Not easily, but he can move. The Democrats certainly are poised to accuse Jim Baker of putting George Bush's interests above foreign policy interests. What Baker can do, of course, is simply to say that reelecting George Bush is in the interest of American foreign policy. And I suspect that's what he'll do and I suspect he'll go to the Bush White House, not to the Bush campaign, possibly as chief of staff.

(NBC-Lead)

NBC's Martin Fletcher reports a leader of Bosnia's Serbs warns the U.N. would face disaster if it tried to take on Serbian guerrilla fighters. Another leader warns there are Serbian pilots who would fly suicide missions against nuclear installations in Europe. It sounds fanciful, but the Serbs have a reputation for doing what they say they'll do.

(NBC-2)

IRAQ/INDEPENDENT COUNSEL

Jennings: In Washington from the attorney general today, a decision which is going to be taken as unusually political, as this is an election year. Attorney General Barr has refused to name an independent counsel to investigate charges made by Democrats that the Administration lied to Congress about its policy toward Iraq before the war.

ABC's John Martin reports the Justice Department issued a statement calling the allegations too "vague" to justify a special prosecutor. Rep. Brooks denounced the decision.

(Brooks: "It's stonewalling, plain and simple. And it leaves all of us, as American citizens, with one overriding question: What is the Administration trying to hide in the record of its assistance to Saddam Hussein?")

(Rep. Gonzalez, March 30: "They courted Saddam Hussein with a reckless abandon that ended in war and the death of dozens of our brave soldiers.")

President Bush says no laws were broken.

(President Bush, CBS's "This Morning," July 1: "We did not go to enhance his nuclear, biological or chemical capability.")

The Justice Department says it will continue investigating on its own. But the Democrats say the department has now become part of the coverup.

(ABC-3)

Rather: One week from today, the Republican National Convention opens in Houston. It was supposed to be a celebration for a shoo-in incumbent President. But more obstacles appeared today. The new obstacles range from the President's stand on abortion to taxes, from death camps in Yugoslavia to lingering questions about possible secret help given to Saddam before the war with Iraq.

CBS's Rita Braver reports on the Justice Department's decision. Republicans claim Democrats are on a witch hunt.

(Rep. Michel: "I've heard some rather free charges being leveled out there without substantiation. And I think that in a political year, people are going to accuse any number of people for doing any number of things.")

Democrats say it's the Justice Department that's playing politics.

(Rep. Schumer: "When the attorney general is appointed by the President and the President's political life is hanging by a hair, how can anyone be expected to make an impartial decision?")

Congress will continue its own investigation and Democrats say they'll take their case to the American people, trying to show that actions by the Bush Administration made life tougher for American troops in Desert Storm.

(NBC-5, CBS-Lead)

RABIN VISIT

Jennings: President Bush met with Israel's new prime minister, Yitzhak Rabin, up in Kennebunkport today. Tomorrow, they're expected to announce the U.S. will after all guarantee \$10 billion in loans to Israel in exchange for curtailing Jewish settlements in the occupied West Bank and on the Gaza Strip.

(TV coverage: President Bush walking with Rabin in Kennebunkport.)

(CBS-7, ABC-7)

CBS's Jesse Schulman reports some Israelis continued to settle in the occupied territories today. The settlers say Rabin's plans will bring a Palestinian state into being and put Israel in mortal danger. But Rabin is calculating that U.S. support is essential and the dream of making the occupied territories Jewish forever is not. (CBS-8)

L.A. POLICE/FEDERAL INDICTMENTS

Rather reports the four police officers involved in Rodney King's beating pleaded not guilty today to federal charges. (NBC-9, CBS-5)

NAVY/SEXUAL HARASSMENT

CBS's Jim Stewart reports the headlines make it appear the Navy's hormones are out of control. Lt. Cmdr. Roberta Spillane, second in command of the USS Sylvania, sees the problem as confined to a handful of men.

(Spillane: "Aviators, divers, SEALs -- those types of communities that, as they say, are living on the edge of death all the time. It's almost a frenzy, that image they have to uphold.")

Officially, the Navy portrays it as a problem of a few. But evidence is strong that something is rotten within the institution.

