'Forever Young' up to old tricks

The misnamed "Forever Young" answers the considerable clamor to see what Mel Gibson might look like, more or less, when approaching his 60s, 70s and 80s. "Old at Last" would be a far more accurate title.

This tenderhearted trifle also confirms that one precociously maudlin screenwriter, Jeffrey Abrams, has a remarkable faith in the restorative power of near-fatal accidents and comas.

Barely out of college, Mr. Abrams sold the inspirational whopper "Regarding Henry," which lured Harrison Ford into the simple-minded cautionary role of a cutthroat lawyer transformed into a harmless, passive family man by a bullet wound in the head. Now Mr. Abrams' "Forever Young" has attracted the appealing Mr. Gibson, who apparently couldn't resist a Good Guy pastiche of Rip Van Winkle, the Rocketeer and E.T.

Mel plays a time-warped romantic hero, Daniel McCormick, who is introduced in a B-25 as a crack test pilot, circa 1939. Daniel is plunged into a profound nose dive by the loss of his sweetheart, Helen (Isabel Glasser, who gets scant opportunity to enlarge on her attractive debut in "Pure Country").

Poor Helen, you see, is knocked into a strictly gratuitous coma by a mysteriously handy produce truck seconds after Daniel can't quite put his devotion to her in so many words.

A novel means of escaping grief presents itself: Daniel's scientist pal, Harry Finley (a typecast George Wendt), is about to make the first human test of his cryogenic deep freeze. Daniel volunteers himself for a year in the cooler.

What with one global distraction and another, the Army Air Corps and then the Air Force misplace the gadget for 53 years. It takes two boys, Nat and Felix (Elijah Wood and Robert Hy Gorman), to release the hero accidentally from half a century of repose when they mess around in an air base warehouse.

The "E.T." bits begin accumulating soon after Mr. Gibson makes his obligatory bare-bottom appearance as the resurrected Iceman, to

scattered applause.

Despite the flagrant derivations, the movie makes some amusing and sentimental headway once Daniel is out, hides in the boys' treehouse and seems to commence a shyly endearing courtship with little Nat's lonely single mom, Claire, a nurse played by Jamie Lee Curtis.

Director Steve Miner, who used to be associated with "The Wonder Years," recalls that show transparently in a subplot about Nat's infatuation with classmate Alice (Veronica Lauren). The time traveler, haunted by his failure to tell Helen everything that was in his heart, urges Nat to declare himself rather more rashly than circumstances merit in grade school circles.

The spectacle of the big guy and the little guy sharing courtship troubles has funnier possibilities than the filmmakers pursue. But Mr. Gibson has an ingratiating romantic-heroic flair that carries the scenario through Daniel's re-entry phase likably enough.

Then Mr. Abrams pushes the panic button down the stretch: The hero suffers wrenching pains that signal a galloping onset of the aging process. And reversing romantic directions, Mr. Abrams decides that Daniel's reunion with Helen would be more sensational than some sort of understanding with Claire.

Far from caring which sweetheart Daniel catches up with in a stolen B-25 bomber, you're too distracted by the virtuoso makeup and melodramatic desperation to take a rooting interest in his love life.

It's really more interesting to observe that, in the estimation of makeup artists Dick Smith and Greg Cannom, Mr. Gibson will start resembling Brian Keith in the next 20 years. Of course, now that the secret is out, what remains of the Gibson career in the years ahead?

Michelle Pfeiffer in a Tale of a 1960's Interracial Friendship

"Love Field," a gentle, involving film about interracial friendship, begins with a very broad stroke in the form of Lurene Hallett (Michelle Pfeiffer), a blond bombshell who feels a special psychic bond with Jacqueline Kennedy. The year is 1963, the President has just been assassinated and Lurene feels duty bound to take the bus from Dallas to Washington to attend the funeral. "What I want is to go to that rotunda and file past that caisson or cortege or whatever it is and pay my respects," Lurene says, savoring the important-sounding words that make her think she has a mission.

For Lurene, feeling closely involved in this national tragedy amounts to a kind of character trait. Defining herself visibly in terms of Mrs. Kennedy's appeal, she boards the bus wearing a homemade lavender suit in the Kennedy style and sporting a bouffant hairdo that happens to be platinum blond. "Love Field," which opens today at the New York Twin, takes its title from the Dallas airport where Lurene turns up early in the story, to catch a glimpse of the Presidential plane.

A character this flamboyant would risk sinking any film. But Ms. Pfeiffer, again demonstrating that she is as subtle and surprising as she is beautiful, plays Lurene with remarkable grace. Her only problem, if you could call it that, is looking like a cross between the young Mrs. Kennedy and the Marilyn Monroe of "The Misfits." It isn't easy to believe that a pastel vision like Ms. Pfeiffer's Lurene could pass through so many sticky Southern towns without causing more of a stir.

