I. PURPOSE

To meet with the leadership of the Little Rock Lodge of the Fraternal Order of Police (FOP) and thank them for their strong endorsement.

II. BACKGROUND

With 361 officers, Little Rock FOP Lodge #17 is the largest police group in the state of Arkansas. In mid-September officers voted overwhelmingly to endorse you, despite a last-minute phone call from Governor Clinton. Lodge President John Gilcrest cited your solid commitment and continued support of law enforcement officers during your presidency as a major reason for this endorsement. The Little Rock FOP endorsed you in 1988 as well.

Governor Clinton has had a strained relationship with Arkansas law enforcement, specifically as a result of his low spending levels for law enforcement, a disinterest in the state's criminal justice system and differences over labor and pension issues. In addition, Governor Clinton has failed to attend almost all of the annual police officer memorial events held at the State Capitol during his administration, a sore point with many officers.

The Vice President visited the Lodge this summer and spoke before many of its members. Although the Arkansas State Chapter declined to support you, the Little Rock Lodge is the largest lodge in the state. Despite the state's vote, the National FOP endorsed you last week in Ohio.

The delegation will be led by Lodge President John Gilcrest. Officer Gilcrest, 29, has been with the Little Rock Police Department and FOP Lodge for four years. He is a patrol officer with the Community Oriented Police Patrol (COPP), a new program designed to improve community relations through the use of increased foot and bicycle patrols.

SUBJECT: Angolan Inaugural Ceremonies (Mid-November)

Angola held its first democratic elections on September 29 and 30, 1992. Election officials have delayed announcing results until United Nations (UN) observers have investigated National Union for the Total Independence of Angola (UNITA) claims of election fraud. Pending results of the U.N. investigation, the inauguration ceremony for the new government of Angola is likely to be held in mid to late November. You have already approved a delegation, but General Scowcroft has made additional recommendations and I concur.

I recommend that you approve the following additional individuals to serve on the delegation:

CHESTER A. CROCKER, of Massachusetts. Former Assistant Secretary of State for African Affairs. Should be included to recognize his efforts to establish peace in the region and to create the preconditions for Angolan reconciliation.

AMBASSADOR EDMUND DE JARNETTE, of Virginia. Currently the Ambassador to Tanzania. Will be serving as charge d'affairs in Luanda during the inauguration (non-travelling member). In clearance for nomination as Ambassador to Angola.

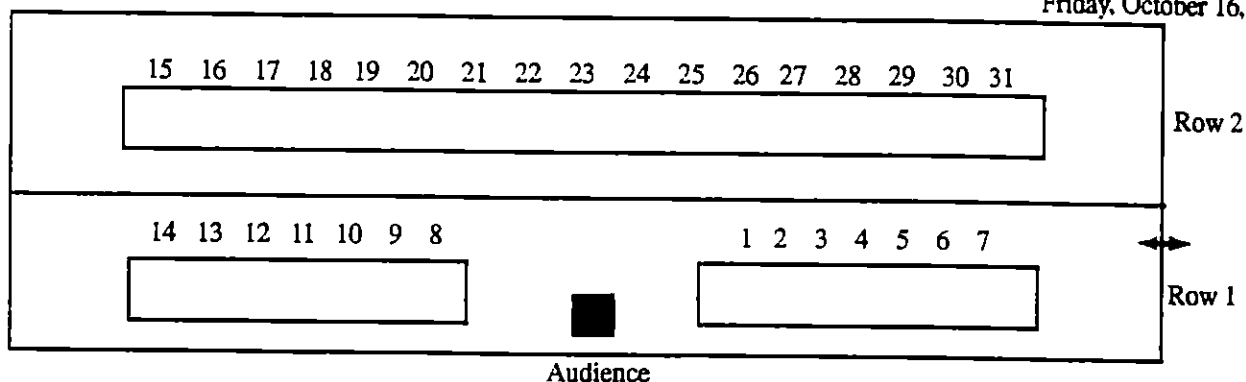

You will be asked to explain why you broke your "no new taxes" pledge; why your Health Care proposal is better than Mr. Clinton's for New Jersey; and how you propose to balance environmental concerns with those of business.

NEWARK STAR LEDER EDITORIAL BOARD

Question: New Jersey's current unemployment rate stands at about 9%. That's higher than when you took office. To what extent are you responsible.

Answer: First, the state's employment picture just got better. The most recent figures showed an improvement from 9.4% to 9%. Also, I think New Jersey's economy would have improved faster without \$3 billion in new taxes from Governor Florio. The Bush Administration policies have actually improved the picture, by increasing exports which are so important to the state's economy. I know people are hurting. That's why I sent package after package to Congress. If they would just pass my tax break for first time homebuyers, construction jobs would be much better.

Question: A large section of central New Jersey residents claim to be adversely effected by aircraft noise from jets arriving and departing Newark International Airport. They are complaining that an environmental impact statement has been delayed. What is your feeling?

Answer: Secretary of Transportation Andrew Card has met with these affected residents to hear their complaint that the 1989 flight patterns were instituted without public hearings (illegally). I'm waiting to hear his assessment. However, in any case, I pledge in my second term to deliver real relief to the affected areas. We can utilize different flight patterns -- higher and wider -- and divert flights over the ocean and into military air space in order to ease their burden. I will work to find a solution.