(Capt. Edward Simmons, USS Sylvania: "The conduct that I have to say I've been in myself was not the best -- a lot of two-fisted drinking and staying up late and raising hell. It was how you were brought up in that whole environment and you get the picture it's OK and it's not OK.")

Military analyst Carolyn Becraft, a former naval officer, puts the blame squarely on the service's leadership.

(Becraft: "It is their responsibility. They set the tone. And by not acting swiftly, they send mixed signals. The signal they send is, 'Well, it's OK.' It's not OK.")

Attendance at sexual-awareness courses is mandatory. But the message seems numbingly bureaucratic -- to the point where no one seems to care very much. (CBS-11)

INSLAW CASE

Jennings reports the House Judiciary Committee is about to ask for a special prosecutor in the Inslaw case involving the Justice Department. (ABC-4)

MCDONNELL DOUGLAS

Jennings reports McDonnell Douglas, the nation's leading defense contractor, said today it will consolidate its six government aerospace businesses into two and take other steps to make the company more competitive. (NBC-7, ABC-12)

SMALL BUSINESSES

NBC's Mike Jensen reports that in the last 10 years, the nation's Fortune 500 companies eliminated 4 million jobs. But small companies with fewer than 500 employees created 13 million jobs. The small companies are often the first to spot a hot, new trend and to do something about it. (NBC-8)

AFGHANISTAN

Rather reports Muslim fundamentalist rebels in Afghanistan have gone on a new offensive, bombarding Kabul with hundreds of rockets. Reports today said at least 1,000 people were killed or wounded. (NBC-13, CBS-6)

VIETNAM/U.S. EMBARGO

NBC's Brad Willis reports Vietnam has thrown its doors open to capitalism. But the U.S. has stuck to its embargo, preventing Vietnam from achieving total economic freedom. It's a policy many U.S. businessmen say also hurts them. (Warren Williams, U.S. Chamber of Commerce: "The United States is the only country in the world -- the only developed country in the world -- that is not already there doing business, trading with and investing in Vietnam.") America already lost a war in Vietnam. Now, it stands to lose again there, on the new battlefield of global economics. (NBC-12)

POLICE/RADAR GUNS

ABC's Bettina Gregory reports several policemen testified to congress today that radar guns used to detect speeding motorists expose them to radiation and eventually cancer. The Fraternal Order of Police says police departments are ignoring complaints. Makers of radar guns say there is no evidence they cause cancer. But everyone agrees a federal study is needed to find out if radar guns do cause cancer. (NBC-3, ABC-10)

PUBLIC HOUSING

CBS's Scott Pelley reports the Desire housing development in New Orleans is part of what is being called a national disgrace. Across America, public housing is in ruins, even though millions in federal housing money is just sitting in Washington, unspent. The blame lies with local housing authorities that the feds believe are too inept to spend the money wisely. Today in Washington, the National Commission on Severely Distressed Housing recommended professional help for local authorities who can't seem to get the money to the poor. (CBS-10)

COLOMBIA/ESCOBAR

ABC's Mark Potter reports that the prison from which Pablo Escobar escaped was comfortable. Escobar and fellow traffickers had access to a large gameroom, a modern gym, a soccer field and several cabanas overlooking Medellin. But it is the living quarters that have caused the most outrage from the Colombian public and press. Each drug trafficker had several rooms with state-of-the-art electronics and expensive furnishings. (NBC-14, ABC-8)

William Hybl [HIB-el], President of the U.S. Olympic Committee. Fellow athletes and Americans. Welcome to the White House. It's an honor to have the U.S. Olympic team here, though I almost didn't recognize you without Bob Costas as a voiceover.

I want to welcome you to the White House, and to extend this message: Whether you won a gold, silver, bronze, or simply gave your best, you're all winners in the eyes of each American. /

Over the last couple of weeks America was completely caught up in the Olympic spirit. For instance, the other night Barbara asked me to help her re-arrange a couple of chairs. I said, "What's the degree of difficulty?" //

For sixteen days / over hundreds of hours / you showed how competition lifts the human spirit -- and how that spirit lifts the American character. / When I was a boy I read a quote about "the game [being] well worth the candle burned long into the night." / Now, I'm told your nights in Barcelona were long. / But I'm betting that your candle will last still longer. //

Each Olympics is one for the record books. This Olympics was one for the history books. / Our world has been remade since Seoul -- and we Americans helped remake it. In 1989, a wall crumbled in Berlin. This summer, more barriers tumbled in

Barcelona. / This was an Olympics without boycotts / without terrorism / without politics -- and that's as it should be. /

East and West Germany / black and white South Africans / North and South Koreans: One by one, the old divisions gave way. The world watched as countries that didn't even exist at the last Olympics took their place on the field -- and the medals stand.

