

Seated on the dias for our Dinner will be the two Senators and fourteen Members of the House from New Jersey, the nominal honorees of the evening. Seated also at the head table will be presiding officers of each House of the New Jersey Legislature, and a number of the Officers and Directors of our organization, who make up the leadership of the New Jersey business community. The Chaplain of the House will offer the Invocation and contingents from the military will present colors and provide appropriate music.

The speaking program following the Dinner will be quite brief and limited to short, informal remarks by Senators Bradley and Lautenberg, Congressman Robert Roe, senior of New Jersey House members. Governor Kean will offer greetings to the Legislature from the people of New Jersey. The underlying theme of this 1989 affair will be "New Jersey — The Invention State."



Mr. Consentino informed me that they will prepare a special base for both eagles, so that our inscription can be placed on the base. I told him we would like to have the inscription read:



SUBJECT: NEW JERSEY CHAMBER OF COMMERCE DROP BY

This memo summarizes the scenario for the New Jersey Chamber of Commerce Drop By on Thursday, February 2, 1989. The event will take place in the Sheraton Ballroom of the Washington Sheraton Hotel at 7:45 pm.

There will be 1,500 seated guests who will have finished dinner. THE PRESIDENT will be met by Mr. William Faherty, Chamber Executive, and will be escorted to off-stage announcement area. Following Ruffles and Flourishes, THE PRESIDENT will proceed directly to the Podium where he will be welcomed by Chamber President Robert V. VanFossan. THE PRESIDENT will then present Governor Thomas A. Kean, Governor of New Jersey, and Secretary Nicholas Brady, porcelain American Eagles, manufactured especially for THE PRESIDENT by the Edward Marshall Boehm company. THE PRESIDENT will then make brief remarks before departing.

NICHOLAS F. BRADY SECRETARY OF THE TREASURY

Nicholas F. Brady became the 68th Secretary of the Treasury on September 15, 1988.

Secretary Brady served in the United States Senate from April 20, 1982 through December 27, 1982. During that time he was a member of the Armed Services Committee and the Banking, Housing and Urban Affairs Committee.

In 1984 President Reagan appointed Secretary Brady Chairman of the President's Commission on Executive, Legislative and Judicial Salaries. He has also served on the President's Commission on Strategic Forces (1983), the National Bipartisan Commission on Central America (1983), the Commission on Security and Economic Assistance (1983), and the Blue Ribbon Commission on Defense Management (1985). Most recently, Secretary Brady chaired the Presidential Task Force on Market Mechanisms (1987).

Secretary Brady's career in the banking industry spans 34 years. He joined Dillon, Read & Co. Inc. in New York in 1954, rising to Chairman of the Board. He has been a Director of the NCR Corporation, the MITRE Corporation, and the H. J. Heinz Company, among others.

He has also served as a trustee of Rockefeller University and a member of the Board of The Economic Club of New York. He is a member of the Council on Foreign Relations, Inc. He is a former trustee of the Boys' Club of Newark.

Mr. Brady was born April 11, 1930 in New York City. He was educated at Yale University (B.A., 1952) and Harvard University (M.B.A., 1954). He and his wife, Katherine, have four children.

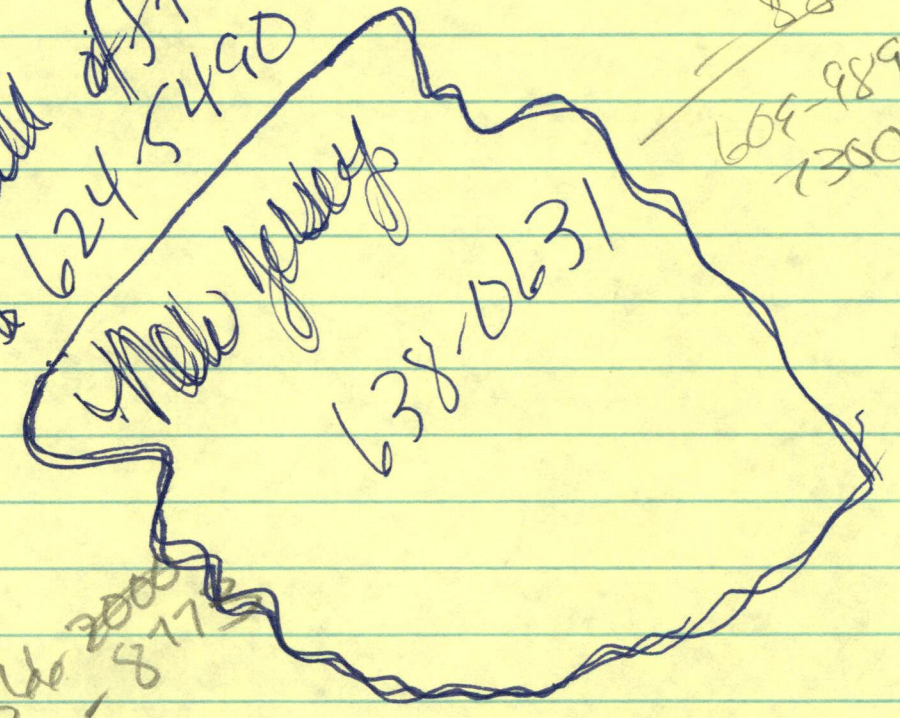
