Dear George,

I was encouraged by your letter of 4 October about Poland. It confirms that our views are very close, and that the West is working well together to support reform in Eastern Europe.

You will have seen that EC Foreign Ministers meeting on 3 October approved a substantial package of help for Poland and Hungary. Under this, the Community will expand access to our markets for Poland and Hungary. We shall also spend 200 million ecu from next year's EC budget, mainly to promote reform of agriculture in Poland and to finance management training and environmental protection in both countries. This matches what they need with what Europe can best offer.

Like you, we are impressed with the economic policies which the Poles have outlined and with their determination to carry them through. We shall give the fullest backing to efforts to secure a strong and sustainable programme with the IMF. This is the key to unlock the further help we can all give. In particular, we need the guidance of the Fund on the scale and timing of Poland's external financing needs, to which the IMF itself, the World Bank and Poland's friends and supporters would respond.

I welcome most warmly your decision to contribute \$200 million, contingent on the conclusion of an IMF agreement, and which would go towards a total of \$1 billion in Western assistance for Poland. Your action provides a good lead. I hope, as you do, that it will be matched by others. We have already committed ourselves to substantial aid to Poland, both through the community and bilaterally by our \$40 million "Know-How Fund". But I confirm that we are ready to do more and provide a further British contribution as part of a collective Western effort. I would prefer not to set a precise figure until we know more from the IMF about Poland's precise needs. But our contribution would certainly be proportionate to yours.

I agree with you that it is right to offer grants, not loans, so as not to increase Poland's heavy debt. We note that your proposed stabilisation fund differs from the Poles proposal for a stabilisation loan, aimed at building up international reserves and supporting a newly unified and convertible currency. We should be interested to learn more of the intended uses of the stabilisation fund and the period envisaged for disbursement.

We should think carefully about how these grants are used, to ensure good value both for the Poles and ourselves. My own view is that the priority objectives should be:-

- to promote the conversion of state-owned firms into market-based ones. Finance Minister Balcerowicz especially asked Nigel Lawson for help in this.
- to encourage Western private sector involvement in Poland.
- to improve the quality of Polish management.

We need ways of bringing together capital and expertise from many sources - Western and Polish, multilateral and bilateral, public and private - for these purposes. One method might be an investment consortium, which would bring together Polish enterprises and potential investors. This might be developed

into an Investment Bank, drawing equity both from the Poles and from the West, which would take shares in state firms being privatised and help to turn them into profit-making operations. At every stage, the skill and experience of the International Finance Corporation would be invaluable and I believe they would be ready to help. We would want to pursue these ideas further with you and other Western participants, as well as with the Poles themselves. I hope that the team you propose to send to Poland could visit London en route to exchange ideas.

The transformation of Eastern Europe is only just beginning. So in helping Poland, we should be mindful of other East European countries embarking on similar reforms to escape from the straightjacket of Communism, whether now or in the future. This especially applies at present to Hungary. Hungary's political reforms are in some ways as ambitious as Poland's. Economically, they need to get back into close relations with the IMF and to correct their fiscal and external deficits. But their economy is certainly healthier than Poland's: they have so far serviced their debts; they can feed themselves; they have gone further towards a market economy. The EC will help Hungary, through its recent decisions, and you announced measures of assistance when you visited Budapest. But we should also give more thought to how the West can together help the Hungarian reforms.

I am writing in this sense to all our G7 colleagues and to Jacques Delors.

SUBJECT: Colombian Request for Additional Economic Assistance

Carlos Marulanda, Colombia's Minister of Development, came to see Deane, David Miller and Bill Pryce yesterday. He was accompanied by the Minister of Planning, the Ambassador and others.

Marulanda's message was simple: without substantial financial help for 1990 from the international community, Colombia will not be able to keep up the drug war. He claimed that the combined effect of the collapse of the coffee agreement and economic disruption due to the fighting the drug lords was costing Colombia's economy \$600 million this year and would cost an additional \$1 billion next year.

