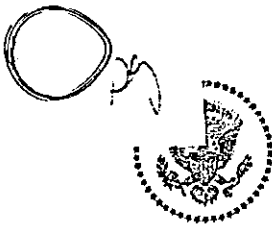

MEMORANDUM FOR THE PRESIDENT

FROM: ROGER B. PORTER *RBP*
SUBJECT: USAir - British Airways Transaction

When you called this afternoon inquiring about the USAir - British Airways transaction, I was delivering a speech, but am pleased to provide a brief update.

On July 19, British Airways agreed to acquire a major interest in USAir. Because U.S. law restricts foreign ownership of U.S. airlines, British Airways proposes to acquire 25 percent of USAir's voting stock and approximately 44 percent of its total equity. The proposed transaction was structured to fall within the ownership and control guidelines established by the Department of Transportation.

USAir is under financial pressure. The proposed transaction would provide an infusion of capital and is strongly supported by USAir's employees. From British Airways' perspective, acquiring a U.S. carrier would allow it to feed domestic passengers into its overseas routes.

✓ The proposed deal, however, is controversial. The major U.S. carriers -- United, American, and Delta -- have urged DOT to disapprove the transaction, unless Great Britain agrees to provide greater access to U.S. airlines. U.S.-U.K. bilateral aviation is governed by the so-called "Bermuda II Agreement," which severely restricts the landing rights of U.S. carriers. The U.S. carriers believe that failure to renegotiate the accord would give British Airways an unfair advantage in trans-Atlantic competition.

By law, the USAir/British Airways transaction is subject to DOT approval. DOT has indicated to the British Government that approval of the proposed transaction is indirectly tied to progress on liberalizing Bermuda II. Two rounds of negotiations have been scheduled. The first round began today; the second is scheduled for October 20. By the end of the month, we should have a better understanding of Britain's willingness to negotiate and thus of the prospects for eventual DOT approval of the proposed USAir-British Airways transaction.

11. How do you think Perot's entry in the race will affect the campaign?
12. What states do you need to carry to win?

13. Clinton says you can't finance an across the board tax cut and bring down the deficit without cutting Social Security and Medicare?

SUBJECT: Congressional Update, 10:00am Wednesday

The House is effectively gone for the year although it will not actually be adjourned sine die until the Senate concludes its work later in the week. Despite the holiday, the Senate will convene at 2:00pm today to debate and pass two bills by unanimous consent as described more fully below.

These major items remain on the Senate agenda:

- o TAX. A cloture vote will occur tomorrow. Senator D'Amato has dropped his filibuster. In return, the Senate will pass a separate bill by unanimous consent which is identical to the trade provision dropped from H.R.11. The bill will then go to the House where no action will be taken.

Given the close vote in the House early Tuesday morning and our signals that you will veto the bill, it is unclear whether cloture will be invoked. We will try to defeat cloture, thus preventing the bill from reaching your desk. If cloture is invoked and the Senate proceeds to vote on the bill itself, we expect to show veto strength. We will need to decide whether to actually veto or just pocket veto H.R. 11 if it does reach you desk.

- o WATER. Senator Seymour has backed off his filibuster of the water bill after being convinced by Senator Dole that his position was hopeless. In return for Senator Seymour backing down, the Senate will pass by unanimous consent this afternoon free-standing legislation on California's Central Valley Project. (Seymour gets to control the floor for four hours.) The bill will then be sent to the House where no action will be taken.

The bill will then be passed tomorrow. You will have to decide whether to veto the bill. As we discussed on the phone yesterday, you indicated in May that you would not sign the bill as it was written at that time. Senator Wallop, on behalf of Senator Seymour, negotiated substantial changes. Those changes do not, apparently, make the bill acceptable to Seymour or Governor Pete Wilson.

Senator Wallop, who believes this is the best bill California will get given the make-up of the House Interior Committee, and other Senators are urging you to sign the bill. Other states with projects in the bill include:

- o ENERGY. The Senate will vote cloture on the Energy bill tomorrow at 11:00am. Cloture is expected to be invoked, and the bill passed and sent to you for your signature. I believe you can expect the Clinton campaign to claim you have signed a tax increase.

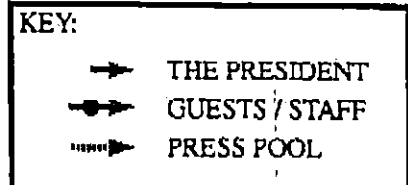
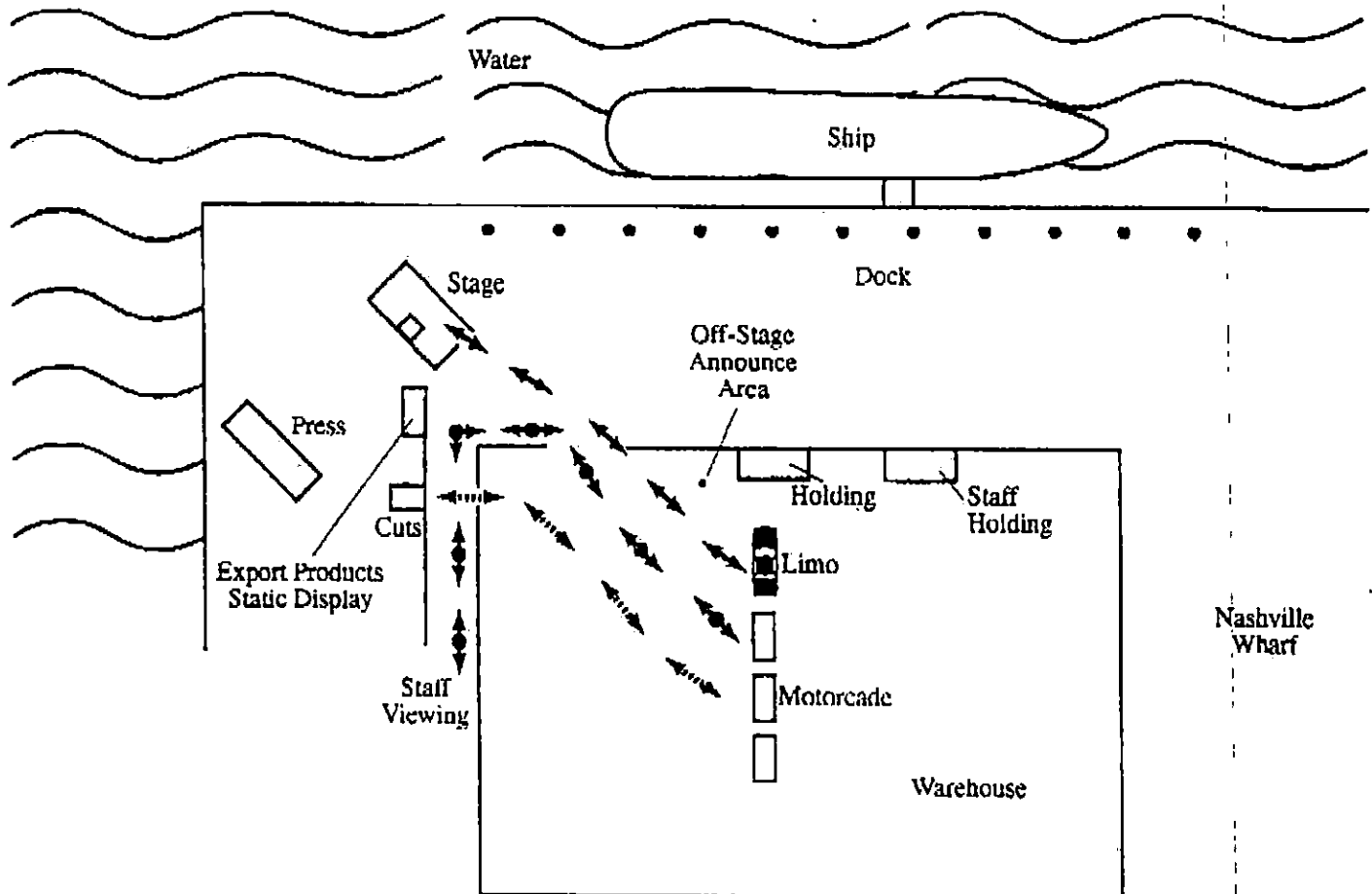

