National Commission on America's Urban Families
Summary of Recommendations

1. **Strengthen the family.**

- Decrease the tax burden on families by providing a child tax credit for all children (which would be larger during the year of birth or adoption) and by increasing the differential between the standard deduction for single earners and married couples.
- Redesign the welfare system to provide incentives for employment, responsible fatherhood and marriage, including limiting receipt of AFDC benefits to two years and requiring work of all AFDC recipients, including public employment if necessary.
- Increase the number of married couples in public housing.
- Increase parental authority in education.

2. **Strengthen marriage.**

- Promote premarital counseling and marital enrichment.
- Reform state laws on marriage and divorce to encourage preservation of the marriage and put children first.
- Discourage pregnancies for unmarried couples.

3. **Strengthen the relationship between parents and their children.**

- Change workplace policies to increase parental time with children.
- Foster parenting skills by incorporating parenting education into school curricula and increasing public and private funding for effective parent education programs.
- Identify the parents of every child born in the United States by ensuring that the birth certificate identifies both parents.
- Strengthen the enforcement of child support orders.

4. **Build community support for families.**

- Make neighborhoods safe for children and families, including expanding community policing programs and developing effective mentoring programs, especially involving male role models.
- Build grassroots, family-centered programs that involve local leadership, mandate parental involvement, strengthen rather than replace the parent-child relationship, reinforce values, and build relationships between children and their non-custodial parents.

5. **Change the nation's culture to give families priority.**

- Change television content to support families, including creating national or regional private sector commissions to rate the acceptability of television programs for families.
- Establish a President's Advisory Council on Strengthening Families to review progress on reversing the trend of family fragmentation and create a national clearinghouse for information on effective community programs.
- Create a White House "Families First" Award to honor persons, organizations and programs that exemplify a commitment to family well-being.
- Create a Family Strength Index to measure family well-being, composed of the mean of the percent of adults married, first marriages intact, percent of births to married parents, children living with their two-married parents, and children living with two married parents.

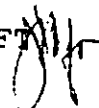

To meet and have a photo opportunity with three American family members of the victims of the KAL 007 tragedy.

II. BACKGROUND

At their request, you will meet three of the principal organizers of the group of American family members of the KAL 007 victims. The group leader is Mr. Hans Ephraimson-Abt, a Jewish survivor of the Holocaust, who lost his young adult daughter on the KAL flight.

This will be a brief, five-minute photo opportunity and short discussion. They would like to thank you personally for your efforts during the past two years to convince Presidents Gorbachev and Yeltsin to apologize for the shootdown, and to negotiate compensation for the family members, as well as provide information on the remains and personal effects of the victims. In their view, the USG did little to resolve these issues until your Presidency--they have publicly given you the great share of the credit for our recent advances with the Russians.

As you know, our efforts paid off this past October when Yeltsin met this group, apologized for the incident, and promised to work with them to satisfy all of their remaining concerns. Since then, the Russians have turned over the KAL black boxes to the ICAO for independent review--Yeltsin mentioned to you in Moscow that he favored this approach as the best way to close out this sad chapter from the Cold War. We are working closely with the families to set up another meeting with the Russians in February to pursue all of the remaining issues.

- WE WILL ASSURE THAT THE NEW ADMINISTRATION IS AWARE OF OUR EFFORTS. I AM SURE THEY WILL CONTINUE TO BE SUPPORTIVE OF YOUR CONCERNS.