Think of that. You know what it means to make America a winner. Think what it must mean to be the first athlete to bring a medal home to Latvia or Croatia. / They -- like you -- made this an Olympics truly worthy of its name. /

Today we honor the fastest and strongest of America's athletes. Here's what I like even more: You're among its most inspirational. / Beside me is Shannon Miller -- who overcame a bone chip in her elbow. We recall, too, Gail Devers overcoming her Graves Disease -- or Charles Barkley overcoming his shyness. / That brings me to Oscar De La Hoya. He not only brought home the gold -- he brought honor to his mother's memory. / Each of them competed / competed to win / for the family called America.

Ask diver Mark Lenzi what it takes to get the Gold. He'll tell you about dad's carpools or mom's care packages -- his favorite brownies, her special lasagna. / Talk to Summer Sanders, one of swimming's "New Kids on the Block." She'll say that "success comes down to the support of people around you." / ((Let me add, I'm especially amazed by the synchronized swimmers. Maybe it's because I live in a city where it's tough to get any two people to agree on anything.)) //

Family? Look at the Oden sisters -- Kim and Elaina -- volleyball's "Sisters of Smash." / Then, there's the men's bronze medalist volleyball team. We've had a lot of athletes proudly represent the symbol of the bald eagle -- but they're the first to look like one. / From Trent Damias and Chris Campbell to Janet Evans and Carl Lewis. From Gigi and Mary Jo Fernandez to the woman -- Leora "Sam" Jones -- representing those who won not only medals but also our hearts. The list of heroes goes on -- but I'll stop there. Suffice it to say that in Barcelona this Nation became your family -- and why not? Sports aren't abstract -- they're flesh and blood. Americans see you -- and they relate. //

Wrestler Bruce Baumgartner shows what I'm talking about. / ((Watching him on TV, he's even stronger than I thought he was. Bruce, any time you feel your heavy weightlifting equipment isn't enough of a challenge, you're welcome to drop by and bench-press the Federal budget.)) //

Eighteen days ago, Bruce called his two-year son, Bryan, in western Pennsylvania. The day was doubly special. It was the Opening Day of the Olympics. It was Bryan's birthday, too. Bryan doesn't know what a gold medal is yet, but his mother coached him to say, "Bring home the gold medal." / Last Thursday, Bruce did. //

Bruce had a lot of company -- for instance, the Dream Team which sent basketball soaring to new heights. / My good friend, Arnold Schwarzenegger, who led our delegation to Barcelona, once

starred in a movie where he uttered the famous words: "Hasta la vista, baby." / In Barcelona that's what all of you said to opponents -- and to couch potatoes. / You inspired the mom who plays softball with her boys / the dad shooting hoops with his kids / the family who knows that sports are ageless. ((Take Pablo Morales, the swimmer who missed out in '84, didn't make the team in '88, then came back this year to earn a gold medal -- the ripe old age of 27. Let that be a lesson: Youth and inexperience are no match for maturity and determination.))

This summer the entire world was barely a match for you. / In Barcelona you KO'd the opposition: 108 medals -- the most ever since 1904 in a non-boycotted Olympics. / You paved the way toward an American knockout punch in Atlanta: Like you, I can't wait till 1996. / A proverb says, "On the day of victory no one is tired." Today we celebrate Olympians who -- like America -- are victorious, refreshed, and free. //

Now, let's have a picture -- then I want to meet each of you. After that, it's off to a barbecue for your Olympic-sized appetites. Thanks for coming to the White House -- and God bless the land you've made so proud -- the United States of America.

PURPOSE: To seek his support for the Lieberman-Kasten amendment to the tax bill on Enterprize Zones and to urge all Senate Republicans to support it.

