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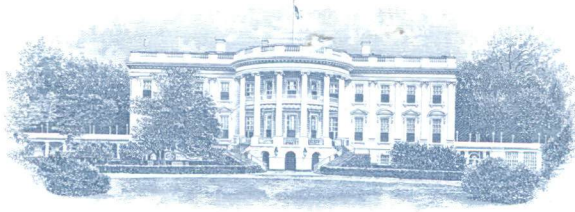

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PRESIDENT BUSH: Thank you very much, and to you and Rich my most sincere thanks.

Let me just say to the viewers here, I have great confidence in what Bob Teeter is doing with the campaign, and in the steering job that Rich is doing over at the National Committee. We're lucky, we've got a good team.

And now I want to thank you for tearing away from your usual Monday night routine to get together and talk a little bit about the future of our great country. I know for most of you Monday night is just like very other night, making phone calls and talking politics. And those of you in opposition research, I know you're usually home right now watching Murphy Brown.

As you know, the Democrats gathered in Madison Square Garden last week and they met in the home arena of the New York Rangers who haven't won a hockey championship in over five decades. But I told Rich that he couldn't make any cracks about how it's going to be even longer before their nominee sits in the White House.

I took the opportunity last week to get far, far away from a television screen and do a little fishing. But I did get a report about what went on out there in New York City after I got back from the trip that Bob just told you about to Utah and other parts of Wyoming. And I think we should all take great pride that the ideas we've been espousing for generations are now at least being paid lip service by the other party.

And do they mean what they say? Don't ask me, I'm a little biased. Ask an old Democrat. Another George by the name of McGovern. He called this year's Democratic ticket "a Trojan horse." And he went on, he said, and I quote, "they're much more liberal underneath and they'll prove it when they're elected." Now I didn't think you'd ever hear me say that hit

received enough. And now, of course, this election isn't going to be decided by what we say about the other side. What matters is, what we have to offer the American people.

And my view of America is a little different than what you may have heard last week. I see a nation facing difficult challenges, but also awesome opportunities. And I don't see a nation down in the dumps. I see a determination to make things better.

For four decades, we sacrificed so that America and the world could be free. And because of our sacrifice, and our leadership, dark corners of the globe now bask in the sunshine of freedom. We're safer today than we were a decade ago, a year ago.

Even one month ago, when I sat down in the Rose Garden with Boris Yeltsin, the question we're facing is really simple. Can we in the US compete now that so many other nations are playing our game? I believe we can. I'm sure we can. And as we compete, we can enjoy prosperity like never before and extend opportunity to our friends and neighbors who frankly don't enjoy it today.

It's not going to be easy, but here's what we need to do. First, I believe we have to get our economy growing faster. Despite what you may have heard in New York, we are still the world's largest economy and our workers are more productive than the Japanese, the Germans, or any other industrialized nation.

But, today, too many people have worked for a company for 20 years only to worry that the next mail run will bring a pink slip. Too many parents have saved to send kids to college, only to find that graduates can't find a decent job. We have to create incentives for the people who create jobs. And that means reducing the deficit by limiting the size of government, cutting federal spending, and it means reigning unnecessary federal regulation that's throwing a wet blanket on our economic recovery.

The economy, that's priority number one. Now, number two. I believe we must return some moral principles to this nation. The more I deal with the challenges of this office, the more I see how right Barbara is. What happens in the White House isn't anywhere near as important as what happens in your house.

And so we're advancing programs to help keep our families strong and growing. We want to give parents the right to choose their children's schools whether those schools are public, private or religious and we want to give people on welfare the incentive to get a good job so their families can stay together.

Priority number three is to make America safe again. We didn't work to create peace in this world, to see Americans hiding behind bolted doors. It's time to end the illegality and put a stop to the lawlessness.

These are the kinds of issues we're going to be talking about between now and election day. We've got specific ideas in each area that will allow us to achieve America's potential. I know a lot of people are disillusioned by politics. But tell your neighbors to listen to what we have to say. The ideas we present to meet the challenges we face.

Let me just add a word about Ross Perot's announcement last week, and I know many of Ross's supporters are watching tonight. A vote was taken this spring and summer. No ballots were cast, no polls opened. But a referendum took place nonetheless, and nobody won. Nobody won this election. Politics lost. Politics lost because it's become increasingly irrelevant to too many Americans, because the language of politics lacks any connection to the carers and concerns people talk about around the kitchen table. Because

politics has become a word that means the opposite of progress.