Question: New Jersey's law for funding hospital costs for indigent patients has been ruled invalid by the courts. This highlights the health care problem here in New Jersey. How would your plan help provide coverage for New Jerseyans?

Answer: The last thing New Jersey needs is a payroll tax to fund its health care system. This is a major difference between Governor Clinton and me. I seek more competition within the system and tort reform in order to lower costs.

Other key state issues include:

- * School choice. [Background: NJ is a state with many private schools and parents of private school pupils supporting the plan. Education system very strongly opposed. Gov. Kean is not a strong supporter of a school choice program which places private schools in competition with public schools.]
- * Environment. [Contrary to the image, the Bush Administration has had an excellent record in New Jersey the past four years. Accomplishments include the increase in funding to the Coast Guard, releasing millions in Federal Super Fund clean up dollars and the end of ocean sludge dumping. NJ's economy is very dependent on a clean ocean and George Bush has delivered on his promises.]
- * Clinton and Florio: [The NJ Bush campaign has worked hard to link Gov. Florio and Gov. Clinton. They have similar plans to tax the "rich" and solve problems with big government programs. First, by newspaper accounts, Gov. Clinton has "ducked" the issue. He told the Asbury Park Press that he "takes no position one way or the other." The Florio taxes and more spending did not help the New Jersey economy or prevent a budget deficit the following year.]

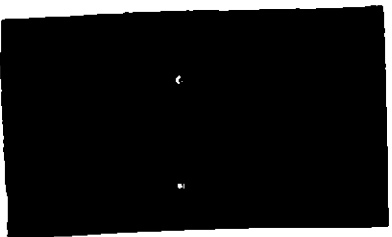

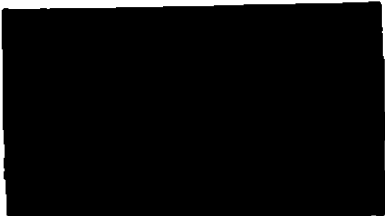

I. RECENT CORRESPONDENCE

On September 23, State Senator John E. Dimon (R), chairman of the legislature's Military Affairs Committee, and Edward A. Kelly, Jr., Military Liaison for Burlington County, wrote voicing their support for using Fort Dix as an orientation and education facility for multinational peacekeeping forces.

B. State Employee Layoffs

In the biggest round of layoffs in the State's history, Governor Jim Florio (D) dismissed 1,500 state employees on October 5, 1992, in an attempt to balance the State's budget. Over the next eight months, an additional 2,600 state workers are expected to be laid off. Including the 3,500 state workers taken off the payroll last year, New Jersey will have reduced its work force by 10 percent by Spring of '93.

C. Haytaian Economic Growth Proposal

Assembly Speaker Chuck Haytaian (R) has proposed an economic growth package for New Jersey that would: (1) phase out its telecommunications tax, (2) phase in a capital gains tax exclusion, (3) offer a tax credit to companies that boost spending on research and development, and (4) allow small businesses to organize as Subchapter "S" corporations under the Internal Revenue Service Code without risking double taxation.

D. "Medicaidgate"

The New Jersey Legislature's Joint Select Committee on Medicaid Reimbursement is meeting to investigate the State's loss of nearly half a billion dollars in anticipated Medicaid reimbursement funds which has been dubbed "Medicaidgate." This issue has become a political football in New Jersey with the Republican legislative leadership blaming Governor Florio and Florio trying to place the blame on the Republican legislature and the Bush Administration.

In December of 1991, New Jersey applied to the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) for retroactive claims for reimbursement of Medicaid disproportionate share costs for State and County psychiatric hospitals in the amount of \$450 million. These previously unanticipated federal funds were incorporated by Governor Florio into his FY'92 and FY'93 spending plans.

Based on its clear regulatory requirements, HHS rejected part of New Jersey's retroactive claims in the amount of \$74 million.

On June 25, 1992, HHS Deputy Secretary, Kevin Moley, indicated in a letter to Speaker Haytaian that New Jersey may prospectively receive approximately \$126 million of the requested \$450 million. The receipt of these funds is contingent on New Jersey resubmitting its application and dropping its claim for the additional monies. The Florio Administration refused this because it still believes it is entitled to the \$450 million and has appealed the preliminary denial. Speaker Haytaian believes Governor Florio is delaying a settlement until after the election in the hopes of a Clinton presidency.

Governor Clinton chose Rawhay, N.J., on September 24, 1992, to deliver a major health speech which addressed Medicaid, but did not mention the New Jersey dispute.

E. NAFTA

- Since 1987, 36,400 new jobs have been created by growth in New Jersey's manufactured exports to Canada and Mexico.

F. Sales Tax Revenue

In what some analysts are pointing to as a signal of improving economic conditions, New Jersey income tax revenue for the month of July increased 9.3% from that collected in June of 1992. The figures are especially promising when juxtaposed to July of 1991, when base sales tax collections dropped 8% from June of 1991. Most significantly, sales tax revenue jumped while the sales tax rate was cut from 7% to 6%.

