I. PURPOSE/BACKGROUND

Your interview with Bob Hardy of KMOX Radio in St. Louis, Missouri will provide a forum for you to discuss your campaign themes to the Missouri and Illinois media markets.

Questions for the interview will focus on the economy, specifically your plans to bolster confidence among local workers whose jobs are threatened by Defense Department cut backs. In addition, you will be asked if you plan to announce an agreement to sell F-15 fighter planes to Saudi Arabia while you are in St. Louis; why Missouri is a key state in your bid for a second term; and your views on Ethanol and Methanol as alternative fuels.

You were interviewed by Bob Hardy during the 1988 campaign. Bob Hardy has interviewed Bill Clinton and Al Gore, and claims to be a personal friend of your brother Bucky.

POSSIBLE Q&A FOR THE INTERVIEW

IRAQ

Question: What is the latest on the Iraq situation and where do things stand with the coalition forces?

Answer:

To address the brutal repression of the government of the men, women and children of Iraq, I announced yesterday that:

- o the United States and its coalition partners will begin flying surveillance missions in southern Iraq - the area where a majority of the recent violations of resolution 688 have taken place.
- o the coalition has informed Iraq that we will establish a "no-fly-zone" for all Iraqi fixed and rotary-wing aircraft.
- o the United States continues to support Iraq territorial unity, bears no ill will towards its people, and takes these actions to help save innocent lives.

ECONOMY/ST. LOUIS

Question: What are you going to do to help the economy nationally and in particular in the state of Missouri, which relies heavily on the defense industry?

Answer:

- o In Houston last week, I announced a number of proposals to help reduce the deficit, get control over government spending, and stimulate the economy. My proposals include:
 - an across-the-board tax cut so people can keep more of what they make;
 - a veto of any spending bill that exceeds my budget requests;
 - a cap on non-social security entitlement spending;
 - a check-off so taxpayers can deduct 10 percent of their payments to reduction on the national debt;
 - a line-item veto and balanced budget amendment.
- o And for Missouri, which I know relies heavily on the defense industry, as President:
 - I have an obligation to carry out the proper levels of defense spending. We've reduced the amount we spend on defense, and it's hurt some people, including some right here in Missouri.
 - We have to help defense firms and workers to adjust to defense down sizing, and we're doing just that by eliminating the recoupment fee and creating new programs to help retain defense workers. We will do everything possible to ease the defense build-down adjustment.
 - What we will not do is what my opponent is calling for: slash defense by \$60 billion. That might be appealing rhetoric, but it would endanger the safety and security of all Americans and it would throw many, many Americans out of work.

Not expected, but if asked about ethanol:

QUESTION: Mr. President, the Corn Growers and the ethanol industry have asked you to grant a one pound waiver under the Clean Air Act so that this renewable energy source will be used. Will you grant the waiver?

ANSWER: First, let me repeat what I believe -- that ethanol is a great American success story. It is the single largest industrial use of corn, and ethanol consumption has risen from a fledgling industry ten years ago to 800 million gallons last year, and to 900 million gallons this year. I am confident that ethanol use will increase significantly more in years ahead as a result of the Clean Air Act. I want to also remind everyone that it was my Administration's idea to use ethanol to improve air quality -- and that is why the Clean Air Act that I fought for does provide new opportunities for ethanol. Let me say it in plain English: I support ethanol. And I believe it must and will become a major player in the fuels market.

Under the Clean Air Act, ethanol will get a boost from the oxygenated fuels program that will be up and running this fall, and I believe it will also be an important player in the reformulated gasoline program. The latter program is complicated and we have not fully concluded our scientific review in this area -- but let me assure everyone here today, I want to make sure that ethanol is competitive in the reformulated gasoline program.

I am committed to resolving this matter. Clayton Yeutter has worked very hard on this problem but given his impending move over to my campaign, I have asked Bob Zoellick, my new deputy chief of staff, to carry on his effort and bring this matter to closure.

Missouri exported a total of \$1.6 billion of goods to Canada in 1990.

Annual savings to the US taxpayer as a result of the closing will be \$12.9 million. Base closures and realignments nationwide will save US taxpayers \$2.3 billion, 1992-1997.

I. Recent Correspondence

Governor John Ashcroft has requested a welfare reform waiver which is currently under consideration at the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (see below). Governor Ashcroft also thanks you for your support in making the Federal welfare waiver process easier and quicker for states.

