

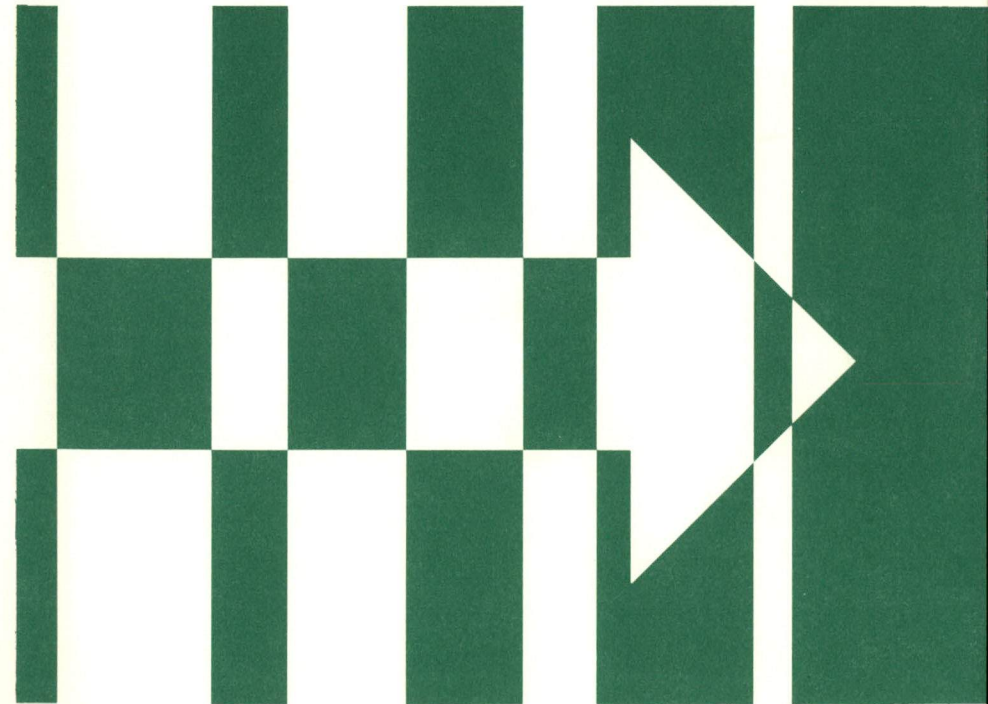

## Paper

As a presenter, you are requested to submit your paper according to the following outline by September 10, 1978. These papers will be reviewed and edited for publication in the 1978 Proceedings. Please note that papers will not be made available to conference participants until the Proceedings is published.

### Guidelines for Paper

Manuscripts should be mailed, first class, to Pat Marx, Director, Handicapped Student Services, Wright State University, Dayton, Ohio 45435.

Three copies should be submitted, including one original and two copies. Please do not send carbon copies, as they tend to smear. Keep one copy for reference.

### Manuscript Format

1. Manuscripts should be, typed double-spaced, with pages numbered consecutively and margins of at least one inch on all four sides, on 8 1/2 X 11 inch white, nonerasable bond paper that will take ink.
2. The title and a brief abstract, running about 35-50 words in length, should ~~each be placed~~ on separate pages on the beginning of the manuscript.
3. Headings within the text are to be in order as follows:
  - a. major headings - capital letters, underlined and centered;
  - b. secondary headings - capital and lower case letters, underlined, flush left; and
  - c. headings introducing a paragraph - a phrase underlined, ending with a period.
4. Each table and each figure should be typed on a separate page.
5. Footnotes should be numbered consecutively and typed double-spaced on a separate page as endnotes.

6. References, if used, should be numbered consecutively and typed double-spaced on a separate page. They should be in alphabetical order by the author's last name. All references must be cited in the text by the last name and year of the publication in parentheses, e.g., (Jones, 1976).