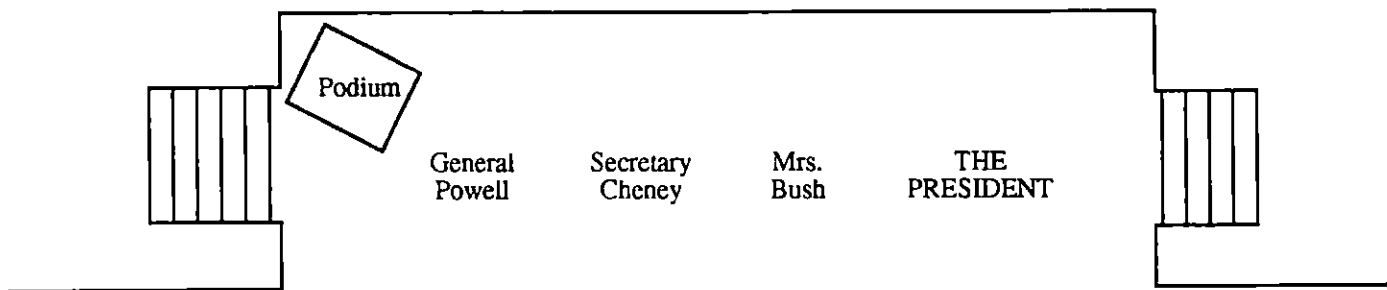

Last act, last scene

As 12 years of Republican control of the White House came to a symbolic and tearful end, President Bush and former President Reagan yesterday predicted a GOP comeback if not another "revolution."

In the East Room, where Mr. Reagan bid farewell to Washington four years ago, Mr. Bush drew the curtain on his presidency and what has been called the Reagan revolution by presenting "the Gipper" with the Medal of Freedom and posing for a final picture with his mentor.

In the morning event witnessed by glitterati from both administrations, Mr. Bush recalled Mr. Reagan's famous 1940 movie line to "win one for the Gipper," but the ceremony seven days before his departure from office was another reminder that the Bush-Quayle reelection campaign fell far short of that goal.

In any case, the two men did not dwell on the past.

Mr. Reagan might have put it best: "Some may try and tell us that this is the end of an era, but what they overlook is that in America every day is a new beginning and every sunset is merely the latest milestone for a voyage that never

ends. . . . Our work is not yet done. A great cause remains, because the task of the peacemaker is never complete."

That statement was underscored just two hours later when U.S. warplanes swept into Iraq to deliver a blow to President Saddam Hussein, who over the past week repeatedly violated United Nations resolutions.

But no stress from the latest military mission or the hammering of workers on President-elect Bill Clinton's inaugural parade reviewing

stand outside the White House showed on Mr. Bush's face as he wrapped up 10 weeks of farewell speeches, final photographs and medal giving.

Accompanied by their wives, the two presidents arrived in the East Room together. Mrs. Bush wore a plum-colored woolen suit and her trademark faux pearls while a rail-thin Mrs. Reagan wore a dress of brilliant red.

Mr. Bush declared, "We honor the American life of an American original."

In a testimonial to the two-term president, Mr. Bush said Mr. Reagan made it possible for Americans to "believe in themselves."

"And I remember Inauguration Day in 1981 and how the clouds — maybe you remember it, a gloomy morning — gave way as he began his speech. He turned that winter of discontent into a springtime of possibility," Mr. Bush said.

Michael Reagan, Mr. Reagan's son, who sat with his father in the front row, sobbed as Mr. Bush spoke. Others were teary-eyed. Among the 100 people at the event were Reagan associates Pat Buchanan and Ed Rollins — both rivals of Mr. Bush.

"None was more a prophet in his time," Mr. Bush said before draping the highest civilian medal around the neck of the 40th president.

Visibly moved, Mr. Reagan took the podium, speaking quietly but in the same voice that was magic to Republican ears for most of the 1980s.

"From time to time I have been called 'the Great Communicator,' but I'll tell you, it's no easy thing to communicate what I feel right now," he said.

His first words were for his student and colleague. "George, I join your countrymen in conveying our deepest thanks for all you have done for America."

There was no mention of Mr. Bush's defeat to Mr. Clinton. And no one spoke of the recent TV Guide story — denied by Mr. Reagan — that the former president voted for Mr. Clinton.

Mr. Reagan started with a joke, something rare in the White House recently: "This year marks the 200th anniversary of the laying of the cornerstone of the White House. By the way, my back is still killing me."

Then, Mr. Reagan spoke of his efforts to defeat communism, sign nuclear arms treaties and expand democracy around the world.