II. Discussion

A. Unemployment Figures

B. Exports/NAFTA

Missouri exports to Canada and Mexico, the state's two largest trading partners, totaled approximately \$2 billion and supported an estimated 78,000 jobs in 1991. State sales to Mexico and Canada accounted for 52 percent of Missouri's total exports.

Missouri's leading exports are agricultural crops, food products, transportation equipment, chemicals, computers and industrial machinery, electric and electronic equipment, and fabricated metal products.

C. Surface Transportation Funding

As of August 14, \$291 million of the FY 1992 funding had been obligated by the state.

Please note that Missouri also received an extra \$2.4 million in obligation authority on August 3rd as part of the FHWA's annual August redistribution.

Under last year's Intermodal Surface Transportation Efficiency Act (ISTEA), Missouri will receive over \$2.42 billion from FY 1992 to FY 1997.

D. Welfare Reform Waiver Request

The state has requested a waiver which would enable Missouri to mandate school attendance by AFDC (Aid to Families with Dependent Children) children and teen parents from the time they reach seventh grade until they graduate from high school or obtain their GED. Regular school attendance would be an eligibility factor in determining the amount of the AFDC grant. The intended result is that AFDC recipients will be better able to become self sufficient with a high school education.

The waiver is in the final stages of negotiations between the Department of Health and Human Services and the state. Approval is expected any day, perhaps even today.

E. Creve Coeur Lake Memorial Park

The Federal Highway Administration released a draft Environmental Impact Statement indicating that the

preferred route of a 10-lane, 21-mile expansion of Page Avenue would cut through Creve Coeur Lake, a large, natural, inland lake near St. Louis. The proposed highway extension, called the "red route," would cut across the marshy wetlands at the southern tip of the lake. There is strong citizen and environmentalist opposition to the red route, conflicting with strong state and congressional political support. Proponents of the red route say alternatives would be expensive and would force too many people to move.

F. Base Closing

The Pentagon has slated the Richards Gebaur Air Force Base near Kansas City for closure within the next five years. The base is a reserve facility housing a squadron of A-10 Tank Killer aircraft and a fighter wing. There will be a loss of approximately 500 civilian jobs. The squadrons will be relocated to Whiteman Air Base in Knob Noster, Missouri.

The U.S. Department of Labor's Veterans' Employment and Training Service (VETS) is actively involved in providing transitional job services at military installations in Missouri to individuals being separated from the Armed Forces.

G. Defense Conversion

A representative for Governor Ashcroft testified at a hearing in St. Louis on August 20th of the Defense Conversion Commission (DCC), a federal panel charged with producing a report by December 31, 1992 on the impact of reduced defense spending on the U.S. economy. The Commission's charter calls for a review of plans for assisting military and civilian personnel leaving the Defense Department, as well as the ability of defense contractors to cope with the consequences of reduced spending.

Members of the DCC toured St. Louis companies and spoke to workers, executives, and local government officials to learn first hand of the impact of downsizing the defense budget.

McDonnell Douglas Corporation plans to lay off about 10% of their 600 managers, in addition to a reduction of 220 of 2,200 managers last week at the McDonnell Aircraft division.

H. America 2000

MISSOURI 2000 was launched statewide in October of 1991 and the steering committee is chaired by Sanford McDonnell, former President and CEO of McDonnell/Douglas.

1992 POLITICAL UPDATE

The Republican and Democratic Presidential Caucuses in Missouri were held on March 10, 1992. The President faced no opposition in the Missouri Caucuses, easily carrying each of the forty-seven Missouri delegates to the Republican National Convention.

Arkansas Governor Bill Clinton prevailed in the Democratic Caucuses, defeating Paul Tsongas 60% to 7%, with 29% remaining uncommitted.

Texas billionaire H. Ross Perot did not qualify for the general election ballot in Missouri before leaving the Presidential race. His organization in the state suffered from a fall-out when two of the individuals leading his petition drive in Missouri were removed by the Perot campaign for selling Perot regalia on the side for a profit.

The most recent statewide poll was conducted by KMOX Radio and the St. Louis Post Dispatch during the week of June 13-17, and showed Ross Perot leading with 29%, followed by the President with 23%. Governor Clinton trailed with 20%. The margin of error for the poll was +/-4%. New polls are currently being conducted.