G. Intermodal Surface Transportation Act

Between now and 1997, a total of \$1.2 billion will be spent in Hudson County on projects to improve local roads, consolidate rail service from outlying counties into Penn Station in Manhattan, build a light rail line along the waterfront, and separate traffic bound for the waterfront from the flow of commuters to New York.

Badly in need of improved transit facilities for commuting to New York, New Jersey is a major beneficiary of the Federal Intermodal Surface Transportation Act. Ultimately, the State expects to receive \$2.4 billion for highways, \$1.5 billion for mass transit, \$700 million for bridges and more than \$1 billion for transit and highway demonstration projects.

H. SSA Grants for Outreach Activities

The Social Security Administration (SSA) recently awarded \$8 million in federal grants to 49 community-based organizations to locate and assist low-income elderly, blind and disabled individuals who may be eligible for SSI benefits.

CONGRESSIONAL DISTRICT VISIT

On this trip, the President will travel to Edison to attend a Middlesex County College Welcome and to Somerset to attend a Victory '92 event. Edison is in Congressional District 06, represented by Democrat Congressman Frank Pallone. Representative Pallone is seeking a third term and faces Republican State Senator Joseph Kyrillos. Senator Kyrillos worked for President Bush during the 1984 Presidential Campaign. Somerset is in Congressional District 07, represented by Republican Congressman Matthew Rinaldo. Representative Rinaldo is seeking an eleventh term and is facing Democrat homebuilder Leonard Sendelsky.

POLITICAL HOT POINTS

Between October 2 and October 4, the Asbury Park Press conducted a poll of 696 likely voters with a margin of error of +/- 4.5 percent. These were the results:

Last week, the New Jersey Clinton-Gore Headquarters released a statement suggesting that 500 workers were fired from a Maidenform plant in Bayonne because the Agency for International Development encouraged the company to move to Honduras. After the New Jersey BUSH-QUAYLE Headquarters challenged that account, a Clinton spokeswoman admitted that there is no direct connection between the layoffs and the Agency. Maidenform officials stated that the company is consolidating and moving to Florida and North Carolina to hire 450 workers.

The First Lady, Doro Koch, and Secretary Lynn Martin have been visiting New Jersey to court women voters. On October 21, they will return with more women from the First Family to visit many sights in northern New Jersey.

On September 18, Mrs. Quayle visited Park Ridge to attend a Victory '92 fundraiser.

On September 30, Clinton visited Somerset to attend a \$4 million fundraiser for state and national Democrat candidates.

On September 24, Clinton visited Rahway to speak about health care to a crowd at Merck Pharmaceuticals. Clinton appeared with his arm around Democrat Governor Jim Florio.

On September 15, Mrs. Gore spoke about family leave in southern New Jersey.

The federal welfare waiver that the President announced for New Jersey has been well received and voter discontent with Governor Florio's tax increases remains a key issue. Florio's package included \$2 billion in new taxes to cover a \$600 million deficit that has grown this year to \$800 million.

New Jersey's largest export market is Canada and its sixth largest market is Mexico. Between 1987 and 1991, New Jersey's exports to Canada rose to \$2.8 billion -- an increase of 150 percent. Between 1987 and 1991, New Jersey's exports to Mexico rose to \$452 million -- an increase of 140 percent.

New Jersey will receive \$3.3 billion from the President's \$151 billion Intermodal Surface Transportation Efficiency Act of 1991.

Minimal BUSH-QUAYLE staff was in New Jersey during the primaries. While there was no presidential travel during the primary season, several mass mailings were sent with slate cards. There was no paid media in the state on behalf of the BUSH-QUAYLE campaign.

Despite his re-entry into the race, Perot's New Jersey organization remains minimal. State Republicans and Democrats are competing for support among disenchanted Perot supporters. Former Perot leadership has met with Governor Tom Kean and greeted the President on recent trips to New Jersey.

CONGRESSIONAL OUTLOOK

SENATE OUTLOOK

The two Democrat Senators who represent New Jersey, Frank Lautenberg and Bill Bradley, will be up for re-election in 1994 and 1996, respectively.

HOUSE OUTLOOK

In 1988, 62 percent of Democrat Congressman **Frank Pallone's** CD-06 voted for the **BUSH-QUAYLE** ticket. Representative **Pallone** did not bounce any checks in the house bank scandal.

In 1988, 59 percent of Republican Congressman **Matthew Rinaldo's** CD-07 voted for the **BUSH-QUAYLE** ticket. Representative **Rinaldo** bounced eight checks in the house bank scandal.

Although Republican Congresswoman **Marge Roukema** (CD-05) disagrees with the President's veto of the Family Leave bill, she has stated her full support of the President's bid for re-election. Despite reports that she "boycotted" the President's trip to Basking Ridge on September 18, Congresswoman **Roukema** clarified that her absence was due to Congress being in session.

On September 16, former Republican Congresswoman **Millicent Fenwick** died of natural causes at the age of 82. **Fenwick** served four terms in the House and supported President Bush against former President **Reagan** in 1980.