My message to people disillusioned with politics as usual, to people fed up and frustrated, is simply this. Don't walk away from the system. Add your voice to ours. Together we can build a powerful force for change, a force that can take America forward.

Now some might say, well, why haven't you done something already? And the truth is we have made important advances in education, the environment, childcare, but it's also true that our ideas aren't popular everywhere in Washington. They threaten some entrenched interests. They require change in mindset that some aren't willing to make. And so they balk at these changes, and America is hurting because of it.

Change for the sake of change isn't anyone's interest. The changes I seek are for the betterment of your pocketbook, your neighborhood, and your nation. To give you just one example, I have put a short term plan to spur the economy before Congress, and if they pass it, we could add a half a million new jobs by the end of the year. But it's not the old government spending program, so they simply set it aside.

Ask your friends if they are tired of that kind of inaction. If they want to get rid of the deadlock in Washington, they can start by getting rid of some dead wood in the United States Congress. For all the talk about change we heard last week in New York, one thing hasn't changed in years, 38 years to be exact. And that's the Democratic control of the House of Representatives. Give this Republican President a Republican Congress and see what we do to change America.

Let me close with a message right from the heart. Whether you've been with me for every campaign I've ever run, or if you're casting your first vote this year, I want to say thanks for the help. Because of your incredible work in the primaries, almost two million more Republicans turned out than in 1988, while the Democratic turnout was nearly two million fewer.

It isn't this week's polls that count, it's what happens in that election booth November 3rd. And this is my last time around the campaign track, but I am glad that you're beside me in the driver's seat. And let me tell you, the Democrats have had their day, and next month it's our turn. And we're going to come out of Houston strong. We've got a good agenda, and we're going to challenge Congress to act on it, and I'm going to take our case to the American people and I'm confident the American people will respond.

It's not going to be easy. The American people want action. And with your help, we can give the American people the kind of answers, the kind of action, the kind of change they are looking for. Think about it. If we can tear down the Berlin Wall, we can build a strong economy. If we can lift the Iron Curtain, we can

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bring the curtain down on immorality and indifference. And if we can help people walk free through the streets of Europe, there's no reason that we can't take back our streets here in America.

And that's all I'll say for now. And now I'd like to hear what's on your mind and thank you so very much for what you're doing.

Q Mr. President, this is Pete Wilson in Sacramento.

PRESIDENT BUSH: Governor, how are you?

Q I'm fine sir, how are you?

PRESIDENT BUSH: All right sir.

Q Mr. President, as I travel California I find that the

people of my state share your number one concern which is the economy. They are very much interested in jobs for themselves, and for their neighbors, and finally for their children.

Now, we intend in California to send you that Republican

Congress that you deserve. That's a priority for us. But would you tell us, sir, how you intend in your second term to take the steps necessary for America to compete successfully in this global economy, and how will that specifically help to create new jobs that the Californians need?

PRESIDENT BUSH: Well, Pete, I firmly believe that we have

to get the federal deficit under control. I believe that will stimulate the economy shortrun and longer run. I have gotten before the Congress, and I think I mentioned this before in my remarks, some proposals to actually stimulate investment and jobs right now and some of us -- (inaudible) -- investment, tax allowance, almost like an ITC, like an investment tax credit, talking about a first time home buyers -- credit for home buyers that are going to own their home for the first time -- that'll stimulate not only the home building industry but then the many industries that serve that great business.

We've got to do that, we've got to hold the line on federal

spending. And one of the proposals we have in detail, sitting up in the place you used to work, the United States Senate, is a proposal to cap the growth of the mandatory spending programs, leaving social security aside. That will do a lot to re-instill confidence, and it'll do a lot to get this federal deficit under control.

I've also fought the battle here in Washington for the

balanced budget amendments. Frankly, it would discipline not only the Congress but the executive branch, and that was defeated. We had close to two thirds in the House and then several of the people that sponsored that resolution, that amendment, got the arm put to them by the leadership, the liberal leadership in the House, and they changed their votes at the last minute. So we lost that one.

I'm going after the line item veto again. What, 43 governors and I think you've got it, maybe you don't. Anyway, 43 governors have it. Oddly enough, I notice that it's cropped up in my

opponent's platform. Hasn't lifted a finger to do anything about it. Hasn't made one phone call to one Congressman trying to do what the people want, but we're going to fight for that one.