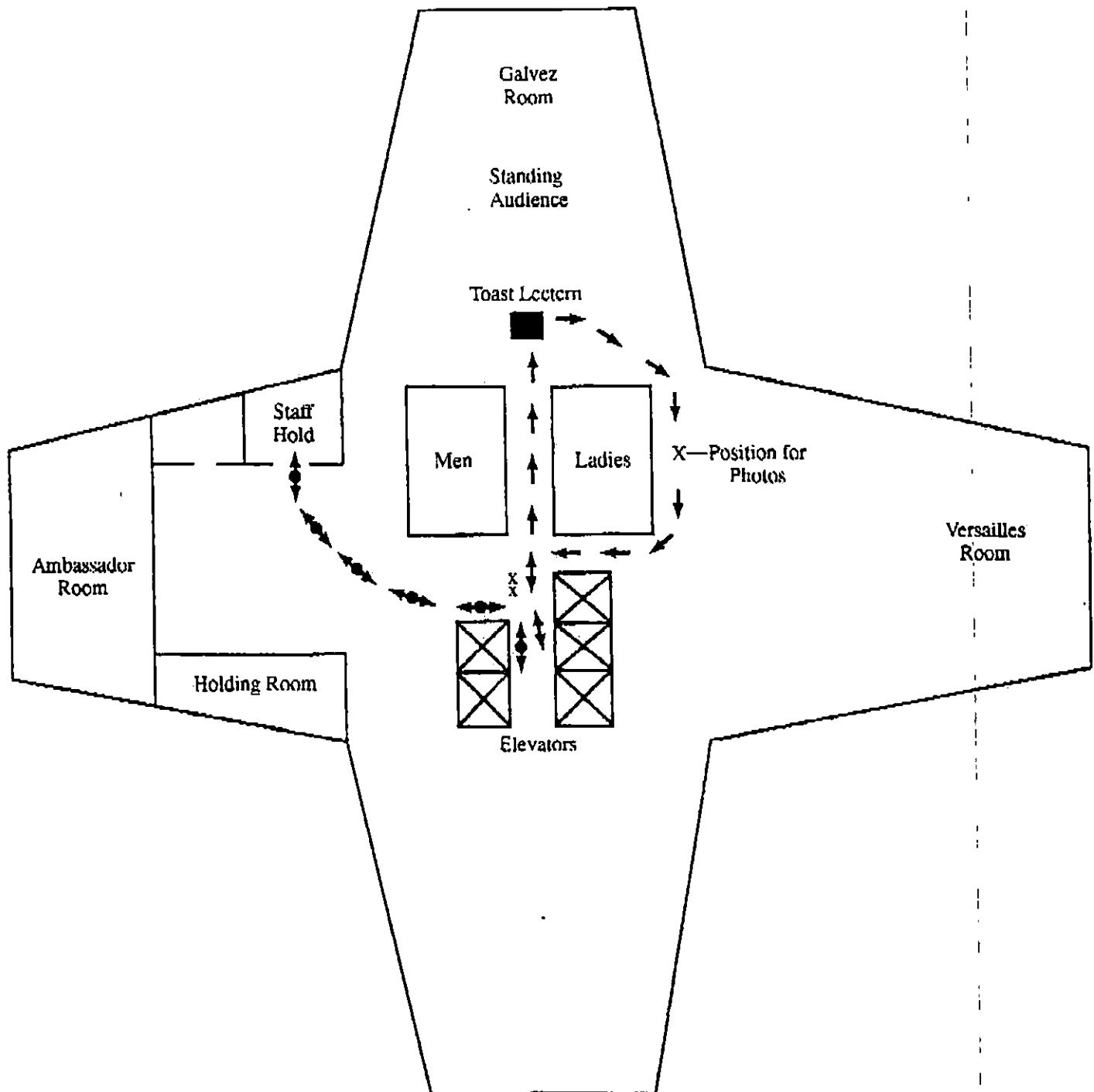

I am pleased today to receive the endorsement of Louisiana's law enforcement community: [The Police Association of New Orleans, the Police Association of the City of Kenner, the Louisiana State Troopers Association, and a number of sheriffs, district attorneys and chiefs of police.] //

Keeping America's neighborhoods safe and secure is one of the fundamental responsibilities of government.

It takes a tough, no-nonsense approach, one that puts our sympathy with the victims of crime -- not the criminals. After all, "hard time" is what criminals should get -- not the innocent kids, and older Americans who have to live in fear of violence.

In this election, two candidates are talking tough on crime -- but just one candidate is taking action.

I. Correspondence

As a result of Hurricane Andrew, Governor Edwin Edwards (D) wrote (9/21) urging you to direct the Department of Commerce to release funds under sections VII and IX for Federal assistance to aid existing businesses or new businesses in the State.

Governor Edwards also wrote (9/25) requesting additional funds for the Department of Agriculture and Forestry as a result of Hurricane Andrew and an exemption for the State to match these funds.

II. Discussion

A. Economy

B. Hurricane Andrew

1. Disaster Assistance Declarations/Grants

On August 26th, you signed the disaster declaration for the State of Louisiana, due to damage resulting from Hurricane Andrew. On September 4th, you signed a waiver to allow reimbursement of 100% (of eligible public assistance costs exceeding \$10 per capita).

On Tuesday, October 6th, Secretary Barbara Franklin announced two grants to development districts in Louisiana for economic recovery planning efforts to help the region recover from damage incurred by Hurricane Andrew. The grants, awarded through Commerce's Economic Development Administration

totalled \$160,000 and \$140,000. These development districts represent 14 of the 36 parishes which you declared natural disaster areas.

C. Louisiana Abortion Law

On September 22nd, a federal appeals court panel struck down Louisiana's anti-abortion law that banned abortion in most situations and required prison terms for doctors who perform abortions. The Louisiana law, considered the nation's most restrictive, would have banned all abortions except to save a woman's life and in certain cases of rape or incest. It was the first major court action on the issue since the Supreme Court upheld a constitutional right to abortion last June.

This decision did not surprise supporters or opponents of abortion rights. But it is now less likely that the Louisiana law could be used -- as intended by its authors -- to overturn Roe vs. Wade. Louisiana Attorney General Richard Ieyoub (D) has 90 days to decide whether to appeal the ruling to the U.S. Supreme Court.

D. Turtle Excluder Devices (TEDs)

Governor Edwards wrote (9/2) requesting a suspension of the regulation requiring shrimp fishermen to equip their nets with Turtle Exclusion Devices (TEDs) in the Gulf of Mexico. Louisiana shrimpers suffered great property and income losses due to Hurricane Andrew and the use of TEDs makes trawling more difficult in the area.

After monitoring the situation to ensure there was adequate protection for sea turtles, on September 4th, the National Marine Fisheries Service (NMFS) issued a Federal Register Notice to allow limitations for up to 30 days on tow times as an alternative to the requirement to use TEDs by shrimp trawlers. This exemption expired at midnight on October 5th. NMFS was notifying shrimpers by radio on October 6th. There will not be vigorous enforcement for the next week or so.

E. Education

1. America 2000

Louisiana, under the leadership of former Governor Buddy Roemer (R), joined the AMERICA 2000 movement in the fall of 1991. On November 8, 1991, in a statewide teleconference town meeting, all 64 parishes adopted the National Goals. LOUISIANA 2000 kicked off on December 2, 1991.

Secretary Alexander kicked off NEW ORLEANS 2000 on March 30, 1992. The community effort was spearheaded by Mayor Sidney Barthelémy (D) and city councilwoman Peggy Wilson, but progress in continuing is slow.

Last week, voters of Orleans Parish replaced five of the seven School Board members during the primary election and forced the remaining two incumbents into runoffs. Public comment and the political commentators agreed that the replacement of the incumbents stemmed from their inability to improve the school system. As a result, the electorate's decision seems to have been based upon the ineffectiveness of the School Board members rather than on an anti-incumbency mood.

2. United States v. Louisiana (5th Circuit)

This case involves the desegregation of Louisiana's system of higher education. Governor Edwards plans to ask the Bush Administration to drop a federal desegregation lawsuit which was filed in 1974. The State maintains that students today do not face racial barriers in attending any public university in the State. Currently, a Board of Regents oversees the three governing boards which control Louisiana's colleges and universities.

In 1988, the district court ruled that Louisiana had failed to dismantle its racially dual system of colleges and universities, and, in 1989, issued a remedial order. Before the case reached the court of appeals, however, a decision was made on a similar case involving the State of Mississippi. Based on this decision, the district court in Louisiana vacated its earlier order and dismissed the case.

In light of the Mississippi case, Louisiana's case has been remanded to the district court for further proceedings. On September 25th, the parties met with the court and agreed to enter into negotiations for a period of thirty days in an effort to reach a negotiated settlement of the case.

F. Weed and Seed/Drug Grants

The Weed and Seed program was inaugurated in Louisiana on August 4, 1992. The Weed and Seed initiative was strongly supported by New Orleans Mayor Sidney Barthelemy (D) and State Attorney General Richard Ieyoub (D).

New Orleans was selected in 1990 to become a research site for a 3-year demonstration project funded by the Department of Health & Human Services. The grant of \$3.2 million will provide research and treatment for 1,500 homeless individuals.

Federal Drug Grants to the State estimated for FY 1993 are \$29.7 million, compared to \$14.4 million for FY 1989 -- an increase of 106%.

G. Medicaid

Governor Edwards recently signed a bill which authorizes the Louisiana Department of Health and Hospitals to impose provider fees on nursing homes, pharmacies, transportation

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providers, and intermediate care facilities for the mentally retarded. A companion bill authorizes payments of up to \$350 per month to nursing home patients without third party coverage or government assistance to help offset the cost of care.

These two pieces of legislation, when taken together, appear to create the type of situation that the Medicaid Voluntary contribution and Provider Specific Tax Amendments of 1991 was intended to eliminate. The fees appear to be a mechanism which significantly increases the federal share of payments to these providers.

H.

NAFTA/EXPORTS

Manufactured exports accounted for 70 percent of Louisiana's \$1.1 billion in exports to Canada and Mexico in 1991 and supported an estimated 6,800 jobs. In 1991, exports to Mexico totaled \$618 million and exports to Canada totaled \$497 million -- 7 percent of the state's total exports. Since 1987, Louisiana's exports to Mexico have grown by nearly 65 percent, while exports to Canada have grown 17 percent. Mexico and Canada are now Louisiana's fifth and eighth-largest export markets. An estimated 750 new jobs have been created by growth in Louisiana's manufactured exports to our North American trade partners since 1987.

CONGRESSIONAL VISIT

The event in New Orleans is located in the 1st Congressional District where Republican incumbent Robert L. (Bob) Livingston defeated five opponents in the October 3rd Primary securing his seat for another term.

POLITICAL HOT POINTS

The most recent statewide poll conducted by Mason-Dixon between September 21-22 and taken among 807 "likely voters" has found:

The economy of Louisiana relies heavily on exporting, thus the ratification of NAFTA would be a positive development and political plus for the state.

Al Gore's statement that "...a ban on offshore drilling ought to be extended to all of the coastal waters of the U.S.," will be a key voting issue. Such a ban would have a severe impact on Southern Louisiana jobs.

North Louisiana has born the brunt of much of the pollution floating down Arkansas rivers. Governor Clinton's poor environmental record and its resulting impact on Louisiana will move voters in selected areas of the state.

The President visited Greenville Tuesday, September 22, where he addressed supporters at an airport rally. Greenville was the fourth stop during the six-city visit that day.