The Congressional Primary was held on June 2. No incumbents lost.

On September 13, Republican Congressman **Matthew Rinaldo** (CD-07) announced his retirement after serving ten terms. **Bob Franks** resigned his Chairmanship to run for the open seat. He faces Democrat nominee **Leonard Sendelski**, a Somerset County contractor. State Assemblyman **Dick Kamin** is rumored to be interested in the New Jersey Republican Chairmanship.

Democrat Congressmen **Robert Roe** (CD-08) and **Frank Guarini** (CD-14) are retiring this year. In CD-08, Republican State Senator **Joseph Bubba** and Democrat **Herbert Klein** are vying for the seat that **Roe** is vacating. In CD 06, Republican State Senator **Joseph Kyrillos** will face incumbent Democrat **Frank Pallone**.

Reapportionment

New Jersey lost one district due to reapportionment and two Democrat districts were merged.

STATEWIDE OUTLOOK

Democrat Essex County Executive D'Alesseo is under indictment for misuse of campaign funds.

Democrat Governor Florio is laying off 1,500 government workers because of what he calls "budget reduction needs." Although the State Supreme Court temporarily halted the layoffs, the cut is expected to go through in a few weeks.

In 1991, voter revolt against Governor Florio's tax increases led to the Republican takeover of the State Legislature. In the Senate, Republicans captured 11 seats held by incumbent Democrats, constituting the first GOP majority in 18 years. Republicans regained control of the Assembly as well, which they lost to the Democrats in 1989. Republicans now dominate the Senate by a margin of 27 - 13 and the Assembly by a margin of 58 - 22. In 1991, Republican candidates won nearly 3/4 of all elected posts at the state, county and municipal levels.

Governor Florio recently signed one of the nation's toughest bans on assault weapons. In opposition to the President's position on Federal weapons legislation, Tom Kean supports the ban.

On September 23, the Star Ledger published an article written by Gordon Bishop that praised the President, EPA Director William Reilly, and US Fish and Wildlife Director John Turner for their environmental policies. The review cites positive comments in the current issue of Audobon Magazine, such as Reilly and Turner's "richly deserved reputations for integrity and courage."

12:00 P.M. NEWS UPDATE

DEBATE/DAY AFTER (Richmond/AP) -- With 18 days and one debate to go, President Bush and Bill Clinton scrambled for votes after a studious forum rich in substance but short on sparks -- and minus the dramatic shift Bush needs to strip Clinton's lead. Ross Perot was airing a new 30-minute commercial. Bush headed to New Jersey, time running short for a comeback and the stakes ever higher for the debate finale Monday night in East Lansing, Mich.

TRADE DEFICIT (AP) -- The U.S. trade deficit surged dramatically to \$9 billion in August, the worst imbalance in nearly two years, the government said in a report that left another black mark on President Bush's economic record. The Commerce Department said that the huge \$1.7 billion increase from a July deficit of \$7.28 billion reflected the biggest decline in exports in five years as American producers were hurt by widespread weakness in everything from sales of aircraft to soybeans.

INDUSTRIAL PRODUCTION (AP) -- Output at the nation's factories, mines and utilities fell in September for the third time in four months, held back by declines at defense plants and strikes at several GM factories. The 0.2% drop in the Fed's index of industrial production followed a 0.4% decrease in August. The September decline was slightly less than the expected 0.3%, and the August drop was a bit better than an initial estimate of 0.5%.

CAMPAIGN/HILLARY (Richmond/AP) -- His voice still raspy, Bill Clinton stood by at a rally while a stand-in -- Hillary Clinton -- delivered an address much like Clinton's stump speech. "We can't let Mr. Bush and Mr. Perot go unanswered, can we?" she said, even working in a plug for the book detailing Clinton's programs. "You don't have to read their lips -- read their book," she said of Clinton and Al Gore.

CAMPAIGN/V.P. (Raleigh, N.C./AP) -- Vice President Quayle embarked on a bus trek through North Carolina, saying it was not too late for President Bush to overtake Bill Clinton. Quayle said he believes the American people "still have grave doubts about the trust and the wisdom of Bill Clinton." But he seemed to acknowledge that the audience participation debate was a format that favored Clinton. "Bill Clinton told us three different times it was his suggestion and his recommendation," Quayle said. "But I think the President did very well on all the major issues."

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5:30 P.M. EDT NEWS UPDATE

EAGLEBURGER/CLINTON FILE (Reuter) -- Lawrence Eagleburger took full responsibility for the handling of Bill Clinton's passport files and said he was prepared to testify publicly on the matter before Congress. The Senate Foreign Relations Committee scheduled and then postponed a Monday hearing on charges that the State Department used improper procedures trying to get files about Clinton. Eagleburger said he told Sen. Pell he would be happy to testify at an opening hearing. He suggested the postponement may have been related to Monday's third and final presidential debate. Eagleburger said he instead would meet privately with Pell.

SPECIAL COUNSEL/BNL (Reuter) -- Attorney General Barr named a Justice Department special counsel to investigate a case involving fraudulent bank loans to Iraq that has become a major political embarrassment to President Bush. Barr told a hastily called news conference at the Justice Department that former federal judge Frederick Lacey would review the case for him. The appointment falls short of demands from Democrats in Congress for an independent special prosecutor.

