STATEMENT BY THE PRESS SECRETARY

In the past, U.S. national security interests required that measures be taken to control the access of certain foreign flag vessels to U.S. ports and internal waters. The principle objective of this control was to protect U.S. vessels, ports, harbors, and waterfront facilities from sabotage or other activities intended to hazard their safety. In addition, these steps were taken to protect sensitive operations and U.S. defense facilities in waterfront areas from espionage and intelligence.

In light of our evolving relationship with the countries of the former Soviet Union, the following changes have been made to the U.S. port access regime:

- New London/Groton, Port Canaveral, Kings Bay, Port Hueneme, and San Diego, formerly closed ports, are now open for visits by merchant ships registered in the independent states of the former Soviet Union, subject to a request seven days in advance of the desired entry and subject to the concurrence of the appropriate naval authority.
- Charleston, Hampton Roads, Honolulu, Port St. Joe, Panama City, Portsmouth (N.H.), and Pensacola, formerly open on seven days advance request, are now open on three days advance notice.

Mr. Shive continually adds centers to his ministry. When he discovers that a friend or family member has relocated to a particular institution, he approaches its activities director about incorporating his "Music Therapy" program. Besides working with the residents, he encourages the employees to project uplifting attitudes that will eventually affect the elderly. Mr. Shive himself is on-call at all times to offer personal encouragement, and he maintains that this has been the most rewarding work of his life.

During a difficult week, Bush shows class

WASHINGTON—Dorothy Walker Bush taught her son George how to behave.

He was not to talk about himself too much, he was not to gloat or be a bully; when he was afraid, he was to try to master it, and when he was hurt, he was to try to rise above it. It was not whether he won or lost but how he played the game.

When George Bush was growing up in the world of old New England Protestant wealth and privilege, these were family values.

They were the armor of his soul as a 19-year-old combat pilot shot down over the Pacific, in the death of a child and in a political career with as many downs as ups.

Last week there they were again, bracing his steps across the Rose Garden with President-elect Bill Clinton.

Bush had a bad week. His mother died Thursday of a stroke at 91. Despite her age and frail health, it was still a great shock to a man who has more than once said his parents were perhaps the most important influences in his life.

At almost the same time Dorothy Bush's life was slipping away in the family home in Greenwich, Conn., her son was greeting the new president, the man who had soundly defeated him at the polls and left him with the stain of being removed from the Oval Office after only one term.

Although Bush serves until Clinton is inaugurated Jan. 20, it was last week that the full realization of his defeat came to Washington and the White House.

The cameras now follow Clinton as once they had followed Bush on morning jogs, the society pages now chime to every nuance of the new first family, the television shows provide endless footage of the inconsequential because it is new.

It was as though a whole government, a whole country, had done a parade ground about-face, turning away from the incumbent to a new direction.

For Bush, the White House has become an awful waiting room where the walls, as he has told some friends, are "pressing in on him." Short of meeting with the Greek prime minister and the chief rabbi of Romania, there seemed little for the president to do last week.

His old friends had become so worried about his deepening gloom that they were contriving to get him some kind of a timeout with a Texas barbecue and talk or something.

Last week had begun with reports of a Republican governors' meeting in Wisconsin in which the president's party was assaying blame for the disastrous election and setting a party standard so narrow it is unlikely that a young Bush or his late father, Sen. Prescott Bush, would have been much interested in joining.

Across Washington at the State Department, a last tawdry little scene of his desperate campaign for re-election was playing out. The inspector general, Sherman Funk, a school-teacherish sort of man, called "shame" on the department for letting itself be used in a distasteful scheme to find something bad in passport files on Clinton and Clinton's mother.

Although the inspector general said he found no evidence that the White House ordered the search, he did find that White House officials did nothing to shut it off.

It has never been clear that Dorothy Bush approved of some of the campaign techniques that were employed as her son sought the presidency, and remarks the president has made suggest she did not. They often did not please his wife, Barbara, who comes from the same sort of heritage as her husband.

History may show Bush didn't much like what he was doing. He didn't deliver those "bozo" lines well, and when Clinton told him during the first presidential debate that Bush's father, an opponent of Sen. Joe McCarthy's witch hunts, wouldn't be proud of the attacks on Clinton's patriotism, the president seemed stunned, as though that was his thought as well.

But last week he had to greet this young man—22 years his junior and of vast differences in heritage and outlook—and start to turn over to him the presidency, his life's greatest achievement and its greatest defeat.