Lurene does get a rise out of Paul Cater (Dennis Haysbert), a fellow passenger on the bus, but she commands his attention for the wrong reasons. A quiet, serious black man traveling with a little girl (Stephanie McFadden), whom he introduces as Jonell, his daughter, Paul has little patience for the chatty Lurene, who insists on befriending him.

Lurene's sweetness is real, but her self-image includes a bit too much of

Lurene identifies with Jackie, but she looks a bit like Marilyn.

This modest film actually covers a lot of ground, touching on the racial and sexual attitudes of its time while also filling in the particulars of its characters' earlier lives. Lurene's unhappy marriage clearly has a lot to do with her eagerness to reinvent herself in such dramatic ways. Paul's constant watchfulness around white Southerners and his occasional angry outbursts at Lurene's unwitting gaucheness on the subject of race are also carefully drawn.

So are the limits placed on friendship between a black man and a white woman in rural Southern society. When Paul comforts Lurene by touching her arm, a white woman looks on disapprovingly. When Lurene is ostentatiously nice to Paul at a bus station, a black woman registers similar dismay. And when these two finally give in to temptation, there is a long pause before anything happens. The camera watches both Paul and Lurene think things over before they kiss.

As written by Don Roos (who also wrote "Single White Female"), "Love Field" brings remarkably few preconceptions to the telling of its understated story. The characters transcend stereotypes, but what really matters is the actors' ability to breathe these people to life. Mr. Haysbert is warm, sturdy and impressive in conveying Paul's mixture of exasperation and attraction to Lurene. Ms. Pfeiffer has a much showier role. Once again, she manages to be quietly spectacular, revealing the ways Lurene's inner desperation contributes to her outward gaiety. "I just kind of ran it together: don't know why!" she exclaims nervously, trying to explain how she got that name out

of her original Louise Irene.

"Love Field" is finally a shade too polite. It moves cautiously in developing its central relationship, perhaps as a reflection of the restrictive world in which the characters live. But the world is outstandingly well evoked through the series of quiet, desolate Southern settings through which Paul and Lurene pass.

At a remote farmhouse, an elderly white woman (Louise Latham) harbors these two once they become fugitives, and displays a grudging awareness that the world is changing. At in another small town, when Lurene tries to tell a black mechanic of President Kennedy's good deeds regarding racial equality, the man says: "Tall a look around, ma'am. Look like done much here?"

"Love Field" is rated PG-13 (Parents strongly cautioned). It includes brief violence, mild sexual suggestiveness and slight profanity.

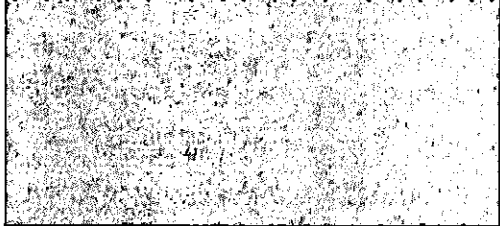

European Community

The European Community (EC) is comprised of three separate communities: the European Coal and Steel Community, established in 1951; the European Atomic Energy Community, and the European Economic Community, both established in 1957. Since 1978, the three have been referred to collectively as the EC. Currently there are 12 members: Belgium, Denmark, France, Germany, Greece, Ireland, Italy, Luxembourg, Netherlands, Portugal, Spain, and the United Kingdom.

A major goal of the Community is the completion by the end of 1992 of a true "single" or common market, with free movement of persons, goods, services, and capital. In December 1991, at Maastricht, Netherlands, EC members agreed to amendments of the EC treaties which would move the Community in the direction of greater economic, monetary, and political union, including more unified foreign and security policies. The Maastricht Treaty on European Union must be approved by all EC countries prior to implementation. Despite a national referendum in Denmark on June 2, 1992, rejecting the treaty, other EC members are proceeding with plans to ratify it. Denmark will hold a second referendum in the first half of 1993.

US-EC Relations

The United States and the Community maintain a continuing dialogue on political and economic issues of mutual interest, and engage in direct negotiations on trade and investment issues. The European Community is the United States' largest trading partner. Total US-EC trade was about \$190 billion in 1990 and 1991. In 1991, US imports from the EC were \$86 billion and represented 18% of total US imports. In

1991, US exports to the EC were \$103 billion and represented 24% of total US exports.

In 1991, the US trade surplus with the European Community rose to \$17 billion, up from \$6 billion in 1990. The United States and the Community are each other's most significant source of direct investment. By the end of 1991, the Community had more than \$230 billion invested in the United States, and the United States had about \$188 billion invested in the EC.

