

Big Price on Salary Cuts

The president's plan to impose a 5 percent pay cut on government workers who make \$75,000 or more a year could be called the Lawyers Relief Act of 1992.

The White House believes that 54,000 government workers, including 24,910 in the Washington area, would be caught up in the pay cut dragnet. But because of various laws, including the U.S. Constitution, many federal employees making more than \$75,000 probably would escape the pay cuts. Some examples:

- The only federal salaries the president can cut by executive order are those of the 8,400 members of the Senior Executive Service (SES). Ninety percent of them are career civil servants, making \$90,000 to \$112,100. Most of them live in the Washington area.

- Federal judges making more than \$75,000 would escape the pay cut, thanks to a constitutional ban on cutting their salaries.

- Postal Service executives, as well as legislative and judicial branch employees, would be exempt from any executive order cutting pay.

- Finally, some congressional sources believe that thousands of higher-paid career civil servants who are not in the SES would escape a pay cut by executive order because the president has missed the August deadline for submitting an alternate pay plan for them.

Under the federal pay law, government workers are due a 3.7 percent raise in January. It would take an act of Congress to cut their salaries, according to House pay specialists.

If the 5 percent cut goes through, the government would likely be hit by a flood of administrative appeals and lawsuits that would keep hearing officers and courts busy for years. U.S. taxpayers would have to foot most of the legal bills and costs associated with the pay cut proposal.

Cutting federal pay may have some appeal beyond the Capital Beltway, but it also may send a signal that the nation is in the midst of a 1930s-style Depression, rather than what appears to be a temporary economic downturn.

Whatever is saved by cutting federal salaries would be more than offset by the legal fights that would follow. Jerry Shaw, president of the Senior Executives Association, said the proposal is "a 5 percent tax laid solely on the backs of government executives." He said his organization would support a proposal for a 5 percent tax on everyone earning \$75,000 a year, "but sticking it to federal executives is unfair and won't work."

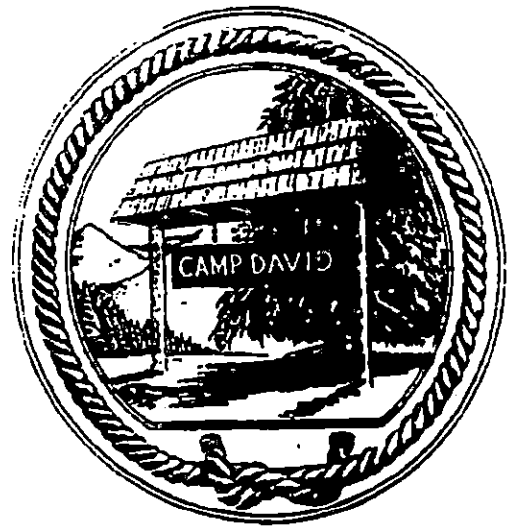

Bush Approves Jet Sale to Saudis

ST. LOUIS (AP) — President Bush today told cheering defense workers in Missouri he was approving a job-saving sale of F-15 jet fighters to Saudi Arabia, saying it was "in the interests of world peace."

The \$9 billion sale of fighters manufactured by contractor McDonnell Douglas was expected to save the jobs of 7,000 defense workers, the company said.

"We can and indeed must, for our own sake, go forward with this sale," Bush told the company crowd.

"I am certain it is in the interests of world peace."

Earlier in the day, Bush sought to sell his repackaged economic renewal agenda to Midwestern voters, saying: "Do not let the other side try to scare you into thinking we're not up to the job."

"I'm asking for a mandate to put my solutions into action and get this country moving," Bush said at a rally on the sunny campus of Missouri Southern State College in Joplin.

"I'm confident I will win this election because I know America doesn't scare easily," Bush said.

He said Democratic presidential nominee Bill Clinton is

"running a Freddy Krueger and he is more interested in scaring people than in dealing with this country's real problems." Bush had already signaled his plan to approve the sale of F-15 jet fighter planes to Saudi Arabia, and he arranged a campaign stop to announce it at McDonnell Douglas, where the jobs are.

The president had said the sale was in the works and had promised it would not put Israeli military superiority at risk. The White House said the sale of the 72 F-15XP jets was worth \$9 billion. Building them would preserve 7,000 defense jobs, according to the company.

It was the second time the president had built an overseas arms sale into his campaign for re-election; last week he announced that he was approving the sale of F-16 jets to Taiwan in Fort Worth, Texas, at the plant where they are built.

Clinton said today the Saudis were an important partner in the Gulf War and "deserve to have their forces modernized." However, he said that before he could endorse the F-15 sale he would have to be certain Israel would retain its military superiority in the region.

Bush assured a Jewish group on Tuesday that would be the case.

Sen. Christopher Bond, R-Mo., told reporters he promised Bush some months ago enough Senate support — a third plus one vote — to prevent the sale from being blocked. He said the Saudis were determined to buy planes, if not F-15s then British-made Tornados, and added that U.S. control of spare parts and maintenance would ensure the planes will not be used against Israel.

Bond, a former governor who is up for reelection, said Bush is running behind in Missouri, a battleground state with 11 electoral votes.

On Thursday, Bush made a high-profile effort to put a new look on his economic proposals by combining them in one package. He also outlined second-term goals that included a start toward

doubling the size of the sluggish U.S. economy by the early years of the 21st century.

"We can do that," Bush claimed. The president acknowledged that economic growth has been anemic, but won't stay that way. In a speech billed as a major campaign milestone, Bush told the Economic Club of Detroit on Thursday that he was prepared to slash White House and congressional spending, and to cut top-level federal salaries as part of a quest to save money that could finance a 1 percentage point cut in the income tax rate along with capital gains and small business tax reductions.

Bush didn't advocate those specific cuts, just cited them as examples of what could be done with the savings "if we discipline spending." He's sought a capital gains tax reduction since taking office, but Congress has balked at his terms.

"He wants to give another big tax cut to the wealthy and a small sop to the middle class," said Democratic presidential nominee Bill Clinton.

The Bush program was printed in a 29-page campaign pamphlet, "Agenda for American Renewal" with Bush's signature emblazoned on the dark blue cover. Five-minute advertisements highlighting the Bush address were broadcast as campaign ads on the television networks Thursday night, and voters were invited to call in for copies of the booklet.

It was Bush's third major effort to put his economic program into a package that would register with the voters and help him overtake Clinton on the issues that troubles them most, the recession and sluggish recovery.

The sequence began with his State of the Union proposals last winter; he tried again in his address to the Republican National Convention. Bush and his campaigners have complained repeatedly that he has a solid economic game plan it hasn't succeeded only because Congress won't let him implement it.

Has Bush abandoned high ground in Mideast arms race?

WASHINGTON, Reuter - President Bush's decision to support the sale of U.S. fighters to Saudi Arabia was attacked Friday by experts who called it a blatant political move that would give arms-making nations a green light to the Middle East.

But other analysts say the Saudis are a pillar of Arab moderation in the volatile region and that the sale of 72 F-15s is a legitimate step to save thousands of aircraft industry jobs and win Bush votes in the November election.

Bush arranged to announce his support for the sale -- which could be blocked by Congress although that was not expected -- during a campaign appearance Friday at the Missouri headquarters of F-15-builder McDonnell Douglas Corp.

The decision to press ahead despite Israeli distaste for such a sale emphasized Bush's intention to use the powers of incumbency in an election year.

But it raised a major question about his demand last year that major arms-making countries cooperate in damping down the Middle East weapons race.

"No matter how many U.S. jobs this gains, it puts the United States out of business as far as regional arms control is concerned," said Edward Luttwak of the Center for Strategic and International Studies in Washington.

If Bush can cite U.S. economic hardship in justifying last week's decision to sell F-16 jets to Taiwan and now the F-15s to Saudi Arabia, then Russia, China, France, Britain, North Korea and others can legitimately go to the Middle East arms bazaar on the same basis, Luttwak said.

"The president last year sought the high ground when he urged other countries to cool the Middle East arms race," said former Assistant Defense Secretary Lawrence Korb, now with the Brookings Institution. "He is no longer on that high ground." Yet others argued that if the United States did not sell the F-15s, then the British would sell Tornado jet fighters to the Saudis, who already own 84 F-15s and are still officially at war with Israel.

Fouad Ajami, a prominent Middle East analyst, said the Saudis had proved to be a responsible ally of Washington in the Gulf War against Iraq and that the kingdom needed the jets for defensive purposes.

"There are very legitimate (U.S.) economic grounds for this sale, and we cannot really afford great tension in the U.S.-Saudi relationship," Ajami said.

Ajami stressed that the United States had not abandoned its line in the sand between selling arms to friends like Israel and Saudi Arabia while refusing to supply Iran and Syria with weapons.

Democrat Bill Clinton, Bush's opponent in the race for the White House, has said he would not oppose the Saudi sale if the F-15s involved are not the most sophisticated models.

Bush this week promised a meeting of B'nai B'rith, a leading Jewish organization, that the United States would continue to assure Israel's qualitative edge in the Middle East arms balance.

But some experts, such as Michael Hudson, a professor of Arab studies at Georgetown University, questioned how Washington could continue to set the Middle East agenda.

Hudson said China and North Korea would claim that they had legitimate rights to sell arms to Iran, Syria, Libya and other countries over U.S. protests.

Luttwak added: "For decades we sold arms in the Middle East to balance Soviet sales in the region. Now, we control the playing field and we go ahead and sell them anyway."

China has protested loudly against Bush's announcement last week that he would approve the \$6 billion sale of 150 F/16 fighters to Taiwan.

But congressional officials noted Friday that the Taiwan sale violated a 1982 agreement between Washington and Beijing that the United States would phase out arms sales to Taiwan.

"If it's in our economic interest to sell jets to Saudi Arabia, who's to say it's not in the interests of Russia and China, where the economy is a hell of a lot worse, to sell weapons to Syria and Iran?" asked one of the officials, who asked not to be identified.

Bush to offer more campaign largesse

WASHINGTON, Reuter - President Bush is poised to offer more campaign largesse Friday -- a sale of fighter jets to Saudi Arabia that will help U.S. workers -- as Bill Clinton's camp raised questions about the president's economic program.

Bush traveled to Missouri and was expected to announce the sale of 72 F-15 aircraft at a McDonnell-Douglas Corp. plant where the planes are built, using his power as an incumbent president to offer election-year goodies to cash-strapped voters.

With 53 days before the election, Clinton leads Bush in most presidential preference polls.

The sale could be worth more than \$5 billion and would save thousands of jobs in Missouri, Connecticut and California. It is the third such offering Bush has made this month.

He also offered subsidies to wheat farmers in South Dakota and a change in weapons sales policy that benefits aircraft workers in Texas.

White House spokesman Marlin Fitzwater denied the jet sale was politically motivated, saying its purpose was to counter Iran's recent acquisition of advanced Russian-built jet fighters.

Missouri Sen. Kit Bond, like Bush a Republican, said the Saudi sale would "determine whether we keep 40,000 aerospace jobs in the United States, or whether we lose them to the British Tornado or the European fighter aircraft."

During the Missouri trip, Bush took aim at Clinton as an alarmist out to frighten the electorate.

"Don't let this governor try to scare you, America," Bush said in Joplin, Mo. "He's more interested in scaring people that dealing with the country's problems."

Clinton, who as the Democratic governor of Arkansas has no capacity to offer voters any such deals, said in a statement he would have to look over the aircraft sale proposal before commenting further.

Both presidential candidates are likely to make repeated pilgrimages to Missouri, a key state in the Nov. 3 elections and home of the late Democratic President Harry Truman, whom both Bush and Clinton claim as a political inspiration.

Bush's nouncement comes one day after he unveiled his economic agenda for a second term, calling for a 1 percent across-the-board tax cut, reductions in White House and congressional spending and trade agreements with various foreign countries.

Clinton campaign spokesman James Carville took a dim view of the Bush economic plan.

"It's a failed economic policy that he's tried before," Carville said in NBC's "Today" program. "It didn't work before, it's not going to work now. What this country needs is change."

Clinton was to talk more about his economic program in a speech at the University of Notre Dame in South Bend, Ind.

U.S. to sell missiles to Italy for \$145 million

WASHINGTON, Reuter - The Bush Administration told Congress Friday that it plans to sell 446 High-Speed Anti-Radiation Missiles and support equipment to Italy for an estimated \$145 million.

The HARM AGM-88 missiles, launched from aircraft and designed to seek and destroy enemy ground radar sites, are made by Texas Instruments Corp. Italy has previously bought such missiles from the United States.

The sale is expected to become official in 30 days without objection from Congress, U.S. defense officials said.

Quayle Defends Anew His Joining National Guard in 1969

WASHINGTON (AP) — Vice President Dan Quayle defended anew Friday his decision to join the National Guard in 1969, saying "it was the correct thing for me to do" because he wanted to attend law school at the same time.

Quayle, on a cable television call-in show, said that "in 1969, even President Nixon didn't support the war in Vietnam."

Some Vietnam historians disputed that statement, although they said Nixon came to the White House that year seeking to end the conflict and began a gradual U.S. withdrawal that took until 1973.

Quayle, who was grilled in the 1988 campaign on whether he joined the Guard to avoid being drafted and sent to Vietnam, has criticized Democratic nominee Bill Clinton for steps he took to avoid service in Vietnam. Clinton opposed the war.

Quayle supported "the aim of stopping communism in Southeast Asia," said his spokesman, David Beckwith. "But as the war was being fought in a no-win fashion he, along with everyone else, was against the war as it was being conducted."

Quayle revisited his own military past while fielding questions on a C-SPAN television show.

A Los Angeles woman demanded "a good reason why (Quayle) did not go to the service and who lobbied for him to go to the National Guard?"

Quayle said he had "answered every conceivable question" about his military record in 1988 after he was tapped as George Bush's surprise running mate.

"Let me try to take you back to 1969 when I graduated from DePauw University," said Quayle.

"I feel that joining the National Guard was the correct thing for me to do. I wanted to go on to law school and at that time in 1969, even President Nixon didn't support the war in Vietnam," he said.

Quayle added that he had "the greatest respect and admiration for those that went to Vietnam."

George Herring, a University of Kentucky history professor and author of "America's Longest War: The United States and Vietnam," said Quayle's statement "would come as a surprise to President Nixon."

"Nixon knew the war had to be ended ... but in a way that to him was honorable to the United States, which meant not a bugout," said Herring.

"It's overstating the case," said Harry G. Summers Jr., editor of Vietnam magazine. "President Nixon had begun the withdrawal. ... But Nixon had (not) given up on the war."

South Vietnam surrendered to communist North Vietnam in 1975, two years after the last U.S. troops were pulled out. Some 58,000 Americans were killed in Vietnam. Just 100 of those fatalities were National Guardsmen on active duty.

Quayle, Clinton and Al Gore, Clinton's running mate, were all born within an 18-month span during the post-World War II baby boom and came of age in the late 1960s, when the country was ripped by dissent over the war.

George Bush, 68, was a decorated Navy pilot in World War II who flew 58 missions against the Japanese in the Pacific.

Clinton, 46, obtained a deferment so he could complete his final year as a Rhodes Scholar at Oxford by promising he would later join a ROTC program at the University of Arkansas law school.

Clinton later decided against attending that law school. He participated in a draft lottery in December 1969, got a high number and was never called.

Gore, 44, enlisted in the Army after graduating from Harvard despite misgivings about the Vietnam War. He spent six months in Vietnam during his two-year stint as an Army journalist.

Quayle, 45, sought family help to get into the Guard. A Quayle uncle asked Wendell C. Phillippi, managing editor of the family-owned Indianapolis News and a former commanding general of the Indiana Guard, to put in a good word for his nephew.

Phillippi recommended Quayle as "a good man" to the Guard commander. But the Indiana Guard reportedly had several vacancies and no waiting list at the time.

U.S. opposes sale of Chinese reactor to Iran

WASHINGTON, Reuter - The United States said Friday it opposed an agreement by China to supply Iran with a small nuclear power station.

"We think that any cooperation like that is highly imprudent and should be avoided," said State Department spokesman Richard Boucher.

"The Iranian regime's conduct in recent years raises serious questions about whether Iran can be trusted to live up to its commitments in the nuclear non-proliferation area," he said, adding that both China and Iran were aware of Washington's views.

Iranian President Akbar Hashemi Rafsanjani announced Thursday that Tehran had agreed to acquire a small nuclear power station from China.

The Iranian acquisition of the 300-megawatt nuclear plant marks China's second deal to export a nuclear power facility, following a similar agreement with Pakistan last year.

China has also presented Algeria with a much smaller 15-megawatt nuclear power plant described as being for research purposes.

U.S.-Chinese relations have been strained by Washington's decision to sell 150 F/16 jet fighters to Taiwan. Beijing said the sale would make it difficult for China to continue to cooperate in arms control and proliferation talks.

China, in its account of the agreement, stressed that Iran had agreed to accept inspection of its nuclear power program by the International Atomic Energy Agency.

The issue of nuclear cooperation between China and Iran has raised fears in the West that Beijing could be helping Iran develop the technology for nuclear bombs.

U.S. officials have said Iran has already bought equipment from China capable of enriching uranium used in nuclear arms. China and Iran have stressed that their cooperation is aimed only at promoting civilian nuclear power. The two sides signed an official agreement to that effect Thursday, pledging that the cooperation between the two countries was totally for peaceful purposes.

Bush to announce F-15 sale; says Clinton fear-mongering

Updates with Bush, Fitzwater grafs

JOPLIN, Mo., Reuter - President Bush Friday worked another demonstration of White House power into his campaign with the planned announcement of a warplane sale that means jobs for Missouri, a key state in his uphill re-election bid.

Aides said Bush would announce the proposed sale to Saudi Arabia of 72 F-15 fighters valued at \$5 billion or more during a hastily arranged afternoon visit to a McDonnell-Douglas Corp. plant in St. Louis, where the planes are built.

Some administration officials said the sale could be worth as much as \$8 billion to \$9 billion in revenues.

The sale of more sophisticated U.S. warplanes to the Saudis has been politically difficult because of the opposition of Israel and American Jews, but Bush has carefully laid the ground with public assurances to U.S. Jewish leaders that Washington would do nothing to harm Israeli security.

Israeli Prime Minister Yitzhak Rabin said recently he saw no point in opposing this sale. Diplomatic analysts say it is not expected to hurt Middle East peace talks.

Congress could try to block the deal but is expected to go along with the sale, which would save thousands of jeopardized aircraft industry jobs in Missouri. The state is important to Bush's strategy for winning the Nov. 3 election against Democrat Bill Clinton, who is out front in the polls.

