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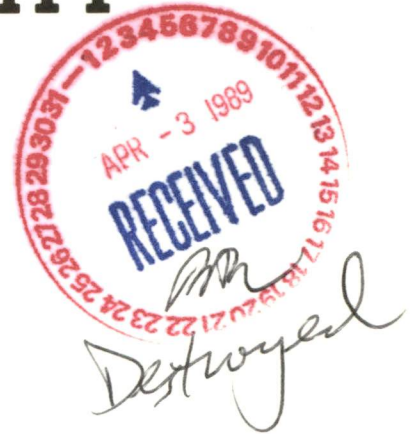

International Counternarcotics Policy

Jim Cicconi returned to me this morning your memorandum to the President concerning our proposed NSR on International Counternarcotics policy (Tab I), explaining that he could not forward it to the President yet in view of significant comments he had received from David Bates (Tab II) and Boyden Gray's office (Tab III).

Most of the comments arising from David Bates' staffing of your memo with the Cabinet Departments would seem to be "bureaucratic" and easily accommodated. They mostly involve choosing between Justice's preference for not listing subordinate operating arms (FBI, DEA) as separate addressees on the President's directive versus Coast Guard's (but not Transportation's) preference for listing them as we had done originally. We do not know what Treasury has in mind by requesting additional consultations before our package goes to the President; I suspect that David Miller could expeditiously work out any problems.

More serious is the "hold" placed by Boyden Gray's office, arising as it does from his "policy" (as distinct from his "legal") view that we are placing insufficient emphasis on the impact of U.S. barriers to non-narcotics imports from Latin American countries. These, he thinks, leave few alternatives for Latin American countries to earn foreign exchange other than through illegal narcotics trafficking. As you can see, John Schmitz's memo is basically a "place holder" while Boyden is out of town.

I believe that the practice of having your recommendations to the President "short-stopped" and "second-guessed" in this way raises important questions of principle. It is, in my experience, extremely unusual, to say the least. Please let me know how you wish to proceed to have the questions raised by David Bates and Boyden Gray's office resolved.

RECOMMENDATION

That you refer the package at Tab I back to David Miller to incorporate the comments received from Jim Cicconi.