He was the 302nd recipient of the nation's highest civilian honor, the 38th of Mr. Bush's tenure. "It was very symbolic," a White House official said of the last meeting of the two men in the White House.

Citizen Bush plans a last day far from the media crowd

WASHINGTON - President Bush will leave his office and fly home to Houston on Jan. 20 without the usual pool of reporters accompanying him on Air Force One.

X Bush's press secretary, Martin Fitzwater, said the president and Barbara Bush will be joined by several members of his immediate family plus a few other selected staffers and friends.

On Inauguration Day, Bush will ride from the White House to the US Capitol with President-elect Bill Clinton, as is traditional in a change of administrations.

After Clinton takes the oath

of office and delivers his inaugural address, private citizen Bush will depart for Andrews Air Force Base and the 2½-hour flight to Houston.

Normally, a departing president takes a pool of reporters with him.

However, Bush told Fitzwater he did not want them on this last trip.

After the election, Bush and several members of his family were known to be bitter about press coverage of the campaign, asserting favoritism toward Clinton.

Even if Barbara Bush hadn't been leaving the White House, her signature three-strand choker of faux pearls would have lost its cachet.

Kenneth Jay Lane, whose designs she is known to favor, says "nobody's going to stop wearing pearls simply because Barbara Bush is no longer first lady." But he concedes that the choker is on the wane.

"The newest thing in pearls," he says, "is the very long length — even to the waist or below."

"Barbara Bush was a great ambassador for pearls," says fashion jewelry designer Jay Strongwater, noting the bold statement they made. "But now, the No. 1 fashion trend is necklaces that are long."

Both Mr. Lane and Mr. Strongwater credit the long, lean look in fashion with reviving the flapper-length strands.

"With all those long sweaters over leggings that so many people are wearing," Mr. Lane says, "... you can't have a dinky little thing at the neck."

Mr. Strongwater says longer necklaces are needed to balance the proportions.

"You're not going to wear a short necklace that leaves a tremendous amount of blank space between your neck and hem," he says. "In other words, you have a larger canvas to work with."

He recommends ropes up to 60 inches long.

"That might seem very long, but you have to remember you can double and triple it, so it gives you so many more options," he says. "More and more people are buying the longer lengths because of all the things they can do with them."

Layering is a key concept at Carolee, another popular purveyor of fashion jewelry.

"Pearls are definitely longer and worn in multiples," says owner Carolee Friedlander. "It's most stylish to wear three or four necklaces of varying lengths, from 32 to 60 inches."

"The idea of layering with longer strands is a trend that's predicated on change," she says. "So much of what we've been showing is jewelry that's high at the neck, so this is something new."

With the longer lengths come smaller beads.

"Everything is scaled down and feminized," says Linda Borella, vice president and fashion director at Monet in New York. "It's a more understated, delicate look."

Beth Miller, fashion coordinator at Napier, agrees. "The trend is less bold, and the scale of the pearl has come down, so it's not this overwhelming size anymore. It's a look that people associate more with real pearl jewelry."

As for color, Napier is mixing natural-color pearls with gold-tone accents, particularly filigree.

Mr. Strongwater opts for pearls the color of cream. "While white can be a little harsh against the face," he says, "a beautiful cream is more flattering."

At Carolee, the most popular hues are gold and subdued shades of pink and peach.

"Jewelry is so close to your face that it functions almost like cosmetics," Ms. Friedlander says.

Gold, she says, is particularly suited for darker skin, while pink and peach are more flattering for fair complexions.