Governor John Ashcroft will serve as General Chairman of the Missouri Bush-Quayle '92 campaign. Senator John Danforth and Senator Christopher Bond both serve as the Bush-Quayle '92 Co-Chairmen in Missouri. Congressmen Tom Coleman, Bill Emerson, and Mel Hancock serve as Missouri's Bush-Quayle '92 Vice-Chairman. William "Bucky" Bush is the Missouri Bush-Quayle Finance Chairman. Ann Wagner is the Executive Director of the Bush-Quayle '92 campaign in the state.

The Bush-Quayle ticket carried Missouri's eleven electoral votes in 1988 by a 52% to 48% margin.

Missouri will be a major political battleground in 1992, as it was in 1988. Incumbent Republican Governor John Ashcroft is constitutionally barred from a third term. The Republican primary was hotly contested and at times divisive. The primary was held August 4, 1992.

Republican candidate and State Attorney General, William L. (Bill) Webster won the GOP gubernatorial primary in a close race with Roy D. Blunt the Missouri Secretary of State. He will face Democratic challenger Mel Carnahan in November.

Controversy entered into the Republican primary in late 1991 when a newspaper story reported that Webster was the target of a grand jury investigation for improper financial dealings. Webster accused Blunt of leaking the story; Blunt denied the charge. More allegations against Webster of alleged impropriety have surfaced since April 1992. Webster was charged with having favored lawyers who contributed to his previous campaigns when he allocated workers compensation cases to private attorneys. These continuing charges may serve to undermine Webster's credibility in the state, but did not stop him from winning the GOP Primary.

In the Lt Governor's race, GOP candidate Margaret Kelly won with 71% of the vote. She will face Democrat Roger Wilson in the Fall.

Senator Kit Bond easily won the GOP Senatorial primary and will face Geri Rothman-Serot in what is predicted to be a hot November contest. Serot is the ex-wife of former Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the State Assembly, Ken Rothman.

In CD 1, Arthur Montgomery is the Republican nominee, and he will challenge Democrat William (Bill) Clay who is attempting to win his 13th race for Congress.

In CD 2, House Minority leader James Talent will face Democratic incumbent Kelly Horn this Fall.

In CD 3, Mack Holekamp was the winner and will face incumbent Democrat Dick Gephardt in November.

In CD 4, John Carley was the winner. He will face Democrat incumbent Ike Skelton.

In CD 5, Edward "Gomer" Moody won the Republican honors and will take on incumbent Democrat Alan Wheat who is vying for his 6th term.

In CD 6, incumbent Republican Tom Coleman will take on State Democratic Senator Pat Danner.

In CD 9, Republican candidate Richard Hardy will try to unseat 8th term Democrat Harold L. Volkmer.

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STATE GOP UPDATE

The major challenge facing the Missouri Republican Party is fundraising for the upcoming election cycle. The Party will be expected to support the Presidential, Gubernatorial, Congressional and U.S. Senate races -- a formidable task. The Party hosted successful fundraising events with Mrs. Quayle and Governor Sununu earlier this year. William H. T. Bush serves as Finance Chairman for the Missouri Republican Party, the Party Chairman is Tom Fowler, National Committeeman is Hillard Selk, and the National Committeewoman is Bobbie Capps Moore.

Victory '92 has a goal of \$1,000,000 and has raised approximately 30%.

Missouri held its Republican State Convention on June 27 and 28, 1992. 47 Republican delegates, all loyal Bush-Quayle supporters, were chosen to attend the Republican National Convention in August. Governor Ashcroft was elected Chairman of the delegation. The Missouri delegates to the Republican Platform Committee were Governor Ashcroft and Jan Cunningham. Vernon

Missouri will not gain or lose any Congressional districts as a result of reapportionment.

STATE LEGISLATURE

The current partisan balance in the Missouri State Senate is 22D to 11R with 1 Senate seat vacant. The balance in the State House is to 99D to 64R. All 163 State House seats are up for election in 1992, as are one-half of the seats in the State Senate. State GOP Officials are hopeful the Republicans can gain 10 seats in the house and 2 in the Senate.

FAMILY VALUES

Question: Family values has been a dominant theme in this campaign, but often its definition has been somewhat vague. Could you elaborate?

Answer:

- o The family is the single most important institution in American society. The strength of our nation is based upon the strength of its families.
- o Family values include respect for the family, faith in God, and knowing right from wrong. Imagine the America we could create if all parents taught their children the importance of honesty, hard work, responsibility, and respect for others. We would have less violence, less illegal drug use, and fewer teen pregnancies. Instead, we would have families, friends, and communities that care about each other.

MEDIA

Question: What is your feeling about the media coverage of this campaign? Do you feel there is a bias in their reporting?