CAMPAIGN/GOP STRATEGY (Scripps Howard) -- President Bush intends to finish up the final two weeks of his re-election campaign without any new lines of attack on Bill Clinton, according to Charles Black. Black said that Bush has made headway with his opposition to Clinton's anti-war demonstrations in England. But Black said Bush does not plan to offer any new evidence of what he considers flaws and inconsistencies in Clinton's character. Black said Bush does not plan to be any more "aggressive" in the third debate at Michigan State University Monday than he was Thursday night.

CLINTON/NEW PLAN (Richmond/AP) -- Bill Clinton said he is studying new ways to "bump this economy" and if elected may try to speed federal spending on highways and other projects to create jobs. However, Clinton, campaigning in Virginia and Louisiana, said he was concerned that any major speed-up in federal spending might spook financial markets, since it could force a delay in deficit reduction measures and possibly send interest rates higher. "There may be some way to increase investment without increasing the deficit," Clinton said. Economic advisers in Clinton's camp are studying ways to "front-load" federal spending for highways, bridges and other infrastructure, so that new jobs created from the spending would occur early in 1993.

FLOWERS/PENTHOUSE (Little Rock/AP) -- Gennifer Flowers poses nude and repeats her unsubstantiated allegation of a 12-year affair with Bill Clinton in the December issue of Penthouse magazine. Publisher Bob Guccione said that the magazine was concerned about printing Flowers' "sensational but unsubstantiated charges" so close to an election. Clinton aide Betsey Wright called Flowers' allegations "pure smut."

PEROT/COMMERCIAL (Dallas/UPI) -- Ross Perot outlined his prescription for higher taxes and spending cuts to balance the budget in a 30-minute commercial to air Friday night on NBC. In his second "infomercial" Perot said his plan would cut the budget deficit by \$754 billion by the end of 1998. Perot said the government can make \$21 billion by improving tax collections on foreign companies and save \$16 billion by limiting tax deductions for business entertainment. He also proposed "user fees" that would bring in another \$49 billion.

V.P./ELECTION (Fayetteville/AP) -- Vice President Quayle pounded away at Bill Clinton's character and turned to baseball imagery to predict a dramatic comeback to overtake Clinton. "We're the Atlanta Braves and when we get to the bottom of the ninth inning and it's two outs, we're going to score another run and we're going to win," Quayle told 1,500 cheering supporters at Fayetteville Technical Community College. "Do you really trust Bill Clinton?" he asked. The crowd shouted "No!" Quayle shrugged off Thursday's gentlemanly debate. "We've got over two weeks. That's a long time in politics," Quayle said in Raleigh as he embarked on a 160-mile campaign bus ride through eastern North Carolina.

YUGOSLAVIA/ARMS EMBARGO (AP) -- Bosnia-Herzegovina's foreign minister, Haris Silajdzic, sought U.S. help in ending a U.N. arms embargo so his country can defend itself against "the insane, Bolshevik-turned-fascist regime" in Serbia. Any country which does not help the Bosnians defend themselves "will be accomplices in a gigantic crime," Silajdzic said after meeting with Brent Scowcroft and State Department officials. Silajdzic on Thursday sent a letter to President Bush seeking his help in ending the U.N. embargo. It argued that, as a democracy, the U.S. cannot deny the right of another democracy to fight for its life.

BAKER/OIL (Reuter) -- The Bush Administration has denied that James Baker, who has large oil investments, improperly helped shape a policy that could affect oil and gas prices. In reply to queries from Reuter, the State Department discounted records showing Baker discussed strategy on oil spill liability in 1990. "The facts indicate that the ethics system worked properly and fully protected government integrity," a spokesman said. "The facts do not indicate that Secretary Baker in any way acted inconsistently with his recusal undertaking."

GATES/YELTSIN (Moscow/UPI) -- CIA Director Gates sat down in the Kremlin with Boris Yeltsin for an unprecedented discussion of possible intelligence cooperation between the former Cold War enemies. Gates also handed over previously secret U.S. materials on the 1974 efforts by the CIA vessel Glomar Explorer to salvage a Soviet submarine that sank in the northern Pacific Ocean in March 1968, Russian officials said.

MORTGAGE RATES (AP) -- Interest rates on 30-year mortgages rose to a 10-week high of 8.06% this week, the Federal Home Loan Mortgage Corp. said. The new rate, up from 8.01% the week before, was the highest since rates also averaged 8.06% during the week ended Aug. 7. On one-year, adjustable-rate mortgages, lenders were asking an average initial rate of 5.05%, up from 4.97% last week and the lowest since the corporation began tracking ARMs in 1984.

STATEMENT BY THE PRESIDENT

I am signing into law H.R. 2321, the "Dayton Aviation Heritage Preservation Act of 1992," which establishes the Dayton Aviation National Historic Park in Ohio as an addition to the National Park System. The park will preserve certain historic sites in the Dayton, Ohio, area that are associated with the Wright brothers and the early development of aviation. The Act will recognize the national significance of these sites and the achievements of the Wright brothers, two of our most distinguished Americans.