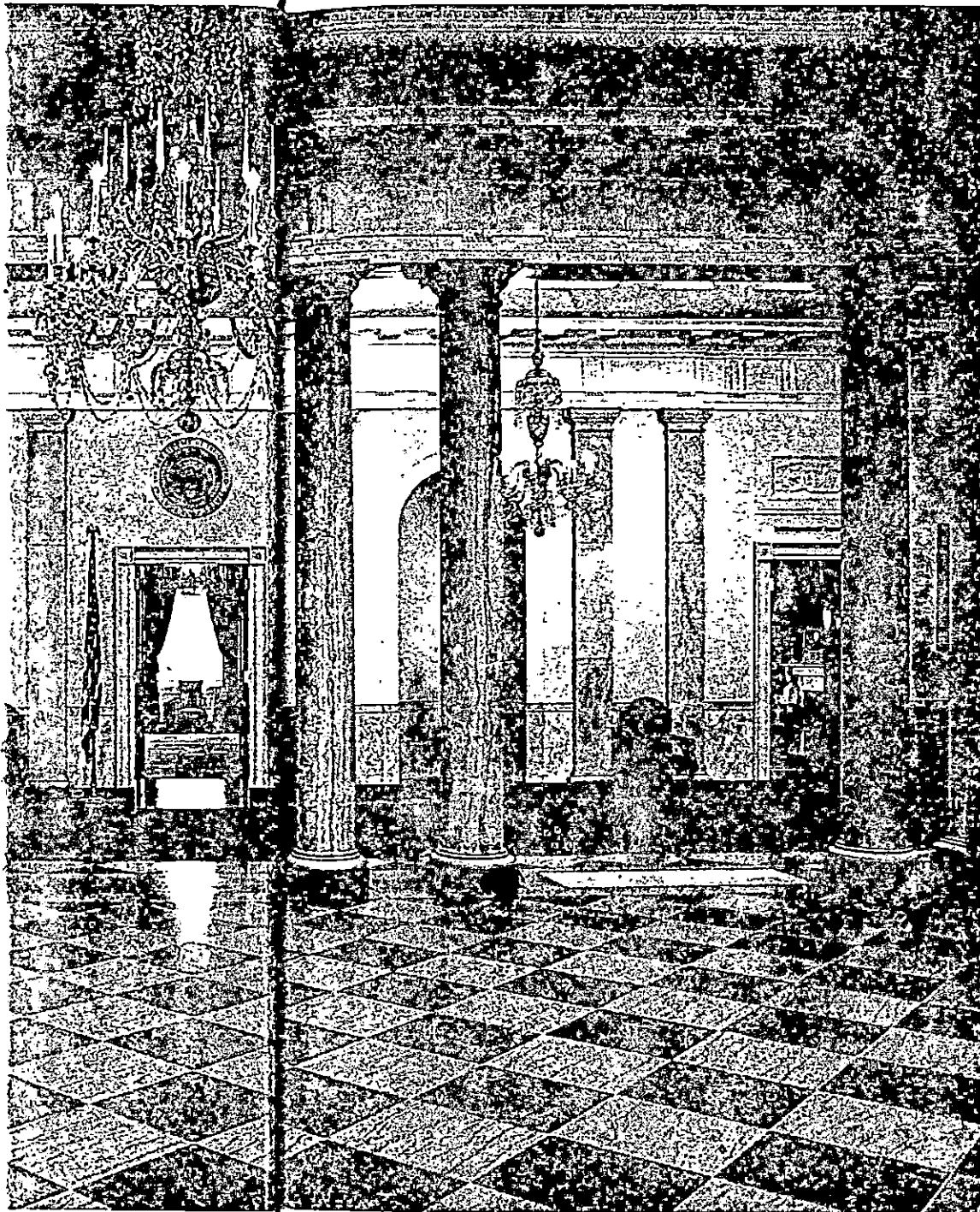
"Pick the right color," she says, "and it can really give a glow that enhances your natural beauty."

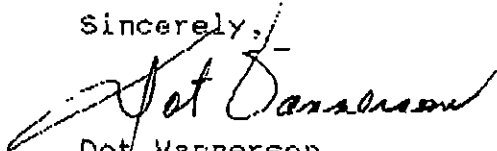

for Advice and Consent

Purpose

To submit the START II Treaty to the Senate for advice and consent to ratification.