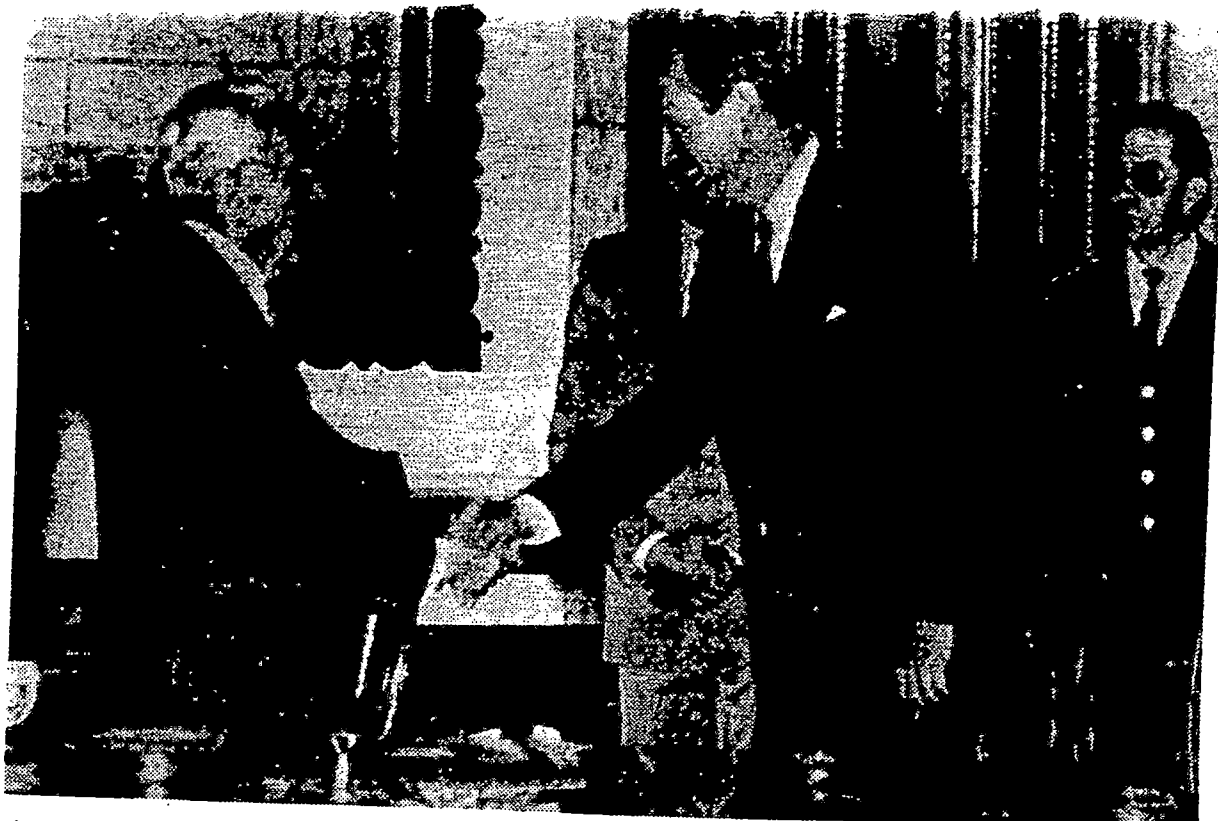

Bolivia Shifts Tactics in Drug Fight

LA PAZ, Bolivia, March 18 — After years of American-assisted efforts to slow cocaine production and export through raids and other enforcement measures, Bolivia has switched its priority to voluntary crop substitution and eradication.

Arguing that force alone will not persuade peasants to quit growing coca, the raw material of cocaine, the Government of President Victor Paz Estenssoro seeks more than \$600 million from wealthy nations to develop agriculture, build roads and install electricity in the main coca region.

The initiative reflects a widespread attitude among Bolivian officials and political leaders that other methods of combating drugs cause too much social and economic damage and increase violent resistance by coca growers and processors.

"We feel the greatest solidarity with those abroad who suffer from the effects of cocaine, but we want them to understand us," said Anibal Aguilar Gómez, the under secretary of agriculture responsible for the new undertaking. "We are also victims of the same problem."

The Route to the U.S.

"Troops and herbicides may seem like the easiest way to face the problem," he said, "but there would be a high cost in social and economic terms. If we cut off the peasants' income they will react, and we want to avoid violence."

Bolivia, the poorest nation in South America, is the second largest grower of coca, after Peru. Most of the Bolivian coca is processed at clandestine laboratories into coca paste or cocaine base, preliminary forms of the drug, then flown to Colombia for final pro-

cessing and distribution to the United States and other consumer nations.

The Drug Enforcement Administration and other United States agencies have been helping Bolivia in anti-drug efforts for more than a decade, but most have been aimed at stopping traffickers or raiding laboratories.

In mid-1986, the United States sent 170 soldiers and 6 Black Hawk helicopters to help the Bolivian drug police raid laboratories. The operation almost halted cocaine exports from Bolivia for a few months and left growers with no market for their leaves.

But when the troops left exports resumed and prices paid for the leaf climbed. A Drug Enforcement Administration spokesman said peasants were now getting \$70 to \$100 for a hundred pounds of leaves. While that is a fraction of what they were receiving five years ago, it is well above the production cost, which he estimated at \$30. The price is said to have fallen to about \$20 a hundred pounds during the 1986 raids.

Attorney General Dick Thornburgh visited La Paz on a fact-finding tour May 7 to see what the Government was doing to stem the drug trade. At a news conference during the visit, he mentioned no new American initiatives and said Bolivia had not asked Washington to send troops back in to help destroy the coca crops.

U.S. Gives \$59 Million

Bolivia already receives more United States aid, for both economic support and anti-drug programs, than any other South American nation. The total in fiscal 1988 was \$59.3 million, and Mr. Aguilar said it was being increased this year. Italy is the second-largest donor to anti-drug programs, having contributed \$60 million for use over five years.

