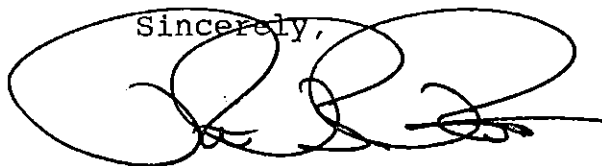
There are many excellent literary agents in the United States. I differ from them in one important respect. I received an extremely warm and enthusiastic reception during my visit to Taiwan last week, primarily because I was the first cabinet-level economic official to visit since the late 1970's. Based on discussions with Taiwanese authorities and businessmen, I believe that U.S. exporters will have new opportunities in that rapidly growing market.

In meetings with President Lee, Premier Hau, Minister of Economic Affairs Vincent Siew, and many others, I emphasized that U.S. exporters are extremely competitive in the major sectors in Taiwan's six-year capital development plan, such as nuclear energy, environmental protection, and transportation. I noted that, as Taiwan's largest export market, we expect fair treatment for U.S. bids under the six-year plan.

My message appeared to be received by all. Several with whom I met, however, stressed that U.S. exporters must try harder to sell in Taiwan. Japan's success, they argued, is due to its much greater marketing presence. I relayed this message to members of the Taiwan-based U.S. business community.

The visit provided an opportunity to press Taiwan to strengthen its rules protecting intellectual property, and to take other market-opening steps needed to become a member of the GATT. Most of Taiwan's authorities appeared sympathetic, but some (including legislators) favor a more gradual process. We will need to keep up the pressure. This will be made easier under a new bilateral Trade and Investment Framework Agreement, which we agreed to create during my trip.

Finally, I was able to underscore support for certain U.S. exporters facing unusual problems doing business in Taiwan. For example, Federal Express has experienced extraordinary delay in getting approval to set up a regional hub at Chiang Kai-shek Airport, a move that should benefit Taiwan greatly. Also, General Motors has longstanding differences with Taiwan's customs authorities over valuation of imported parts. Hopefully a sign of support from Washington will help these issues be resolved.

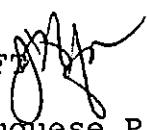

SUBJECT:

Reply to Portuguese Prime Minister Cavaco Silva

Purpose

To reply to Cavaco Silva's message on the crisis in Angola and to encourage his support for the U.S.-EC trade Agreement.

Background

Cavaco Silva wrote you shortly after the breakdown of Angola's electoral process, expressing his deep concern with the deteriorating situation and urging our active involvement. We have been cooperating closely with the Portuguese to prevent renewal of civil war and to get the reconciliation process back on track. The attached reply thanks Cavaco Silva for Portugal's role and underscores our commitment to supporting the Angola peace process. The reply also encourages Cavaco Silva to support the November 20 U.S.-EC trade accord and efforts to achieve a broader Uruguay Round agreement in the weeks ahead. To date, Portugal has been quietly positive on the U.S.-EC agreement.

RECOMMENDATION

That you sign the attached response to Cavaco Silva.

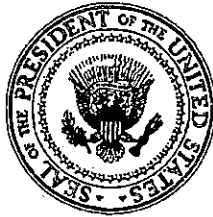

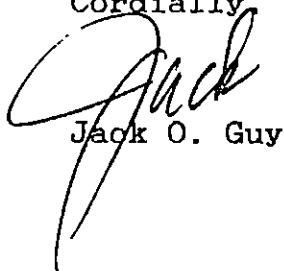

U.S. OFFICIALS ESTIMATE COST, LENGTH OF SOMALIA MISSION

Administration officials, under pressure to clarify the limits of the U.S. military mission in Somalia, said Sunday the humanitarian operations will begin in "about two days," probably will last no more than two to three months and could cost American taxpayers \$300 million to \$400 million.

But Secretary Cheney said the notion that the U.S. will get bogged down in another guerilla war is "dead wrong.... If you are looking for the U.S. to stay until all the problems are solved in Somalia, that is not going to happen."

Cheney and acting Secretary Eagleburger, appearing on T.V. interview shows, took issue with the U.S. ambassador to Kenya, Smith Hempstone, who has warned that the Somalia operations will become a "tarbaby," similar to Vietnam. Eagleburger, on ABC's "This Week With David Brinkley" said most Administration officials believe Hempstone "probably exaggerated things substantially."

Although Cheney declined to say specifically when U.S. troops would begin landing, the Marine Corps commandant, Gen. Carl Mundy, indicated on the Brinkley show that U.S. troops will begin going ashore in Somalia in "about two days." Brent Scowcroft on CBS's "Face the Nation" said that "a few thousand" people in logistics and other support units may remain in Somalia after combat troops depart because of that country's lack of infrastructure.

U.S. Won't Seek Total Disarmament In Somalia, Officials Say

U.S. forces will do what they must to pacify Somalia's warring gunmen, but there will be no attempt to "round up every AK-47," Secretary Cheney and other Administration officials say.

"We may well want to go in and round up troops or weapons. We might want to offer a bounty" to reward Somalis who hand in guns, Cheney said Sunday on NBC's "Meet the Press." Marine Commandant Carl Mundy said he was looking for a peaceful disarmament and cooperation from Somali warlords. But commanders and individual marines will be told "if they're fired upon, they can return fire," Mundy said on ABC's "This Week With David Brinkley."

A Gallup poll for Newsweek found broad support for President Bush's humanitarian mission, despite the risks. Sixty-six percent of some 602 adults surveyed Dec. 3-4 approved of sending troops to Somalia, although 77% believed the American troops could become targets for renegade gunmen. The poll had a five-point margin of error.

Cheney Hopeful Troops Can Begin Withdrawing By Mid-January

Secretary Cheney denied that American servicemen in Somalia will be forced into confrontations with armed guerrilla warlords and stuck in the war-torn African nation indefinitely. "I think that's just dead wrong," Cheney said on NBC's "Meet the Press."

Sen. Mitchell, while applauding the Administration moves to date, also warned of "dangers and risks" that will face the American forces, including "armed, dangerous and virtually lawless groups roaming throughout" the country.

Cheney said he was hopeful some American troops could begin withdrawing by Inauguration Day, while again cautioning against setting an "artificial deadline." Administration officials predicted a contingent would probably have to stay in place, perhaps offshore, for an additional period of time. (UPI)

Marines Brace For D-Day In Somalia

Tuesday will be D-Day for the U.S.-led war against hunger in Somalia when marines go ashore in the East African nation, Gen. Carl Mundy said Sunday.

Secretary Cheney said the cable from Amb. Hempstone criticizing the Somalia rescue operation demonstrates that Hempstone "clearly disagrees with the policy." He said Hempstone also opposed the initial U.S. military relief flights from Kenya to Somalia. Acting Secretary Eagleburger said "we asked him for his views, he gave them to us, we thought about them, and I made sure that everyone else in the decision-making process knew about them." **TRUCKS MOVE FOOD
ACROSS 'GREEN LINE'**

MOGADISHU -- Relief workers moved food from this divided city's main harbor for the first time in nearly a month, sending four convoys through a front line fraught with danger from armed gangs.

The food transport came amid reports of the first contact between planners of the coming U.S. military intervention and Mogadishu's relief community. The U.N. port captain here received a telephone call from a U.S. admiral asking questions about the depth of the harbor channel and the length of the wharf, said one relief source.

Two Defense Department officials were expected to slip into the city late Monday to discuss possible security measures that relief groups could take, especially in the hours surrounding the initial U.S. troop movement, one relief official said. However, the official said, relief workers still had not had even initial consultations on meshing their plans with the American military activity. (Todd Shields, Washington Post, A27)

Aid Convoy Ends Somalia Standoff

MOGADISHU -- A relief convoy ended a month-old standoff with warring militias Sunday and left the capital's chaotic port to deliver food to an isolated part of the city as U.S. marines massed offshore. The convoy of 40 trucks was the first such convoy to make it safely out of the port in more than a month.

