I. PURPOSE:

To listen to the concerns of Oklahoma independent oil and gas producers. To reiterate to them your record of encouraging domestic oil and gas production.

II. BACKGROUND:

This meeting was requested by Senator Nickles. As you know, the oil and gas sector, in general, has felt the impact of a slow economy. In fact, in the last ten years, employment in this industry has been in a steep decline.

While the economic climate has been difficult, you have been a strong advocate for pro-growth, free market policies within the energy industry, seeking incentives for drilling, exploration and domestic production. On your initiative, the Natural Gas Wellhead Decontrol Act was enacted in 1989. The Administration launched the National Energy Strategy (NES) shortly thereafter, promoting incentives to increase domestic production of oil and gas, energy efficiency, alternative and renewable fuels and conservation measures.

Since that time, the Administration has taken several measures to help the oil and gas industry, including: enacting Alternative Minimum Tax (AMT) relief for independent oil and gas producers; pushing Congress for \$2.25 billion in oil and gas tax incentives, as part of the '90 Budget Act; defeating new taxes on the industry sought by Democrats in Congress to fill the Strategic Petroleum Reserve (SPR); and fighting for access to ANWR and against new Outer-Continental Shelf moratoria. The NES bill, in which many of these issues are at stake, has gone to conference, and the Administration continues to fight for AMT relief and other measures to benefit the industry.

B. Rising Grazing Fees

Oklahoma ranchers fear a Congressional proposal to increase grazing fees for public lands. New "calculating methods" for establishing appropriate grazing fees could raise grazing fees up to 260 percent (from \$1.91 per animal unit to \$5.00 per animal unit). Administration policy since 1988 has been to maintain the present fee formula.

Canada and Mexico are now Oklahoma's first and fifth-largest export markets. The \$713 million in exports to Canada and Mexico in 1991 support 23,300 jobs in Oklahoma.

On August 10th, Oklahoma received \$4.8 million when Senator Moynihan's Courthouse Bill failed (this bill would have directed Federal Transportation funds to the restoration of the Brooklyn courthouse).

E. Recent Disaster Payments

Nearly 34,000 Oklahoma farmers and ranchers received disaster payments totalling \$31 million for losses on 1990 and 1991 crops. Sign-ups for disaster claims on 1992 crops began last week. Though there have been few sign-ups from Oklahoma thus far, it is expected that sign-ups from Oklahoma will substantially increase by the deadline on October 2, 1992.

F. Export Enhancement Program / Wheat

Your Export Enhancement Program (EEP) for Wheat export subsidies will benefit Oklahoma as one of the top ten wheat producing states. Wheat is Oklahoma's largest crop and is the State's primary cash commodity.

G. Oklahoma 2000

Oklahoma became an America 2000 state on December 19, 1991. Enid has not officially signed onto America 2000, but has established several supportive programs. The Enid school system has established a Blue Ribbon Committee comprised of local business leaders and government officials to work together towards fundamental reform.

H. Oklahoma Energy

Enid's industrial focus is on energy, specifically on natural gas. Oklahoma is the second largest supplier of natural gas among all states.

The vast majority of Oklahoma's producing oil wells are "stripper wells," those producing less than ten barrels per day. The average daily oil production per well in Oklahoma was 3.4 barrels. Annual oil production is at its lowest level since 1931.

I. Wetlands

Oklahoma farmers are anxious about the final definition of wetlands. Though many problems from the 1989 manual have been eliminated by exempting tilled land from consideration as a wetland, there is an overriding concern among the landowners about private property rights.

J. Environmental Tension - the Illinois River

A major concern in Eastern Oklahoma is the pollution of the Illinois River which is considered a scenic waterway by the State. For years, treated sewage from Arkansas has been allowed to flow into a tributary to the Illinois River. The EPA sided with the State of Arkansas and the U.S. Supreme Court recently upheld an EPA ruling that the Arkansas sewage did not constitute a pollution of the Illinois River. This issue remains very controversial.

CONGRESSIONAL DISTRICT VISIT

The Enid event is in the 6th Congressional District, where Republican Bob Anthony will face incumbent Democrat Glenn English in November.