But there is growing insistence here that not enough is earmarked for developing alternative crops and jobs in the Chapare, the tropical rain forest northeast of Cochabamba where most of Bolivia's coca fields are.

An example of the Bolivian view was expressed recently by Gonzalo Sánchez de Lozada, a candidate for President in the May 7 elections and until recently Minister of Planning. While saying Bolivia should "get out of the cocaine business," he called the United States' approach "too Protestant."

"As a Protestant country, it thinks the way to deal with drugs is through repression," he said. "They fail to see that there is a better way through substitution of crops."

He said it was difficult to get financial aid for such programs because American officials felt that it was immoral to give money to coca farmers to help them switch crops.

'Terrorized' by Congress

He said he believed that some in the State Department understood the Bolivian point of view but were "terrorized" by the United States Congress on the issue and "bending over backward" to satisfy its demands for more direct action.

Another leading presidential candidate, Jaime Paz Zamora, said Bolivia was "determined in the fight against narcotics trafficking, but the Bolivian people cannot be obliged to pay the bill that belongs to everyone."

"We are willing to conduct a head-on fight against drug trafficking if it doesn't make us poorer than we are now," he continued. "As long as the Bolivian people don't see any benefit from fighting drug trafficking they won't do it."

Alberto Bonadona, director of planning for the crop substitution program run by Mr. Aguilar, said coca is thought to represent 20 percent of Bolivia's agricultural production and 5 percent of the gross national product, making it difficult to eliminate coca without a replacement. About 400,000 Bolivians are thought to live off coca and cocaine production.

Mr. Aguilar said that the Drug Enforcement Administration and Bolivian drug forces should continue, and even increase, their raids on laboratories and pursuit of traffickers, but that these efforts should be accompanied by expanded programs to help peasants switch crops. That also entails building roads and other infrastructure in the area and finding markets, he said.

HARTFORD, CONNECTICUT
THURSDAY, MARCH 24, 1988

I want to talk to you tonight about drugs, and I want to start out by asking a question... How do you feel about the casual use of drugs? Do you think the use of cocaine is a "victimless crime"?

For those who answer "yes," I ask... What about the distribution chain that provides the cocaine? How do you feel about the New York policeman, Edward Byrne, who was executed last month as he sat in his patrol car? How do you feel about the federal drug agent, Enrique Camarena, who was kidnapped in Mexico and savagely tortured until he died?

How do you feel about Colombia's Attorney General Hoyos, who was assassinated while investigating drug-related judicial corruption... or about Colombia's Justice Minister and 21 judges... all killed for standing up to the narcotraficantes?

How do you feel about our national security when criminal cartels use American drug dollars to bribe and threaten and undermine the fragile democracies of our neighbors to the South?

How do you feel about the drug-related violence and crime that is turning sections of our cities into combat zones... where even city buses require a police escort... where 70 percent of the men arrested for serious crimes test positive for drugs?

How do you feel about the babies who are born damaged for life because their mothers use cocaine... or who are born with AIDS because their mothers used dirty needles for their drugs?

And how do you feel about the attitude that encourages young people to try illegal drugs, to break the law, to get high... only to find that they've bitten off more than they can chew, that their lives are going down the drain, or in far too many cases, into a coffin?

...Like Maryland basketball star Len Bias, headed for stardom with the Boston Celtics... Or, closer to home,

Hartford's own William McKinley, who used to teach at Weaver High -- 34 years old and dead on New Year's Eve, from a cocaine overdose.

If you're like me, you're angry, and you're worried for our country... and our future.

Think of the cost to us... not of the \$2 1/2 billion we spent last year on the federal law enforcement effort against drugs (more than triple the level when we took office)... not of the tens of billions that Americans pay every year for this poison... not of the billions more that are lost to American businesses because their employees are too out of it to do their jobs... Think of the cost to our country of the young lives that are ruined or lost because of drugs. How can you put a price tag on that? More important, how can we stop it?

I have been involved in the federal effort to interdict narcotics since 1982, when the President asked me to head the South Florida Task Force, formed at the request of Miami Citizens Against Crime, to fight the inflow of drugs into this country at a time and a place where it threatened to get out of control.

