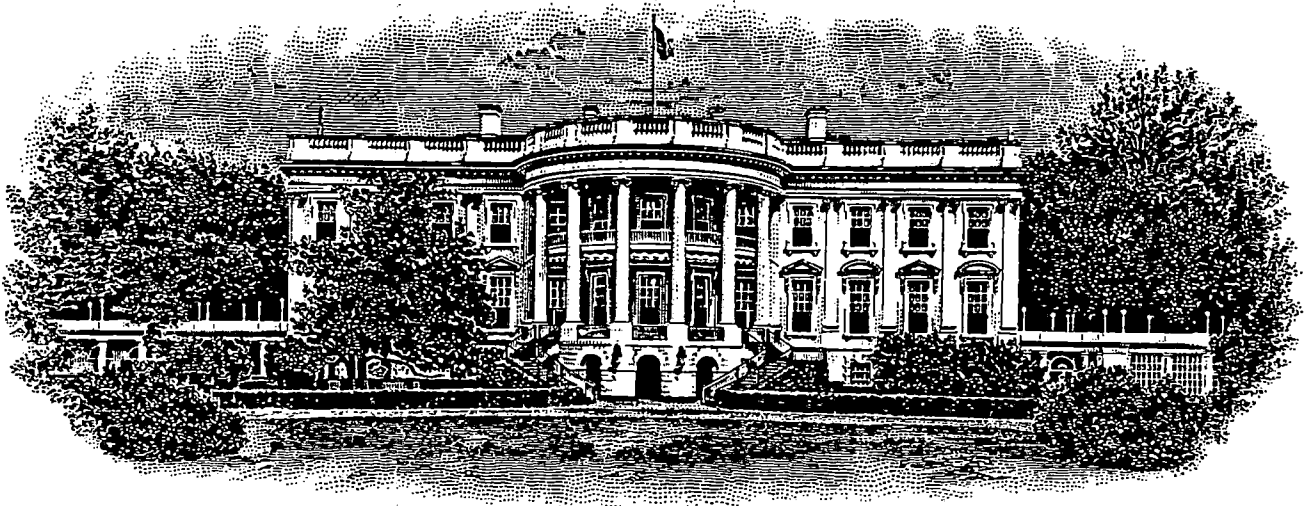

REMARKS BY THE PRESIDENT  
TO BRIGHAM YOUNG UNIVERSITY AND PROVO COMMUNITY

THE PRESIDENT: Thank you very much. (Applause.) Thank you all for that warm welcome. And may I just single out your President -- Mr. President -- it sounds pretty good, doesn't it, for Rex -- but to say to Rex Lee that I am delighted to have been introduced by him, a man who has served, first, his government with such great distinction, integrity and honor; and now serves this wonderful university in a position of extraordinary leadership. (Applause.)

Allow me for a moment just to acknowledge Senator Hatch; Governor Norman Bangertter, my friend over here; Val Oveson, Lieutenant Governor; Mayor Joseph Jenkins. And may I just suggest that it is appropriate that I pay, and you all pay, a special tribute to Senator Jake Garn who's retiring this fall, after years of dedicated service to Utah and the entire nation. (Applause.)

And again, to President Lee and Provo's Hafen, and Ron Hyde and Dee Anderson, BYU Vice President, let me just say thank you for inviting me here today. More than that, I want to thank you for extending an invitation to all the presidential candidates to come to BYU and share their views. And this is appropriate -- the university not pulling back but permitting people to have a fair say in this important election year. And I salute you for that. (Applause.)

I noticed that on your seal it says that "The glory of God is intelligence." I would add that intelligence and education are absolutely necessary to fulfill your democratic obligation. So I salute you for your desire to learn more about all our candidates and where we want to lead this great nation. (Applause.)

And in this spirit of free speech let me register one strongly-held view. I want to change things. And one thing I want to change is the control of the House of Representatives in Washington. (Applause.) For 35 -- you talk about change -- for 35 years, 36, one party has controlled that one institution, the House of Representatives. And enough of these bank scandals and post office scandals. We've got to change control, and that's why I want Richard Harrington in the United States Congress. (Applause.)

Let me say I agree with him on this, and with the senators, that a strong America has led the world to change. And we have not surrendered one single ounce of our sovereignty. We are the leader of the free world, undisputed, on our terms. We're the United States of America. (Applause.)

You know, BYU is a special place, of physical beauty and spiritual strength. (Applause.) A place devoted to a simple creed: "Enter to learn. Go forth to serve." I happen to believe that there is no higher calling than serving humanity. So I say thank you for choosing BYU. This home of the Cougars

MORE

feels like my home. And thanks for that warm welcome.  
(Applause.)

I spent two days this past week far away from TV and radio. Didn't listen -- watch one or listen to the other -- up in Wyoming, trout fishing with Secretary of State Jim Baker, and our sons, Jamie and Jeb. But I'm aware that something else was going on in America this week. (Laughter.) Something real important. This is the week when all across America, crowds of panting, sweating people overran their neighborhood video stores. (Laughter and applause.)

From Tallahassee to Tempe, Americans turned on their TV and decided they'd rather watch "Action Jackson" than listen to -- well, never mind. (Applause.) Now, look, don't get the idea that this is some kind of partisan attack. (Laughter.) Stop by Rich's Video down on Freedom Boulevard -- (applause) -- and I'm sure Rich will tell you, give it to you straight. Sales aren't all that bad during the Republican Convention either. (Laughter.) So I want to be fair about this. (Applause.)

