1. FYI-Jonathan and Jody Bush will arrive at the White House at 6:00 p.m. today. They will depart Wednesday morning.

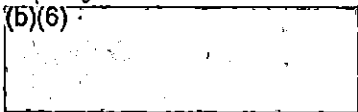

GOP leaders say Williams has a chance to oust Ford

carried all 120 counties against weak opposition from Republican Jackson Andrews. But he ran diligently, remembering that two years before, heavily favored but complacent Democrat Walter "Dee" Hudleston had lost the other Senate seat to Republican Mitch McConnell, who still holds it.

Williams certainly seems less likely to follow in McConnell's footsteps. McConnell had a superb political and fund-raising base as Jefferson County judge-executive and worked on his race for almost four years. Williams represents about 100,000 people in eight poor, Republican counties in Southern Kentucky, and he has been running for little more than four months.

McConnell also ran with a popular president, Ronald Reagan, who coasted to re-election. President Bush's political strength has diminished so much in recent months that his own state chairman, McConnell, said Tuesday, "I don't think the president would be of great help to anybody right now."

Williams might get more help, however indirect, from the third force in this year's presidential race, likely independent candidate Ross Perot.

"Ross Perot could make as much difference as George Bush could in the race," said Ford's campaign chairman, state Senate Majority Leader Joe Wright.

Perot capitalizes on and amplifies anti-incumbent feelings, and he might bring to the polls many people who wouldn't otherwise vote, Wright said. "If he is dead in the water by the first of November, I think Wendell Ford is probably going to be in great shape."

Williams, who says Ford's defeat would be a loud message for change in Washington, said, "I don't see how anybody can vote for Ross Perot and Wendell Ford."

Troop said, "There may be disgruntled people out there, but what I've always heard is, 'We're not mad at our friend Wendell Ford.'"

The Ford camp says that is shown by its poll last September, in which 72 percent of likely voters said they would choose him over an unnamed opponent.

Republicans say a poll done for their senatorial committee in January found that only 41 percent said

they would vote to re-elect Ford, while 46 percent said it was time to give someone else a chance.

(If the figures are being cited accurately, the disparity could be explained by the passage of time, the wording of questions or other differences in survey methods.)

Williams said that the poll helped get him in the race, and that the demand for change was reflected again Tuesday, when Democrats in the 1st Congressional District rejected Rep. Carroll Hubbard, who was among the leading check-bouncers at the House bank.

"It's not just the checks that got Carroll Hubbard in trouble," Williams said. "It's the feeling that the United States Congress is going to be changed and we can't live with business as usual anymore. ... Wendell Ford is a guru of the Senate and has to bear some responsibility for what's happened there."

Ford and his camp prefer to talk about his proven ability to do things for Kentucky, but also point out that he has cut congressional printing costs and opposed an attempt to create a Senate bank like the one the House had.

Despite his anti-Washington stance, Williams said he welcomes Bush's help, which usually comes in the form of fund raising. He said other GOP notables will come to Kentucky to help him raise money.

Williams' big sugar bowl could be the Republican senatorial committee, which can give him as much as \$321,000. He will get that if he runs an aggressive campaign and shows that he can raise money on his own, Anderson said, adding, "We have every belief that David will meet that criterion."

Williams said, "We're going to spend the summer raising money and talking to people about the issues," such as Ford's votes for federal spending and against giving Bush immediate authority to attack Iraq. "I think money's the only obstacle, and I don't think it's an insurmountable obstacle."

Williams raised about \$40,000 for his quiet primary race, including \$10,000 from himself, and spent almost all of it in defeating Phillip Thompson with 61 percent of the vote in a light turnout.

Ford, who was unopposed in the primary, raised more than \$1.2 million through March and had about \$800,000 left then. That is less than

most other Democrats facing challenges and is one reason why the GOP senatorial committee has moved the Williams-Ford race up on its priority list, Anderson said.

The other reason was the January poll.

Republicans also cite this month's edition of the Rothenberg Political Report, a Washington newsletter that moved Ford from its list of "currently safe" senators to its "watch list" of those who might become vulnerable.

Ford's aides say no other observers have reached that conclusion, and they say he will have adequate funds. He has gotten most of his money from political action committees but is trying to get more individual contributors.

Williams, an articulate and witty lawyer, has asked for several debates, but the Ford campaign says it's too early to discuss the idea.