We brought the military into this fight for the first time -- using our most sophisticated air surveillance equipment to watch for drug smugglers trying to cross our borders. We brought in the intelligence community, which I led in the mid-1970s. We launched a coordinated assault at the federal, state, and local level, and we made some headway... The people of South Florida saw that law enforcement authorities, not criminals, had regained the upper hand.

We built on that success by creating the National Narcotics Border Interdiction System, which I also have had the privilege to lead, to coordinate federal, state, and local law enforcement efforts against drug smuggling nationwide. Seven years ago, these agencies wouldn't even speak to one another.

Seven years ago, only two countries were eradicating drug crops. Today, 23 countries have joined us in this effort.

We've seized record amounts of drugs -- last year, for example, 70 tons of cocaine... 70 tons of a substance that retails for well over \$1,000 an ounce. Over the last seven years, we've seized hundreds of tons of cocaine and tens of thousands of tons of marijuana. Men and women have risked their lives to do this -- and now, in this political season, the demagogues are out there ranting, raving, and denigrating this service to mankind.

We've appointed tougher judges and tougher prosecutors, and they're getting results -- two and a half times as many drug offenders charged, convicted, and sent to prison last year,

compared to 1980. We've increased our conviction rate -- our batting average -- from 75 percent to 84 percent, and the sentences are one-third longer than they were.

And we've made some headway on extraditing foreign suppliers. Carlos Lehder, a top figure in the Colombian drug cartel, is locked up in a Jacksonville jail.

Progress? Yes, but we must do more, much more, to stanch the flood of illegal drugs. Let me throw out some thoughts on where we go from here.

* Last year Congress reduced our proposed budget for the Coast Guard -- the lead agency keeping drug smugglers from our shores -- by \$72 million... to provide more money for Amtrak. What a distorted set of priorities -- cutting back on narcotics enforcement to provide more money for subsidized trains!

The Coast Guard needs those cuts restored, and it needs still more money next year.

* We need to do more to help source countries fight this drug war... with boats, planes, helicopters, training of their personnel. This is not foreign aid... American drug users finance the production of these crops, and we must help finance their eradication.

* Increasingly, drug traffickers, particularly in Latin America, are destabilizing legitimate governments and corrupting enforcement agencies. These developments pose a substantial threat to our national security. As President, I will seek a summit meeting of all the countries in this hemisphere to discuss the threat and the steps we can take together to combat it.

* We should also explore the possibility of creating an international antidrug effort, under the auspices of the United Nations or another multilateral agency... because drug trafficking is a problem that respects no borders. Such a force could respond to requests from source countries to eradicate drug crops and destroy clandestine laboratories.

* Domestically, I will seek stronger penalties for drug offenses. Many of our political opponents criticize the anti-drug effort, but how many of them have been out front for mandatory sentencing, tougher penalties for those who poison our kids through drugs? Bob Dole has proposed the death penalty for drug kingpins, and I agree. The same penalty should be available for those who commit drug-related murders. These people are dealing in death, and that's what they should get.

* We should crack down on drug users -- from the kid on the street to the beautiful people in Beverly Hills. We should not just turn our heads. Our goal should be to send them a message... not just to punish, but to deter.

In San Diego, U.S. Attorney Pete Nunez has a policy of "no tolerance." He prosecutes any motorist caught crossing the border with illegal drugs, no matter how small the amount. The offenders' cars are confiscated on the spot.

In New Jersey, drivers lose their cars and their licenses if they're arrested with drugs in their cars.

State Attorney General Cary Edwards says students' eyes glaze over when he warns them they could go to jail for drug use, because they know that's unlikely for young first offenders. But they snap to attention when he tells them they won't be able to drive.

* Fundamentally, the drug problem in America is not one of supply, but of demand. Let's face reality: As much as we do to bust the smugglers and the dealers, as much as we do to eradicate the crops and interdict the flow of drugs into this country... as long as Americans are willing to pay billions of dollars for illegal drugs, somebody somewhere in the world will provide them. It's as simple as that.

If we believe in personal freedom, we must believe in personal responsibility. Unless we listen and unless we act, drug use will continue unabated.