The President travelled to Louisiana twice to survey the damage caused by Hurricane Andrew. On September 5, the President

announced that the federal government would pay 100% of the eligible costs of cleaning up and repairing the damage caused by the Hurricane. The Federal Government's response to the hurricane has been more positively received in Louisiana than in Florida.

Mrs. Bush was in Baton-Rouge on September 30, where she attended a Victory '92 fundraiser, a Bush-Quayle rally, and visited LaSalle Elementary School. Mrs. Bush also participated in a local TV talk show in New Orleans.

On October 6, Mrs. Quayle participated in a fundraiser for the State Party Federal Account in Monroe, addressed the Young Republicans at the State College in Alexandria, and attended a Victory '92 Reception in Hammond.

Governor Bill Clinton visited Louisiana in September to survey the damage caused by Hurricane Andrew.

While Al Gore was campaigning in Louisiana on September 9, Secretary Watkins held a press conference in Shreveport and released a transcript of an interview with Gore. Gore was quoted as saying, "I think that a ban on offshore drilling ought to be extended to all of the coastal waters of the U.S." Local Republicans hammered away at the issue as Gore campaigned across the state. Gore quickly backed off his statement.

Democrat State Treasurer Mary Landrieu and Democrat Lieutenant Governor Melinda Schwegmann, along with other female business and political leaders, announced the formation of Women for Democratic Victory, a group urging voters to elect Clinton-Gore. The group held a series of luncheons around Louisiana on Friday, October 2, "to recruit women in favor of the Democratic ticket."

PRESIDENTIAL PRIMARY

The Louisiana Presidential Primary was held on March 10, 1992. President Bush received 62% of the vote and all 38 delegates.

Democrat mayor of Alexandria Ned Randolph is also running for this seat.

In the October 3rd Primary, Holloway, Baker, and Randolph prevailed with 37%, 33%, and 30% respectively. They will run in a 3-way race in November. This contest will drive a strong Republican turnout in this District.

The race in the seventh district has been often referred to as the "battle of brothers." In the October 3rd primary, Democrat incumbent Jimmy Hayes defeated his brother Fredric Hayes, the Republican candidate, and little known Republican Robert Nain of Lafayette.

Initial efforts to re-call Governor Edwin Edwards fell apart when the leader of the movement left the state. However, the movement is being reorganized under new leadership.

Democrats control both chambers of the state legislature.

PARTY CAMPAIGN ACTIVITY

On February 6, 1992, State Party Chairman William (Billy) Nungesser publicly endorsed Pat Buchanan at the opening of Buchanan's state headquarters in Kenner, LA. The National Committeeman is Haywood Hillyer. National Committeewoman Ginny Martinez passed away in June 1992. Her position has not yet been filled.

Congressman Richard Baker has agreed to serve as the State Chairman of Bush-Quayle '92. Congressmen Bob Livingston, Jim McCrery, and Clyde Holloway are State Co-Chairmen. Louisiana Secretary of State Fox McKeithan is also a State Co-Chairman, while Joe Canizaro is the State Finance Chairman.

Due in part to the delay caused by the hurricane, the Victory '92 account stands at \$25,000. It is anticipated that the upcoming events should raise between \$300,000 and \$600,000. The proposed Victory '92 program has a budget of \$600,000, so the majority of the programs will be implemented.

Former Governor David Treen has a comprehensive program in place for statewide volunteer activities. Nine Regional Victory '92 offices are open and staffed with full-time volunteers.

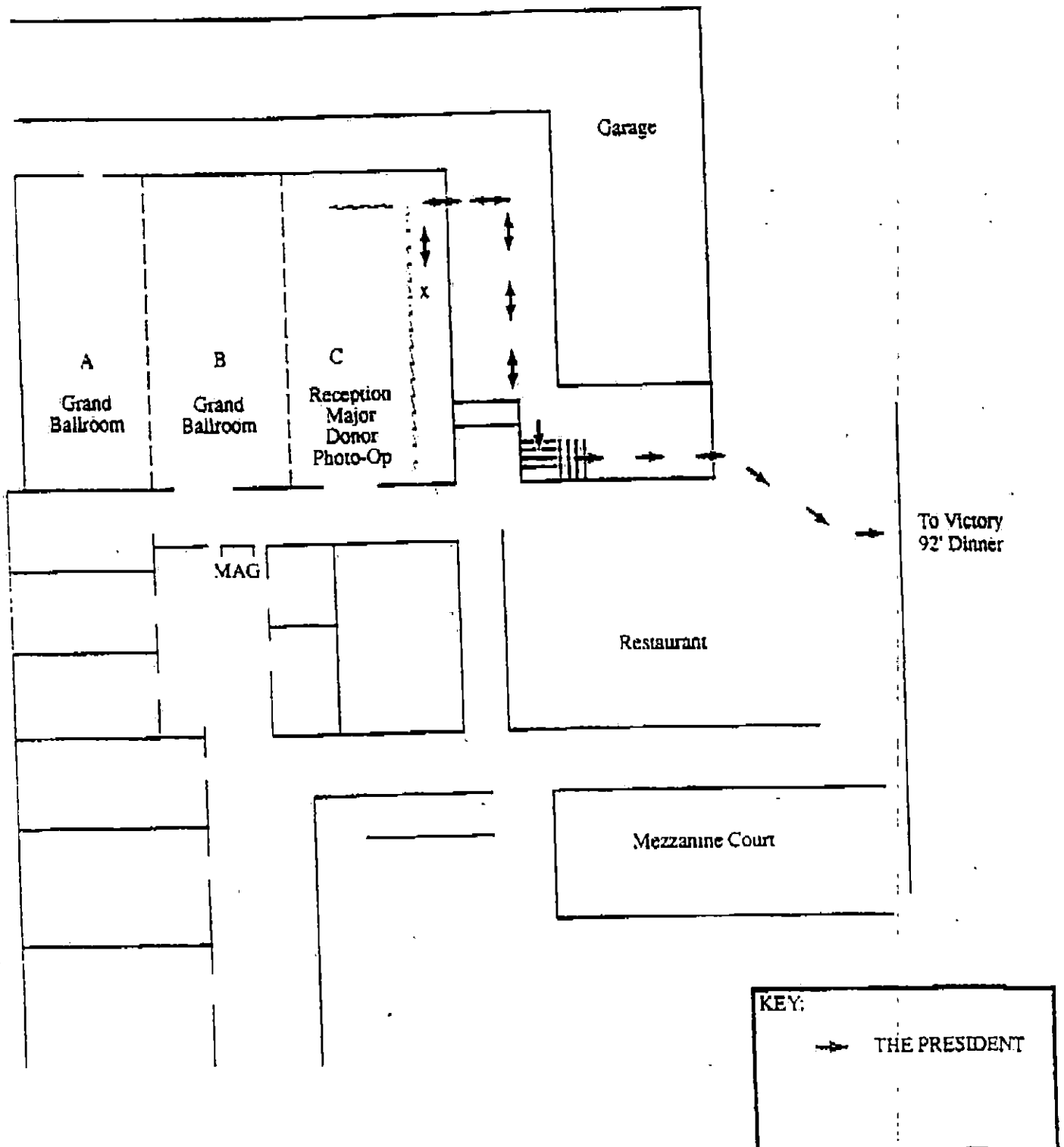

SUBJECT: REMARKS AT PORT OF NEW ORLEANS

Tomorrow afternoon at 2 p.m. you will speak to a crowd of 3,000 office workers and Republicans at the Port of New Orleans. Your remarks (16 minutes/teleprompted) explain the importance of NAFTA and criticize Governor Clinton's inexperience in global economics and his timidity on free trade.

We hope to keep a positive free trade story alive for a second day. On page three, there is a reference to "Cha Ching" - the popular cheer of the New Orlean Saints. I am told you have used this before, but it is pronounced like the sound of a cash register ringing and is used to express enthusiasm.

Good morning, everyone. Former Governor David Treen, Congressman Bob Livingston, Ron Brinson -- President and CEO of the Port of New Orleans.

It is a special pleasure to be alongside the muddy Mississippi, at one of the great ports of the world -- a place where past, present and future come together -- a jambalaya of commerce and enterprise.

Trade was this city's nursemaid, and your virtues are cultivated by a true openness to the outside world -- virtues like tolerance, self-confidence, a fondness for the old and a passion for the new. All these can be found right here -- in the great city of New Orleans.//

This morning I would like to say a few words about the economic challenge facing America -- about the powerful force of trade -- a force that will shape the lives and livelihood of our children.

In this campaign, I have laid out my Agenda for American Renewal -- a comprehensive series of steps to win the new global economic competition. To create here in America -- by early in the next century -- the world's very first \$10 trillion economy.//

My agenda sets out the things we must do to achieve that goal -- the priorities I am fighting for.

I want to literally reinvent American education -- and give every parent the right to choose their kids schools -- public, private or religious.//

I want to reform our legal system -- as a nation we must sue each other less and care for each other more.//

I want to strengthen the American family -- because family is still the foundation of our nation.

I want our nation to save and invest more -- we can do this only by reducing the size of government -- because today government is too big -- and spends too much of your money.//

And I want to limit the terms of members of Congress -- take Congress away from the special interests -- and give it back to you -- the American people.//

These are steps we must take to realize the global opportunity before us -- to place more of our neighbors on the path to prosperity.

But we can begin by grasping a unique opportunity -- to break down century-old barriers to the free-flow of goods and ideas -- by fighting to open new markets. Because you know as well as I do, given the right chance, the American worker can outthink, outcompete, and outwork -- any other in the world.//

I was in San Antonio yesterday -- to mark a turning point in the history of North America. Along with President Carlos Salinas of Mexico and Prime Minister Brian Mulroney of Canada --

we watched the signing of The North American Free Trade Agreement -- or NAFTA.

Over the next 15 years, NAFTA will create the largest free trade area in the world -- an economic trading area with over 360 million consumers -- and over \$6 trillion in annual output.