POLITICAL HOT POINTS

The latest state-wide polling undertaken in Oklahoma on the Presidential race was conducted by Mason-Dixon on August 25, 1992 showing the President leading Governor Clinton 44% to 41%.

The remaining 1,600 employees at the Tulsa McDonnell Douglas plant cheered Friday, September 12, when they were told the sale of F-15 fighters to Saudi Arabia would proceed. The Tulsa announcement came minutes after President Bush made the announcement to employees at the company's St. Louis plant.

The Vice President visited Tulsa on September 2, for a Bush-Quayle rally at Union High School, and a Victory '92 fundraiser at Southern Hills. The public rally was attended by approximately 4,400 people. television coverage leading up to the event, the actual event, and day-after reactions by three local affiliates included 17 stories. The Tulsa World and The Daily Oklahoma carried banner front page stories the next day.

Mrs. Quayle was in Lawton on Tuesday, September 15, for a Victory '92 luncheon. She then proceeded to Ardmore, where she attended a Bush-Quayle rally.

Clayton Yeutter made a three-city visit to Oklahoma beginning September 10. He met with the statewide leadership of "Farmers and Ranchers for Bush-Quayle '92 Coalition" before attending a news conference at the state capitol in Oklahoma State University in Stillwater, and at the Cherokee Strip Conference Center in Enid.

Al Gore was in Tulsa September 13 for his second trip into the state since being nominated Vice Presidential Candidate for the Democratic Party. Details of Gore's trip were unknown, but he was expected to attend a private fundraiser, and do a press avail in front of a Texaco gas station.

Governor David Walters, a Democrat and national Co-Chairman of the Clinton-Gore campaign, issued a strong statement attacking the President's visit on Friday to Pat Robertson's Christian Coalition in Virginia Beach. Walters made the comments at a press conference at the Democrat National Committee headquarters in Washington D.C.

Clinton has not visited Oklahoma thus far in the campaign, but the Governor of the state is raising money and actively campaigning on Clinton's behalf.

Clinton and Brown were the only Democrats on the ballot in the Oklahoma Primary.

The BUSH-QUAYLE ticket won Oklahoma with 58% of the popular vote in the 1988 Presidential election.

Perot is on the ballot in Oklahoma and has a campaign office open in Oklahoma City.

Pat and Barbara Clancy, who were instrumental in the Perot petition drive in Oklahoma announced their support for the President at a news conference recently. The Bush-Quayle campaign immediately involved them and they will actively be working with the tulsa County Bush-Quayle '92 organization.

CONGRESSIONAL OUTLOOK

SENATE OUTLOOK

Incumbent Republican U.S. Senator Don Nickles will face re-election in 1992. Nickles was elected to the Senate in 1980, and is considered by many as Oklahoma's most popular elected official. His tenure in Washington has been very successful -- he was Chairman of the National Republican Senatorial Committee in the 1990 election cycle, and currently serves as a member of the Republican Senate leadership. In addition, Nickles served

as Co-Chairman of the Republican platform committee for the 1992 National Convention in Houston, a critical post in this year's convention process.

Nickles, barring any mishaps, should win re-election fairly easily. He will face Democrat State House Speaker **Steve Lewis** in November. Lewis staged an unsuccessful bid for the Democrat nomination for governor in 1990, losing to now Governor **David Walters**. As a result, Lewis has respectable name recognition in the state. However, most of the political establishment consider Nickles unbeatable, and any Democrat challenger will find fundraising difficult against the seasoned incumbent.

HOUSE OUTLOOK

Oklahoma was one of the first states in the nation to pass its redistricting plan -- in April, 1991. Even though the Democrats controlled the process, the districts will remain mostly unchanged. Oklahoma will not gain or lose any Congressional Districts in 1992.

In CD 01, incumbent Republican **Jim Inhofe** defeated challenger **Richard Bunn** in the Republican Primary, and will be opposed by Democratic challenger **Dan Morrisey**.

In CD 02, **Jerry Hill** defeated **Terry Gorham** in the Republican primary, and will face Democrat incumbent **Mike Synar**.

In CD 03, incumbent Democrat **Bill Brewster** was unchallenged yesterday, but won't have it so easy this Fall as he takes on Republican Primary winner **Robert Stokes**.

