Dear Mr. President and Mrs. Bush,

The crew welcomes you back to the Catoclin Mountains! The weather forecast for your stay calls for partly cloudy to mostly sunny skies. Temperatures will range from the mid 20's to the low 40's.

Some items of interest:

Sunday Worship Service. Chaplain Frusti's sermon at the 0900 service will be "Children Of The Resurrection", based on Luke 20 : 36.

Asphalt Paving. The work at the Landing Zone is complete. Work continues along Main Camp Road with repair of curbing now in progress.

Cabin Work. Rosebud's roofing and siding are complete with some final interior work now underway. Reroofing is now complete on Hemlock and Witch Hazel and being completed on Red Oak. Elm and Walnut both received a new coat of paint. Despite rainy weather, work is proceeding well on the new cabins near Holly.

Perimeter Poles. You may notice a couple new poles along the inner perimeter fence. These tensioning poles are part of a new vertical sensor system that will be similar to that on the outer fence. It will replace the Y-shaped sensors that have been causing maintenance problems.

Aspen Flowers. A couple of frosts did in the mums. They've been removed and we'll be planting tulip bulbs in the upcoming weeks.

Hangar Paint. You'll notice a few primer spots on the hangar. It is being prepared for a sorely needed painting.

Art Restoration. The restored Laurel Conference Room pictures have been returned and are now back in place. A few other pieces of art from various cabins are now in for restoration with the National Museum of American Art curators.

Reforestation. We have new trees near the Chapel, Eucalyptus parking lot and various other places. These 75 new trees were planted as a part of our continuing Camp forest preservation.

Please let us know if there is **anything** we can do to make your stay more comfortable, relaxing and enjoyable.

Even though you will not see this note until after the election results are known, I wanted to let you know that you are in my thoughts. Though I have admired your leadership in past campaigns and as President, I think your conduct during the course of this campaign has been especially admirable. The way you have kept your poise and grace while all the petty jerks of the world have tried to bring you down with everything from Iran Contra and BNL to POWs and Perot's daughter's wedding has truly been inspiring.

Bush Files as G.O.P. Presidential Candidate in 1980

WASHINGTON, Jan. 5 — George Bush, former Director of Central Intelligence, filed with the Federal Election Commission today as a candidate for the Presidency but told reporters the move was just short of a formal declaration that he was running for the nomination.

"What this does is to permit me to raise money or spend money for the campaign," Mr. Bush said in Dorado, P.R., a few hours before the papers were filed, adding that he was "extraordinarily interested" in running.

The announcement, according to sources close to Mr. Bush, is dictated by a feeling that his campaign activities now

legally demand the creation of a committee. For tactical reasons, however, the publicity that Mr. Bush's advisers hope will accompany a personal declaration of the reasons he should be President should be delayed until next spring.

The chairman of the George Bush for President Committee is James A. Baker 3d, who was President Ford's campaign chairman in the 1976 general election, and its treasurer is Robert P. Visser, who was counsel to the Ford campaign. Much of the early support for Mr. Bush has come from the ranks of former Ford partisans, and Mr. Baker discussed his role in the Bush campaign with the former President in November and got his approval.

An Office and a Phone

Otherwise, the formal trappings of the campaign now consist of an eight-room office in Houston and a telephone number — GOP-1980. Mr. Baker said no money had been raised yet for the campaign, with the rent and the phone bills guaranteed by Mr. Bush, a millionaire.

Besides serving as Director of Central Intelligence, Mr. Bush was head of the United States mission in China, served as the United States representative to the United Nations and was chairman of the Republican National Committee. He served two terms in the House but lost a bid for a Senate seat from Texas in 1970.

Mr. Bush, who is 54 years old, was born in Connecticut, the son of the late Senator Prescott Bush. After his graduation from Yale University in 1948, he moved to Texas to enter the oil business.

Mr. Bush's presence in Puerto Rico today, addressing a convention of the National Association of Wholesalers Distributors, reflected the fact that Puerto Rico is trying to beat out New Hampshire for the distinction of holding the first primary in 1980.

Other travel plans this month include two visits to New Hampshire and one to Florida, another early primary state.

Representative Philip M. Crane of Illinois, Benjamin Fernandez, a businessman, and former Gov. Harold E. Stassen of Minnesota have announced their candidacies for the Republican Presidential nomination in 1980. Several other candidates, including former Gov. John B. Connally of Texas, former Gov. Ronald Reagan of California and Representative John B. Anderson of Illinois, are expected to announce their candidacies in the next few months.