The United States continues to support the EC's plan to develop an integrated market by the end of 1992. It is in the interest of both sides that the program be implemented in an open fashion without new trade barriers. The United States holds regular meetings with the Community to discuss various aspects of the 1992 program and to resolve trade differences, many concerning agriculture. In its negotiations with the Community on trade and investment issues, the US Government works to ensure that American interests are not discriminated against in post-1992 Europe. The global reform of agricultural policies is an important US objective and a major goal of the current Uruguay Round of multilateral trade negotiations.

The United States long has discussed foreign and trade policy issues on an ad hoc basis with the Community. These arrangements were formalized by the Declaration on US-EC Relations of November 20, 1990, which institutionalized regular consultation and cooperation on political, economic, scientific, educational, and cultural matters. As agreed in the declaration, the US President meets twice annually with the head of state or government of the presidency country and the President of the EC Commission. The Secretary of State meets twice annually with the EC foreign ministers and as necessary with the foreign ministers of the "troika"

(the EC presidency country, its predecessor, and its successor). The Secretary also meets twice annually, along with cabinet colleagues, with the EC Commission. Discussions include a broad range of issues: maintenance of international peace and security in areas such as the Gulf, the Middle East, and Central America; the Uruguay Round and other international trade issues; support for the emerging democracies of Eurasia; and cooperation in science and technology.

EC Institutions and Presidency

Since July 1967, the three communities have functioned with common institutions. Major EC institutions are the Commission, the Council of Ministers, the European Parliament, and the Court of Justice. Member states agree to relinquish a degree of national sovereignty to EC institutions and to cooperate in the joint administration of these powers.

The 17-member Commission, appointed by common agreement of the 12 governments, has primary responsibility for initiating and implementing EC policy in areas that fall under EC treaties (for example, the internal market, external trade, and agricultural policy). The Council of Ministers, representing the member states, occupies the preeminent position in the current institutional power balance and decides on the Commission's proposals. The Parliament, the only EC institution that directly represents European citizens, has significant power over budgetary matters and can amend or reject certain legislation approved by the Council. The Court, which has a role similar to that of the US Supreme Court, is the final authority on the interpretation of EC treaties and laws.



Each member state serves as President of the Council for 6 months in rotation. The presidency country presides at all meetings of the member states and serves as spokesman in dealing with countries on intergovernmental matters, including efforts to coordinate the foreign policies of the member states. This foreign policy coordination process, known as European Political Cooperation, is one of seeking consensus for joint action by the 12 members on international political issues, such as the Gulf crisis and refugee aid, the Middle East peace process, South Africa, Central America, and the Conference on Security and Cooperation in Europe.

European Integration

The process of European integration was strengthened by the implementation in July 1987 of the Single European Act (SEA), which increased the scope of the Community's legislative and executive authority. The SEA endorsed the objective of economic and monetary union and outlined a series of directives necessary to eliminate all physical, technical, and fiscal barriers to completion of an internal "single" market by January 1, 1993. It also formalized procedures for cooperation in the area of foreign policy.

At the landmark Maastricht summit in December 1991, EC members approved additional proposals which, if ratified by national parliaments, will forge even closer economic, monetary, and political ties within the Community. The treaty calls for the EC to establish a European Central Bank and a single currency by the end of the decade, although all 12 member countries may not enter the new arrangements at once. The draft treaty also sets in motion a further acceleration of political integration, including elements of a common foreign and security policy, and cooperation in justice and domestic affairs.

The question of how fast to proceed with enlargement of the Community while strengthening EC institutions, (the "widening" versus "deepening" issue), continues to be a major topic for

discussion among member states. An intergovernmental conference is scheduled to be held in 1996 to evaluate the progress of economic and monetary integration and to consider greater coordination of foreign policy and security matters.

EC Economy

As a result of German unification in October 1990, the population of the EC is now roughly 345 million. By the end of 1991, it had a gross domestic product (GDP) of about \$6.2 trillion and an average per capita GDP of \$18,000. An important aspect of the EC's economy is its Common Agricultural Policy, a complicated system of price supports, subsidies, and protection to European farmers that consumes more than half of the EC budget. EC member states agreed to an important reform of that policy in May 1992.

The EC is the largest trading entity in the world. In 1991, EC member country exports were almost \$1.4 trillion, or about 40% of total world exports, while EC exports to non-EC countries were \$525 billion, or 15% of world exports. Exports within the EC were \$853 billion. Germany is the largest exporter in the EC.

Relations With Other Countries

In April 1992, the EC and the seven-member European Free Trade Association signed an agreement to broaden their existing free trade agreement and create a European Economic Area (EEA). The EEA establishes free movement of goods, services, capital, and labor throughout the combined territory. In a December 1992 referendum, Switzerland rejected participation in the EEA.