He said that if winning the narcotics war was worthwhile to the U.S., Colombia would need an injection of funds to keep up the public will to fight. He asked for our support with the international financial institutions to get loans, both general and project specific. Colombia's excellent reputation would not make repayment an issue.

Marulanda expressed appreciation for the trade and investment package (even though it is small potatoes) and the President's commitment to work for a restructured coffee agreement (although he realizes it is unlikely to be realized soon).

We told Marulanda we would discuss his ideas with you and Treasury. Treasury is looking into this. It should be possible to expedite World Bank loans; the IMF has a facility to compensate countries for sharp drops in commodity prices (but Colombia is not the only coffee producer which would qualify). However, we told him that it was unrealistic to expect to make up fully the projected gap and that trade liberalization was a two way street.

We also told him we would examine sharing of asset seizures, which promise to yield sizeable amounts in the near future.

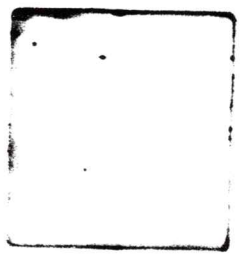

OK

State has added the question of General Powell attending the Military Doctrine Seminar in Vienna to Wednesday's breakfast agenda. The seminar is under the rubric of the CSBM talks and runs from 16 Jan to 5 Feb. Warsaw Pact states intend to be represented at the Chief of Staff level if other participants do the same. NATO and neutral states appear willing to follow the U.S. lead.

Although these discussions were originally a Pact initiative, Ambassador Maresca believes the best approach is to embrace them fully as he expects the seminar to have broad political impact in Europe. General Powell will go if you, Secretary Baker and Secretary Cheney agree that this sends the right political signal. The NSC staff supports General Powell's attending at least part (probably one-two days) of the four day opening session of the seminar which is devoted to general presentations on security policy and doctrine. The Soviets have offered to "coordinate" announcements to avoid either side appearing to react to the other but we should not give the appearance of any bilateral actions in what is a multilateral forum. It is also important that a U.S. decision be communicated to our Allies in Vienna before an announcement here.

As a matter of interest, we have been told that Admiral Crowe will visit Moscow to speak to a committee of the Supreme Soviet. This is in response to Marshal Akhromeyev's invitation and will likely coincide with the Doctrine Conference.

This summarizes the IEPR breakfast on November 17.

1. IDA IX: Treasury and OMB are trying to resolve differences over funding for IDA IX. Treasury sought \$1.7 billion for the Multilateral Development Bank (MDB) account. OMB's mark is \$1.5 billion. ~~At~~ that level, Treasury would not be able to maintain our contribution to IDA in real terms (an increase of \$102 million) and still eliminate arrearages to the MDBs. Treasury will aim for an agreement with OMB shortly so that the U.S. can take a position when IDA negotiations resume in mid-December.

2. MDB Loans to China: Treasury reported on World Bank plans for its lending program to China in 1990 and asked for the group's guidance on the U.S. approach. The U.S. legislative process is complicated, since the Administration must take into account sanctions legislation against China, the IDA IX replenishment, and the Bank's lending plans. Secretary Baker noted that other G-7 members, with the possible exception of the UK, are prepared to take a more forthcoming attitude toward China. It was agreed that the Administration should wait to see how the legislative situation unfolds. We may be able to move ahead in 1990 if there are no further complications on the legislative front. In the meantime, it would be helpful if the World Bank Executive Board put Chinese matters on hold until January.

3. Andean Summit: Secretary Brady referred to William Bennett's suggestions for "debt for drug" swaps. Bennett's proposals all involve some sort of debt forgiveness. Robson stressed that the NSD called for performance first on the part of the drug producing countries and then U.S. assistance. Some of the schemes circulating within the USG seem to reverse these priorities. The group agreed on the desirability of a "clean agenda" for the Summit, i.e., the focus on drugs, not on debt or other issues. Baker said that of the various debt forgiveness/repayment schemes that had come to his attention, he favored only that one involving existing Section 572 authority, which would provide debt relief to Bolivia. Mulford noted that the Colombian Finance Minister would be in Washington next week, and the Treasury would press the Colombians to take the steps

necessary to obtain World Bank credits already in the pipeline. The Colombians simply have not engaged the Bank yet. They should be negotiating.