And the good news on this one, Pete, on jobs for the future, is we're poised for a good recovery. The economy is growing, albeit too slowly, and I know California's still hurting a lot and other states are. But the national economy is growing. We've got interest rates down. Inflation is down, and literally, we are poised for what could be a spectacular recovery.

So, I want to put some incentive into the system to make that come true right now. And we do have good programs. So I'm going to ask that everybody that's listening tonight to take a look at the definitive aspects of our program, take that message to the people in your communities. And I believe we can get this country moving again.

Q Well, Mr. President, I think you just proved very clearly that you know what needs to be done, now it's our job to get you the votes in Congress to help you do it. Incidentally, I'd love to see you get that line item veto.

PRESIDENT BUSH: Well, we want that and we're going to work like the Dickens for it, I'll tell you. You know, you mentioned Congress. There are going to be so many changes in Congress, in the House now I'm talking about, that I think no matter what happens -- and I want them to be Republicans obviously -- there are going to be so many changes though that the people that take their case to the people are going to have to listen, and when they come into Washington next January, I think they are coming to represent change. And I think the change is the kind of programs I'm talking about here. So, I'm optimistic.

Q Thank you very much sir. Look forward to seeing you soon.

PRESIDENT BUSH: Good luck.

Q Mr. President, this is Jim Oberweyer (sp) from Dallas, Texas.

PRESIDENT BUSH: My heavens.

Q How are you, sir?

PRESIDENT BUSH: Fine Jim.

Q Good. My question, Mr. President, is this. It concerns the problem of drugs and crime in America and I know that Governor Clinton did not even mention crime and drugs in his acceptance speech. Could you outline for us the initiatives you have in getting tough on criminals and fighting the war on drugs in America?

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PRESIDENT BUSH: We got a good program, Jim. We've got a good national drug strategy, and frankly, we've made some headway. The good news is that cocaine use among teenage kids is down, down by 60 percent since I've been President. That's encouraging.

The bad news, to be very frank about it is, that in the 35 year age group, where you have more addicts, we aren't making the progress we want. So, we have a good program for rehabilitation, treatment, and I think that's important.

Our interdiction efforts, working cooperatively with the countries south of our border, including Mexico, are going well. Still got a long way to go, but look what's happening in Columbia when it comes to jailing the drug lords. So we're making some progress on that front, and I'm encouraged about it.

But there's another aspect of the fight against drugs, and that is the law enforcement aspect. We have got to get these drug dealers brought to justice. And, again, I don't want to sound like I'm trying to blame somebody else all the time. But we have a program, a crime bill, that's sitting, languishing in the House of Representatives because they will not do what the American people want, and that is to pass strong, anti-crime, anti-drug legislation that carries out a little more support for the victims of crime and a little less for the criminals themselves.

So, we've got to get tougher on law enforcement. Let me say lastly, I'm going on a little long on this question, but I get wound up because this is priority. We've got to win this fight. I support our local law enforcement people. And we ought not to back away from it. We must support those who lay their lives on the line for us every single day, and I'm talking about whether it's the sheriff's officers, or the police department, and I hope they know. And those that are in that line of work know tonight how strongly I feel about backing them up with strong, anti-crime legislation.

Q Thank you Mr. President.

PRESIDENT BUSH: And Jim, thanks for what you're doing there. Q Thankyou very much, sir, for everything you're doing.

PRESIDENT BUSH: We keep struggling. I'm confident.

Q -- in the Pizza and Sports arena in Atlanta, along with several hundred of your strong supporters including several people who have previously been supporting Ross Ferot. We've had the pleasure this evening of listening to a fellow Georgian that we're very proud of, the gentleman that you appointed Secretary of Health and Human Services.

Dr. Sullivan talked to us about health care, a matter of considerable concern to all of us. We know that you submitted a plan to Congress some six months ago which they have not yet acted upon. If you would tell us about that plan to control health care costs and make quality health care available to all Americans, and tell us, if you will, why you feel Congress has failed to act on that important issue?

PRESIDENT BUSH: Fred, you're putting me in a very difficult spot here. You're asking me to talk about health care after you've just heard from Lou Sullivan, your fellow Georgian. And this gives me an opportunity though to say that he is doing a superb job as our Secretary of HHS, all the way from health care which I will talk about now, to showing the right kind of research and the right kind of compassion in relation to AIDS. This is a problem that really concerns us and Lou Sullivan has been out there on the cutting edge with sound and sensible approaches to the AIDS problem, including his insistence that we've raised our spending on research up to something like \$4.9 billion requested in our '93 budget, up from 4.2 now. So, not only is he doing a great job on the health care front, but also in these individual diseases where his record is superb.