It was in Bush's hands to make this meeting warm or cold, friendly or bitter. The president showed Clinton through the Rose Garden, the two men of the same height walking in a friendly, almost familial, manner.

The session in the Oval Office had been set to last an hour. They finally broke after an hour and 45 minutes, Clinton telling reporters, "It was a terrific meeting, the president was very helpful."

Sen. Alan Simpson (R-Wyo.), one of the president's buddies, said it was classic George Bush. The president had painstakingly listed for his young successor 17 hot spots in the world and what he had been trying to do in each.

The next morning, Bush's mother suffered a stroke. He and his daughter, Dorothy, her grandmother's namesake, made a hurried trip to his mother's bedside. When they left, she was rallying, but at dusk she passed away.

In those few hours, Barbara Bush greeted Hillary Clinton for a visit to her new house.

The first lady whisked her soon-to-be successor through the rooms with the gracious warmth of an older sister.

George Bush has often suffered cruel ribbing for his background, for being a prep-school boy and a Yalie, a child of the rich and a man with an inheritance. But at those cold New England schools that also produced Franklin Roosevelt and John Kennedy, it was how you played the game.

Bush family keeps funeral private for clan matriarch

GREENWICH, Conn. (AP) — President Bush led the mourners yesterday at the funeral of Dorothy Walker Bush, his 91-year-old mother and matriarch of the Bush clan.

More than a hundred people attended the private funeral service in Christ Church here in the town where Dorothy and Prescott Bush raised their five children.

Mrs. Bush died last Thursday after a stroke.

Presiding over the service were the Rev. John M. Allin, the former presiding bishop of the Episcopal Church in the United States and rector of the churches Mrs. Bush attended during summers at Kennebunkport, Maine, and winters in Jupiter Island, Fla.

He was assisted by the Rev. Terence L. Elsberry, the senior associate rector at Christ Church, and the Rev. James Lee Walker. After the 45-minute service, a hearse took the coffin off for cremation, and the president, his wife, Barbara, and other relatives spent 25 minutes outside the church greeting relatives and others who attended the by-invitation-only service.

No reporters or White House staff were allowed inside the church.

The president was smiling as he greeted other mourners outside the stone church while bells pealed overhead.

Afterward, Mr. Bush and his immediate relatives, including his three brothers and one sister, went to Mrs. Bush's nearby home for three hours before the interment of

their mother's ashes at Putnam Cemetery.

The president and his wife and their five children flew in a U.S. Air Force jet from Washington to White Plains, N.Y., yesterday morning. They drove to Greenwich on a sunny morning for the service at Christ Church, a 287-year-old Episcopal church where Mrs. Bush had been a parishioner since World War II.

Also at the funeral was former baseball Commissioner Fay Vincent.

The oldest and youngest Bush brothers, Prescott and William, spoke during the service, but the president did not, one woman said as she left the church.

The Bushes were accompanied by White House Chief of Staff James A. Baker III and his wife, Susan. Vice President Dan Quayle flew in separately and Treasury Secretary Nicholas Brady, a longtime family friend, also attended the service.

Mrs. Bush was remembered by friends for her compassion and down-to-earth attitude.

"Dottie and the people in her circle were very, very committed people and really got involved in social issues," said Bernie Yudain, longtime friend of the Bush family and a former Greenwich Time managing editor.

He said Mrs. Bush helped found the Greenwich Shelter for Children, which includes a family center, counseling center and day care center.

"They really got their hands dirty," he said. "She was the epitome of the group. The people who grew up with her just absolutely idolized her."

Mrs. Bush was born July 1, 1901, in Kennebunkport, Maine, a daughter of wealthy Midwestern businessman George Herbert Walker and Lulie Wear Walker. She grew up in St. Louis and attended the Farmington School Academy, a prep school in Farmington, Conn.

She and Prescott Bush, a financier and businessman, were married in 1921. The couple moved to Tennessee, then Massachusetts, where the future president, their second son, was born in 1924.

After settling in Greenwich with her husband in 1926, Mrs. Bush became active in community affairs. She also was the author of a column in the local paper, the Greenwich Time. At the time of her death, Mrs. Bush still volunteered for the Red Cross and a local welfare agency.

Prescott Bush eventually entered politics, representing Connecticut in the U.S. Senate from 1952 to 1963. He died of lung cancer in 1972.

President Bush said his parents were the most important people in his life. His 1987 autobiography, "Looking Forward," is dedicated to them.