The first thousand or so U.S. troops, out of a force that may ultimately exceed 28,000 troops from the U.S. and a dozen other countries, were preparing an amphibious assault on Mogadishu and other points in the country from a naval task force now standing about 50 miles off the coast.

**A FEW IN CONGRESS ADVISING

**U.S. DIPLOMACY PLUNGES

When marines land at Mogadishu, Somalia, this week they will open a new chapter in U.S. diplomacy, one that could set a precedent for future intervention. Already, the operation has ushered in a debate on the role of the U.S. in what some are calling the "new world disorder."

The Bush Administration argues, as Acting Secretary Eagleburger has put it, that Somalia met two criteria for intervention: It is "a tragedy of massive proportions and, underline this, one that we could do something about." But by that standard, says Terrence Lyons, a Brookings Institution specialist on Africa, "there must be 10, 12, 15 cases where justice would be served by intervention." INDIAN RIOT DESTROYS MOSQUE

AYODHYA, INDIA -- Thousands of rioting Hindu extremists, many wielding hammers and pickaxes, demolished Indian Muslims' most controversial mosque Sunday in a rampage that threatened the government's stability and spread fear of religious violence across the country. While a frenzied mob of more than 200,000 chanting Hindus urged them on, several thousand men stormed police barricades and began smashing the walls of the 16th century mosque.

By day's end, the chief minister of Uttar Pradesh, India's most populous state and the site of the riot, resigned, and the national government took control of the state.

**VIETNAM MINISTER URGES

HANOI -- A Vietnamese minister urged Washington to forget the past and lift its punishing trade embargo against Hanoi, an official newspaper said Monday.

Le Xuan Trinh, minister in charge of Prime Minister Vo Van Kiet's cabinet office, told Quan Doi Nhan Dan army newspaper that Vietnam had tried hard to improve relations with the U.S. and that the next move was Washington's. **CHINESE ARMS DEALS PROLIFERATE
DURING BUSH'S FINAL WEEKS**

China's weapons trade, long a matter of U.S. concern, has been stepped up in the waning days of the Bush Administration in apparent anticipation that Bill Clinton will take a harder line toward Beijing's arms sales. Government sources said the arms activity involves numerous deals for missile technology and other weapons, and includes the import and re-export of some Russian armaments. Customers include Syria, Iran, Pakistan, and possibly Libya, the officials said. (Jim Drinkard, AP)

**NO GAYS, MILITARY
MEN SAY**

Two more senior defense officials Sunday joined the rising chorus of leaders opposed to lifting a ban on homosexuals in the U.S. armed forces. "I do support the ban against homosexuals in the military," Marine Commandant Gen. Carl Mundy said.

Secretary Cheney said Sunday he opposes lifting the ban. "People don't have choices about who they associate with," he said on NBC's "Meet the Press." "It's difficult to separate your private life from your professional life in the uniformed military, and it's the judgment of our senior military commanders, which I concur in, that to force gays leading an overt, openly gay lifestyle into our military units would have a detrimental impact upon the cohesiveness of the units and our combat capabilities."

ABC's Forest Sawyer: Even before U.S. troops arrive in Somalia relief supplies have broken through the month-old siege of Mogadishu. Planes loaded with food have also landed in the central city of Bardera. But the anarchy in the country continues to make it almost impossible for relief workers to do their job, which means everyone is waiting for the U.S. to arrive.

ABC's Ted Koppel reports this is a country where the four horsemen of the apocalypse are on familiar territory. That makes the Marines expected here any day now a very desirable alternative.

(Ali Mahdi Mohamed, war lord: "I'm so happy if the U.S. has responded in sending forces to Somalia to settle the peace and deliver the food to the needy people.)

His rivals call Ali Mahdi Mohamed a war lord. He calls himself "president."

(Koppel to Mohamed: "If the Marines come and say, 'Mr. president, we would like your men to give up their weapons,' will you tell them to do it?"

Mohamed: "I will be very happy to hear that. And my people are ready to lay down their weapons because they need the peace.")

Although his gunmen control a significant piece of the country, Ali Mahdi has a precarious grip on the capital because of this man, Farah Aidid, another warlord, who prefers the title "chairman." He too says he welcomes the Marines but with a difference.

(Aidid: "Only America, I believe, can give this possibility. It's a great country.")

Koppel: "What about your security forces? If they are asked to give up their weapons, will they do so?"

Aidid: "I think we have to talk with the American officials. I think it is not necessary to force my forces to disarm them. It's not necessary because they are obeying my instructions.")

Aidid says he would like the U.S. government to send a delegation to meet with him before the Marines land to avoid misunderstanding. But with the Marines coming one way or another, Aidid made some concessions today, as Bill Redeker now reports.

ABC's Bill Redeker reports more than 100 trucks loaded with 1,000 tons of wheat left the port today, leaving Aidid's turf, heading toward Ali Mahdi's. Today, C.A.R.E. agreed to pay off the faction that controls the port with 20 tons of grain so the trucks could roll. Ibrahim Omar says he'll put down his gun for good once the U.S. Marines arrive. But many here are skeptical. The hired guns earn of Somalia earn a living fighting one another.

SOMALIA/AMBASSADOR TO KENYA

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ABC -- THIS WEEK WITH DAVID BRINKLEY

Moderator: David Brinkley. **Panel:** Sam Donaldson, Cokie Roberts.

Guest: Lawrence Eagleburger.

Roberts: ...The forces could be there a lot longer than anybody's talking about right now. Can't you see a situation where they just can't be gotten out of there?

Eagleburger: Sure you could see such a situation. But you know, things are tough. You have to make decisions. And the President's advisers and the President himself went through all of this and in the end made a judgment that this was an area where we could affect the outcome, where we could do it with relatively few costs and where we could, in fact, make a big difference and get out fairly quickly, and that's the judgment, and talk to me two months from now and we'll see whether we're right or not. I think we are. I think the worries about the ability to extract ourselves are very much overdone.

Donaldson: ...With all due respect, President Bush does it [sends troops over]...and says to the new president, Mr. Clinton, "Here, it's all yours now. See if you can get out."

Eagleburger: No.... The President wouldn't have decided to go in if there weren't great confidence that we can get out and get out on our terms. But secondly, the fact of the matter is that if President Bush had not done something about this, Mr. Clinton would have faced the issue on the 20th of January; there would have been thousands more that already would have died of starvation. He then has to put his government in order. It would be weeks before he could deal with this thing. The President had to make a choice and the choice was do we do something now to keep people from starving to death and do it in a way in which we are more than confident that we can manage the process and get out and on our own terms, or do we simply stand by because this is the end of a term and let a lot of people starve to death? The world does not run itself on the basis of the American political calendar.

Eagleburger: ...I think what we are seeing in Somalia does say that the U.S. military may well have a new role.... There is no other country in the world that could provide the logistic support, the air transport to manage something like this....

Eagleburger: ...I don't think we have an obligation [to go back in if chaos returns after we leave] unless we decide we have one, and the test of this one will be in the eating of the pudding. I don't know what's going to happen when we leave. What I am convinced of is we will have fed people who would otherwise have died. We will hopefully have established a more stable situation on the ground in Somalia which will permit the U.N. to put in a peacekeeping force of some larger substance and that this will begin a process of creating the kinds of things you're talking about. But I don't know that it will happen.

Donaldson: The British Foreign Office now agrees that it searched Bill Clinton's passport and immigration files over there. Can you assure us that that search was not instigated directly or indirectly by any way from our own State Department, its personnel, either here or in our Embassy in London?

Eagleburger: No, I can't assure you of that. I haven't the vaguest idea. The first I'd ever heard of it was when I read it in the newspaper. I have serious...doubts that we had anything to do with it in the State Department, but to the degree we can investigate and find out the answers to that, we will do so.

Guest: Imam.