I didn't get a chance, as I said, to see the other party on TV. But I couldn't help but notice one little comment made by one of the conventioners. It was made by a man named McGovern. First name, same as mine, George. You remember him? Over the years Mr. McGovern hasn't always been my biggest fan. (Laughter.) So I was kind of surprised by what he said in the newspaper. He called this year's Democratic ticket "a Trojan horse." And he said -- and I quote -- "They're much more liberal underneath and will prove it when they're elected." Now, I know I've never said this publicly, but, one, they won't be elected, and George McGovern is an incredibly insightful man. (Laughter and applause.)

You may not believe this, but that's all I'm going to say about the other party. You didn't invite me here to talk about the other side. You want to know what I have to offer and what I believe and what's in my heart. (Applause.) Let me just start by explaining a little bit about where I see America today.

Here at BYU you like to say that the world is your campus. Your president telling me about the numbers of foreign languages that are taught and spoken by the students on this campus. Well, that campus, internationally, has been through incredible change in four years. Because of our leadership, because of America's sacrifice and commitment, millions more people breathe free today. (Applause.)

When you go to bed tonight you can sleep knowing that we are safer from nuclear destruction. Safer than we were a decade ago. Safer than we were a year ago. Safer than we were even a month ago, before I met with Boris Yeltsin in the White House to get rid of some of these nuclear weapons. (Applause.)

But this new world that we live in poses new challenges and new opportunities. The challenge is this: Can we compete now that so many other nations are playing our game? It's a tough question. But since the answer is, inevitably, yes, consider the opportunity we face.

More of the world's people hungry for our products. More of the world's people eager for our services. More good jobs for you and all your classmates. What do we need to take advantage of this opportunity? The same values, the same principles, the same ideas, that we used to change the world.

To start, I believe we need to get to work today to create more opportunity for more people. You can't build a home without a hammer, and you can't build a dream without a job.  
(Applause.)

MORE

Work isn't just good for our wallets. Work elevates us. It teaches us values. It gives us purpose. Some people tear down our economy and they say we're second-rate, second-class. But keep in mind just a few facts. We are still the world's largest and most vibrant economy. We've tamed the lion of inflation. And consider this: The last time interest rates stayed this low the Brady Bunch wasn't even on TV yet. (Applause.)

Our factories produce a higher percentage of the world's manufactured goods than we did 20 years ago. And we've emerged as the world's export champion. Last year the Japanese government asked who leads the world in 143 critical technology industries. Japanese firms led in 33 and the United States in 43. And I wouldn't be surprised to learn if that report was put together on software made right here in Utah. (Applause.)

But while our economy is growing today it's not growing fast enough. Many of you are working your way through this great university. When you graduate you don't want to get letters that say: "We'll keep your resume on file." You want letters that say: "How fast can you get here and take the job?"

I used to run a business and meet a payroll. I learned the only way government can create jobs is to help the people who create jobs. (Applause.) That means providing incentives so that businesses can create jobs. And it means getting our own house in order by making like Paul Bunyon and taking an axe to the rotting tree that is the federal budget deficit. (Applause.)

Governor Norm Bangerter, just back from a trip to St. Petersburg, to Russia, came to have breakfast this morning. And this is his philosophy; it's the philosophy that Governor Bangerter follows and Utah follows. And we've got to bring some of that Utah attitude to Washington, D.C. (Applause.) And like your Governor, we need a line-item veto, and we're going to get it. We're going to get the American people to insist we have it. (Applause.)

And like you, we need a balanced budget amendment to the Constitution. And we're going to get that, too. (Applause.)

Thirty-one times in the past three years I've had to wield my veto pen -- many times to cut away wasteful government spending. And with the help of Senator Orrin Hatch and then a new Congress coming in with him, we're going to continue to stand on principle and protect your pocketbooks. And we're going to treat wasteful spending the way Carl Malone will treat other teams' jump shot in Barcelona. (Applause.) We're going to swat it into the front row. (Laughter.)

And I also believe that we need to restore the special values that have carried this nation for 200 years. Americans need to understand something that you all know very, very well and that your lives epitomize. No other success can compensate for failure in the home. (Applause.)

David O. McKay's words harken back to a different age. And today we can fly from Paris to New York and arrive earlier than we left. (Laughter.) But do we too often leave behind the difference between right and wrong? We can explore a world beyond the stars, but do we too often ignore a neighbor down the street? We can turn natural ingredients into miracle medicines, but why do we feel the need to turn every argument into a lawsuit? (Applause.)

And by the way, I am not going to give up, I'm going to continue to fight for legislation that puts a stop to all these frivolous lawsuits. (Applause.) We need to give doctors the chance to practice medicine, dads and moms to coach Little League without worrying that they're going to end up in a courtroom every single week. (Applause.)

So where do we get our traditional values? Where do we get our traditional values? We learn them in our living rooms and in our churches. And while religion and families help keep our lives together, government can help keep our families together. Government can reward work, not welfare dependency. Welfare programs can and must encourage families not to fall apart, but to stay together. (Applause.)