In CD 04, Republican **Howard Bell** defeated his opponent for the right to challenge incumbent Democrat **Dave McCurdy** in November.

In CD 05, incumbent Republican **Mickey Edwards** lost his attempt for reelection. **Ernest Istook** defeated **Bill Price** in the September 15 Republican runoff. He will challenge Democratic nominee **Laurie Williams**.

In CD 06, incumbent Democrat **Glenn English** was unopposed, as was his Republican opponent, **Bob Anthony**.

STATEWIDE OUTLOOK

While Oklahoma Republicans lost a disappointing race for Governor, history was made when **Claudette Henry** became the first woman ever elected to statewide office, and **J.C. Watts** became the first Black ever elected to statewide office. Both Henry and Watts are Republican, and considered rising stars in Oklahoma

Republican politics. Watts was a star quarterback for the University of Oklahoma football team in the early 1980's.

Currently, Democrats hold a 37 to 11 advantage in the State Senate, and a 68 to 33 margin in the State House.

PARTY CAMPAIGN ACTIVITY

The Oklahoma Victory '92 office is up and running in Oklahoma City. Clinton Key, Chairman of the State Party, is the Oklahoma Victory '92 Chairman.

The Oklahoma GOP has made steady gains over the past ten years, electing a record number of four statewide office holders. Democrats still hold better than a 2:1 registration advantage, but recent Republican success is slowly chipping away at the Democrat establishment. GOP Chairman Clinton Key has reduced the Party's debt, and has run an aggressive candidate recruitment program for the state legislature.

State leadership of the Bush-Quayle Campaign held an organizational meeting on August 8 to discuss and finalize the campaign plan for Oklahoma.

There are Bush-Quayle headquarters open in both Oklahoma City and Tulsa with a paid staffer in each location as well as several full-time volunteers.

Oklahoma Republican Party Chairman Clinton Key serves as the BUSH-QUAYLE '92 Chairman, with Tulsa businessman Ed Lawson as Finance Chairman. U.S. Senator Don Nickles, former Governor Henry Bellmon, Congressmen Mickey Edwards and Jim Inhofe, are all Honorary Chairmen. Treasurer Claudette Henry, Corporation Commissioners J.C. Watts and Bob Anthony, Bill Liedtke, and former Tulsa Mayor Jim Hewgley are all Co-Chairmen.

I. Discussion

A. 1996 Summer Olympics

The 1996 Summer Olympics will be held in Atlanta and are expected to create 84,000 jobs and add approximately \$200 million to the area's economy.

In addition to other new construction that the Olympic games will bring, Atlanta's new domed stadium is nearing completion. The stadium will be used for the Olympics, as well as serving as the Atlanta Falcon's new home and the site of the 1993 Peach Bowl and the 1994 Super Bowl.

Georgia's leading exports are scientific and measuring instruments, chemicals, industrial machinery and computers, transportation equipment, and primary metals.

D. Banca Nazionale del Lavoro (BNL)

BNL is an Italian-owned bank that operated as an agency bank in Atlanta. The investigation and prosecution of individuals and entities involved in illegal activities at BNL-Atlanta has received intense scrutiny in the media and Congress and Justice's handling of the case was part of the recent Independent Counsel inquiry conducted by Attorney General Barr at the request of the House Committee on the Judiciary. Christopher Drougoul, the branch manager of BNL in Atlanta, was convicted of orchestrating \$5 million in illegal loans to Iraq. The sentencing hearing for Mr. Drougoul is currently underway and a decision could come as early as tomorrow.

U.S. District Court Judge, Marvin Shobb, has been outspoken in his handling of the BNL case and has publicly stated his belief that the fraud occurring at the Atlanta bank was known by high officials in Rome or Washington.

E. State Budget

Since the state is constitutionally bound to a balanced fiscal year budget, the Governor has the responsibility to monitor state expenditures and cut discretionary spending to state programs and services when necessary. Governor Zell Miller's (D) FY 1993 budget had projected a state revenue increase of 7.1 percent, but the revenue increase has remained at only 6 percent. As a result, an estimated \$96 million budgetary shortfall is expected by the end of the fiscal year.