BACKGROUND: The Senate will begin consideration of H.R. 11, the tax bill today. Senators Joe Lieberman (D-CT) and Bob Kasten (R-WI) will offer an amendment this afternoon on Enterprize Zones. Senator Lloyd Bentsen's (D-TX) Enterprize Zones provision is unacceptable--it has only 25 zones, and no capital gains proposal.

The Lieberman-Kasten amendment would allow up to 150 zones, with a sliding capital gains proposal that would zero out any tax on gains if held for 10 years. It is fully supported by the Administration and most Republicans. We are working hard to get Democratic support and are making good progress.

As a result, Senator Bentsen is increasing pressure on Democrats and on Finance Committee Republicans. Some worry that support for the Lieberman-Kasten proposal may endanger the bill.

KEY POINTS:

-- Bob, I am calling to urge you, and for you to urge Senate Republicans, to support the Kasten-Lieberman Enterprize Zone proposal.

-- There are a lot of reasons that the Kasten-Lieberman approach is superior to Lloyd Bentsen's, but I won't bore you with the details.

Dear Mr. President:

Excellent press conference today. Had the executive council of the President's Export Council in my office at the time -- all agreed you'd done well. Great speeches this week, too -- thought you appearance with that business group that Bob put together was very effective.

Have been in Raleigh, N. Car. ~~and~~ and Miami and Traverse City, Michigan in recent days.

Raleigh & that area are booming -- unemployment 4% -- and businesspeople seem more optimistic than some other areas... found miami upbeat, too (despite Dade County unemployment rate of 10+ %.) I. Background

The National Advisory Council on the Public Service was authorized by P.L. 101-363 on August 14, 1990. The purpose of the Council is to regularly assess the state of the federal work force and seek to attract individuals of the highest caliber to careers involving national public service. The Council also promotes better public understanding of the role of federal employees.

II. Term

Members serve for the life of the commission.

III. Membership

The Council consists of fifteen members as follows:

Ten individuals appointed by the President,

Four of whom shall be chosen from among officers serving in the executive branch,

One of whom shall be chosen from among career employees in the civil service,

One of whom shall be a federal employee who is a member of a labor organization (as defined by 5 U.S.C. 7103(a)(4)); and

Four of whom shall be chosen from among members of the public.

Two Members of the Senate, one of whom shall be appointed by the Majority Leader and the other of whom shall be appointed by the Minority Leader,

Two Members of the House of Representatives, one of whom shall be appointed by the Speaker of the House and the other whom shall be appointed by the Minority Leader of the House, and

The Director of the Administrative Office of the United States Courts (or his delegate).

OPENING REMARKS FOR ROUNDTABLE MEETING
WITH REPRESENTATIVES FROM THE JEWISH MEDIA

- o Welcome to the White House. I am glad to have this opportunity to meet with you all today. I wanted to get this group together for a couple of reasons.
- o First, as I'm sure you all know, I've been meeting up at Kennebunkport with my old friend Yitzhak Rabin. We have had a successful meeting, and I want to tell you all about it.

- o But before I do, I want to set the record straight on one very important point -- I want to clear up any misinterpretations concerning my comments last September 12. My references to lobbyists were never meant to be pejorative. I have great respect for citizen advocacy. That's what strengthens our country. It gives America vitality. It's part of why America great.
- o All citizens have the right to advocate their positions, and politically organized groups and individuals are a legitimate and valued part of the decision making process in a democracy.

- o Anything to the contrary that someone may have misinterpreted from the press conference last year is just plain wrong. Nevertheless, sincerely, I apologize if anyone was hurt by something that was misinterpreted. Know where I stand on this issue --- check the record --- this has consistently been my position.
- o And now, let me tell you about my meeting with Prime Minister Rabin.