Answer:

- o I'll leave it to others to judge the media, but I often feel that there is good news out there and it isn't covered by the national media

DEFICIT

Question: Mr. President, I would like to hear your proposals for cutting the budget deficit. Down in Houston you outlined some of these, but could you be more specific?

Answer:

- o What's important is the fundamental difference between my approach and Governor Clinton's: I want to cut taxes and to reduce federal spending. Clinton has promised to raise taxes and raise spending.
- o What my proposals do include:
 - an across-the-board tax cut so people can keep more of what they make;
 - a veto of any spending bill that exceeds my budget requests;
 - a cap on non-social security entitlement spending;
 - a check-off so taxpayers can dedicate 10 percent of their payments to reduction of the national debt;
 - a line-item veto and balanced budget amendment.

DEFENSE

Question: What can you say about the defense build-down and its effect on jobs? In general, people are in favor of reducing defense spending, but when it comes to their own backyard, it's a different story. What would you say to them?

Answer:

- o As President, I have an obligation to carry out the proper levels of defense spending. We've reduced the amount we spend on defense and it's hurt some people, including some right here in Ohio.
- o We have to help defense firms and workers adjust to defense down-sizing, and we're doing just that by eliminating the recoupment fee and creating new programs to help retrain defense workers. We will do everything possible to ease the defense build-down adjustment.
- o What we will not do is what my opponent is calling for: slash defense by \$60 billion. That might be appealing rhetoric, but it would endanger the safety and security of all Americans and it would throw many, many Americans out of work.

NOTE: The General Electric plant in Evandale is one of the largest employers in Ohio, with a workforce of approximately 14,500. It is also the largest exporter in Ohio. They have laid off workers recently and more lay-offs may follow.

Automotive Industry

- o Additional shifts on GM and Chrysler assembly lines have been hired. Car and truck sales are up, and Ohio car makers look to increased sales in 1992-93.
- o GM is facing three potential strikes, including one in Lordstown, Ohio, that could delay the production of the 1993 Saturn. The UAW has served five-day letters, official warnings of a strike, as required in the GM-UAW master contract. The dispute at Lordstown involves unresolved health and safety issues at Local 1714. A strike could begin on Thursday, August 27.

Trade

- o President Bush and Ohio recognize that exports are the engine of economic growth. Since President Bush took office, US exports have surged, accounting for 70 percent of US economic growth and generating an estimated 1.8 million new jobs in export-related industries.
- o Ohio's exports increased 58% between 1987 and 1990 to a total of \$16 billion.

- o The Office of the US Trade Representative estimates that in 1991, about 424,400 workers in Ohio owed their jobs to exports of manufactured goods, an increase of 112,700 over 1987.
- o Ohio's key export markets are Canada, France, Japan, the UK, Germany and Mexico.

NAFTA

- o Indicative of the importance President Bush's negotiation of a successful North American Free Trade Agreement holds for Ohio, the state's largest export market is Canada, which in 1991 bought \$7 billion of the state's merchandise exports. Ohio's exports to Canada grew almost 75 percent from 1987 to 1991.
- o Ohio's exports to Mexico, the state's sixth largest export market, increased almost 140 percent from 1987 to 1991. Ohio's merchandise exports to Mexico totalled \$582 million in 1991.

Competitiveness

- o Ohio has demonstrated a willingness to remain competitive through education and facilities such as the Thomas Edison Program and the Ohio Aerospace Institute, which coordinate the efforts of public and private sectors.

Transportation

- o Ohio will receive \$4.17 billion as a result of President Bush's \$151-billion six-year Intermodal Surface Transportation Efficiency Act of 1991.

Defense

- o The 1991 Defense Base Closure and Realignment Commission has recommended the closure of Rickenbacker Air Guard Base. Part of its resources would be transferred to Wright - Patterson Air Force Base, also in Ohio.
- o Rickenbacker's shutdown will save US taxpayers \$22.7 million annually. Base Closures and realignments nationwide will save US taxpayers \$2.3 billion, 1992-1997.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY cont.

- o As of September 30, 1990, the Department of Defense employed 46,310 personnel in Ohio.
- o 122 DoD personnel stationed in Ohio participated in Operations Desert Shield/Desert Storm, and 9,576 Reservists and Guardsmen were called to duty during the conflict.