Background

Secretary Eagleburger has forwarded the START II Treaty for your transmittal to the Senate, requesting advice and consent to ratification. The attached transmittal message (Tab A), encloses the State Department's article-by-article analysis of the Treaty (Tab B), the text of the Treaty, its Protocols and the Memorandum on Attribution of data (MOA) (Tab C), and the text of related letters (Tab D).

The START II Treaty builds upon the historic achievement of START in our effort to enhance the stability of the strategic balance through arms control. The elimination of all heavy ICBMs and the effective elimination of all other multiple warhead ICBMs has long been a U.S. goal. Its achievement (along with reducing the number of deployed warheads to 3000-3500) by the year 2003 -- or by the year 2000 if a program of U.S. assistance can be agreed -- will put an end to the most dangerous weapons of the Cold War.

Since you signed START II on January 3, Russian government officials have been actively promoting the Treaty in public, in preparation for an anticipated tough ratification debate in Moscow. Strong personal support for START II from Defense Minister Grachev should help keep the military on board. But it is too early to gauge the level of real opposition to START II in the Supreme Soviet.

In the United States START II has received virtually unanimous acclaim. Although criticisms will undoubtedly arise, no serious controversy is likely. Our strategy of urging prompt Senate consideration of the Treaty is intended to maintain momentum in Moscow for ratification and to focus attention in the other

former Soviet Republics, especially Ukraine, on the need to ratify START and adhere to the non-proliferation treaty.

In addition to the Treaty, its Protocols and the MOA, the package includes three exchanges of letters that are not submitted for advice and consent, but are relevant to the consideration of the Treaty by the Senate. These letters address the status of SS-18s in Kazakhstan, U.S. assurances on heavy bomber armaments, and restrictions on Russian heavy ICBM silo conversion.

LAWMAKERS EXPRESS support for U.S. strike on Iraq.

President Bush's decision to initiate retaliatory strikes on Iraq for violating U.N. peace accords was met with approval yesterday on Capitol Hill and by the incoming Clinton administration.

"The United States and its coalition partners today took forceful actions against Iraq," said White House spokesman Marlin Fitzwater, explaining the air strikes and deployment of a battalion in Kuwait in response to Iraqi leader Saddam Hussein's deployment of anti-aircraft missiles around a "no-fly zone" in southern Iraq.

The zone was established in 1991 to shield Shiite Moslems from attack by Saddam's military.

A bipartisan mix of lawmakers were quick to offer their support for the military action. House Majority Leader Richard A. Gephardt, D-Mo., said: "The message of today's air strikes against Iraqi military targets should be clear. Democrats and Republicans — the Bush administration and the Clinton administration — will not tolerate violations of the U.N. resolutions by Saddam."

Sen. Robert C. Smith, R-N.H., praised the move. "I hope that as President Bush goes out the door, he turns and gives Saddam what he deserves," he said.

With Bush set to leave office in just a week, the use of military force this close to the end of a president's term is unprecedented. But it was met with approval by President-elect Bill Clinton. "President-elect Clinton stands foursquare with the president in his determination to ensure compliance with all relevant U.N. resolutions," said Clinton spokesman George Stephanopoulos.

CHRISTOPHER BACKS strike on Iraq, explains Army spying.

In a confirmation hearing going on at the same time that U.S. warplanes were striking Iraq, Secretary of State-designate Warren M. Christopher yesterday

backed the Bush administration's use of military force.

Christopher told the Senate Foreign Relations Committee that the incoming Clinton administration "stands shoulder to shoulder" with the Bush administration's decision to retaliate against Iraq's violation of the agreement that ended the 1991 Persian Gulf War.

Christopher added that President-elect Clinton would strive to compel Serbia to end the war in the former Yugoslavia, even if that requires force. "I can assure you that this administration will vigorously pursue concerted action with our European allies and international bodies to end the slaughter in Bosnia," Christopher said.

The nominee is slated to make another appearance before the panel today.

In a wide-ranging hearing, Christopher also acknowledged that he was aware that the Army spied on civilians during the 1960s. But he maintained that his testimony before the Foreign Relations panel in 1977 during his confirmation hearing as deputy secretary of State was not inconsistent.