The sale would also be an economic boon to Connecticut and California, other election battleground states where F-15 engines and other components are manufactured.

Bush's unveiling of the Saudi sale marked the third time in the last two weeks that he has used the power of incumbency to create good will and gain support during a campaign swing.

In Humboldt, S.D., last week, he tried to please farmers by ordering an expansion of grain export subsidies. Then, the same day in Fort Worth, Texas, he announced his approval of the sale of 150 F-16 fighters to Taiwan, winning the cheers of thousands of General Dynamics workers who make the craft.

Though presidential approval of the sale was no surprise, Bush's visit to the St. Louis plant was a late addition to a schedule that also included two other stops in the home state of the late Democratic President Harry Truman. Bush is making Truman his campaign role model because of his come-from-behind victory in the 1948 presidential race.

Fitting in the stop at Lambert Field, the site of a McDonnell Douglas plant, forced Bush to scrub a question-and-answer session planned for Joplin and to limit his vote-getting efforts to a brief outdoor speech on the campus of Missouri Southern State College.

In the speech, he accused Clinton of mounting a "Freddie Krueger candidacy" -- a reference to the scary homicidal villain in the "Nightmare on Elm Street" horror movies.

"Don't let this governor try to scare you, America," Bush said. "He's more interested in scaring people than dealing with the country's problems."

Before the St. Louis stop, he planned to visit a Kansas City suburb and was flying on to Virginia afterward for a rally with Christian evangelicals led by conservative preacher Pat Robertson.

With just 53 days before the election, he continued to trail Clinton by double digits in some polls. Thursday, he presented a plan to revive the nation's anemic economy under the banner of a second-term "agenda for American renewal."

While the Saudi sale was sure to score more points for Bush, there was also a downside since many American Jews probably oppose it despite his public relations efforts.

The deal also exposed Bush to Democratic charges that he was tailoring policy to his political self-interest.

White House spokesman Marlin Fitzwater denied the deal was politically motivated, saying it is designed to counter Iran's recent acquisition of advanced Russian-built jet fighters.

He said the sale had been under consideration for months and that Bush had discussed it with Rabin during the Israeli leader's visit to Maine last month. Rabin had "no major problem" with it, Fitzwater said.

In an address Tuesday in Washington before B'nai B'rith, a Jewish service organization, Bush pointedly noted that Clinton was on record in favor of the F-15 sale to Saudi Arabia.

Speaking to reporters in Little Rock Friday, the Arkansas governor said he wanted to see the details of the planned sale and reiterated his view that it should not undermine Israel's "qualitative" military edge in the region.

"I want to know exactly what's going to be on the plane and what it's going to look like before I say 'yes' or 'no,'" Clinton said. He added, however, that the Saudis were an important partner during the Gulf War and "they have a right to modernize their forces."

Mortgage Rates Fall to 19-Year Low

WASHINGTON (AP) — The average rate on 30-year mortgages fell to a 19-year low of 7.84 percent this week following a reduction in a key short-term interest rate last week by the Federal Reserve.

It was down from 7.94 percent a week earlier and the lowest since June 1973, the Federal Home Loan Mortgage Corp.

The rate had dropped to 7.87 percent during the week ended Aug. 21, but then, because of a plunge in the value of the dollar, it blipped up to 8.01 percent the next week.

On Sept. 4, the Federal Reserve cut the federal funds rate — the rate charged among banks on overnight loans — to a 29-year low of 3 percent. It was the 24th time since the spring of 1989 that the central bank has moved interest rates lower in an attempt to revive the sluggish economy.

On one-year adjustable rate mortgages, lenders were asking an average initial rate of 5.15 percent, down from 5.24 percent last week and the lowest since the corporation began tracking ARMs in 1984.

A year ago, 30-year mortgages averaged 9.02 percent and one-year mortgages were going for 6.87 percent.

Thirty-year rates have now averaged below 8 percent during four of the last five weeks and have declined during 20 of the last 25 weeks, after hitting 9.03 percent in late March.

The rates do not include add-on fees known as points.

Perot: No 'October Surprise' Candidacy Planned, But. ...

WASHINGTON (AP) — Ross Perot said Friday he's not planning any "October surprise" return to the presidential race but left the door open if Republicans and Democrats don't adequately address the federal deficit and other issues.

"If the volunteers said, 'It's a dirty job but you gotta do it,' I belong to them," the Dallas businessman said, referring to his supporters.

Perot, who abruptly ended his independent bid for the White House in July, said during a call-in show on C-SPAN: "Let's try to get the two parties to step up to the plate. If they don't, we'll do what we have to do."

Still, he said concerning the possibility he would try to revive his candidacy, "There's no plan for an October surprise or a September surprise. There's nothing planned."

In the hour-plus go-round, some callers said they were angry he had abandoned his run for the White House after promising to make the quest if volunteers put him on all ballots.

A woman from Virginia Beach, Va., sounded confused.

"When you got out, first I was shocked and then I cried and then I was very angry. And now I'm simply perplexed. I'm wondering, What are you doing?" she said to Perot.

After several more phone calls accusing him of reneging on his pledge to run, Perot said, "We didn't disappear. ... We redoubled our effort to make the two-party system work."

Perot said supporters still involved in a "United We Stand" movement were serving as a "massive tap on the shoulder" to President Bush, Democrat Bill Clinton and House and Senate candidates to fully address the deficit and other issues.

He said he was on the ballot in 49 states but that his group might endorse Bush or Clinton if they adequately addressed important issues.

"We have an option if they ignore us," Perot said, alluding to a potential re-entry. But he said "we will have failed" if he is forced to run himself because that will mean Republicans and Democrats failed to respond.

He urged Bush and Clinton to stick to economic issues.

"If you want to totally destroy your credibility ... just keep up the slimy mudslinging that's been going on. It has nothing to do with solving America's problems," he said.

One caller asked him if he would go to work in a Bush administration, should the president win re-election.

"That is wishful thinking on your part," Perot said, noting that White House spokeswoman Marlin Fitzwater had been critical of him early last summer.

"Fitzwater called me a monster and it goes downhill from there. I'm not overly impressed with talk like that," Perot said. Besides, he said, he was not impressed with what has happened in the country in the past 12 years of Republican leadership.

Administration Considers A Ban On Military Flights Over Bosnia

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States is considering a ban on military flights over bloodied Bosnia and is consulting with its allies on how it would be implemented, a senior Bush administration official said Friday.

One purpose of the "no-fly" zone would be to prevent Serbian warplanes from shadowing Western relief flights to Sarajevo, the official said. It also would be a step toward U.S. military involvement in the conflict in the former Yugoslav republic and would "get the attention" of the Serbian militia that has been attacking Bosnia's Muslims for six months.

"We are looking quite actively and hard at it," said the official, who spoke to a grp of State Department correspondents under rules that prohibited release of his identity.

A similar ban was placed on Iraqi military flights over an area populated by Shiite Muslims and has effectively shielded them from further Iraqi attack.

France has called for a no-fly zone over Bosnia, and the United States is talking with its allies at the United Nations in New York about going ahead with the proposal.

It would be a mistake to believe the move would have an important effect on the chances that another humanitarian flight would be shot down, the official said. The Italian relief plane shot down last week was hit by a ground-fired missile.

However, the official said, it would help avoid cases of mistaken identity, since only relief planes would be permitted in the airspace.

"It quite obviously could prevent the use of Serbian aircraft in support of Bosnian Serb ground forces," the official said. "It would have that beneficial effect."

The Bush administration s moved cautiously in its approach to the ethnic conflict in Bosnia-Herzegovina and other former Yugoslav republics.

"It is not the silver bullet that we've either been loathe to fire or we've just discovered," the official said.

Last month, at a conference in London, a Western diplomatic initiative produced promises from Bosnian Serbs to end their siege of Sarajevo and other Bosnian cities, turn over their heavy weapons to U.N. monitors and shut down detention centers.

Meanwhile, Richard A. Boucher, the State Department spokesman, said the shadowing of humanitarian flights by Bosnian Serb combat aircraft presents a serious threat to their safety.

"We condemn this practice in the strongest terms," Boucher said. "There is no reason to do this shadowing of humanitarian flights."

The spokesman added: "We have repeatedly stressed to all the parties the importance of ensuring the safety of the humanitarian airlift as well as the safety of U.N. personnel and convoys in general."

Boucher said Milan Panic, the Yugoslav prime minister, and Radovan Karadzic, leader of the Bosnian Serbs, have agreed that the shadowing was "an unacceptable practice and both have promised to do their utmost to halt these operations." AP-DS-09-11-92 1451EDT

Bush Giving Approval of Saudi Jet Deal, Saving Missouri Jobs

EXCELSIOR SPRINGS, Mo. (AP) — President Bush used a campaign trip to Missouri Friday for his second announcement in 10 days that he was approving a major sale of jet fighters overseas — these to be built by St. Louis contractor McDonnell Douglas.

In a St. Louis stop, added to his schedule so he could formally announce the approval, Bush was emphasizing the economic benefit for the local area of the sale of \$5 billion or more in F-15 planes to Saudi Arabia. The company says the deal, still being negotiated, will save the jobs of more than 7,000 workers.

Last week, Bush had made a similar announcement at a General Dynamics plant in Texas concerning the sale of F-16 fighters to Taiwan.

Bush spent Friday campaigning across Missouri, talking up his economic renewal plans. But the Saudi deal, with foreign policy as well as regional job implications, overshadowed everything else.

The Saudis have asked to buy 72 F-15s, and Israel, which has been strongly opposed in the past, has indicated it will not fight the sale.

Bush had hinted that the deal was imminent earlier this week in a speech to the Jewish service organization, B'nai B'rith. He assured the group that Israel's military superiority in the Mideast would not be compromised.

"I can guarantee you the qualitative edge that Israel has will not be neglected," he said then.

Democratic rival Bill Clinton said he would have to be certain that was the case before he would endorse the sale. However, he also said the Saudis were an important partner in the Gulf War and "deserve to have their forces modernized."

For months, the F-15 sale has been at least informally dependent on the fate of \$10 billion in loan guarantees Israel is seeking from the United States to use in resettling an estimated 500,000 Jewish immigrants, most of them from the former Soviet Union. As he made his announcement about the Saudi sale on Friday, Bush also formally submitted the loan guarantee legislation to Congress, where the Senate Appropriations Committee is to deal with it next week as part of a foreign aid bill.

Sen. Christopher Bond, R-Mo., said the F-15 production line would have been shut down in late November without a large sale. He said more than 40,000 jobs were at stake in 46 states that manufacture parts for the plane which is assembled at the McDonnell Douglas plant in St. Louis and in Tulsa, Okla.

Earlier Friday, in Joplin and then at a job corps training center in Excelsior Springs, Bush sought to sell the economic package he described on Thursday in Detroit.

He said he wants the U.S. economy to grow from the current \$6 trillion a year to \$10 trillion "by the early years of the next century." And he declared, "Do not let the other side try to scare you into thinking we're not up to the job."

He told a rally at Missouri Southern State College, in Joplin, that he was asking for a mandate "to put my solutions into action and get this country moving."

"I'm confident I will win this election because I know America doesn't scare easily," Bush said. The president said Clinton was "running a Freddy Krueger" playing on people's fears, a reference to the movie horror character.

Clinton, asked about that at a campaign stop Friday, merely rolled his eyes and smiled.

Bush said he goals include a network of free trade agreements spanning the globe.

"One of six manufacturing jobs is tied to foreign trade," the president said. "One of every three acres we harvest will be sold abroad."

"The bottom line of our new economy is: Exports equal jobs."

Bush accused Clinton of first supporting a free trade agreement with Mexico but then saying, after the North American Free Trade agreement was worked out recently, that he was reviewing the treaty.

"I never heard leadership defined as 'please leave a message and I'll get back to you later,'" said Bush. "There is no call-waiting in the Oval Office."

Clinton has said he supports the idea of the treaty but won't give it his formal endorsement until the administration releases details.

Bush wants to be like Harry, but what about Clinton, Perot?

WASHINGTON, Reuter - President Bush wants to be like Harry Truman, but there may have been a bit of Bill Clinton and Ross Perot in his plan for reducing the size of the federal government.

The boldest element of Bush's speech to the Detroit Economic Club Thursday was an offer to reduce the executive office of the president by 33 percent if Congress will cut its staff by the same amount.

This would squeeze only a few drops of the flood of red ink called the budget deficit, but it represents a symbolic commitment to reduce the size of government.

Bush, who identifies his struggle for re-election with Truman's 1948 come-from-behind victor has often railed about obscure congressional subcommittees perpetuating their own existence, but this was the first time he had proposed to do something about it.

"Why should the federal government be the only large organization in America that continually adds size and offices, and never gets rid of anything?" Bush said.

Bush's plan seemed designed to go one better than Clinton who has proposed a 25 percent cut of the White House staff along with a challenge to Congress to make an equal reduction.

The Democratic nominee also proposes eliminating 100,000 unnecessary positions in the bureaucracy through attrition. He also wants federal managers and workers to achieve 3 percent across-the-board administrative savings.

Perot, the Texas tycoon who flirted with a run for the presidency and tantalized millions of people only to decide against running, proposed an idea nearly identical to Bush's in a new book, "United We Stand -- How We Can Take Back Our Country," that outlined the agenda he would have pursued had he been elected.

"The White House and Congress could easily reduce their staffs by 30 percent," Perot wrote. He points out that John Kennedy's White House staff was 600 and back then Congress's staff was about 5,600. Bush's staff numbers about 2,000 and Congress's staff now is put at 20,000.

"What do all these people do?" Perot asked. "From my experience, their main mission is to insulate executive officials and members of Congress from you, the people. Their secondary mission is to make sure their boss gets re-elected."

The executive office of the president includes the White House staff and a number of other agencies such as the Office of Management and Budget and the U.S. Trade Representative's office.

In his speech, Bush also said he wanted a "consolidation" of agencies and bureaus within the executive branch, which includes vast bureaucratic departments such as defense, state, treasury, housing, and agriculture, among others.

He didn't give details but made clear he was intending reductions in the sprawling federal government, which he said spends 24 cents out of every dollar of the country's income. As an example, he cited a need to restructure the Arms Control and Disarmament Agency, a Cold War creature dedicated to monitoring compliance with U.S.-Soviet arms control agreements.

Perot gave a more pointed example, saying the Rural Electrification Administration, a product of Franklin D.

Roosevelt's New Deal, should be phased out now that the country is electrified.

Bush's proposal, whether copied from Clinton and Perot or not, was an attempt to answer voter rage at Washington that the government has grown too bloated and is unresponsive.

This voter anger is what gave rise to the Perot movement, and when he dropped out of the race, many Perot supporters moved behind Clinton as the agent of change.

Bush would like them to cross over to his side, and is trying to direct voter discontent toward turning out the Democrats who control Congress.

Treasury Secretary Nicholas Brady had his doubts whether Congress would go along. "I think it's a terrific idea," Brady told CNN's "Moneyline" program. "I don't think they're (Congress) going to do it, but they ought to."

Senate Majority Leader George Mitchell, a Democrat from Maine, did not hold out much hope.

He insisted that since Ronald Reagan took office in 1981, with Bush as his vice president, the number of employees in the legislative branch of government has declined by 4.7 percent while the executive branch increased by 3.6 percent.

"The fact of the matter is that consistently this president and the preceding administration called for more spending than the Congress appropriated, increased the numbers of employees as the number of legislative branch employees was declining," he told reporters.

Bush also proposed cutting 5 percent from the salaries of government employees who make more than \$75,000 a year, saying federal workers should have to tighten their belts like most Americans suffering through a two-year recession.

Sen. Sam Nunn, the Georgia Democrat who is chairman of the Senate Armed Services Committee, said this sounds good but that government has enough difficulty already retaining quality employees because often they leave for big-money jobs in the private sector. "It could prove to be counterproductive," he told ABC's "Nightline" Thursday.

Iraq to begin destroying chemical weapons soon

BAGHDAD, Iraq, Reuter - A U.N. chemical weapons expert said Friday he expected Iraq to begin destroying its stocks of nerve gas before the end of the month and of mustard gas shortly afterward.

Briton Ron Manley, wrapping up a week-long inspection visit, said two destruction plants at Iraq's former chemical weapons complex at Muthana northwest of Baghdad were complete.

"It's been a very satisfactory week. Both plants are complete and are operating on test materials," he told reporters.

Manley said he would report to the head of the U.N. Special Commission destroying Iraq's weapons of mass destruction under the terms of the Gulf War cease-fire. The commission chief would then give Iraq the go-ahead to start bulk destruction under U.N. supervision.

"I would expect it to be operating before next month," he said of the hydrolysis plant that will destroy the nerve gas. Hydrolysis is the decomposition of a substance by chemical reaction with water.

Manley, one of three experts in the latest chemical weapons inspection team, said the incinerator plant that will burn the mustard gas was much more complex.

"It's like Dante's Inferno. It's a very complex plant," he said, noting that its operating temperature was 2,012 Fahrenheit.

Manley said the United Nations would ask the Iraqis to operate the plant for several weeks to destroy one of the components of mustard gas, before starting the more hazardous task of destroying mustard gas itself.

"This will allow them to gain experience and it will allow the U.N. team that is monitoring there to get used to the facility."

He said it would start destroying mustard gas after further test data had been evaluated -- a process he expected to last a few weeks.

Iraq has been stockpiling its chemical munitions at Muthana, 80 miles from Baghdad. U.N. experts have blown up some chemical bombs and shells which were leaking and too hazardous to move from the south.

Manley, who leaves for Bahrain Saturday, said Iraqi experts had emptied about 70 tons of nerve gas and 200 tons of mustard gas from the estimated 45,000 bombs, shells and missile warheads collected at the site.

He estimated that the same amounts remained to be emptied.

Manley, who was full of praise for Iraqi cooperation in the destruction of its chemical arsenal, expected the process to take six months to a year.

"It is unlikely to be finished in six months. It should not take more than one year," he said.

"Whatever else Iraq may or may not be guilty of, they have made a considerable achievement in the fact that they have built the plant from scratch. It operates. We have every confidence that with experience it will perform satisfactorily."

TRIP (AP) -- With a job-saving foreign arms deal as a campaign bonus, President Bush sought to sell his repackaged economic renewal agenda to Midwestern voters, saying: "Do not let the other side try to scare you into thinking we're not up to the job. I'm asking for a mandate to put my solutions into action and get this country moving," Bush said at a rally on the sunny campus of Missouri Southern State College.

Bush had already signaled his plan to approve the sale of F-15 jet fighter planes to Saudi Arabia, and he arranged a campaign stop in St. Louis to announce it. Sen. Bond told reporters he promised Bush some months ago enough Senate support to prevent the sale from being blocked. Bond said Bush is running behind in Missouri.

