SAN ANTONIO SPURS DRUG FREE YOUTH BASKETBALL LEAGUE

The San Antonio Spurs Drug Free Youth Basketball League is a non-school basketball program for at-risk youth ages 9 through 16 who reside in the inner city. The league is a cooperative effort of the Spurs, San Antonio Parks and Recreation, YMCA, Boys and Girls Club and the National Youth Sports Coaches Association of Texas. The league was created by Spurs Assistant Coach, Gregg Popovich, and NYSCA of Texas Executive Director, Frank Martin and is funded by the Spurs Foundation.

Currently in its second year, the league has over 2300 participants - a 100% increase over its first season. All of these children are from underprivileged Hispanic and Afro-American neighborhoods and most would not have had the opportunity to play basketball had it not been for the Spurs financial support to this league. Further expansion of the leagues is expected to include a Summer Midnight Basketball Program similar to programs in Chicago and Washington D.C.

All volunteer coaches receive training on what to say to their players about drugs and both the players and coaches are required to sign a drug-free pledge and join a special All American Drug Free Team created nationally by NYSCA. As a member of that team, players receive a packet of material that includes anti-drug messages from Isiah Thomas and President Bush. Also, players, coaches and parents attend an anti-drug basketball clinic conducted by the Spurs.

Hopefully this will be enough to get you started. Here are some key points in regards to the information that you have requested:

1. The League

The league is called the **SPURS DRUG FREE YOUTH BASKETBALL LEAGUE**...this year over 2,300 kids are playing in the league, making up 230 teams...the league started on January 6th and finishes in March with the league championships being played on March 7th...games are played six nights a week at roughly 15 locations throughout San Antonio...the kids are ages 9 to 16 and both boys and girls participate...the league, **"EMPHASIZES DRUG EDUCATION AND A DRUG FREE ENVIRONMENT FOR ALL PARTICIPANTS AND IS SPECIFICALLY TARGETED TOWARD 'AT RISK' YOUTH."**...the kids come from several local groups: the Boys & Girls Clubs of San Antonio (both East and West), the Parks and Recreation, local YMCA's (East, West and Central San Antonio), the San Antonio Police Athletic Leagues and the Harlandale Community Centers...the league is made possible by a \$19,000 grant from the Spurs Foundation (for info see below #2) and is sponsored by Diamond Shamrock...the league is administered by the San Antonio chapter of the National Youth Sports Coaches Association (the NYSC), which is a non-profit education program for youth sports organizations...all coaches in the league must be NYSC certified and must attend a Spurs Basketball/Drug Free Clinic...all players must sign a Drug Free statement and attend a Spurs Basketball/Drug Free Clinic...one of our assistant coaches, Gregg Popovich (Air Force Academy '70) runs clinics and makes random appearances at games...we've had two 'Basketball Clinics' that Popovich has run this season, where Gregg and a player go to a gym and present a free clinic to the kids...over 750 kids were on hand for each clinic...Spurs guard Rod Strickland and Spurs forward/center Sidney Green have both made appearances for these clinics...also David Robinson made an unannounced visit last week to one of the gyms where games were being played... for more information please call me or Chris Domhoff (512) 554-7733...Chris is the person who has organized the program on our end.

2. The Spurs Foundation

The Spurs Foundation is a non-profit group that the Spurs created in 1988, its mission is **"TO PROVIDE FINANCIAL SUPPORT TO DISADVANTAGED CHILDREN; SINCE ITS INCEPTION, THE FOUNDATION'S GOAL HAS BEEN TO HELP ECONOMICALLY, EMOTIONALLY AND/OR PHYSICALLY DISADVANTAGED CHILDREN IN THE BEXAR COUNTRY AREA."**...the Spurs Foundation supports several key charities in the community each season...this year our groups are: Any Baby Can, Boy's Town, the Children's Center, the Methodist Hospital Children's Center, St Peter-St. Joseph Children's Home, the SAMM Shelter and the Spurs Drug Free Youth Basketball League...Diamond Shamrock's support of the Spurs Foundation has ensured the funding of the Drug Free League...for more information on the Spurs Foundation please call Mary Havel, our Director of Community Relations, at (512) 554-7761.