A debate could show the generational contrast that Williams, 39, hopes to pose with Ford, 67. But Wright said Williams would be "cold and distant" compared with Ford, whose "warm personality and friendliness would come across."

Ford's aides say they are pleasantly surprised by the number of young Democrats who have volunteered for Ford. Troop said some are children of people who backed Ford in the 1960s, when he narrowly won races for the state Senate in 1965 and lieutenant governor in 1967. He was elected governor in 1971 and senator in 1974, defeating Republican Sen. Marlow Cook.

Williams was elected to the state House in 1984 and the Senate in 1986. He was Bush's state organizational chairman in 1988, and he managed the gubernatorial primary campaign of 6th District Rep. Larry Hopkins in 1991, two jobs that Ford aides like to point out.

The Hopkins campaign put Williams at odds with Larry Forgy, who opposed Hopkins; former Gov. Louie Nunn, Forgy's most prominent supporter; and Thompson, a former executive director of the state party who backed Forgy.

Ford and his allies suggest that Williams will be hurt by lingering factional scars, and Nunn buttressed that presumption, last week by refusing to comment on the race. But Forgy said, "What's past is dead, as far as I'm concerned, between Mr. Williams and me."

This Week in Congress

President Bush hands over the reins of government this week to Bill Clinton, ending 12 years of Republican control of the White House.

Clinton will become the 42nd president in U.S. history when he takes the oath of office at noon on Wednesday on the west front of the Capitol. Al Gore will be sworn in as vice president.

Afterward, Clinton and Gore will be the guests of honor at a traditional Hill luncheon sponsored by congressional leaders.

Other than inaugural events, Congress has a light schedule this week.

Senate leaders plan to move quickly on most of Clinton's Cabinet nominations. Senate panels will resume confirmation hearings today, and floor votes could occur on some of the nominees as early as tomorrow.

The House on Thursday may work on organizational matters, including *pro forma* approval of committee assignments. Republicans, angry over a Democratic-backed rules package adopted two weeks ago, are expected to force a number of procedural votes.

Confirmation Votes Set

Senate committees will vote today on whether to endorse eight of Clinton's Cabinet picks. Tomorrow, the Armed Services Committee vote on Les Aspin's nomination to head the Pentagon. Another five nominees will appear before panels during the week. (See box, p. 2)

Two nominees — Treasury Secretary-designate Lloyd Bentsen and Leon E. Panetta, tapped to head the Office of Management and Budget — have already received committee approval. Their nominations could be considered on the Senate floor tomorrow.

Committee votes are scheduled today on the nominees for the following Cabinet posts:

State Nomination. Warren M. Christopher seems sure to win the endorse-

ment of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee to become the next secretary of State, despite some questions last week about whether he misled Congress in 1977 about his knowledge of Army spying on civilians during the 1960s.

After initial questioning, Republicans decided to accept Christopher's word that when he told the panel in 1977 that he was unaware of Army spying, he was discussing specific attempts to infiltrate anti-war groups, not general surveillance activities by the Army.

Education Nomination. Following a smooth hearing last week, the Senate Labor and Human Resources Committee is expected to endorse Richard W. Riley for Education secretary.

Riley, a former governor of South Carolina, favors a direct student loan program and opposes allowing parents to send their children to private schools at public expense.

Labor Nomination. The Senate Labor and Human Resources Committee will vote on the nomination of Robert B. Reich to be Labor secretary. He is expected to win easy approval.

Agriculture Nomination. Despite concerns by some Midwest lawmakers that Agriculture Secretary-designate Mike Espy would bias agriculture policy toward Southern farmers, the Mississippi Democrat is likely to easily win the endorsement of the Senate Agriculture Committee.

HUD Nomination. The Senate Banking Committee is certain to support Henry G. Cisneros' nomination to be secretary of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), when he panel meets today.

The former mayor of San Antonio, Cisneros has promised to move aggressively to provide aid to ailing cities. Cisneros told the panel on Jan. 12 that he would accelerate government spending on a program to help people in public

Last Week

Even though the House and Senate were not in session, there was plenty of action on the Hill last week as a number of Senate panels held confirmation hearings and two special investigative panels released final reports.

The Finance Committee gave Sen. Lloyd Bentsen, D-Texas, the nod to be Treasury secretary.

Other committees held confirmation hearings on nominations for the departments of State, Health and Human Services, Housing and Urban Development, Agriculture, Transportation and Education. (See status chart, p. 2)

A bipartisan mix of lawmakers were quick to offer their support for President Bush's decision to initiate retaliatory strikes on Iraq for violating U.N. peace accords.