(Joplin/Reuter) -- President Bush Friday worked another demonstration of White House power into his campaign with the planned announcement of a warplane sale that means jobs for Missouri, a key state in his uphill re-election bid. Aides said Bush would announce the proposed sale to Saudi Arabia of 72 F-15 fighters valued at \$5 billion or more during a hastily arranged afternoon visit to a McDonnell-Douglas Corp. plant in St. Louis, where the planes are built.

HUNGARY-FREE TRADE (Budapest/Reuter) -- Hungary Friday praised President Bush's pledge to negotiate free trade agreements with Hungary, Czechoslovakia and Poland if he is re-elected to a second term. "I think this is a favorable promise, worthy of praise," government spokesman Balazs Laszlo told a news conference. Balazs said Hungary was currently negotiating with the countries of the seven-member European Free Trade Association (EFTA) about concluding a free trade agreement.

TAX CUT (AP) -- An across-the-board tax-rate cut mentioned by President Bush would be worth less than \$6 a week to the typical four-member family earning the national median income of \$33,000 a year. The wealthiest 1% would pocket an extra \$240 a week -- \$12,465 a year on the average -- chiefly because they would benefit most from the capital-gains tax reduction that Bush has been advocating for years. Citizens for Tax Justice used data from Congress' Joint Committee on Taxation to calculate tax savings for families and single people at other income levels.

IRAQ/PLANES (Persian Gulf/Reuter) -- Iraqi planes have stepped up flights north of a no-fly zone in southern Iraq in a game of "cat-and-mouse" with western patrols, a British air force officer said. Group Capt. Malcolm Ball gave few details of the Iraqi patrols but said Baghdad could muster between 300 and 400 military aircraft despite a U.N trade embargo on spares.

HURRICANE/HAWAII (Honolulu/Reuter) -- The first hurricane to threaten Hawaii in a decade bore down on the chain of popular vacation islands Friday with winds of 140 mph. Hurricane Iniki was expected to roar into the state's sparsely populated northern islands by Friday night but could whip up destructive winds of 75 mph or more over Oahu, where the capital of Honolulu is located, forecasters said.

Hungary welcomes Bush's free trade proposal

BUDAPEST, Hungary, Reuter - Hungary Friday praised President Bush's pledge to negotiate free trade agreements with Hungary, Czechoslovakia and Poland if he is re-elected to a second term.

"I think this is a favorable promise, worthy of praise," government spokesman Balazs Laszlo told a news conference.

Bush said Thursday he wanted to conclude free trade deals with the three eastern European countries if Congress gives him negotiating authority.

Balazs said Hungary was currently negotiating with the countries of the seven-member European Free Trade Association (EFTA) about concluding a free trade agreement.

"So I think that a similar agreement with the United States would be a significant leap forward, offering a market expansion for the Hungarian economy," he added.

Hungary exported \$171.5 million worth of goods to the United States in the first seven months of 1992, while it imported goods worth \$169.3 million.

Report Offers Some Ideas for Government in an Era of Deficits

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Brookings Institution offered America's next president a bookful of advice Friday on facing the social problems besetting the country. Even a government inhibited by deficit can "make some things better," it argued.

Brookings' ideas include some that wouldn't cost much, such as a federal gun "buy back" program to curtail urban violence and making high school grade transcripts available so potential employers can use them in hiring and wage decisions.

But some would be costly — dramatically expanding drug treatment for prisoners to combat recidivism, making Head Start a year-round, daylong program for all 3- and 4-year-old children, increasing foot patrols by police and creating jobs paying 90 percent of the minimum wage that would enable homelss single adults to afford minimal shelter.

The most expensive proposal was one to guarantee health care to all Americans. Universal health insurance is affordable only with a new tax, the report said, and even then the country must abandon the idea that all possible care can be provided to everyone. Some procedures just aren't worth it, Brookings said.

The ideas are spelled out in "Setting Domestic Priorities: What Can Government Do?," a 318-page book issued by the liberal think tank.

"We are far from helpless; there are ways to begin to turn things around," said co-editors Henry Aaron and Charles Schultze, two Brookings researchers who are veterans of past Democratic administrations.

They said their ideas are "grounded in the idea that government can take specific actions to make some things better."

The resigned tone of the Brookings report suggested how profoundly the deficit and the cost of interest on the national debt has inhibited the government from taking new initiatives. Twelve experts were asked to offer their ideas for the next administration but were required to suggest ways of paying for new approaches, through new taxes increases or spending cuts, rather than pushing the costs off to future generations.

That resulted in proposals for two new taxes. One would be a value-added tax — a hidden national sales tax — to pay for health care reforms. The other would tax 85 percent of Social Security benefits, treating them the same way as private pension benefits, to help eliminate the deficit in 10 years.

And to find the money to pay for its other programs, the book targeted some politically popular programs for sharp cuts: farm subsidies, veterans' compensation for low-rated disabilities and the government's \$87 billion civilian and military retirement benefits, for example. Additionally, it proposed increasing what the government charges for the use of federal airways, waterways and the radio spectrum.

Government health expenditures — thfastest growing part of the budget — will require "determined, sometimes painful and politically controversial cost controls," the report said. Health care costs are the toughest to restrain, it said. Because 90 percent of hospital bills and 76 percent of all health expenditures are paid for by insurance or government, there is little incentive for either patient or doctor to control costs. Ultimately, some patients will have to be denied publicly funded

care that "produces small benefits at great cost," the report said.

The health recommendations call for extending the current system of employer-sponsored health insurance with a government backup plan for people not covered through work or a family member's policy.

But any approach designed to make health care available to the 35 million Americans who lack health insurance is bound to increase the share of national health costs financed by government, the report said.

In education, the report called for reforms in the nation's schools to narrow a widening gap between what high school graduates and college graduates will earn.

It proposed the development of study programs and school exams that require students to solve problems, not just learn facts; higher salaries to attract teachers with higher skills in math and science; and assessments of the skills of high school graduates that would allow employers to determine initial assignments and starting wages based on what their newly hired people could handle.

*3 BUSH: F-15 SALE TO SAUDI ARABIA EXPECTED TODAY

"In another offer of political largess" Bush "intends to hand-deliver a major reward" to the St. Louis-based McDonnell Douglas Corp. today by announcing approval for the sale of 72 F-15 fighters to Saudi Arabia. The \$5 billion contract "is expected to save thousands" of MO jobs, and "could mean new business" for defense firms in OH and CA who do work on the F-15 project. The announcement is "certain to delight the defense firm, union officials and lawmakers who had warned" rejection of the deal could cost "as many as 20,000 aerospace jobs by next

summer." One day after Bush "devoted a major address outlining his long-term vision" for the nation's economy, this announcement "reaffirms that his short-term plans for winning reelection include making the most of his control over a vast federal and foreign purse." Critics say the sale risks "alienating Israel and its supporters at a crucial stage of the Middle East peace process." In an "attempt to mollify those critics" the administration may use a model of the F-15 that is "somewhat less capable" than the advanced model used in the Persian Gulf war. Proponents of the sale also "argued" the recent approval of \$10 billion in loan guarantees to Israel "would be enough to quiet Israeli criticism." The announcement is expected to be made by Bush in K.C. MO today (Jehl, L.A. TIMES, 9/11).

ANDREW: The Senate Appropriations Cmte approved over \$7.45 billion in federal aid and loans to areas hit by Hurricane Andrew, but rejected the Admin.'s request to rebuild Homestead AFB in FL. "In this election-year environment, the maneuvering is rich in political theater for all the genuine tragedy of the events." Bush "has been criticized" for using the federal aid "to win support for himself" and his decision to rebuild Homestead came "despite the fact that the facility only narrowly escaped being closed as a result of defense cutbacks" (Rogers, W.S. JOURNAL, 9/11). The action took the Admin. "by surprise" and "provoked a bitter" WH reaction that "set the stage for another [GOP] campaign against the Congress." WH spokesperson Judy Smith: "We regret the proclivity of the Democrats to play politics with human suffering." Joining nine Dems voting not to rebuild the base were GOP Sens. Mark Hatfield (R-OR), Pete Domenici (R-NM) and Phil Gramm (R-TX) (N.Y. TIMES, 9/11). JCS chair Colin Powell: "it is one thing to close a base over a period of years and another thing to shut it down overnight because of a hurricane. The correct decision has been made to rebuild it" (W. POST, 9/11). Sen. Connie Mack (R-FL): "There's a sense of anger and hurt as a result of what happened." Homestead City Mgr Alex Muxo: "If the base had a mission before the hurricane, why shouldn't it have a mission after the hurricane. ... talk about playing politics" ("Today," NBC, 9/11).

NEIL: Michael Wise, ex-CEO of the failed Silverado S&L, was indicted by federal authorities on "allegations that he diverted \$458,000 in bank money for his own use." The indictment is the first to come from the collapse of the S&L. Authorities said the "investigation is continuing, but declined to say how many people are being investigated or who they are." DoJ authorities also "declined to comment" if Neil Bush, who served on Silverado's board, is being investigated, but one official did say "there are no untouchables in this investigation" (L.A. TIMES, 9/11).

BAKER AND BNL: W.S. JOURNAL's Truell reports James Baker, as Sec/State in '89, "brushed aside concerns about Iraqi involvement in the Banco Nazionale de Lavoro [BNL] scandal, and sought instead to ensure that Baghdad received \$1 billion in farm credit guarantees." At the time of the 10/26/89 Baker memo approving the guarantees, the State Dept. "seems to have been well informed about the intentions of the U.S. attorney's in Atlanta with regard to BNL." Congressional Dems charge there was "interference" into the Atlanta probe (9/11). Under header: "Iran-Contra Scandal Haunts Bush Campaign," L.A. TIMES' McManus writes, "like dogged ghosts from a past" Bush would "rather forget, questions from the Iran-Contra scandal have reappeared" in the campaign, "reviving once more the issue of Bush's truthfulness about his actions" as VP (9/11). N.Y. TIMES'

Anthony Lewis writes when Clinton "snapped at reporters" over questions on the draft, "he had a point. We in the press have been dismally negligent in failing to pin Mr. Bush down on what he knew and did -- negligent for the last six years. ... the real question is why the press has been so reluctant to challenge Mr. Bush's story. ... one reason is fear" (9/11).

MORE RELIGIOUS RIGHT: Under header "Religious Right using GOP to fashion world it wants," COX's Smith weighs in with another look at "congregations ... spill[ing] into the public courtyard" (ATLANTA CONSTITUTION, 9/11). In a W. TIMES op-ed Pat Buchanan defends the "culture" war about which he has received criticism: "It is about 'who we are' and 'what we believe.' Are we any longer 'one nation, under God' or has half that nation already begun to secede from the other?" (9/11). Bush addresses the Christian Coalition today in VA.

*4 CLINTON: KERREY SHELLS OUT DEFENSE FOR MR. "PEANUT"

Sen. Bob Kerrey (D-NE), "who predicted last spring that Republicans would use Bill Clinton's draft record to open him up 'like a soft-shelled peanut,' criticized President Bush ... for trying to do exactly that." In a Senate speech, Kerrey "accused Bush of forgetting his pledge to heal the wounds of Vietnam," but he "conceded that Bush's tactics 'appear to be working' in weakening Clinton's support, particularly in the South. And he made little direct defense of Clinton's behavior." While his defense of Clinton was "tepid, Kerrey's attacks on Bush were heated": "The hunger of reelection has gotten the better of you" (Decker, L.A. TIMES, 9/11). Kerrey: "God help us if in 1992, the people who brought us the tragedy of Vietnam use it in a deceptive way to hold onto power" (N.Y. POST, 9/11). Kerrey also "sought to give context to the Clinton controversy by laying blame on the draft regulations set up by Vietnam-era politicians, among them Bush, who served in the House in 1967-71" (Gugliotta, W. POST, 9/11). ABC's Jennings noted Kerrey's statement on Bush's role in writing the rules for draft deferment (9/10). Kerrey, appeared on NBC's "Today," said Clinton is "still having difficulties with the recollection of the events. A lot of us have difficulties with recollection of events 25 years ago. George Bush does as well" (NBC, 9/11).

MORE DRAFT: N.Y. TIMES' Ifill reports Clinton "took refuge" from the press, offering only a long-distance interview to Detroit TV stations. The campaign, "normally eager to have the candidate appear before the press to criticize President Bush whenever it looks like the Republicans might dominate news coverage, instead canceled a news briefing as well as plans to hold a news conference." Clinton commun. dir. George Stephanopoulos: "The subject today is the economy. And Bush's speech is on the economy" (9/11). COPLEY's Barabak: "Vietnam is becoming Bill Clinton's quagmire as questions about his effort to avoid the draft show no sign of fading away." Clinton strategists "are now resigned to the issue lingering in some fashion until Election Day" (S.D. UNION-TRIBUNE, 9/11). Balto. SUN's Simon: "The last time Bill Clinton was completely candid about the Vietnam draft was 23 years ago" (9/11). W.S. JOURNAL reports "more allegations about Clinton and the draft are in the offing." Cliff Jackson, an "avowed Clinton enemy" in Little Rock, is pushing reports ex-AR Gov. Winthrop Rockefeller (R) "made calls to help Clinton avoid being called up. Jackson says he isn't receiving covert aid from Bush-Quayle operatives, but others are skeptical." Also, Bush aides predict for the first

time, "Bush himself will explicitly raise the issue of Clinton's draft status next week" (Jaroslavsky, 9/11).

WHERE IS BILL? W. POST's Broder characterizes Clinton's post-Labor Day effort as a "popgun offensive": "Clinton has so many other things going his way that he may need to do no more than demonstrate his own competence. ... [But Clinton] wants a mandate for major policy change." That "hunger for a big win is hard to reconcile with the slow pace and soft content of these opening days of the fall campaign." Clinton's Labor Day performance "was far from the high-energy campaign most Democrats schedule on a day that is traditionally is a great showcase for their campaign themes. ... Yesterday he was back in Little Rock, with nothing on his public schedule for the following four days but a speech at Notre Dame and a fund-raiser at Pamela Harriman's Virginia estate. It's an oddly lackadaisical and unfocused effort for a challenger" (9/11).

STRATEGY: ABC's Bruno: "He has to establish a credibility level with the American people, ... and even though he's ahead in all the polls and everything, he's still hasn't succeeded in doing that" ("GMA," 9/11). CBS' Plante on the first week of the fall campaign: "I would say that the first week has to be judged to not have gone too well. ... He seems a bit pre-occupied trying to get the draft thing off his back" ("CBS This Morning, 9/11).

NO ACTION FROM JACKSON: W. TIMES header: "Jackson won't push hard for Clinton due to snub" (9/11). Announcing his national voter registration drive in Atlanta, Jackson "did not mention Mr. Clinton by name until he was asked" (Smith, COX/ATLANTA CONSTITUTION, 9/11).

HISPANIC VOTE: DALLAS MORNING NEWS' Jackson reports, "Some Hispanic leaders who wonder whether Bill Clinton is spending enough time with their constituents were not particularly encouraged by a recent meeting with him: He arrived late and left early." AFL-CIO's Maria Hernandez: "The campaign has been focused on middle America, and I am very concerned as a Hispanic." The Clinton camp says they have several efforts "aimed at winning -- and turning out -- Hispanic voters, starting with Spanish advertisements in newspapers and on radio and television." The campaign also has a special Spanish telephone line offering recorded comments for radio stations (9/11).

PATRIOT GAMES: RICHMOND TIMES-DISPATCH editorial header "Patriot Bill." Noting Clinton's misstatement that Patriot missiles "go down chimneys," the paper states when Quayle was in the Senate "he helped save the Patriot from Congress' anti-defense faction. If the Clintonians had their way, no Patriots would have protected Israel or Saudi Arabia. But what does Quayle know?" (9/10). W. TIMES editorial: "Disturbing visions of Michael Dukakis in the tank present themselves" (9/11).

"FINALLY": Ex-AR Dem chair Skip Rutherford, a longtime Clinton adviser, will join the campaign full-time as a "special assistant" to manager David Wilhelm. Rutherford, who "has been a key volunteer and adviser, often spending hours introducing out-of-town journalists to Arkansas": "I've dispensed a lot of hospitality" (ARKANSAS DEMOCRAT-GAZETTE, 9/11).

*5 DNC RADIO ADS: AIRWAVES HEATING UP IN BATTLEGROUND AREAS
The DNC began airing two radio ads in 10 states (not released) concentrated in the South and the Mid-West. The ads are 60-sec. "FAMILIES": "Are America's families better off than they were just a few years ago? Or do you think families are struggling harder -- just to make ends meet? The Republicans

talk a lot about family values. But what is it that they value? For too long, the Republicans have watched health care costs eat away our family savings. Maybe the Republicans think hard times bring families closer together. If that's not your way of thinking, consider this: the Democrats have a plan that puts families first...that honors hard work and responsibility. It's a plan that will turn our economy around, put good, affordable health care within every family's reach, and help our kids afford college again. And it's a plan that'll move thousands off welfare and into the workplace. In times like these, there's plenty our families can't afford...including another year like this one. If you value your family, this November, vote Democratic. Paid for by the Democratic National Committee."

"AMAZING": "For over 3 years, the Republicans refused to admit the country was in a recession. Now, the facts are just too much to ignore. Over the last year, the incomes of average Americans have failed to even keep up with inflation. Just last month, 167,000 private sector jobs were lost. Over two million more people today are living in poverty. Now, with an election around the corner, the Republicans claim they have a plan for the economy. But what are the Republicans really planning? More of the same. Yet another capital gains tax break for the rich. And what would the Republicans cut? They're proposing sweeping cuts in Medicare -- slashing benefits for nearly 30 million older Americans and virtually eliminating all compensation for over one million disabled veterans. It's amazing. When the Republicans do nothing about the economy, it's bad. When they try to do something about it, it's even worse. Paid for by the Democratic National Committee" (DNC release, 9/10).

RNC CHAIR RICH BOND RESPONSE: "I demand the [DNC] immediately cease airing its new radio ads which contain lies and are repeats of standard Democratic tactics to scare older Americans and veterans. ... These claims not only are untrue, they are repeats of lies put out by the Clinton campaign less than a week ago. Those lies were immediately pointed out, but the Democrats chose to repeat them" (RNC release, 9/10).