Meeting with Jewish Media: Remarks

- Welcome to the White House. I am glad that you were all able to come in at such short notice.
- Let me begin with Kennebunkport. As I expect you have heard, we had an extraordinarily fruitful two days. Prime Minister Rabin and I discussed a broad range of issues, from the peace process to proliferation, from Yugoslavia to loan guarantees. I hope you will read my departure statement, for I think it captures both the substance and the mood of what took place.
- On loan guarantees, let me just reiterate what I have said publicly, namely, how delighted I am that we were able to reach agreement. I feel that I have now been able to see through what I began: helping bring Jewish people from Ethiopia and the former Soviet Union to Israel where they can live a productive life.
- I think this agreement is indicative of what we and Israel have been able to do working together. Despite some disagreements, it is important not to overlook all that we accomplished over the past few years:
 - ...repeal of Zionism as Racism .
 - ...the influx of Jews
 - ...the peace process
 - ...strategic cooperation against Iraq
 - ...improved treatment for Syria's Jewish community
 - ...ending much of Israel's diplomatic isolation

- Obviously, there is more to be done, to improve Israel's security and to promote peace, but the record is a good one, about which I feel proud. Also, I am confident that we will have a good relationship with the new government, which has made clear its intent to reorder Israel's priorities.
- Here at home, I am pleased with our record against anti-semitism, against hate crimes. Again, I think we are making some progress in combatting one of the true ills of society.
- That's really all I wanted to say at the outset. Over to you.

4:00 p.m.

Meeting With Congressional Leadership

- Thank you all for coming in this afternoon, as usual at short notice. I very much wanted to have this opportunity to talk given all that is going on and your scheduled departures.
- I would like to focus on the Middle East and my talks up at Kennebunkport with Prime Minister Rabin, but I also will take advantage of the occasion to say a few things about the situation regarding what was Yugoslavia and the latest regarding Iraq.
- My time with Prime Minister Rabin was just what I hoped it would be. We had the opportunity to talk at length about all aspects of the bilateral relationship. Here I would simply say it is in very good shape after some difficult moments over the past few years. More important, I am confident that the difficult times will be a thing of the past and that we will be able to forge a close partnership with the new government, one based on reciprocal respect and trust.
- In my view the new government really represents something different. Rabin wants to reorder Israel's priorities, away from settlements, toward Israel itself. He is motivated by security, not ideology.

- As you all have heard, we were able to reach understandings that will allow us to move forward on loan guarantees. We will be getting a legislative package up to you right away.
- Prime Minister Rabin asked me to avoid going into detail in my descriptions of what we settled. I do want to share the basics with you but I hope that it will stay within this room. I want to respect the Prime Minister's needs and not betray his trust.
- The bottom line is that we will offer Israel up to \$10 billion in guarantees over 5 years. We expect them to build no new settlements for the duration of the negotiations on interim self-government. They intend to cancel contracts for thousands of units not yet begun. They intend to complete construction on units under way and to reserve the right to permit some building--what they call thickening--in selected areas. The costs of all such activity would be deducted from the level of loan guarantees extended. Israel will phase out most of the incentives and subsidies that attract people to live in the territories. This last principle is key and a real sign of their seriousness. We will submit to you a figure for scoring that is as low as possible; the Israelis will absorb the cost of the first 3.5% of the scoring.

- The result is that we will see a major reduction in settlement activity, allowing us to go forward with the guarantees without undermining the historic opportunity for peace now in hand.

- The peace process resumes here in less than two weeks, and I am confident Israel will be forthcoming, especially with the Palestinians. I think the real issue may prove to be whether the Palestinians are up to the challenge and ready to negotiate in earnest.

- Otherwise, Rabin and I talked of regional questions, especially Iran and Iraq, both of which raise real proliferation concerns for Israel. And we discussed such global issues as Yugoslavia, where the Israelis are understandably sensitive to what is going on, although I would point out that Rabin went to great lengths to underscore that he at least saw what was taking place, while terrible, as something quite less than genocide.

- On Yugoslavia, I wish I could say I have a solution, but this is one of those truly difficult and possibly intractable conflicts.

- You are familiar with our approach: we are trying to penalize Serbia with sanctions, improve sanctions enforcement by placing monitors on the ground, and place observers in the region to help prevent any spread of the violence. We are actively working with the British and French to secure Security Council passage of a resolution that would authorize use of all necessary means, including force, to ensure that humanitarian aid reaches the Bosnians.

- What I am trying to do here is motivate others to work with us to help stop the killing, stem the spread of violence and create a basis for a peaceful resolution of the conflict. I also want to alleviate the humanitarian suffering. I want to accomplish all of this, but without making us a protagonist in an open-ended civil war. Here I'd only say that it is not as simple as some would have it.

