Dallas Police Sgt. Tony Crawford testified Wednesday in the attempted capital murder trial of a 17-year-old youth accused of shooting him last November.

Brad Ehly, who was an escapee from a juvenile detention facility near Austin, could be sentenced to 99 years in prison if he is convicted.

Crawford, 31, was investigating a suspicious person report in East Dallas on the evening of Nov. 13 when he spotted Ehly and another runaway, 16-year old Jeremy Dillingham, behind a school.

The nine-year police veteran testified from his wheelchair that as he questioned Dillingham, "I looked out of my peripheral vision to my left, and saw the defendant, Brad Ehly, holding a gun to my head."

He said that he and Ehly struggled for the gun, which went off several times during the scuffle.

Crawford said he thought the .38 caliber pistol was empty when he turned to retreat to his squad car.

"I got no more than just a step or two and heard the gun go off and felt a pain in my back just above my right kidney," he said, "and my legs went out from under me."

He said he pulled his pistol from its holster while he was on the ground, but the two youths beat him and ran away with his weapon.

Crawford, who has been paralyzed since the shooting, said the bullet remains lodged in his spine, and doctors tell him he will never walk again.

Ehly's attorney has tried to implicate Dillingham as the person who pulled the trigger.

Crawford testified at an earlier hearing, however, that it was Ehly who shot him. At the end of that hearing, Ehly was certified to stand trial as an adult.

Dallas police Sgt. Tony Crawford, partially paralyzed by a bullet wound suffered while on patrol last November, will toss out the ceremonial first pitch at the Texas Rangers' first home game Monday.

"I feel like it is such a privilege just to be asked to throw the opening pitch," said Crawford, who still has the bullet lodged in his spine. The officer was brutally beaten and shot in the back in the November incident.

"I am truly honored to be asked to represent all law enforcement officers in the state of Texas."

Dave Fendrick, Rangers' promotion director, said what happened to Crawford could happen to any police officer.

"Tony represents all law enforcement officers who are out there every day risking their lives. They are all true heroes on a daily basis," he said.

Last November, Crawford, who is married and has a 20-month old daughter, volunteered to answer a suspicious-persons call. When he reached the scene, he saw two teenage boys walking in the neighborhood.

A scuffle broke out later and Crawford was shot in the spine with a revolver.

The two youths then proceeded to beat him, striking him repeatedly in the head, ears and neck, police records said.

The youths fled after knocking out three of his teeth and fracturing his skull.

Police later tracked the two youths at a home for troubled youth in Central Texas. They will stand trial as adults next month.

Crawford returned to work in March and he is now able to maneuver his wheelchair easily through the police station.

He continues his therapy twice a week. The therapists say he is making progress and compliment his good attitude.

Two teenage runaways from a central Texas home for troubled youths will be charged with shooting a Dallas policeman in the back during a crime rampage, police said Monday.

Sgt. Anthony Crawford, 31, was shot last Wednesday near an elementary school in the quiet Lakewood area of Dallas. The break in the investigation came Sunday night when police in Cameron, about 150 miles south of Dallas, arrested the youths, ages 15 and 16, at the youth home in nearby Rockdale.

Police spokesman Jim Chandler said the two were being held in the Dallas County Juvenile Home. He said police will seek to have them certified for trial as adults on charges of attempted capital murder.

Crawford was shot with a .38 caliber pistol after he had responded to suspicious persons calls in Lakewood. He remains in good condition but doctors are unsure if the officer will be able to walk again, Chandler said. Doctors have not been able to remove the bullet lodged in his back.

The shooting enraged Police Chief Bill Rathburn who vowed to capture the assailants.

"Apparently, these two youths walked away from the facility in Rockdale," Chandler said. "One of them had been placed at the facility by his parents. The other was there as part of his probation."

The youths stole a pickup truck and later went to the home of the father of one of the youths, where a .38 caliber revolver was stolen, he said.

Chandler said the two then drove to Dallas where they visited the aunt of one of them living in the Lakewood area. After the Crawford shooting, the youths left Dallas in their stolen pickup. One returned to the Rockdale home and the other went to his parents' home, Chandler said. His father brought him to the home.