Trade between the U.S., Mexico and Canada has already increased by 70 percent over the past five years. This agreement strengthens our partnership -- and creates jobs for American workers.

This agreement allows the U.S. to build on our lead as the export superpower. America already sells more products abroad than any other nation in history. Over the past three years, despite a sluggish world economy, U.S. exports have increased more than 30 percent -- and more than \$20 billion of these goods pass through this port -- right here.

(And you know what that means for this city. As the Saints fans might say -- Cha Ching.)//

Today, Louisiana is the nation's sixth largest export state -- with over \$16 billion in export sales. Almost 60,000 jobs, enough people to fill the city of Kenner, are now tied to trade. You send chemicals to Australia, cotton to China and paper to France. You see that yellow tractor right there -- it's headed for Chile. No matter what we're putting in these ships -- we're going to mow down the international competition.//

And while Louisiana leads the way, the rest of America isn't far behind. Already, one in six American manufacturing jobs is

supported by trade. And for those who worry that our children will not enjoy high-wages, consider this fact. On average, trade-related jobs pay 17 percent more than the average U.S. wage. So, if we want our kids to earn more -- we have to promote trade.

You see, the world has changed dramatically the past few years. Where once leaders gathered to find ways to evade conflict, now we meet to find new ways to promote opportunity. Where once our progress was measured only by crises averted, in the new world it will be measured by jobs created.

I learned the lessons of trade not from a textbook, not from a briefing paper, but from the only teacher that counts -- real world experience.

I started out my career in Texas -- (though I know it takes some guts to admit that in Louisiana.) I built a company, met a payroll. Even back then, I learned that the more we could sell in Japan, South America or the Middle East -- the more jobs we could create in Midland and Houston and Odessa.

And over the years, I sensed that the world was becoming more like us, saw people in China and Europe demand more of our cars, our computers even our colas -- and that is why I am so excited by the new era that lies before us.

I know times are tough in America today, but we must keep in mind -- this is a global economic downturn. The nations of Europe suffer higher unemployment, higher interest rates, higher

inflation. But we can lead the way to a new era of prosperity, if we have the courage to do what is right today.

You see, America is uniquely suited to lead this new world -
- just as we led the old one. Despite all the pessimism, don't forget a few facts. We have the largest market -- we sell more high-tech products than any other nation -- our workers are more productive than the Germans, more productive than the Japanese -
- more productive than any other men and women in the entire world.//

In the Cold War, we used our military might to forge alliances across the Atlantic and the Pacific. Today, we can use our economic strength -- to forge new free trade alliances. NAFTA is only the first step. I see other trade agreements with nations in Europe, Latin America and Asia -- and as we tear down walls of trade, we will build new ladders of opportunity here at home.

The old distinction between foreign policy and economic policy has simply vanished. To build a strong economy at home, we must be strong and aggressive abroad.

That's why I believe the American people have a clear choice this November -- between an experienced leader with a clear global vision -- and a governor with virtually no international experience, whose positions are determined by whatever poll was last put in front of his face.

Governor Bill Clinton has spent almost all of his years in government. When he wasn't on the public payroll, he was running for office -- trying to get back on the public payroll.

The Governor's commitment to bigger government in Washington is unwavering, but his commitment to free trade tends to depend on the time of day.

Take NAFTA as an example.

When he started his campaign, Bill Clinton sounded like a staunch defender of free trade. Then, he sought the endorsement of powerful special interests, and they gave him a going-over. Before long, he announced he was undecided. Finally, last week, Governor Clinton looked at the polls one more time -- and came out for NAFTA.

But he left so many conditions, that he left his audience scratching his head.

He said he didn't want the agreement to encourage strike-breakers from coming into the country. That's fine, but the agreement already prevents that.

He said he didn't want the agreement to allow contaminated food to come into the country. Once again, that's been taken care of.

He said he didn't want the agreement to allow other countries to flood our markets with imports -- but part of the agreement is devoted to providing safeguards against them.

(Governor Clinton has laid out so many conditions -- that I wonder if his trade advisor is Vidal Sassoon.)

That worries me. Because in the White House, you can't have it both ways -- the phone in the Oval Office doesn't have a call waiting button. When you're President of the United States -- "maybe" can't be your middle name.//

This is especially important when you're fighting for free and fair trade. Today, the U.S. Congress is a riot of conflicting interests. Many members are loyal to the future and understand that free trade is the way to create jobs.

But others are loyal only to whomever gives them the biggest campaign check -- they open their ears to every open wallet -- they respond to every special interest who asks them to shut down a market, or erect trade barriers.

Only the President can stand up against the irrational impulses of protectionism. Only the President can speak for the national interest -- and fight for the jobs of the future.

That's why American should think hard about what my opponent has to offer. At a time when our economy has become global in nature -- he has virtually no international experience. At a time when free trade demands a leader who will take a stand -- he has demonstrated the sturdy backbone of an Eskimo pie on a steamy New Orleans sidewalk.//

Keep in mind, there was nothing inevitable about this trade agreement. It is the product of thousands of hours of grueling negotiation, hundreds of detours avoided; thousands of diversions ignored.

Only the unwavering resolve of three governments, the steadfast commitment of visionary leaders like Brian Mulroney and Carlos Salinas -- brought this dream to life.

And there is no guarantee that America will remain the world's export superpower -- nothing certain about the economic growth and jobs that will be created.

Our President cannot merely be inclined to accept the new global economy -- he must be passionate about it. He can't just have read about it in a textbook; he must feel it in his bones -- he must have learned it in his life.

The nations of the worlds stand today at a one of those anxious moments in history -- as one era ebbs away -- another comes to fruition. Yes, there are clouds overhead -- but the horizon beckons bright -- if we are true to our nature.

In meeting the challenge of a global economy, America cannot be timid, we cannot be uncertain -- we cannot stand outside the door waiting -- while other nations march right through.

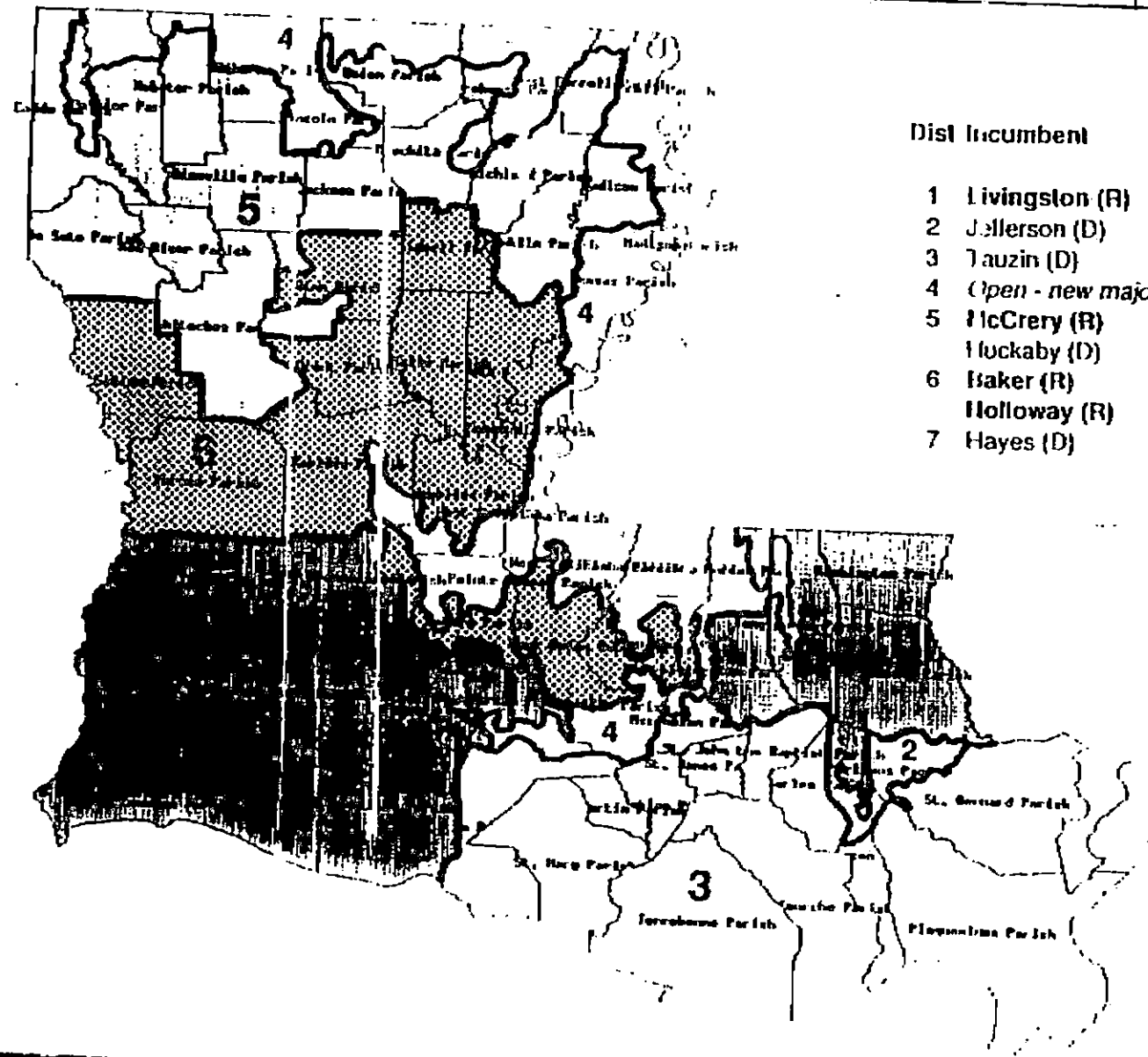
We must be aggressive, we must lead -- we must keep our eyes fixed on the future -- for that is where our opportunity lies.