Governor Miller has warned all state departments to prepare for a 2 percent across the board funding cut to offset the projected \$96 million shortfall. But even with this shortfall, the state has raised all employee salaries for FY 1993 and had hired nearly 20,000 new state workers over the last 4 years.

F. America 2000/Education

Governor Zell Miller (D) kicked off GEORGIA 2000 in October of 1991. Twenty-seven communities across the state have expressed an interest in joining the AMERICA 2000 program strategy.

J. Military Cutbacks

Officials at Fort Benning announced that 202 civilian positions at the post are being cut as part of Federal military budget reductions, although the actual number of laid-off employees will only be 124. The remaining positions will be eliminated through early or optional retirements and resignations. The decision was made to cut the civilian work force after the Army reduced Fort Benning's 1993 budget by approximately \$28 million.

Termination of the Air Force's Logistics Airlift will eliminate 118 civilian and 47 military jobs at Robbins Air Force Base in central Georgia. The Air Force has said that the airlift will be terminated on October 1, with all shipping being turned over to commercial carriers.

CONGRESSIONAL DISTRICT VISIT

The Jonesburro and Atlanta events are in the 3rd and 5th Congressional Districts. Jonesboro, a suburb of Atlanta, is in the 3rd Congressional District where Republican Mac Collins will face incumbent Democrat Richard Ray. In Atlanta, the 5th Congressional District, Republican Paul Stabbler will face incumbent Democrat John Lewis.

POLITICAL HOT POINTS

The latest state-wide polling undertaken in Georgia on the Presidential race was commissioned by the office of Paul Coverdell, and showed the President trailing Governor Clinton by a margin of 51% to 42%. These numbers do not accurately reflect the true closeness of the race however.

The President will need 60% of the white vote to win in November, and of the white voters who have made up their minds, the President stands at 55%. Also, once we improve our position among independents - Bush 44%, Clinton 48% - the numbers should turn significantly in the President's favor.

The Atlanta Journal and Constitution ran a story this past Sunday on the effects of closing military bases in Georgia. The President's position on the military cutbacks should be received much more favorably than Clinton's, based on the additional number of jobs that would be lost.

The President and Mrs. Bush had a very successful visit to Woodstock on August 22, where over 40,000 people attended a rally in the rain.

The President toured Shaw Industries, a Georgia carpet manufacturer in Dalton, on August 3. While in Dalton, the President met with 20 Victory '92 fundraisers, all of whom committed to raising at least \$10,000 toward the Victory '92 effort.

The Vice President had a successful bus tour through Columbus, Albany, and Richland on Tuesday, September 1. The crowds were very enthusiastic in these traditionally Democrat areas, and the media coverage was extremely positive.

Bill Clinton was in Georgia on Wednesday, September 9, for a speech before the National Baptist Convention, the largest black religious group in the country. He also spoke on welfare reform at a welfare office in Clayton County. During the Baptist speech, Jesse Jackson was on the podium, and he and Bill Clinton were very cool to one another, that story dominated the news the next day.

The Clintons and Gores participated in the "Habitat for Humanity" project with Jimmy Carter in Atlanta on August 19.

Clinton has been on television in Georgia for one week and is currently airing a spot on welfare reform.

Rumor has it that Clinton and Gore will be in Atlanta for a fundraiser on September 19, and that the democratic National Committee will be holding an executive committee meeting in Atlanta on September 25. There is also the expectation that Hillary Clinton will be in Georgia sometime in the next three weeks.

Common Cause has filed suit against the Clinton campaign, and the Georgia Democratic Party, based on a report in the Atlanta Constitution on 5/20, that claimed Bill Clinton's presidential campaign, and the Democratic Party of Georgia, funneled thousands of dollars in out-of-state contributions through the party to Clinton primary campaign workers -- violating federal election law and the party's own neutrality rules.

1992 PRESIDENTIAL PRIMARY

On March 3, 1992, the President defeated Pat Buchanan in the Georgia primary by a margin of 64% to 36%, garnering all 52 Georgia delegates to the Republican National Convention.

Bill Clinton won the Democratic primary, receiving 57% of the vote. Paul Tsongas finished with 24%, Jerry Brown with 8%, Bob Kerrey with 5%, and Tom Harkin with 2%. 4% of the primary voters were undecided.