Cameron police later arrested the two on the stolen vehicle charge.

"We then identified them as suspects in the Crawford shooting," Chandler said.

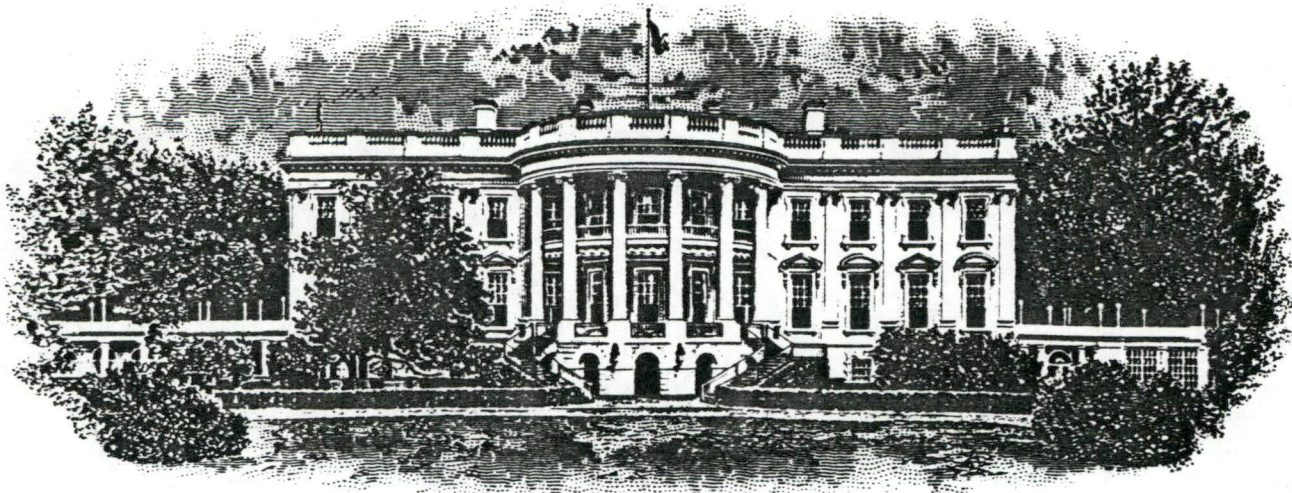
The break came when Dallas police were informed by a Lakewood resident that her son knew one of the suspects.

"That and also the fact that the stolen pickup was seen at the scene of the shooting helped us put together the details. Later, we discovered the two boys had been missing from Rockdale," Chandler said.

Crawford had arrived at the Lakewood area to check on citizen calls about three suspicious males, he said.

"Crawford was looking for three black males but found these two white youth walking in the area. He stopped them to enquire about three black males when one of them began shooting," Chandler said.

Crawford, father of a 14-month-old daughter, was the seventh Dallas police officer to be shot this year. In the continuing violence against police in the city, 19 other officers have been shot at this year, police said.

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**SAN ANTONIO, TX, OPERATION WEED AND SEED****Funding**

San Antonio, Texas was awarded a \$1.1 million grant from Department of Justice funds for Operation Weed and Seed on May 12, 1992. Local funds in the amount of approximately \$1,250,000 will supplement these Department of Justice grant funds. This Weed and Seed project consists of traditional law enforcement activities (approximately \$209,000); community policing (approximately \$217,000); and "seeding" activities (\$187,500). It is anticipated that additional resources will be made available to support "seeding" activities in Fiscal Year 1993.

**Steering Committee**

The "weeding" steering committee consists of: Ronald F. Ederer, U.S. Attorney; Steven Hilbig, District Attorney; William O. Gibson, Chief of Police; Chief, Criminal Division, U.S. Attorney's Office; Special Agents in Charge - FBI, DEA, BATF, United States Customs Service and Secret Service.

The "seeding" steering committee consists of: U.S. Attorney; District Attorney; Nelson W. Wolff, Mayor, City of San Antonio; Chief of Police; YMCA of San Antonio; President, People Against Corruption; Metro Alliance; Communities in School; U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development; Boys and Girls Clubs; Principal, Martin Luther King Middle School; United Way/Fighting Back; and the LECC, U.S. Attorney's Office.