EC countries have long-standing political and economic ties with the new independent states of Eurasia. The Community has provided significant economic assistance to the emerging democracies and has eased access to its markets for them. A new type of "European agreement" has been created, which consists of industrial, technical, and scientific cooperation, financial assistance, and political

dialogue. In December 1991, association agreements were signed between the EC and Czechoslovakia, Hungary, and Poland. Talks currently are underway with Bulgaria and Romania. In 1989, the EC Commission began coordinating aid from the 24 countries (including the US) of the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development to Central and Eastern Europe. The objective is to strengthen the process of political and economic reform, with emphasis on improving the private sector. The European Bank for Reconstruction and Development (in which the United States is an active member) was established in 1990 to support investment and the development of market economies in these countries.

In January 1992, the Community announced that it would seek to negotiate new agreements with the former Soviet republics to replace the 1989 trade and cooperation agreement signed by the EC and the Soviet Union. In May 1992, the EC signed cooperation agreements with Albania, Estonia, Latvia, and Lithuania.

The Community has placed priority on improving relations with developing countries. The Lome Convention provides a framework for EC development cooperation with 69 African, Caribbean, and Pacific (ACP) countries. In 1989, a new 10-year agreement was signed with the ACP states to provide aid to development projects, free access to EC markets for almost all manufactured imports from those countries, and incentives to promote European investment.

The Community is linked with a number of countries in the Mediterranean by either association or preferential trade agreements which provide duty-free access for industrial products and direct grants and loans. EC economic ties to Asia and Latin America usually take the form of bilateral agreements which allow preferential access and certain types of development aid.

Austria, Cyprus, Finland, Malta, Norway, Sweden, Switzerland, and Turkey have applied for membership in the EC. ■



Ambassador James F. Dobbins
U.S. Representative to the European Community

Ambassador Dobbins arrived in Brussels on October 16, 1991, to assume his current responsibilities.

Ambassador Dobbins previously served, from August 1987, as Principal Deputy Assistant Secretary of State for European and Canadian Affairs, and from March to August 1991 as Acting Assistant Secretary. Ambassador Dobbins's previous postings include service as Deputy Chief of Mission of the U.S. Embassy in Bonn (1985-89), Political-Military Officer in London (1977-80), Political Officer in Paris (1968-69), and Consul in Strasbourg (1971-73). Previous domestic assignments included several postings with the European and the Political/Military Bureaus of the Department of State, and with the U.S. Mission to the United Nations in New York (1973-75).

Ambassador Dobbins graduated from the Georgetown University School of Foreign Service in 1963. He was born May 31, 1942, in New York, New York. He served in the United States Navy, 1963-67, and joined the Foreign Service in 1967. He is married to Toril Kleivdal Dobbins and has two sons.

