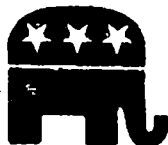

Thank you, Kay, for that wonderful introduction.

((Acknowledgements)). ((It's great to be here tonight at the Red Lion Inn. I heard you Cornhusker fans were enthusiastic, but do you name all your inns after the Big Red? \\\))

I'm delighted to be here today on behalf of your great Republican ticket -- Kay Orr for Governor \\\ Hal Daub for Senate \\\ and Ally Milder for Congress. \\\ They say good luck comes in threes, and I think this may be a very lucky year for the people of Nebraska. \\\

And come Election Day, the opposition's luck is going to run out. That's because they're up against some stiff competition at the polls. We've got a strong Nebraska delegation in Washington, and we're going to keep it that way. Virginia Smith and Doug Bereuter have been doing a phenomenal job -- but they won't hesitate to tell you we need more Republican support. So on November 6, let's make our Nebraska delegation in the House solid Republican -- and let's elect Ally Milder to the U.S. Congress.\\

And of course, there's our future Senator, Hal Daub. I've known him for almost twenty years now, and I know this: Hal Daub has made a difference -- as a lawyer, businessman and four-term Congressman. And he'll make an even bigger difference as the

next Senator for the state of Nebraska. I think everyone here agrees with me: we need Hal Daub in the United States Senate. \\

And thirdly, I'm here to salute the great Governor of the State of Nebraska -- Kay Orr. And from those posts in the desert of Saudi Arabia and the glare of the Persian Gulf, our G.I.s will be sending in their absentee ballots. In a year that has seen the promise of democracy grow -- from Moscow to Managua -- the least we can do is exercise our own right to vote. Let's make our country proud and get out the vote on November 6.

From the banks of the Missouri to the border of Wyoming, Nebraskans have a proud legacy, one of greatness begun under the pioneers. As the Cornhusker fight song goes, "There's no other place like Nebraska." So let's keep Nebraska great -- and let's keep it Republican. \\ Let's make it "Four More for Governor Orr" -- and let's send Hal Daub and Ally Milder to Washington. We need them, and America needs them. \\

President Lobbies GOP

Bush Going on TV To Push Budget

Washington — President Bush said he would give a televised address to the nation at 8 p.m. CDT tonight to press his case for a \$500 billion deficit-cutting package.

Bush announced the speech himself as he met in the White House with a group of business leaders as the White House launched a major effort to sell the bipartisan package unveiled Sunday.

The White House said Bush's speech to the nation would last about 10 minutes.

Earlier, he met with a group of skeptical and undecided Republican House members. Some participants at the meeting said that several lawmakers urged Bush to give a televised address to the nation.

"This budget agreement is our last best chance to get the federal budget deficit under control," Bush told the business leaders. "You can pick the package apart, but you cannot realistically put a better package together."

Bush said it was important for Congress to act and act soon on this vital legislation.

"I don't want to sound sanctimonious about this, but I was elected to govern," he said.

Lawmakers who met with the president said that deep divisions remain in Congress on the measure.

"I'm undecided. So's the nation," Rep. Robert Dornan, R-Calif., told The Associated Press after the first of three

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200 at Central Join Protest Over Clothes

At least 200 Central High School students walked out of their classes Tuesday morning and gathered on the football practice field to protest Omaha School District guidelines banning gang symbols and certain forms of dress.

Most of the student protesters filtered back inside the school building after a rumor began circulating that the administration would expel them for walking out.

Dozens of students then gathered in Central's interior courtyard and confronted school administrators with their objections to the guidelines that ban clothes that can be indicators of gang relationships.

The guidelines are being enforced at some schools but not at Central. The Omaha school board voted Monday night to review the guidelines.

About two dozen students remained on the football field at least

sessions between Bush and GOP lawmakers.

Rep. Mickey Edwards, R-Okla., said Bush had not changed his mind and he still was likely to vote against the package.

But Rep. Thomas Coleman, R-Mo., said he was persuaded by the president to support the package. "It's the only ball game in town," he said. "If this goes down, you're going to see chaos," he said.