In addition to the president, Mrs. Bush is survived by a daughter, Nancy Ellis, sons Prescott Jr., Jonathan and William "Bucky" Bush, and more than three dozen grandchildren and great-grandchildren.

Bush and Aides Attend Funeral For His Mother

GREENWICH, Conn., Nov. 23 — Returning to the town where he spent his childhood, President Bush led more than 100 mourners who gathered here today for the funeral of his mother, Dorothy Walker Bush, who died Thursday at the age of 91.

The President, who had arrived in a long motorcade from Westchester County Airport, briefly shed the trappings of office as the 45-minute Episcopal service ended. He stepped outside Christ Church, where his mother had been a member for more than 40 years, and remained there for about 20 minutes, embracing friends and family members and, at one point, raising his hands to acknowledge a smattering of applause from onlookers across the street.

Several of his top aides, most of them longtime friends, attended the funeral as well. They included James A. Baker 3d, the chief of staff, Treasury Secretary Nicholas F. Brady and Vice President Dan Quayle. The President's wife, Barbara, and their four sons and daughter, who is named for her grandmother, were present, as were Mr. Bush's brothers, Prescott Jr., Jonathan and William, and his sister, Nancy Ellis.

Letter on Faith

The service was led by three celebrants, including the retired 23d Presiding Bishop and Primate of the Episcopal Church of the United States, the Most Rev. John M. Allin. Bishop Allin is also the rector at the Church of St. Ann in Kennebunkport, Me., where Dorothy Walker and Prescott Bush were married in 1921 and where the President and his family attend services when at their summer house.

Two organists provided music, and Prescott Bush Jr. read a letter that his mother had written, said Kelsey Bush Nadeau, one of Prescott Bush's daughters. In the letter Mrs. Bush discussed

her faith and how it had sustained her, other mourners said.

After a luncheon at his mother's house here, the President and other family members drove to Putnam Cemetery for a brief graveside service. As the sun shone amid springlike temperatures, Mrs. Bush's ashes were interred next to the grave of her husband, a former Senator from Connecticut who died in 1972. Next to their markers is a small white marble stone

in memory of George and Barbara Bush's daughter, Pauline Robinson Bush, who died from leukemia in 1953 when she was 3 years old.

After the services, which were closed to reporters, the President returned to Washington aboard an Air Force jet.

Dorothy Bush, a native of Maine, was remembered by people here as a woman of athletic talent and grace. Some of the mourners were her bridge and tennis partners, and one person recalled

that until a few years ago Mrs. Bush insisted on pedaling her bicycle along back roads near her house. She was also active in many charities, and one of them, the American Red Cross, flew its flags at half-staff today in her honor.

Mrs. Bush, 91, died Thursday after suffering a series of strokes.

The president was ac-

companied by his brothers Jonathan, Prescott Jr. and William "Bucky" Bush, as well as his sister, Nancy Ellis.

Many of those who attended the service in the gray stone Christ Church said they felt uplifted by a service that focused on Mrs. Bush's life of dedication to family and community.

"It was one of the most beautiful services I've ever seen," said Eleanor Parker, 91, a lifelong friend of Mrs. Bush.

"What I remember

most is her sportsmanship and her desire that her children always speak the truth."

Jonathan Bush read a letter his mother wrote shortly before her death, which talked about her life and expressed her wishes for an unpretentious funeral.

Mrs. Bush's oldest son, Prescott, talked about what a wonderful mother she had been.

Also attending the service were Vice President Dan Quayle and Marilyn

Quayle, former Secretary of State and Chief of Staff James Baker, former New York City Mayor John Lindsay, former baseball Commissioner Fay Vincent, Kara Kennedy and Mrs. Bush's many grandchildren and great-grandchildren.

At Mrs. Bush's request, her body was cremated, and the remains were interred at the family plot in the Putnam Cemetery on Pheasant Lane, less than a mile from her Greenwich home.

S&L audit firm to pay record fine

The federal government is getting \$400 million in its biggest victory to date against advisers to failed savings and loans during the 1980s.

The huge settlement likely will make it easier for regulators to win big awards from other law and accounting firms that worked with thrifts.

Ernst & Young, the largest U.S. accounting firm, agreed Monday to pay \$400 million to settle all S&L-related charges.

The government charged Ernst & Young with improper auditing in four of the most notorious S&L failures:

- Charles Keating's Lincoln Savings & Loan Association.