Health care. We've got a good program. First, let me say what I won't do. I will not sign any legislation that puts socialized medicine, or nationalized medicine, if you will, into the American equation. We have the best quality health care in the entire world and one way to ruin that is to go with one of these socialized or nationalized programs.

I will not burden the small businessman by this so-called pay or play insurance. That is a program where you just shift the burden of the cost into the business community. And it was tried in a couple of states and the businesses fled across the state line. That won't work, and it's very, very expensive.

So what we've done is design a program that brings affordable insurance to everyone that is uninsured. And we do it through pooling of insurance, we do it, we get the cost down by insisting that the United States Congress pass some liability restrictions. In other words, these malpractice suits -- Fred, this is hard for you to believe I'm sure, malpractice suits cost anywhere from \$25 to \$50 billion a year. Mind boggling. And the special interest on the other side, those beholden to the trial lobby simply will not pass

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our restrictions on some of these lawsuits. And we've got to fight to get that done.

Our program really continues to provide quality insurance and through a series of credits, and through this pooling of insurance, we make insurance available to all. And the poorest of the poor get a shot at it.

Another thing that our program does is make it what you call transportable. If a person works in a company, has to move to some other area, he has that insurance stays with him. He can't just be cut off to try to save costs on the other end. It's a good sensible, private -- you might say private enterprise approach to the problem -- and it's up there in the Congress in detail right now. And I wish the Congress would act, but I'm up against, once again, a Congress that's thinking the old Ted Kennedy way of spend a little more money on programs that have failed, or, in this case, let's pass some nationalized health plan that will literally break the taxpayers of this country.

And, so, we've got a big difference here, and this difference will be spelled out in the campaign. But with Lou Sullivan at my side, Gail Wilensky at my side, the great researchers out there working on our whole health approach, we are going to have a good record to take to the American people in the fall.

Q Thank you Mr. President.

PRESIDENT BUSH: Thank you Fred.

Q Mr. President, as I speak with business leaders here in Illinois, time and again they tell me their top concern for our future is the quality of our work force. They are concerned, in particular, with our nation's educational system and the need for educational reforms that help our young people meet the standards of increasing technical and demanding jobs. Would you tell us what specific proposals you have to meet these concerns?

PRESIDENT BUSH: First place, you've got to look at education as the item that will make us competitive with every other country around the world. We've got the best system of higher education that there is. People come from all over the world for our graduate school work, or for our college and university work.

Where we have been falling down, however, is in training, job training, and adult literacy, programs for adults, of all kinds, and in an RK through 12 education system.

The first thing I did, one of the first things I did when I became President, was to get the governors together and to set some national education goals, six of them, and they're very sensible, pragmatic goals that set the goals, but then leave the states the flexibility to meet the goals.

Then, under the leadership of a former governor, one of your friends, Lamar Alexander, we've designed a program called America 2000. Now, to go into the technicalities of it is too much, but what it really does is revolutionize American education. Many institutions have changed, but education has not changed. And many on the other side are beholden to the union, to the NEA, the National Education Association that is a very firm union -- fortunately, most of the teachers don't agree with them -- but they have endorsed the opponent and they want to do it the same old way.

We want to do it the new way. We believe that choice in education is very, very important. Parents ought to be able to choose their schools. And I mean by that public, private, or religious. Now, when I got out of the service, I was on the GI Bill, I got to use the GI Bill and they didn't tell me you can't go to a religious school or a private school, or you have to go to a state university. And that same principle of choice can, and will, work for the kids. We've got a new GI bill for children. It really helps parents implement this concept of choice.

And so our whole America 2000 strategy is designed at thinking anew, I believe, you know, some of the suburban areas in Illinois might have a little different approach than some of the highly concentrated city areas. So we want the control to stay at the local level and our America 2000 does that, but it encourages through the new American schools concept innovation and competition, and we can get this job done. I am absolutely convinced, if we've done it at the higher level, we can do it and offer these kids a real shot at the American dream.

Q Thank you Mr. President, and you can be assured we'll do all we can here in Illinois to see you have four more years.