Education

- o President Bush has set the nation on a new course to reinvent American education. The President's reforms are based on:
 - instilling accountability;
 - promoting parental choice; and
 - encouraging results-oriented thinking.
- o At an Education Summit held in Columbus on February 19, 1992, Governor Voinovich (R) discussed his Gap Analysis, a state plan to identify what Ohio is doing right and what it needs to do if Ohio is to achieve the six National Education Goals.  - Contain health care costs through malpractice reform and limits on excessive state-mandated benefits.
- o Governor Voinovich (R) has signed legislation providing over \$400 million for the care of the indigent.

Right to Life

- o Governor Voinovich (R) has stated that he would sign a bill passed by the General Assembly, permitting abortion in cases of rape, incest, or to save the mother's life. On August 29, 1991, the Governor signed into law a restriction requiring a 24-hour delay, to allow for discussion with a doctor and provision of state-mandated material depicting fetal development.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY cont.**Welfare Reform**

- o The President's welfare reform measures will add accountability to welfare and will reduce dependency. These reforms include:
 - Requirements that welfare recipients enroll in workfare or some form of job training in exchange for receiving benefits;
 - Incentives that encourage families to stay together, and penalties that discourage additional out-of-wedlock births;
 - Incentives to reward work instead of dependency; and
 - Measuring the success of welfare programs not by how many people move onto the welfare rolls, but by how many move onto the job rolls.
- o Ohio has established programs including Learning, Earning And Parenting (LEAP), and Governor Voinovich (R) has expressed his desire to use block grants to control welfare spending. Implementation of LEAP required HHS waivers.

Environment

- o Issues include increased restrictions on coal-fired power plants, Great Lakes cleanup, and the Waste Technologies Industries incinerator.

Government Reform

- o Governor Voinovich (R) is one of 43 governors who have the line-item veto.

Other

- o Lbrain, the boyhood home of Terry Anderson -- who was held longer than any other Western hostage in Lebanon -- held a huge parade in honor of the 44-year old journalist, June 22.

I. Recent Correspondence

State Representative Paul Jones (D) wrote requesting information regarding federal funding for a proposed jetport in his district.

County Executive Tim Davis, Summit County, wrote requesting that you declare Summit County a Federal Disaster Area due to recent severe storms.

II. Discussion

A. Unemployment Rates

Cincinnati's diverse economy has helped it weather recent economic downturns; no single company employs more than 3 percent of the workforce.

B. Exports/NAFTA

Manufactured exports accounted for 94 percent of Ohio's \$7.6 billion in exports to Canada and Mexico in 1991, and supported an estimated 185,000 jobs.

An estimated 61,300 new jobs have been created by growth in Ohio's manufactured exports to our North American trade partners since 1987.

C. Waste Technologies Industries (WTI) Incinerator

This large hazardous waste incinerator in East Liverpool, Ohio (where Ohio, Pennsylvania, and West Virginia meet) was issued a permit by EPA in 1983, and is nearly constructed. In February 1992, EPA approved a permit modification, which allows WTI to add a spray dryer to its air pollution control equipment at the incinerator. During the modification process, opponents from the three states sought to reopen the entire permit in order to block the facility (a position neither EPA nor Ohio supports). EPA's approval of the spray dryer modification has been appealed by the Sierra Club. Six others also filed appeals for various reasons.

On July 24, EPA's Appeals Board denied six of the seven appeals before it and remanded to EPA the remaining appeal.

The WTI incinerator is the most controversial environmental issue in Ohio, attracting national attention from the anti-incineration movement. Governor Voinovich supports the operation of the incinerator, though he maintains the original siting of

the facility was by a previous state administration (Governor Celeste) and he supports an Ohio legislative initiative to adopt an incinerator moratorium.

Local opponents recently held a "sit-in" at EPA's Washington office to demonstrate against the issuance of a test-burn permit. EPA refused to reverse its decision and the demonstrators had to be forcibly removed, with some being arrested.

D. Waste Importation

Waste importation is one of the major environmental concerns in Ohio and is an issue of particular interest to Governor Voinovich. Ohio is both a chief generator and major importer of garbage and hazardous waste. In 1990, the State imported 12 percent of its total solid waste landfill disposal.

E. Summer Youth Employment and Training Program

On June 19, 1992, Secretary Martin announced that an additional \$500 million will be distributed nationally for the 1992 Summer Youth Employment and Training Program.