This fight will never be won by law enforcement alone; it will only be won by a change in public attitude... from tolerance to intolerance -- of drug use and drug users. Nancy Reagan knows this well, and she has courageously led the way -- in the face of wisecracks and even some ridicule at the outset -- by telling our kids to "Just Say No."

Has it made a difference? You bet it has. The latest survey of our high school seniors shows the lowest levels of illegal drug use since the survey began 13 years ago.

We have to encourage a war on drugs that is not conducted just at our nation's borders, but from house to house, neighborhood by neighborhood, community by community... a guerrilla war that involves all of us together, joining forces to speak the truth -- that drugs are evil, that they ruin and end young lives... that drug dealers are murderers and should be treated as such.

If we're going to win the war on drugs, we have to win it on the home front. That means you and me, all of us... talking to our friends and our colleagues at work... and most important, talking to our children and our grandchildren... about living life and not wasting it.

It means helping and supporting the principals who are trying to keep order in our schools and get drugs and violence out. It means teaching our kids respect for the law, and the difference between right and wrong -- in our homes, in our churches, and in our schools. And as parents, it means setting the boundaries and providing the discipline that our kids so desperately need.

And so I ask you tonight to join me, to work toward this goal, and to join this campaign of intolerance... intolerance of drug use... intolerance of inaction... intolerance of those who are tolerant. If we join together, we can win this terrible war.

EXCERPTS OF REMARKS FOR VICE PRESIDENT GEORGE BUSH HACKENSACK CHAMBER OF COMMERCE HACKENSACK, NEW JERSEY THURSDAY, MAY 26, 1988

Yesterday morning, I spoke at the West Point commencement. Rain couldn't dampen that marvelous, moving moment of cadets becoming officers in the United States Army -- the pageantry and the honor, the pride and the patriotism, the caps in the air -- so I hope you'll forgive me if I speak today in military terms, about a problem that is much on my mind, if I give you a field report on the war on drugs.

We've been fighting this war for some time, and with growing intensity. I've been involved in the interdiction effort -- trying to stop the flow of drugs across our borders -- since 1982.

We've had some successes. Over the last seven years, law enforcement agents have seized hundreds of tons of cocaine and tens of thousands of tons of marijuana. A Rand study estimated that the price of cocaine last year would have been one-third lower were it not for our efforts.

Last year, we seized 70 tons of cocaine -- 70 tons of a substance that retails for well over \$1,000 an ounce. Total street value -- \$2.25 billion.

But that's only a fraction of what's getting through, and a look at the battlefield casualties shows the problem is getting worse where it really matters -- in the lives of our people.

Last year in Maryland a Conrail engineer allowed his freight train to roll through several trackside stop signals, into the path of an Amtrak passenger train with more than 600 people aboard. 16 people died. Drugs did that.

Last week my wife, Barbara, went to Harlem Hospital, and held in her arms a child dying of AIDS... one of about 30 "boarder babies" who live at the hospital. They don't have parents any more -- their parents threw them away. The nurses call them "throwaway kids." The parents are drug addicts, that's how they got AIDS! The children are going to die, alone, in a little white crib in a big city hospital. Drugs did that.

In Queens, New York, a few months ago a young policeman guarding a grand jury witness was assassinated. It was a narcotics case. He was shot in the head as he sat in his patrol car outside the witness's house. He would have been a great cop, but now he's dead. His name was Eddie Byrne. Drugs did that.

Dramatic examples, all of them, of the impact of drugs. But just as dramatic in its own way is the fact that drugs have had a direct and personal impact on almost every family in America.

We've got to do more about this crisis. We've got to take some big steps. If elected President, I intend to fight this war, to win it, and to end it.

Last week I announced I will put my Vice President in charge of a Cabinet-level Council of War. The Vice President will take the lead on every aspect of federal drug policy -- interdiction, law enforcement, education, and treatment. Call it czar -- call it whatever. The Vice President will have the power and the authority from the President that is required to do to the job.

I will not dwell here on the bureaucratic details of how that will work, but suffice it to say: We will establish clear lines of authority and accountability. I will address the detailed restructuring later on.

Every member of the Cabinet and every agency head will be assigned the task of fighting drugs and will be responsible to the Vice President for results.