MORE PEOPLE GET THEIR NEWS: "Sensitive to charges that television's campaign coverage can be too easily manipulated by savvy political operatives, ABC News has instituted a new format for reporting" on the presidential race "designed to minimize soundbites and photo opportunities and maximize issues and strategy." The new format will divide ABC's political coverage into a "Campaign Watch" which will "briefly report the routine daily events and reject 'packaged' news; a "Campaign Focus" that will go "behind the scenes" to explain "strategies or systems"; and examinations of positions and issues reported by the "American Agenda" staff (Loth, BOSTON GLOBE, 9/11). CBS' Sorenson plans "more above-the-fray pieces" too, but added: "There's nothing wrong with being on the bus." NBC "has steered a middle course, mixing interpretive stories" on issues "with a more skeptical approach to the campaign trail." NBC's Russert: "It shouldn't just be the food fight" (Kurtz, W. POST, 9/11).

OPINION: BOSTON GLOBE editorial on the recent studies which found "tilt" in TV political coverage: "[The 4 TV networks] are no more a media monolith than are the nation's daily newspapers.

... It is not the media's fault that the economy is in dismal shape and the federal emergency relief response to Hurricane Andrew got off to a shaky start. And it does not reflect a 'tilt' to report these stories. Nor is it the media's fault that there are still serious questions about the administration's 'tilt' to Iraq in the months before Saddam Hussein invaded Kuwait" (9/10). USA TODAY's Barbara Reynolds, under header "Weekend 'talking heads' are usually male and pale": "It is a sickening spectacle to watch the boring parade of conservative white males evaluating, reporting and debating major news events"

(9/11). Charles Krauthammer counts the federal deficit, foreign policy and family values as "real issues" which go undebated while Bush tries "to make the election a referendum on Clinton's character" and Clinton tries to make it a "referendum on Bush" (W. POST, 9/11). Sen. John Danforth (R-MO): "If the media would maybe do a better job of concentrating on the issue of the deficit and maybe less attention to say bus trips, I really do believe that the American people can be presented with a clear difference between the two presidential candidates" ("Nightline," ABC, 9/10).

*8 INSLAW: HOUSE DEMS REQUEST SPECIAL PROSECUTOR

The 21 Dems on the House Judiciary Cmte called on AG Wm Barr to name an independent counsel to investigate allegations that Justice Dept. officials in the early '80s stole case-management software from Inslaw, Inc. "and conspired to drive it into bankruptcy." In 11/91, Barr appointed ex-federal judge Nicholas Bua to investigate the charges on behalf of the DoJ. But noting the DoJ itself stood accused, House Judiciary chair Jack Brooks declared, "A full investigation by an individual not under the direct control of the attorney general is necessary. ... If ever there was a conflict of interest, this is it." At issue is the DoJ's abrupt cancellation of Inslaw's \$10 million contract and evidence that the exact software, Promis, was used anyway through means of "fraud" and "deceit." Accusations and allegations surrounding the case include those against ex-AG Ed Meese and evoke conspiracies involving possible money carriers from a 1980 "October Surprise" payoff to Iran and the death of investigate reporter Danny Casolaro under questionable circumstances. DoJ spokesperson Paul McNulty said the DoJ would respond to the request "in accordance with the independent counsel's statute." Last month, Barr rejected a similar request to appoint a prosecutor to look into the so-called "Iraq-gate" charges -- that the Bush admin. "secretly" funneled aid to Saddam Hussein prior to the Gulf War, "then tried to cover it up" (AP/W. TIMES, 9/11).

*9 FAMILY LEAVE: TO VETO OR COMPROMISE

"House Democrats tried to cram the family-values issue down President Bush's throat" (Clayton, HOUSTON CHRONICLE, 9/11). Hill Dems made their "most forceful entry into the Presidential campaign" (Clymer, N.Y. TIMES, 9/11). "Putting President Bush to the test on family values," the House passed a bill which would require employers to grant employees up to 12 weeks of unpaid leave to care for a new child or cope with serious illness. The margin of passage, 241-161, fell far short of the 290 needed for a veto-proof majority. The Senate had passed a similar bill by voice vote last month. "While Bush has repeatedly blasted the 'gridlock Democratic Congress' for blocking the domestic agenda, the obstacle this time is in the White House." This bill represents compromise between Dem and GOP Members. Bush vetoed "tougher" legislation two years ago as burdensome to business. Speaker Tom Foley: "[The gridlock] lies with the president. We think this is minimal protection for workers." Some GOP supporters of the bill "said a veto could undermine Bush's family values campaign." Rep. Marge Roukema (R-NJ): "You have to go beyond lip service. ... We're talking her about whether a woman can have a baby and keep her job" (Zalidivar, PHILA. INQUIRER, 9/11). Rep. Henry Hyde (R-IL): "Certainly one of the family values is caring about your spouse, caring about your children and caring about your parents -- to assert that you are for

family values requires you to support this bill" (N.Y. POST, 9/11). Opponents termed the bill a "job killer." House Min. Leader Bob Michel: "How does fewer jobs help families?" (W. POST, 9/11). Rep. Bob Walker (R-PA): "It undermines the job-creation ability of this economy." A WH official "dismissed the House vote as a political ploy and confirmed that Mr. Bush would veto this measure. But the official portrayed the administration as willing to negotiate an alternative, such as a tax credit or deduction for businesses that voluntarily provide such leave" (Trost, W.S. JOURNAL, 9/11).

GORE: Al Gore focused on the family leave issue in KY and NC. Gore in Lexington, KY: "Either [Bush] can change his mind and enact the first measure that Bill Clinton and I are advocating and make it law even before the election takes place. Or else he can hold on to the status quo and force Americans to read his lips on family values" (Louisville COURIER-JOURNAL, 9/11). At a Ronald McDonald House in Durham, NC, Gore called on Bush to sign the bill as "the first opportunity ... to put their words into action" (Raleigh NEWS & OBSERVER, 9/11). DNC chair Ron Brown: "The veto pen speaks louder and clearer about where President Bush stands on real family values than any speech or soundbite he may utter" (DNC release, 9/10).

MARILYN QUAYLE: In a N.Y. TIMES op-ed, Marilyn Quayle writes, "It's time to set the record stright" about what she said at the GOP convention. She calls "nonsense" that she was putting a higher value on mothers who stay at home over those who go to work. Quayle also defended her statement ("most women do not wish to be liberated from their essential natures as women") as consistent with feminist thought "that liberation wouldn't be worthwhile if it simply turned women into clones of men. ... It is no longer an either or situation." In the piece, she cites Carol Gilligan, Betty Friedan and Tom Wolfe (9/11).

*10 CONNECTICUT: BURNHAM'S ON-CAMERA SWEETNESS SOURS OFF AIR

State Rep. Christopher Burnham (R) and businessman Brook Johnson (R) "sounded more like running mates than rivals [9/8] during their second televised debate, aiming all their on-air criticism at" Sen. Christopher Dodd (D). But after the show aired on Storer Cable TV and radio station WELI, "the two camps later picked up where they left off" in their much "less friendly" campaign. When asked by reporters later "if the two candidates said anything to distinguish one from the other, Burnham said Johnson had already done that during the campaign by deciding to spend \$800,000 of his own money" to win the GOP nomination -- a figure Burnham called "obscene." Johnson spokesperson Mark Rivers: "It was typical of Chris to wait until the dust settles to lodge some cheap, personal attack" (Rosenthal, WATERBURY AMERICAN-REPUBLICAN, 9/9).

YEAH, THAT'S THE TICKET: Johnson "backtracked [9/9], saying he and a campaign aide erred in saying [he] had served on a Greenwich school board." During the 9/8 debate, Johnson said he had served "on the school board in Greenwich." An aide later clarified that "Johnson had served on the board of Greenwich Country Day School, not on the Board of Education." But officials at the Country Day School said "he had not served on their board either." Johnson spokesperson Mark Rivers told the HARTFORD COURANT Johnson's original statement was a "mistake" and that he "meant he served on the board of trustees" of the Day School, which his two children attend. But Day School chair David Brownwood "said Johnson never served on the board at the school. He said Johnson had served a few years on a compensation committee the board had formed to deal with staff salaries" (Rubinowitz, GREENWICH TIME, 9/10).

ENDORSEMENTS: Noting "party leaders on state and local levels are in Mr. Johnson's corner mostly," the NEW CANAAN ADVERTISER contends "The Republican Party needs the kind of personal and direct approach that Mr. Burnham would bring to the campaign as a candidate for the U.S. Senate" (9/10).

*11 NEW YORK: ABRAMS CLOSING GAP, HEATED DEBATE AND MORE

A N.Y. DAILY NEWS poll, conducted 9/7-9 by Political/Media Research, surveyed 835 likely voters; margin of error +/- 3.5%. Dem primary subsample: 356 Dem LVs; +/- 5.2% (9/11). Candidates to face Sen. Al D'Amato (R) in November: Ex-Rep. Geraldine Ferraro, AG Bob Abrams, NYC Comptroller Liz Holtzman, Rev. Al Sharpton.

ANOTHER POLL: After 2 nights of tracking, Marist Poll's Lee Miringoff sees a "close race emerging ... with Ferraro having a slight edge followed closely by Abrams. ... Interestingly, Abrams is the second choice between both Ferraro and Holtzman supporters and he has the lowest negatives. ... [There is] a very wide gender gap between Ferraro and Abrams. The gender gap is shaping the numbers right now. ... It looks to be a very low turnout, 20-25% range" (HOTLINE interview, 9/11).

DEBATE: Ferraro, Abrams and Holtzman "hurled mud, dirt and anything else they could find at each other ... in one of the toughest and meanest political debates in decades. ... Things got so hot" between Ferraro and Holtzman "that a clearly flustered" moderator "was forced to plead": "Ladies, ladies." Abrams "appeared far more confident than his opponents" (N.Y. POST, 9/11). Clashing "sharply over ethics," Ferraro's main rivals "repeatedly questioned her integrity and she responded by vigorously challenging their own." When asked if financial questions would make her vulnerable against D'Amato, Ferraro "immediately" said "no one had ever raised ethics questions about her" but Holtzman and Abrams "had been criticized for taking" contributions from people who do business with their offices." Sharpton received "the only applause of the evening" when he criticized the others "for spending too much time on such questions and losing perspective on pressing issues" (Purdum, N.Y. TIMES, 9/11).

DISCLOSURE: Ferraro "reversed herself" and added her 1984 and 1985 personal and family business tax filings to her previously released financial records because the "attacks on her integrity" were "'absolutely' hurting." The '85 report shows a \$5,000 error which was amended in '87 and the '84 return showed a \$25,003 payment to the IRS. Ferraro called for an end to the "double standard" exempting Holtzman and Abrams "from the same scrutiny" (Blumenthal, N.Y. TIMES, 9/11). "Instantly jettisoning the jaunty stance of front-runner that she had so carefully been nurturing," Ferraro "said the attacks" on her finances were "'destroying the target' -- herself -- and helping" Abrams (Verhovek, N.Y. TIMES, 9/11).

AD WATCH: Holtzman released a new ad, aides say her last. It is her "most pointed effort" to paint Ferraro as "sneaky and out of step" with NY Dems. **ANNCR:** "The New York Times on Ferraro's ethics: 'Fair-minded voters are left to wonder' Now, more revelations. Ferraro voted for school prayer. For tax breaks to schools that discriminate against blacks and Latinos. Even voted to make homosexuality a crime. ... Want to beat the sleaze and elect a woman? Liz Holtzman" (N.Y. TIMES, 9/11).

AD FALLOUT: While campaigning near her Brooklyn home Holtzman "got into a street fight" with a constituent who "challenged her" over her anti-Ferraro ads. Dave Landry: "Your commercials are offensive and negative." Holtzman gave him a "five-minute defense of her campaign" but Landry was "unimpressed" (Borges, N.Y. DAILY NEWS, 9/10).

CUOMO CALLS NEGATIVE PRIMARY A "DISASTER": "Publicly neutral" Gov. Cuomo called the "bitter" Dem primary a "disaster" and "blasted" Abrams and Holtzman for "the most undesirable tactics" for their attacks on Ferraro (N.Y. POST, 9/10).

ENDORSEMENTS: VILLAGE VOICE backs Holtzman "in a tough decision" between her and Abrams: "She has Washington experience that Abrams lacks [and] she was a terrific congresswoman" (9/15 issue). N.Y. POST backs Abrams although "he stands significantly to the left" of the paper: "We admire the [AG]. He's smart,

dogged and open-minded." The POST criticized Ferraro for choosing to "wrap herself" in the "Year of the Woman" (9/11). "Boring Bob for Senate" is the header over N.Y. POST's Hamill endorsement of Abrams: "For years and years he has done his job. That is no small thing. ... He shows up. He works" (9/10).

DO YOU HAVE A RECEIPT? "Top" NYC atty Theodore Freidman donated \$1,000 to Ferraro last month, but after reading about her TV spots stressing her support for the death penalty "he wants it back." He wants to split the money among Abrams, Holtzman and Rev. Al Sharpton (D) (N.Y. POST, 9/10).

GERRY'S PLACE: N.Y. NEWSDAY's Arena & Greene report Ferraro's mother, who according to current TV spots "crocheted beads on dresses to support her family," was the "licensed owner of a bar and pizzeria" called "Gerry's Place" after her daughter. Ferraro spokesperson Frank Wilkinson "could not explain" why Ferraro has never mentioned Gerry's Place in her speeches or biographies: "The fact that her mother invested in a bar doesn't mean she didn't sew on beads" (9/10).

MORE: Ferraro's husband John Zaccaro was refused a liquor license 7/92 because he was convicted of real estate fraud in 1985. Spokesperson Frank Wilkinson "conceded" on the race: "I'm sure there will be some tightening." Abrams: "Her lead is eroding." NY Dem chair John Marino: "This is going to be close." Campaign "insiders" say Ferraro's lead has "closed significantly, probably to within five to eight points" (N.Y. POST, 9/10).

COUNTDOWN: The candidates "have spent \$3 million and a year

campaigning" but the 9/15 primary "comes down to this: Has any candidate convinced the voters he or she will change the Senate?" On the GOP side, the candidates "are calling each other names -- such as 'incumbent.'" And in the "slightly more civilized" Dem primary, Murray and Bonker "are fighting over whether the inexperienced Murray could get anything done." All five candidates "are using the word 'change' like a talisman as they battle for votes. And they all say they are outsiders although they bring 75 years of government experience to the ballot box" (Boren, SEATTLE POST-INTELLIGENCER, 9/11).

THANK YOU, THANK YOU, THANK YOU: The Robert Stephen Carter family donated \$16,000 to the Thorsness campaign 9/1, and a week later Thorsness "opened the morning newspaper to find an unauthorized advertisement promoting his campaign." The ad bought by Carter for \$22,000 ran in newspapers statewide, Thorsness had only bought \$30,000 in advertising himself. But "most astonishing is that Thorsness and his campaign staff have hardly a clue about the man behind the unexpected largess." Thorsness spokesperson Kent Patton: "We really don't know much about him. It's odd. If you find out more, I would like to know more too." Carter said he was a delegate to the state GOP convention when he first heard Thorsness speak and was "struck by Thorsness' candor and values." Carter: "I just felt it was a point in my life to do what was right and good for the country." The ad is entitled "Why I'm voting for Leo Thorsness" with the disclaimer, "Paid by Steve Carter, a private citizen like you" (Maier, SEATTLE POST-INTELLIGENCER, 9/11).

*14 MASSACHUSETTS: EYES ON FOUR IMPERILED INCUMBENTS

Front-page BOSTON HERALD editorial header: "Time for a change in Congress." Noting voters on 9/15 will get the chance to "vote in favor of the same old same old or vote in favor of a fresh start," the HERALD urges voting out four Dem incumbents -- Reps. Joe Early (D-03), Chet Atkins (D-05), Nick Mavroules (D-06) and Gerry Studds (D-10). They have "clearly overstayed their welcomes and outlived their usefulness" (9/10). BOSTON PHOENIX's Keller, mentioning Mavroules, Early and Studds: "Challengers ... may quarrel with the claim, but the proven ability of these incumbents to deliver federal goodies through their committee seniority is likely to weigh heavily with economically fearful voters" (9/11 issue). BOSTON GLOBE's Nolan writes MA has been "historically slow to oust congressional incumbents. ... The tradition seems certain to change" (9/10).

MA 03: HERALD endorses ex-state Rep. Gerry D'Amico (D) over Early and state Rep. Peter Blute in the GOP primary (9/10). State Treas. Joe Malone (R) also endorsed Blute, prompting state Rep. David Lionett (R) to claim Malone broke a "no-endorsement pledge." Aides to the pro-choice Lionett "speculated" Malone caved into "pro-life pressure." Both Malone and Blute "oppose abortion in most cases." Lionett was backed by "The Big Tent," the MA chapter of the Nat'l Republican Coalition for Choice. The group "ignored" Michelle Flaherty (R), a "strong" pro-choice supporter. Lionett was previously backed by pro-choice GOP LG Paul Cellucci (HERALD, 9/10). D'Amico was endorsed by the Coalition for Lesbian and Gay Civil Rights (GLOBE, 9/9).

MA 05: HERALD endorses ex-Middlesex Co. asst. DA Martin Meehan (D) over Atkins and businessman Michael Conway over ex-Rep. Paul Cronin in the GOP primary (9/10). In a debate, Meehan "intimated" Atkins should have been prosecuted for an '81 episode in which Atkins, as state Sen. Ways and Means cmte chair, "slashed a judge's staff for refusing to hire a friend" of Sen. Pres. Billy Bulger. Atkins called it a "political mistake" (GLOBE, 9/11). Meehan was also endorsed by ex-MA AG Jim Shannon, who represented the 5th before Atkins. Shannon said Atkins "just hasn't been around doing the job. I think he's frankly lost interest in it" (BOSTON GLOBE, 9/10). Atkins spokesperson Pat Halley noted Meehan used to work as Shannon's congressional press secretary (HERALD, 9/10). Assuming he wins, Cronin announced he will host HUD Sec. Jack Kemp at a 9/23 fund-raiser (GLOBE, 9/10). From a GLOBE profile: "In the old mill cities of Lawrence and Lowell, which form the core of the 5th [CD], Atkins's Yankee background, suburban address and reserved personality sometimes overshadow his reputation as an effective politician who has won significant aid for his district" (Zitner, 9/10).

MA 06: HERALD endorses local Dem official/JFK school admin. Eric Elbot (D) over Mavroules and state Rep. Barbara Hildt (D), and backs ex-state Rep. Peter Torkildsen over ex-MA GOP exec. dir. Sandy Tennant in the GOP primary (9/10). Torkildsen seemed to rebut charges by Tennant, made in debates and a new Tennant TV ad, that Torkildsen switched his abortion position after reviewing poll results. The ad charges Torkildsen "took a poll and flip-flopped." Torkildsen pollster David Williams released completed questionnaires dated after Torkildsen's abortion announcement. Tennant said he would pull the ad if true, but still "acknowledged" he "cannot prove" the charge (HERALD, 9/10).

