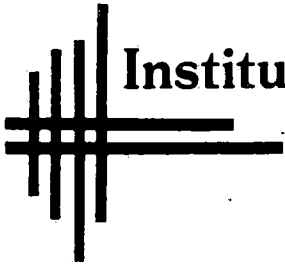


The National Council on the Handicapped is an independent Federal agency comprised of 15 members appointed by the President and confirmed by the Senate. Established by the 95th Congress through Title IV of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 (as amended by Public Law 95-602 in 1978), the Council was initially an advisory body within the Department of Education. However, in 1984, the Council was transformed into an independent agency by the Rehabilitation Act Amendments of 1984 (Public Law 98-221).

The Council is charged with reviewing all laws, programs and policies of the Federal Government affecting disabled individuals and making such recommendations as it deems necessary to the President, the Congress, the Rehabilitation Services Administration (RSA) Commissioner and the National Institute of Handicapped Research (NIHR) Director. Also within the Council's responsibilities are approval of standards concerning Independent Living and Projects With Industry Programs and the preparation of a special report due to Congress in February 1986 which relates to enhancing the productivity and quality of life for disabled Americans.

Whereas many government agencies relate to the needs and concerns of people with disabilities, the National Council on the Handicapped is the only Federal agency with the mandated responsibility to address, analyze, and make recommendations on issues of public policy which affect people with disabilities regardless of age, disability type, perceived employment potential, perceived economic need, specific functional ability, status as a veteran, or other individual circumstances. The Council recognizes its unique opportunity to facilitate independent living and employment opportunities by people with disabilities by assuring a coordinated approach to meeting their needs and eliminating barriers to their active participation in community and family life.

This initiative is designed to broadly explore and demonstrate the efficacy and efficiency of rehabilitation and other disability management strategies.

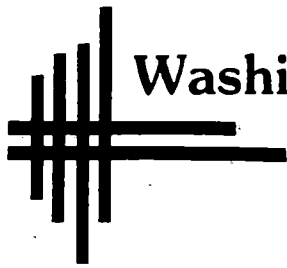
The Institute for Rehabilitation and Disability Management is a joint venture between the Washington Business Group on Health (WBGH) and the National Rehabilitation Hospital (NRH). The WBGH feels that employers need to begin paying close attention to disability costs because they are currently increasing at the same tempo as health care costs were just five years ago. The NRH with its expertise in rehabilitation, hospital administration, and patient care is in a perfect position to work together with the WBGH toward the common goal of promoting effective rehabilitation.

The Institute will bring business leaders together with members of Congress, Administration, academia, hospital officials, and other rehabilitation/disability experts to better educate each other about the economic, social, and societal advantages of well designed and managed rehabilitation.

The Institute's staff will examine the following critical issues:

- . What rehabilitation benefits should be offered to employees, families, and retirees?
- . What are the public, private, and individual costs associated with disability?
- . How can both public and private disability programs be re-designed to encourage early intervention and return-to-work?

The Institute will have a Board of Directors, a WBGH Disability Task Force to analyze relevant legislative proposals, and a National Technical Committee to provide input on all aspects of rehabilitation and disability management.

Willis Goldbeck started the Washington Business Group on Health (WBGH) in 1974 to give major employers a new and credible voice in national health policy. Today, WBGH remains the only national organization dedicated to this task.

Prior to founding the WBGH, Mr. Goldbeck was President of Public Policy Communications, Inc.; Executive Vice President of the Center for Responsive Technology; Project Administrator for CHOICES FOR '76; Special Assistant for Research and Technology (HUD); Correspondent for TIME Magazine; Teacher of Political Science and Coach of Varsity Football and Basketball at the Collegiate School in New York City.

Mr. Goldbeck has also been on the faculty of the New School for Social Research; was a member of the Congressional Urban Study Group; represented the U.S. House of Representatives Banking, Currency & Housing Committee to the UN Conference on Human Settlements; and was selected for the 1978 American Society of Public Administration delegation to the Peoples Republic of China. In 1985, he was the co-leader of a public health study tour of the USSR.

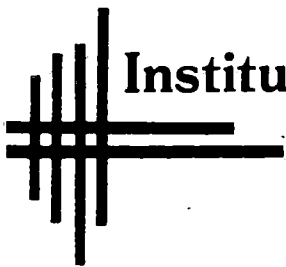

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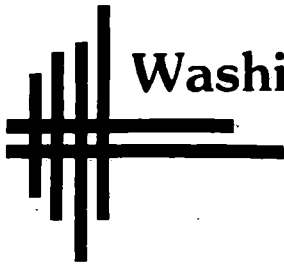

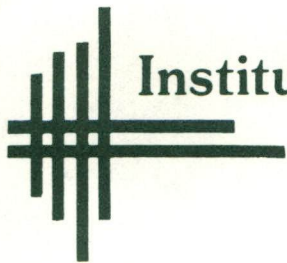
The Council's report draws the following general conclusions:

- o Federal disability programs reflect an over-emphasis on income support and an underemphasis on initiatives for equal opportunity, independence, prevention, and self-sufficiency;
- o More emphasis should be given to federal programs encouraging and assisting private sector efforts to promote opportunities and independence for individuals with disabilities.
- o Disability costs to the Nation are directly related to the extent to which individuals with disabilities realize their full potential and become more independent and self-sufficient.