Cuts Put Off

In its two-day life span, the plan has drawn barbs from lawmakers — Democrats and Republicans — wary of voting for a record amount of tax increases and spending cuts in an election year.

The alternative to a successful budget deal is the imposition of up to \$105.7 billion in automatic spending cuts under the Gramm-Rudman law.

The cuts, which were to have taken effect Monday, were at least temporarily avoided when Bush and congressional leaders announced Sunday a deal to raise taxes and cut spending to slash the deficit by \$40 billion in fiscal year 1991, which began Monday, and by \$50 billion over five years.

Missing from the list of those invited to the White House Tuesday was one of the most outspoken critics of the compromise, House Republican Whip Newt Gingrich, R-Ga.

'Talking to Everybody'

However, spokesman Marlin Fitzwater told AP that nothing should be read into the fact that Gingrich's name had been omitted.

Gingrich rejected the combination of spending cuts and tax increases Monday, saying the plan "will kill jobs (and) weaken the economy. I think that we need to do better than this."

Bush already talked to Gingrich, Fitzwater said, "and we'll talk to him again."

"We're talking to everybody," Fitzwater said. "There are a lot of people who disagree with this, a lot of people have trouble with it, and they need to be convinced. And we're doing our best."

"Everybody knew this deficit-reduction agreement was an ugly duckling," said Sen. James Sasser, D-Tenn., chairman of the Senate Budget Committee. "Nobody expected it to sprout wings and fly like a swan."

But Bush put an optimistic face on

prospects of approval. "It will all work out. Everybody will do what's right," he told reporters.

Congressional leaders planned a series of votes over the next three weeks to etch the compromise plan into law. But reluctance to support the package comes from members of both parties.

Republicans are leery of its \$134 billion in new taxes on gasoline, alcohol, tobacco, airline tickets, incomes of the wealthy and other items. They also complained that defense cuts of up to \$182 billion were too deep and that domestic programs were not pared enough.

Rep. Bill McCollum, R-Fla., who said he would oppose the plan, called the accord "a pro-Democrat negotiated budget deal" and said Bush "got the short stick in this whole process."

"I think the Democrats basically extorted the president into accepting a recession package," said Rep. Duncan Hunter, R-Calif. "That's precisely what it is, and we should vote it down."

Democratic Dissent

Numerous Democrats also don't like the package's \$105 billion in spending reductions for benefit programs such as Medicare and the fact that many of the taxes — such as those on gasoline and alcohol — take a deep bite out of poor peoples' incomes.

"This tax deal stinks," Rep. James Traficant, D-Ohio, said on the House floor. "Let me remind this body that mom and dad, the beer drinkers, didn't get us into this mess. It was champagne guzzlers in the Pentagon, and today they're laughing their brass off."

"I do not think the agreement meets the fairness test, and I will have to oppose the agreement," said Rep. Joseph Brennan, D-Maine. "It results in an unfair burden being placed on the backs of working-class Americans and is especially tough on our older citizens."

And lawmakers of both parties from cold-weather states are furious over the plan's inclusion of a tax on home heating oil.

Senate Passage Predicted

While some House Republicans abandoned the deficit reduction ship, Senate Republicans climbed aboard and predicted passage despite the proposal's call for \$134 billion in new taxes over five years and its lack of a capital gains tax cut.

Hoagland Worried by Changes In Business Investment Plan

Washington — Rep. Peter Hoagland, D-Neb., said Tuesday that "there is cause for considerable alarm" about the way congressional leaders and the Bush administration altered his proposal to encourage investments in small businesses.

"Our proposal was like a Piper Cub and they've put afterburners on it," Hoagland said.

He said his proposal, which originated in the Senate with Sen. Dale Bumpers, D-Ark., was not intended to encourage investments in tax shelters.

"If this proposal suffers from that defect then it should be corrected," Hoagland said in an interview.

A spokesman for Bumpers said the senator "was reserving judgment" on the proposal.

The original Hoagland-Bumpers plan would have allowed investors to exclude from taxation 25 percent of the profit made on the sale of investments in small companies held for five years and 100 percent on investments held 10 years.