Texas billionaire H. Ross Perot officially qualified for the November general election ballot in Georgia before leaving the Presidential race.

Ken Kendricks greeted the President when he arrived at Dobbins prior to the Woodstock visit. Mr. Kendricks and the Perot followers in Georgia are backing the Rudman-Tsongas "Lead or Leave" pledge. **Paul Coverdell** signed the pledge on Friday, September 11. He was the first candidate to sign this pledge in Georgia.

The BUSH-QUAYLE ticket carried Georgia with 60% of the vote in the 1988 Presidential election. Georgia will have 13 electoral votes in 1992.

CONGRESSIONAL OUTLOOK

SENATE OUTLOOK

Democratic incumbent U.S. Senator **Wyche Fowler** will be up for re-election in 1992. Fowler narrowly defeated Republican Senator **Mack Mattingly** in 1986 by a 51% to 49% margin. Former Peace Corps Director, **Paul Coverdell**, the Republican candidate for the U.S. Senate, has tied his Democratic opponent to the House Bank scandal. Records from an old alimony case point to Senator Fowler intentionally abusing House Bank checking privileges to make court-ordered payments. This issue has had an impact on the race. The latest Coverdell for Senate poll shows Coverdell trailing Fowler 49% to 34%. This marks the first time Fowler has fallen below 50% this year, and reflects a major improvement in Coverdell's standing. He once trailed by a margin of 32%. Most experts agree that Fowler is one of the Democrats' most vulnerable incumbents in 1992.

If Coverdell can raise an adequate amount of money, this could become a major upset opportunity.

Coverdell was endorsed in the Republican primary by the **Atlanta Constitution**, the **Atlanta Journal**, the **Gwinett Daily News**, the **Times of Gainesville**, and the **Dekalb News/Sun**.

HOUSE OUTLOOK

Georgia will gain one Congressional district as a result of the reapportionment process. Significant Republican growth in the metropolitan area of Atlanta during the 1980's is thought to benefit Republican chances to make substantive gains in the 1992 Congressional elections.

Congressman **Newt Gingrich** prevailed in a closely contested Republican primary in Georgia's new sixth district by a mere 51% to 49% margin. The district was totally new for Newt, and he was opposed by former state legislator **Herman Clark**, a Republican fixture in the area. Turnout in the primary was unusually high, suggesting that many Democrats voted in the Republican primary in order to dispense with Gingrich. Clark was supported by several liberal activist groups, including **Ralph Nader's** Citizen Action Group, which aired over 200 "Boot Newt" radio advertisements. This upper-middle class sixth district is overwhelmingly favored to be carried by Newt in the general election.

Newt Gingrich, who spent more than \$1 million in his recent primary, is only leading his opponent by a margin of 45% to 33%, with 22% of the voters still undecided. Also troublesome for Gingrich is a high unfavorable rating of 42%.

Republican **Daniel Becker**, running in the 9th Congressional District, has been running very graphic pro-life ads, and plans to show a full abortion procedure later in the fall.

STATEWIDE OUTLOOK

Currently, the Republican party holds 11 of 56 seats in the State Senate, and 35 of 180 in the State House.

PARTY CAMPAIGN ACTIVITY

The Georgia Victory '92 Chairman is **James Edenfield**. Victory '92 Co-Chairs **Mike Sullivan**, **D.J. Lopez**, **Jeanne Ferst**, and **Krishna Srinivasa** have been named. They will be the driving force behind the October 8 event with **Arnold Schwarzenegger**. Atlanta is one of the interactive sites.

The State Steering Committee meeting was held on Sunday, September 13. Approximately 150 attendees were briefed by **Warren Tompkins** and pollster **Whit Ayres** as to the Georgia political landscape. County contacts will be established in the next week. GOP headquarters will be opening all over the state in the next few weeks.

The Georgia Republican Party continues under the strong leadership of Chairman **Alec Poitevint**, who also serves as National Committeeman. **Dot Burns** serves as National Committeewoman. The Georgia GOP has eliminated its debt, and is planning an aggressive campaign to pick up seats in the state legislature this year.

