SULTANS

1. Phoenician and Carthaginian colonies from the 8th - 6th b.c. centuries
2. Roman rule begins in 218 b.c. byzantines
3. Arabs invade Malta in 870 a.d. language
4. Norman conquest in 1090 advance legal and governmental systems
5. The Ottoman Turks in 1523 took control of the islands by paying an annual tribute of one falcon to Charles V of Spain.  
Turks lay siege to Malta in 1565  
In 1530, it was ceded to Order of the Hospital of St. John of Jerusalem ( the Knights of Hopitallers), a religious and military order of the Roman Catholic Church. Malta became a fortress and under the Knights Grand Master, Jean de la Valette, successfully withstood the Ottoman siege of 1565
6. French (Napoleon) take Malta in 1798, but the French presence was short-lived, and the Treaty of Amiens returned the island to the Knights in 1802.
7. British in control 1800 - 1964  
The Maltese protested and acknowledged Great Britain's sovereignty, subject to certain conditions incorporated in a Declaration of Rights. The constitutional change was ratified by the Treaty of Paris in 1814. The island flourished during the Crimean War and favorably affected by the opening of the Suez Canal in 1869. Self-government was granted in 1929 on a dyarchical basis and revoked in 1936 due to a battle over the official language -- English, Italian, Maltese. During WWII, the islands repelled the Axis powers against severe odds, having been one of the most heavily bombed targets of the conflict. As a result, it was awarded the George Cross, Britain's highest civilian decoration. Self-government was granted in 1947, revoked in 1959, and restored in 1962.
8. On September 21, 1964, Malta finally achieves complete independence from the British Commonwealth. It becomes a republic on December 13, 1974.

HISTORIC BAY

MARSAXLOKK -- The Turkish forces invaded Malta in 1565 from the shores of this village. Here also landed the troops of Napoleon to whom the knights surrendered in 1798. In this harbor lies the largest fishing fleet of the island.