PRESIDENT BUSH: Thank you Governor, for all you're doing. Thank you very much, Jim.

Q Mr. President, this is Doug Barclay (sp) calling from Long Island, New York.

PRESIDENT BUSH: Doug, you're out of your turf there.

Q Yes, sir, but I'm in the state of New York.

PRESIDENT BUSH: Well, that's for sure. How are you?

Q I'm well thank you. You've been discussing issues that are important to the family -- education, health and other related matters. Health and education are important, but equally important is to keep the family together. Your welfare reform encourages families to stay together. Would you please elaborate on this important issue?

PRESIDENT BUSH: Doug, one of the great tragedies is the fact that you have decades -- or put it this way, Generation after

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generation in some families -- living on the welfare. Being

stripped of their dignity because they've had neither the education  
or the work incentive to move off of welfare. So we have a program  
that really is largely based around granting waivers, again this  
sounds technical, but encouraging innovation.

I think of what Tommy Thompson's done in -- Governor Thompson  
to me -- in Wisconsin, with work fair, or learn fair, that says  
look, if you're going to get a welfare check, you're going to have  
to do some work and you're going to have to get educated if you have  
some real shortcomings in that field. Just today I signed a waiver  
permitting the state of New Jersey to try their new programs for  
welfare reform.

Pete Wilson, who we talked to just a minute ago, has a very  
innovative approach also built around the world incentive to  
encourage people to work, and thus get off welfare. And you're  
right, it does hold families together. But where we need to take  
action, we are in the field, for example, a father deserts the  
mother with the child, and we're going after those deadbeat fathers  
and making them pay up, finding them, making them face the law. And  
so, we're trying to use discipline as well as encouragement.

And let me say something else. This, sometimes when you talk  
about welfare reform, you've got to be a little careful because some  
would make the listener believe that isn't fair in terms of welfare  
reform I'm doing something that isn't fair in terms of race, or fair  
to minority. The people that have been victimized the most by the  
system have been many in the minority community and they're the ones  
that want the educational opportunity. They're the ones that want  
to keep that family together. They're the ones that need to have  
those values reinforced, or re-inculcated if you will, into their  
children.

And, so, we're not talking about a race problem, or a minority  
problem, we're talking about an American problem. And our reforms  
or our encouraging the states to take these reforms, really makes a  
great deal of good sense. And we're going to keep fighting, and  
along with it incidentally, has to come that whole neighborhood  
concept keeping the neighborhood safe.

I can't tell you how emotional I feel when I think of a mother  
whose child perhaps, maybe a single mother, whose kid is at school  
and that kid comes home in an unsafe neighborhood, scared that he  
isn't going to make it to the door of the house and the mother may  
come home late at night on the subway and wondering whether because  
of some street criminal attack she's going to make it home. Along  
with the welfare reform, we've got to remember that we must make  
these neighborhoods safe too.

Thank you very much Mr. President.

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Q Mr. President, this is Mitch McConnell down in Louisville with 300 of your enthusiastic supporters.

PRESIDENT BUSH: Thank you Senator. How you doing, Mitch?

Q I'm doing fine, sir. You're looking great. Listen,

Mr. President, you made the right decision going fishing last week.

I made the mistake of listening to your opponent's speech in New

York and you're not going to believe this, he stole one of your

lines that you've used several times which was, if we can change the

world, we can change America. And, of course, you and President

Reagan changed the world and I think that clearly all of us feel you

ought to be the one to change America.

It does raise, I think, a question Mr. President, as to

whether defense and foreign policy is still important? You know, a

lot of the surveys indicate that the American people have kind of

forgotten about these issues, and I think we'd all like to hear from

you what role defense and foreign policy plays in the overall scheme

of things in the post-cold war world.

PRESIDENT BUSH: Mitch, let me get to that. But let me just

make a comment, a tongue in cheek comment. Today, I did have some

fun. A lot of kids at the American Legion program, Boys Nation,

were in the Rose Garden and somebody asked me about the speech and I

did say, you know, a Democratic candidate a few years ago dropped

out of the race being accused of plagiarism. You know, when I said,

you know, we've changed the world, let's change America, and heard

that replayed in a tape I heard after I got back from fishing, I was

thinking hey, what's going on here, you know.