Barbara Bush Assails Congress

DENVER (AP) — Barbara Bush on Tuesday danced with senior citizens, hugged children and urged voters to stand with President Bush in his battle against Bill Clinton and "the scandal-ridden Congress."

"This is going to be a tough race for the president and all Republican candidates," she told 750 Republican partisans at a \$10-a-plate luncheon at the Jefferson County Fairgrounds.

Earlier, in Colorado Springs, she said the first-ever override of a Bush veto was bad news for the cable television industry, but not a bad omen for Bush.

"What it shows is that a scandal-ridden Congress is just doing what they normally do, playing with the American people's money," she said. Putting the cable industry under government regulation will have "a terrible impact on the cable business," she said.

Mrs. Bush began her day at a \$50-a-plate fund-raising breakfast with 250 women in Colorado Springs, then visited the Colorado Springs Senior Center where she learned a "line dance" to country music and fielded questions from 225 people.

"I don't believe the polls," she told reporters at a brief news conference. "I just don't believe them."

As for Ross Perot, the latest entrant in the presidential race, she said, "I don't think it will make any difference. ... I go around and talk about George Bush and what he's done for the country. That's my kind of campaigning."

In Denver, she saluted a literacy program, the Adult Learning Source, and listened to welfare mothers read with their children at the Bishop Richard Allen Center, then headed to the fairgrounds to fire up the Republican faithful.

She urged them to "clean the House" and "give George ... a Congress that believes the future means more than just their own re-election."

After a fund-raising dinner at a private home, Mrs. Bush was flying to Chicago for campaign appearances there and in Milwaukee Wednesday with daughter Dorothy Koch, daughter-in-law Margaret Bush, sister-in-law Nancy Ellis and granddaughter Noelle Bush.

BARBARA BUSH "PROMISCUOUS SEX IS DEATH"

WASHINGTON, Oct 4, Reuter - First lady Barbara Bush cautioned American youth on Sunday against engaging in promiscuous sex, saying such sex "is death."

"I think the issue is that we ought to tell children that sex is death. It is. Promiscuous sex is death. They shouldn't be doing that," she said.

Mrs Bush joined her husband, President George Bush, for part of an interview on CNN's "Larry King Live" and the conversation turned to the Republican manifesto that called for a ban on all abortions.

Mrs Bush gained the favour of moderate Republicans when she said just before the party's nominating convention in August that abortion should not be included in the manifesto because it was a matter of personal decision.

This was interpreted to mean she was more flexible on abortions than her husband, who says they should be banned except in cases of rape, incest or a threat to the life of the mother.

Mrs Bush declined to be drawn into a discussion of her views on abortion, saying, "We ought to be talking about abstention and education."

In her remarks on the potential dangers of sex, she seemed to be talking about the threat of AIDS as well as abortions.

"We ought to be telling these wonderful young women there's a great deal of life out there for you if you finish school, if you get a job, and then you can have a family. But you shouldn't be having promiscuous sex. It just ruins your life," she said.

First Lady Says 'Promiscuous Sex Is Death'

WASHINGTON (AP) — First lady Barbara Bush says the national debate over abortion should focus on persuading children that "promiscuous sex is death." Appearing with President Bush on CNN's "Larry King Live" program in a taped interview Sunday, Mrs. Bush suggested the news media put too much emphasis on the question of conditions under which abortion should be legal.

"I think the issue is that we ought to tell children that sex is, is death," Mrs. Bush said in the White House interview. "It is. Promiscuous sex is death. They shouldn't be doing that.

"We ought to be telling these wonderful young women there's a great deal of life out there for you if you finish school, if you get a job, and then you can have a family. But you shouldn't be having promiscuous sex. It just ruins your life."

Mrs. Bush has never publicly explained her position on abortion rights.

In the interview, the president said he supported the abortion plank of the Republican Party's national campaign platform — which advocates outlawing abortion under all circumstances — and stated his personal views this way:

"I am against abortion. I am against federal funding except for the life of the mother, and I am against abortions except for rape, incest and the life of the mother."

Clinton to Bush: 'Meet Me in St. Louis' for First Debate

ST. LOUIS, Mo. (AP) — Democrat Bill Clinton, telling President Bush to "meet me in St. Louis," said Saturday the campaign debate series they'll begin next Sunday should not be a test of accusations but of ideas and visions for America's future.

The Democratic presidential nominee said his will win.

"This is a debate about whether we can do better and whether we are better," he told a rally at a farmers' market. "This is a great country but we are going in the wrong direction."

In Washington, the Bush and Clinton campaigns released final details on the debate schedule and officially invited Ross Perot to take part.

There will be three presidential confrontations — Oct. 11 in St. Louis, Oct. 15 in Richmond, Va., and Oct. 19 in East Lansing, Mich. The first will have a panel of questioners, as Bush wanted; the second a single moderator, as Clinton asked, with further questions from the audience, and the third a single moderator for the first half and a panel for the second. There will be a vice presidential faceoff Oct. 13 in Atlanta with a single moderator.

While Clinton was criticizing Bush in St. Louis, Bush was in Florida seeking senior citizens' votes with a promise not to tamper with Social Security and an accusation that Clinton was "trying to scare America's seniors" about possible health-care cuts.

Bush also raised for the first time the subject of Clinton's one-time experimentation with marijuana and said his lack of military service raised questions about his fitness to command the nation's armed forces.

"This guy couldn't remember in detail that he didn't inhale 20 years ago, and he can't remember what came out of his mouth 20 minutes ago." Bush said, accusing Clinton of waffling on issues while at the same time referring to Clinton's acknowledgement that he once experimented with marijuana.

But Clinton said in St. Louis, "The American people know that Bush is the great flip-flopper in this campaign. ... I have displayed a constant passion throughout my political life and a remarkable consistency on the economic, education and other challenges of the day."

Campaigning in Fort Lauderdale, Fla., where he trained as a pilot in World War II, Bush declared, "I do believe that serving in uniform is a good criterion for being commander in chief of the armed forces."

Bush did not mention Perot, who entered the presidential race Thursday and is preparing to take the stage with the president and Clinton at the debates.

"I'm looking forward to debating all comers," Clinton said. "I'm happy about it."

In Dallas, Perot spokesman Orson Swindle said, "I think Mr. Perot is most interested in seeing the issues debated and not so much the format of it."

"Mr. Perot is a man who is very observant, studious, intelligent. He will be well prepared" for the debates, Swindle said.

He said no campaign appearances have been scheduled for the Texas businessman and that the focus now was on preparing a 30-minute commercial that will be telecast Tuesday night.

In Washington, Clinton campaigned for Italian-American votes, appearing with political and business leaders of that ethnic community to announce formation of a leadership council to back his ticket.

Reclaiming the so-called Reagan Democrats, blue collar voters who had shifted to the Republican column in recent elections, has been a major Democratic aim this campaign. Clinton said Italian-American working class voters are among those "we hope and believe will be coming home to us this November."

"Their votes have been sought continually based on emotional and divisive appeals, and I am sure that they now know better," he said.

Clinton shared head table billing at the dinner with Barbara Bush, and tempered a toned down version of his campaign speech with a salute to the president and his family.

"President Bush and I may disagree on economic policy ... on issues ... but I want to say here before this patriotic group that I honor him and Mrs. Bush for their love of their country and their family and for their years of service to the United States," said Clinton.

Mrs. Bush thanked him for that, and mentioned the coming debates. "I'm looking forward to several visits with you in the coming weeks," she said. "I may end up by seeing you more than I see my husband."

Sophia Loren was there, too, and Mrs. Bush said they chatted.

"Sophia and I had the opportunity to talk about our beauty secrets," she said. "And I'm sure she appreciated my advice."

A Newsweek poll taken Thursday and Friday, just after Perot announced, showed Clinton still well ahead, 44 percent to 36 percent for Bush and 14 percent for Perot. The figures had been 46-37-9 one week earlier.

In Missouri, Clinton said he'd had trouble getting Bush to agree to debate but that the schedule was falling in place.

"And I can say to George Bush, meet me in St. Louis," Clinton said, drawing home town cheers.

"Mr. Bush is a good debater in spite of all his talk about being at a disadvantage to me," Clinton said. "I never studied debate at Oxford. Mr. Bush went to a country day school and to Yale. I think he can take care of himself in debate."

"This is not a debate between two people hurling charges," he said. "It is a debate about the direction of the country."

"We have tried it their way," he said. "I offer you a new approach, not trickle-down economics, not tax-and-spend economics, but putting the American people first, investing in our jobs here at home, controlling health care costs."

Clinton recalled that he'd announced his candidacy one year ago Saturday, in Little Rock, with Bush running at 70 percent in the polls. "I don't think even my mother thought I could win," he said. Now he leads the same polls, and Bush is battling to catch up.

Clinton's farmers' market rally wasn't a hit with everyone. Secret Service and police security for Clinton, and a mid-morning crowd of several thousand people concentrating on his rally, hurt business for the people running the fruit and vegetable stands.

"None of our customers could get in," complained Marcella Walter. Clinton noted the problem and put in a plug for the vendors. "After this rally's over, go in there and buy something," he told the crowd. "Go in there and buy some broccoli."

BUSH DEFENDS PRO-CONSUMER STAND; CLINTON IN FLORIDA

WASHINGTON, Reuter - President Bush defended his pro-consumer principles Tuesday after a rebuke from Congress less than a month before Election Day, while Bill Clinton accused Bush of supporting a policy that exports U.S. jobs. Congress Monday overrode Bush's veto of a bill to regulate the cost of cable television, handing him the first veto defeat of his presidency in a vote that had bitter political overtones for Bush in the dash toward the Nov. 3 vote.

"We've had a good streak," Bush said on ABC's "Good Morning America." "We won 35 straight, lost one ... But the big thing is you've got to stand for something, and I felt that my position would have kept consumer costs down."