Asst US Atty Jonathan Chiel said the government has lined up 50 witnesses to testify against Mavroules in his corruption trial. U.S. Dist. Judge David Mazzone said the case is not likely to go to trial until 1/93 (HERALD, 9/10). The US Atty's office has offered immunity to Mavroules' brother, George, and Walter Roache, his boyhood companion, "in anticipation that they will testify" against Mavroules (GLOBE, 9/11). In a debate, Mavroules answered charges from Elbot that legal problems would impede his effectiveness: "If I can handle what I have the last few months, I can handle the future" (GLOBE, 9/11). PHOENIX's Keller writes with 40,000 Dem voters in "Mavroules strongholds" of Lynn, Peabody and Salem, "it will take a genuine electoral earthquake to dislodge the incumbent, indictments be damned" (9/11 issue).

MA 10: HERALD endorses state Sen. Paul Harold (D) over Studds and ex-Weld Cabinet member Dan Daly over atty Michael Crossen in the GOP primary (9/10). Accompanied by veterans leaders, Harold accused Studds of backing a single-payer national health plan that would result in the closing of V.A. hospitals. Harold backs a "pay or play" plan which calls on employers to provide coverage. Studds responded the single-payer plan will keep V.A. hospitals open and also allow vets to receive government-funded care at other hospitals. Rep. Marty Russo (D-IL), the sponsor of the single-payer plan, said Harold "doesn't know what he is talking about" (GLOBE, 9/10).

*15 NY HOUSE

NY 03: Rep. Norm Lent (R-04) is retiring. Nassau Co. exec. Peter King (R) successfully challenged signatures on author/banker Robert Previdi's (R) nominating petitions last month leaving Previdi 6 signatures short of the minimum. The Appellate Court decided unanimously in favor of Previdi's appeal so he is now in Supreme Court arguing the validity of 3 signatures. Previdi calls the primary -- "assuming there is one" -- as between "A New Republican Party" which he "vows to create" and "the old Nassau GOP 'clique'" (Vincent, N.Y. NEWSDAY, 9/8).

NY 05: Reps. Bob Mrazek (D-03) and Gary Scheuer (D-08) are retiring. Rep. Gary Ackerman (D-07) is "caressing the worry beads" because he "faces an unexpectedly stiff challenge" from professor Rita Morris (D) (Seifman, N.Y. POST, 9/10).

NY 12: Insiders say Rep. Stephen Solarz "has the most to worry about" of all NYC incumbents. Longtime activist Elizabeth Colon (D) and local Puerto Rican rep Nydia Velasquez (D) are considered his toughest challengers (Seifman, N.Y. POST, 9/10). Colon was endorsed by the N.Y. TIMES "enthusiastically" (9/9). Ex-Puerto Rican Defense and Education Fund head Ruben Franco (R) will appear on the Liberal line in November (N.Y. POST, 9/10). VILLAGE VOICE endorsed Colon "because we believe she has put together a stronger multi-ethnic coalition. ... She's done her job of reaching out to every part of the district" (9/15 issue).

NY 17: Rep. Eliot Engel (D-19) faces convicted felon/ex-Rep. Mario Biaggi (D). N.Y. POST's McAlary criticizes Phil Caruso, "head of the city's largest police union" for standing "arm-in-arm" and endorsing Biaggi -- "the most graceless sleazebag in the history of city politics." Biaggi "is fond of saying 'Let the voters decide.'" But 24 people -- two sets of juries -- have already voted him a common thief" (9/10).

NY 24: Rep. Dave O'B. Martin (R) is retiring. Dems: retired civilian worker Danny Francis, NH presidential candidate Stephen Burke and wife of '88 Martin challenger Margaret Rosencraft. GOPers: state Sen. John McHugh and John Hosley.

NY 26: Binghamtom mayor Juanita Crabb (D), Assemblyman Maurice Henchy (D) and social worker Barbara Wolfson (D) face off to challenge businessman Bob Moppert (R) for retiring Rep. Matt McHugh's (D-28) seat.

NY 30: Rep. Henry Nowak (D-33) is retiring. Erie Co. exec. Dennis Gorski faces off with Sheriff Tom Higgins (D) to challenge Jack Quinn (R).

Minge faces farmer Pat O'Reilly (DFL) and LaRouchie Andrew Olson (DFL) in the 9/15 primary. '90 Gov. nominee/ex-state Rep. Cal Ludeman (IR) is unopposed.

MN 05: Minneapolis STAR-TRIBUNE editorial: Rep. Martin Sabo (DFL) is "running for his congressional life." He faces financial planner Lisa Neibauer-Stall (DFL) in the 9/15 primary. "He deserves to win. But voters are the beneficiaries when a 14-year congressman who is usually a shoo-in for reelection has to work for it" (9/2). ST. PAUL PIONEER PRESS editorial: "Neibauer-Stall just doesn't make her case that Mr. Sabo's enough a part of the Washington problem for the voters of the 5th District to throw him out. Our nod goes to" Sabo (9/6). On IR side, banking officer Stephen Moriarty won the IR endorsement by default over corrections counselor Buzz Gilbertson (IR). Gilbertson, who was the IR-endorsed candidate against Sabo in the past two elections, did not seek the endorsement because of a family emergency. But Gilbertson "believes his name recognition and his campaigning" give him the edge (PIONEER PRESS, 9/6).

OK 02: Rep. Mike Synar (D-02) was one of 122 Reps. exonerated by the DoJ this week in its investigation of the House bank scandal (PHOENIX, 9/10). Ex-Reagan press sec. James Brady held a news conference in Tulsa 9/8 to defend Synar who has been "under attack" from the NRA. Brady praised Synar for supporting the Brady Bill. Synar, who did not attend the press conference, "said Brady's visit gave him the opportunity" to dispute the pro-gun control record the NRA has suggested he has: "I am not for gun control. I am adamantly opposed to it, but I think a seven-day waiting period to assist our police is something that is very reasonable" (Martindale, TULSA WORLD, 9/9). In a published letter to the TULSA TRIBUNE, Handgun Control chair Sarah Brady writes, "The [NRA] would like to see Synar out of office because he didn't put the NRA's special interests before his constituents' interests" (9/8). The NRA ran a full-page ad in the TULSA TRIBUNE and the TULSA WORLD warning, "If Synar Wins, Hunters Lose" (9/10). Synar received the endorsement of consumer advocate Ralph Nader and the 50-million member Consumer Federation of America (Muskogee PHOENIX & TIMES DEMOCRAT, 9/10). Synar faces ex-Muskogee Co. D.A. Drew Edmondson (D) in the 9/15 runoff. '90 Congress nom. Terry Gorham (R) and physician Jerry Hill (R) meet in the GOP runoff.

OK 05: State Rep. Ernest Istook (R) "criticized" '90 GOP nominee Bill Price (R) for failing to file his FEC report on time. The report was due 9/3. Price media consultant Jack Edens said "it was an old-fashioned error." Istook also complained about fliers distributed by Price supporters at an Oklahoma City gun show that cited the NRA's endorsement of Price and "said Istook opposes the Second Amendment right to own guns." Istook, in a release: "Don't believe the lies" (DAILY OKLAHOMAN, 9/9). YUKON REVIEW editorial: "Voters should be informed of the real truths about Istook's effectiveness" as a state Rep. His '92-session attendance was "one of the worst 11 in the House of [Reps.]. He missed a total of 91 votes. ... Bill Price remains

the man to represent the voters of the 5th District. A vote for Istook means a vote for ineffectiveness" (9/5). Runoff 9/15.

*19 NORTH CAROLINA: HUNT LIKELY TO FACE HORTON-ESQUE TV ADS

Ex-Gov. Jim Hunt's (D) "release of a murderer, at the insistence" of the FBI and the DoJ in '84, "is a question of being tough or soft on crime" said LG Jim Gardner (R). Hunt released convicted murderer Roy Lee Fox because "federal law enforcement officials urged him to in return for Fox's help in winning the conviction of drug kingpin Jamiel Chagra." Hunt "who says in hindsight it was a mistake, reluctantly agreed to requests" from the FBI and the DoJ after Chagra was sentenced to life in prison. The sentence was partly due to information gathered by Fox. Two years after being released from prison, Fox murdered a 39-year-old farmer. Gardner spokesperson Tom Ballu: "It's an example of two things. One, that Jim Hunt did not do a good job fighting crime while he was governor (and) two, that voters should look at his records more than his rhetoric." Gardner: "I would never, ever as governor commute the sentence of a murderer. To let him off simply because he squealed on someone else -- never." Hunt spokesperson Rachel Perry, noting a 46% increase in violent crime since '84 said, "on his (Gardner's) watch the state has become the most dangerous state in the country" (Efron, Greensboro NEWS & RECORD, 9/9). "The incident may turn out" to "be the stuff for a campaign commercial." Gardner officials "won't confirm it, but it's likely they'll use the case in a TV commercial." Gardner Media consultants, National Media Inc. "have produced some of the nastiest commercials in political history" according to Advertising Age magazine (Efron, NEWS & RECORD, 9/9).

DEBATE: Gardner and Hunt "met face-to-face" for the first time in a TV debate that Hunt called "mean-spirited" and Gardner called "hard-hitting." Gardner continually hit Hunt on the parole issue, while Hunt criticized Gardner's "failed business record" (Patterson, NEWS & RECORD, 9/11). Gardner: "You talk like John Rambo now, but you were like Minnie Mouse, when you were governor." Hunt "defended his tenure" and "counterpunched with questions about the collapse of Gardner's real estate and hotel empire" during the '70's. Hunt: "State government should be run like a business. But I hope you don't get to run it like one of your businesses" (Christensen, Raleigh NEWS & OBSERVER, 9/11).

ABORTION: Hunt and Gardner "staked out very different territory on abortion" 8/31. Hunt "picked up an endorsement from" the NC chapter of NARAL, saying he's "firmly pro-choice." Hunt: "If I'm elected, we will not restrict a woman's right to choose." Gardner said "he is opposed to abortion except in cases of rape, incest or death of the mother" (Lineberry, DURHAM HERALD-SUN, 9/1).

Bush Hits Trail To Sell Economic Plan

Update with Bush says 'don't let other side scare you,' calls for new free-trade agreements, Bond promised Senate won't block F-15 sale.

JOPLIN, Mo. (AP) — With a job-saving foreign arms deal as a campaign bonus, President Bush sought to sell his repackaged economic renewal agenda to Midwestern voters today, saying: "Do not let the other side try to scare you into thinking we're not up to the job."

"I'm asking for a mandate to put my solutions into action and get this country moving," Bush said at a rally on the sunny campus of Missouri Southern State College.

"I'm confident I will win this election because I know America doesn't scare easily," Bush said.

He said Democratic presidential nominee Bill Clinton is "running a Freddy Krueger and he is more interested in scaring people than in dealing with this country's real problems." Bush said he wants free-trade agreements east and west to build the American economy "and we will do it by the end of my second term, the end of the next four years."

He accused Clinton of waffling on trade. "I don't recall ever hearing leadership defined as please leave a message and we'll get back to you later," Bush said. "It doesn't work that way. There's no call waiting on the phone at the Oval Office. You have to make decisions."

Bush had already signaled his plan to approve the sale of F-15 jet fighter planes to Saudi Arabia, and he arranged a campaign stop in St. Louis to announce it at McDonnell Douglas Corp., where the jobs are.

The president had said the sale was in the works and had promised it would not put Israeli military superiority at risk. The Saudis want to buy 72 planes in a \$6 billion deal with terms still being negotiated. Building them would preserve 7,000 defense jobs, according to the company.

It was the second time the president had built an overseas arms sale into his campaign for reelection; last week he announced that he was approving the sale of F-16 jets to Taiwan in Fort Worth, Texas, at the plant where they are built.

Democratic presidential nominee Bill Clinton has said he will support the Saudi sale on condition that it not threaten Israel's military advantage in the Middle East. Bush assured a Jewish group on Tuesday that it won't.

Sen. Christopher Bond, R-Mo., told reporters he promised Bush some months ago enough Senate support — a third plus one vote — to prevent the sale from being blocked. He said the Saudis were determined to buy planes, if not F-15s then British-made Tornados, and added that U.S. control of spare parts and maintenance would ensure the planes will not be used against Israel.

Bond, a former governor who is up for reelection, said Bush is running behind in Missouri, a battleground state with 11 electoral votes.

On Thursday, Bush made a high-profile effort to put a new look on his economic proposals by combining them in one package. He

also outlined second-term goals that included a start toward doubling the size of the sluggish U.S. economy by the early years of the 21st century.

"We can do that," Bush claimed. The president acknowledged that economic growth has been anemic, but won't stay that way. In a speech billed as a major campaign milestone, Bush told the Economic Club of Detroit on Thursday that he was prepared to slash White House and congressional spending, and to cut top-level federal salaries as part of a quest to save money that could finance a 1 percentage point cut in the income tax rate along with capital gains and small business tax reductions.

Bush didn't advocate those specific cuts, just cited them as examples of what could be done with the savings "if we discipline spending." He's sought a capital gains tax reduction since taking office, but Congress has balked at his terms.

"He wants to give another big tax cut to the wealthy and a small sop to the middle class," said Democratic presidential nominee Bill Clinton.

The Bush program was printed in a 29-page campaign pamphlet, "Agenda for American Renewal" with Bush's signature emblazoned on the dark blue cover. Five-minute advertisements highlighting the Bush address were broadcast as campaign ads on the television networks Thursday night, and voters were invited to call in for copies of the booklet.

It was Bush's third major effort to put his economic program into a package that would register with the voters and help him overtake Clinton on the issues that troubles them most, the recession and sluggish recovery.

The sequence began with his State of the Union proposals last winter; he tried again in his address to the Republican National Convention. Bush and his campaigners have complained repeatedly that he has a solid economic game plan that hasn't succeeded only because Congress won't let him implement it.

Mrs. Quayle Cries Foul Over 'Grotesque' Accounts of Her Speech

WASHINGTON (AP) — The wife of a political candidate is crying foul, saying her remarks and opinions are being distorted. But the complaint isn't coming from Hillary Clinton. This time it's Marilyn Quayle.

Mrs. Quayle, wife of the vice president, said her speech to the Republican convention is coming back to her "in grotesque, often unrecognizable forms."

"The great hazard of stating one's views publicly, in one's own words, is that they will be misunderstood or, for political reasons, deliberately misconstrued," she wrote in an opinion piece published Friday in The New York Times.

Her comment was ironic in light of the full-bore Republican attack on Mrs. Clinton, an influential lawyer and wife of Democratic nominee Bill Clinton, at its convention last month. Party figures made repeated attacks on her writings and statements that legal scholars and others said were misleading or dead wrong.

One complaint was that Mrs. Clinton wants to let children sue their parents who ask them to take out the garbage — drawing from an article on the legal rights of children whose futures may be affected by abuse or medical decisions, for example.

In a series of interviews since the convention, Mrs. Clinton has said the Republican Party completely distorted what she has written and her longtime commitment to education and other children's issues.

Mrs. Quayle's convention speech praised traditional "family values" of women who stay at home to raise their kids. It was widely interpreted as a put-down of those who don't — including Mrs. Clinton, who practiced law while Mrs. Quayle gave up her practice.

The vice president's wife said she was astonished that some thought "I implied that women who work are somehow less admirable than women who stay home with their children. This is nonsense. I never said that," she said.

Mrs. Quayle said one part of her speech had been "subject to particularly wild and hostile misinterpretation" — her claim that liberals are angry because most women "do not wish to be liberated from their essential natures as women."

She said feminist Betty Friedan and psychologist Carol Gilligan both have argued that women and men are different. All she meant, she said, was that "we don't have to reject our essential natures as women to prosper in what was once the domain of men."

Mrs. Quayle is an important adviser to her husband and her work as an important adviser hardly makes her a stay-at-home mom. Her conclusion: "Perhaps this is all too delicate to discuss in a political year."

Quayle drew wide ridicule for instructing a boy in a spelling bee in a Trenton, N.J., classroom on June 15 to add the extra letter e at the end of the word potato, thus misspelling it "potatoe."

Quayle said he took his cue from an errant "teacher spelling card ... and we're still talking about it."

"C'mon, give me a break, folks," said Quayle. But he added, "We all make mistakes."

President Undergoes Prostate Operation

PARIS (AP) — President Francois Mitterrand underwent prostate surgery today, and his doctors said he was in satisfactory condition.

On Thursday night, Mitterrand, 75, was admitted in secrecy to the urology section of Cochin hospital in Paris to prepare for his first operation since becoming president in 1981.

The operation took place just 10 days before a hotly contested referendum on a European Community treaty for a closer union. An official communique indicated the surgery wasn't elective, referring to urinary problems that "evolved rapidly."

His doctors, Adolphe Steg and Claude Gubler, said in a statement that the operation went smoothly. They deined to say how long the president would remain in the hospital.

The announcement of Mitterrand's operation did not provoke a major reaction on the Paris stock exchange. The main index rose slightly in the 30 minutes following the news.

Aides said Mitterrand remained capable of carrying out his duties and would not transfer powers temporarily to Premier Pierre Berezgouy.

Dr. Pierre Attignac, a urologist with the American Hospital of Paris, told the television channel TFI that most people who undergo this type of surgery are hospitalized for four to five days, then be able to resume regular activities without any difficulties. Mitterrand has suffered few serious medical problems during his presidency. His doctors have released twice-yearly reports on his health. The most recent report, issued July 22, said he was healthy.

Last week, Mitterrand impressed the public with a forceful three-hour appearance on national television when he defended the Maastricht treaty on European political and economic union, which will be subject to a referendum on Sept. 20.

On Thursday afternoon, shortly before entering the hospital, Mitterrand took a stroll through the grounds of the presidential palace with Israel's foreign minister, Shimon Peres.

Mitterrand, who will turn 76 next month, was re-elected to a second seven-year term in 1988.

Several of his medical problems have occurred during travels aboard. He suffered severe back pains during a visit to Mexico in 1981, was briefly overcome by the heat while visiting a museum in Niger in 1982 and in 1989 became ill during a welcoming ceremony at the airport in Caracas, Venezuela.

Proposed Questions and Talking Points

1. First Mr. President, on the Agenda for American Renewal you described yesterday -- why did you wait until now to do this?

Now is the right time to look forward and set out my agenda for my next term.