The council has focused its report on ten major topic areas.

These include: Equal Opportunity Laws, employment disincentives to work under Social Security Laws, prevention of disability, transportation, housing, community based services for independent living, educating children with disabilities, personal assistance, and coordination. Each topic will be discussed in detail here today.

Our intent is to provide a forum for discussion and exchange about federal laws and programs affecting persons with disabilities. We encourage you to take what you learn here today and disseminate it to your various constituencies and networks.

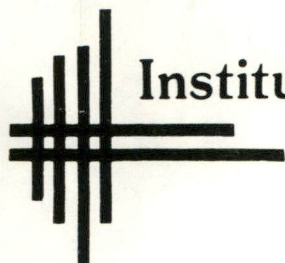

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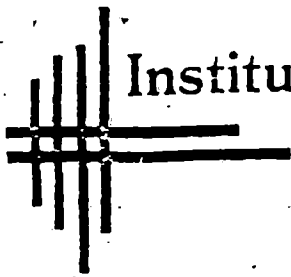

Brief Introduction

The development of the Institute for Rehabilitation and Disability Management responds to a national need for a primary repository of information on rehabilitation and disability management. This initiative is designed to broadly explore and demonstrate the efficacy and efficiency of rehabilitation and other disability management strategies.

The Institute for Rehabilitation and Disability Management is a joint venture between the Washington Business Group on Health (WBGH) and the National Rehabilitation Hospital (NRH). The WBGH feels that employers need to begin paying close attention to disability costs because they are currently increasing at the same tempo as health care costs were just five years ago. The NRH with its expertise in rehabilitation, hospital administration, and patient care is in a perfect position to work together with the WBGH toward the common goal of promoting effective rehabilitation.

The Institute will bring business leaders together with members of Congress, Administration, academia, hospital officials, and other rehabilitation/disability experts to better educate each other about the economic, social, and societal advantages of well designed and managed rehabilitation.

The Institute's staff will examine the following critical issues:

- How can we best demonstrate the cost-effectiveness of rehabilitation?
- What rehabilitation benefits should be offered to employees, families, and retirees?
- What are the public, private, and individual costs associated with disability?
- How can both public and private disability programs be re-designed to encourage early intervention and return-to-work?

The Institute will have a Board of Directors, a WBGH Disability Task Force to analyze relevant legislative proposals, and a National Technical Committee to provide input on all aspects of rehabilitation and disability management.

All About WBGH

The Washington Business Group on Health (WBGH), established in 1974, gives the business community a credible voice in the formulation of federal and state health policy. Started as a member coalition of large corporations, WBGH began with five companies and has grown steadily to include almost 200 of the Fortune 500 companies. WBGH members direct the health care purchasing for more than 50 million of their employees, retirees and dependents.

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WBGH developed research capacity through its institutes to provide long-range planning and analysis with a corporate perspective. The National Council on the Handicapped is an independent Federal agency comprised of 15 members appointed by the President and confirmed by the Senate. Established by the 95th Congress through Title IV of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 (as amended by Public Law 95-602 in 1978), the Council was initially an advisory body within the Department of Education. However, in 1984, the Council was transformed into an independent agency by the Rehabilitation Act Amendments of 1984 (Public Law 98-221).

The Council is charged with reviewing all laws, programs and policies of the Federal Government affecting disabled individuals and making such recommendations as it deems necessary to the President, the Congress, the Rehabilitation Services Administration (RSA) Commissioner and the National Institute of Handicapped Research (NIHR) Director. Also within the Council's responsibilities are approval of standards concerning Independent Living and Projects With Industry Programs and the preparation of a special report due to Congress in February 1986 which relates to enhancing the productivity and quality of life for disabled Americans.

Whereas many government agencies relate to the needs and concerns of people with disabilities, the National Council on the Handicapped is the only Federal agency with the mandated responsibility to address, analyze, and make recommendations on issues of public policy which affect people with disabilities regardless of age, disability type, perceived employment potential, perceived economic need, specific functional ability, status as a veteran, or other individual circumstances. The Council recognizes its unique opportunity to facilitate independent living and employment opportunities by people with disabilities by assuring a coordinated approach to meeting their needs and eliminating barriers to their active participation in community and family life.

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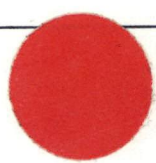

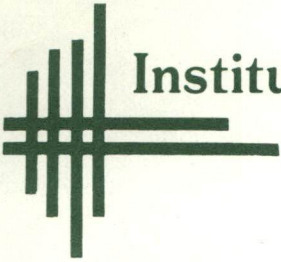