3. The History of the Spurs

The San Antonio Spurs have been one of the premier teams in the NBA over the past three seasons...each of the last two seasons the Spurs were the Midwest Division Champions, making appearances in the NBA play-offs...the Spurs were the only team in the NBA to claim a Division Title in both the 1989-90 and 1990-91 seasons...the Spurs came into existence in 1967 as the Dallas Chaparrals in Dallas, Texas...the team played six seasons in the American Basketball Association (the ABA) in Dallas before moving to San Antonio in the summer of 1973, and becoming the San Antonio Spurs...the Spurs played three seasons in the ABA in San Antonio before merging into the NBA before the 1976-77 season...this season is the Spurs 16th in the NBA...and 10th in San Antonio...in those 16 NBA seasons, the Spurs have won...

the NBA - and 19th in San Antonio...in those 16 NBA seasons, the Spurs have won seven Division Titles, making 12 trips to the NBA play-offs...some of the greats to have played for the Spurs over the last 19 seasons include: George "The Iceman" Gervin, who led the NBA in scoring four different times and played in 11 All-Star games while with the Spurs...in his professional career the Iceman scored 26,595 points, putting him 8th on the all-time scoring list...Gervin currently works for the Spurs as a Community Services Representative; Artis Gilmore, an All-Star center 11 times in his career, including two appearances while with the Spurs; and of course the Spurs current All-Star center, David Robinson.

4. David Robinson


David Robinson is our star player and arguably the best center in the NBA today...I've sent a copy of his bio from our media guide, but here is some additional information...this season, for the third time in his three-year NBA career Robinson was named an NBA All-Star...he is on the 1992 USA Olympic team (he also played in the 1988 Olympics)...this season he leads the Spurs in scoring, rebounding, field goal percentage, steals, blocked shots and he is the only player in the NBA who is among the top 10 leaders in five categories: he is 8th in the NBA in scoring with 22.8 points per game, 7th in the league in rebounding with 12.1 per game, 1st in blocked shots with 4.76 blocks, 5th in steals with 2.28 per game and is 6th in field goal percentage with a 56.0 shooting percentage...he is a devoted Christian and was married this past December to Valerie...he is nicknamed the Admiral due to his Navy background...still in the Navy as a reservist and is currently a Lieutenant...visited the White House this summer with his mother Freda for a State Dinner...his parents, Freda and Ambrose Robinson, run The Robinson Group, which is David's main management group...his agency is Advantage International in Washington...in his three seasons with the Spurs he has already set 18 Spurs franchise marks.

5. This Season's Spurs

The Spurs are currently 31-23 and are in 2nd place in the Midwest Division, behind the Utah Jazz...we play three games at home this week...we host the Miami Heat tonight...the Golden State Warriors on Thursday, the 27th and the Denver Nuggets on Saturday, the 29th...we play our home games in the HemisFair Arena in downtown San Antonio...billed as the Noisiest Arena in the NBA, the HemisFair seats 16,057 and tonight will be our 50th straight sell-out...besides David, our other key players are forwards Sean Elliott, Terry Cummings and Antoine Carr, guards Rod Strickland, Paul Pressey and Vinnie Johnson and center Sidney Green...guard Willie Anderson, who is normally a starter for us, is currently on the injured list with a stress fracture in his left tibia...our head coach is Bob Bass...and our owner is Red McCombs.

DAVID ROBINSON

1990-91:

Averaged 25.6 points, 13.0 rebounds, 2.5 assists, 3.9 blocks, and 1.5 steals in 37.3 minutes per game . . . shot .552 (754-1366) from the field and .762 (592-777) from the line . . . for the second straight season he appeared in all 82 games for the Spurs, starting 81 times . . . won several awards for the season including, All-NBA First Team, NBA All-Defensive First Team, The Schick Award, All-NBA Interview Second Team, was voted onto the starting line-up for the 41st Annual NBA All-Star Game, and finished third in MVP voting behind Michael Jordan and Magic Johnson . . . was the only player in the NBA to rank in the top 10 in four different categories, was 1st in rebounding, 2nd in blocks, 9th in scoring, and 9th in field goal percentage . . . led the Spurs in scoring 54 times, in rebounding 65 times, in blocks 75 times, and in steals 30 times . . . scored double figures 81 times, scoring 30 or more 27 times . . . Spurs were 22-5 when David scored 30 or more points . . . when David had 13 or more boards the Spurs were 32-14 and the team was 31-10 when David blocked four or more shots . . . recorded 66 double-doubles and 3 triple-doubles . . . set new career highs with 43 points (1/17/90 vs Denver and 1/10/91 vs Orlando) and 23 rebounds (4/2/91 vs the LA Lakers) . . . had season highs of 6 assists (12/5/90 at Atlanta), 11 blocks (1/12/91 vs Utah) and 49 minutes (1/7/91 at Philadelphia).