**Target Area**

The target area consists of several small residential subdivisions, a public housing development (Springview Homes), and an apartment community completely subsidized through HUD Section 8 programs (New Light Village). Accidental and homicide death rates in the target area are twice the rate for the city as a whole. There is also intense gang activity and escalating drug trafficking and violent crime. Five major gangs, with approximately 500 members, operate within the target area. The dropout rate is the highest in the city.

**Need Strategy**

A coordinated enforcement effort, using tactical crime analysis of the target area, and dedicated prosecutorial resources in the DA's office will be utilized, with a focus on the removal of "Crack Houses" within the target area. Additionally, loitering in parks and vacant lots, curfew violators, gang-related activities, and targeted property crime activities will be highlighted. The use of a Directed Patrol system will be the primary approach through the redeployment of newly organized units, such as the Gang Unit, "Park and Walk," and Special Operations.

A Bicycle Patrol will also be deployed as a key element of the Community Policing component as will use of a mobile police substation and the establishment of a Weed and Seed office in a community center in the target area, where community police officers, a community service officer and crisis intervention officer will have office space. Focus on youth services will be accomplished through a major expansion of the Police Athletic League with two additional officers and significant equipment provided through the grant as well as an expansion of the Drug Abuse Resistance Education (DARE) program.

### Seed Strategy

The Seed component focuses significantly on intervention and prevention programs for youth, including mentoring, and expanded adolescent health services to the under-served residents, establishment of a Safe Haven initiative utilizing local libraries, and counseling and referral to other services for residents. Boys and Girls Clubs and the YMCA of San Antonio (drug education and prevention classes) will also provide expanded services in the target area.

A Midnight Basketball program will be established through the PAL organization and the Parks and Recreation Department of San Antonio. Also, in conjunction with the organized activities available through the PAL program, the target area Boys and Girls Clubs, YMCA and Parks and Recreation facilities will extend their hours of operation until midnight to offer an alternative to "roaming the streets."

The Barbara Jordan Community Center is the backbone of the San Antonio Weed and Seed Program (one of very few buildings in the area where no gang graffiti can be found) and will continue to sponsor recreational and educational programs as well as provide space for a Weed and Seed office, out of which the two additional PAL officers will operate their expanded youth services. In addition to providing additional athletic activities to youth in the target area, the Police Athletic League will coordinate with the San Antonio Department of Arts and Cultural Affairs to provide educational benefits while introducing at-risk children to the world of cultural arts. Instruction of Visual, Performing, and Media Arts will focus on anti-drug/gang messages and a program goal is to produce a theatrical production with an anti-drug/gang message.

Communities in Schools (CIS) will provide expanded services in the target area. CIS will provide remedial classes in math and reading through the summer, and these classes will include summer diversionary and enrichment programs focusing on the transfer of values. In addition, CIS will maintain a community network through weekly meetings with parents of participating students continually reminding them of the necessity of their fervent involvement.

**FORT WORTH, TX, OPERATION WEED AND SEED****Funding**

Fort Worth, Texas, was awarded a \$1.1 million grant from Department of Justice funds for Operation Weed and Seed on May 12, 1992. Local funds in the amount of over \$1.5 million will supplement these Department of Justice grant funds. This Weed and Seed project includes a broadly expanded community policing program (approximately \$844,000, for six police officers and numerous youth and community programs), with a sizable contribution from local funds (\$736,000).

The Fort Worth Weed and Seed project includes a significant traditional law enforcement component during the first year (\$1.1 million in funds are dedicated for this program, in addition to the funds for community policing), while "seeding" activities are anticipated to be significantly increased from the initial level of \$139,000.

Minter, Tarrant County Interim Sheriff; Tarrant County Constable, Office Precinct 8; and Carolyn Bell, President, Citizens Crime Commission Tarrant County (CCTC).

Community Revitalization Advisory Committee: Joe Cordova, Boys and Girls Club of Greater Ft. Worth; Terry Ryan, Ft. Worth Chamber of Commerce; Reginald Gates, Metropolitan Black Chamber of Commerce; Diane Smiley, South Side Area Ministries, among many other community-based groups, social service and education providers and private sector participants.