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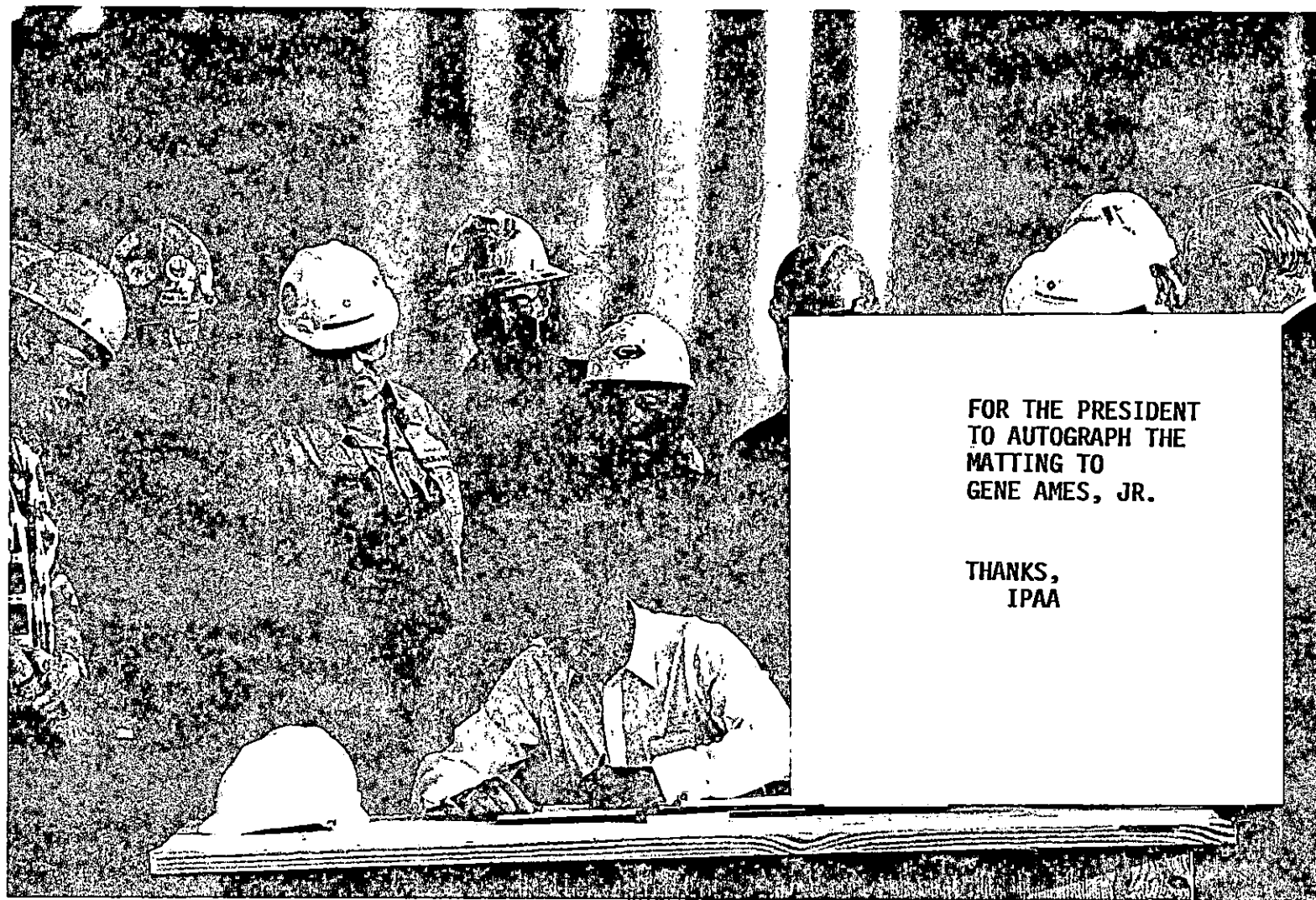

SUBJECT: Authority for Assistance to Refugees, Displaced Persons and Conflict Victims from and within the former Yugoslavia

This memorandum recommends that you designate refugees, displaced persons and victims of conflict from and within the former Yugoslavia as eligible for assistance provided bilaterally or through private voluntary organizations under section 2(b)(2) of the Migration and Refugee Assistance Act of 1962, as amended. A determination in 1962 designating Yugoslav refugees has become outdated, and we seek a new designation which relates to the current situation.

We currently are authorized to provide assistance to Yugoslav refugees, displaced persons and migrants through international organizations. In order to ensure maximum U.S. Government flexibility and response capability, we may need to extend our efforts to include bilateral assistance and direct contributions to private voluntary organizations. This can only be done if you determine that assistance to refugees, displaced persons and victims of conflict from and within the former Yugoslavia will contribute to the foreign policy interests of the United States, and designate such individuals as eligible for direct assistance.

SINCE THE MORNING PAPERS:

- o US Central Command in Mogadishu is pleased with the progress of Operation Restore Hope. Gen. Joseph Hoar, Commander-in-Chief of Central Command, held a news conference today in the Somalian capital, and said he is satisfied with the way the operation is going up to this point. Gen. Hoar also said there has been a significant increase in offers of troop support from other countries, including an additional 10,000 combat troops. This could lead to a reduction in the number of US troops in Somalia, with some troops coming home earlier than expected, and an increased support role played by US forces. Finally, Hoar announced there will be some disarmaments of Somali gunmen who have been involved in scattered firings on coalition forces.
- o The UN will vote today on whether to call on Israel to rescind its deportation of 400 Palestinians from the occupied territories yesterday. Momentum appears to be with those in favor of rescinding the deportation, and sources say the US is expected to vote with that side.
- o The upper house of Germany's parliament today ratified the Maastricht Treaty, following the lower house's passing of the treaty.
- o South Korean Democratic Liberal Party candidate Kim Young Sam is leading in his country's presidential elections, held today, reports South Korean television. The South Korean embassy in Washington confirms Kim, the majority party candidate, leading with just over 40 percent. He is followed by Democratic Party candidate Dae Joong Kim, with just over 34 percent. The winner will be the first civilian president in South Korea since 1961.
- o Financial news as of 12:15 AM EST:
 - DOW (30 Industrials): Up 19 points to 3288 on a volume of 197 million shares.