And government can and must, in my view, give families in Utah and every other state the option of deciding where their kids are educated. (Applause.) Whether it's a public school, a private school or a church school -- it doesn't matter -- let the parents choose. That is the American way. (Applause.)

And I also believe we need to restore respect for the law. Peace in the world, it's fine but it's not enough. And if people don't feel safe in their own backyard, it doesn't seem to matter. What do you say to an elderly woman who watches the Berlin Wall fall on television right before her eyes, but is afraid to walk into her neighborhood grocery store? What do you say to kids in our cities who hear of the Russians reducing nuclear weapons, but then have to walk through a metal detector at school every single morning? What do you say to these Americans? You say enough is enough. And let's put an end to the lawlessness. And let's get rid of the drugs. And let's say "sayonara" to the crack dealers and the criminals. (Applause.)

We can help with legislation. You can help in your neighborhoods and your local institutions. But let's pledge to make America safe again. (Applause.)

As you know, this has been an important week in American politics for a couple of reasons. I met a guy in Wyoming yesterday who noted that the week I went fishing, one of my opponents dropped out of the race. And he wondered if I wanted to stay out West and bag another trophy hunting next week. (Laughter.)

But let me just make a serious observation. It's easy for me to stand here as an incumbent President of the United States and quietly applaud Ross Perot's withdrawal from the campaign -- but to salute the fact that this strange political year is suddenly much more "normal." But I can't do that. The fervor of the Perot supporters, of those sensational volunteers transcends politics as usual.

And there was an election in America this summer -- no ballots cast, no polls open, but a referendum took place nonetheless. Nobody won, but politics lost. And politics lost because it is becoming irrelevant to more and more Americans. And for too many people, politics is now the opposite of progress. (Applause.) And so my message to anyone dissatisfied with America is this: Don't quit. Don't walk away from the system. Don't believe that because there's no protest vote you have no vote at all.

Ross Perot's supporters believe in the same principles in which I believe -- about cutting the size of government, about letting parents choose their kids' day care and high schools. And most of all, we agree about the need to break the deadlock in Washington, D.C. (Applause.)

And it is time to say so long to politics as usual. And more than that, it's high time to shake up the system. And if you'll excuse just one more political observation, you give me a Congress that shares my values and your values and you'd see this system not just shaken, but rattled and even rolled. (Applause.) And you will see real progress in our great country.

And I know that Provo is one of America's youngest cities. For years, more babies were born at Utah Valley Hospital

MORE

than any other hospital in America. (Applause.) More than most hospitals in the world. (Laughter.) And I heard from some not-so-reliable sources that lately some hospitals way up in northern Europe are surpassing your birth rates. But I guess that in Utah babies are born because of hope. Well, way up in northern Europe they are born because of hope and weather. (Laughter.)

Now, as I look out on this audience today, my guess is you're probably asking the question that every young generation asks: Will the future be bright? Will the dream stay alive? And despite all our challenges, I am betting on America. And I know you are, too.

I still believe -- I still believe in America's capacity to confront any challenge and seize any opportunity. And if we can topple the Berlin Wall, and if we can reduce the threat of nuclear weapons, and if we can do those things, we can build a strong economy and we can -- and if we can lift that Iron Curtain, we can bring the curtain down on immorality and indifference. (Applause.) And if we can help people walk free in Eastern Europe, we can take back the streets in the United States of America. (Applause.)

So this then is our mission. And this is our crusade. And together I am absolutely confident that we can get the job done for the United States of America.

God bless you. And may God bless our great country. Thank you very, very much. (Applause.)

The current platform draft says Americans have personal responsibility "for the religious faiths they follow, the ethics they practice, the values they instill. . . ."

While God and country have been evoked in state documents, political speeches and platforms since George Washington, the Republican Party is the master of this tradition of "civil religion," historians say.

"Republicans do it very well because they do it unselfconsciously," said Forest McDonald, a historian of American politics at the University of Alabama.

"I think the Democrats are crazy for taking it [the word God] out," he said. "This is a very religious country."

But Stuart Eizenstat, a Democratic platform committee member and former Carter administration domestic policy adviser, said contrived use of religious symbols can backfire.

"The Democratic Party has tended to be a more secular party in terms of separation of church and state," said Mr. Eizenstat, a Washington lawyer.

Evoking religious ideas and symbols "only makes sense if it is part and parcel or the centerpiece of the candidate," he said. "The worse thing you can do is try to fabricate [religion] or be phony for political reasons."

Though the term "God" was rejected, "religious faiths" was included to show the Democratic concern for national values, he and other Democrats said.

"It was just part of the effort by the Democratic Party to not allow the Republicans to solely appropriate the issue of values," Mr. Eizenstat said. "It's better to revive issues of family, community, neighborhood, which are secular symbols."

These differences over religion have revealed themselves in the past.

While the Republican Party platform of 1988 mentioned the American people's "faith in God," the Democratic Party platform talked of a "spiritually stronger" nation by its example to the world.

The 1992 Republican Party platform will be drafted before September.

The differences over religion also appeared in speeches at the two parties' 1988 conventions.

Democratic presidential candidate Michael Dukakis neither mentioned God nor religion but focused on equality and opportunity.

The Rev. Jesse Jackson's 1988 Democratic Convention speech said "providence" brought him and Mr. Dukakis together, while his 1984 convention speech was more a sermon, historians say.