**Target Area**

The target area lies within the Eastside, the highest crime sector in the city, with a great amount of gang and drug-related activity, including crack houses and street sales. It comprises a 15 square mile area with a population of 44,000. Eighty-one percent of the population is black and twelve percent is white. (Blacks represent 22% of the total Fort Worth population while 36% of all blacks live within the target area.)

Although the target area is large, the exclusion of any portion of the target area would result in drug dealers and violent offenders

simply being "displaced" into adjacent neighborhoods. The Fort Worth Weed and Seed strategy therefore encompasses the neighborhoods contained in a larger area. A large public housing development, consisting of 300 units is located in the target area. The area has 2 high schools, 10 elementary schools, 3 middle schools, one university and 12 parks. There are 2 multi-purpose centers and numerous social service centers throughout the area.

### Weeding Strategy

Fort Worth is creating a multidisciplinary task force to target gang and drug-related crime. Community policing activities include deployment of a Strategic High Impact Team and the expansion of the Citizens on Patrol, Taxis on Patrol, and Neighborhood Patrol Officer programs. Other community-based activities include: mini-police stations; a neighborhood assessment program conducted by beat officers within the target area; and the Crimebusters Club, a program designed to equip children with skills to prevent them from becoming victims of crime.

### Seeding Strategy

Fort Worth's seeding strategy focuses on preventing involvement in gangs and drug trafficking and providing alternatives for youth. The Citizens Crime Commission is providing training on gang and crime prevention, and the Ft. Worth Department of Housing and Human Services is stepping up efforts to remove gang activity in public housing developments. The Boys and Girls Club in the public housing complex is expanding its sports, recreational, educational, and cultural awareness activities for youth. For example, it is recruiting target area youth as cast members for Teen Drama, which sponsors performances on issues relevant to teenagers, such as alcohol and drug abuse, AIDS, and teen suicide.

In addition, the Ft. Worth Employment and Training Department will provide basic skills programs to school dropouts, and the Ft. Worth Police Department will expand the DARE program to all elementary schools in the target area to educate students about the dangers of drugs, alcohol and gangs. Tarrant County Hospital District's Mobile Outreach Project is providing transportation to health care appointments and outreach activities to pregnant women and infants in an effort to combat low birth weight and infant mortality.

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Barbara and I have known the warm friendship of our Texas friends for many years -- and especially during what I like to refer to as my first term as president. //

In four years, I've laid out some ambitious goals -- ambitious because there are those who resist, those who fear change.

But there's an old saying: If you do not change, you might end up in the direction you are headed.

There's been a lot of talk about change. But the time for talk is over. /

Without pointing fingers -- ask yourselves: is the system we've got right now working? Is it eliminating poverty --

providing opportunity -- creating jobs -- creating hope? No, it is not. The old solutions are producing fresh failures.

The challenges we face today go deeper than the crisis we saw just a few short weeks ago in Los Angeles. Beyond emergency aid, we've got to bring hope and opportunity -- not just to neighborhoods in South Central Los Angeles -- but to neighborhoods in South Dallas and all across this country.

Many of you may remember hearing me speak out in L.A. of eight-year-old Rudy Campbell. In the midst of the turmoil, he said he feared that things will only get "badder and badder and badder." It breaks your heart. We must assure Rudy and all America's children: Things will get better. /

Over a week ago I called congressional leaders -- Republican and Democrat -- to the White House and outlined my six-point plan for a new America. //

First, we've got to keep the peace: because families can't thrive -- children can't learn -- jobs can't flourish in a combat zone. The kind of violence we saw in L.A. should not be explained / it cannot be excused / and it must be condemned. //

Here in Dallas: officers put themselves in harm's way every day to protect the people from violence. Like Dallas' police Sergeant Tony Crawford who was shot and paralyzed last November while on duty. Tony, I salute you. For officers like Tony, we must pledge ourselves to control crime. We must support our police. //