Brinkley: You were born in Mogadishu, I believe, a member of a diplomatic family. You are throughout familiar with the country.... U.S. military forces are on their way to your country.... What would you expect and hope they would do?

Imam: As an American citizen of Somali origin, I do highly support the U.S. troops going into Somalia. But what I cannot understand is the lack of the long-term and a strategy plan behind Operation of Restore Hope. I am worried, that it will be totally in vain if there is no resolution for peace in Somalia. What we need really is a national peace conference in Somalia, whereupon Somali clan elders, Somali warring factions, Somali people are brought together to discuss what do Somali people want for Somalia and not impose on them an idea or impose of them...something that they have no idea about.... What the people are really crying for in Somalia now is the disarmament of the warring factions.

Brinkley: Are you talking about a permanent occupation by the U.S. in your country -- your former country?

Imam: No, I'm worried that the U.N. trusteeship that is being thrown around now -- that the Somali people will take it and will understand it as a new world order colonialism. Somali people do not trust and are not comfortable with the United Nations really administering their country.... The slow-moving United Nations peacekeeping operation has totally failed in Somalia. And what we need really now is more assertive, preventive diplomacy, peace-making operation in Somalia.

Roberts: You talk about disarmament, and you've been quoted saying that the United States armed Somalia in the first place, why should it hesitate about disarming it. What do you suggest?

Imam: First of all, I am quite sure that Washington did not hesitate for a single moment to flood that country with weapons as late as 1988. But what I am saying is that very simply that our U.S. troops...going into Somalia will be in vain if there is no long-term strategy behind it. If the U.S. troops leave in three, four months, we will be to square one. What I am promoting is really a national peace conference. I'm going to start launching this campaign with Randall Robinson of TransAfrica as early as Tuesday, December 8th in Washington. Washington and the government and the international community, I hope, will support this.

Guest: General Mundy.

Brinkley: When are you landing your first troops there?

Mundy: In about two days will be the D-day as we would normally term it and of course this is a -- I've termed it a peace-making operation. This is to achieve a level of stability in a country in which there's a tremendous amount of instability so that we can conduct the humanitarian assistance that has been ongoing out there for a couple of months now, but is just not satisfactory as your earlier reports indicated this morning.

Roberts: ...The U.N. resolution doesn't talk about disarmament. But obviously there are a lot of people with guns there. Are you prepared to disarm them, ready to offer bounties -- do something like that?

Mundy: All of the above. Very clearly we would hope that that would be a peaceful disarmament.... But we are prepared to take whatever measures we have to achieve disarmament.

Roberts: The big question that everybody is asking is how long is this likely to go on? How long will they stay there? And the other question that I'm of course hearing on Capitol Hill is how much will it cost?

Mundy: How long is...until we accomplish the mission that we're sent in there to do.

Mundy: ...It could take a long time, but remember that there will be a long-time residual force in there that will be blue-helmeted United Nations forces....

DISCUSSION

On Somalia, Tom Wicker joins panel:

Donaldson: ...What we're doing here is ad-libbing for the best of impulses. It's a noble impulse.... But we're ad-libbing in a way: we don't know how we're going to come out, we don't know what's going to happen to Somalia, we don't know what our obligations are going to be in the future. And we don't know finally what sort of precedent this may set in our own hearts if no where around the world. And if we now believe that the U.S. is strong enough and wealthy enough, mighty enough to project our humanitarian impulses all over the world, I think we're in for a crash.

Wicker: ...It is an ad-lib, and it should be an ad-lib. It's an ad-lib in this circumstance. And I think that's why it would be dangerous to say we now have an armed forces that's going to good things rather than conduct wars. It's only in this circumstance that they're doing that, and I don't think the Secretary [Lawrence Eagleburger] was very good on that, that we should not consider this a precedent or something that obligates us to do the same thing elsewhere....

Roberts: But I do think there is a need to establish some sort of policy.... What is the underlying philosophy of the U.S. foreign policy. And you can make a good case that the Bush Administration just simply withdrew from making any of those decisions for the last year.

NBC -- MEET THE PRESS

Moderator: Tim Russert. **Panel:** Al Hunt, Fred Francis.

Russert: You [Tom Brokaw reporting from Somalia] have been talking to the relief groups and some of the warlords. What are you finding over there?

Brokaw: I think the relief agencies are perplexed at this point why no one from the United States has been in touch with them. As they point out, they know this country better than any other outsider. They have been bringing in the food. They have been doing the best job that they can with the distribution process, and yet no Marines, no members of the armed forces from the United States have been in touch with the people on the ground here.... We find the same thing among some of the warlords. I talked with General Aidid last night. He said he had heard from no official U.S. representative.

Russert: ...What kind of reception can the U.S. military expect when they arrive in Mogadishu and Somalia?

Brokaw: It's only a guess at this point, but I think that in the city that they'll get a very friendly reception.

Russert: ...Mr. Secretary, you just heard Tom Brokaw. Why haven't we been in touch with the relief organizations and the warlords, telling them what we plan to do in Somalia?

Cheney: We will, in fact, be in touch, but it's also important to make a point here that the Marines and the Army troops going in will not be the first Americans on the scene. We've flown over 1,400 missions -- relief missions -- into Somalia since August. We've had several hundred Air Force personnel involved in the effort from Mombasa into Somalia. We've had people in there periodically to repair runways. So we've got a pretty good idea of what the situation is like -- not perfect by any means, and certainly we will want to be in touch with the appropriate people there.

Russert: The secretary-general of the United States has said that disarmament is essential for a lasting peace, and also, according to "The New York Times" today, American officials have told Security Council folks at the United Nations that we will, in fact, attempt to confiscate machine guns, mortars, artillery. Will that be part of our mission?

Cheney: We have to remember what the mission is. The mission is to go in and restore some semblance of order and make it possible for the relief supplies to be distributed and ultimately to turn things over to U.N. peacekeeping forces. A means to achieving that objective or to carrying out that mission will be to reduce the level of violence and to deal with the arms that are there, but I would view it as a means to an end, not as an objective in and of itself.

Russert: ...How much have we budgeted for operation?

Cheney: ...I would guess that it's going to run us perhaps \$300 or \$400 million, but that's a guess at this point. I can't be more precise than that until our number crunchers have a chance to look at it.

Hunt: ...Where is the U.S. vital interest involved in Somalia?

Cheney: ...I think this is best perceived as a humanitarian mission. It's the kind of situation where, clearly, you don't have the critical interest at stake that we had in the Gulf when Saddam Hussein threatened the world supply of oil. But it is a situation where the United States is the only nation that has the capability that will let us restore the situation to the point where we can deal with it by traditional international means through blue-helmeted forces under the auspices of the United Nations.... It was the President's judgment and concurred on by his advisers that the only way we could stop the starvation and create a set of circumstances in which those normal methods could work is for the U.S. to intervene, and that's why we've taken these steps.

Hunt: Wouldn't that principle hold just as true for a number of other places -- Haiti, Sudan, Liberia? Why aren't we intervening there militarily?

Cheney: ...You have to make judgments. Circumstances differ from country to country. Sometimes you make a judgment based on what is in vital U.S. interests, sometimes you make a judgment based on the ability of the U.S. to do it versus someone else to do it. Sometimes you do it based upon the cost....

Hunt: ...What about arming the Bosnians?

Cheney: Arming the Bosnians is an option that has been debated. I expect it will be debated again. We have not made a decision at this point to go forward and do that.

Hunt: Are you for it?

Cheney: It's part of the U.N. sanctions at this point to prohibit arming anybody there. You'd have to change the U.N. policy in order for us to be able to arm the Bosnians.

Francis: Back to Somalia, Mr. Secretary. How do we get out?...

Cheney: ...We've already had a large number of nations just in the last 48 hours...who have committed to send forces to participate alongside the U.S. in terms of the peacemaking operation and to be there so we can hand off responsibility to them when we leave. That's the key part of the process by which we get out. If you're looking for the U.S. to stay until all the problems are solved in Somalia, that is not going to happen.... Our mission is very precise. Our mission is to restore conditions so that the humanitarian effort can go forward and then to turn over responsibility for securing the country to U.N. forces.