In his 1988 convention speech, President Bush mentioned "our religious faith," said he believed "there's a God and He is good," cited Catholic and "Bible study" groups and thanked God for an adopted grandchild.

Mr. Eizenstat noted that though President Carter was a Baptist and Sunday school teacher, he rarely evoked the God-and-country of civil religion.

Critics of Republican civil religion have compared President Carter's "prophetic" appeal for American's to sacrifice during the energy crisis with President Reagan's call to reap God's blessings.

## Democratic Convention Lineup: Who's Missing From the List?

Absent from the array of speakers and participants for this month's Democratic National Convention in New York are New York Gov. Mario M. Cuomo and former California governor Edmund G. "Jerry" Brown Jr.

In announcing the July 13-16 convention lineup yesterday, Democratic National Committee Chairman Ronald H. Brown said it represents "the best of the Democratic Party—integrity, creative ideas and change."

Convention planners had hoped to persuade Cuomo to nominate Arkansas Gov. Bill Clinton, but Cuomo has not agreed. Cuomo, who gave a riveting speech at the 1984 convention, has said repeatedly he does want to address this one.

DNC press secretary Ginny Terzano said that Jerry Brown, the Clinton campaign and the DNC are discussing Brown's role because the former governor has not endorsed Clinton or decided whether to have himself nominated.

Brown's sister, California Treasurer Kathleen Brown, however, will speak to delegates.

And Jesse L. Jackson is on the program at Ron Brown's request. "The chairman is certain that Reverend Jackson will endorse Governor Clinton prior to the convention," Terzano said.

Three of the men Clinton defeated for the nomination—Sens. Tom Harkin (Iowa) and Bob Kerrey (Neb.) and former Massachusetts senator Paul E. Tsongas—will speak. But Virginia Gov. L. Douglas Wilder, the first to drop out of the presidential primaries, is not expected on the podium.

Although Clinton is expected to have named his running mate before the convention opens, many of those he is considering will address the convention. They include Sen. Albert Gore Jr. (Tenn.), John D. "Jay" Rockefeller IV (W.Va.), Harris Wofford (Pa.) and Rep. Lee Hamilton (Ind.).

D.C. Mayor Sharon Pratt Kelly, Del. Eleanor Holmes Norton (D.C.) and Baltimore Mayor Kurt Schmoke will appear Tuesday night, and Sen. Barbara A. Mikulski (Md.), a convention co-chairman, will speak Monday.

The DNC announced last month that keynote speakers will be Sen. Bill Bradley (N.J.), Georgia Gov. Zell Miller and former representative Barbara Jordan (Tex.). Texas Gov. Ann Richards is convention chairman.

