I. PURPOSE

The purpose of this meeting is to hear the report of Jim Baker on his objectives and plans for the May 10-11 Moscow Ministerial.

II. BACKGROUND

Jim Baker's trip is one in a series of steps that we need to take to seize the initiative on U.S.-Soviet relations. We have prepared a national security directive on the Soviet Union for your signature before Jim's departure. The day after the Moscow Ministerial, your speech at Texas A&M can report the results of our Soviet review and put forward our new approach to Moscow. The Baker trip and your speech should help silence the critics who say that we do not have a strategy for dealing with Gorbachev.

Baker's two day meeting with Soviet Foreign Minister Shevardnadze will be our first substantive meeting with the Soviets on the five areas of concern to us; arms control, regional issues, human rights, transnational and other bilateral issues including economic relations.

As you know, the Soviets are anxious to go back to the arms control table. They will, at a minimum, expect us to set dates for resumption of the Nuclear and Space Talks and the Nuclear Testing Talks and for the next session of the Standing Consultative Commission. This will require your approval. There are some issues of policy reaffirmation or change that will also require your decision.

The expert working groups on regional issues will reconvene and we should take the opportunity, again, to press on

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Central America, Afghanistan, the Middle East, a settlement in Cambodia and implementation of the Namibian accords.

We are beginning discussions with the Soviets for the first time on transnational issues. Cooperation with Moscow on control of international drug trafficking and on protection of the environment is seemingly cost free, but there are some potential problems in collaboration with the Soviets on counterterrorism. As you know, Bill Webster has reservations about exchange of information, fearing compromise of U.S. sources and methods or those of our allies.

The Soviets may press on economic issues, but we are not ready yet to announce any policy initiatives. We are examining the issues more closely and will be able soon to make recommendations to you on next steps in our economic relations with the Soviet Union.

The Soviets are anxious to get going again. They know that the reviews are over and are looking for signals concerning your approach to U.S.-Soviet relations. They will look for reassurances that we want perestroika to succeed and that U.S.-Soviet relations are back on track.

Secretary Baker, Secretary Cheney, Admiral Crowe, Director Webster, Chief of Staff Sununu, National Security Advisor Scowcroft and Deputy National Security Advisor Gates.

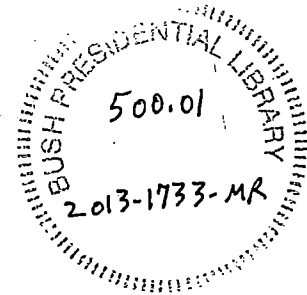

The Oval Office meeting provides an opportunity to hear Secretary Baker's objectives and plans for the Moscow Ministerial. The meeting should give a sense of the tone that Baker intends to take with the Soviets. As you know, the Soviets are anxious to get going again, particularly in arms control. They will also want reassurance that we want their internal reforms to succeed, especially given Secretary Cheney's comments.

We would expect the Secretary to lay out broad objectives in the five areas: arms control, regional issues, human rights, transnational issues and bilateral relations. As you know, the NSC staff had received only the arms control talking points as of Tuesday evening. We do not, therefore, have a good idea of the Secretary's objectives for this Ministerial. You may know better from this morning's breakfast.

Arms Control

The most pressing issues are resumption dates for START, DST, Nuclear Testing Talks and the SCC; reaffirmation of or changes in key elements of our START and D&S positions; our stand on Krasnoyarsk; what to say to the Soviets about chemical weapons, as well as nuclear, chemical and ballistic missile proliferation; and our approach to nuclear testing talks. These issues require Presidential decision.

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There are some conflicts in the arms control approach State is taking in organizing for the Ministerial. They plan not only an arms control working group, but sub-working groups on each of the substantive areas. We are not ready for such detailed discussions, since the policy review is still underway, although there are a few broad principles which we can reaffirm (and which we will work separately with you, as Bob Gates directed). The Soviets will be disappointed by our lack of details, but will be pleased by our willingness to resume NST and nuclear testing talks in June.

You may also wish to raise the issue of putting the stamp of the Bush Administration on all of our arms control negotiations, particularly START.

Regional Issues

The regional working groups will resume in Moscow. The major issue facing U.S.-Soviet relations in Latin America is Soviet policy in Central America. Our problem is to decide what we intend to do if the Soviets ignore our now public linkage of Soviet aid to the Sandinistas to the overall relationship.

Shevardnadze's visit to the Middle East did not signal a helpful shift in Soviet policy on the peace process. We should be prepared for the Soviets to press again on "negative symmetry" in Afghanistan.

The working group on Asia should examine the disconnect between Soviet expressions of support for easing tensions on the Korean peninsula and the Soviet-sponsored modernization of the North Korean armed forces. Soviet policy toward Cambodia, now the primary unresolved issue in Sino-Soviet relations, should be raised as well as our long standing support for return of the Northern Territories to Japan.

The most promising region may be Africa, notwithstanding the Soviets' unhelpful stance on the SWAPO incursion in Namibia. The Soviets have signaled their willingness to discuss the problem in the Horn of Africa in addition to Southern Africa. We could also explore ways to contribute to internal stabilization of the regime in Mozambique.

Transnational Issues

The State Department has been slowly but surely defining the transnational issues agenda through statements to the press and in testimony on the Hill. Cooperation with the Soviets on control of international drug trafficking and on protection of the environment is seemingly cost free, but there are numerous

pitfalls in collaboration with the Soviets on counterterrorism.

Economic Policy

We are not prepared to make any overtures to the Soviets on economic issues. As you know, we are about to examine several key questions, including Jackson-Vanik. The Soviets will undoubtedly press for removal of "discriminatory" practices and granting of MFN. We should say very little on economic issues in Moscow.