But proponents of the bill restoring federal oversight of cable TV costs argued just the opposite and carried the day overwhelmingly despite heavy White House lobbying. The override vote passed 308-114 in the House and 74-25 in the Senate, far more than the two-thirds majorities needed.

The Republican Bush took a break from campaigning Tuesday to prepare for the first of three presidential debates Sunday.

But his surrogates were out in force, with Barbara Bush in Colorado, U.S. Trade Representative Carla Hills in Georgia and Labor Secretary Lynn Martin in New Jersey -- all states that Bush had counted on but where Democrat Clinton has gained strength.

The Arkansas governor started the day in Florida, where he attacked a foreign aid program that he said has encouraged U.S. companies to export jobs to Central America.

"No wonder George Bush spends all his time bad-mouthing me. He cannot defend spending tax dollars to shut American plants and throw Americans out of work and take their money to finance low interest loans and job training and promotional ads to move the plants overseas," Clinton told a rally at the University of Florida in Gainesville.

The program Clinton criticized is part of the Caribbean Basin Initiative, begun when Bush was vice president under Ronald Reagan as an effort to help poor Latin American countries. Clinton called the program immoral and said he would end it.

Later Tuesday, Clinton was headed for Tennessee, home of running mate Al Gore, where he was to appear on the popular syndicated "Donahue" television talk show.

Clinton, who has led in polls since the Democratic convention in July, got more good news in recent surveys.

A new Washington Post/ABC News poll had him leading Bush 48 percent to 35 percent, with independent Ross Perot a distant third at 9 percent. A Lou Harris poll put Clinton at 53 percent, Bush at 36 percent and Perot at 9 percent.

A CBS/New York Times poll showed the president closer with 46 percent for Clinton, 38 percent for Bush and 7 percent for Perot.

The polls were taken last Friday through Sunday, after Perot re-entered the race.

Perot, the Texas billionaire who declared himself a presidential candidate last Thursday, scheduled a 30-minute television advertisement for broadcast during prime time Tuesday on CBS. Otherwise, he stayed out of sight.

Wisconsin's Deer Aims To Be First Indian Woman in Congress - And More

MADISON, Wis. (AP) — Ada Deer was the first member of her Menominee tribe to graduate from the University of Wisconsin, the first woman to lead her tribe — and if elected, would be the first American Indian woman to serve in the House.

But the university lecturer says her campaign goes beyond gender and race.

"It would be a nice historical touch, but I am a qualified woman," said the 57-year-old Deer. "I am a whole person."

Her race against first-term Republican Rep. Scott Klug is expected to be one of the harder fought congressional contests.

Klug, 39, is a former television anchorman who upset veteran Rep. Robert W. Kastenmeier two years ago. He has since gained national attention as one of the Republican "Gang of Seven" freshmen who helped expose the bad checks lawmakers wrote at the now-defunct House bank.

"Clearly, the day I won (in 1990) the Democrats sat down at the coffee table to figure out how to replace me," Klug said.

But during his first term, Klug has "bucked the White House" by supporting abortion rights and family leave. Those positions have helped him cultivate a moderate image in a 2nd Congressional District that includes the liberal university city of Madison as well as more conservative rural areas.

A Democratic observer, who spoke on condition of anonymity, gave Klug high marks for keeping in touch with constituents by returning to Wisconsin on weekends and attending picnics, parades and town meetings across his district.

"The problem with Klug is he's doing everything right," the Democrat said.

If Deer prevails, she would become Wisconsin's first woman to serve in Congress as well as the first Indian woman in the House.

Deer is a member of the Menominee Nation, a tribe of about 2,700 members whose reservation is located about 45 miles northwest of Green Bay.

In 1953, at the age of 17, Ms. Deer won a contest as one of the six prettiest Indian girls in the country and was flown to Hollywood to appear in "The Battle of Rogue River," which starred George Montgomery.

After graduating from the university, she became the first woman to lead her tribe as head of the Menominee Restoration Committee, which recreated tribal government after an abortive effort to run the tribe like a corporation.

Deer is on leave from the University of Wisconsin at Madison, where she is a senior lecturer in the school of social work and the American Indian studies program.

In her campaign, she has embraced such issues as universal health insurance and cuts in military spending to create jobs and boost social programs at home.

The former Indian leader accepts no political action committee money. Klug has accepted \$113,195 from PACs during the last two years, according to Federal Election Commission reports through August.

Both candidates have attracted the support of prominent personalities.

First lady Barbara Bush helped Klug launch his re-election bid in May, raising about \$100,000 for Klug's campaign at a brunch.

The Rev. Jesse Jackson visited Madison in September to endorse Deer, saying she "represents a sense of history, of healing and of hope."

Barr: America In Moral Decline

WASHINGTON (AP) Citing Woody Allen as a case in point, Attorney General William P. Barr says America is in a headlong moral decline caused by permissiveness and rampant secularism.

"Today we are in the midst of a great moral crisis," Barr said in an after-dinner speech Tuesday to a conference of conservative Roman Catholics. "We have lived through 25 years now of permissiveness, sexual revolution and the drug culture."

A "pithy summary" of the problem was provided by Woody Allen's reaction to criticism of the actor-director's affair with the young adopted daughter of Mia Farrow, Barr said.

"Genuinely puzzled over all the fuss, Mr. Allen explained to Time magazine that he was in love with the girl," the attorney general said. "Having fallen in love, Mr. Allen implied it must follow as night follows the day the two of them would consummate their love. After all, he said, the heart wants what the heart wants."

Added Barr, "Try that as an instruction for your children when they ask you if a particular course of conduct is good or bad."

Allen's comment on the break-up of his relationship with Miss Farrow dramatizes contemporary "licentiousness," the attorney general said.

"Mr. Allen epigrammatically captures the essence of contemporary moral philosophy," said Barr. "That, in essence, has been the guiding principle behind our moral decline and the rallying cry of the long binge that began in the mid-1960s."

Barr spoke to the Catholic League for Religious and Civil Rights and the Fellowship of Catholic Scholars.

Except possibly for a passing reference to first lady Barbara Bush, the attorney general did not say anything that sounded politically partisan.

But some of his comments seemed to echo themes in the Republican platform and championed in the current campaign by President Bush and Vice President Dan Quayle.

For example, Barr said legalized abortion and the deterioration of the traditional family were among the most obvious signs of pervasive moral collapse.

"The secularists of today are clearly fanatics," he said. Their debunking of the "Judeo-Christian moral tradition" has produced "soaring juvenile crime, widespread drug addiction, skyrocketing rates of venereal disease, 1.5 million children aborted each year," he said.

"Today I fear the power and pervasiveness of our high-tech popular culture not only fuels the collapse of traditional morality but drowns out the scattered voices that are raised against secularization," the attorney general said.

Barr, who attended a Roman Catholic elementary school, said one way to "regain our moral compass" was to "do all we can to promote Catholic education at all levels."

The attorney general's reference to Mrs. Bush was to note a study she cited about alcoholism, drug addiction and violence in a California public school district.

Debates dominate candidates' agendas

With debates on his mind, President Bush stuck close to home and largely offstage yesterday, delivering campaign messages through one television interview at a time.

The only technique he prefers more is one-way communication to friendly audiences.

One example of that is the nationwide spectacular arranged for Thursday night when the president, first lady Barbara Bush, former Presidents Reagan and Ford, Vice President Dan Quayle and Mrs. Quayle each will address 35 Victory '92 fund-raising dinners from different locations via satellite television hookup.

As Election Day nears and the punditry becomes more ominous, Mr. Bush is getting down on the press as he has not been throughout his presidency. He continues to shun the national press corps, with which he is openly disgusted.

He hasn't had a press conference since August, when he held No. 140, and hasn't talked to reporters on Air Force One since late spring.

"The media has been rolling down the tracks in their own inimitable way and

it's not been very pleasant," Mr. Bush said in words reminiscent of President Kennedy's remark, "I'm reading more and enjoying it less."

At dawn yesterday and again in the afternoon, he sat in the Map Room talking into a television camera that has become a semipermanent fixture there.

He set aside three hours to bone up on briefing books for Sunday's first debate in St. Louis with Arkansas Gov. Bill Clinton and Texas businessman Ross Perot. He gave up his weekly rest stop at Camp David and plans to do mock debates Saturday with stand-ins who haven't yet been identified.

The Arkansas governor returned to Little Rock last night and is taking today off to rest his voice, raspy after nine days of campaigning. He holds a news conference tomorrow before going to Kansas City, which will serve as his debate headquarters.

Mr. Clinton will speak at a rally Friday in Kansas City and Saturday in St. Louis. On Sunday, he will go to church and then go behind closed doors until the debate.

To prepare, Mr. Clinton has two loose-leaf binders — one on domestic policy and the other on foreign affairs, said Clinton campaign director Bruce Lindsey.

Mr. Bush continues to shun the national press corps, with which he is openly disgusted.

Playing Mr. Bush will be Washington lawyer Bob Barnett, who has made a minicareer playing the president during the Democrats' 1984 vice-presidential and 1988 presidential debate simulations, Mr. Lindsey said.

Yesterday, on ABC's "Good Morning America," Mr. Bush brushed off as "Washington Post gossip" a question about reports that Budget Director Richard Darman called his repudiation of the 1990 budget agreement "sheer idiocy."

"They have very little to do about what I'm trying to do for the country, what my answers are on principle, so I can simply say he's got my full confidence,"

Yesterday afternoon Mr. Bush gave separate interviews to the four major Philadelphia TV stations, part of a successful program to get dominant exposure in battleground areas. The campaign designates Michigan, Missouri,

Illinois, Ohio, Pennsylvania, New Jersey and Wisconsin as battleground states that either side could win.

"The president feels it's a good opportunity for him to talk directly to the voters in those regions," Deputy White House Press Secretary Laura Melillo said, of the White House invitations to regional TV personalities.

Much of his travel has been geared to capturing favorable coverage throughout those regions, coverage that nearly always holds him in awe and is uncritical.