IN THE WHITE HOUSE AND AROUND TOWN:

- o While Boris Yeltsin is saying that Russia and the U.S. have agreed on a second Strategic Arms Reduction Treaty, to be signed in January, White House spokesman Marlin Fitzwater is saying nothing was definite. It wasn't clear if Yeltsin's move was a tactic to increase pressure on the U.S., or perhaps an attempt to counter any impression Russia is drawing closer to China than to the West.

Russian Foreign Ministry spokesman Sergei Yastrzhembsky told the AP that Russia was proposing a summit in the U.S. at the beginning of 1993. Yeltsin said the summit was tentatively scheduled to be held in Alaska. Yeltsin made the announcement at a meeting of Chinese intellectuals today just before he signed a series of treaties and agreements with China. "I can tell you now that a START II agreement has been prepared for a two-thirds cut in strategic nuclear weapons," said Yeltsin. Fitzwater said an accord hadn't been reached, however. "We're getting closer. We're hopeful. But that's the best we can say," Fitzwater said after meeting with President Bush in the Oval Office.

- o **GATT's Uruguay Round is dead, for now anyway**, report Bush Administration officials involved in trade issues. The talks have suffered a serious setback, with Europeans said to be charging that the US tried to make a number of last-minute changes to the Dunkel text concerning services and intellectual property. US negotiators, however, are claiming they made it clear all along that the US wanted additional changes in the Dunkel text on these matters and that the US was willing to be flexible on these issues had the Europeans shown any interest in negotiating. US trade negotiators are said to have given up hope of achieving an agreement soon, and are now "trickling home." According to one US official: "It is a setback, but the Round isn't dead, it just means it will be another year or two before it is taken up again." The official added: "What we have achieved to this point in the Dunkel text and in the other agreements that have been struck will serve as the starting point for the negotiations whenever they start up again." According to the official: "The Round came about because the fundamental economic interests involved dictated that we resolve these issues. That does not just disappear. So it is just a matter of timing. It is inevitable that the reforms that were sought will come about some day, because they are too basic and fundamental to sound economic growth to be ignored." As for prospects during the Clinton Administration of seeing a GATT agreement, the official thought it would be a difficult chore, saying: "The Congress will put more caveats on in the environmental and labor areas, and it will take the Clinton team a period of time to get up to speed on the changes they want to make in the US's positions. Then someone has to put the proper motivation into the EC."
- o **As has been anticipated for some time, it is expected that President-Elect Clinton will soon name Rep. Les Aspin as his Secretary of Defense**, according to transition and congressional sources. Aspin is headed to Little Rock for discussions with Clinton today, although it does not appear Clinton will announce any new Cabinet Members until at least tomorrow. Reportedly, Clinton has also decided to offer Rep. Dave McCurdy the position of Director of Central Intelligence. McCurdy, chairman of the House Intelligence Committee, has said in the past he wasn't interested in heading the CIA, however.
- o **The political dimension of breaking the budget into past, present, and future outlays will be formidable**, according to Democratic sources familiar with the budget process, but Clinton advisors say it will be worth the effort, which candidate Clinton supported. One former Democratic budget official told the Bulletin that breaking the budget into a past obligations account, a consumption account, and an investment account, as some of Clinton's advisors are urging, may have the principal effect of flooding Capitol Hill with special-interest lobbyists attempting to portray the activities of their clients as "investments" and "future oriented" rather than "consumption-oriented" or "present spending." Asked whether the introduction of past, present, and future categories will result more in an actual change in behavior or an exercise in political semantics, Clinton economic advisor Rob Shapiro told the Bulletin: "Of course, you must expect the second, but you will also get some of the first," adding that changing the terms of the debate is one of the first orders of business. If the budget process is to be reformed in this way, Shapiro explains, the budget players will "have to exercise real discipline in maintaining the budget categories." Shapiro also notes that the past and present budget categories ought not be stigmatized: "If something is classified as part of the 'present' or 'consumption' budget, that is not to say that it is an illegitimate or unworthy Federal activity. The difference between the present and the future budget lies in their means of financing and their permitted rate of growth."

A former budget official told the Bulletin: "The idea [of categorizing the budget] sounds appealing to

me on policy grounds, but I fear it may be very appealing to some in Congress for less noble reasons. It will be a very tempting exception to otherwise rigid budget disciplines." Shapiro explains that "success will depend in part on the clarity with which these categories are defined. The future budget must include only those areas of spending which generate direct streams of economic returns for the economy or for the government." (For more on the possibilities for budget reform, please see the interview with Shapiro in the MANDATE FOR CHANGE section below.)