Former C.I.A. Chief George Bush expressed strong interest in the Republican presidential nomination in 1980. But in his talk before a business group in Puerto Rico, he stopped short of formally declaring his candidacy.

Bush hints at Cerromar he may seek presidency

DORADO — George Bush, a former Central Intelligence Agency director, all but announced Friday that he will seek the Republican nomination for president in 1980.

Bush, asked about the announcement in Washington of the organization of a campaign committee, said he is "extra-ordinarily interested in this."

Bush, speaking before the National Association of Wholesaler-Distributors at the Cerromar Hotel also said that "the Puerto Rican primary will be held before the one in New Hampshire."

He added, however that the opening of the campaign committee "constitutes a serious expression of intent," but falls short of "an announcement."

Interviewed after the speech, Bush said he may be campaigning here early next year if he finally announces his candidacy, as expected.

"Puerto Rico has more delegates than several of the states," he said. "It is diverse from New England and would loom important to a candidate who is relatively unknown."

Bush, who will remain here until today or Sunday, said he hopes to meet with Gov. Romero but still had not arranged for an interview. "I did have breakfast with the mayor (Hernan Padilla)," he added, "and found the talk most stimulating."

Bush, a former congressman from Texas who failed in two senate bids, is also a former U.S. delegate to the People's Republic of China, a former ambassador to the United Nations and a former Republican Party National Chairman.

His campaign committee in Texas, with the Houston telephone number of GOP 1980, is headed by James Baker, who headed President Gerald R. Ford's unsuccessful presidential bid in 1976.

Baker has indicated that Ford approved and even encouraged him to become involved in the Bush campaign, which tends to confirm Ford's statements that he will not enter the early primaries but would be available for the nomination if the party turned to him.

Bush, 54, devoted most of his speech to explaining why he opposes President Carter's decision to obrogate the defense treaty with

Bush, who spent a year and a half in Peking, said he favors improved relations with the People's Republic and agreed with two of the conditions which Carter met — withdrawal of recognition from the Republic of China, the Taiwan regime, and the withdrawal of a token U.S. military force from Taiwan.

He added, however, that abrogation of the treaty "transcends the China-Taiwan issue" and seriously affects the U.S.'s "credibility" as an ally.

"My concern is not so much over whether mainland China will invade Taiwan now, but over the effect of this on African countries, which must be wondering now how reliable an ally the U.S. is," Bush said.

Speaking of other matters, the former CIA director said that:

— He favors more trade with Cuba, but would like a lifting of trade restriction to a "reduced" Cuban "presence" in Africa.

— He believes the people of Puerto Rico should exercise self-determination on status, but opposes "lectures by minions of the Cuban dictator."

— The U.S. should continue to support the government of Iran despite the human rights situation there because "it is in our self-interest."

— "We've been on the back on the CIA and the FBI so long that our foreign sources are drying up."

— The strategic arms limitations agreement between the U.S. and the Soviet Union appears to have been negotiated from a position which is "not one of strength."

Bush said that political observers have been telling him for months that the American people's main concern is inflation, but he is still concerned about the "excessively aggressive attitude of the Soviet Union."

Bush said that the formation of the campaign committee at this point means only that "we can raise and spend money," but added that he has been "seriously considering" running for president for the past year and is resigning from business and civic positions.

Bush is the son of former Connecticut Sen. Prescott Bush, also a Republican.

The mainland press has called him a "moderate," compared to former California Gov. Ronald Reagan, an almost sure contender, and

Clinton Victory Ushers in Democratic Control

Voters across the country did more than just call for change on Tuesday, they shouted it. Riding a tide of discontent over the state of the economy, Arkansas Gov. Bill Clinton won a landslide electoral victory Tuesday over President Bush.

In the three-way race with independent candidate Ross Perot, Clinton won 43 percent of the popular vote and 370 electoral votes. Bush won 38 percent of the vote and the remaining 168 electoral votes. Perot received 19 percent of the popular vote. It was the first time in U.S. history that more than 100 million Americans voted.

Bush had asked voters to give him a new Republican-controlled Congress. Instead, they gave Congress and the nation a new Democratic president. A strong anti-incumbency vote did not materialize as expected. Democrats, who may have picked up a seat in the Senate and lost nine House seats, remained in firm control of Congress.

"The American people have voted to make a new beginning," Clinton told supporters Tuesday night. "This election is a clarion call for our country to face the challenge of the end of the Cold War and the beginning of the next century."