House Speaker Thomas S. Foley, D-Wash., said he decided to name Dan Glickman, D-Kan., as chairman of the Intelligence Committee to replace Dave McCurdy, D-Okla.

And Ohio Republican Bill Gradison announced he would resign his House seat at the end of the month to become president of the Health Insurance Association of America.

Ohio Gov. George V. Voinovich, R, set March 16 as the date for the primary election and May 4 for the special election in Ohio's 2nd District to replace Gradison.

Confirmation Action

More Senate committees opened for business early last week to begin work on several of the top level nominations of President-elect Bill Clinton.

The full Senate is expected to take final action on some of the following nominations later this week.

Bentsen. The Finance Committee approved, 19-0, the nomination of Treasury Secretary-designate Lloyd Bentsen, D-Texas, who has chaired the committee since 1987.

Bentsen said reducing the deficit will be a top priority. He also indicated that

EPA Nomination. When the Senate Environment and Public Works Committee meets today, it is expected to endorse Carol M. Browner to become the next administrator of the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA).

In a Jan. 11 appearance, Browner told the panel that the incoming administration would rely on market-based incentives to solve the nation's environmental problems.

Defense Nomination. The Senate Armed Services Committee tomorrow will vote on whether to recommend that Les Aspin be confirmed as Defense secretary. Aspin, D-Wis., the current chairman of the House Armed Services Committee, is expected to easily win the approval of the panel.

HHS Nomination. The Senate Fi-

nance Committee will vote on the nomination of Donna E. Shalala to be secretary of Health and Human Services.

The Finance panel heard from Shalala last week, as did the Labor panel, which has no official jurisdiction over the nomination.

Trade Representative. The Finance panel will also consider, and vote on, the nomination of Mickey Kantor to be the U.S. Trade Representative.

During the last decade, U.S. trade relations have taken on great importance, especially with Japan and the European Community.

In addition, one of the new administration's first priorities will be sealing the recently negotiated North American Free Trade Agreement with Mexico and Canada.

Kantor, 53, is a seasoned political operative who managed President-elect Clinton's campaign.

Confirmation Hearings

Justice Nomination. Attorney General-designate Zoe Baird will go before the Senate Judiciary Committee amid recent revelations that she illegally employed undocumented workers in her home.

While her employment of illegal aliens has caused some to question whether Baird, 40, should become the nation's highest law enforcement officer, her nomination is not considered to be jeopardized.

Baird's professional experience is varied, including work in both the public and private arenas. In 1990, she became general counsel for Aetna Life & Casualty Co., where she supervised a large staff of more than 100 lawyers. Other work includes brief stints at the Justice Department and White House under President Jimmy Carter.

controversial subject brought up when Interior Secretary-designate Bruce Babbitt appears before the Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee today may be the nominee himself.

Babbitt, who is recognized as one of the foremost conservationists in the country, is not expected to have trouble winning the panel's support or confirmation by the full Senate.

But Babbitt is likely to be peppered with questions on a variety of controversial subjects. Western lawmakers are likely to quiz him on what he considers the proper balance between protection of the Northern spotted owl and support for local logging interests.

Questions about federal grazing fees, wetlands protection, California desert protection and mining law reform are all expected during the hearing.

The Indian Affairs Committee will hear from Babbitt next Monday.

Energy Department. Energy Secretary-designate Hazel R. O'Leary, will appear today before the Senate Energy panel.

O'Leary's nomination signaled Clinton's determination to move the emphasis of U.S. energy policy away from production and toward conservation.

A utility executive, O'Leary was set to become president of Northern States Power's Natural Gas Utility this month, but instead took the government job.

O'Leary is likely to face questioning about her lack of expertise in the area of nuclear weapons production and disposal of nuclear waste. She supports opening up a high-level waste dump at Yucca Mountain in Nevada — a move opposed by many environmentalists.

U.N. Nomination. The Senate Foreign Relations Committee on Thursday will hold a confirmation hearing on Madeline K. Albright, who has been tapped to be U.S. ambassador to the United Nations.

Albright, long a stalwart of Democratic politics, has been a professor at Georgetown University since 1982.

The role of the U.N. ambassador is becoming more important as the United Nations itself takes on more responsibility for world problems. Clinton has promised to elevate the office of U.N. ambassador to Cabinet status.