- o **US District Court Judge Gerherd Gesell has temporarily blocked a Bush Administration attempt to stop setting volume limits on the sale of oranges and lemons from California and Arizona.** USDA has responded to Gesell's order by saying it plans to set a limit on the sale of oranges today, and for lemons on December 20. Growers of oranges and lemons requested the temporary restraining order yesterday, saying Agriculture Secretary Madigan had violated the Agricultural Marketing Agreement Act of 1937 "by basing his decision upon pressure from the White House" and "failing to offer a reasoned explanation for his sudden change in policy." According to the growers, Madigan violated the Administrative Procedures Act by terminating volume restrictions without proper public notice to Congress or considering comments from the industry and the public. According to a declaration filed by William Quarles, a Vice President of Sunkist, Madigan "told me at a meeting in his office on November 20, 1992, that he was waiting for instructions from Robert Zoellick, Deputy Chief of Staff in the White House, as to how he should decide on issues related to the navel orange marketing order between the time he received his instructions and January 20, 1993." Quarles added: "Madigan personally told me subsequently that he was being directed by deregulators in the White House to suspend volume regulation on navel oranges."
- o **With a number of his Cabinet picks selected and announced, President-Elect Clinton is said to be under ever increasing pressure from leaders of Democratic constituency groups wishing to see one of their own selected for the few remaining slots,** report Clinton transition officials. According to these Clinton advisors, those in Little Rock are experiencing a more shrill advocacy from special interest group leaders wishing to see at least one of the remaining Cabinet choices come from their ranks. The officials say that leaders representing women's groups, Hispanics, blacks and various geographical regions are indicating strong concerns with the Clinton team that they do not feel that the Clinton Cabinet reflects the nation as they see it. "To make everybody happy, we would need to fill 50 Cabinet posts," said one Democrat involved in the transition process. "Unfortunately, we can't do that, so we are anticipating some dissatisfied customers come the first of the year." According to another Clinton transition official: "We are having various groups trotting in and out of here explaining how it is absolutely essential that [Clinton] select so-and-so. With fewer slots left, some of these people are beginning to panic and the pressure they are applying has gotten a little out of hand."
- o **While many reports in the popular press indicate Rep. Mike Espy is in line to be Clinton's Agriculture Secretary, insiders report there is still pressure to pick somebody else.** According to these Democratic insiders, Espy's prospects have dimmed somewhat in the last week or so, although he still remains a top contender and possibly remains the front-runner. Washington attorney Ruth Harkin is being pushed by women's groups and is also said to be on Clinton's short list. Also said to be under consideration for the post, although possibly at a tier lower, are Representatives Kika de la Garza (D-Texas) and Dan Glickman (D-Kansas), and Carl Whillock, the President of the Arkansas Electric Cooperative and a friend of Bill Clinton's. According to insiders, however, Whillock is a more likely choice for Deputy Secretary. Sources report the agricultural community is concerned with the "dominance" of environmentalists involved in the Clinton-Gore transition effort, and are extremely interested in seeing a person with considerable commodity experience as the next Agriculture Secretary. According to one source, considering the overall politics of this choice, agricultural lobbying efforts are "much stronger" than those of the women's groups, which may diminish Harkin's prospects.

- o **Keith Mason, chief of staff to Georgia Governor Zell Miller, will apparently move north to accept a key White House post,** report insiders. Precisely what Mason will be doing is unclear, but most expect him to land in the White House's intergovernmental affairs shop.
- o **Sources say House Speaker Tom Foley has been told by the Clinton transition team that, as many expected, the President-Elect intends to name Howard Paster** to head the White House legislative affairs shop. Some interpreted this signal to Foley as the last chance for the Speaker, and other Democratic leaders on the Hill, to express any objection to Paster's selection.
- o **It appears those in the Vice President's Office are practicing what they preach when it comes to family values.** John Howard, Counsel to the Vice President, is the proud father of three new children. This week, Howard's wife delivered triplets.

POLL WATCH:

- o **According to an NBC News/Wall Street Journal poll of 1,004 respondents conducted December 12-15:**
 - Clinton's favorable/unfavorable rating is 60 percent/19 percent.
 - Bush's favorable/unfavorable rating is 46 percent/34 percent.
 - President Bush's job approval/disapproval rating is 49 percent/43 percent.
 - 25 percent approve of Bush's handling of the economy, while 69 percent do not.
 - 71 percent approve of Bush's handling of foreign policy, while 22 percent do not.
 - 45 percent of Americans say the country is headed in the right direction, while 32 percent say it is on the wrong track.

MANDATE FOR CHANGE -- ENTERPRISE ECONOMICS:

This morning, the Bulletin invites **Robert Shapiro**, Vice President of the Progressive Policy Institute (PPI), where he directs economic studies, to discuss "Enterprise Economics and the Federal Budget," which he contributed to PPI's new book Mandate for Change. PPI is affiliated with the Democratic Leadership Conference, a centrist Democratic organization in which Bill Clinton has served as Chairman. Shapiro also serves as an economic advisor to President-Elect Clinton.