"There's nothing scientific, but our people out in the field who have a better sensitivity say it's going very well. We have stacks and stacks and stacks of clips from the towns he visits. And it's very positive," Miss Clarke said.

Each of Thursday's dinners in 25 states will have an administration-related speaker and all will hear and see the stars from Houston (President Bush), St. Louis (Mr. Quayle), Los Angeles (Mr. Reagan), Philadelphia (Mr. Ford), New York (Mrs. Bush), Atlanta (Arnold Schwarzenegger) and Washington (Mrs. Quayle, Senate Minority Leader Robert Dole and House Minority Leader Robert Michel).

Pols kneel before King of cable TV

That Larry King is probably so swellheaded these days he can barely squeeze through the doors of the CNN building on First Street NW. The old schmoozer, the Arsenio Hall of the hard news set, is now The Man To See if you want to be president.

President Bush guested on "Larry King Live" from the White House Sunday night, coming off at times like a regular guy and ably assisted by GOP MVP Barbara B.. Mr. Bush returns tonight to take questions from callers worldwide.

Monday night, Wonder Twins Bill Clinton and Al Gore gabbed with Larry live from Ocala, Fla., where the Democratic bus tour had bedded down for the night.

It was like a session around the campfire. Big Bill and Ole Al sittin' in the swamp wearin' work shirts, like good Dimmycrats, tellin' tales that ought to have made many a Republican shiver in his sleeping bag from fright.

Why? Because the Wonder Twins looked and sounded good on TV. Real good. They came across as relaxed and common-sensical, earnest and unflappable.

Whether it's true or not, they (significant, that "they"; Mr. Gore talked as much as Mr. Clinton) speak as if they know what they believe in and are comfortable defending it. This contrasts with the syntax-challenged Mr. Bush, whose difficulty as an extemporaneous speaker makes it seem sometimes that he doesn't know his own mind.

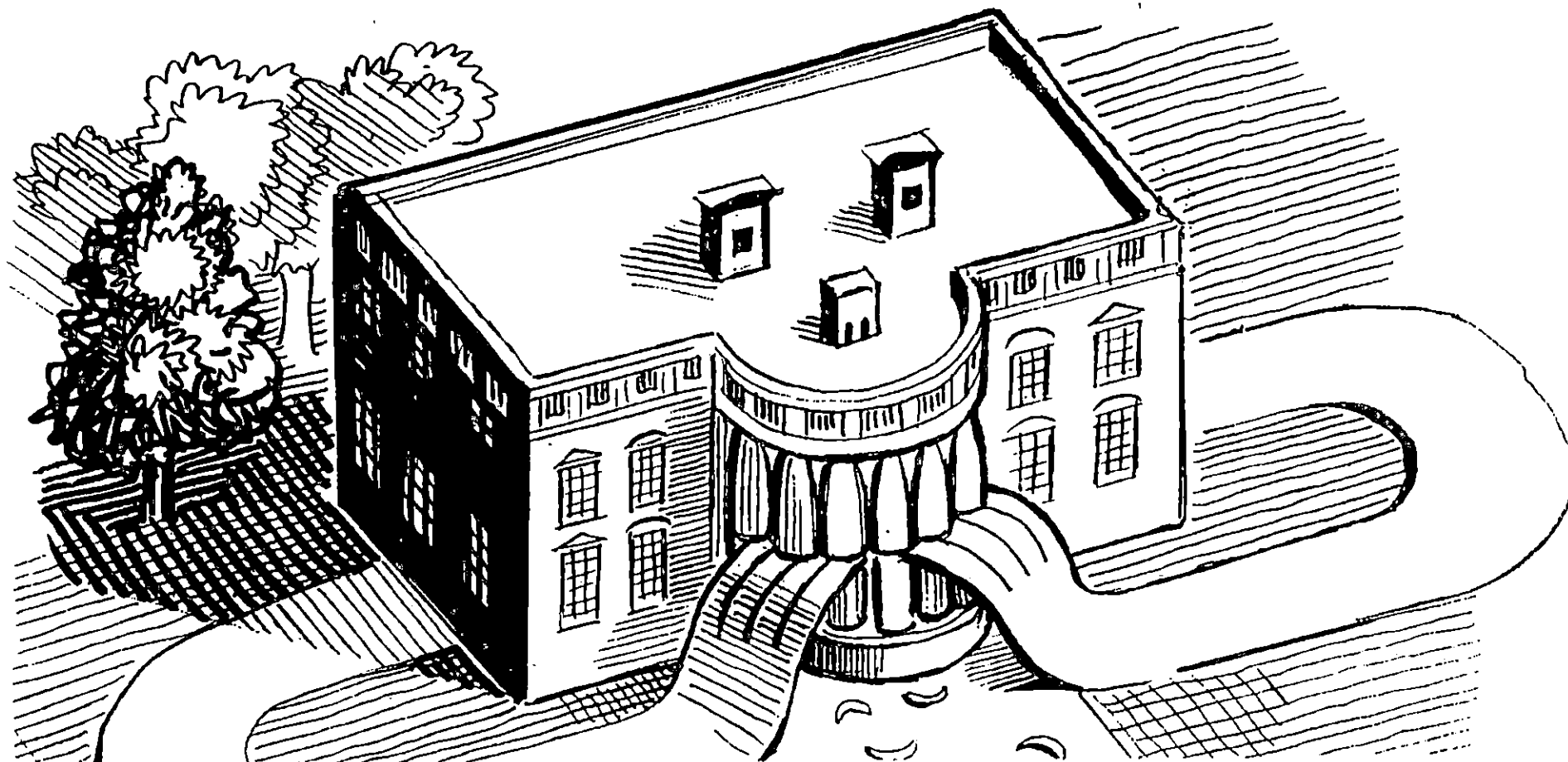

The White House Gets the Willies

One Month
To Go and the
Joint Is Jumpy.

You are a Republican, employed because of your politics, and lately you've noticed something weird. Your friends outside the party—and you do have a few of those friends—have started tiptoeing around the subject of George Bush. They aren't arguing with you anymore. In better days, they'd whine and complain and bait you. Now they sit quietly, at lunches and luncheons, *trying to be sensitive to your feelings.*

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The poll results just sit there on the front page, bordered in black like a new widow's stationery. It's like reading your horoscope: You say you don't believe a word of it, but. You turn on the television and see Bill Clinton walking with Admiral Crowe. You saw Clinton two weeks ago, on TV too, surrounded by CEOs who support him. *How could anybody support that guy?* In Time magazine, you read that Marshall Bush, George's 6-year-old granddaughter, told a classmate in Virginia that grandpa "won't be president much longer." Somebody tells you that they heard Dan Quayle plans to give up politics and move to Arizona to run his family's newspaper. You hear another rumor that Mrs. Bush is discouraged and crabby, but then you see her on C-Span a couple weeks later at that whistle-stop thing in Ohio—and she looks fantastic. And you feel great! So much better! But *why?* And suddenly, you're not feeling so great.

You are one of 3,000 government workers serving at the pleasure of George Bush, and things are getting just a little bit schizo.

"Oh, today we're very upbeat!" says Sam Skinner, the former White House chief of staff, answering his own phone at the Republican National Committee last Thursday. "But there'll be something else tomorrow," he says. "You'll find it goes way up, and way down."

Panic indeed set in last week, followed by a desperate optimism when the news spread that the president

wanted to debate Clinton three times before the election on Nov. 3. After Ross Perot announced he was back in—maybe taking votes from Clinton—the Republican mood soared, although precariously. "Of course," whispers one consultant who has grown wealthy off his Republican connections, "the ultimate nightmare is that Perot will bail out right before the election *and en-*

dorse Clinton."

Mania, then grumpiness. Numbness, then confidence, then doubts. Some of the campaign staff have that tentative, limp look of helium balloons after three days on the ceiling. Late hours, morning headaches, creeping anxiety. White House staffers, making every attempt to seem positive, say they felt "great relief" when James Baker took over as chief

of staff—everything, let him take over *everything*—but then another depression settled over the GOP on Sept. 22, when the ABC News/Washington Post poll showed Bush 21 points behind Clinton. Even though some of the staff took comfort in campaign co-chairman Robert Teeter's own polls—which showed the race was considerably closer—it wasn't exactly enough. "Black Mon-

day," somebody whispers, even though it was a Tuesday. "It was really terrible. Huge impact. People were talking about needing new jobs. Phones started ringing."

When Michael Farren, the aide to campaign directors Teeter and Fred Malek, announced he would be leaving Nov. 4 to be the Washington representative for Xerox, other people

started worrying about Nov. 4 too.

"Résumé writers are the lowest form of life," fumes Mary Matalin, the Bush campaign's political director. "They've obviously forgotten what they're here for. All that self-indulgence! Once we win this election, I'd like to wipe all those people out of office. Clean house!"

Getting a little testy? Is there a little problem with . . . mood?

"Mood? My mood hasn't changed one bit," says Matalin. "Anybody who's going any legitimate work on this campaign is too professional, too busy, too focused, to even *have* a mood."

The day the poll was released, Malek gave a pep talk to staffers—"No more long faces"—that left some people feeling even more depressed. "I've had volunteers on the campaign," says Republican direct-mail strategist and abortion-rights activist Ann Stone, "tell me that they don't even want to go back in the building."

Just one week after this dire mood slump—on Sept. 29—the ABC/Washington Post poll stunned the Republicans again. It had fluctuated wildly. Bush, it showed, was only nine points behind.

"One week in politics," says White House speechwriter Curt Smith, "is like a year anywhere else."

It's Upbeat. I Swear

Since James Baker's timely return—did he change in a phone booth?—and with his SWAT team of efficiency specialists, George Bush himself has seemed more confident, according to Torie Clarke, the campaign press secretary. ("All that has helped Bush's confidence level," she says.) And indeed, Matalin describes the president as "confident, serene, invincible, unstoppable." His exuberance and energy on the road have been at least sporadically contagious:

"It's not too late!" says one longtime political appointee, a Republican veteran who woke up one November morning in 1976 out of a job. "You never stop skating as fast as you can—until the whistle blows."