Christopher said that in 1977 he denied knowing about "covert" Army infiltration of anti-war groups, not about the Army's surveillance of dissidents when he was deputy attorney general in 1968.

The nominee also stood by Clinton's campaign pledge to stop the automatic return to Haiti of Haitians seeking asylum in the United States.

DOT NOMINEE Peña handles questions from Environment panel.

The Senate Environment and Public Works Committee yesterday took a look at Federico Peña, President-elect Clinton's choice to head the Transportation Department.

The committee has no formal role in confirming Peña — that job is handled

Agriculture Nomination: Agriculture Secretary-designate Mike Espy will likely be asked about a new restructuring plan for the Department of Agriculture when he testifies before the Senate Agriculture Committee today.

The plan was introduced by current Agriculture Secretary Edward Madigan last week and seeks to streamline what has been criticized as the far-flung and inefficient office structure and time-consuming paperwork requirements of the agency. Up to now, Espy has withheld public comment on the proposal, opting to wait for his confirmation hearing.

The 39-year-old Espy, currently a Democratic congressman from Mississippi, served three terms on the House Agriculture Committee before being tapped by President-elect Bill Clinton for the USDA slot.

Espy is considered an expert on the country's often complex and arcane farm policies.

HHS Nomination: The Senate Finance Committee will hear from Donna E. Shalala, President-elect Bill Clinton's choice for Secretary of the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS).

A former chancellor of the University of Wisconsin, Shalala, 51, has more experience in the field of education than in health care.

But she is known as an able administrator, a quality that will be vital in overseeing HHS, the department with the largest budget in the federal government.

Clinton has already made it clear that she will be the key player in formulating his administration's health-care policy.

Although the Finance panel has official jurisdiction over the nomination and will vote on it, Shalala will also testify before the Senate Labor Committee on Friday.

by the Senate Commerce Committee — but the Environment panel has jurisdiction over some transportation issues and wanted a chance to question the secretary-designate.

Panelists mainly asked Peña about his views on the nation's infrastructure (such as water systems and bridges) needs. Committee Chairman Max Baucus, D-Mont., tried to pin Peña down on his priorities for infrastructure programs, but Peña said that the incoming administration had yet to set those priorities.

He also fended off a variety of regulatory and policy questions, such as how to control billboards, whether the air-traffic controllers fired by former President Ronald Reagan should be rehired and what limits to place on tractor-trailers.

He did say that he supports the full funding of the 1991 surface transportation bill, which was authorized at \$151 billion over six years. Congress provided only \$13.2 billion for highway and transit spending in the fiscal 1993 transportation appropriations bill, returning transportation spending to fiscal 1991 levels.

However, Peña said that the "policy was still being developed" as to where the additional money would be found. He told members that the new administration would analyze the benefits of a gasoline tax, but added that he knows how "sensitive that is, coming from the West." Peña was the mayor of Denver from 1983 to 1991 and grew up in Laredo, Texas.

ECONOMIC PLAN likely to include consumption tax, says Altman.

President-elect Bill Clinton's choice for the No. 2 job at the Treasury Department told the Senate Finance Committee yesterday that an economic stimulus package, to be introduced shortly after Inauguration Day, is likely to include new taxes on consumption.

"It is my view that as a nation, we have been consuming too much and investing too little," Treasury Secretary-designate Roger C. Altman told lawmakers reviewing his nomination. "I do think that one form or another of new tax on consumption is necessary."

After receiving a broad overview of the incoming administration's economic plans from Treasury Secretary-designate Lloyd Bentsen on Tuesday, panel members quizzed Altman on the details.

Altman said that reducing the federal budget deficit will remain a top priority, but added that additional steps would likely be taken to stimulate the economy and encourage private investment.

Prodded by Donald W. Riegle Jr., D-Mich., to move quickly on an economic stimulus package, Altman responded, "If your standard is a few weeks, senator, I'm confident we can meet that."

Riegle pointed out that to meet Clinton's goal of creating 8 million new jobs over the next four years, 165,000 jobs would have to be created each month. "We're not anywhere close to that right now," said Riegle.