The merchandise trade deficit in July (trade data always lag an additional month behind) was \$7.8 billion, up from \$6.7 billion in June. This was a larger increase than expected by private analysts, and the highest since late 1990. Exports declined \$800 million and imports rose about \$300 million. While the level of exports in July was the third highest on record, the decline from June and its pattern of a large decline in exports to Western Europe is worrisome because of the slowdown in the other advanced economies. Imports reached an all-time high. *9/16*

The initial state claims for unemployment insurance for the week ending August 29 rose slightly. This reflected in part the effect of the GM plant strike but does not yet include the effect of Hurricane Andrew.

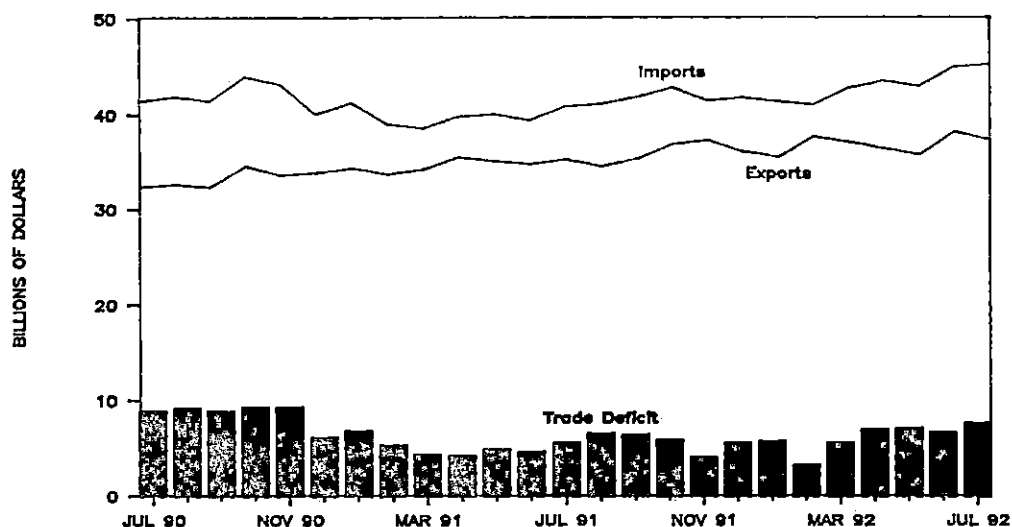
SUBJECT: Exports and Imports in July, Commerce Department
Release, Tomorrow, 8:30 a.m.

The merchandise trade deficit increased to \$7.8 billion in July from \$6.7 billion in June, reaching the highest level in over a year and a half. The increase in the deficit was surprisingly large; private analysts had expected a smaller increase to \$7 billion.

In July, merchandise exports fell \$0.8 billion, or 2.2 percent. Export performance was mixed across the principal end-use categories. The largest export decline occurred for nonautomotive capital goods, largely as a result of a \$0.9 billion decline in exports of civilian aircraft. The largest export gain occurred for the foods, feeds, and beverages category.

Merchandise imports increased \$0.3 billion, or by less than 1 percent, but still reached an all-time high. Import performance was mixed across the principal categories, with the largest increase occurring for nonfood, nonautomotive consumer goods and the largest decline occurring for foods, feeds, and beverages.

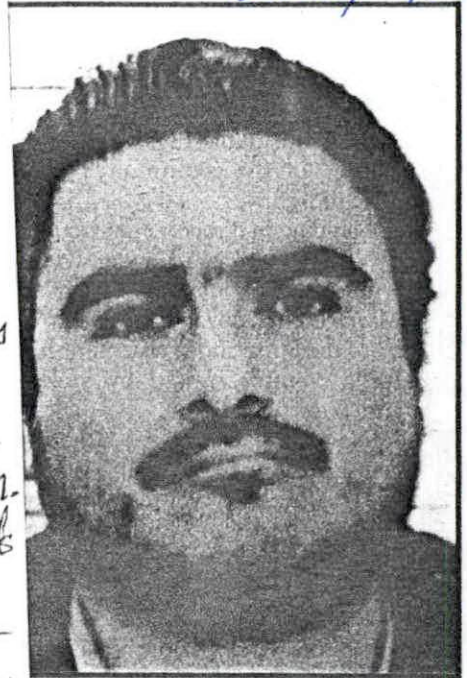