Russert: ...You can't perceive any circumstances where United States troops would still be there six months from now?

Cheney: I wouldn't -- not in the numbers that we're putting them in now, certainly. I would expect, as General Powell said in our briefing the other day, that we're looking at an operation that'll take two to three months. But after we've done the basic bulk of our work there still may be a need for various kinds of specialized units. You may want to leave a Marine amphibious ready group off the coast for a while because that would give the support to the U.N. blue-helmeted force so that you could deal with the situation if it got out of control. You may want to leave some of our logistics or our medical engineering people there for a longer period of time because we've got capabilities there that other nations don't have.

Hunt: ...Why did George Bush lose the election do you think?

Cheney: ...I thought he should have won the election. I think he's done an outstanding job, especially in the international arena. And I think that the history books will show that he did a good job on the economy too -- that, in fact, the policies he pursued for getting through and out of the recession were the right ones, that we didn't panic or do a bunch of dumb things in terms of pumping up the economy. If I had one thing to suggest, it would be that we weren't very good about talking about economic policy in terms of describing what we were doing and why we were doing it....

CBS -- FACE THE NATION

Moderator: Bob Schieffer.

Guests: General Scowcroft, Senator Simon, Senator Hank Brown and Rep. John Lewis.

Guest: General Scowcroft.

Schieffer: ...What will constitute a mission accomplished once our U.S. military forces get there? When will they feel the job has been done?

Scowcroft: Our objective is really very fixed.... Our objective is to go in, open up the ports, open up the distribution centers,...open up the communications routes, then turn it back over to the peacekeepers who will come in....

Schieffer: ...In order to do that, does that mean that the U.S. forces will have to disarm these warlords? Will they have to confiscate their guns? What exactly is their mission there?

Scowcroft: That will not be an objective of the operation. The objective of the operation is to clean up the area sufficient to allow aid to continue. Will there be weapons collection? I think absolutely so. If we made that an objective, we would indeed be there forever rooting out all the weapons. But I think it can be done to a degree which will allow peacekeeping operations...to allow...aid to continue to be distributed.

Schieffer: ...How long will these troops have to remain in Somalia before those U.N. peacekeepers can come in and do their job?

Scowcroft: ...I would say it's a matter of weeks rather than a matter of months because one of the things that some of the troops that will go in with the American troops will be what we call coalition forces in this stage, but they will also stay on as peacekeeping forces. The Pakistanis, for example, who are already in there as peacekeepers -- they will augment their force. They will go in with us to restore order. Then they will stay behind. So it should be a fairly smooth operation in the sense of clearing the way, establishing a peaceful environment or an environment at least peaceful enough to allow aid to go, and then with people to maintain it.

Guests: Sens. Simon and Brown, Rep. John Lewis.

Schieffer: Senator Brown,...what is it [about the U.S. mission in Somalia] that bothers you?

Brown: Every time we've deployed military personnel in a combat situation and we haven't spelled out the mission clearly, we've had a disaster.... The President talked about deploying troops for 30 days. Colin Powell now talks about two to three months. Some estimates are out that it'll be four months. The CIA says it takes at least a year. The American ambassador to Kenya says it would take at least four years. And the simple fact is we haven't spelled out what we're going to do. We're exposing American troops without being able to take care of them. And lastly, and maybe most important, we're taking over the civil administration of Somalia with American Marines. They're not equipped, they're not trained and they're not designed to do it. In many areas, they don't speak the language. What we ought to have done is deployed troops from the area that share the religion, share the background, share some similar languages. We'd be far better off to focus our attention on relief of the famine and providing medicine, not military operations in Somalia.

Simon: ...I think the President has done the right thing. I think, frankly, this is George Bush's finest hour. The reality is we do have a specific mission and that is to see that food gets to desperate people....

Lewis: ...We need to use our military to do exactly what we're doing in Somalia -- stop spending money on bombs and missiles and guns, and help the people of the world. I think this is the finest hour for our military.

THE McLAUGHLIN GROUP

Moderator: John McLaughlin. **Panel:** Fred Barnes, Eleanor Clift, Clarence Page, Morton Kondracke.

On Somalia:

McLaughlin: ...Are the U.S. goals sufficient as to justify military intervention of this magnitude?

Barnes: No, they aren't. I am in favor of this mission. I think Bush should have ordered it sooner; he does get credit. The only reason this is happening is because the U.S. and President Bush have decided to do it. But, in fact, you need to have explicit guidelines, and he wasn't at all reassuring on his speech on TV by saying, "Well, it's not open ended, and we won't be there forever. And we won't be there any longer than necessary." They need to have specific rules about the chain of command,...the timetable, exactly what the military mission is, not the overall goals. These are the things we need to know.

Clift: I think the short-term goal is clear, and that's to get the food through.... I think what hasn't been thought through is what you do after Jan. 20. I don't believe for a minute that the troops are going to be out by Jan. 20, and it's very stupid to say we're going to leave. That tells the warlords, "Hey, hide in the desert somewhere, and after the 20th you'll have free rein."

Page: I'm very happy we're doing it. I wish we would have done at least six months ago.... What bothers me is there is a lack of consistency that Fred touched on here or a larger policy that explains why are we in Somalia and not in the Sudan, for example. Why can't we use the same military justification to go into Bosnia-Herzegovina? This is the real problem. The trouble here is that there is not enough consistency that shows that there is an order to this new world.

McLaughlin: Do you think this operation can be contained?

Kondracke: I'm afraid that it is going to be contained. This is George Bush at his best and at his worst. He's doing foreign policy, which he loves; he's organizing the world to do something. This is kind of a humanitarian Desert Storm. The problem is that it's too late -- typical Bush. Second thing is that there is no plan for what happens to organize Somalia in the long run. This is part of the new world order. We don't know what kind of machinery is going to be in place to do these things systematically. The last thing is, he's totally ignoring Bosnia. There are 100,000 people dead now in Bosnia and 400,000 more are going to die this winter, and Bush is doing nothing about it.

McLaughlin: Your point is that there has to be a political dimension to this. There is anarchy there. Unless you have order established, a temporary mercy mission will not accomplish anything that is lasting....

McLaughlin: ...On a military intervention time scale, 0 representing Grenada -- in and out surgically -- 10 representing Vietnam, where do you think this operation will fall as far as the U.S. is concerned?

Barnes: A 3 or 4 -- longer than it should, but I'm not even sure of that.

McLaughlin: Well beyond the 20th of January?

Barnes: Oh, sure.

Clift: I agree with that.

Page: Whatever six months amounts to -- around a 2....

Kondracke: Three.

McLaughlin: The answer is a four.

On the economy:

McLaughlin: ...The economy has turned the corner. Who deserves the credit, George Bush, Bill Clinton, neither?

Page: ...How about Adam Smith. This is capitalism. This is the way capitalism works. The economy was improving under Bush but nobody believed it. It was awful salesmanship on his part....

Barnes: ...It will be clear that it is Bush's recovery and not his [Clinton's]....

On Somalia:

Peterson: ...Is this [sending troops to Somalia] a wise thing to do?

Krauthammer: Whether or not it's wise, it's the right thing to do.... What we're claiming is a new principle: we will not allow genocide anywhere in the world, and I think it's a good principle.

Totenberg: I agree....

Thomas: ...I think it was the right thing to do, but I wonder if it's going to work. We're not going to fix that country any time soon, and I don't think the U.N. is either.

Krauthammer: ...The mission is rather well defined....

Peterson: ...What now defines our national interest?

Allen: I think this is Bush's parting message -- that our national interest has changed, that our national interest is part of his new world order and that that new world order calls for a new assumption of responsibility where we don't just now redefine it in terms of superpower confrontation but we begin to use our moral good will and our might....