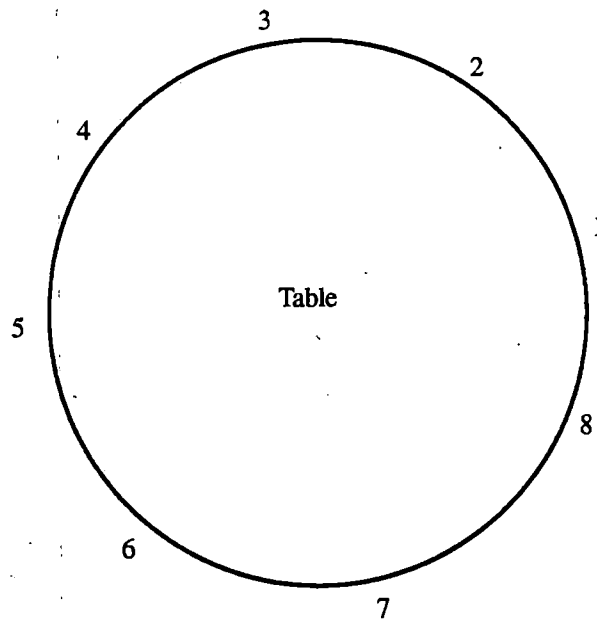

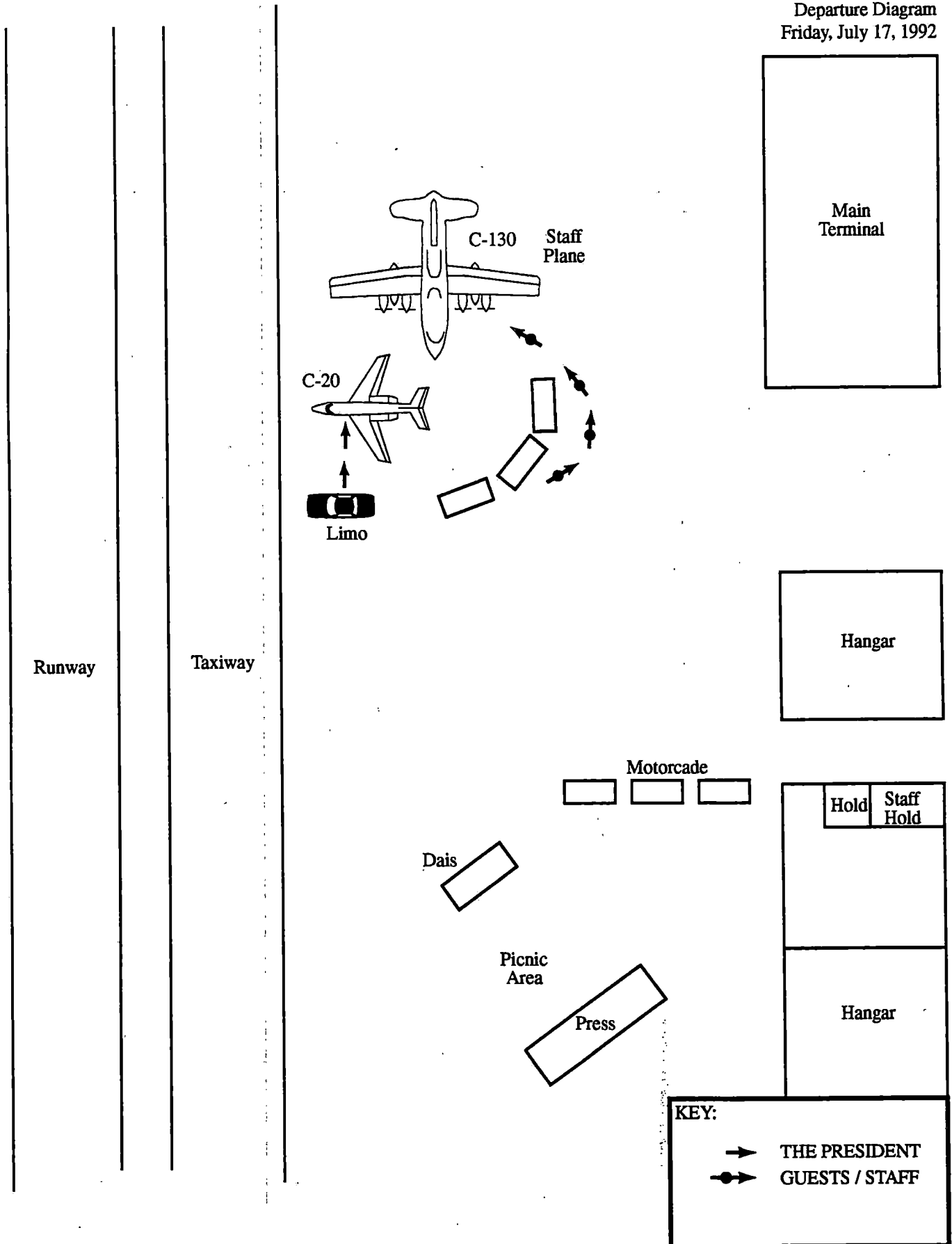

Smith (June), President, University of Utah and Ms. Mary Pat Matheson, Director, Red Butte Garden and Arboretum. Following the Greetings, THE PRESIDENT, accompanied by President and Mrs. Smith and Ms. Matheson, proceeds up walkway to the Water Pavilion Garden. THE PRESIDENT arrives Water Pavilion Garden and is introduced by Lt. Governor W. Val Oveson. THE PRESIDENT proceeds to Park Bench and begins participation in Ask George Bush Meeting. THE PRESIDENT concludes participation in Ask George Bush Meeting, departs Water Pavilion Garden and proceeds to Motorcade. THE PRESIDENT boards Motorcade and departs Red Butte Gardens en route Salt Lake City International Airport.

The backdrop is a pond, wild flowers and mountain vista (Wasatch Mountain Range of the Rocky Mountains). The press are located straight-on at 35 feet on ground level. A slightly raised platform is straight-on at 20 feet.