Of that amount, Ohio will receive a total of \$20,268,301. The following cities will receive a portion of that allotment:

F. Mound Nuclear Weapons Facility

The Mound Nuclear Weapons Facility, located in Miamisburg, Ohio, is being considered for consolidation by the Department of Energy (DOE). Under DOE planned consolidation of nonnuclear facilities associated with the nuclear weapons complex, the preferred option is to move production work from Mound to other DOE sites in Kansas City in order to reduce overhead costs. At present, no decision has been made on this option. The DOE decision, expected later this year, will take into account public comments and findings from an environmental assessment.

If a decision is made to terminate production, DOE hopes to minimize effects on personnel by transferring them to other programs or by early retirement. DOE will also conduct environmental restoration of the site in consultation with state and local officials.

G. Surface Transportation Funding

Through August 17, Ohio has obligated \$368 (58 percent) of its available Federal-aid highway funds. This is much lower than the national obligated funds average of 80 percent.

Ohio received almost \$5.2 million in extra obligation authority on August 3, 1992, so it can use that much more on highway construction projects this fiscal year. This amount was part of the August redistribution in which FHWA redistributes obligation authority from states that do not expect to be able to use it this fiscal year to states that can.

1992 POLITICAL UPDATE - PRESIDENTIAL

The President's most recent trip to Ohio was on Friday, July 24, 1992 when he visited Brookville, Ohio to attend the Brookville Picnic. More than 10,000 people were estimated to be in attendance. Previously, the President traveled to Cleveland on May 21 to attend a Bush-Quayle fundraiser raising in excess of \$300,000.

The Clinton-Gore campaign has taken yet another bus tour through Ohio. Originating in Cleveland on Friday, August 21, the Democratic ticket visited Youngstown and Erie on the way to Pennsylvania. Pat Buchanan was dispatched to the Buckeye State to counter the Democratic charges.

1992 POLITICAL OUTLOOK

As it was in 1988, Ohio will be a key political battleground in 1992. Ohio has supported Republican Presidential candidates in the past three elections (1980 - 1988), but the Democrats have indicated that they will work hard to break that tradition in 1992. Arkansas Governor Bill Clinton has made a number of campaign trips to Ohio, including stops in Utica, Columbus, and Wilmington on his bus tour with Senator Gore during the week immediately after the Democratic National Convention.

Governor Voinovich serves as General Chairman of the Ohio BUSH-QUAYLE campaign effort, with W.R. "Tim" Timken serving as Finance Chairman.



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The BUSH-QUAYLE Ohio Steering Committee is composed of the following individuals: Keith McNamara, Paul Mifsud, Tally Krumm, Bob Bennett, Martha Moore, Mike Colley, Alex Arshinkoff, Tom Van Meter, Jim Tilling, Bruce Johnson, Joe Deters, Jim Brennan, Senator Grace Drake, and Melanie Mitchell. The BUSH-QUAYLE campaign headquarters opened on Monday, April 20, 1992, in Columbus. Doug Preisse serves as Executive Director.

The Ohio Presidential primary was conducted on June 2, 1992. The President easily defeated Pat Buchanan, garnering 83% of the primary vote as opposed to Buchanan's 17%. The President won the support of all 83 Ohio delegates to the Republican National Convention.

In the Democratic Presidential Primary, Bill Clinton received 61% of the popular vote, defeating Jerry Brown with 19%, and Paul Tsongas with 11%. Clinton thus garnered 113 delegates to the Democratic National Convention, as opposed to 34 delegates for Brown, and 1 for Tsongas.

Ross Perot had developed an extensive campaign organization in Ohio and qualified for the general election ballot in the Buckeye State before withdrawing from the Presidential race. He has indicated an interest in remaining on the November ballot in Ohio.

Ohio GOP State Chairman Bob Bennett and other Republican leaders have been actively courting Perot supporters. A data base of 14,000 Perot supporters was provided to the GOP by Dee Zuber, author of the Perot magazine, America Speaks. A letter was sent from Governor Voinovich to all these supporters urging their support for the President. Of the three supposed leaders of the Ohio Perot effort, two have indicated their support for the Bush/Quayle ticket.

The most recent state-wide poll in Ohio was conducted (August 9-12) by the Cleveland Plain Dealer showing Clinton leading the President by a 44% to 33% margin with 15% undecided. When asked if Perot were a candidate, Clinton received 35%, the President received 30% and Perot received 19%.

The Cleveland Plain Dealer poll also revealed some interesting sentiment among the voters relating to the abortion issue. In a survey of 1,010 registered voters, 26% indicated a preference for a candidate who is anti-abortion while 37% said they preferred a President who favors abortion rights. 32% said a President's position on the issue was not important.