Krauthammer: We have to explain why Somalia and not Bosnia.... I think there's a real difference....

Totenberg: There are more things we could do in Bosnia.... We could, for example, enforce our no-fly zone. And we and the Europeans -- President Reagan was over in Europe urging NATO to take action in Bosnia....

brave men became heroes.

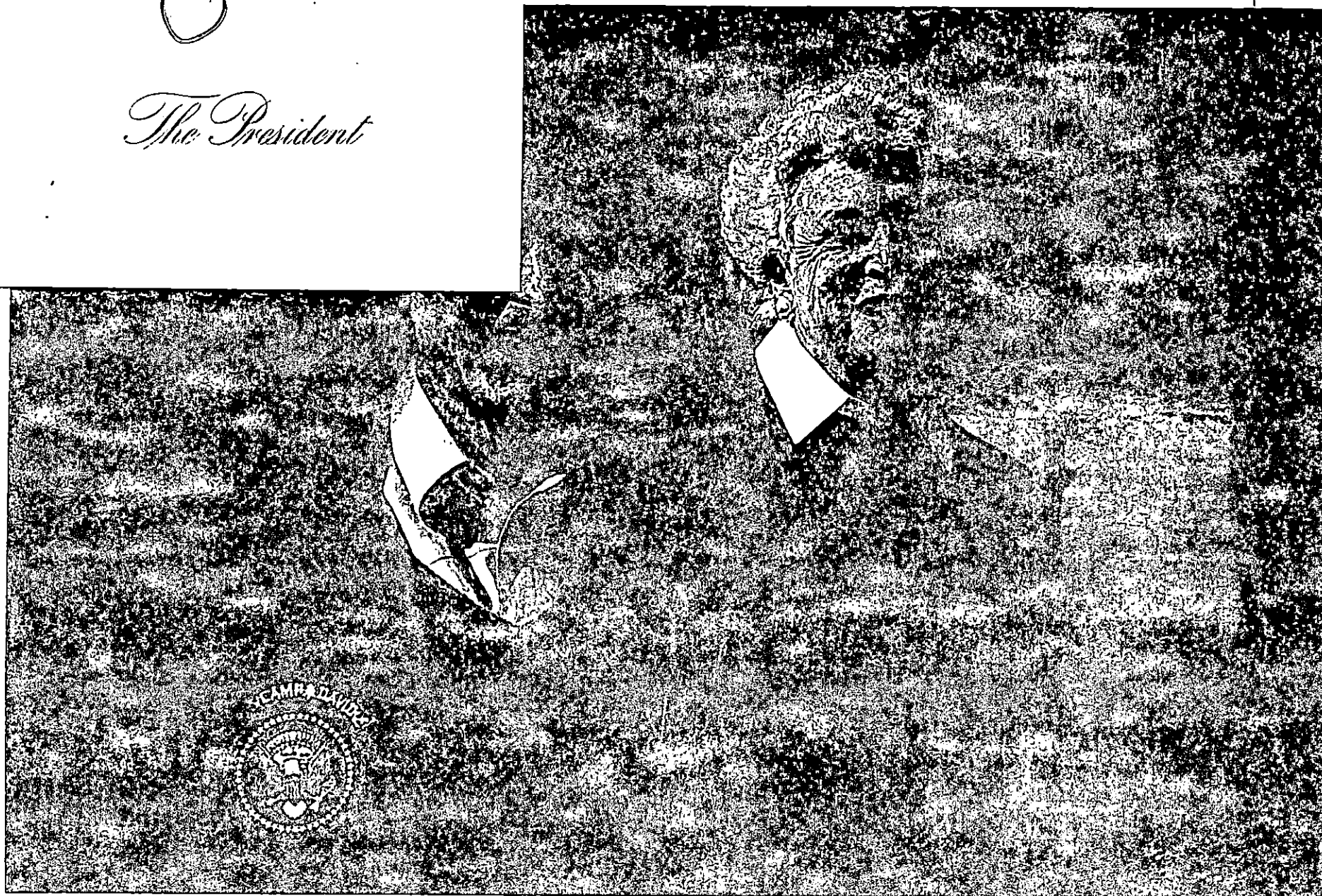
In that spirit, let this wreath I place at the foot of the

It is spelled: H-I-S-T-O-R-Y. Berkeley should learn the lessons of its own history of using race, class and gender criteria to exclude applicants. It should not travel the unpleasant road again.

No accident that Berkeley now boasts a social-science experiment: a Third World utopia with students as the numerical majority. Berkeley is not Harvard. Could it be Harvard for one important reason: Berkeley is a public school, hereby the beneficiary of public funds to which a public obligation is

attached. Harvard has no public obligation to do so. In a state that is now 40% Latino and in which city students comprise the majority of public-school students, they are not afforded Harvard's luxury of simply trying harder. Racial attitudes on college campuses are a mix of good and not-so-good things that either inspire or disgust young people that there is something for them after high school.

Alone in the Crowd

Man Runs a Bush-Quayle Campaign Office in Black Community

The sluggish economy and slow post-riot recovery means that no grand opening in the Crenshaw business district goes unnoticed these days.

The newest storefront enterprise is drawing unusual attention, however.

It is a Bush-Quayle reelection campaign headquarters in the middle of a black community that has long been considered one of the surest Democratic strongholds in Los Angeles.

"I skidded on my brakes the first time I saw the place. I couldn't believe it," said Dolores Spears, a union representative who lives nearby.

"The audacity to put that up in this neighborhood," said Phillip Barnett, a pest control company supervisor who works across the street from the new headquarters.

The campaign office is being run by 88-year-old Richard Jones. He opened it Sept. 26 after spending \$4,000 of his retirement savings on rent and supplies for the office.

GOP leaders say the presidential campaign headquarters is a first for Southwest Los Angeles.

"He's courageous," said Bill Fahey, chairman of the Los Angeles County Bush-Quayle campaign.

Lorelei Kinder, executive director of the state Republican Party, said: "I hope when I'm 88 I have the same courage of my convictions that he does."

Jones acknowledged that the President is unlikely to collect many votes in his neighborhood. Voter registration rolls for the county's 2nd Supervisorial District—which includes the Crenshaw district—list 474,435 Democrats and 88,811 Republicans.

"Most black people are Democrats," Jones said. "But I feel that in a country with two political parties, we should be part of both."

He said he was too young to vote when he first sampled politics as a precinct captain in Chicago 70 years ago.

As an adult, he was a campaign volunteer in Detroit, where he worked as an insurance company manager.

Jones moved to Los Angeles in 1956 after a blizzard blew him out of Michigan.

"I had snowed so hard that all the cars were covered," he said. "I went out to get my car and shoveled and shoveled. Then I found out I'd dug out the wrong car. I said: 'I'm getting out of here.'"

In Los Angeles, he worked 12 years as an executive assistant to Mayor Sam Yorty. During that period, Jones helped open City Hall to minorities—including African-Americans who were appointed to city commissions, he said.

Jones draws stares when he wears his Bush-Quayle button or his "Reelect the President" hat on the half-hour bus ride from his home in the West Adams district to the campaign headquarters at 4710 Crenshaw Blvd.

He brushes off criticism from Bill Clinton supporters, who have several nearby campaign offices—including one at 4209 W. Washington Blvd.

"Things are bad on the street—things are tough, I admit that," Jones said. "But let's look at other things. Today we're not living under the threat of the atomic bomb. Nations that have never talked before are sitting down and talking and there's a chance for peace."

More important, he said, a show of black support for Republican candidates could mean that more attention will be paid black communities when Democrats are out of power.

Some in the Crenshaw district applaud the Bush-Quayle headquarters.

"I've heard a lot of comments about it being here. But I say: 'Hey, the Democrats are just as bad,'" said Zaid Tarig, who operates a bookshop on the boulevard.