- On Iraq, we remain determined to see Saddam comply fully with all Security Council resolutions. UN inspectors now in Iraq have yet to meet resistance; Americans are going everywhere. It is up to the UN to decide what is inspected. We will not tolerate any Iraqi delay or resistance if it materializes.

- We are also increasingly concerned by reports of what Saddam is doing to his own people in violation of UNSC res. 688.

- That's about all I wanted to say in the way of introduction. As usual, I look forward to your views. And I do look forward to prompt passage of what we send you on loan guarantees.

Re: Productivity and Costs

Productivity--output per hour--grew at a 2.3 percent pace in the second quarter for the entire nonfarm business economy; and a strong 4.7 percent for the manufacturing sector. Productivity was revised upward for the first quarter. Labor costs grew at a modest 2.7 percent pace in the second quarter; 3.3 percent in manufacturing.

We will receive a lot of data for July this week--retail sales, industrial production, and consumer and producer prices. They generally should paint the same picture of the economy: growing, but slowly, with inflation under control.

I attended a dinner in New York Sunday night with Prime Minister Rabin, and had an opportunity to chat with him briefly. He is an impressive man, and seem quite aware of the need for economic reforms in Israel.

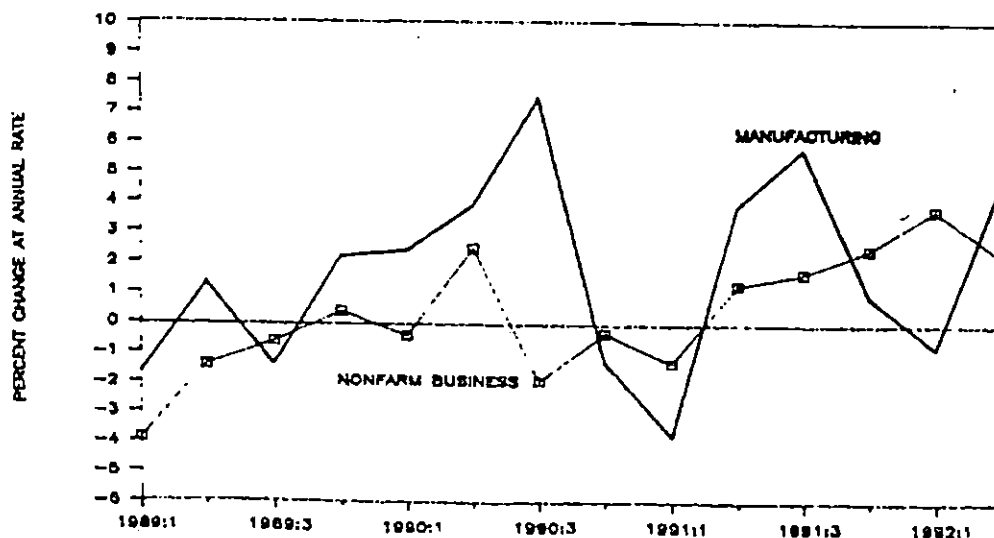
SUBJECT: Productivity and Costs, Second Quarter 1992, Labor Department Release, Tomorrow Morning, 10:00 a.m.

Productivity in the nonfarm business sector rose 2.3 percent at an annual rate in the second quarter of 1992, following a revised 3.8 percent increase in the first quarter. It is the fifth consecutive quarterly increase and is attributable to a 2.0 percent increase in output and a 0.3 percent reduction in hours worked. Manufacturing productivity increased 4.7 percent at an annual rate in the second quarter, following a revised 0.8 percent decline in the first quarter. The increase was almost entirely due to increased output.

Hourly compensation in the nonfarm business sector rose at an annual rate of 2.7 percent in the second quarter following a revised 3.9 percent increase in the first quarter (up from 2.2 percent). Manufacturing hourly compensation rose 3.3 percent in the second quarter up from a revised 2.1 percent decline in the first quarter.

For the first two quarters of 1992, unit labor costs in nonfarm business rose at annual rates of 0.1 and 0.3 percent, respectively. They actually declined 1.3 percent in each of the first two quarters in the manufacturing sector. This may signal even lower inflation in the second half of 1992.

On the sleaze issue:

Marlin Fitzwater said the New York Post story did not come up in his pre-briefing with Bush before the news conference.