Republicans questioned what kind of new taxes might be included in the plan. Charles E. Grassley, R-Iowa, pointed out that Altman wrote in 1990 in support of an increased gasoline tax. Altman said no decision had been made on specific items in the package, but noted that a national sales tax was being considered.

OMB NOMINEE Rivlin vows to tackle budget deficit.

Alice M. Rivlin, President-elect Bill Clinton's nominee to be deputy director of the Office of Management and Budget (OMB), assured senators at her confirmation hearing yesterday that deficit reduction would be one of her chief concerns in office.

"We will make a lot of people mad at us by reminding them of the importance of the deficit," Rivlin told members of the Senate Governmental Affairs Committee.

Rivlin, a Brookings Institution economist and former director of the Congressional Budget Office (CBO), is expected to win congressional approval. Her nomination won plaudits from both Democrats and Republicans alike, and committee members praised her extensive work in the economics and budget arena.

At the hearing, Rivlin reiterated the priorities that OMB Director-designate Leon E. Panetta had presented to the committee on Monday. She called the deficit "the greatest long-term threat to the health of our economy."

When asked about Clinton's promise to cut the deficit in half, Rivlin said that the exact goal was under discussion but that the budget team would get the deficit going "in the right direction." She has argued against a policy of placing an economic stimulus package ahead of efforts to reduce federal red ink.

In their statements, several committee members cited the ongoing need for review and evaluation of government activities as a crucial task of the OMB. Rivlin pledged to maintain as a priority the management responsibilities of the office.

Panetta Vote. At the hearing, the committee agreed by voice vote to confirm Panetta, subject to his formal nomination as soon as Clinton becomes president. Sen. John Glenn, D-Ohio, said that Panetta will likely be confirmed by the full Senate on Inauguration Day.

SUPREME COURT says Senate has final say in impeachments.

In a unanimous ruling, the Supreme Court yesterday said that U.S. courts do not have the constitutional authority to review the proceedings of Senate im-

peachment trials.

The decision was in response to an appeal filed by Walter L. Nixon Jr., a former Mississippi district court judge who was removed from office by the Senate in 1989 for perjury. Nixon argued that his impeachment conviction should be overturned because he was allowed to present his case only to a 12-member Senate panel rather than the full Senate.

But the Supreme Court, in a decision by Chief Justice William Rehnquist, said that the Constitution grants impeachment power to Congress and provides for no federal court involvement.

The ruling also affects freshman Rep. Alcee L. Hastings. The Florida Democrat was removed from office by the Senate in 1989 while he was serving as a U.S. district judge, but his conviction was struck down last September by U.S. District Judge Stanley Sporkin on the grounds that Hastings had not been tried before the full Senate.

Sporkin's decision would likely be reversed on appeal, said Elizabeth Bazan, a lawyer in the American law division of the Congressional Research Service, and Hastings conviction by the Senate reinstated.

The Senate's action would not prohibit Hastings from serving in Congress, however. Bazan said Congress, in impeachment proceedings, has the right both to remove federal officials from office and disqualify them from holding other offices, and the Senate voted only to remove Hastings from office.

The House could still vote to expel Hastings, Bazan said, but that is unlikely considering that House leaders allowed Hastings to be sworn into office Jan. 5.

'OCTOBER SURPRISE' panel finds no proof GOP made Iran deal.

A House task force said yesterday that there was absolutely no proof the Reagan-Bush campaign team struck a deal with Iran to delay the release of U.S. hostages until after the 1980 presidential election.

"There is no credible evidence to support the central 'October Surprise' allegations," said Rep. Lee H. Hamilton, D-Ind., chairman of the ad hoc task force, in releasing the lengthy bipartisan report.

President Bush and his predecessor, Ronald Reagan, have long denied allegations that they bribed Iran to delay the release of the 52 U.S. hostages beyond the November 1980 election.

The 10-month House investigation included hundreds of interviews in more than 10 countries and the review of tens of thousands of documents and tapes.