"It's wonderful that office is here. A true two-party system needs African-Americans in both parties," said Steve Hamilton, a Republican political consultant working in the Crenshaw district on county supervisorial candidate Diane Watson's campaign.

Still, few residents have stopped in for Bush bumper stickers or for brochures that outline the Republican Administration position.

"I don't need to. I've lived it the past 12 years," shrugged one.

Plenty of outsiders have come to Jones' office, though. The reason: The office number is the only Bush-Quayle telephone listed for Los Angeles.

Republican Robert Durio, a customs officer from Playa del Rey, was happy to find the place.

"Good for you," he told Jones as he scooped up campaign materials.

■ Riot aftermath: Mercantile attack new law intended to protect businesses from moving out of disaster areas.

Korean-American and Japanese community leaders have joined to fight a recently adopted federal law that could prevent hundreds of merchants from using Small Business Administration disaster relief loans to rebuild their businesses in the Los Angeles area.

Korean-American leaders say they passed in September to prevent the loss of businesses from economically devastated neighborhoods—is yet another blow to their battered community, which suffered huge business losses during the riot and now faces opposition to its plans to rebuild. "My immediate, gut reaction was to go back, people don't want to go back, people don't want to go back," attorney Pio Kim said. "There has been a blow after another to the Korean community. Their businesses were burned and now, even for [business owners] going to go back, people don't want to go back."

Sponsored by Rep. Neal Smith, the amendment to two federal disaster bills, the law prohibits the disaster relief loans to "relocate outside the business area in which disaster occurred." The law was intended to keep businesses and their services and job opportunities in the disaster areas, according to Smith. But the law could hurt more than it helps. Los Angeles business owners, many of whom are Korean-Americans, who have not yet been approved for loans may want to relocate because they cannot afford to wait for the lengthy hearing process that the city is conducting for those seeking to rebuild liquor swap meets.

Although the Smith amendment has already been passed, local Asian leaders are seeking working solutions—which are still being developed. The law would exempt Los Angeles businesses from the law.

The SBA neither requested nor the legislation, said Dan Eramian, spokesman. "We are reviewing the legislation and it does need to be flexible. Our assurance there will be as little possible on the [Los Angeles] owners."

The law is not retroactive only to loan applications approved Oct. 7, Eramian said. There are 1,330 Los Angeles disaster applications still under review. The official deadline for riot-related applications was Sept. 15, Eramian said.

Although the Los Angeles community does not believe Los Angeles owners should be exempted from the law, "Los Angeles is no different place," said Smith, who cited an unidentified West Valley whose only grocer wanted to flood devastated the small community.

"If you give subsidized loans and they leave . . . you can't have community."

But the racial preference stated by the Hornbeck award, which UC Berkeley signed on to, is offensive for an important symbolic reason. It is spelled: H-I-S-T-O-R-Y. Whites-only scholarships, like sports-only drinking fountains, railcars and schools, are ugly reminders of an ugly past that should not be resurrected for a new generation to see. Berkeley should learn the lesson of its own history of using race, class and gender criteria to discriminate. It should not travel the unpleasant road again.

It is no accident that Berkeley now publishes a social-science experiment, a Third World utopia with students as the numerical majority. Berkeley is not Harvard. Could it be Harvard for one important reason: Berkeley is a public school, hereby the beneficiary of public funds to which a public obligation is

attached. Harvard has no public obligation to do so. In a state that is now at least 40% Latino and in which city students comprise the majority of public-school students, Berkeley is not afforded Harvard's luxury of simply trying harder. Racial imbalances on college campuses are the tallies of good and not-so-good things that either inspire or discourage young people that there is something for them after high school.

Alone in the Crowd

Man Runs a Bush-Quayle Campaign Office in Black Community

The sluggish economy and slow post-riot recovery means that no grand opening in the Crenshaw business district goes unnoticed these days.

The newest storefront enterprise is drawing unusual attention, however. It is a Bush-Quayle reelection campaign headquarters in the middle of a black community that has long been considered one of the surest Democratic strongholds in Los Angeles.

"I skidded on my brakes the first time I saw the place. I couldn't believe it," said Dolores Spears, a union representative who lives nearby.

"The audacity to put that up in this neighborhood," said Phillip Barnett, a pest control company supervisor who works across the street from the new headquarters.

The campaign office is being run by 88-year-old Richard Jones. He opened it Sept. 26 after spending \$4,000 of his retirement savings on rent and supplies for the office.

GOP leaders say the presidential campaign headquarters is a first for Southwest Los Angeles.

"He's courageous," said Bill Fahey, chairman of the Los Angeles County Bush-Quayle campaign.

Lorelei Kinder, executive director of the state Republican Party, said: "I hope when I'm 88 I have the same courage of my convictions that he does."

Jones acknowledged that the President is unlikely to collect many votes in his neighborhood. Voter registration rolls for the county's 2nd Supervisorial District—which includes the Crenshaw district—list 474,435 Democrats and 88,811 Republicans.

"Most black people are Democrats," Jones said. "But I feel that in a country with two political parties, we should be part of both."

He said he was too young to vote when he first sampled politics as a precinct captain in Chicago 70 years ago.

As an adult, he was a campaign volunteer in Detroit, where he worked as an insurance company manager.

Jones moved to Los Angeles in 1956 after a blizzard blew him out of Michigan.

"I had snowed so hard that all the cars were covered," he said. "I went out to get my car and shoveled. Then I found out I'd dug out the wrong car. I said: 'I'm getting out of here.'"

In Los Angeles, he worked 12 years as an executive assistant to Mayor Sam Yorty. During that period, Jones helped open City Hall to minorities—including African-Americans who were appointed to city commissions, he said.

Jones draws stares when he wears his Bush-Quayle button or his "Reelect the President" hat on the half-hour bus ride from his home in the West Adams district to the campaign headquarters at 4710 Crenshaw Blvd.

He brushes off criticism from Bill Clinton supporters, who have several nearby campaign offices—including one at 4209 W. Washington Blvd.

"Things are bad on the street—things are tough, I admit that," Jones said. "But let's look at other things. Today we're not living under the threat of the atomic bomb. Nations that have never talked before are sitting down and talking and there's a chance for peace."

More important, he said, a show of black support for Republican candidates could mean that more attention will be paid black communities when Democrats are out of power.

Some in the Crenshaw district applaud the Bush-Quayle headquarters.

"I've heard a lot of comments about it being here. But I say: 'Hey, the Democrats are just as bad,'" said Zaid Tarig, who operates a bookshop on the boulevard.

"It's wonderful that office is here. A true two-party system needs African-Americans in both parties," said Steve Hamilton, a Republican political consultant working in the Crenshaw district on county supervisorial candidate Diane Watson's campaign.

Still, few residents have stopped in for Bush bumper stickers or for brochures that outline the Republican Administration position.

"I don't need to. I've lived it the past 12 years," shrugged one.

Plenty of outsiders have come to Jones' office, though. The reason: The office number is the only Bush-Quayle telephone listed for Los Angeles.

Republican Robert Durio, a customs officer from Playa del Rey, was happy to find the place.

"Good for you," he told Jones as he scooped up campaign materials.

Koreans, Japanese Un Against SB Loan Meas

Korean-American and Japanese community leaders have joined to fight a recently adopted federal law that could prevent hundreds of merchants from losing their businesses in the Los Angeles riots from using Small Business Administration disaster relief loans to rebuild their shops.

Korean-American leaders say the law passed in September to prevent the loss of businesses from economically distressed neighborhoods—is yet another blow to their battered community. It offered huge business losses and spring riots and now faces opposition to its plans to rebuild.

"My immediate, gut reaction was attorney Pio Kim said. "There has been a blow after another to the Korean community. Their businesses were built and now, even for [business owners] going to go back, people don't want to."