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Among Republicans who said they favor abortion rights, 55% said they will support the President while 39% indicated they will support Clinton. Among Democrats who said they were anti-abortion, 79% said they will continue to support the Clinton-Gore ticket.

Ohio will have 21 electoral votes in the 1992 Presidential contest. The BUSH-QUAYLE ticket carried Ohio in the 1988 election with a 55% to 44% margin.

1992 POLITICAL OUTLOOK - U.S. SENATE

On Monday, February 3, 1992, Lieutenant Governor Mike DeWine announced his candidacy for the United States Senate -- challenging Democratic incumbent Senator John Glenn. DeWine is a popular Ohio figure and expects an uphill battle, but he is considered an aggressive campaigner. His strategy will be to portray Glenn as out of touch with mainstream Ohio, and ineffective as a legislator. DeWine hopes to tap into the current anti-incumbent mood, and suggests that Ohio needs a new face in Washington. DeWine is 49 years old, Glenn is 70. DeWine is a conservative, Glenn a liberal. DeWine endorses term limitations, Glenn has served in the U.S. Senate for 18 years. The contrasts between the two candidates could not be sharper.

Though initial state-wide polls on the Senate race showed Glenn with a 47% to 29% lead, he has steadily lost ground to DeWine. The latest public statewide poll, conducted by The Cleveland Plain Dealer the week before the Republican National Convention, shows DeWine trailing Glenn by a 47% to 38% margin.

An internal poll conducted earlier in the year by Tarrance and Associates for the DeWine campaign July 1-4, showed Glenn leading DeWine by only two percentage points, 48% to 46%.

DeWine's campaign was given a strong boost on July 21 when the Fraternal Order of Police of Ohio endorsed his Senatorial campaign. DeWine was the only Republican in the state endorsed by the organization at its annual meeting in Akron. The policemen's support is seen as a reflection of DeWine's tough anti-crime record as an assistant county prosecutor, state senator, congressman, and lieutenant governor.

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Since July 14, DeWine has commissioned several focus group studies for a possible wave of negative advertisements that might be used to attack Glenn in the Fall.

Many have asserted that Glenn has been hurt by the "Keating Five" scandal as well as a vigorous, issue-oriented campaign conducted by DeWine. Glenn has amassed a war chest in excess of \$2 million while the National Republican Senatorial Committee has publicly committed to spending \$897,097, the legal limit in coordinated campaign funds. Glenn has already spent more on his current election than on any previous race for public office. Glenn appears to realize that he is in for the strongest challenge of his career. As of June 30, DeWine had \$347,249 cash-on-hand and \$1 million in aggregate receipts while Glenn reported \$1.3 million cash on hand.

A fact that could become a campaign issue is the revelation that nearly half of Glenn's contributors who gave \$200 or more are from outside Ohio. In addition, more than 40% of Glenn's funds have come from PACs totaling more than \$700,000 as opposed to 11% for DeWine.

DeWine must raise over \$3 million to mount an effective challenge to the nationally known and popular John Glenn.

Governor Voinovich (who will serve as DeWine's campaign chairman) and the Ohio Republican Party have pledged their full support to DeWine, and he has requested the President's participation in an Ohio fundraising event. Both Senator Bob Dole and Secretary Jack Kemp have hosted fundraisers on DeWine's behalf.

Despite his involvement in the savings and loan "Keating Five" scandal, Glenn remains a popular elected figure in Ohio. Glenn's longstanding career in public service has given him tremendous credibility with voters, and most residents of the Buckeye State are willing to look past his obvious mistakes. DeWine will be careful not to attack Glenn's hero image, but will rather stress the need for change. Most experts agree that Ohio's two Democratic U.S. Senators (Glenn and Howard Metzenbaum) are far too liberal for a state with a Republican Governor, Lt. Governor, and Secretary of State.

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Ohio held its Congressional primaries on June 2, 1992 and the following are the results.

1st Congressional District

First-term incumbent Democrat Charles Luken resigned unexpectedly on June 28. Secretary of State Robert Taft announced a runoff election on August 4. Former Cincinnati Mayor David Mann won in a runoff election and will face Republican businessman Steve Grote who was forced to run as an independent due to the fact that no Republican candidate had filed to run against Luken before the June primary.

2nd Congressional District

Four-term incumbent Republican Bill Gradison is expected to retain his seat over Democratic challenger Tom Chandler.