It would have cost the government an estimated \$218 million a year in lost revenues compared with \$7.3 billion the Treasury Department estimated as the cost of the revised proposal.

The revised plan allows investors to take an immediate tax deduction of up to \$50,000 on investments made in companies worth \$50 million or less.

Gains from the sale of stock in the companies would be taxed either at 50 percent of the gain or at a rate adjusted for inflation.

Current law taxes capital gains like any other source of taxable income.

Sen. Bob Kerrey, D-Neb., said the new proposal "should be stricken" from the budget agreement announced Sunday by President Bush and congressional leaders.

'Estimate Low'

Kerrey termed "much too low" the Treasury's estimate that \$7.3 billion would be the first-year cost of the tax incentives.

"My investor instinct tells me it is going to be more like \$70 billion," he said.

Before coming to the Senate two years ago, Kerrey headed a firm that organized investments in a chain of sports and fitness centers.

Kerrey said a story in Tuesday's Wall Street Journal "confirmed my internal suspicions" about the cost of the tax incentives in the budget agreement.

The Wall Street Journal said the tax incentives "could turn out to be one of the newest tax dodges for the rich."

The newspaper reported, "Experts say the law could spawn a new class of companies that give investors up-front write-offs and other tax goodies that could benefit them — not to mention tax lawyers, accountants, and syndicators — more than they help the economy."

'A Compromise'

Senate Majority Leader George Mitchell, D-Maine, one of the congressional negotiators who adopted the budget agreement, said he had opposed the proposal.

"We accepted it as a compromise," Mitchell said at a press conference. "The administration was very insistent and adamant."

He said the proposal, which would not be accepted if it lost as much \$70 billion a year in federal revenues, "needs careful scrutiny" before it is written into law.

Delta Rocket Blasts Off With Navigation Satellite

Cape Canaveral, Fla. (AP) — An unmanned Delta rocket blasted into space Monday with a \$65 million navigation satellite designed to guide U.S. warplanes, ships and other military craft with extreme accuracy.

It was the Air Force's third attempt in four days to launch the rocket.

In 1917, the American expeditionary force in France suffered its first fatalities in World War I.

Bush Urges, Fed Resists Easing of Interest Rates

Washington — President Bush called on the Federal Reserve Monday to push interest rates down in recognition of the new federal budget accord, but Fed officials signaled that the central bank was unlikely to do so in the foreseeable future.

Portraying the new budget accord as part of a pact between the administration and the Fed, Bush in effect demanded that the Fed hold up its share of the bargain, telling reporters in New York that "I would look to the Federal Reserve to lower the rates."

The president's remarks reflected a belief, widely held both in New York and Washington, D.C., that the Fed would push interest rates down if a budget accord was reached. Bush said Monday that he thought a "good budget agreement will result in lower interest rates."

No Promise

Fed officials indicated Monday that they considered the deficit-reduction accord inadequate and that they had no immediate plans to nudge rates down when the Fed's policy-setting Federal Open Market Committee meets in Washington today.

Fed officials insisted in interviews that earlier statements from Fed Chairman Alan Greenspan have been misinterpreted and that he had never offered easier monetary policy in return for a budget agreement.

Federal Reserve spokesman Joseph Coyne stressed that Greenspan had promised only that the central bank would let the financial markets judge the package. If the credit markets are pleased and short-term interest rates fall on their own, he said, the Fed "won't stand in the way."

"We never said we would ease," Coyne said.

Mixed Reaction

The financial markets turned in a decidedly mixed response to the budget accord Monday.

On the New York Stock Exchange,

the Dow Jones Industrial Average surged more than 63 points on the day, buoyed both by the budget accord and by a sharp drop in oil prices.

But at the same time, the dollar continued to plunge on the foreign exchange markets, reflecting continued disappointment with U.S. economic policies.

Since the Iraqi invasion of Kuwait, which sent oil prices soaring, the Fed has declined to move on its own to ease interest rates, fearful that inflation might then spiral out of control.

