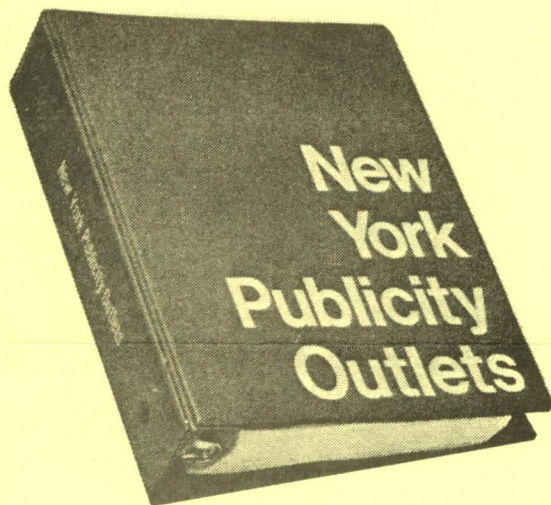

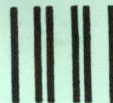

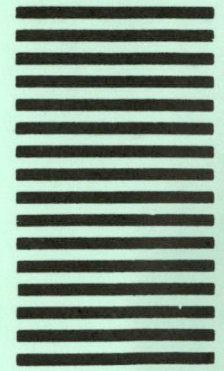

Was this a deliberate decision on your part or the result of oversight? If the former, we ask you to reconsider; if the latter, please treat this as an important reminder.



**A**Sslicit drugs devastate not only the inner cities of the nation but the inner lives of millions of American families, "The Cocaine Kids: The Inside Story of a Teenage Drug Ring" and "Addicted: Kids Talking About Drugs in Their Own Words" offer sorely needed information from the front lines. They shed light on two distinct phenomena: adolescents as the backbone of the retail drug trade, and adolescents as addicts.

For nearly five years Terry Williams, a sociologist, spent much of his time with a group of teen-age drug dealers at after-hours clubs, discos, crack houses, street corners and their homes and places of "business." The fruit of that work, "The Cocaine Kids," provides a remarkable close-up view of the drug trade in New York's Spanish Harlem. Mr. Williams, a senior scholar at the Center for Social Research at the City University of New York, and a recipient of a MacArthur Foundation grant to study the culture of housing projects, is clearly a warm and engaging man who earned the trust of the crew of seven young men and one woman. They allowed him to observe them as they cut, mixed and sold their illicit wares. They knew he was taking notes on their lives and they let him know their secrets. In return, he "was kind of a big brother, able to help with homework and even babysitting, but most of all a willing and sympathetic listener."

Perhaps the most startling conclusion that emerges from Mr. Williams's ethnography is how much these young drug traders conform to mainstream values, including the work ethic, and how deep is their belief in the American dream, even as the communities in which they live are being shattered by the effects of drugs. The "cocaine kids," aged 14 to 19 when we meet them, seven Dominicans and one black, are willing to work hard (sometimes 24 hours a day and 7 days a week), maintain self-discipline and risk their lives in

the search for power, respect, prestige and wealth.

Unable to extract from family, school and community the skills, credentials, connections and opportunities to compete successfully in the regular economy, these youngsters have found a way to use their entrepreneurial talents. Through the drug trade they have been able to make a living, and to obtain status, prestige and proof that they can succeed at something.

Mr. Williams's detailed observations yield a fascinating picture of an underground economy that is remarkably similar to the world of respectable commerce. Moving up requires hard work, skill, intelligence and luck. Successful dealers and distributors generate repeat business, limit their own consumption, keep accurate records and avoid arrest. "A kid who can routinely handle money, control personal use of cocaine, deal with buyers, and control a weapon, may make it out of the street and into the elite world of the super dealer."

Max, the leader of the gang, worked his way up slowly. "I had to convince people I could do it. I didn't have my hand out for no charity. I worked hard to get established."

"Selling coke is just like any other business," says Masterrap, second in command of the crew. "You gotta work hard, stay on your toes, protect what's yours," he says, and not mess up "with silly matters." Anyone who gives away or uses too much cocaine or parties too much doesn't last in the business. Self-indulgent behavior and freebasing — smoking base cocaine — are grounds for dealers to reject potential recruits.

We learn how the attraction of the drug business extends beyond its "flash and dazzle" and the chance to make big money. It also serves as "a 'safety net' of sorts, a place where it is always possible to make a few dollars."

What makes "The Cocaine Kids" particularly valuable is that Mr. Williams combines his talents as a keen observer with thoughtful, sophisticated analysis. He shows how the drug trade has become for many adolescents a thoroughly institutionalized social and economic system, shaped by powerful outside forces. The current prevalence of "crack" — base cocaine — is a result of a 1983 cocaine supply glut in foreign countries that led to price cuts and the search for new consumers; the centrality of teen-agers in today's drug economy is

a result of vastly harsher penalties for drug traders over the age of 18.

Most important, Mr. Williams makes clear that the drug trade flourishes in direct response to the absence of legitimate opportunity. That is why its ranks are filled with minority children from poor families and from neighborhoods where the future looks forever bleak. These youngsters cannot see a future in lawful pursuits, or if they do, they cannot imagine a legitimate entry point. If you want to get into a legal business, says Masterrap, dealing is the way to get start-up money. Charlie, the only black in the crew, also sees the drug world as a stepping stone. He says his parents wanted him "to at least finish college. . . . I don't plan to be in this business forever; I've got potential to do better, and I will. But right now, the thing is to make some money. After I do that, then I can think about college and all that."