The investigation caused fierce partisan wrangling on Capitol Hill as some Republican lawmakers accused the Democrats of looking for trouble.

But Hamilton said: "To have left these allegations to fester would have been inexcusable if they were true and

terribly unfair if they were false."

The scandal dates to 1980, when the Republicans feared President Jimmy Carter would pull off a last minute hostage release — an "October Surprise" — and win re-election. Carter lost the election to Reagan, whose swearing in was instantly followed by the hostages' release.

Illinois Rep. Henry J. Hyde, the task force's ranking Republican, pointed to the high cost of the investigation, which he said totaled \$4.5 million, and said the probe had shown the conspiracy theory was just that.

"Our conclusions were reached with confidence, and there are no material issues remaining," said Hyde. "Many of the key sources of these allegations not only lacked credibility but were fabricators."

He said the task force was forwarding names "of a number of individuals" to the Justice Department for possible prosecution for lying to Congress.

POW-MIA probe finds no 'clear evidence' of live prisoners.

A select Senate panel that spent the last 15 months investigating the fates of missing U.S. military personnel wrapped up its probe yesterday saying it had uncovered no "clear evidence" indicating that American servicemen are being held against their will in Southeast Asia nearly 20 years after the Vietnam War.

The committee issued a 1,000-page final report that also concluded that top U.S. government officials did not possess any "certain" knowledge that prisoners were left behind after U.S. forces were removed from Vietnam.

"But there remains the troubling question of whether the Americans who were expected to return but did not were, as a group, shunted aside and discounted by government and population alike. The answer to that question is essentially yes," the report said.

There are 2,264 Americans listed by the Defense Department as prisoners of war (POW) or missing in action (MIA). But Kerry said that that number is basically erroneous and that the committee had narrowed it down to 135 "discrepancy cases" in which there is reason to believe men were captured and kept alive at least for a time.

The report was critical of several administrations' efforts to analyze and follow up on live-sighting reports, which purport to show evidence of live prisoners.

But it also concluded that much of the evidence it looked into simply did not pan out.

"The live-sighting reports that have been resolved have not checked out; alleged pictures of POWs have proven false; purported leads have come up empty; and photographic intelligence has been inconclusive, at best," the report said.

The committee's authorization ex-

pired on Jan. 3. Kerry and other members, including Charles S. Grassley, R-Iowa, said they would continue to press for more answers to the POW issue in some of the permanent committees of the Senate.

BRADLEY SWITCHES, backs line-item veto measure.

Sen. Bill Bradley, D-N.J., yesterday announced he will introduce legislation to give the president a line-item veto over appropriations and tax bills. Bradley had previously opposed the line-item veto.

Bradley conceded the measure faces an uphill struggle, especially in the Senate, where it is bitterly opposed by Appropriations Committee Chairman Robert C. Byrd, D-W.Va.

Bradley added tax bills to the target list. In the past, most measures proposing a line-item veto have dealt only with appropriations bills.

"If a line-item veto is really going to attack unnecessary spending," Bradley said, "it has to address both the appropriations and the tax sides of the budget."

Under Bradley's proposal, Congress could overturn a veto only with two-thirds majority votes of both the House and the Senate.

He said that his previous opposition to the line-item veto was based on his belief that such a tool would give the president too much authority. "But while I've been in the Senate, the deficit has quintupled... It's time for a change."

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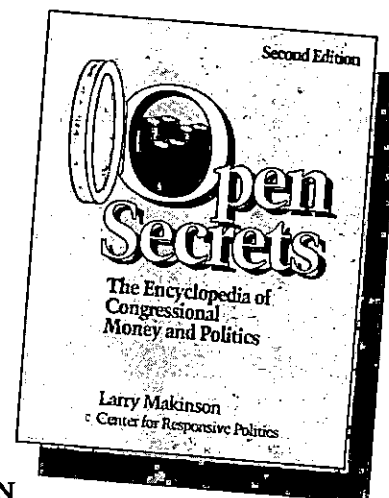