Some Fed officials said the central bank was increasingly hesitant about lowering interest rates because it was concerned by the rapid decline in the value of the dollar over the past few weeks.

Commission Pulls Riverboat License

Des Moines (AP) — The Iowa Racing and Gaming Commission revoked the license Monday of a riverboat casino planned for Sioux City, leaving the Missouri River without a floating casino when the season opens April 1.

"At this point there's absolutely no possibility that there will be a boat on the Missouri River on April 1st," said Chuck Patton, state director of riverboat gambling.

The commission voted 5-0 to revoke the license held jointly by non-profit Missouri River Historical Development Inc. and Fried-Schegan and Associates of San Diego after the California developers failed repeatedly to come up with \$15.5 million in financing for the project.

While the revocation brings the financially plagued project to an end, officials from the non-profit group said they plan to reapply for a license with new financial backers in the next few weeks.

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Senior Citizen Groups Vow to Fight Budget War in Voting Booth

Washington (UPI) — Senior citizen groups charged that President Bush and Congress have "declared budget war on the elderly" by proposing the largest-ever increases in Medicare patient payments. They promised retribution on Election Day.

Reaction Monday to the deficit reduction budget package proposed by White House and congressional negotiators Sunday was swift and angry from groups representing the 33 million elderly and disabled Americans served by the Medicare health insurance program.

"President Bush and the budget summitters are asking one-eighth of the population to shoulder one-half of the cuts in domestic spending, and that eighth represents the oldest, the sickest, the poorest adults — those least able to pay," said Ron Pollack director of Families USA, a national advocacy group for seniors.

"By unfairly and disproportionately singling out seniors for these enormous cuts, the summitters (negotiators) have declared budget war on the elderly," Pollack told a Capitol Hill press conference. "Those that wage this war shouldn't expect older Americans to be pacifists on election day."

\$30 Billion

Bush, speaking with reporters aboard Air Force One en route to Washington from New York, said, "What are you going to do? You can't keep everybody happy. I learned that long ago. You've got to do what's right and that's what we're trying to do."

The budget compromise, still to be approved by Congress, would raise \$30 billion from Medicare beneficiaries over five years by

raising the monthly premium and the annual deductible paid for doctors' services. An additional \$30 billion cut in payments to doctors and hospitals would make for a total budget savings of \$60 billion coming from the Medicare program.

Arthur Fleming, chairman of the Save Our Security Coalition of organizations for seniors and the disabled, said the overall effect of planned and proposed increases will mean a 366 percent increase in the share paid by Medicare beneficiaries.

Part B

The major changes on the budget proposal would come under Medicare's Part B program, which pays doctors' bills. The annual deductible, before Medicare covers 80 percent of

physician bills, would increase from the current \$75 to \$100 in 1991, \$125 in 1992 and \$150 in 1993-95. The deductible last rose, from \$50, in 1982.

In addition the Part B premium would rise 5 percent to cover costs, increasing from \$28.60 per month to about \$34 in 1991 and about \$55 per month in 1995. The budget compromise proposal would also require beneficiaries to pay 20 percent of laboratory costs which are currently paid entirely by the Medicare program.

"A \$300 plus increase in annual premiums coupled with a \$75 increase in the deductible will force millions of seniors to eat less food, to skip their prescriptions and to fall behind in their rent or utility bills," Pollack said.

The budget proposal sets aside a new \$2 billion fund to help seniors just above the poverty line pay the increased costs, but Pollack called the amount "wholly inadequate

toward what needs to be done."

Rep. Edward Roybal, D-Calif., chairman of the House Select Committee on Aging, called the budget proposal "unacceptable."

"I predict that the senior citizens of this nation are going to be heard, not only here in Washington, but also across the nation," Roybal said.

Several seniors groups said they favored a shift in income tax rates that would put a greater burden on the wealthy as the most equitable way to trim the mammoth federal deficit.

"The best approach is a progressive income tax system," said Larry Smedley, director of the National Council of Senior Citizens. "Older Americans didn't cause the deficit and they shouldn't be asked to pay more than their fair share of the costs."