But, it doesn't matter what they say. The point is, we have

changed the world. And when I stood there and signed, with Boris

Yeltsin not so many weeks ago, a program to eliminate the most

destabilizing nuclear weapons, and I'm talking about the massive SS-

10s that the Soviets have, this was a significant achievement and it

was reassuring to every family in America.

Now we can't live on that forever, but we have and I salute

President Reagan and others too that have gone before. We have won

the cold war, and we've beaten back the menace of this monolithic

communism. But we still have some problems. They say to me who's

the enemy, and I say the enemy is unpredictability. The enemy is

uncertainty. And we're fighting to guard against, as you know well,

you've helped us to guard against nuclear proliferation. And I'm

still concerned about mad dictators that would try to achieve

nuclear weapons and then to blackmail the United States of America.

I'm concerned about terrorism. I'm concerned about fighting

that could break out in the local area, and then involve all of

Europe. And we have a responsibility as the sole remaining

superpower to do our part in guaranteeing the safety of the world,

and that's in the national security interest of the United States.

So foreign policy is important. And I feel as President no greater responsibility than guaranteeing the national security of this country. Now, as you know, we have been able to cut defense spending and we've cut it substantially. And maybe in the future we can cut it more. But we must not think that there is no danger in this troubled world. It wasn't but a year and a half ago that we had to go to war to beat back an aggressor, and I might say in so doing we earned the respect of the entire world when our young men and women won so courageously in Desert Storm, and set an example. Said to a dictator, you're not going to take over a neighbor. That was a bold principle and we led and fought for it, and our standing in the world has never been higher because of it.

Now, we've got other problems and I am determined to do everything we can to cut all spending, but we must not cut into the muscle of our defense. And we must be ready for emergencies that we can't even foresee today. And so defense is important. Foreign policy is important.

And I might say this. If you want to put it in terms of jobs and opportunity, in a tranquil world, in a tranquil world jobs for Americans in America are guaranteed because we are leading in exports. It's exports that have saved us during this terrible anemic recovery, or recessionary times. It is the exports that have saved us, and if we were dealing in unpeaceful areas, we wouldn't have this kind of job opportunity right here in the United States. So, we've got to preserve it, and I know that the Democrats act like foreign policy is absolutely unimportant, that world peace doesn't matter, that defense doesn't matter. But I think they do and thank God my grandchildren, all twelve of them, can go to sleep at night without this fear of nuclear weapons that generations previously had. And that's an accomplishment all of us can be proud of.

Well, Mr. President, we want to thank you for not only what you've done to make the world safer, but what you've done for us here in Kentucky as we're going to do everything we can to ensure that you have four more years.

PRESIDENT BUSH: Mitch, thank you, sir, for all you are doing and I value your counsel, as you know. So keep those cards and letters coming.

Well, listen, I guess that's it and the end of our question period. But again, to all assembled, thank you so much for tuning in tonight. Thanks once again for all the hours and all the effort. You know, tonight we've talked about the programs and the policy that can change America for the better. Instead of saying change, I might say renew America. We're basically strong, and we're basically sound, so I like that world renewal.

## The Stanley Cup

The Stanley Cup was originally donated to the Canadian Amateur Hockey Assn. by Sir Frederick Arthur Stanley, Lord Stanley of Preston and 16th Earl of Derby, who had become interested in the sport while Governor General of Canada from 1888 to 1893. Stanley wanted the trophy to be a challenge cup, contested for each year by the best amateur hockey teams in Canada.

In 1893, the Cup was presented without a challenge to the AHA champion Montreal Amateur Athletic Assn. team. Every year since, however, there has been a playoff. In 1914, Cup trustees limited the field challenging for the trophy to the champion of the eastern professional National Hockey Assn. (NHA, organized in 1910) and the western professional Pacific Coast Hockey Assn. (PCHA, organized in 1912).

The NHA became the National Hockey League (NHL) in November, 1917. From 1918 to 1926, the NHL and PCHA champions played for the Cup with the Western Canada Hockey League (WCHL) champion joining in a three-way challenge in 1923 and '24. The PCHA disbanded after the 1925-26 season and the NHL playoffs have decided the winner of the Stanley Cup ever since.

## PRESIDENT BUSH TO PARTICIPATE IN NATIONAL SATELLITE CAMPAIGN BRIEFING MONDAY EVENING

-- GATHERINGS PLANNED IN 27 STATES --

Washington, D.C. -- President George Bush will participate in a national satellite campaign briefing with supporters gathered at 34 sites in 27 states on Monday, July 20.