We start with an idea I call "Weed and Seed." First, you "weed out" the gang leaders, drug dealers and career criminals - - and then "seed" the community with expanded employment, educational and social services. We've already started "weeding" and "seeding" here in Texas with two promising programs in Fort Worth and San Antonio. Though it is new -- it is tough -- and it's going to help people take back their streets / take back their neighborhoods / take back control of their lives. /

Next, we've got to rebuild the community -- with investment / with opportunity / with hope. That means Enterprise Zones for our inner cities. / It means private sector activity: real jobs in real businesses. /

Third, we must promote new hope through home ownership. I've never understood how anyone could be content with the present system -- how we should take pride in warehousing the poor. / Our HOPE initiative gives poor families a stake in their communities -- something to pass on to their children. It's just this simple: HOPE can turn housing into homes.

Fourth, we've got to reform the welfare system. We've got to replace the perverse dis-incentives that encourage welfare and discourage work -- that penalize families for building a savings, for staying together. /

Fifth, we need a strong jobs program for city youth -- ideas like our Apprentice Initiative and Job Training 2000.

Finally, this brings me to our plan's sixth point: Revolutionizing American education -- that's the idea behind our

America 2000 strategy. So that children in Oakcliff will enjoy the same opportunities that kids in Highland Park do. Whether it's public or private or religious, parents -- not the government -- have a right to choose their children's schools. //

The critics say: "You've proposed all this before." True, but these ideas have not been tried; now is the time to act.

But the need for reform and new ideas doesn't end where the suburbs begin. Reform is needed throughout all of America.

Look at the big picture: Our revolution in education isn't just about helping inner city students -- it's about helping all students: from kindergarten to college.

Reform means taking action to break down barriers to free trade -- to create new jobs for American workers by opening new markets to American goods. //

Reform means taking on America's legal system -- putting an end to these outrageous court awards that strain our civility and sap our economy. We all agree: Americans need to spend less time suing each other and more time helping each other. //

We need health care reform. My comprehensive health care reform plan will open up access to all Americans. Contrary to what the big government folks say -- national health care would be a national disaster -- and I won't let that happen. //

Finally, we've got to bring the reform process to government. To restore fiscal discipline to the federal government, I challenge Congress to get moving on a balanced

budget amendment. It's an important amendment -- and best of all: Congress cannot undo it. //

I've been speaking about what government can do -- but government alone cannot solve our problems. /

Time and again the people I met in Los Angeles put their finger on one root cause of the riots: the declining influence of the family. / They're right. Ask yourself: What keeps a kid in school / away from drugs / off the streets? It's not government spending -- or the number of SBA loans or HUD grants. It's whether kids live in a home where they are loved, and cared for, and kept on the right path. I believe this. That's why I've made it my mission as President to put the American family first.

PRESIDENTIAL REMARKS: TEXAS VICTORY '92  
GRAND KEMPINSKI HOTEL BALLROOM  
MONDAY, MAY 30, 1992

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It is no coincidence that this great state's name comes from an Indian word meaning "friend." Barbara and I have known the warm friendship of our Texas friends for many years -- and especially during what I like to refer to as my first term as president. //

Four years ago, I set out on a mission: one that I knew had to draw from my more than twenty years as a public servant. In these past four years, I've laid out some ambitious goals -- ambitious not because they would be hard to reach, but because I knew that there would be those who fear change, even when it is good change.

Angeles -- but to neighborhoods in South Dallas and all across this country.

Many of you may remember hearing me speak out in L.A. of eight-year-old Rudy Campbell. In the midst of the turmoil, he said he feared that things will only get "badder and badder and badder." It breaks your heart. We must assure Rudy and all America's children: Things will get better. / Things will get better.

Over a week ago I called congressional leaders -- Republican and Democrat -- to the White House and outlined my six-point plan for a new America. //

First, we've got to keep the peace: because families can't thrive -- children can't learn -- jobs can't flourish in a combat zone. Violence and brutality destroy order and the rule of law. The kind of violence we saw in L.A. should not be explained / it cannot be excused / and it must be condemned. //

And when I took that message to Mt. Zion Church in South Central L.A. -- in the heart of the riot zone -- I mentioned support for the police, and the whole church erupted in applause.