The Act also establishes the Dayton Aviation Heritage Commission to assist Federal, State, and local authorities in preserving and managing historic resources related to aviation in the Dayton area. The commission is composed of 13 members, most of whom are appointed by the Secretary of the Interior from recommendations of various State and local officials. The majority of members are effectively selected by various nonfederal officials and thus are not appointed in conformity with the Appointments Clause of the Constitution, Article II, section 2, clause 2. Therefore, I sign this bill on the understanding that the commission will serve only in an advisory capacity and will not exercise Government power.

It should also be noted that the FY 1993 Interior Appropriations Act (Public Law 102-381) reduces the funds available for National Park Service management by approximately \$42 million from my budget request. I question the wisdom of establishing new units of the National Park System that fail to meet the criteria established by the National Park Service when the Congress is not providing the existing system with adequate funding.

Consumer Choice In Auto Insurance

FACT SHEET

President Bush announced a proposal today that would allow consumers to save 20 to 30 percent on their auto insurance premiums, for a potential nationwide savings of \$20 to \$30 billion annually. These savings would be achieved by giving consumers the opportunity to waive their right to sue for pain and suffering damages (thereby also insulating themselves against lawsuits for such damages), and to elect insurance coverage payable by their own insurer regardless of fault.

The Problem

The current auto insurance system is a source of consumer outrage. Insurance premiums -- now more than \$1,000 per car in many areas -- grew at almost three times the rate of inflation in the 1980s, forcing many lower-income Americans to drive uninsured.

A root cause for escalating rates is the "pain and suffering" component of tort awards. Nationwide, coverage for pain and suffering awards constitute 15 percent of insurance costs, while litigation costs (which are driven largely by the prospect of pain and suffering awards) account for another 10 percent.

There are other wasteful costs as well under the current system, such as incentives to inflate medical costs. In particular, a recent study by the Insurance Research Council showed that people involved in auto accidents obtain more expensive medical treatment if they file a claim against the other driver than if they collect from their own insurer regardless of fault.

If there were fewer lawsuits for pain and suffering, overall auto insurance rates could drop sharply. Under current law, however, consumers cannot purchase auto insurance that omits coverage for pain and suffering.

The Solution

The President stated that on the first day of the next session of Congress, he will submit legislation proposing a Federal statute to permit purchasers of automobile insurance to opt out of pain and suffering claims.

Under the President's proposal:

- Consumers would be allowed to waive their right to sue for non-economic (i.e., pain and suffering) damages. In return, they would be insulated from non-economic damage claims by other motorists.
- Those electing to waive the right to sue for non-economic damages would purchase "personal insurance protection" coverage, under which they would collect economic damages without regard to fault from their own insurer instead of suing other motorists. This would largely eliminate litigation costs, and avoid the lengthy payment delays (usually 18 months or more) that are common under the current system.
- Those motorists not waiving this right would retain their coverage under the tort liability system. They would purchase coverage from their own insurer to cover all damages (for both economic and non-economic losses) negligently caused by drivers who elect the personal insurance protection plan.
- All motorists would retain the right to sue for pain and suffering caused by intoxicated or criminally negligent drivers.
- All motorists would also be able to sue for all economic damages based on fault in excess of their own insurance coverage.

The Benefits of the President's Proposal

- Although the proposal would benefit all motorists, the greatest cost benefits would go to consumers in high premium areas, and especially to poor, inner city residents, many of whom now drive illegally without insurance.
- This proposal presents a sharp contrast to the non-market approaches preferred by the Democrats, such as mandatory rollbacks, surcharges on insurers, and rigid rate regulation, which try to force businesses to engage in losing ventures.
- This proposal also reinforces the President's call for legal reform, and makes clear that consumer empowerment and choice is the key to better insurance.

The President today recognized the volunteers of Youth to Youth of Columbus, Ohio, as the 925th Daily Point of Light for the Nation. Youth to Youth volunteers work to ensure that teenagers have a decent, drug-free, and safe place to live.

Founded in 1982, Youth to Youth is a drug prevention initiative that emphasizes teens helping teens. Through the organization, young people plan and implement their own programs. Over 200 students and adults volunteer more than 400 hours each month with the Columbus Chapter, whose efforts already have been replicated by branches in 35 states and 13 nations.

Youth to Youth believes that teens can best promote a drug-free lifestyle for other teenagers by creating positive peer pressure. A 50-member Youth Advisory Board spreads the drug-free message through activities, such as food drives, that allow local teens to contribute to their community in a healthy way through voluntary service.

Sixty to eighty students have learned public speaking and drama skills through the High School Speakers' Bureau program. Student volunteers perform puppet shows at local elementary schools and speak at local high schools, addressing issues such as peer pressure, decision-making, time management, and self-esteem and initiating discussions about remaining drug-free. The volunteers establish relationships with their peers, serving as positive role models and friends.

A Community Action Group plans information sessions for parents, drug awareness workshops at local schools, and recreational events, including hay rides, fiestas, and ice skating outings, that offer positive alternatives to drugs. Teen volunteers commit one year to the group and try to teach responsible behavior by coordinating activities for their peers.