PRO CAREER:

Was drafted by the Spurs with the first overall pick in the 1987 NBA Draft . . . the unanimous choice for NBA Rookie of the Year after the '89-90 season . . . averaged 24.3 points, 12.0 rebounds, 2.0 assists, and 3.9 blocks in 36.6 minutes per game . . . shot .531 (690-1300) from the field and .732 (613-837) from the line . . . played in all 82 games for the Spurs, starting 81 times . . . was named the NBA Player of the Week three times and was the Rookie of the Month all six months . . . named to the NBA All-Defensive Second Team and the All-NBA Third Team . . . he also won the Schick Award, played in the All-Star game, and finished 6th in MVP voting as he led the Spurs to the biggest single season turnaround in NBA history (from 21 wins in '88-89 to 56 wins in '89-90) . . . ranked among NBA leaders in five categories, 2nd in rebounding, 3rd in blocks, 9th in scoring, 15th in field goal percentage, and 20th in steals . . . scored in double points 81 times, with 20 or more 62 times, and 30 or more 15 times . . . had a season-high 41 points 3/2/90 vs Golden State . . . had 58 double-doubles and 3 triple-triples . . . had a season high 21 rebounds 2/3/90 vs Chicago and a career high 12 blocks vs Minnesota on 2/23/90 . . . led the team in rebounds 61 times, in points 46 times, and in steals 22 times . . . won the Toyota Favorite Spur Award . . . appeared in 10 playoff games, averaging 24.3 points, 12.0 rebounds, and 4.0 blocks.

COLLEGE:

Was the consensus NCAA Player of the Year as a senior at the Naval Academy . . . won a total of 12 Player of the Year Awards, including the Wooden, the Naismith, and the Rupp Awards . . . as a senior led the nation in blocked shots averaging 4.5 per game . . . also averaged 28.2 points — which was 3rd in the nation — and ranked 4th in the NCAA in rebounding with 11.8 per contest . . . scored a career high 50 points vs Michigan in the NCAA Tournament in what was his final collegiate game . . . the first player in Division I history with over 2,500 points, 1,300 rebounds, and a career shooting percentage of over .600 from the field . . . appeared on the 1988 U.S. Olympic team that won the Bronze Medal . . . the 1987 Pan American Team . . . and the 1986 USA World Championship Team . . . as a freshman averaged just 7.6 points and 4.0 rebounds . . . posted career averages of 21.0 points and 10.3 rebounds in 127 games.

Full name is David Maurice Robinson . . . holds a bachelor's degree in mathematics from Navy . . . scored a 1,320 on the SAT College Board Examination . . . played just one year of high school basketball . . . grew 7 inches while at the Academy . . . served as a Naval Ensign from 6/87 to 5/89 at Kings Point, Georgia . . . parents, Ambrose and Freda, run The Robinson Group in San Antonio serving as a management company for David . . . wears a Nike size 15 . . . favorite meals are Fettucine and Lasagne . . . also enjoys Chicken Fajitas from Taco Cabana . . . favorite movie is the Little Mermaid . . . likes to watch Sports Center on ESPN . . . spends a lot of his free time playing and listening to music . . . favorite artists are Grover Washington and Natalie Cole . . . is a dedicated reader of the Bible . . . says he would play baseball if not in the NBA . . . only superstition is wearing socks tucked in or rolled down . . . says favorite vacation is just relaxing and his perfect day would be "to be able to relax as much as I would like to."
