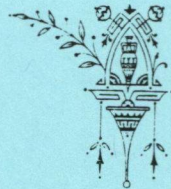

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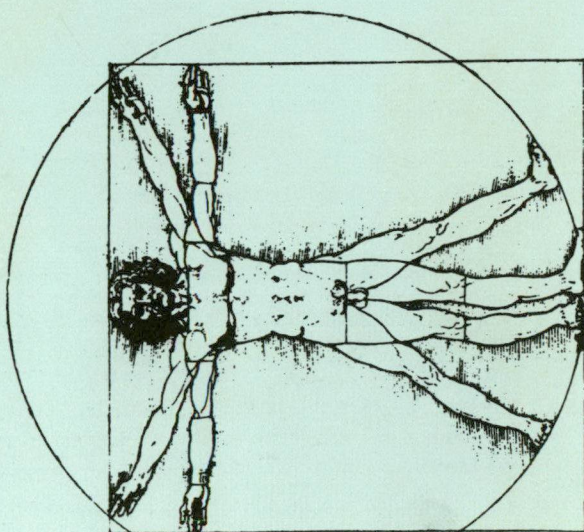

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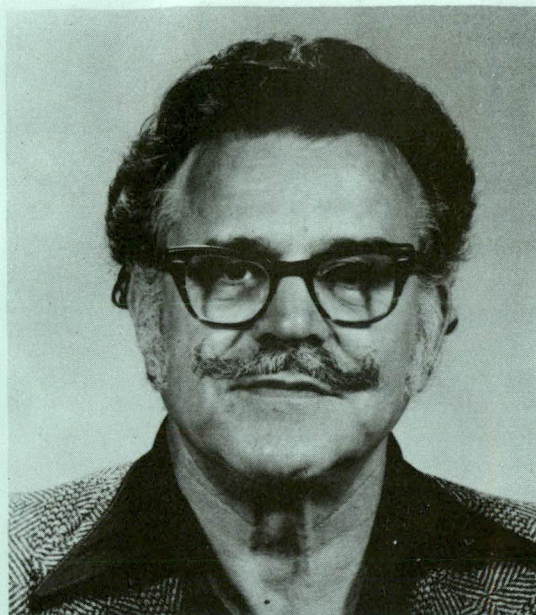

Biographical Sketch

Guy A. Renzaglia

Born in the small mining community of Virginia, Minnesota, Guy A. Renzaglia came to SIUC in 1955 to organize and direct a newly authorized program in rehabilitation counseling. As its director, he has built the Rehabilitation Institute into one of the top training centers of its kind in the nation. Dr. Renzaglia has earned an international reputation for professional development in the fields of rehabilitation and counseling psychology. As a professor and director of the Rehabilitation Institute, he is responsible for numerous creations and innovations which have consistently led the field in rehabilitation.

The background which brought Guy to his present stature is as unique and diverse as the Rehabilitation Institute itself. Guy, the second son of an immigrant family, developed early insights into the feelings of being disadvantaged. His first efforts to overcome and reach beyond that stigma resulted in successful athletic pursuits. He received his bachelor's degree in physical education at George

Washington University where he was an outstanding football player for three years.

Guy's drive for self improvement led to the achievement of three graduate degrees. In 1941, he received a Master of Education degree in physical education at the University of Minnesota. During a four year stint with the U.S. Air Force in World War II, his natural leadership abilities led him to the rank of major. Guy then returned to the university setting. He received a Master of Arts degree in psychology and a Doctor of Philosophy degree in counseling psychology.

Dr. Renzaglia's background reveals a wealth of experience. He was a counselor for several years with the University of Montana counseling center. In fact, he was acting director of the facility from 1948 to 1949. Guy combined his teaching skills with his counseling skills, and by 1953 was both an assistant professor and the associate director of Testing and Counseling Services at the University of Missouri in Columbia. In 1955 Guy moved to Southern Illinois University at Carbondale in order to develop the Rehabilitation Counselor Training Program. Little did he know that he would remain at SIUC for the next twenty-four years developing one of the most comprehensive rehabilitation graduate training programs in the country.

Over the thirty years of Guy's involvement in the human services field, he has been identified as a consultant to the nation's top governmental agencies. These include the United States Public Health Service, the Federal Bureau of Prisons, the United States Department of Labor, the United States Social Security Administration, and the Veteran's Administration. Recently Guy was contacted by the countries of Brazil and Australia to assist in creating and developing rehabilitation programs in their countries, under the auspices of the Partners of the Americas and the World Rehabilitation Association. His current interest in lifestyle, international rehabilitation, rehabilitation engineering, gerontology, and biofeedback, to mention only a few, indicate the always forward-thinking nature of our friend and scholar—Guy A. Renzaglia.

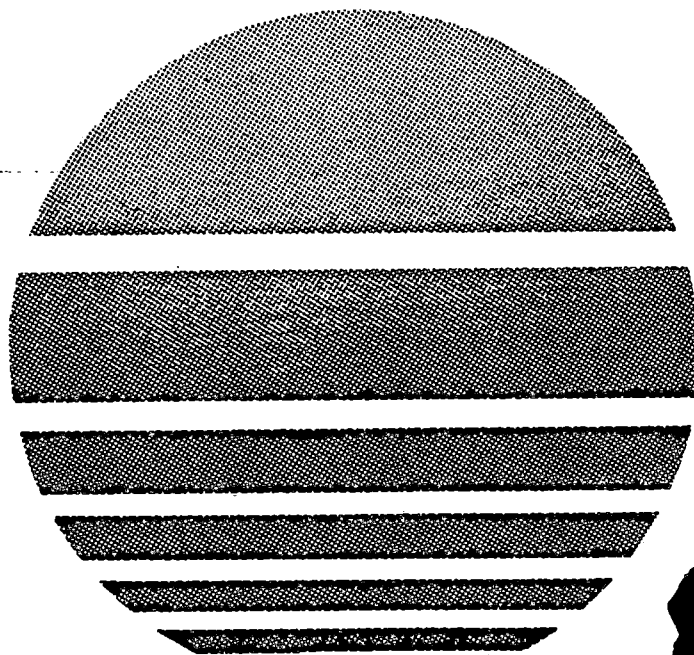

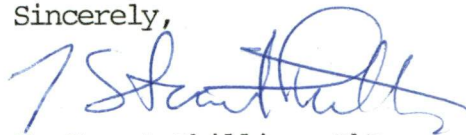
Dear Lex:

It is our great pleasure that you have consented to be a participant in Human Resources '83 on April 5, 1983. 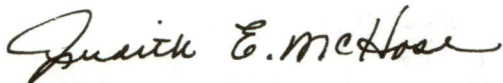

Independent living plan offers handicapped 'power to choose'

Lex Frieden is the director of the Independent Living Research Utilization project at the Institute for Rehabilitation and Research in Houston, Texas. Frieden, an assistant professor of rehabilitation at Baylor College of Medicine, Houston, has published several books and papers on the subject and has served as a consultant for the U.S. House of Representatives Committee on Science and Technology. He was honored by the U.S. Jaycees this year as one of American's Ten Outstanding Young Men.

"Independent Living Programs have grown faster than MacDonalds," quipped Frieden, speaker at the fourth Guy A. Renzaglia lecture in Student Center Ballroom B. The Renzaglia lectures are held annually during Human Resources Week to honor Renzaglia, the founder of the Rehabilitation Institute in SIU.

"I broke my neck 15 years ago as a freshman in college," Frieden said. "At that time we did not have any Title VII for the handicapped, no accessible building codes, very little accessible housing, negligible involvement of the handicapped in decision making, very little jobs for handicapped and no public incentives for industry to hire handicapped people.

"When I applied to the newly built Oral Roberts University, they said it was their policy not to accept handicapped students. And so it was with most universities then," he recounted in his speech, "Disabled People in the Community: Progress Made, Progress Needed."

"Today we have made amazing progress. From just three independent living programs in 1972 we have more than 200 today, at least one in every state," he said.

Frieden also explained that independent living is "basically a question of empowerment — giving power to people who had none.

"Handicapped people did not have much choice about where to go to school, what job they'd like, even everyday decisions of what to wear in the morning. Independent living gives them the power to choose, to assume responsibility for their decisions and to participate actively in the community," he said. "In short it allows them to take control over their own lives."

Frieden called for self-advocacy by disabled people.

"We need to get together with people of different disabilities and fight for each other's and our rights," he said.

Taking a look at the future, Frieden said because of advances in medical technology and training handicapped people may become normal and normal people, handicapped. "Because computers are doing everything for people from their own homes, people are going to forget how to relate with other people. Social skills training may become the thing for the future," he said.

Some walls down, but the handicapped still face barriers

For America's disabled, much progress has been made toward a barrier-free society, but according to rehabilitation researcher Lex Frieden, much remains to be done.

Frieden, speaking at the Human Resources '83 conference at Southern Illinois University-Carbondale, said great strides have been made in integrating handicapped persons into the community during the past 15 years, but as a society, "We don't know how to deal with disability."

Because of this, he said, many barriers still face the nation's handicapped.

In addition to the architectural obstacles, barriers within the areas of education, employment, health care and communication are also very real problems, Frieden said.

There has been significant improvement in removing those hindrances, he said, but the public still needs to be informed and persuaded that "people with disabilities have a role to play in our society."

The remaining barriers have resulted in the creation of independent living programs, a project Frieden has worked on since the early 1970s.

An independent living program is a residential program designed to meet the physical, vocational, residential, and economic needs of the handicapped population.

Due to the limited alternatives disabled people have, many are confined to institutions or stifled in unproductive home settings. The purpose of an independent living program, Frieden said, is to empower those who presently have no control of their own lives with the ability to create their own future.

Such a program, he said, allows the handicapped to make decisions and assume responsibility for their own lives, while at the same time providing an opportunity to participate actively in the community.

The independent living movement, Frieden explained, resulted from a

group of people who wanted freedom. The number of such programs has grown tremendously from three in 1972 to the present 200. Every state now has such alternative programs and several other countries are also developing and operating similar programs.

Frieden, himself a quadriplegic from a spinal cord injury, said, "It's a travesty that we have to develop independent living programs," but it is essential that realistic options be provided for the handicapped.

For the physically impaired, economic barriers remain quite severe. Fewer than 40 percent of the nation's disabled are employed, with the remainder dependent upon government aid.

It is necessary, Frieden said, to raise the consciousness of the public in order to clear the obstructed career paths.

Large corporations are beginning to promote gainful employment of the disabled, he said, but it must be emphasized that the handicapped "can assume roles of responsibility, not only as workers, but as managers also."

In the future, Frieden said, if the needs of the disabled are to be met, there will have to be more coordination between the federal, state, and local levels of government, which now provide services for the handicapped. Presently, he said, there are over 100 programs for the disabled, but because of bureaucratic obstacles, many of those eligible for financial assistance "get lost in the maze."

As more and more handicapped citizens become participating members of society, they will need to become more aware of their individual rights. Presently, many disabled citizens need to be educated regarding their legal privileges, he said.

Despite the forces which aim to dismantle many of the programs geared for the handicapped, "doors are still being opened," he said. If the disabled citizens of America organize themselves politically and become active in policy-making procedures, their future could be very bright, he said.