Fitzwater was very tight-lipped on this issue. Asked by the pool whether Bush was familiar with the Post report, the press secretary said, "I have nothing for you."

When a reporter suggested to Fitzwater that the question had to be asked and that the matter should not be held against the CNN reporter who posed it, Fitzwater showed no animation. His lips didn't move. His eyes didn't twinkle. Nothing.

Fitzwater was asked if he cared to amplify on his own non-response. "No," he replied.

Throughout the news conference, including during the Mary Tillotson question, Mrs. Bush stood on the sidelines with Mrs. Rabin to her right, granddaughter Noelle (sp?) to her left and granddaughter Ellie LeBlond standing in front of her.

During the question by Tillotson, Mrs. Bush at first looked slightly puzzled and her eyes squinted in a querulous way. Her lips were slightly pursed in a questioning way, as if to indicate intense listening to the query. Then, her demeanor turned slightly incredulous and seemed to show some distaste and a little disgust. These expressions were subtle, not exaggerated and my characterization here is subjective.

After Bush answered the question _ you heard the response _ Mrs. Bush's made a brief remark. She continued to look at the president as she spoke but I presume that whatever she said was intended for Mrs. Rabin. I could not hear what she said. .

Also in the lineup was Bush daughter Doro. I could not see her because TV cameras were in the way.

After the news conference, pool spotted Bush's mother, Dorothy, sitting in a chair on porch of her cottage where she was attended by a nurse. Tacked up on the wall of the shingled cottage .is an (old?) campaign poster of Bush on which someone has handwritten, "Maine loves George and Barbara."

Fashion: Bush in grey pinstripe suit, blue shirt, maroon rep stripe tie, brown wingtips with Corfam soles; Mrs. Bush in salmon cotton suit with jeweled buttons; Baker in navy blazer, charcoal pants, blue shirt, red tie and cowboy boots.

About 20 men (and one woman, Ruth Yaron) comprised the U.S. and Israeli staff that stood to the left of Bush and Rabin. These included Scowcroft, Haass, Djerejian, Ross.

TO ESTABLISH CIVIL LIABILITY SANITY IN THE UNITED STATES
PUNITIVE DAMAGE REFORM

I. BACKGROUND

The civil liability explosion in this country of the last 25 years is simply "out of control" and is badly eroding American competitiveness. The August 1991 report of the President's Council on Competitiveness "Agenda for Civil Justice Reform in America" defines the problems and offers numerous helpful reforms. Texaco supports this initiative. Indeed, Texaco is prepared, and we believe numerous other major corporations are prepared, to lend support in numerous ways to bring about meaningful reform.

Keep in mind this is a many layered problem: run-a-way juries; punitive damages; contingent fees and award-of-attorneys fees; class actions; excessive discovery; a trend toward strict liability and criminalization of many forms of non-intentional conduct. Overall reform is badly needed. However, too broad a focus will result in no change. Thus, we suggest special emphasis on a narrower focus, namely, reform of punitive damages.

II. PUNITIVE DAMAGE REFORM

Punitive damages are a significant drag on the competitiveness of American business. Twenty years ago, punitive damages were rare. But, since the early 1970's, punitive damages have grown more than 100 times.¹ In the same 20 years, the U.S. economy less than doubled.

¹This figure is the result of a study Texaco conducted early in 1992 concerning final punitive damage judgments in four large states: California, Texas, Illinois and New York. The study found that, correcting for inflation, the total dollar amount of such judgments increased by 117 times. The study compared final judgments in these four large states in the years 1968 to 1971, with final judgments in the same states in the years 1988 to 1991.

4 P.M. NEWS UPDATE

PALESTINIANS/ISRAELI LOANS (Jerusalem/AP) -- Palestinian leaders said that as long as Jewish settlement building in Israel's occupied territories is stopped, they won't oppose U.S. plans to give Israel \$10 billion in loan guarantees. Israeli financial leaders praised President Bush's announcement on the guarantees as a vote of confidence in Israel's economy. In a statement issued in Tunisia, the PLO did not denounce Bush's decision but urged Congress to go slow in considering the guarantees.