The 46-year-old Clinton will be sworn in on Jan. 20 as the 42nd president of the United States and the first born after World War II. Vice President-elect Al Gore, D-Tenn., will have to resign his Senate seat.

The presidential victory was the first for a Democrat since 1976 and will give the party control of both the White House and Congress for the first time since 1981.

Bush's failure to address the sluggish economy was his undoing. The majority of voters surveyed said the economy and deficit reduction were the major issues of the campaign, not character and family values issues — themes stressed by Bush.

After winning 40 states in 1988, Bush could muster only 18, becoming the first GOP president to lose a re-election bid since Herbert Hoover in 1932. "We have fought the good fight and we have kept the faith and, I think, I have upheld the honor of the presidency," he said. "Now I ask that we stand behind our new president."

Bush's 38 percent of the vote was the lowest for an incumbent seeking re-election since William H. Taft in 1912.

Perot, who promised to use his business acumen to revitalize the nation's economy, predicted that he would win by a landslide in all 50 states, but took none. His best showing was in Maine, where he won 30 percent of the vote.

Bush was the most prominent, but certainly not the only incumbent who

What Anti-Incumbent Vote?

So much for the anti-incumbent mood. Although some pundits predicted that the incumbent label would be the kiss of death for many on Election Day, only 19 members not involved in races against another incumbent were defeated.

Almost all of the members who lost had some ethics problem or were thrown into new areas by redistricting.

When the five incumbent-versus-incumbents races are added in, two dozen House members lost — not far from the average of 21 defeats in each election year since 1962.

The three losses by sitting senators was actually less than the average of 4-5 over those same 30 years.

A number of members, of course, did feel the heat. About 50 members won re-election with 55 percent or less of the vote — a precarious margin that often bodes ill in their next race.

Few members of the House leadership could rest easy. Speaker Thomas S. Foley, D-Wash.; Majority Whip David

Bonior, D-Mich.; and Democratic Caucus Chairman Steny H. Hoyer, D-Md. all won only 55 percent of the vote. And Republican Leader Robert H. Michel, R-Ill., and Minority Whip Newt Gingrich, R-Ga., fared only a little better, each winning 58 percent of the vote.

All those members of the leadership had winning percentages under the House average, which was 62 percent. That percentage has decreased in the last two elections, but not by as much as predicted.

The following figures show how the percentage of votes incumbents with major party opposition received in 1992 compares with previous elections.

tasted defeat on election night. Voters also rejected 27 members of Congress.

Although Democrats lost seats in the House, Clinton's coattails kept the losses to a minimum. Republicans had hoped to pick up 30-35 seats, but gained only nine.

While the 110-member House freshman class is huge, it is smaller than expected. Most observers predicted that the number of House departures would top the post-World War II record of 118 in 1946.

The 103rd Congress is slightly more Democratic in the Senate and slightly less so in the House, but firmly in Democratic hands.

'Comeback Kid'

Clinton's trek to the White House was far from easy. Just nine months ago,

allegations of marital infidelity and a Vietnam draft controversy nearly drove him from the presidential race.

But he weathered the storm and a superior campaign organization kept him competitive through the primaries. Clinton surged in the polls in July, thanks in part to a successful Democratic National Convention. He never lost the lead, although Bush narrowed the gap in the last week before the spread opened up again.

It was the best showing by a Democratic candidate since 1964, when Lyndon B. Johnson won 44 states and the District of Columbia in racking up 486 electoral votes. Of the 20 states that had not supported a Democratic president since that election, nine went to Clinton, including the 54-vote megastate California.

Clinton's strong electoral vote showing belied a splintered three-way vote: His 43 percent of the popular vote was the lowest winning margin since 1968, when Richard M. Nixon received a comparable percentage.

Bush's re-election bid became an uphill struggle when the economy continued to stagnate, but the nation's voters have traditionally been kind to leaders who presided over a successful war. But Bush's campaign drifted for months, and only in the final weeks did he sharpen his attack on Clinton.

Minority Candidates Tally Big Gains at Polls

Minorities increased their ranks in the House and Senate by 50 percent in Tuesday's election.

There will be 38 blacks, 16 Hispanics and five Asian-Americans in the House next year. (Several non-voting delegates are also minorities.) Twenty-five blacks, 11 Hispanics, three Asian-Americans and one American Indian served in the 102nd Congress. Alabama, Florida, Virginia, North Carolina and South Carolina elected black House members for the first time since the late 1800s.