4. Poland: The key issue here is the stabilization fund. We need to reach an understanding with our G-7 partners on the use of the fund; there is some misunderstanding at present. The fund is for stabilization of the economy after introduction of a tough adjustment program, not for balance of payments support. The Japanese, for example, have offered \$150 million in import financing, which is not consistent with stabilization fund objectives. Mulford will press the allies for agreement on the nature of the fund and the need for commitments now at the G-7 Deputies meeting on November 20. Part of the problem in reaching agreement on the use of the stabilization fund arises because the Poles are not clear in their own minds whether they would draw on it, for example, to meet short-term import needs. The group agreed that we should press to get agreement on the fund through meetings of the G-7 Deputies, the G-24 preparatory meeting on November 24 and the G-24 Ministerial in December. Another round of letters to Foreign and Finance Ministers may be necessary at some point. In the meantime, the U.S. is prepared to take the lead in organizing a \$500 million bridge loan for Poland, which would involve a U.S. contribution of \$200 million.

5. USSR: In response to Brady's question, Baker said the Soviets probably would raise at Malta the question of Soviet membership in the GATT, IMF and World Bank. But the Administration's position had not changed, and we would tell the Soviets that. Looking ahead, Baker distinguished between Soviet membership/observer status in the GATT and the IMF/World Bank. The former would be easier and make more sense in terms of the Soviet economy. Regarding Jackson-Vanik, the Soviet emigration law appears to be moving toward passage. When approved, it may be possible for the President to provide the necessary Jackson-Vanik waiver and then initiate negotiations on the required trade agreement. Thus, the period for monitoring Soviet implementation of the emigration law and negotiation of a trade agreement could overlap.

6. IMF Quota Increase: The matters remains unresolved. Secretaries Brady and Baker continue to differ on the prospects for positive Congressional action.

TELEPHONE CONVERSATION WITH
COLOMBIAN PRESIDENT VIRGILIO BARCO

- I wanted to confirm my acceptance of Cartegena as the site for our Andean Conference.
- When we last talked we agreed that mid-February would be a good time. I understand that during the OAS General Assembly the Andean Foreign Ministers agreed with our people that February 15 or 16 would fit into everyone's schedule. Do you think we could agree on February 15?
- We need to work together if the Andean Summit meeting is to mark the successful initiation of an intensified and coordinated campaign to control cocaine trafficking.
- Your efforts have been outstanding. However, Peru and Bolivia are lagging behind. Statements by Presidents Garcia and Paz Zamora criticizing the U.S. narcotics strategy have been unhelpful. I understand that Foreign Minister Londono, in his recent visit to Bolivia, was dismayed by Bolivia's lack of commitment on the narcotics issue. We share that dismay.
- Our sense is that President Garcia is much more concerned about the Sendero Luminoso threat than the traffickers, and that President Paz Zamora seems to hope that alternative development will make law enforcement unnecessary.

- We recognize that Peru and Bolivia are disappointed that U.S. economic assistance is not greater or beginning sooner. But they overlook the fact that our assistance is already significant in Bolivia (\$97 million in FY 90), and there is the prospect of significant increases in FY 1991, assuming the Bolivians and Peruvians get moving on law enforcement.
- If we are to have a successful summit, we need you to use your influence to convince Garcia and Paz Zamora that they must make a full commitment to interdiction. We are prepared to help Peru in its battle against Sendero, and we want to help the Bolivian economy grow. But their efforts must be made simultaneously with serious efforts to destroy the trafficking networks. Interdiction where the coca leaf is grown will ease the narco-threat to Colombia.
- I am asking Assistant Secretary Aronson to visit Colombia, Peru and Bolivia during the second week in December for further preparatory discussions and hope you can see him.