"I've always been upbeat," says Anna Perez, the First Lady's press secretary.

"I'm upbeat!" says Roy Pfautch, a Republican public affairs consultant. "I'm very positive! Look what happened in England! In Japan!" (In . . . Japan?)

"Despite slings and arrows, he will be reelected," says Joseph Verner Reed, former chief of protocol, now an undersecretary general at the United Nations. "But remember, you're talking to JVR and I'm *always positive!* The glass is always half full for me!"

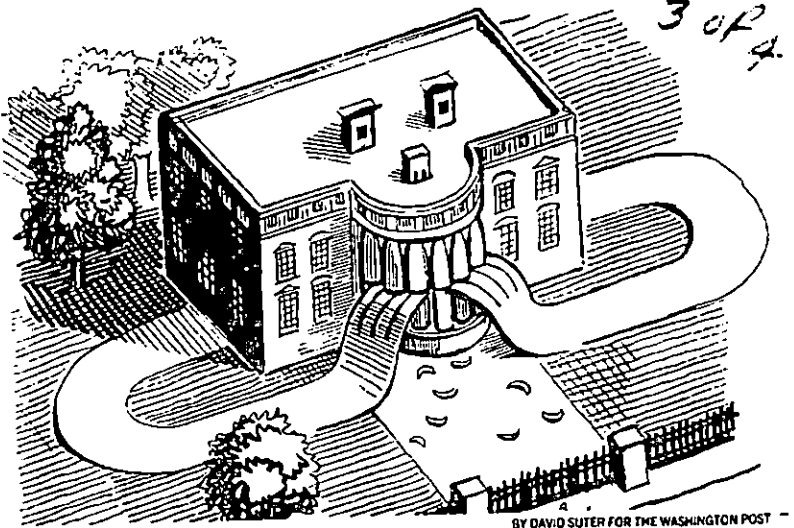
"Upbeat? *Are they really sounding upbeat at the White House?*" asks one Republican appointee, an agency official who was born and raised in Washington. "What planet are these people from?"

Earth, says James Pinkerton. He's the Bush campaign official who penned the Republican Party's New Paradigm.

"Some of us draw sustenance and comfort from history and precedent," says Pinkerton. "You know, the conservatives in Britain, for example. John Major, from the right-of-center party, running for reelection—that's the third consecutive reelection—was behind in the polls, never ahead in the polls, for an entire campaigning season, and he even lost some of the exit polls, but, in fact, went on to win."

Maytag, Maytag!

That sinking feeling came early for some. In winter, a Republican advance man showed up at the Bush campaign headquarters and it was empty. "That worried me," he says. "I looked around and there were four people on

the phones. It looked like the Maytag repairman shop."

Second-guessing and scapegoat-hunting have been going on all spring, all summer. Something was broke. Something needed fixing. First, people complained that Sam Skinner was an incompetent chief of staff. Then people began complaining that the president's advance office was fumbling. "They still can't get the right number of chairs on stage for an event," says one aide at the Commerce Department. Says an advance man at another agency: "They are just getting around to figuring out sound and lighting."

Waiting for Bush to start the campaign became another sore point. "I don't know of anybody who was comfortable with the president waiting until after the convention to begin campaigning," says Lou Cordia, who tends the Reagan-Bush alumni association.

Four speechwriters were not fired but "reassigned" in early August ("the Tuesday Night Massacres," somebody calls it), a mood-altering prescription.

The response was mixed, as usual. Some Republicans complained that more White House staff should be fired—"It's a huge welfare state over there," says one campaign aide—but others were happy enough to be cheerful: Decisions were being made! Still others suggest that the firing was brutal and unnecessary. "It's a jarring contrast," says a former Bush aide, "from three years ago when George Bush was talking Polaroids of his staff in the Lincoln Bedroom. All those friendly little notes and gestures. Now it's the White House Shuffle."

People at the White House tend to worry about the campaign people. People at the campaign tend to worry about the White House people. "Everybody blames Skinner," says one White House aide, "and Skinner blames Teeter." A couple of weeks ago, when The Washington Post ran a list of White House salaries on its Federal Page, people at the campaign headquarters couldn't help noticing. They couldn't believe how much the White House staff was making. "Haven't you noticed," says a campaign staffer, "that when you call over there, it's like trying to talk to people who are comatose?"

In July, the White House invited about 200 old Reagan types to a reception in the Old Executive Office Building—to reach out, renew support, all that. The president appeared, and Dan Quayle and Dick Cheney and Sam Skinner and Clayton Yeutter and even old Ed Meese. "All the big hitters," says one of the invited, a Reaganite unused to such attention, and skeptical of it. "They must have been totally panicked."

Skinner spoke for 10 minutes, searching for ways to bond with this group of conservatives, who were upset about the tax increase, the civil rights bill, the refusal to try to use the line-item veto,

the failure to control bureaucracy, the squandered 90 percent approval rating. "The more I think about this campaign," Skinner told the group, searching for common ground, "the more it reminds me of an earlier campaign we were all involved in—Goldwater in '64."

"I turned to my friend," says the Reaganite, "and I said: *Yeah, real similar. We only carried five or six states.*"

By the end of August, people had moved on to complaining about the convention—that the trick of using Barbara Bush and Marilyn Quayle had backfired, that women voters had been turned off. The polls continued to look lousy. The convention was unnerving.

"It looked like a convention of nuts," says Ann Stone. "We can't let Pat Buchanan and Phyllis Schlafly run the Republican show."

This fall, now that the advance problems look solved—longtime Reagan advance types were brought in to do the train trip—and the convention seems like old news, the griping of political appointees has come back to another favorite old target: Treasury Secretary Nicholas Brady.

"You know how long Nick Brady would have lasted in the Reagan administration with his kind of results?" asks an appointee of both presidents. "Ronnie would have given him some medal of freedom and said, *And by the way, Nick, don't let the door hit you on the way out.*"

Waiting for the Miracle

Perhaps the greatest symptom of desperation is the ever-floating and ever-changing rumors about Bill Clinton that buzz from Republican to Republican. They are chanted, over and over, to members of the press: Hundreds of women all over the nation, it would seem, are raising Clinton's illegitimate children. Suicides too have resulted from the hearts he has supposedly broken. During Vietnam, Clinton tried to become a Swede, somebody says, to get out of military service. "There's a letter to prove it," he says.

"No, he tried to become a British subject," says somebody else. "And I heard that Prince Charles handed the letter personally to George Bush."

"Yes," somebody else says, "there's paperwork on that."

"Go to Moscow for the story," says a Republican fund-raiser. "The Kremlin knows everything."

"I heard," says a campaigner, "that Jim Baker has a letter that he's going to pull out at an opportune time."

"Yeah-right," says a Republican appointee on a federal board. "That letter is sitting in Baker's top desk drawer now. One of the reasons he never leaves his office."

Deus ex machina?

The hand of God?

"No," the appointee responds. "The hand of Jim Baker—more powerful than God."

"Ohhh," sighs a campaign staffer when the rumor stories come up, "I'm sick of Baker getting credit for everything."

The Wave of the Future?

You drift into fantasy. Every so often, an image of George and Barbara Bush comes into your head. They are standing on the tarmac at Andrews Air Force Base—at the bottom of a flight of airplane steps, about to board. They are waving. Barbara's wearing her wide and bright blue suit. George is smiling and wincing at the same time. They wave again. Their hair is blowing around at Andrews, for the last time maybe, and you're watching them stand there on TV, and then you flip the channel over to the Clinton inaugural parade and you are already feeling bad about it. You are imagining feeling bad for the Bushes. Bad for yourself too. Bad about it all.

Run. Run out of town?

"He'll be Carterized," says one appointee. "He'll be in the company of Jimmy Carter and Herbert Hoover."

"Worse than Carterized," says a big-name Republican consultant. "He'll be Fordized, and he'll be opening K mart's for \$1,500."

The hate comes back—now and

again. Clinton . . . ugh. You hate waste and all those liberals and imagine the money flowing out of their paychecks fattening up the government—and watching it expanding, expanding, expanding—way beyond control, beyond the imaginations of any. "It's like I have cancer," says one Bush appointee. "I don't like thinking about it. I wish you wouldn't remind me about it."

Says another, who came to Washington to work for Reagan: "All the crap we've been through over the last 12 years—the negative stories in the media, the countless lawsuits, the effort and heartache and abuse and sacrifice. . . . In four years, Bill Clinton will have this country back to where it was in 1980. You have to ask yourself—was it all worth it?"

"There's been this lovefest between the press and Clinton that makes me sick," says a former White House aide. "The press is so bored by Bush and all the same people. They just want somebody new to write about—then rip to shreds next spring. And just wait, in about five or six months, we'll be stuck with this horrible president that everybody hates."

What else? Anger, resentment, disappointment, the feeling that maybe it's all slipping away quickly—sands of

the hourglass and all that. Your life, your advantages, your ideology, your blue enamel cuff links with the White House presidential seal on them. Good seats at the swearing-in ceremony, photo ops, the box at the Kennedy Center, international travel.

All going, all going, all maybe gone.

"I went to a reception last night," says one prominent Republican strategist. "People weren't angry so much as disgusted. This White House has been so smug and exclusionary, and they've been coasting for so long and winning on the same format that they can't grasp that it's not working."

"There are two theories among some conservatives," says a Republican conservative. "One is that maybe Bush ought to lose so after four disastrous years of Clinton, we can regain the White House with a true conservative. The other theory is that, if George Bush wins, all his people are going to be impossible to live with."

A White House aide of four years says: "Ahhh, the White House is such a caldron. The stakes are so high. The stress is so great. All this reminds me of the saying, *I would not want to relive this, but I wouldn't have missed this for the world.*"