Minorities also made gains in the Senate. Carol Moseley Braun, D-Ill., will be the first black woman to serve in the Senate, and in Colorado, Democratic Rep. Ben Nighthorse Campbell, who is part-Indian, won the state's open Senate seat. They join Democratic Sens. Daniel K. Inouye and Daniel K. Akaka, Japanese-Americans from Hawaii, as the only minorities in the Senate.

All but four of the minority candidates elected Tuesday are Democrats. Rep. Gary Franks, Conn., is the only black Republican, and three Hispanic Republicans were elected: Rep. Ileana Ros-Lehtinen and state Sen. Lincoln Diaz-Balart, both of Florida, and Henry Bonilla, who upset Rep. Albert G. Bustamante, D-Texas.

Minority gains were assured by the redistricting that followed the 1990 census. Under the Voting Rights Act and court interpretations of it, states were required to draw congressional districts that maximized the opportunity of minorities to elect

their own representatives to Congress.

Texas Democrat Gene Green, an Anglo state senator, was the only non-minority to win in a district created to elect a minority. He defeated Hispanic Houston City Councilman Ben Reyes in a hotly contested Democratic primary and runoff, then easily defeated GOP nominee Clark Kent Ervin, a black, on Tuesday.

More blacks in Congress means more legislative influence, says Rep. Edolphus Towns, D-N.Y., chairman of the Congressional Black Caucus. "We'll be able to cover every committee and subcommittee," he says.

Most importantly, Towns says, the Black Caucus may now be able to have more impact on the budget process. The Caucus submits its own budget proposal for review each year, but its recommendations usually get lost in the shuffle.

Rep. Solomon P. Ortiz, D-Texas, chairman of the Congressional Hispanic Caucus, says that Hispanics, too, will be an important voting bloc. "On a tight vote, [we] can make a difference," he says.

Towns and Ortiz have also discussed the possibility of forming a coalition of blacks, Hispanics, women and other minorities. The groups share interests in health-care, low-income housing and job creation in the inner cities, among other things, Towns says. "There is no reason why we should not form a closer working relationship.... As a result, I believe a lot of positive things can come out of it."

...A New Experience for Most Members

House Democrats in particular will find that focusing on a legislative agenda is a relief after a year of internal soul-searching brought on by scandal. Panetta said that is the lesson of 1992: "If you don't have a legislative agenda, other things can take center stage."

Outside Looking In

If Hill Republicans thought being in a Congress dominated by Democrats was a lonely job, it is only going to get worse without an ally in the White House.

GOP leaders have served as facilitators of the Reagan and Bush administration agenda for 12 years, giving them leverage in negotiations with Democrats. As long as the GOP controlled the White House, Republicans could block almost any bill by sustaining a presidential veto. Those days are gone. "We'll all have to find skills that we hadn't had to develop as long as Republican was in White House," said Rep. Dick Armey, R-Texas.

But Georgia Republican Newt Gingrich, the House minority whip, sees opportunity as well. "We'll have a lot more room for creativity, a lot more ability to act without the ponderous maneuverings of the executive branch," he said. "You can have a lot of opportunities when you're in the minority."

Without a clear leader of the party, Senate Minority Leader Bob Dole, R-Kan., and his House counterpart, Robert H. Michel, R-Ill., are likely to play more prominent roles as party spokesmen. "Certainly the role played by our leaders will change," said Rep. Robert H. Walker, R-Pa. "Instead of being the defender of the White House, we will become the arch critic." Walker said that will take a more aggressive tack and give junior members a chance to make a name for themselves.

The first hint at how Republicans will respond to their new circumstances will in the following weeks during organizational meetings for the new Congress.

While Dole and Michel appear safe as party leaders, Armey is challenging Jerry Lewis, R-Calif., for the chairmanship of the Republican Conference.

It could become a battle between differing wings in the party on how to respond to a Democratic president. Lewis, who has headed the Conference since 1988, is a moderate who searches for compromise with Democrats more often than not. Armey would like to see the party sharpen its rhetorical attack against Democrats.

One favorite GOP theme of the past year, congressional reform, could also become less prominent as Democrats focus their energy on enacting Clinton's domestic agenda.

But to completely ignore proposals to modernize congressional operations would be a big mistake, says Rep. Jim Bacchus, D-Fla. The large freshman class, many of whom will have campaigned on a theme of cleaning up Capitol Hill, will also have a say "I think they need to take advantage of what they can do together," said Bacchus. "The internal, structural things are probably what they can most agree on."