Sponsored by Rep. Neal Smith as an amendment to two federal disaster bills, the law prohibits the disaster relief loans to "relocate outside the business area in which disaster occurred." The law would keep businesses and their services and job opportunities in stricken areas, according to Smith. But the law could hurt more Los Angeles business owners: Korean-Americans—whose loans have not yet been approved—may want to relocate because they rented have not been able to afford to wait for the lengthy hearing process that the city is now seeking to rebuild liquor licenses.

Although the Smith amendment already been passed, local Asian leaders are seeking wording in the legislation—which are still being debated—which will exempt Los Angeles business owners.

The SBA neither requested the legislation, said Dan Eramian, spokesman. "We are reviewing congressional language and it does the need to be flexible. Our assurance there will be as little possible on the [Los Angeles] owners."

The law is not retroactive only to loan applications approved Oct. 7, Eramian said. There are 1,330 Los Angeles disaster applications still under review. The law continues to accept applications until the official deadline for riot-related applications was Sept. 15, Eramian said.

Although the Los Angeles riot has the impetus for its amendment, he does not believe Los Angeles business owners should be exempted from the law. "Los Angeles is no different from any other place," said Smith, who cited an unidentified West Valley whose only grocer wanted to flood devastated the small community.

"If you give subsidized loans and they leave . . . you can't rebuild the community."

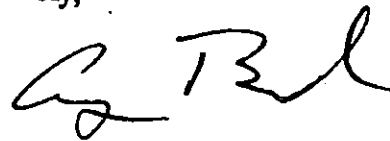

VII. BRIEFING POINTS

A. PROPOSED WETLANDS REGULATION

The rule was proposed on November 4; the public comment period closes on December 21. EPA has received over 1200 comments including numerous requests for an extension of the comment period. Comments thus far are running largely in opposition to the proposed rule, and include threats of litigation by groups within and outside Alaska.

- During the interagency review of this proposal, Interior, CEQ, USDA, and Commerce expressed serious concern and/or objections to issuance of the rule. Justice also recognized the significant risk that a final rule would likely be subject to an immediate legal challenge.

- EPA's Office of General Counsel has suggested that, unless the process to finalize the rule includes an opportunity to adequately consider and address public comments and satisfy Administrative Procedures Act procedural requirements, the final rule is unlikely to survive judicial review.

- This would include:

- satisfying normal internal agency review requirements,
- development of a response to all significant public comments,
- development of a factual record to support statements in the Preamble, and,
- final interagency review and OMB clearance.

EPA feels it will be very hard pressed to do all this by January 20, 1993.

B. ALASKA REGIONAL OFFICE

EPA opposes because:

- o The overhead needed to create a Regional Office for Alaska would not be cost effective.
- o While land mass is the key criterion for the establishment of a local office in some other Federal agencies, because EPA's authority relates primarily to pollution sources, the number of regulated entities is a more appropriate index. This number is relatively small in Alaska.
- o A Regional Office needs a multi-state perspective in order to adequately represent all interests-those of both the states and the nation. In fact, a number of other states believe they, too, deserve a single-state Region, as Alaska requests, with the prospect of additional diversion of EPA resources and enlarging the EPA bureaucracy.

C. EXPORT BAN ON OIL

You issued a Presidential finding and Commerce thereupon recently issued an export license for 25,000 BD of California heavy crude. Hickel feels you should do the same for Alaska crude. Justice disagrees and feels the law is different and more restrictive for Trans Alaska Pipeline crude oil. The matter is in court as Alaska has sued the federal government over the export ban.