George Bush is best equipped to lead

The president who will lead this country through the 1990s must stand on a tripod of economic progress, clear foreign policy and the kind of fair-play leadership that inspires the confidence of the American people.

A tough assignment, no question. But when all is said and done in this peculiar presidential campaign, the candidate best equipped to lead and serve the country is George Bush. We recommend his re-election.

This campaign has moved more slowly than most to the core issues for our future. It has taken strange twists and turns, with Ross Perot almost in, then out, now back in, with a cadre of supporters who are totally dissatisfied with the status quo. Far too much time has been wasted on peripheral, purely political posturing that generated static instead of common sense. It has taken far too long to get beyond fringe issues and onto the gut subject of how the country can best get ready for the next century.

Now is the time to consider what must be done and who best can do it.

Economic progress will determine the domestic well-being of the United States for the remainder of this century. It is true there hasn't been much to cheer about in recent months. It also is true that George Bush has been president during this prolonged slump. That is cannon fodder for critics. But some of the criticism is disingenuous. Democrats, not Republicans, were and are in control of the Congress. Democrats, not Republicans, used the cover of a bipartisan compromise to entice George Bush to break his no-new-taxes promise, his face, and then throw it in



To his credit, the president resisted pressure to interfere with the monetary policy of the Federal Reserve. As a result, both interest rates and inflation are extraordinarily low. This positions the country for a strong recovery, especially if tax policies can be enacted to stimulate investment.

Independent candidate Ross Perot offers the most drastic deficit reduction program, including stiff taxes on gasoline, curtailing of home mortgage deductions and across-the-board budget cuts. His concept is strong, but is unlikely to be adopted as described.

The president's economic agenda for the next four years offsets modest tax reductions with spending cuts. He proposes to cut the budget by \$294 billion, by capping entitlement programs. With this kind of restraint, the economy can grow in a safe, sustainable way and the deficit can be reined in.

Democratic candidate Bill Clinton, on the other hand, proposes spending another \$220 billion, not counting the cost of his national health care plan, and his nod to deficit reduction is a relative drop in the bucket, with spending cuts of only \$145 billion over four years. Despite his Robin Hood rhetoric about taxing the rich and giving to the middle class, Mr. Clinton's programs cannot be financed without higher taxes for everyone.

Economic progress — measured in jobs — mostly will determine whether the American dream can be made available to all Americans, whether our health care crisis can be managed, whether our environment can be protected, whether other social challenges can be met. For everyone, nothing good happens until we have economic progress.

Foreign policy hasn't gotten much attention lately. The Berlin Wall is down, communism is dead, the Cold War is over, let's move on to something else, we hear. That would be a serious mistake.

The world is a safer place, but a smaller one, and danger remains, though not so

readily visible. Yes, the Berlin Wall is down, but the reunification of Germany has its own pain. Communism has failed, but the resulting economic chaos threatens regional violence throughout the former East Bloc. We have better nuclear treaties, but terrorists remain, and their thirst for nuclear weapons has not been slaked.

While it is difficult to visualize the risk of a currency collapse in Europe, the success of the European economy is vital to our own. While it is difficult to visualize the opportunity of freer trade with our neighbors in Mexico and Canada, their success is vital to our own. President Bush began the process of negotiating the free-trade agreement with Mexico and Canada, and the economic growth it portends for Texas in particular. Bill Clinton has recently voiced support for the free-trade agreement, but with caveats regarding job retraining and environment that could be difficult to finance and implement. Ross Perot has expressed great doubt about the proposed agreement.

The steady hand that delivered our foreign policy successes is needed to guide our relationships with the rest of the world in the years ahead. President Bush has that experience. Bill Clinton does not. Ross Perot does not.

Public confidence, the elusive issue of trust, is in some ways the most difficult to define because it has so many facets. In other ways, it is the easiest because we know intuitively in the privacy of the voting booth that one candidate or the other gives us more comfort and confidence, or doesn't.

There clearly is much angst about our political system. The legions of frustrated Americans who have lined up behind Ross Perot give ample testimony to that.

But it doesn't really matter very much whether or not Bill Clinton wanted to be drafted, or what George Bush's children do for a living, or whether or not Ross Perot was misunderstood about a side issue. It matters a great deal whether or not a candidate is playing straight with voters, whatever the issue.

Mr. Perot has said himself that he doesn't have the temperament to be president. Mr. Clinton's style is a bit too smooth, even elusive. No one can accuse Mr. Bush of being too smooth, but at least he has been consistent. Some say the president is too predictable, but in turbulent times like these there is comfort in steadfastness and a seasoned captain.

President Bush can rebuild public confidence if he articulates his vision clearly, and moves properly to see that it is implemented. One immediate way to demonstrate that he is serious about change would be to shake up the Cabinet. New White House chief of staff James Baker gets things done, and someone of his caliber ought to drive the domestic agenda, as Mr. Baker has in the past driven America's foreign policy.