Here in Dallas: law enforcement officers put themselves in harm's way every day to protect the people of this city. Like Dallas' police Sergeant Tony Crawford, who as many here know, was shot and paralyzed while answering a call at a local elementary school. Tony, I salute you. You are a shining example of America's finest. It is for dedicated officers like Tony that we

must not be complacent about the crime that controls our cities.  
We must support our police. //

We start with an idea I call "Weed and Seed." First, you "weed out" the gang leaders, drug dealers and career criminals - - and then "seed" the community with expanded employment, educational and social services. We've already started "weeding" and "seeding" here in Texas with two promising programs in Fort Worth and San Antonio. Weed and Seed is new -- it is tough -- and it's going to help people take back their streets / take back their neighborhoods / take back control of their lives. /

Next, we've got to rebuild the community -- with investment / with opportunity / with hope. That means Enterprise Zones for our inner cities. / It means private sector activity: Not government make-work -- but real jobs in real businesses. /

Third, we must promote new hope through home ownership. I've never understood how anyone could be content with the present system -- how we should take pride in warehousing the poor. / Our HOPE initiative gives poor families a stake in their communities -- something to pass on to their children. It's just this simple: HOPE can turn housing into homes.

Fourth, we've got to reform the welfare system. We've got to replace the perverse dis-incentives that encourage welfare and discourage work -- that penalize families for building a savings, for staying together. /

Fifth, we need a strong jobs program for city youth -- ideas like our Apprentice Initiative and Job Training 2000. Our

programs are simple: One-stop shopping -- where a person can walk in for help without fear of being swallowed by bureaucracy and red tape. /

Finally, this brings me to our plan's sixth point: Revolutionizing American education -- that's the idea behind our America 2000 strategy. So that children in Oakcliff will enjoy the same opportunities that kids in Highland Park do. Whether it's public or private or religious, parents -- not the government -- have a right to choose their children's schools. //

Now, we all know what the critics say: "You've proposed all this before." That's true -- but these ideas have not been tried. Now is the time to act. There will be gridlock in Washington as long as there are roadblocks in Congress. //

But what's going on in urban America is just one part of a larger issue -- because the need for reform and new ideas doesn't end where the suburbs begin. //

Look at the big picture: Our revolution in education isn't just about helping inner city students -- it's about helping all students: from kindergarten to college.

Reform means taking action to break down barriers to free trade -- to create new jobs for American workers by opening new markets to American goods. //

Reform means taking on America's legal system -- putting an end to these outrageous court awards that strain our civility and sap our economy. No lobby of trial lawyers will stand in the

way. We all agree: Americans need to spend less time suing each other and more time helping each other. //

We need health care reform. My comprehensive health care reform plan will keep America first in the world in high-quality health care. At the same time, it will open up access to all Americans. We do that through making insurance available to all.

Contrary to what the big government folks say -- we don't have to socialize our health care system. Let's face it: National health care would be a national disaster -- and I won't let that happen. //

Finally, we've got to bring the reform process to government. To restore fiscal discipline to the federal government, I challenge Congress to get moving on a balanced budget amendment. It's an important amendment: a contract between you and your government -- and best of all: Congress cannot undo it. //

I've been speaking about what government can do -- but government alone cannot solve our problems. / Government may be able to make good laws, but it's never been able to make men good.

Go back to Los Angeles for a minute. Time and again the people I met there put their finger on one root cause of the riots: the declining influence of the family. / They're right. Ask yourself: What keeps a kid in school / away from drugs / off the streets? It's not government spending -- or the number

of SBA loans or HUD grants. It's whether kids live in a home where they are loved, and cared for, and kept on the right path.

I believe this. That's why I've made it my mission as President to put the American family first. / And in January, I heard from this nation's mayors -- who said the single most important problem facing the cities is the dissolution of the America family. So we've moved on their concerns: a new urban commission on the American family is in place, headed up by Governor John Ashcroft of Missouri and your former mayor Ned Strauss.

But as much as we move toward a new beginning, government alone can't transform the lives of people in need. That's why I keep coming back to the Good Samaritans I call Points of Light: people who help others in need -- and never ask a nickel in return. //

With their help, with your help: We have come far together. We will go further.