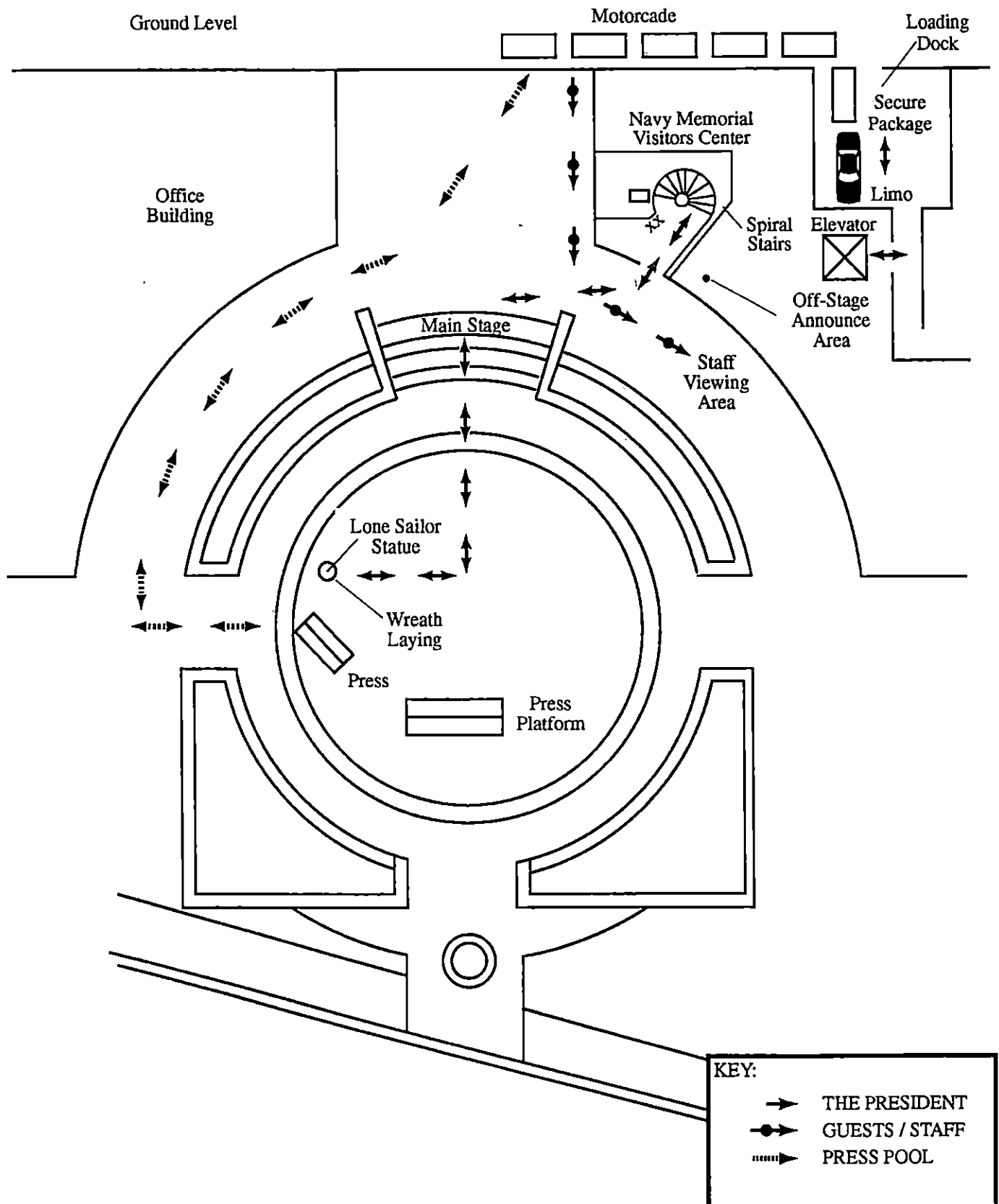

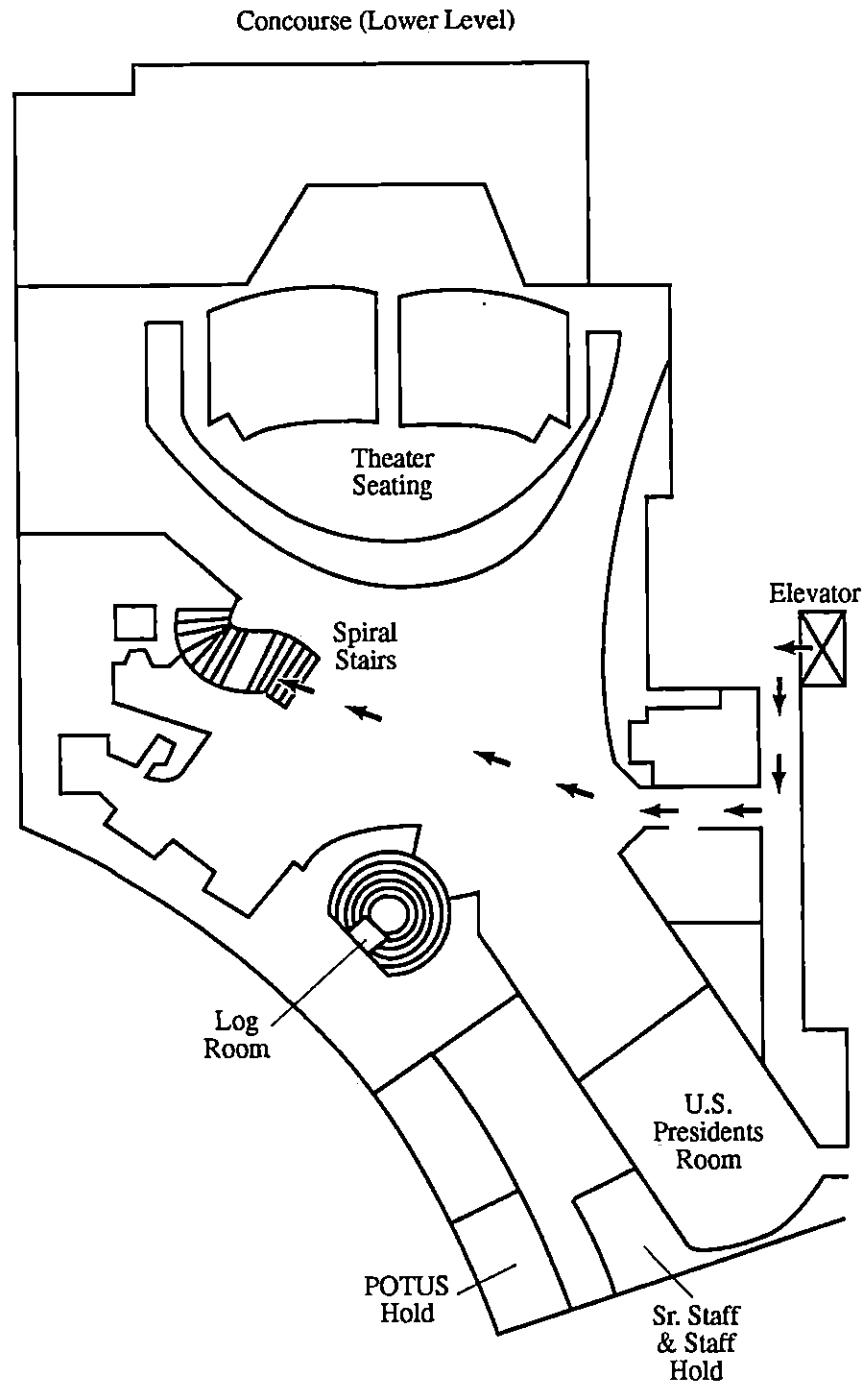

 Monday, December 7, 1992



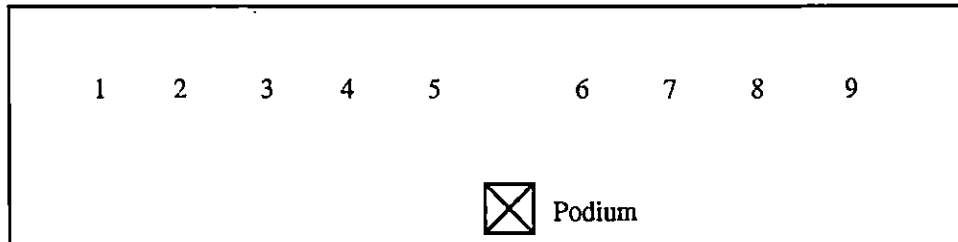

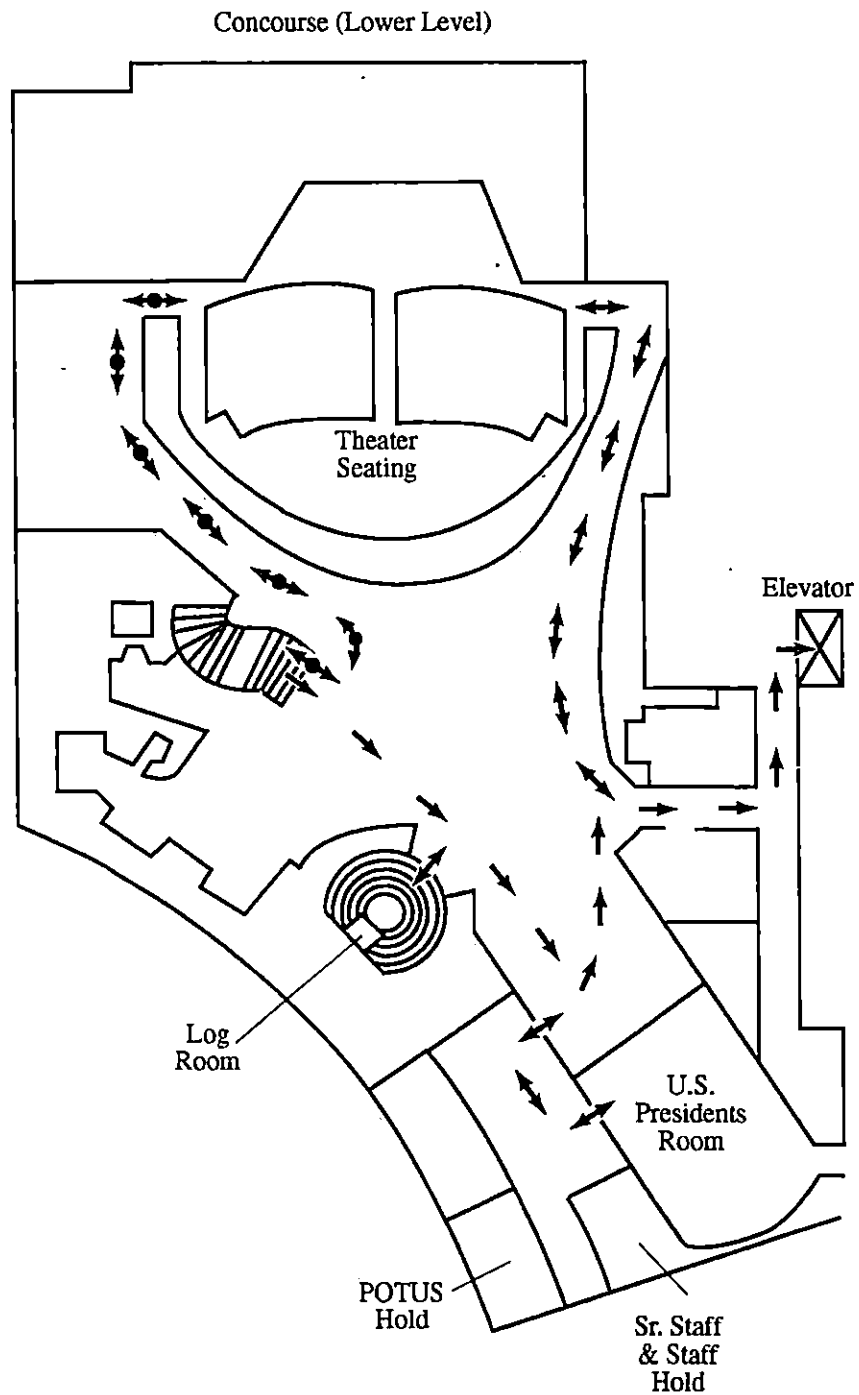

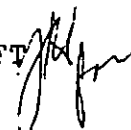