Mr. Bush ought to be ready with a 100-day plan for Congress, aimed at prompt implementation of a realistic deficit reduction program and reasonable economic policies for the future. The plan should be more demanding than anything else considered by the 103rd Congress. He should summon congressional leaders to discuss a common search for solutions on the day after the election, and Congress should resist its customary urge to respond with partisan politics. Any other course increases the already significant risk of a cataclysmic economic event.

George Bush is a proven, known quantity. He is honorable above all else, and he is best qualified to lead the country. He deserves re-election.

Bush touts experience, Perot speaks plainly

What President Bush needed to do in St. Louis last night was to reassure voters that experience matters. He did. While demonstrating clear confidence on foreign affairs, he attempted to convince voters that he has heard their concerns about domestic affairs. For the first time, he stated that if re-elected he would ask former Secretary of State James Baker to turn his experience to the nation's economic and domestic problems.

Mr. Bush sought to contrast himself with Democrat Bill Clinton and Independent Ross Perot by emphasizing that "America is not a country coming apart at the seams" and that change for change's sake is not necessarily beneficial. He stressed that he has proposed prudent solutions, and, given a more receptive Congress, he will be in a better position to get those plans through.

While he had fewer memorable lines than Mr. Perot and fewer compelling statistics than Mr. Clinton, Mr. Bush did make effective use of his experience in office, most pointedly by correcting Mr. Perot's statement about what has already been done to remove intercontinental ballistic missiles from the former Soviet Union.

His weakest moment, perhaps, was in trying to pick a fight at the beginning of the debate with Gov. Clinton by questioning his anti-war activities while studying abroad. Mr. Clinton later turned the question about patriotism on the president by pointing out that Mr. Bush's father, Sen. Prescott Bush, had courageously stood against the inquisition used by Sen. Joe McCarthy in the 1950s.

Mr. Clinton also made effective use of family references — especially in referring to his brother's drug recovery to buttress his opposition to legalization of drugs. Throughout the debate, the Arkansas governor had a statistic and a plan for every question. But, overall, he seemed wooden and was unable to translate his data into a compelling argument for change.

By contrast, Dallas businessman Ross Perot was the candidate who most connected with the debate audience, speaking in colorful, plain language. "We're practicing 19th-century capitalism," he warned, while our competitors are practicing "21st-century capitalism."

Mr. Perot offered to be a Mr. Fixit for the country, promising to act on problems rather than talk about them.

He suggested creating several task forces to prepare action plans on issues such as health care, crime and defense conversion, which would be presented to Congress as a "Christmas present."

When asked about experience, he snapped in characteristic style, "You're right. I don't have any experience in running up a \$4 trillion debt." Exhibiting the most humor of the three, Mr. Perot said that if there was a fairer way to reduce the deficit than by increasing gas taxes, "then I'm all ears." He then smiled while the audience shared the joke about his prominent, often caricatured, ears.

But his witticisms did not always add up. For example, Mr. Perot cracked that if he were president, he would send all the lobbyists in "thousand-dollar suits and alligator shoes" to the Smithsonian. He failed to explain, however, how he would reduce the role of lobbyists in influencing legislation. Overall, the first round of the 1992 fall debates helped reveal three different personalities and approaches. But it is good that there will be follow-up debates — with different formats — to further draw the distinctions for voters. Mr. Clinton needs to do more than try to sit on his lead. Mr. Perot needs to show how he would turn his aphorisms into action. Even though we believe that Mr. Bush is the best choice for the country, he needs to be a stronger salesman in his own behalf, explaining in greater detail and more persuasively his Agenda for American Renewal.

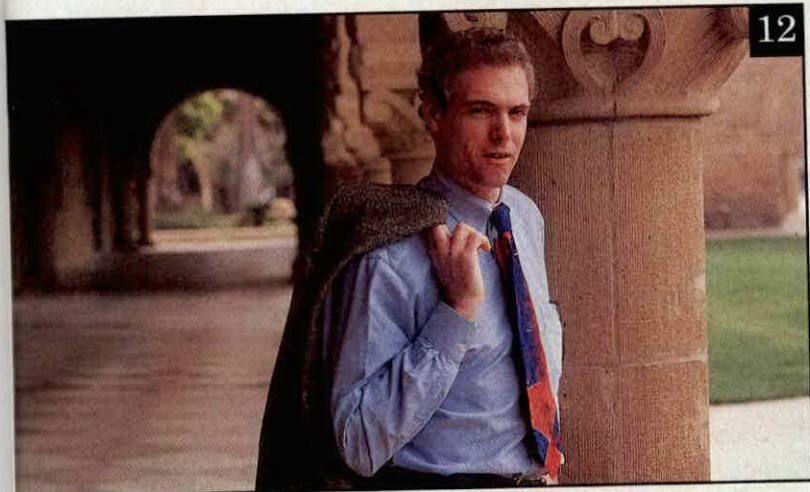

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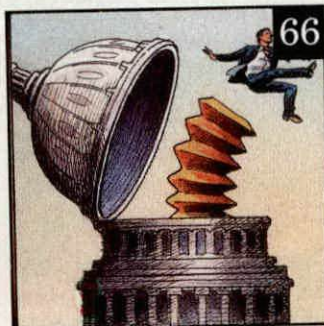