With the old Congress beginning it's final session, Americans are all too ready to look ahead to next year, to the new Congress. As many as one third will be new members I can work with.

I've set forth my agenda now because it's time for Americans to make a choice -- a choice between two very different agendas and two very different candidates.

2. What's new about your agenda?

It's a new approach. It doesn't deal with just a few of our problems. It deals with them all. It recognizes that domestic, economic and foreign problems are connected and must be solved together.

It's about expanding global trade ... sharpening the competitive edge of American business ... preparing our children .

We've got to promote economic opportunity ... ensure economic security ... and we've got to right size a government that's too big.

Our goal is a ten trillion dollar economy by the early years of the next century.

3. What are some of differences between your agenda and Bill Clinton's proposals?

We have fundamentally different approaches. Mine is based on my belief in the individual, in less government and lower taxes. He believes in more government, \$150 billion in new taxes and \$220 billion in new spending.

And while we're on the subject of Governor Clinton, let me say he should be ashamed of the fear-mongering and scare tactics he is using on senior citizens. When he says I want to cut Social Security and medical benefits, he knows he is not telling the truth. My plan guarantees full funding for cost of living increases and for new Americans coming into the system.

ECONOMIC PLAN (Walter Mears, AP) -- President Bush took his repackaged economic renewal agenda to Midwestern voters, asking for an election mandate to "tax less, spend less, cut the deficit" and curb the federal government. On Thursday, Bush made a high-profile effort to put a new look in his economic proposals by combining them in one package. "He wants to give another big tax cut to the wealthy and a small sop to the middle class," said Bill Clinton. Clinton adviser James Carville, speaking on NBC's "Today" show, said "In 1988, George Bush got up and said 30 million new jobs and no new taxes and ended up with 30 million new taxes and no new jobs, and now it's the same deja vu all over again." Sen. Dole said Bush was "right on track" while Rep. Gephardt called the plan "a tired retread." Speaker Foley said it was an attempt to revitalize Bush's campaign, not the economy.

CAMPAIGN/BRADY (New York/Reuter) -- Secretary Brady said that President Bush has already outlined the spending cuts he plans to introduce if he is re-elected, including reductions in defense spending. "These cuts have been outlined for over three budgets that the President has previously submitted (to the Congress). They're programs that he has outlined in his previous budgets to be cut," Brady said on "CBS This Morning." Queried on whether more military spending cuts were in store, he replied, "Well, there are some defense cuts in there, but they've already been outlined."

PRICES (Reuter) -- Wholesale prices rose a scant 0.1% in August, the government reported, providing further evidence that the stagnant economy is keeping prices in check. The rise in the Producer Price Index, reported by the Labor Department, was the same increase as in July. It was the fourth straight month of insignificant increases, bringing the total rate of wholesale inflation this year to a seasonally adjusted 1.7%.

SOMALIA (Bardera, Somalia/AP) -- U.S. planes carrying rice, beans, grain and oil to a western Somali town were forced to return to their Kenyan base because of a dispute among local truckers. Meanwhile, the U.N. postponed airdrops of food for starving people in rural areas until the weekend to better organize ground operations, a U.N. agency spokeswoman said. The U.S. military planes were unable to land at Belet Huen after the losing party in a contract dispute between two rival Somali trucking firms parked its trucks on the airstrip, said a spokeswoman for AID. The planes returned to their Kenyan airbase.

Bush expected to announce jets sale to Saudis

WASHINGTON, Reuter - President Bush is expected to announce Friday that he has approved the sale of F-15 jet fighters to Saudi Arabia, administration officials said.

One official, who spoke on condition of anonymity, said Bush was expected to grant Saudi Arabia all of the 72 jets it had requested.

The announcement was likely to come during a campaign visit to St. Louis, where much of the aircraft is made.

Last week, Bush announced that he was scrapping 10 years of U.S. policy by selling 150 F/16 fighter jets to Taiwan.

Bush, caught in an uphill battle for re-election, has been trying to revive the nation's economy and reverse its rising unemployment rate.

Officials said the sale of the fighter jets to Saudi Arabia could save as many as 7,000 jobs and benefit a total of 50,000 workers in the defense industry.

News From the Hill

HOUSE FLOOR: Family leave bill clears, faces Bush veto.

House members yesterday cleared a bill (S 5) to grant up to 12 weeks of unpaid leave to workers with newborn or newly adopted children or ill family members.

The 241-161 vote to approve the conference agreement sets up an election-year showdown with President Bush, who vetoed similar legislation two years ago. The tally was 27 votes short of the two-thirds majority needed to override a veto.

During debate on the measure, Democrats tried to turn the Bush presidential campaign's family values theme to their favor. "How can you be for family values and against family leave?" asked Majority Whip David E. Bonior, D-Mich.

Under the bill, employers with 50 or more workers would have to provide employees with up to 12 weeks of family leave and continue their medical coverage during their absence.

Republicans accused Democrats of playing politics by sending the bill to Bush two months before the presidential election. "If this bill was so important to the Democratic leadership, why has it been held in legislative limbo for almost a year?" asked Minority Leader Robert H. Michel, R-Ill. Bush and many GOP members oppose the measure because they say it represents a hidden tax on businesses.

Consumer Safety. Legislation (HR 4706) that would reauthorize the Consumer Product Safety Commission and mandate new child safety regulations passed the House by voice vote yesterday.

The watch-dog agency would be reauthorized at a fiscal 1993 level of \$42.1 million and a fiscal 1994 level of \$43.3 million. The measure also requires that warning labels be placed on toys with small parts that could choke very young children.

• The House will not meet today.

SENATE FLOOR: Product liability bill killed; Treasury bill debated.

At press time last night, the Senate

was debating the \$22.7 billion fiscal 1993 spending bill (HR 5488) for the Treasury Department, the Postal Service and various White House offices.

In a procedural vote, members rejected, 49-49, an amendment by Terry Sanford, D-N.C., that would have brought into parity the payments provided to some Social Security recipients, commonly known as "notch babies", who, because of the date of their birth, receive less in Social Security benefits than some of their peers.

Product Liability. The Senate effectively ended action on product liability legislation this year after supporters were unable to round up enough votes to cut off a certain filibuster on the measure (S 640).

Members voted, 58-38, on a motion to limit debate and proceed to the bill — two votes short of what was needed. An earlier cloture vote also failed, 57-39.

Sponsors had worked both sides of the aisle, trying to win supporters. A key vote switch that helped doom consideration of the bill was cast by Bob Kerry, D-Neb., who earlier favored the measure. Senate Majority Leader George J. Mitchell, D-Maine, urged members to vote against cloture, saying too much time would be consumed by debate on the measure this late in the congressional year.

Bill supporters argue that the current system has led to excessive jury awards and high legal costs.

Opponents say the bill would limit victims' ability to sue manufacturers.

The bill would have set national standards to be used to determine how victims of faulty products should be compensated.

• The Senate will be in briefly today before many members leave to attend funeral services for the late Sen. Quentin N. Burdick, D-N.D.

Late Wednesday. The Senate late yesterday passed, 92-3, the fiscal 1993 spending bill for the departments of Veterans Affairs and Housing and Urban Development and related agencies.

The \$87.8 billion measure (HR 5679)

is the eighth of the 13 regular spending bills to pass the Senate this year. The House has completed action on all 13 bills.

Trade Representative. Also late Wednesday, the Senate passed, by voice vote, a two-year reauthorization bill (S 2880) for the Office of the U.S. Trade Representative (USTR), the U.S. International Trade Commission (ITC) and the U.S. Customs Service.

The bill would authorize fiscal 1993 spending of \$22 million for the USTR, \$45 million for the ITC and roughly \$1.5 billion for the Customs Service, including \$139 million for air and marine drug interdiction programs.

CABLE BILL conferees finish; approve tougher rate regulation.

Congress and President Bush moved closer toward a battle over the future of cable television Wednesday when House and Senate conferees agreed, by voice vote, on a bill that would set rates for cable programs while attempting to spur competition in the \$20 billion industry.

Bush has vowed to veto the measure (S 12), arguing that cable competition can be achieved without more regulation by allowing telephone companies to own and deliver video programming.

The bill that emerged from conference is somewhat tougher on rate regulation than either chambers' original version. It also contains a controversial Senate provision that would allow local broadcasters to demand compensation for the use of their over-the-air signals by cable operators — signals that cable systems now may snatch out of the air free of charge.

But two House provisions addressing future trends in cable television — foreign ownership of cable systems and the migration of sports events from free television to pay television — were dropped from the bill.

Conferees accepted the House bill's process for requiring the Federal Communications Commission to set a price for basic cable television service. The commission would have to set its price based on several factors, including the price of basic cable service in the few areas that do have competing cable or satellite systems. That could result in basic cable fees dropping by as much as 30 percent, bill sponsors said.

ENERGY CONFEREES approve energy efficiency provisions.

House and Senate conferees made headway yesterday on a comprehensive energy bill (HR 776), tentatively adopting by voice vote provisions that would mandate minimum energy efficiency standards for certain appliances.

Senate Energy Committee Chairman J. Bennett Johnston, D-La., laid out a plan to complete work on the measure in the next two weeks and warned fellow conferees that time was running out to finish a bill this year.

The minimum energy efficiency standards would apply to certain electric motors, commercial heating and air conditioners, certain lights and showerheads.

Conferees also approved a federal program to promote electric vehicles and give states more power to enforce octane posting requirements.

When the panel meets next week, the conferees are expected to consider provisions relating to the Strategic Petroleum Reserve and renewable energy.

DISASTER AID approved minus Homestead Air Force funds.

The Senate Appropriations Committee yesterday approved \$7.5 billion in fiscal 1992 emergency aid for areas in Florida and Louisiana hammered by Hurricane Andrew last month.

The aid was added to the House-passed, fiscal 1992 defense supplemental appropriations bill (HR 5620), which is intended to cover costs leftover from Operation Desert Storm. The vote on HR 5620 was unanimous, 25-0.

The measure also includes \$195 million for Guam, still recovering from Typhoon Omar.

Panel members did not include funds requested by the White House to rebuild Florida's destroyed Homestead Air Force Base. Committee members voted 12-8 to withhold \$480 million for reconstruction until a commission on military base closures decides next year whether the Homestead base should stay open.

The committee did approve \$26 million for cleanup work at the base, including demolition of damaged buildings and removal of rubble.

Like an \$8.8 billion House bill (HR 5911) introduced on Wednesday and a similar proposal by Bush, the Senate measure contains grants and loans to help individuals, businesses and governments rebuild from the most expensive natural disaster in the nation's history.

The House bill includes the administration's request to rebuild the Homestead base.

The Senate committee also included unrelated language by Sen. Tom Harkin, D-Iowa, that would lift the administration ban on abortion counseling at federally funded family planning clinics. The same

language was included in the fiscal 1993 Labor, Health and Human Services, and Education spending bill (HR 5677), also approved by the panel yesterday.

LABOR-HHS bill, with abortion language, heads to Senate floor.

The Senate Appropriations Committee yesterday approved a \$241 billion fiscal 1993 spending bill (HR 5677) for the departments of Labor, Health and Human Services (HHS), and Education. The funding level is about \$3 billion less than what is in the House-passed version of the bill.

During panel debate, Labor, Health and Human Services, Education Subcommittee Chairman Tom Harkin, D-Iowa, complained that the spending caps imposed by the 1990 budget agreement kept the increase for discretionary programs in the bill to only 2 percent, a level that is less than the amount needed just to keep the roughly \$60 billion worth of programs over which appropriators have direct control even with inflation.

Harkin vowed to offer an amendment on the floor to move just over \$4 billion in funds from the defense side of the ledger to the domestic side. Under the 1990 budget law, fiscal 1993 funds cannot be shifted among the three spending categories: defense, domestic and international.

The committee also set the stage for abortion battles over the bill by adding provisions virtually certain to draw a presidential veto. As approved, the bill includes language that would block enforcement of Bush administration regulations barring abortion counseling at federally funded family planning clinics, as well as language that would allow federal funding of abortions in certain cases of rape or incest.

Identical abortion-counseling language prompted Bush to veto the fiscal 1992 Labor-HHS bill, and similar rape-incest language drew a veto of the fiscal 1990 bill. In both cases the language was dropped after the House failed to override the vetoes.

AUTO THEFT measure would track stolen car parts.

The House Ways and Means Trade Subcommittee yesterday approved, by voice vote, a bill (HR 4542) aimed at combating automobile theft.

The measure would require the 14 most-often-stolen parts in vehicles sold in the United States to be marked with identifying numbers.

The identifying numbers would be put into a FBI computer data base that could then be used by police to trace stolen parts.

The measure also would make "car jacking" — stealing a car while the owner is present — a federal crime.

The bill would direct the Customs Service to spot-check cars being shipped abroad to determine whether they are

stolen. About 1.6 million cars were reported stolen in the United States in 1991, nearly 200,000 of which were believed to have been exported.

Cuba Sanctions. The Trade Subcommittee also approved, by voice vote, legislation (HR 5323) that would block ships that have taken part in trade with Cuba from entering U.S. ports.

Additionally, the measure would allow the president to impose sanctions on any nation that provides aid to Cuba.

DAT ROYALTY bill approved by Ways and Means panel.

The House Ways and Means Trade Subcommittee yesterday approved, by voice vote, a bill (HR 3204) that would help compensate music performers and publishers for home recordings of their music made through the use of new digital audio technology.

Digital audio technology, known as DAT, makes recordings of much higher quality than can be achieved by using standard recording technology. Some in the music industry are concerned that a number of quality copies could be made from one original, resulting in a significant loss of revenue.

The bill would add a 3 percent royalty fee to the price of blank digital tapes and a 2 percent fee to the price of new digital recording equipment. Musicians, recording companies and music publishers would receive the additional fees to cover financial losses from the copying of original recordings.

In addition, the bill would require makers of DAT equipment to install an electronic device in equipment sold in this country that would prevent consumers from making more than one copy of an original recording.

MFN Withdrawal. The subcommittee also approved, by voice vote, a bill (HR 5258) that would withdraw most-favored-nation trade status — low, normal tariffs — from Yugoslavia in light of the violent civil war being conducted by ethnic Serbs and Croats.

FEDERAL MINING law revamp approved by Agriculture panel.

With little debate yesterday, the House Agriculture Committee gave voice vote approval to legislation (HR 918) that would revamp current laws governing mining on federal lands. The bill, which would rewrite the 1872 Mining Law, would increase the payment for land and levy a new royalty tax on minerals extracted.

Committee Chairman E. "Kika" de la Garza, D-Texas, made it clear, however, that the committee's quick approval did not necessarily mean that members agreed with the all of the bill's provisions. The committee "makes no recommendation in areas" not under its jurisdiction, he said.

The bill includes controversial provi-

sions, drafted by the House Interior Committee, that would sharply increase the costs of extracting minerals from federal land. The Agriculture panel had jurisdiction only over provisions calling on the Forest Service to write report on how mining would affect the federal land in question. In that regard, the panel approved an amendment to consolidate a number of Forest Service reporting requirements.

• In other action, the committee also approved, by voice vote, a bill (S 1029) that would add roughly 700,000 acres to Colorado's wilderness areas.

COPYRIGHT PROTECTION bill expanded; now covers all materials.

The House Judiciary Intellectual Property Subcommittee yesterday approved, by voice vote, a bill to stiffen penalties for copyright infringement.

As introduced, the bill (S 893) had provided penalties only for software piracy. But the subcommittee approved, by voice vote, an amendment offered by Chairman William J. Hughes, D-N.J., to expand the penalties to include all copyrighted materials, including books, magazines and music as well as software.

S 893, as amended, would make large-scale copyright violations a federal felony. Currently, most criminal violations of the copyright laws are misdemeanors.

Under the measure, people who generated more than \$5,000 of illegally copied material could serve up to two years in prison. Repeat offenders could receive a maximum of five years.

MONTANA WILDERNESS bill strengthened by House panel.

The House Interior Subcommittee on National Parks and Public Lands yesterday approved, by voice vote, a bill (S 1696) that seeks to protect 2.5 million acres of the Big Sky state from development.

The subcommittee-approved version would provide significantly more protection than the version passed by the Senate on March 26. Opponents of the Senate bill, which would protect 2.2 million acres, say it would not do enough to protect Montana lands from mining and logging.

Subcommittee Chairman Bruce F. Vento, D-Minn., the author of the substitute House bill, said the House version was drafted in response to complaints from Montana residents, local governments and some Hollywood luminaries who own property in the area.

The two-member Montana delegation was split on the issue: Democrat Pat Williams supported the bill while Republican Ron Marlenee opposed it.

The measure would add several wilderness areas, reaffirm the rights of citizens to petition for even more land to be set aside and reserve water rights for the wilderness to the Senate-passed measure.

• The committee also approved legis-

lation (HR 5118) that would consolidate state lands that are surrounded by federal lands in Utah, mainly land managed by the Forest Service. HR 5118 would transfer approximately 114,500 acres of state land to the federal government in exchange for federal land elsewhere in the state and proceeds from federal mineral leasing.

MARTIN DETAILS trade pact job-loss estimates.

Labor Secretary Lynn Martin yesterday told the Senate Finance Committee that about \$670 million might be needed to retrain workers who might lose their jobs as a result of the North American Free Trade Agreement, which was signed by the United States, Mexico and Canada last month.

Martin, who said the trade pact will create many more jobs than it might cost, told the panel that a funding plan for worker retraining would be included in the president's fiscal 1994 budget request next January.

But both Democratic and Republican panel members said they objected to the promise of a program without spelling out how it would be paid for.

Martin said the trade pact could result in a maximum job loss of 150,000.

She said six to eight industries, including textiles, would likely be hit hardest. U.S. Trade Representative Carla Hills earlier cited household glass and seasonal farm produce as two industries that would be hurt.

Committee Chairman Lloyd Bentsen, D-Texas, said that without details of the retraining program, "the North American Free Trade Agreement will surely be a dead letter next year."

And William V. Roth Jr., R-Del., reiterated his proposal to pay for worker retraining by imposing an import fee on some products from Mexico.

The pact must be approved by the legislatures of all three countries, with Congress not due to vote until next spring.

• In a related development, Hills yesterday at the State Department rejected a call by House Majority Leader Richard A. Gephardt, D-Mo., to call all three parties back to the table to renegotiate the pact.

INDEPENDENT COUNSEL law opposed by Justice Department.

A Justice Department official yesterday criticized the independent counsel law, telling members of the House Judiciary Subcommittee on Administrative Law that the statute is unnecessary, costly and dangerous.

Timothy Flanigan, assistant attorney general for the Office of Legal Counsel, said the law allows independent counsels to "exercise prosecutorial power without appropriate accountability or effective review."