Mr. Williams's eye-opening account should be widely read, for it provides some of the understanding that could help this nation to formulate the complex policies and programs to assure that the inner-city youngsters coming of age in the 1990's will not be doomed to repeat the sad struggle of the cocaine kids.

The lives chronicled in "Addicted" are in striking contrast to those of the cocaine kids. ## Ethnography in Washington Heights

Terry Williams arrived in New York City by bus in 1966. He came from McComb, Miss., scene of much violence during the civil rights movement. Emerging from the Port Authority Bus Terminal he saw 42d Street, with its combination of glitter, grime and crime, and felt a spark of curiosity, the awakening of what he now calls "a sociological imagination."

Today, Mr. Williams is a senior scholar at the Center for Social Research at the City University of New York, with offices on — 42d Street. Looking down at a different stretch of the same bustling street in a recent interview, he remembered wondering "Who are all those people and what are they doing?"

Over the years he studied after-hours clubs and wrote "about prisoners, and then the Black

Panther Party folk," he said. Still calling himself a "country boy," Mr. Williams devoted four years to research in the Washington Heights neighborhood where he lives for "The Cocaine Kids," his third book, just as the cocaine business turned into the crack epidemic.

He describes his research technique as an "applied sociological method that is more a cousin to cultural anthropology," adding "I've only been frightened once or twice." With William Kornblum, he is working on a new book about the lives of black and Hispanic youth in Manhattan public housing projects. "We are finding that housing projects are stable and it is the community around them that is falling apart," Mr. Williams said.

I would also have welcomed some discussion of whether the desperate circumstances (drug-related seizures, overdoses, destitution, prison sentences and suicide attempts) of these youngsters prior to successful treatment seem to be a necessary precursor, or whether better prevention, treatment and rehabilitation options might have averted some of the misery they both endured and caused. Nevertheless, the inside look we are offered is illuminating and gripping.

Joel Engel's interviews and Terry Williams's extensive observations and analysis will both contribute to our understanding. Americans urgently need to know more about every aspect of the destruction wrought by illicit drugs. In the absence of greater understanding and wiser action, including substantial investment in powerful social alternatives to drug using and trading, drug-related casualties — ranging from random shootings and even murder to addicted and abandoned babies and children — will continue to mount. □

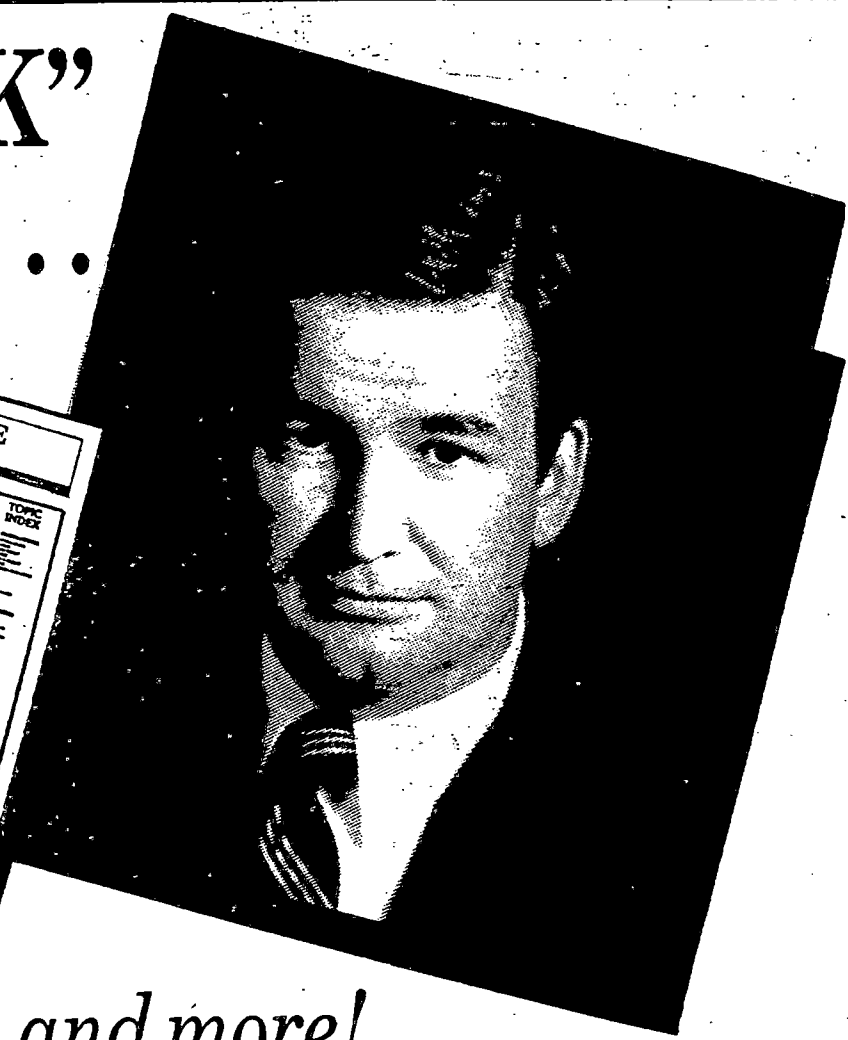