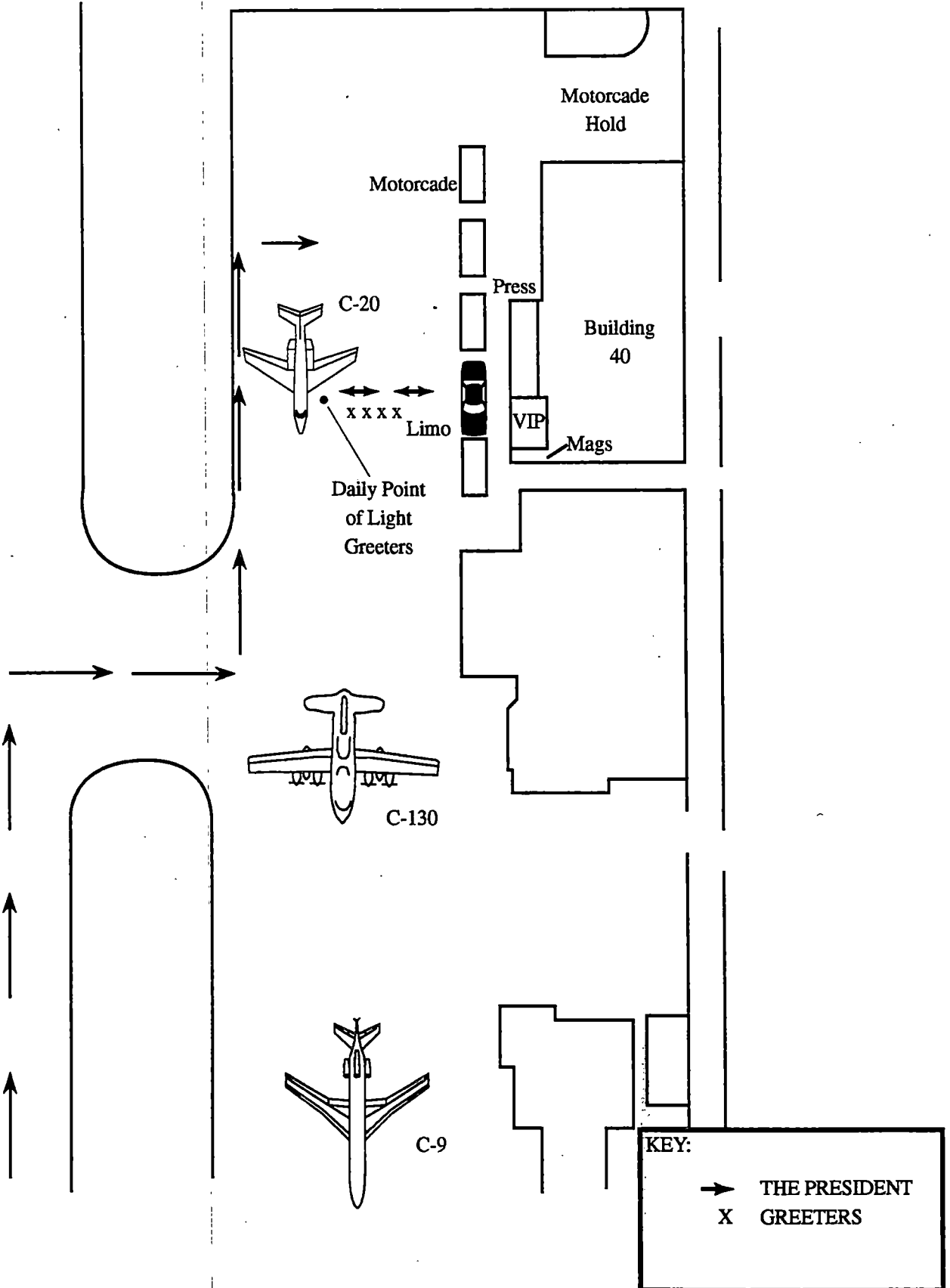
SCENARIO: THE PRESIDENT arrives Brigham Young University Marriott Center and proceeds to Holding Room and holds briefly. THE PRESIDENT departs Holding Room and, accompanied by Mr. Rex Lee, President, Brigham Young University proceeds to Off-Stage Announcement Area and holds briefly. THE PRESIDENT, accompanied by Mr. Lee, is announced onto stage to Full Honors played by Timpview High School Orchestra, proceeds to Seat and is seated (Enter Stage Right). THE PRESIDENT is introduced for Remarks by Mr. Lee. THE PRESIDENT Remarks. (NOTE: A teleprompter will be used.) THE PRESIDENT concludes Remarks returns to Seat and remains standing. Mr. Lee proceeds to Podium and introduces West Ridge Elementary School Choir and the benediction. The West Ridge Elementary School Choir performs "A Thousand Points of Light". (NOTE: The West Ridge Elementary School Choir is located immediately behind the Stage. During the performance, they will hold "candles" representing the thousand points of light.) Upon conclusion of the performance, Luana Miller, Student, Brigham Young University, proceeds to podium and offers the Benediction. Following the benediction, THE PRESIDENT, accompanied by Mr. Lee and The Honorable Joseph Jenkins, Mayor of Provo, departs Stage (Exit Stage Right) and proceeds to Holding Room. En route to Holding Room, THE PRESIDENT is met by: Mr. Jason Hall, President, Brigham Young

Student Body. Mr. Hall presents THE PRESIDENT with a Brigham Young University t-shirt. (NOTE: Mr. Hall, is restricted to a wheelchair). Upon conclusion of the gift presentation, THE PRESIDENT, accompanied by Mr. Lee and Mayor Jenkins, proceeds to Holding Room. THE PRESIDENT, accompanied by Mr. Lee and Mayor Jenkins, arrives Holding Room and participates in Gift Presentations. (NOTE: THE PRESIDENT is presented with books by Mr. Lee and a Statuette by Mayor Jenkins. Following the presentations, THE PRESIDENT departs Holding Room and proceeds to Motorcade. (NOTE: Six Police Photos will be taken at this time.) THE PRESIDENT boards Motorcade, departs Marriott Center en route to Provo Airport.