- Silverado Banking Savings & Loan Association — which had President Bush's son Neil on the board of directors.

- Vernon Savings & Loan Association of Dallas.

- Western Savings Association.

The failure of those four cost taxpayers \$4.5 billion.

Ernst & Young audited about 400 of the roughly 2,500 banks and thrifts that failed in the past decade.

The Office of Thrift Supervision said litigating the case would have cost \$150 million.

The accounting firm neither admitted nor denied guilt.

Its insurance company will pay \$300 million; the company pays off the other \$100 million over four years.

That's \$13,158 per year for each of 1,900 partners.

Also, one current partner and two former partners are barred for life from auditing banks and S&Ls.

The settlement is the largest ever with an accounting or law firm. Most big U.S. accounting firms face similar charges.

Matters presidential

When kids bring anger to school

It should come as no surprise to anyone to learn that idyllic children nurtured in traditional nuclear families are a rarity.

Family demographics have changed radically in the past several decades: Single-parent families, dual-career families, blended families, even homeless families have become part of the norm. Since 1965, the number of single-parent households has increased from about 10 percent of American families to 25 percent. Many of these people are poor and live in low-income inner-city communities.

The problems of high unemployment, inferior schools, drugs, alcohol, crime and violence that plague cities and towns contribute to demoralizing these citizens, who have been stigmatized as the "underclass." These tragic conditions are particularly devastating for their children, too many of whom are not being properly cared for by their parents or extended family.

One indication of the enormous damage already inflicted on children is the shocking statistic that, since the 1970s, reported incidents of child abuse and neglect have risen from about 75,000 to more than 2 million cases annually. We can't expect these children and others suffering from various forms of trauma to interact well with teachers and fellow students. From an early age, children who suffer from various forms of trauma, and others who are undisciplined or suffer from a combination of syndromes, are angry and ready to strike out. When they reach school age, they bring major problems to the classroom.

Everyone realizes that teaching can be a difficult job, but it is even more difficult for teachers who work in low-income inner-city schools. They must undertake the education of many children who have not participated in programs like Head Start and are not emotionally or intellectually ready for school. Such children are not prepared to interact with fellow students and teachers; and their problems often make a teacher's task frustrating and unrewarding.

Teachers may approach these neighborhoods with fear for their safety due to the high rates of neighborhood crime and school violence that are often a part of their working environment. Although teachers' colleges offer courses in child development, behavioral psychology and ethnic and cultural differences, such theoretical subjects may not adequately prepare teachers to handle the behavioral problems they are likely to encounter in the classroom.

The sad fact is that today more children than ever do not receive acceptable parental support in the home and turn instinctively to teachers and other school staff for nurturing and other support traditionally supplied by the family. Unfortunately, their disruptive behavior tends to drive some teachers away, yet there are many who are eager to meet the challenge and wish to do a good job.

It is important to realize that these school problems are not just a black, brown or white issue. Coping with ethnic, racial and class differences can be overwhelming for educators from any ethnic background.

For example, an 8-year-old boy who has been neglected and perhaps abused is likely to carry his

anger to school and let loose a stream of four-letter words at his teacher. Should the teacher react by adopting the old-fashioned view of the child as "bad," or even deranged, and succumb to defeatism, this boy, and others like him, may be doomed to failure and additional neglect. Even a teacher who has studied the required psychology courses may be unable to overcome the class and cultural differences that influence his or her response.

It is hard for teachers to deal with disruptive students who hurl hostile profanity at them. In such a situation, most normal human beings tend to become incensed, feeling that they personally are the objects of attack, hurt and disrespect. A protective response can be withdrawal and losing sight of the professional skills that enable adults to reach out to help distressed students. Such an attack is seldom personal; it may erupt because a child is reacting to upsetting events that affected him at school, on the street or even at home.

A youngster who has been mistreated elsewhere may respond at school by lashing out at other students to vent his fury and unhappiness. That can be the reason why a child punches another child for merely bumping into him. The student strikes out at the slightest provocation because he is already enraged. This type of dynamic, which is an everyday occurrence, is partially responsible for the high rates of violence and homicide in some communities.

Without suggesting that hostile and disobedient youngsters be coddled, I believe that it requires extra effort and understanding for teachers to reach out to explore the problems the child may be experiencing outside the classroom. They may not respond to the first overture of interest but, over time, many will learn that their teachers have a real interest in the well-being and success of their students, particularly as the teachers demonstrate their interest in helping their pupils to learn.