We must fight this drug war on all four fronts at once:

- Shrinking the supply by destroying crops and labs, and by patrolling our borders vigorously;
- Increasing the certainty and severity of punishment, for dealers and users alike;
- Deterring drug use with testing and with education that begins early in life and continues on into the work place;
- And finally, rehabilitating those who need help to escape addiction's trap.

All four initiatives have a common objective -- persuading more Americans not to use drugs.

Today I want to focus on steps we can take toward stopping the production of drugs where they're grown and stopping the consumption of drugs at home.

Our efforts to date have concentrated mostly on stemming the flow of drugs into the United States, and arresting and punishing those involved in their distribution.

Our successes in law enforcement, including the recent conviction of Carlos Lehder, of the notorious Medellin Colombian drug cartel, have put many drug dealers behind bars.

I applaud those efforts. I'm for tougher penalties for those who poison our kids with drugs. For major traffickers, for those who commit drug-related murders, the penalty should be death -- and that's a statement that you won't hear from Mike Dukakis or Jesse Jackson. And we should crack down hard on those who get children to do their dirty work.

But if we're going to move from holding our own in this war to winning it, we must turn our attention from the middle of the drug flow -- the dealers -- to the beginning and the end -- the producers and the users -- because this is not a pipeline we're talking about, controlled by a single shutoff valve -- it is a flood, cascading in through our thousands of miles of open border, by land and sea and air, sucked in by the prospect of enormous financial reward.

Some propose that we "seal off our borders." We can do better there. But do you know the biggest single problem at New York's Attica state prison, heavily fortified Attica prison? Illegal drugs. If we can't keep drugs out of Attica, that shows you the severity of the problem of interdiction.

Let there be no misunderstanding: Our military can make a contribution, but it cannot win this war alone. Neither can the Coast Guard, the Customs Service, the judiciary, or local law enforcement officers. This is a war that everyone must fight together -- parents, teachers, brothers, sisters, preachers, coaches, journalists, screenwriters. As President, I will honor no exemptions from this draft.

Our military forces have already made a substantial contribution to our interdiction effort, and today they are being called upon to do more. Their primary target should be the production of drugs abroad.

The logic is simple: The cheapest and safest way to eradicate narcotics is to destroy them at their source. Put those drugs on a Cessna or a speedboat, and the costs of interdiction escalate dramatically, even as our effectiveness declines.

We need to wipe out crops wherever they are grown and take out labs wherever they exist.

We should create an international strike force to hit back, quick and hard and often, at foreign drug operations. The intelligence community is pulling together, but stepped-up intelligence is essential in this effort.

We know a lot already. We know where the fields are, and the laboratories, and the air strips. All we need is the will to act and the cooperation of the source countries.

To get that cooperation, we must first recognize that some countries in this hemisphere have become economically addicted to drugs. We must help them reduce their dependence, and I will encourage that withdrawal -- at a hemispheric summit that I will call as soon as I take office.

If we deny these countries the opportunity to profit from legitimate agriculture and industry, we can hardly be surprised that their people turn to the lucrative market for coca.

We can do much to help our neighbors diversify. For example, we should push forward once again on the Caribbean Basin Initiative -- a forward-looking program of economic action and opportunity for the region.

But all these steps will only slow the flow of drugs. They will not win the war. The war can only be won at home, and only by extending our reach to the actual users.

As long as Americans are willing to spend billions of dollars for illegal drugs, there will be suppliers. But cut off the flow of middle-class money to the drug dealers, and watch them disappear.

The first step is education -- conveying the message through our schools and our churches and our media -- and, most importantly, through our homes -- that drugs are not cool, drugs are evil, drugs will chew you up and spit you out, and ultimately, drugs will kill you.

I've seen this kind of program in action -- programs like DARE, which started in the Los Angeles public schools and spread to more than 20 states around the country, led by police officers who recognize that what they do in the classroom to stop drugs is as important in the long run as what they do in the streets.

But this anti-drug message cannot stand by itself. It must be part of a larger expression of the values that we value -- values like self-discipline, courage, and character. These are the keys to resisting drugs.