CEA Nomination. The Senate Banking Committee on Thursday will question Laura D'Andrea Tyson, Clinton's choice to chair the Council on Economic Advisors.

The 45-year-old Tyson, a macroeconomist by training, is considered an expert on trade issues and may come under fire for some of her writings — which are not always wholeheartedly supportive of free trade. ■

cuts may be in store for popular federal programs such as Social Security and veterans benefits.

Bentsen also said a middle-class tax cut would be difficult to go through with given the grim deficit predictions from the White House Office of Management and Budget.

Altman. Following Bentsen was Roger G. Altman, Clinton's choice for the No. 2 job at Treasury. Altman told the Finance Committee that an economic stimulus package, to be introduced shortly after Inauguration Day, is likely to include new taxes on consumption.

Altman said no decision had been made on specific items in the package, but noted that a national sales tax was being considered.

Christopher. Warren M. Christopher, designated to be secretary of State, told the Senate Foreign Relations Committee that the incoming Clinton administration "stands shoulder to shoulder" with the Bush administration's decision to retaliate against Iraq's violation of the agreement that ended the 1991 Persian Gulf War.

Christopher also said that as president Bill Clinton would strive to compel Serbia to end the war in the former Yugoslavia, even if that requires force.

Panetta Vote. The Governmental Affairs Committee voted to recommend the confirmation of Leon E. Panetta, D-Calif., as director of the Office of Management and Budget. The approval is subject to his formal nomination when Clinton takes office.

In a hearing, Panetta told the committee that reducing the nation's red ink will be a higher economic priority than giving the middle class a tax break.

Panetta said that the balance of spending cuts and new taxes used in the 1990 budget agreement (two-thirds spending cuts, one-third new taxes) would probably be a good model to follow for any future deficit-reduction package.

Rivlin. Alice M. Rivlin, nominated to be deputy director of OMB, reiterated the deficit reduction priorities that Panetta had presented to the committee.

Rivlin has argued against placing an economic stimulus package ahead of efforts to reduce federal red ink.

Riley. Richard Riley, Clinton's choice for Education secretary, testified before the Senate Labor and Human Resources Committee in favor of direct student loans and in opposition to school choice, a plan that has been pushed unsuccessfully by President Bush.

Cisneros. Henry G. Cisneros, who has been nominated to head the Department of Housing and Urban Development, told the Banking, Housing and Urban Affairs Committee that he would make sure that urban and rural develop-

ment proposals play a key role in the administration's economic stimulus package.

Panel members urged Cisneros to develop with the administration an economic recovery plan that balances the needs of urban and rural areas.

Browner. Carol M. Browner, nominated to head the Environmental Protection Agency, told the Senate Environment Committee that creating and marketing new environmental protection technologies would help the United States revive its economy and become more competitive in world markets.

Browner also said reviewing the "superfund" law, which covers the clean-up of the nation's worst hazardous waste sites, would be one of her first priorities upon taking office.

Other Hill News

'October Surprise.' A special House task force, in a final report, said there was absolutely no proof the Reagan-Bush campaign team struck a deal with Iran to delay the release of U.S. hostages until after the 1980 presidential election.

The investigation was initiated by Democrats who wanted to look into allegations that campaign officials conspired with Iranians to delay the hostages' release, thereby preventing an "October surprise" that might have boosted President Jimmy Carter's re-election campaign.

MIA-POW. The Senate Select Committee on POW-MIA Affairs issued a final report saying it had uncovered no "convincing evidence" indicating that American servicemen are being held against their will in Southeast Asia nearly 20 years after the Vietnam War.

It did say there was evidence to suggest Americans were held prisoner after the war ended but that U.S. officials had no "certain knowledge" of troops that were knowingly left behind.

The report capped a 15-month, \$1.9 million investigation that was initiated by members of both parties, many of whom served in Vietnam, following a series of news reports and publication of photographs in 1991 that indicated U.S. servicemen might have been held prisoner in Vietnam long after the war ended.

Pay Raise Suit. Some House and Senate Republicans asked a U.S. appeals court to revoke a \$4,100 congressional pay raise that took effect at the beginning of the year, on the grounds that the automatic cost of living adjustment violate the 27th Amendment.

The 27th Amendment bars pay raises approved during one Congress from taking effect until an election of the House has intervened. The GOP members argue that the amendment also bars pay raises that have not been specifically approved, such as COLAs. ■

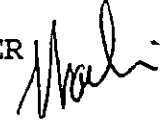