Teachers may discover that students who are acting out have learning differences that cause frustration and defensive behavior and need to be evaluated. It is not uncommon for the learning disabilities of low-income children to go undetected. I have known youngsters whose dyslexic disorders were entirely overlooked in psychological evaluations administered by inexperienced testers. When some of the students were re-examined at centers that specialize in treating these problems, they were found to have severe learning disorders.

Children misdiagnosed at school as mentally disabled or having a low I.Q. are placed in special education classes that become dumping grounds for any student whose antics or behavior disturb the normal conduct of the classroom. These classes, frequently overcrowded and understaffed, challenge personnel to maintain discipline. Such places do not provide a setting in which overburdened teachers can teach and students can learn.

Programs in schools where teachers are aided in understanding the cultural environment and psychological forces affecting their students have shown some success, particularly when teachers, psychologists, counselors, social workers and parents work together as a team.

Teachers must make the best use of their psychological knowledge and perseverance, in spite of periodic frustration, to help the seemingly "bad" children who are victims of struggling families and depressed communities.

A.M.A. Guidelines Ask Doctors to Help Identify Abuse of Elderly

Estimating that two million older Americans become victims of mistreatment every year, the American Medical Association yesterday issued its first guidelines to help doctors identify and treat abuse of the elderly.

The guidelines are part of the American Physician's Campaign Against Family Violence, which last June published similar guidelines on domestic violence and the abuse and neglect of children. The new guidelines recommend interviews and other methods for discovering cases of physical abuse, and they cover several kinds of mistreatment and other behavior, like coercion in legal or financial matters.

"We hope to encourage physicians to become more acutely aware of elder abuse and to intervene when neces-

sary," said Dr. Palma E. Formica, a New Jersey family doctor who is a trustee of the A.M.A. "We've talked a lot about abuse by care givers, but we have not been willing to admit the prevalence of elder abuse by family members."

Routinely Questioning Patients

The guidelines suggest that doctors routinely ask older patients about abusive or neglectful behavior, and that the interviews be conducted away from caretakers or family members. The questions doctors are advised to ask include: Has anyone at home ever hurt you? Has anyone ever touched you without your consent? Has anyone ever made you do things you didn't want to do? Are you afraid of anyone at home?

"We have tended to associate elder abuse with care-giver exhaustion, but

the new studies show that it's not necessarily the older person who needs 24-hour care who gets abused," Dr. Formica said. "It may be the parent who is taking care of an adult child with drug or alcohol or emotional problems, or the mother whose son seems so devoted, but is really terrorizing her."

Abuse of older people came to light in a number of disturbing news reports in the 1970's, but there is still relatively little research and almost no formal training for doctors on how to identify abuse of the elderly, or on what to do about it.

"Training on domestic violence of any kind has been sadly lacking in medical schools, and there is no doubt that elder abuse is the most unexplored area of domestic violence," said Dr. Mark Lachs, an assistant professor of geriatrics at the Yale University

School of Medicine and an author of the guidelines. "I think a large percentage of elder abuse and neglect goes unrecognized."

The guidelines cover many kinds of mistreatment by family members, caretakers and nursing homes and other institutions. The kinds of behavior described as abusive or neglectful include slapping, verbal harassment, inappropriate use of medication, forcible placement in a nursing home, coercion in changing a will and failing to provide eyeglasses, hearing aids or false teeth.

"Physicians are ideally situated to play a significant role in the detection, management and prevention of elder abuse and neglect," the guidelines state. "A physician may be the only person outside the family who sees the older adult on a regular basis, and he or she is uniquely qualified to order confirmatory diagnostic tests such as

blood tests or X-rays, to recommend hospital admission or to authorize services such as home health care."

The guidelines also recognize that intervening in cases of mistreatment might present ethical or legal complications. "There's a difference between child abuse and elder abuse," Dr. Formica said. "Children need protection. But if a competent adult doesn't want you to intervene, you don't."

Until recently, doctors have been reluctant to confront domestic violence. Several studies have shown that many doctors are uncomfortable with the issue, not only because of a lack of training, but also because it is often time consuming and difficult to evaluate an abusive situation.

"Physicians fear that it opens a Pandora's box, and the time and extensive interviewing needed to assess suspected abuse are not well reimbursed in current medical practice," Dr. Lachs said.

"But I think those of us concerned with elder abuse can learn a lot from the pediatricians, who have successfully medicalized the question of child abuse," Dr. Lachs said.