We must do a better job of teaching that citizenship in a free society demands as much in the way of individual responsibility as it offers in free choice and the pursuit of happiness.

We can start this lesson by treating drug use as the crime it is -- not legalizing it, as some have suggested. That's exactly the wrong way to go.

To those who say drugs should be legalized, I say this -- legalization is just another word for surrender and surrender is not in this American's vocabulary.

In some communities, casual drug use is treated less seriously than jaywalking. That's got to stop. There's nothing casual about the drug trade that's tearing our cities apart, and drug users are the fuel of the fire, whether they live in the suburbs or downtown.

The new "zero tolerance" policy -- the one that's led to the seizure of cars and planes and yachts -- is important not because it will stop the flow of drugs into this country, but because it sends the right message: If you're using drugs, you're abusing your country.

Some call this policy controversial. I think it makes great sense. If people can lose their cars for parking violations, surely they should lose them for carrying drugs. "Zero tolerance" should be the policy of every state in the Union.

Drug possession should lead to arrest and a sentence. The sentence doesn't have to be jail time, automatically. There are other alternatives -- a hefty fine, suspending a license, putting a picture in the paper, the way they do some places to discourage prostitution.

We require counseling for drunk drivers; we should do the same for drug users. No program has had a more powerful impact on Barbara and me than Straight. We witnessed the results this program can have on young people and their families, and we will never forget it.

But failing to stay drug-free after arrest should mean time in jail. The message should be unambiguous: If you won't stop, then we'll stop you.

To take these steps, we need modest increases in our law enforcement resources -- funds for new prisons and for new personnel at the FBI, the DEA, and U.S. Attorneys' offices nationwide. Yet every time we've asked, Congress has just said no. I say, put your money where your mouth is.

Employers, too, can play a major role in discouraging drug use, with programs of testing and follow-up. The military has such a program, and it has cut the incidence of drug use by two-thirds in the last eight years -- from 27 percent to 9 percent.

To you here in the Chamber, let me say, these programs don't cost, they pay. Absenteeism improves, productivity rises, and accident rates drop -- dramatically.

Testing for drug use should be required of anyone responsible for the public safety -- airline pilots, for example, or prison guards. Indeed, testing should be required of anyone whose actions at work could put others at risk.

OSHA requires safe machinery in the workplace; we need safe workers, too.

I will make adoption of drug-free programs a condition of obtaining federal contracts, and I will ask the states to do the same.

There are those who say that drug testing is an invasion of individual rights. But the use of drugs is not just a personal matter, like buying a dress or a car -- it's a matter that affects the health and safety of others. We've run out of patience, and we've run out of pity. And it's time to say: We've had enough.

We need to say it for the kids in the audience today, and for the kids in tough neighborhoods who want to go to school in peace, and for the kids that Barbara held in her arms the other day, those infants born of addicts who will never leave the hospital alive -- because of drugs.

I want to close by reading you a letter that was published recently in the Miami Herald. It was handed to the publisher as he visited the Dade County Jail, and it was signed "Another Crack Addict." Here is what it said:

"Cocaine is death. Anyone who has tried it knows what I mean. I was a golden boy with looks, extreme intelligence, charisma, and plenty of everything, transformed into a common junkie doing anything and everything to feed my vicious habit. In the past six years, I have gone from winning gold medals in high school to sleeping in alleys and fighting daily to stay alive and stay high just one more day.

"I lay cringing and watching cocaine steal my life and dreams from me. I am but 19 years old, and cocaine has pushed me to prostitution, crime, self-hatred, embarrassment, and utter despair.

"My last ride on the crack express found me alone in a sleazy motel with \$200 worth of crack, bought with stolen money, trying to overdose. I merely ended up vomiting all over myself. By the end of the night, I was begging God to let me die.

"I knew many will read this and discard it, but, if my message can help save the life of one person out there, I'm satisfied." My crack use is what brought me to the deepest of bottoms, and I have used it only for five months. Please listen and learn, don't discard this and die.

"Please listen and learn, don't discard this and die." Let us, each of us, learn that message and pass it along. Bush will make adoption of drug-free programs a condition of obtaining federal contracts and will ask