The statute, which was enacted as part of the 1978 Ethics in Government Act, requires a panel of federal judges to appoint an independent counsel if the attorney general determines that high-ranking executive branch officials have engaged in wrongdoing. Congress passed the law after the highly publicized Watergate incident when President Nixon fired special prosecutor Archibald Cox, who was investigating possible misconduct within Nixon's administration.

Supporters of the independent counsel law point to this incident, known as the "Saturday Night Massacre," as evidence of the conflict of interest that can result when the executive branch investigates itself.

The law, which must be reauthorized every five years, expires on Dec. 15. Reauthorizing legislation (HR 5840) has the support of subcommittee Chairman Barney Frank, D-Mass., and other Democratic members of the panel.

But the panel's ranking Republican George W. Gekas, Pa., has offered an alternate reauthorization bill (HR 5849) that would require the appointment of an independent counsel to investigate possible wrongdoing by members of Congress. Currently, the attorney general may, but is not required to, request an independent counsel to probe possible congressional misconduct.

HOUSE POSTAL official indicted in federal probe.

The Justice Department yesterday indicted a former top official of the House Post Office in a move that may not bode well for several House members. Joanna G. O'Rourke was charged with embezzling money, conspiring to defraud the government and causing a public official to misuse public funds. She has agreed to plead guilty to two charges and cooperate with federal authorities.

The conspiracy to defraud charge against O'Rourke stems from her direction of Post Office employees to pick up campaign checks for members at postal boxes off Capitol Hill. It was the first official indication that the federal grand jury is looking into that practice.

Several current and former members had postal boxes off Capitol Hill. Post Office couriers fetched mail from the boxes in violation of both House rules and federal law. Members have said they were unaware that the practice was occurring.

O'Rourke is the highest-ranking post office official to be charged in the case that has also cast a shadow on other House members.

The expense account records of three House Democrats were subpoenaed in May: Ways and Means Committee Chairman Dan Rostenkowski, Ill., and Pennsylvanians Joe Kolter and Austin J. Murphy. ■

Bush Hits Trail To Sell Economic Plan

update with Carville and Black clash on economic plan

WASHINGTON (AP) President Bush took his repackaged economic renewal agenda to Midwestern voters today, asking for an election mandate to "tax less, spend less, cut the deficit" and curb the federal government.

His Democratic challenger and congressional leaders scoffed at what they called more of the same.

Bush left the White House this morning for Joplin and Kansas City, Mo., and he was planning to add a stop in St. Louis on his way out of the state to announce that the United States plans to sell F-15 fighter aircraft to Saudi Arabia, campaign sources said. St. Louis-based McDonnell Douglas Corp. manufactures the aircraft, and the Bush administration's plan to sell 72 of the F-15s to Saudi Arabia would save thousands of jobs in St. Louis and Tulsa, Okla.

On Thursday, Bush made a high-profile effort to put a new look on his economic proposals by combining them in one package. He also outlined second-term goals that included a start toward doubling the size of the sluggish U.S. economy by the early years of the 21st century.

"We can do that," Bush claimed. The president acknowledged that economic growth has been anemic, but won't stay that way. In a speech billed as a major campaign milestone, Bush told the Economic Club of Detroit on Thursday that he was prepared to slash White House and congressional spending, and to cut top-level federal salaries as part of a quest to save money that could finance a 1 percentage point cut in the income tax rate along with capital gains and small business tax reductions.

Bush didn't advocate those specific cuts, just cited them as examples of what could be done with the savings "if we discipline spending." He's sought a capital gains tax reduction since taking office, but Congress has balked at his terms.

"He wants to give another big tax cut to the wealthy and a small sop to the middle class," said Democratic presidential nominee Bill Clinton.

Clinton adviser James Carville heaped scorn on Bush's plan and promise not to repeat the deal with congressional Democrats to raise taxes in 1990.

"In 1988, George Bush got up and said 30 million new jobs and no new taxes and ended up with 30 million new taxes and no new jobs, and now it's the same *deja vu* all over again," Carville said on NBC's "Today" show.

Bush senior adviser Charles Black said Bush's promise on the campaign trail in New Jersey "means what it says, that we're not going to have any more tax increases."

The Bush program was printed in a 29-page campaign pamphlet, "Agenda for American Renewal" with Bush's signature emblazoned on the dark blue cover. Five-minute advertisements highlighting the Bush address were broadcast as campaign ads on the television networks Thursday night, and voters were invited to call in for copies of the booklet.

It was Bush's third major effort to put his economic program into a package that would register with the voters and help him

overtake Clinton on the issues that troubles them most, the recession and sluggish recovery.

The sequence began with his State of the Union proposals last winter; he tried again in his address to the Republican National Convention. Bush and his campaigners have complained repeatedly that he has a solid economic game plan that hasn't succeeded only because Congress won't let him implement it.

In Detroit, Bush was asked why he was delivering an economic agenda less than two months before the election. He said he'd already spoken of the components and now was putting them together, "and the most significant thing we've tried _ that I've tried to do is say it's one global economy."

"No nation is an island today," Bush said, emphasizing trade as vital to growth, and a slowdown in allied economies as a reason for the U.S. slump.

Clinton, in Little Rock, Ark., put the same question more pointedly: "Why did it take you over 3 1/2 years just to come up with more of the same. ... It hasn't worked and it won't work."

Sen. Bob Dole of Kansas, the Republican leader, said Bush was "right on track" while House Majority Leader Richard Gephardt of Missouri called the plan "a tired retread."

House Speaker Thomas Foley, D-Wash., said it was an attempt to revitalize Bush's campaign, not the economy.

Among the new elements of the Bush plan:

_ A drive to cut the government share of the gross domestic product from the current 24 percent to 20 percent or less.

_ A 5 percent cut in salaries of federal employees paid over \$7500 a year, about 54,000 people.

_ Efforts to negotiate free trade agreements with the new democracies of eastern Europe and to expand them in the Western hemisphere.

_ A pledge to seek government streamlining in a second term, and to work with the 150 or so new members expected to win seats in the Democratic Congress in a 100-day drive to enact his agenda. AP-DS-09-11-92 0841EDT

HONOLULU (AP) — Hurricane Iniki churned today toward Hawaii's northern islands with winds gusting to 155 mph. Forecasters said it could whip up hurricane-force winds tonight on Oahu Island, where Honolulu is located.

Iniki, with sustained winds of 125 mph, turned Thursday and headed toward the islands of Kauai and Niihau on a course that would take it tonight over a 25-mile-wide channel separating the islands.

A hurricane warning was issued for Kauai and Niihau, about 100 miles northwest of Oahu, meaning winds could top 74 mph within 24 hours.

The storm was expected to pass 130 miles west of Oahu, but the island was included in the hurricane warning because of strong winds feeding the storm from the east, said meteorologist Tom Heffner of the National Weather Service.

Public schools on Kauai were ordered closed today. Civil defense officials on Oahu recommended that classes be canceled.

At 5 a.m. EDT, the center of the hurricane was 310 miles south of Lihue, Kauai's main city, moving toward the north at 15 mph. Hurricane-force winds, which are a minimum of 74 mph, extended 35 miles from the center of the storm, forecasters said.

Iniki (pronounced ee-nee'-kee) had been on a track that would take it west of the islands, but on Thursday began swinging toward the north, the weather service said.

The last hurricane to hit Hawaii was Iwa in 1982. It glanced Oahu and roared over Kauai, causing \$216 million damage.

More than 800,000 people live on Oahu, where Honolulu and the Pearl Harbor naval base are located.

Kauai, with more than 50,000 residents, is a roughly circular island about 30 miles across. Its interior has eroded volcanic mountains rising nearly a mile high. Most development is along the island's eastern and southeastern shores. Lihue is on the east shore.

Kauai's west shore, closest to the eye's projected track, is lightly populated.

Niihau is roughly rectangular, less 10 miles wide and 20 miles long, pointing northeast toward Kauai. It is privately owned and has about 300 residents, most ethnic Hawaiians who speak Hawaiian almost exclusively. Outsiders aren't allowed on the island. The Hawaiian chain continues toward the northwest to Midway Island, 1,300 miles northwest of Honolulu, but consists of small, uninhabited islands until Midway.

The islands of Maui, Molokai and Lanai, southeast of Oahu, were under a tropical storm watch.

Producer Prices in August Rise 0.1 Percent

WASHINGTON (AP) — Prices paid by wholesalers advanced a barely perceptible 0.1 percent in August despite big increases in the cost of fruits and vegetables, the government said today.

The tiny increase in the Labor Department's Producer Price Index matched the gain in July and was attributed to drops in the cost of gasoline and fuel oil, tobacco and children's clothing.

For the year so far, prices have advanced at an annual rate of just 1.7 percent in the face of a stagnant economy and weak demand. Last year, prices actually fell 0.1 percent, but that number was heavily influenced by the drop in oil prices that came with the end of the Persian Gulf War.

In August, food prices jumped 0.7 percent, pulled up by a 30.2 percent increase for vegetables and a 16.9 percent rise for fruits. Lettuce prices tripled. Strawberry prices jumped 70 percent. Labor Department officials said bad weather affected farms in the Salinas Valley of California and in New York and New Jersey.

Prices also rose for chicken, beef and eggs. They fell for fish, turkey and cooking oils.

Energy prices fell 0.1 percent, the second consecutive decline following a worrisome 2.3 percent jump in June. Gasoline prices fell 1.7 percent and fuel oil dropped 4.4 percent.

Excluding the volatile food and energy components, prices fell 0.1 percent after a 0.2 percent rise in July.

The price of children's clothing fell 0.7 percent. Tobacco was down 5.6 percent. However prices rose for new cars, magazines and prescription drugs.

BUSH OFFERS AGENDA TO REVIVE ECONOMY

DETROIT -- President Bush Thursday drew together a disparate package of his Administration's past proposals to revive the nation's economy and reintroduced them under a new umbrella that he said will be the basis for a second-term "agenda for American renewal." In a speech to the Detroit Economic Club, a five-minute campaign commercial broadcast Thursday night on four TV networks and a 29-page document sent to Republicans nationwide, Bush sought to convince American voters that he has a coherent plan to achieve a goal of almost doubling the size of the U.S. economy. The plan, he argued, is based on principles of limited government and reliance on the marketplace that differ significantly from those of Bill Clinton. Bush's presentation...provides a unifying rationale for many of the Administration's previous initiatives. It offered two major proposals that were new -- to "right-size" the executive branch...by reducing and eliminating agencies and cutting salaries and personnel, and to launch a "strategic network" of free trade agreements across the globe. In a statement from Little Rock, Clinton rejected the a package as "more of the same": more tax cuts for upper-income people and more deficits and less growth. We've tried this for 12 years. Now, just two months before the election, the President repackages it."

Bush Details Growth Plan

Suggested a 1% across-the-board tax rate cut if Congress agrees to spending cuts. Called for reducing the government workforce and some salaries. Promised to expand free trade with Eastern Europe. And he said economic output could nearly double if the U.S. works to be "a military superpower, an economic superpower, an export superpower.

"Americans never retreat, we compete," he said.

Bush, under pressure to provide his economic vision, offered few new proposals and did not detail spending cuts to offset reduced taxes. Instead, he sought to show how "the pieces fit together."

Bush Promises He'll Tax Less And Spend Less

Bush Pushes Economic Plan With Few Specifics; Suggests 1 Percent Tax Cut

DETROIT -- Seeking to portray himself as the man to lead America back to economic prosperity, President Bush on Thursday spelled out his priorities for a second term and suggested that income tax rates could be reduced by 1 percentage point across the board.

Bush, in a 40-minute address to the Economic Club of Detroit, unveiled his "Agenda for American Renewal," a repackaging of past proposals to cut taxes, reduce spending, expand trade and shrink the size of government. Offering "just an example" of what could be accomplished in a second term, Bush said that if Congress would act on his spending-reduction plan, there would be enough money to pay for an income tax cut, a reduction of the small-business tax rate from 15 to 10 percent and a cut in capital-gains taxes. White House officials said the President would probably propose an even large tax cut if reelected. But once again, Bush was vague about how he would achieve budget savings to pay for his promises and appeared to be backing away from earlier pledges to devote budget savings to deficit reduction.

Bush Suggests 1 Percent Tax Cut

DETROIT -- President Bush on Thursday laid out a repackaged economic manifesto less than two months before Election Day, suggesting a 1 percent across-the-board tax cut would be possible if Congress followed his spending recommendations.

Bill Clinton quickly dismissed the proposals as "more of the same," adding up to big tax cuts for the rich, little for average wage-earners and harder times for Medicare recipients, disabled veterans and others receiving benefits likely to be cut to pay for the lower taxes.

IN REVERSAL, BUSH PLEDGES 5% CUT IN TOP FEDERAL PAY

President Bush Thursday pledged to cut the pay of federal workers making more than \$75,000 a year by 5%, directly reversing the position his Administration took in 1990 when it orchestrated sweeping changes aimed at boosting federal employee pay.

In remarks Thursday to the Detroit Economic Club, Bush said, "Taxpayers have tightened their belts. The better-paid federal workers should do the same."

His message sent a shock wave through the federal work force and echoed loudly in the Washington area. "We think it's a major blow to the health and vitality of the civil service," said Bruce Moyers, executive director of the Federal Managers Association, which represents federal supervisors.

R. Scott Fosler, president of the National Academy of Public Administration, voiced fears that, "To the really good people, it sends a signal.... 'I'll start looking elsewhere.'"

Rep. Hoyer...said Bush' proposal was made in the midst of the presidential election campaign and called it "obviously demagogic."

Bush Thursday complained that federal spending has climbed to 24% of economic output. When he took office the percentage was only 22. Bush complained that government regulates too much. But his Administration has worked for the passage of new regulations.... Bush said he wants lower taxes, but in 1990 he signed a budget agreement that included \$137 billion of tax increases. **PRESIDENT DEFINES DIFFERENCES
Debate Is Joined On Key Issues**

After months of trying unsuccessfully to glamorize or alibi or apologize for his economic record, President Bush Thursday finally attempted to contest Bill Clinton's claim to having the best plan for recovery.

His speech to the Economic Club of Detroit contained Bush's clearest acknowledgment of the current public pessimism and the most coherent statement of his strategy for improving America's lagging economic performance....

The Clinton camp immediately accused Bush of larceny. "George Bush, who has spent four years in the White House without a program, has woken up, discovered that it hasn't worked, and accepted many of the premises of Bill Clinton's program," said Robert Shapiro, a Clinton economic adviser.

A senior Bush aide admitted that the speech fell short of the specificity of a budget document. But for a president who has tried repeatedly to jump-start a faltering campaign, it was at least a step toward coherence.

LITTLE ROCK -- Bill Clinton denounced President Bush's new economic plan as "another big tax cut to the wealthy," and "a small sop to the middle class," that would neither create jobs nor reduce the deficit....

"Under this plan...30 million Medicare recipients would have to pay \$400 more a year for health care, 3 million college students would have to pay \$2,000 in student loan interest on their student loans, and 1.2 million disabled veterans would be removed from the disability rolls," Clinton said. BUSH PROMISES TOO MUCH FROM CAPPING ENTITLEMENTS, CRITICS CHARGE

To pay for his election-year promises, President Bush has his own version of a pot of gold: \$294 billion he says can be saved by cutting federal spending.

On Thursday, Bush said the savings could finance across-the-board income tax cuts, tax breaks for small businesses and capital gains tax cuts next year.

In July, the White House suggested that the savings would be used solely to reduce the federal budget deficit.

"The numbers don't add up and the American people know it," said Rep. Panetta. "You can't use the same spending cuts to pay for tax cuts and reduce the deficit at the same time.... Mr. President, stop the budget flimflam."

NEWPORT NEWS, Va. -- By appearing Friday night at a resort that hires only Christians, President Bush sanctions religious discrimination and could alienate non-Christian voters, some religious and political leaders say.

Bush is scheduled to address Pat Robertson's Christian Coalition at Founder's Inn, a resort in Chesapeake, Va., run by Robertson's Christian Broadcasting Network.

"President Bush may feel he needs to go there," said the Rev. Imam Muhammad Karoub, director of the Federation of Islamic Associations. "People say that it is a strong vote. I recognize that as politics," Karoub said. "But President Bush doesn't have to sell his soul to Pat Robertson to win the presidency."

"I have no reason to think that Mr. Bush is anything but a nice man," said Rabi Mark Bolub of Temple Sinai in Newport News and president of the Hampton Roads Board of Rabbis. "But I don't think he is able to deal with the onrush of the religious right.... To pander to one group is dangerous."

"It's nothing new to court a faction, be it political or religious," said Richard Gordon, chairman of the community relations council of the United Jewish Federation of the Peninsula.

CLINTON TAKES WIDE LEAD IN ELECTORAL VOTES -- SURVEY

The nationwide survey by the Field Institute showed Clinton ahead of Bush in 17 states and found that voters were "leaning" toward Clinton in 15 others.

BUSH TO APPROVE SALE OF FIGHTER JETS TO SAUDI ARABIA

President Bush plans to announce Friday that he will approve the sale of 72 F-15 fighter jets to Saudi Arabia, a \$5 billion transaction that would save thousands of jobs, Administration officials disclosed Thursday.

Bush is promoting the sale more as an election-year jobs program than as a strategic foreign policy tool, several senior Administration officials conceded privately.

"It's jobs, jobs, jobs," said one anonymous official. "It can't be justified (solely) on national security grounds."

CHINA HINTS IT MAY SUSPEND PURCHASES OF AMERICAN WHEAT

BEIJING -- China, the number one customer of U.S. wheat, suggested Thursday that Beijing might stop buying the grain immediately if Washington sells F-16 fighter jets to Taiwan.

The announcement, carried by the official New China News Agency, is the second one in as many days that indicates China is stepping up pressure for retaliation against the sale of the advanced planes to Taiwan.

Because, in Beijing's view, the Bush Administration has violated a 1982 agreement between China and the U.S. that calls for the gradual phasing out of arms sales to Taiwan, a Chinese official in charge of agriculture "has strongly appealed to the departments concerned to consider his proposal to stop importing U.S. wheat," the news agency said. CHINA TRADE RETALIATION MAY BACKFIRE -- U.S.