GOP PLATFORM (Houston/AP) -- The Bush re-election campaign had a change of heart on a new platform plank that denounced as a mistake the 1990 tax increase signed by the President. The provision, which also calls for repeal of those taxes, was designed to repair the damage caused by Bush's broken no-new-taxes pledge from the 1988 campaign. "Republicans believe that the taxes contained in the 1990 budget agreement were a mistake.... We believe these tax increases should be repealed," said the amendment.

(Houston/Reuter) -- Under pressure from President Bush's reelection campaign, Republican platform writers said they had agreed to drop from the platform a reference to Bush's acceptance of a 1990 tax increase as "a mistake." Reps. Weber and Walker said Republicans drafting the platform had agreed to the change after talking to Charles Black. "We've been talking to Charlie Black," Weber told reporters. "Where he's been getting his ultimate orders, I'm not quite sure."

(Houston/Reuter) -- Republican platform writers weighed adoption of party policies accusing some of the nation's largest corporations and banks of undermining key American cultural values. A draft platform undergoing final review by the party's platform committee denounces an unnamed corporation it accuses of advocating violence against the police. And it accuses unspecified companies of undermining "family values" by cutting off grants to the Boy Scouts of America.

N.Y. POST STORY/MATALIN (New York/Reuter) -- Bush campaign manager Mary Matalin called allegations that President Bush had an affair with a former aide "trash," and accused the Democrats of conducting a "negative, trashy, sleazy campaign." In an interview with "CBS This Morning," Matalin said a front-page story in the New York Post was a fabrication. "It is beyond a flat-out lie. It is total trash," Matalin declared.

CLINTON/HEALTH CARE (Miami/AP) -- Bill Clinton defended his health care plan against Republican attacks, saying that without it the nation already was moving toward universal coverage and higher taxes by forcing states to take over. "Let's quit backing into this and face it up front and do something about it," Clinton told the Southern Legislative Conference. He spoke shortly after Secretary Sullivan offered the group a version of the Bush Administration's attack against Clinton's plan.

BALKANS (Sarajevo/AP) -- Serb forces said they would allow women and children under 18 to leave besieged Sarajevo. In a separate disclosure, the U.N. said Serb forces were carrying out one of the war's biggest "ethnic cleansings," driving some 28,000 Muslims from their homes in northwest Bosnia. In Sarajevo, new fighting left 18 dead and 172 wounded, the Bosnian government said.

(AP) -- The Bush Administration says it is not contemplating use of force to gain entry to camps in Bosnia where Serb forces reportedly have detained thousands of Muslims and Croats. Richard Boucher said, "We're doing everything within our power to get ICRC access, international neutral access, into all places of detention."

ECONOMY (AP) -- American labor costs, held back by the weak economy, have risen in 1992 at the slowest pace in 17 years, while productivity posted a healthy gain in the spring, the Labor Department said. The department said that unit labor costs for non-farm businesses inched up at an annual rate of just 0.3 percent in the April-June quarter, following a barely perceptible 0.1 percent rate of advance from January through March. Meanwhile, productivity posted a third consecutive healthy gain of 2.3 percent at an annual rate in the spring.

MIA/PEROT (AP) -- Ross Perot told Senate investigators he believes American prisoners were left behind after the Vietnam War and accused some government officials of covering up their existence. But during 2 1/2 hours of testimony before a lunch break, Perot provided little new evidence to substantiate his claims. Meanwhile, Sen. Smith said investigators had learned the Vietnamese government, despite publicly saying there were no American POWs left, may have offered to make a deal with the Reagan Administration in January 1981 to trade some POWs for \$4 billion in reconstruction aid.

FAMILY LEAVE (AP) -- The Senate approved a bill requiring unpaid leave for many workers in family emergencies, setting the stage for a campaign-season veto battle and a challenge to President Bush's claim to be the defender of family values. The House is expected to follow the Senate and send the bill to Bush after Labor Day. The bill is similar to the one Bush vetoed in 1990.

IRAN-CONTRA/GATES (Reuter) -- CIA Director Gates is demanding that a judge throw out a subpoena that would require him to testify about the Iran-Contra affair at the criminal trial of his onetime colleague, former spymaster Clair George. Justice Department attorneys, representing Gates, said the testimony was sought of his "entire knowledge of events relating to the Iran-Contra affair," even though it was unrelated to the charges and might duplicate other testimony.
