To all assembled, it is a pleasure for me to be with this distinguished group.

((Earlier tonight, I asked why the East Room/State Floor was chosen for this event. The sweep of history // the memory of great orators from Washington to Reagan. The answer made sense. I was told we'd need a room this grand just to contain my charisma. //

((I do what I can. But public office can be hard on a family. Even its most electrifying members. // Speaking of Millie / she wanted to be here. But her new book's doing so well she's out negotiating the movie rights. // How about that.       weeks on the best-seller list.

((Still, I worry about this going to her head. This morning they offered her a bowl of Alpo, and she asked to see the wine list. // By the way, if any of you are interested, I can get you a terrific deal on her new exercise video. They say she looks terrific in spandex tights. //

((Dogs, of course, are as All-American as the Republican Party. As as is concern with the downtrodden, the destitute, the hopeless. // But enough about liberal Democrats.)) // I just wanted to take a few moments to thank you for what you've done for Party, and Nation. // I recall how John Kennedy told a similar Democratic group: "I am touched to address you -- but not nearly as touched as you have already been." // I thank you from the bottom of my heart. //

Let me begin with a promise, and a salute. The promise: I'll be brief. ((You remember the kid who went to church with his grandfather, and he said, "Granddad, what are all the flags along the side of the church for?" The Grandfather said, "That's for those in service." The kid said, "Oh really, the 9 a.m. service, or the 11 a.m. service?")) //

The salute, of course, is for a man who has enriched our party for many years. He's a fighter // a winner // above all, he's our friend and inspiration. Lee Atwater. // Lee has been forced to keep a low profile. But he, himself, is a profile in courage. I join every Republican in extending prayers to Lee, his wife Sally, and his three daughters, Sarah, Ashley, and Sally. Here's to the Grand Young Man of the Grand Old Party. //

Like Lee, you know what the 100 Team is all about. It's about values and priorities. It's about helping the letters "GOP" stand for Growth, opportunity, and prosperity. The Democrats' philosophy burdens people for the benefit of

government. Team 100 wants to use government for the benefit of easing burdens on people. //

Look at last year. Think of what this philosophy helped us do. We passed Clean Air legislation that doesn't try to cleanse the environment by throwing people out of work. // Think of the budget. We got an agreement that makes real spending cuts -- enforceable cuts -- and real budget process reform. Then, there's child care and education. We have done much. But there's still much more to do. ((For example, one day at Kennebunkport last summer I took the boat out, played in a horseshoes tournament, went for a three-mile run, got in 18 holes of golf, met <sup>with</sup> John Sununu, read a couple briefing books, phoned a dozen world leaders. // Just when I was rolling, Barbara ~~made-me-stop-by~~<sup>ed</sup> calling me to breakfast.)) //

I feel a sense of urgency. So do you in helping people help themselves. Think of George Kettle, who started a D.C. Chapter for the "I have a dream" foundation to help disadvantaged kids. /

~~Ruth Buchanan, and her work for those suffering from Alzheimer's Disease. // Or Jerry Milbank -- the Eagles' founder -- who's the national President of the Boys and Girls Clubs of America.~~

Democrats want to empower the bureaucracy. You want to empower individuals. In that spirit, let me close with an issue which concerns a globe of individuals who look to us for leadership. // The Persian Gulf. // What is at stake is the very principle of international order: Whether aggression pays - - or whether aggression is punished. //

We will resolve this crisis -- whether peacefully or not, we don't know. This we do know: Brutality will not be tolerated. America will not look the other way. We will not waver -- and Saddam's aggression will not stand. //

Right now -- half a world away -- our young men and women are showing that America would not be the land of the free if it were not also the home of the brave. // They deserve -- and have -- our support and prayers. Let's stand up for them at home and abroad -- working for better government and a stronger America, too.

There's a seal on the front of this podium that bears a symbol shared by this group. The eagle faces to its right -- the direction of honor. // In one set of talons are the arrows of war: in the other, the olive branch.

After the last World War, it was decided that never again should the eagle's head be turned toward the arrows. Ever since, it has looked in the direction of honor -- the direction of

peace. That is our purpose in the Persian Gulf. It is the purpose that you have aided so generously. It is why we are relying on the courage of our outstanding men and women in uniform. //

So I'd like to conclude with a toast to them: May God bring them safely home, and soon. //