3rd Congressional District

Seven-term incumbent Democrat Tony Hall is the heavy favorite to retain his seat against Desert Storm Veteran Peter Davis.

4th Congressional District

Republican incumbent Mike Oxley looks solid to retain his seat for a sixth term over Democratic challenger Raymond Hall.

5th Congressional District

Republican incumbent Paul Gillmor has no Democratic opposition.

6th Congressional District

Upon winning a hotly contested primary against Republican incumbent Clarence Miller, five term Republican incumbent Bob McEwen is expected to win this newly created seat over Democrat college professor Ted Strickland.

7th Congressional District

Incumbent Republican David Hobson is running for a second term against Democratic challenger Clifford Hasket.

8th Congressional District

First-term incumbent Republican John Boehner is vying for re-election against Democratic challenger Fred Sennett.

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9th Congressional District

Democrat incumbent **Marcy Kaptur** is running for a fifth term against Republican challenger **Ken Brown**.

10th Congressional District

Incumbent Democrat **Mary Rose Oakar** faced stiff opposition in a five-way primary. Oakar will face Republican challenger **Martin Hoke**.

11th Congressional District

Incumbent Democrat **Louis Stokes** is vying for a twelfth term and is challenged by Republican **Beryl Rothschild**.

12th Congressional District

Republican incumbent **John Kasich** is the heavy favorite over Democratic challenger **Robert Fittrakis** as he runs for a fifth term.

13th Congressional District

Upon the retirement of eight-term incumbent Democrat **Donald Pease**, the 13th District is an open seat. Former Secretary of State **Sherrod Brown** will face Republican challenger **Margaret Mueller**.

14th Congressional District

Incumbent Democrat **Tom Sawyer** looks to be the heavy favorite to retain his seat against Republican challenger **Robert Morgan**.

15th Congressional District

With incumbent Republican **Chalmers Wylie** retiring after more than 25 years in the U.S. House, Democratic State Representative **Richard Cordray** will square off against Republican challenger and former Judge, **Deborah Pryce**.

16th Congressional District

Incumbent Republican **Ralph Regula** is expected to retain this seat against Democrat challenger **Warner Mendenhall**.

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17th Congressional District

Democratic incumbent **James Traficant, Jr.** is favored to win a fifth term over Republican challenger **Salvatore Pansino**.

18th Congressional District

Incumbent Democrat **Doug Applegate** will face Republican challenger **Bill Ress**.

19th Congressional District

With Democrat incumbent **Ed Feighan** retiring after five terms, State Senator **Eric Fingerhut** will face Republican challenger and Lake County Commissioner **Robert Gardner**.

STATE LEGISLATURE

Currently, Republicans control the State Senate 21-12, and trail in the Assembly 38-61. While it is a formidable task, the state GOP is confident that it can make major gains -- if not capture the Assembly -- because Republicans control the reapportionment process. Re-mapping and reapportionment have resulted in the creation of 16 open seats.

OHIO GOP UPDATE

The Ohio Republican Party continues to strengthen its position under the leadership of Chairman **Bob Bennett**. The Ohio GOP is arguably one of the best run state party organizations in the country. As a result, an extensive grass roots campaign strategy has been devised in 1992. Chairman Bennett is backed up by National Committeeman **Mike Colley** and National Committeewoman **Martha Moore**, as well as a top-notch political staff.

Ohio Victory '92 has strong organization in every county. Several organizational meetings, hosted by the state party, have been conducted for local and county Republican leaders. 19 satellite phone banks, consisting of more than 500 lines, have been established throughout the state. Voter ID calls started immediately following the Republican National Convention. Several organizational meetings hosted by the state party for local and county Republican leaders have been conducted statewide.

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Ohio Secretary of State Robert Taft has recently devised a state-of-the-art voter registration program in conjunction with MCI Communications. MCI has agreed to provide the state with an 800 number whereupon citizens can simply call to request a voter registration form which is in the mail within 24 hours.

Thus far, the response has been overwhelming, with a reported 1,600 calls in the first week. To date, more than 8,000 Ohioans have indicated an interest in registering.

REAPPORTIONMENT UPDATE

Ohio will lose two Congressional seats in 1992 as a result of reapportionment. Republicans control the Reapportionment Board 3-2 (Governor, Secretary of State, Senate President). Ohio Republicans fared well in Congressional redistricting. As a result, Democrat incumbents Edward Feighan, Donald Pease, and Dennis Eckart will all retire in 1993.