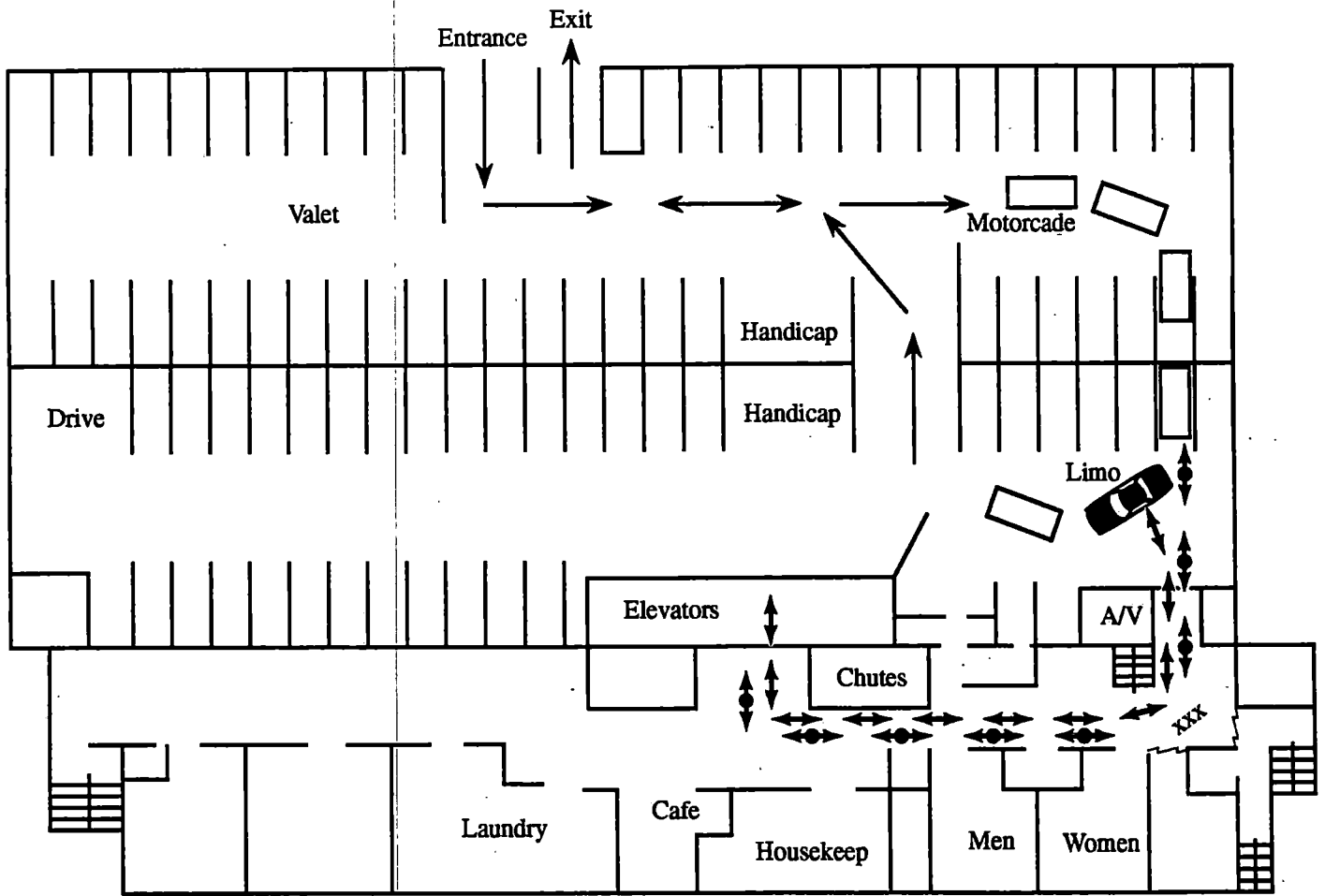

 July 17 - 18, 1992



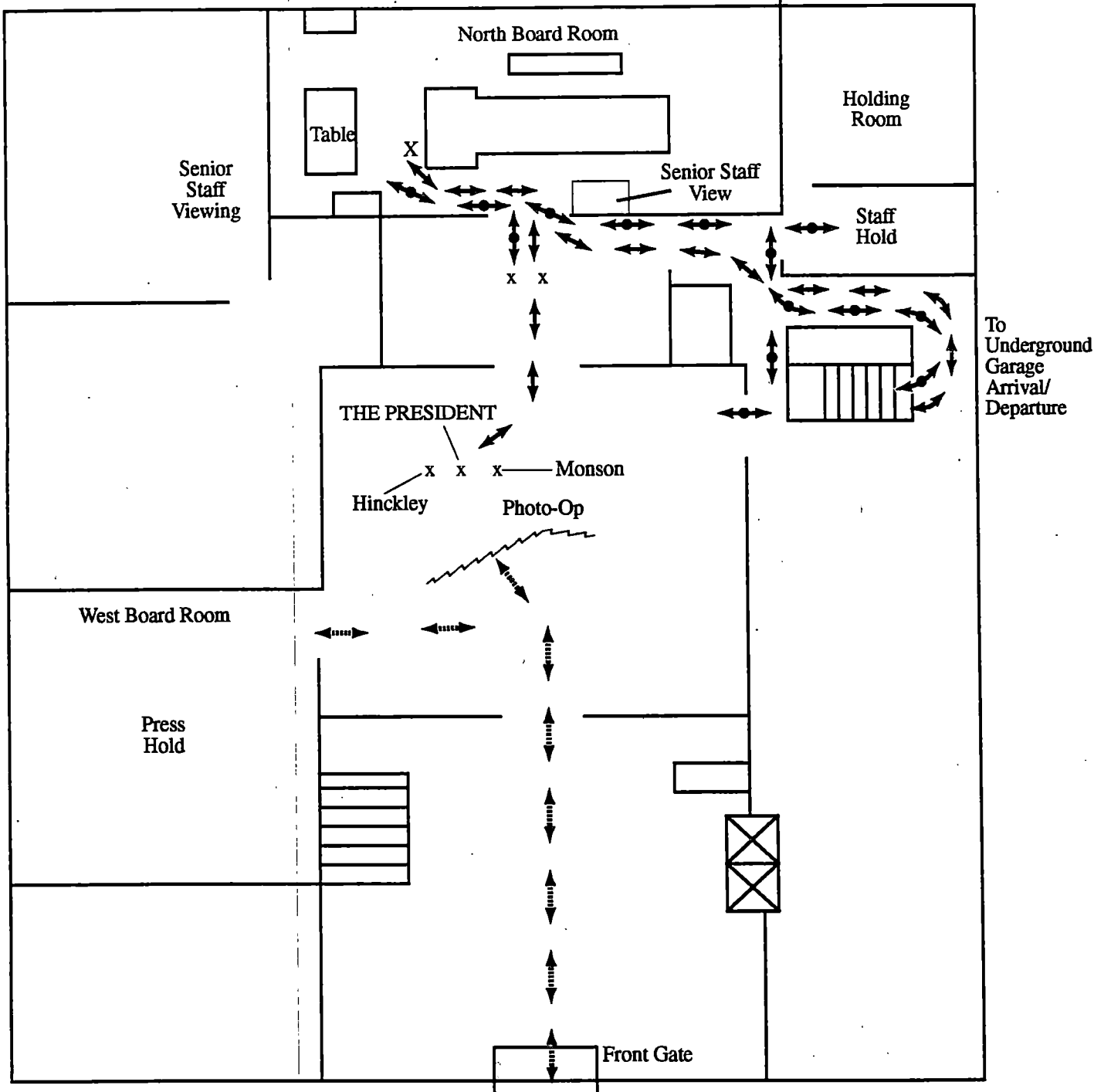