BULLETIN: What is "enterprise economics?"

SHAPIRO: Enterprise economics is a strategy for rebuilding the American economy's potential for higher growth and productivity. This strategy arises from two sources. First, a critique of the prevailing strategies -- the liberal strategies of the 1970s and the conservative strategy of the 1980s. Second, a hard look at the conditions for economic policy and economic activity within a global economy. In essence, enterprise economics bring to bear the facts of that hard look on the conventional models of liberal and conservative economic policy.

For economic policy in general, enterprise economics says that the government's role is to provide the opportunities, and in some cases the means, for average workers and average firms to become more productive. The first principle of the agenda, therefore, is public investment.

In order to provide those opportunities for firms and workers, we have to invest both publicly and privately in the nation's common economic resources -- those resources which are common to all economic activity. These include the education and skills of workers, research and development into new technologies, our communications and transportation infrastructures, the capacity of entrepreneurs to create new businesses, and the equipment at the disposal of workers and firms.

The second fundamental principle is to enhance competition and liberate markets, within which people and firms can be more productive. This goal requires that we re-evaluate all of the trade protections, economic regulatory insulations, tax and spending subsidies for particular interests. Special interest politics is inconsistent with market economics.

We want to empower people and firms within free markets. Genuine economic opportunity for both workers and firms isn't possible *without* free markets. At the same time, in a global economy, markets cannot operate efficiently unless workers and firms have access to the means to be more productive. Liberal and conservative economics each has it only half right. And because each is only half right, their prescriptions divert into unproductive directions -- the conservatives into tax breaks for wealthy people, and many liberals into micro-managing business decisions and allocating business resources across sectors.

BULLETIN: What are your recommendations of furthering these ends through the Federal budget?

SHAPIRO: The government must respect the needs of the economy for investment in the resources that make firms and workers more productive. It must also respect the needs of the private economy to operate without distortive direction from government and to have access to the resources that the private economy generates for itself to maintain its own level of growth and productivity.

That necessitates what I call "progressive fiscal restraint," which restricts the share of the private economy claimed by government in order to support consumption -- either its own or that of other groups. It also requires reinvigorated and expanded investment in the nation's common economic resources. And both require serious procedural and substantive reforms.

The basic principles of the procedural reforms are a budget divided into a past obligations account, a consumption account, and an investment account -- or past, present, and future using the President-Elect's terms. We should restrain the growth of non-investment spending so it grows more slowly than the economy. We need a commitment to finance in the present all non-investment spending -- to balance the non-future budget, except during recessions. We need enhanced procedures for the rigorous evaluation of current spending and tax programs through sunset provisions on spending programs or on tax expenditures. And we need the provision of the line-item veto for the President to enforce those decisions.

We need substantive reforms to achieve the goals laid out in the structural reforms. We need to reform entitlements, defense spending, the administration of government, and the provision of subsidies for special interests. And at all times, as we make policy, we need to remember that the purpose of the Federal budget is not to achieve bookkeeping balance. Nor is its purpose to please any particular group. Rather, the purpose of the budget is to be an instrument of economic growth and opportunity.

In order for the budget to be an instrument of economic growth and opportunity, it must channel the nation's public resources, and through it, private resources, to investment in wealth-creating activity for all firms and workers, while pursuing fiscal discipline. So we have to control the growth of spending while strengthening public and private investment in the resources that promote a more productive private economy.

BULLETIN: So you are talking about a conceptual reordering that will point the President's budget team and lawmakers in the proper direction?

SHAPIRO: Yes. There are three levels. There is the conceptual level, which is driven by economic analysis. There is a structural level, which is driven by both economic and political analysis of the way government operates. And then there is a substantive level, in which we try to give specificity to how the structural reforms could be carried out in order to achieve the ends identified by the conceptual analysis.

BULLETIN: You mentioned keeping consumption spending under control. How do you do that in the face of the demographics of the aging baby boomers?

SHAPIRO: The problem of the aging baby boom is still quite far off. The baby boom doesn't begin retiring for 20 years. We will face significant problems at that time, and we need to begin to address them today; but the demographics actually help us right now.

In the short run, when we focus on Medicare and Medicaid spending, which are the most serious substantive budget issues we face, we are helped by the fact that the largest single group in the population -- the baby boom generation -- has entered its peak earning years.

In fact, baby boomers' rising earnings mean that the health care budget problem is not driven today by baby-boomer demographics. The base for paying for current health expenditures is growing faster than the demographic base that is consuming the expenditures. Rather, the problem in health care spending today arises from the runaway inflation in the health care sector, and this should be the central focus of health care reform.