BEIJING -- China would be hurting itself if it decided to stop importing American wheat in retaliation for Washington's decision to sell F-16s to Taiwan, the U.S. embassy said. "We would regret a Chinese decision not to buy wheat from the U.S., which would deny China access to a low-cost, high-quality supplier," the embassy said in a statement. (Reuter)

**SENATORS PRESS LABOR SECRETARY ON
NAFTA-RELATED JOB-LOSS RETRAINING**

Support for NAFTA would be stronger if President Bush assured workers that there will be federal funds to pay for a job-retraining program, members of the Senate Finance Committee told Lynn Martin Thursday. Bush has proposed a \$10 billion, five-year retraining program for workers who lose jobs as a result of cheaper imports or the shift of plants to low-wage Mexico....

"Without telling the American people with certainty where the money will come from," said Sen. Bentsen, "this program just looks like empty campaign promises." Sen. Baucus said that until Bush "explains how the program is to be funded, it's not worth the paper it's written on." Sen. Moynihan called the lack of a specific money source "the usual smoke and mirrors," labeling it a "treachery toward the American worker." Martin said Bush intends to spell out his job-retraining funding proposal in the fiscal 1994 budget he'll send to Congress in January. That, she said, would be in advance of the submission of NAFTA implementing legislation, now expected in February, giving legislators the assurance they want that the money will be there. LABOR SECRETARY SAYS NAFTA COULD COST 150,000 U.S. JOBS

Secretary Martin said Thursday that a maximum of 150,000 American workers would lose their jobs if NAFTA is implemented.

It was the first time any member of the Bush Administration had publicly stated such figures. In testimony before the Senate Finance Committee, she said, however, that the Bush Administration's \$10 billion retraining program is more than enough to help workers affected by the trade pact.

U.S. ROLE IN BALKANS PLAYED DOWN**Aerial Patrols Might Invite Serb Attacks, Official Says**

The U.S. is unlikely to play a more aggressive air combat role over Bosnia-Herzegovina because of concern by other countries that U.S. planes would be singled out as special targets by Serb anti-aircraft gunners, an anonymous senior U.S. official said Thursday. "Some other countries have been reluctant to have the U.S. engaged directly (in expanded air operations) because they feel that since the U.S. was the principal instigator of sanctions against Serbia, we'd become a special target of the Serb irregulars on the ground in Bosnia, and that would lead to an increase of tensions," the official said. BOSNIAN FACTIONS AGREE TO 'OPEN-ENDED' TALKS

SARAJEVO -- Leaders of Bosnia's three warring parties have agreed to meet next week in Geneva for open-ended talks on halting the factional war in the former Yugoslav republic, Cyrus Vance said.

VANCE, OWEN DENY CEASE-FIRE DEAL IN SARAJEVO

BELGRADE -- Cyrus Vance and Lord Owen Friday denied reports of a cease-fire deal in Sarajevo but said a pending U.N. vote to bolster its presence in Bosnia would boost efforts to end ethnic war there.

The two men dismissed a French government announcement that they had arranged a provisional truce during their meetings with leaders of Bosnian Serb, Croat and Moslem militias.

Owen praised Secretary-General Boutros Ghali's recommendation that the number of U.N. peace-keeping troops in Bosnia be increased from the current meager 1,500 to as many as 7,500.

Owen said: "It will strengthen the U.N. presence on the ground and will help the merging of peace-keeping and peacemaking which is really part of the whole idea of the U.N. and E.C. working together (to resolve the crisis)." (Reuter)

U.N. CHIEF PROPOSES BOOST IN BOSNIA FORCE

U.N. -- In another step toward greater involvement in the Balkan conflict, Secretary General Boutros Ghali recommended Thursday that up to 7,500 U.N. peace-keeping troops and personnel be sent to Bosnia to carry out intensified humanitarian relief operations. (Trevor Rowe, Washington Post, A28)

PRESIDENT'S SPEECH

ABC's Peter Jennings: We're going to begin in Detroit tonight, because that is where President Bush went today, trying to take people's minds off how bad the economy has been, and in a major philosophical declaration, convince them how much better it will be if he is reelected. It's the main event in our Campaign Watch today, heavily promoted by the White House 24 hours after the President told us all how lousy the economy has been.

ABC's Brit Hume: Aides say this speech, which was accompanied by a 29-page booklet entitled "Agenda for American Renewal, will be the foundation not just of the President's five-minute paid address on network TV tonight, but of every word he'll utter on the economy for the rest of the campaign. The speech contained no major new initiatives, though the President did announce an ambitious new goal he said could be achieved if the policies he tried to draw together are adopted.

(President Bush: "And this renewed America will be empowered toward a grand goal to nearly double the size of our economy to \$10 trillion by the early years of the next century.")

Basically, the President called for an economy less encumbered by taxes, government spending and regulation, and better able to compete in a worldwide network of free markets. One example of the clarity he's trying to achieve concerned the capital-gains tax cut he's been seeking for four years. Democrats have blocked it as a giveaway to the rich. Today, the President gave his simplest explanation of why he believes in it so deeply.

(President Bush: "When capital is taxed lightly, there's more of it. And when it's taxed heavily, it becomes scarce, available only to those who are already wealthy who need it least of all. That's not the kind of economy that I want. And if capital were more abundant, labor would be more in demand. Wages would rise, unemployment lines would shrink, and that is the kind of economy that I want.")

Even as the President was trying to make today an exercise in clarity on the economy, his aides were trying to lend a little clarity to something he said yesterday that sounded like a renewal of his broken pledge of no new taxes. Not so, said the aides. The President was just saying he doesn't want to raise taxes. It all seemed to underscore two things: How late it is for a candidate to be trying to make sense of his proposals, and how badly he needed to do just that.

(ABC-Lead)

Jennings reports the Clinton people are delighted to hear the President dwell on the economy today, because they believe it's an issue that works for them. Clinton said Bush's tax proposals favor the rich over the middle class. And in what may or may not have been a symbolic act, reporters noticed that Clinton went jogging halfway through Bush's speech.

(ABC-2)

ABC's Stephen Aug reports the spending limits the President is talking about are the ones he's already sent to Congress. Bush said the limits would save enough money for a 1 percent across-the-board income-tax cut for all Americans. The President also threw in a 30 percent cut in taxes for small businesses, and his longtime favorite, capital-gains cuts. According to some economists, the problem with all that is that while you're cutting spending, not enough money is going back into the economy.

(John Albertine, economist: "Over the next year, the President's program will not create a single new job, because it adds no new stimulus to the economy. That means for average working Americans, this program doesn't mean very much.")

Many economists say that to get the economy moving, the government must either spend a lot or cut taxes a lot. Either way, that would raise the deficit.

(ABC-3)

NBC's Tom Brokaw: President Bush today in Detroit and later tonight in a paid appearance on all the television networks is making his big case for economic revival. And Bill Clinton is already on the attack. The President called for a cut in tax rates of 1 percentage point, if Congress comes up with \$132 billion in spending cuts. He also proposed cuts in White House and congressional budgets and federal pay. And the President wants a new trade agreement with Eastern Europe. The President is selling hard.

NBC's John Cochran: The President did today what three Democratic candidates, including Bill Clinton, did before the New Hampshire primary. He put his economic game plan in writing. And tonight, in his paid TV political appearance, voters will be urged to get this little booklet by calling an 800 number. Bush chose a hard-hit area, Detroit, to say there will be new jobs if Congress goes along with his 1 percentage point tax cut, paid for by spending cuts.

(President Bush: "If we use just \$130 billion in specific spending cuts that I have already proposed -- specific spending cuts of 130 that I have already proposed -- we could cut income-tax rates by 1 percentage point across the board, reduce the small-business tax rate from 15 percent to 10 percent, and reduce the tax on capital gains.")

Bill Clinton was quick to accuse Bush of wanting to cut benefits for the needy to pay for tax cuts for the wealthy.

(Clinton: "Under this plan, someone with an income of over \$200,000 would get a \$14,000 tax cut. Someone with an income of \$20,000 would get about \$50 a year. But 30 million Medicare recipients would have to pay \$400 more a year for health care. Three million college students would have to pay \$2,000 more for student-loan interest on their student loans. And 1.2 million disabled veterans would be removed from the disability roles.")

Bush was speaking to business executives. But they were watching, too, in a working-class suburb of Detroit that went for Reagan and Bush in the '80s.

(Citizen: "He's running for president. He's just saying what he wants people to hear.")

(Citizen: "I'm not so sure about President Bush. He doesn't seem to impress me at all.")

Cochran continues:

Bush's message was serious and focused. But as has happened so many times, he muddled his message with a campaign snafu. Yesterday, Bush seemed to renew his famous "no new taxes" pledge from the '88 campaign.

(President Bush: "I went along with one Democratic tax increase, and I'm not going to do it again -- ever, ever.")

Today, spokesman Marlin Fitzwater said, "It wasn't a pledge, no. Our position is that Bill Clinton already has pledged to raise taxes. We don't think we need to make a pledge."

Which gave Al Gore the chance to thank Fitzwater with deep sarcasm.

(Gore: "Because otherwise, the nation might have been fooled into believing that President Bush actually meant what he said.")

Bush actually has gone along with at least 78 tax and fee hikes. But it was the income-tax increase two years ago that Dan Quayle referred to when he said --

(Quayle, on KTLA: "We raised taxes on the American people and we put this country right into a recession.")

All this when Bush's friends hoped he had his act together.

(Rep. Michel: "I'll be the first to admit that our public relations shop in the Bush Administration has been rotten compared to the previous administration.")

But the Bush campaign now thinks it really does have something to offer to voters, who are more interested in an economic game plan than in family values. (NBC-Lead)

CBS's Dan Rather: More news giving cause for concern about the economy. The government now says American businesses are planning further cutbacks in their capital-investment plans, and the line for unemployment benefits grew longer again. Fixing the economy is the No. 1 issue in the presidential campaign. President Bush says the U.S. economy is poised to take off again. Today, he revealed a new, expanded plan for how he'll go about doing that if he's reelected.

CBS's Susan Spencer: Mr. Bush used a major speech in Detroit today to spell out the economic plan. It was a speech that many Republicans felt was long overdue.

(Emcee: "The man with the plan, President George Bush." [applause])

The plan's ambitious goal is to double the size of the U.S. economy by the year 2000 with a conservative agenda Mr. Bush said differs sharply from his opponent's.

(President Bush: "I want to stimulate entrepreneurial capitalism, not punish it. I want to empower people to make their own choices, not yoke them to new bureaucracies. I want a government that spends less, regulates less and taxes less.")

With the Cold War over, Mr. Bush said, it's time for lowering trade barriers around the world. And in what was clearly supposed to be a peek at a glorious second term, he repeated calls for job training, education and health-care reform. As for taxes, the President also again suggested an across-the-board tax cut -- perhaps, he said, 1 percent; a check-off, so voters can allot some of their taxes to the deficit; business incentives and a cut in the capital gains tax. The money would come from a spending freeze on domestic programs and a cap on the so-called entitlements -- benefit programs like Medicare, Medicaid, food stamps, veterans benefits could take a big hit.

Spencer continues:

(TV coverage: President shaking hands with voters.)

(President Bush: "And I will streamline the government, consolidating agencies, tightening budgets and cutting the salaries of highly paid federal employees. And I'll start by cutting the White House budget 33 percent if the Congress cuts its own budget by the same amount." [applause])

In the hall, at least, it went over big.

(William McCormick, CMS: "The emphasis on lower taxes, less government spending and more economic growth was what we were waiting for.")

Some economists were more restrained.

(Carol Cox Wait: "I think the President has it exactly right. People would like to see the federal government get a little bit smaller, except that they don't want any of their favorite programs cut. And they would like to have it have the cut. The problem is that doesn't add up, the deficit reduction.")

Most economists agree that there is very little the President can do to affect the economy before the election. But now, 3 1/2 years into his term, he does at least have on paper an agenda for after the election, should he need one.

Rather: The President said yesterday and the newspapers headlined today said it, that he would not increase taxes again "ever, ever." Then he sent out Marlin Fitzwater today to say: Well, that's not exactly what he said. Where does all that stand?

Spencer: It stands in deep denial. It was one of those instances of what the President really meant to say. And apparently, what the President really meant to emphasize was that simply, he is against higher taxes. We were told repeatedly today this was not meant to be taken as a new pledge, not another "read my lips, no new taxes." He got burned on that one too much the first time around.

(CBS-Lead)

CAMPAIGN/ECONOMIC PLANS

NBC's Lisa Myers reports Gov. Clinton's economic program includes something for just about everyone. Despite the huge budget deficit, Clinton promises big increases in government spending for some two dozen new or expanded programs. Clinton claims these programs would cost \$50 billion a year. Others say it could be three times that much. Some voters are skeptical. Clinton claims he can increase spending at least \$50 billion a year and cut the deficit in half without any further tax increases. Many neutral economists say that's fantasy.

(NBC-2)

CBS's Richard Threlkeld reports Clinton today said Bush's economic plan is too little, too late.

(Clinton: "The deficit would continue to grow because this plan does nothing to control health care costs and has a lot of accounting gimmicks in it. So this is more of the same -- more tax cuts for upper-income people and more deficit and less growth. We tried this for 12 years. Now, just two months before the election, the President repackages it.")

Threlkeld continues:

Clinton's plan is based on a robust economic recovery, something that flies in the face of most forecasts. It's questionable whether he could get even a Democratic Congress to go along with his budget cuts, and whether there's really all that much money in taxing the wealthy.

(**Joseph Duncan**, economist: "If you want to reach that kind of revenue, you're talking about taxing everybody who makes over \$56,000. So the euphemism is that everybody over \$200,000 or \$250,000 -- whatever number you want to use -- there aren't enough people there, there's not enough income there to really significantly affect total government revenue.")

Most economists say the only way to really get a handle on the deficit is either to raise everybody's taxes or start cutting entitlements. The only two presidential candidates who preached that this year -- Ross Perot and Paul Tsongas -- you know what happened to them.

(CBS-2)

Brokaw discusses the Bush and Clinton economic plans with **Carol Cox Wait**, president of the bipartisan Committee for a Responsible Federal Budget:

Brokaw: Is [the Bush plan] politically realistic?

Wait: I don't think so. I like some of the things in the President's plan. I like the thought that spending ought to go down when defense spending goes down. I like the shift towards investment, away from consumption. But the problem is that the President proposes a total over five years of maybe \$400 billion in spending cuts and \$130 billion in tax cuts. That leaves -- if we're lucky and if Congress did everything he proposes to do, and they won't -- a maximum of about \$300 billion over five years to reduce the deficit. That's a deficit that's over \$300 billion a year already. It just doesn't add up.

Brokaw: ...Is it realistic to talk about any kind of tax cut, at all, in a political sense?

Wait: In a political sense, certainly it is. People like to hear it and candidates like to say what people like to hear. In an economic sense, it seems to me as much as I would like a tax cut, that it is more important first to put our country's fiscal health in order. If you cut spending and you also cut taxes, the deficit doesn't go down.

Brokaw: The Clinton plan assumes pretty robust economic growth. Today, the Commerce Department was out with a report saying that American businesses scaled back last year their plans for investing in equipment and plants. Doesn't that put a hole in the Bill Clinton plan?

Wait: Oh sure, it does. You remember rosy economics scenario from the early Reagan years. The Clinton plan has given us supply-side spending instead of supply-side tax cuts, but the result is the same. Unrealistic projections of growth are not a dependable source of deficit reduction.

(NBC-3)

CAMPAIGN/CLINTON/KERREY

Jennings reports Sen. Kerrey accused President Bush of trying to divide the nation again by making the draft an issue. Kerrey said Bush was a member of Congress in the 1960s and helped write the rules for draft deferment. In the name of all that is decent, Kerrey said, call off the dogs.

(ABC-4)

IMF/BUDGET DEFICIT

Rather reports the IMF is calling on the U.S. and other industrial nations to raise taxes, cut spending or both to get their budget deficits down. The IMF is warning that growing deficits are a serious threat to the world economy. (CBS-3)

FAMILY-LEAVE BILL

ABC's Bill Greenwood reports the House today passed the family-leave bill.

(Rep. Hyde: "A woman should not have to choose between having a baby and keeping her job.")

(Rep. Sanders: "How dare the President of the United States -- Mr. Family Values himself -- threaten to veto this legislation.")

(Rep. Walker: "This bill is about the Democrats who think that if your family has a problem, what you need to do is get more government involved.")

Democrats admit they do not have the votes to override a presidential veto. And some Republicans say Democrats are just pushing the issue now as part of a cynical election ploy.

(NBC-11, ABC-7)

CBS's Bob Schieffer reports Democrats say if President Bush vetoes the bill again, it would just underline that all the Republican emphasis lately on family values is nothing but talk -- one reason they delayed the final vote on this bill until the campaign season was in full swing. So no matter how noble the objectives of this legislation, it came to a vote today mainly for political reasons.

(CBS-5)

BUSINESS/FAMILY CARE

Jennings reports more than 100 major companies announced plans today to give their employees what most workers badly need and want -- day care for children and elderly parents. (CBS-4, ABC-6)

PRODUCT-LIABILITY BILL

Jennings reports the Senate today killed a proposal aimed at limiting the size of cash awards paid to consumers who win lawsuits against the makers of faulty products. (NBC-10, ABC-8)

FLORIDA/HURRICANE

Jennings reports the Florida lieutenant governor delivered the state's first emergency loans -- interest free -- designed to help the owners of small businesses. (ABC-20)

Rather reports a Senate committee today approved \$7 billion to help repair hurricane damage in Florida and Louisiana. (CBS-8)

HOUSE POST OFFICE

Jennings reports a federal grand jury today concluded there was a conspiracy between House Post Office employees and legislative officials to defraud the government. For example, they mailed campaign materials at taxpayers' expense. (CBS-6, NBC-8, ABC-11)

DRUG POLICY

Jennings reports drug czar Bob Martinez said President Bush's drug strategy has helped us turn the corner on the drug problem. The Democrats on a Senate committee insist that hardcore drug use is actually up. (ABC-12)

BOSNIA-HERCEGOVINA

Jennings reports Secretary-General Boutros-Ghali said more U.N. troops are needed to help deliver food and medicine to the people of Bosnia. He said the Security Council should send up to 7,500 more. (ABC-16)

SOUTH AFRICA/MASSACRE

Jennings reports the Security Council today said it was the South African government's responsibility to keep law and order.

ABC's John Laurence reports ANC leaders are being accused of using reckless and provocative tactics. The criticism is coming from enemies as well as allies. (ABC-17)

Rather reports the ANC said it is willing to take part in a summit called by President de Klerk. But first, the ANC said the government must do something to stop violence against blacks, including black-on-black violence. (CBS-7)

IRAN/CHINA/RUSSIA

Jennings reports President Rafsanjani says China has agreed to sell Iran the equipment it needs to build a nuclear reactor. There also are reports that Russia will sell additional reactors to Iran. (ABC-19)