P-1 Parking Garage and Back of House

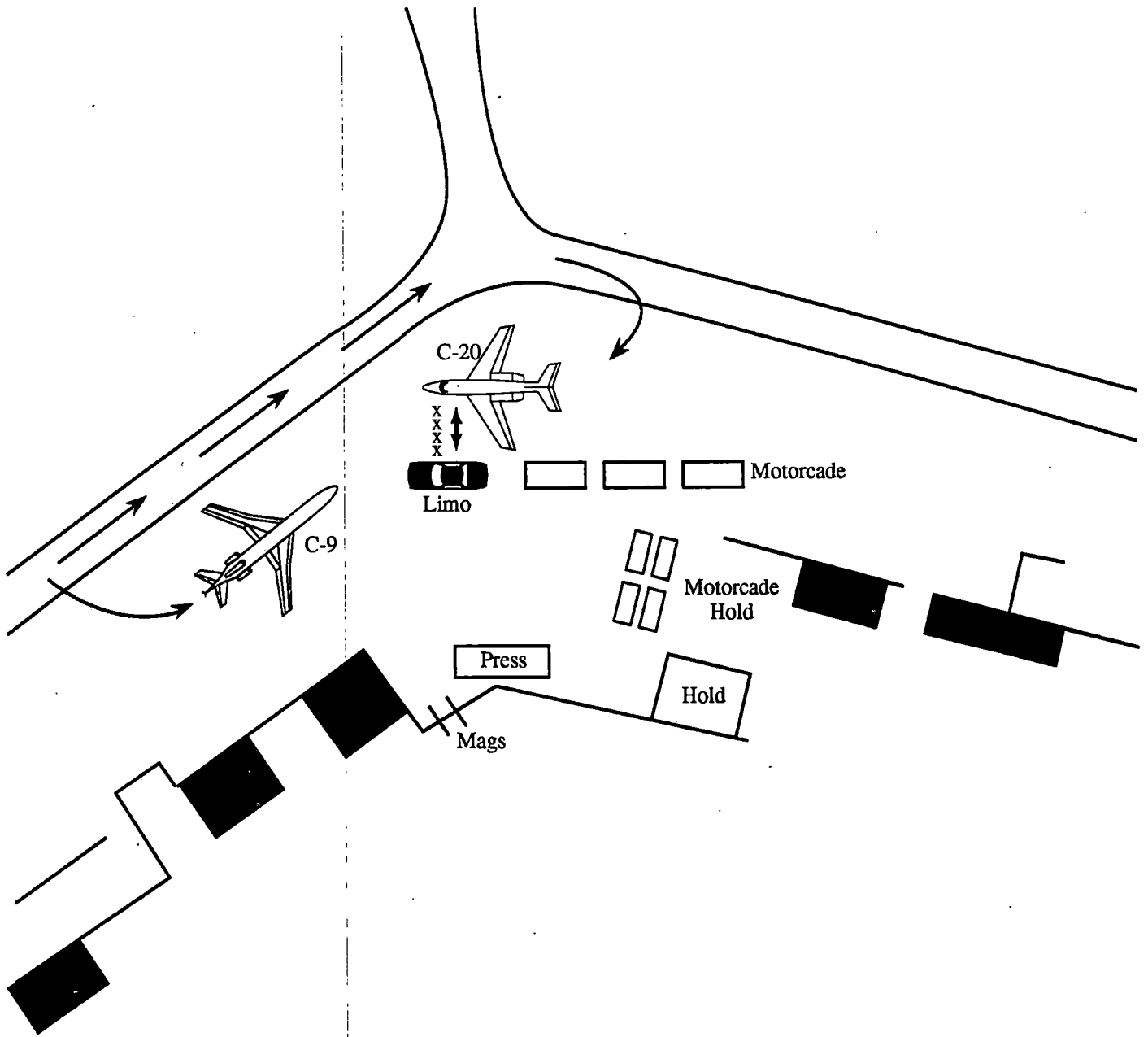
