TOAST FOLLOWING THE PRESIDENT'S DINNER

IN HONOR OF PRESIDENT MUBARAK

TUESDAY, APRIL 4, 1989

President Mubarak and Distinguished Guests:

It is a great pleasure to welcome you back to the White House. It is most fitting that old friends like you, Mr. President, are among the first visitors to Washington since I assumed my new responsibilities. I hope this is only the first of the occasions we will have to host you here.

I think we had a pretty good day here yesterday -- we struck the right balance. Our meetings in the morning were very productive and valuable to me. Then off to the ball game. Sitting in the stands out at Memorial Stadium, I couldn't help but think of Lou Gehrig's comment that "it's great to be young and a Yankee." It made me think that it's also nice to be a little older and President.

One of the special reasons I have for feeling particularly close to President Mubarak is that we both have been tested in the crucible of Vice Presidential service. I am sure that you will agree with me, Mr. President, that there are a great many noble attributes which characterize Vice Presidents. Integrity and wisdom are two which spring quickly to mind. But possibly

the most important characteristic for a Vice President, certainly the one which draws the most comment, is the ability to adapt yourself to the pace and orientation of someone else -- those of you who are husbands will also appreciate this concept. In order to do that successfully, you have to be patient. All Vice Presidents are believers, by necessity, in Longfellow's dictum that "patient endurance attaineth to all things."

The benefits of patient endurance, of course, stretch well beyond the confines of the Vice Presidency or even marriage. The patient pursuit of sound policies and just solutions by our two governments in recent years has begun to bear fruit. In that regard, I believe it might be helpful to compare the situation which prevails in the region today to that which characterized it when you last joined us. In the fifteen months since you last honored us with your presence, Mr. President, our common policy has been rewarded with a series of advances which just a few years ago appeared wildly improbable.

In fact, patience has brought us to the point of recognizing a new era of opportunity for the peoples of the Middle East -- opportunity to build secure and stable relationships on the basis of the peaceful resolution of differences; opportunity to achieve social and economic well-being; and opportunity to define a future unbound by the diktat of foreign occupiers.

In Afghanistan, nearly ten years of foreign occupation has been swept away by the popular resistance of the Afghan people. We are under no illusion that the struggle for Afghan self-determination has now been achieved -- the struggle continues against an illegitimate regime. But we who stood beside the people of Afghanistan in their struggle to be free know that the right of the Afghans to determine the fate of their nation will soon be restored.

Similarly, we have seen in the last fifteen months -- in the ceasefire now in place between Iran and Iraq -- the hopeful first steps on the way back to peace and stability for that troubled region. Again, we are under no illusions that the transition to a better future will be brief or easy. But we do believe that the ceasefire provides an opportunity to pave the way to a permanent peace based on a resolution of the issues before the two parties. Patience and determination will be the watchwords.

Developments in Afghanistan and the Gulf in recent months have been dramatic. In contrast, there have been no dramatic breakthroughs in our search for peace among Arabs and Israelis -- a search which so often has appeared designed to test the

patience of angels. But I believe that we have made real progress there as well. Fifteen months ago, Mr. President, your visit to Washington began an extended effort to lay the foundation for Middle East peace. Secretary Shultz's efforts, with your strong and unstinting support and guidance, did indeed stimulate fresh thinking in the region and an extended and healthy debate among all parties as to what their real objectives in the peace process should be. At the end of that process, and again with strong Egyptian leadership very much in evidence, PLO Chairman Arafat acknowledged that the future of the Palestinian people would be served best by an end to the violence and despair of the last forty years and by the participation of Palestinian representatives in the search for peaceful solutions. We are now engaged in a dialogue with representatives of the PLO to see whether further progress can be achieved in the search for peace.

Mr. President, as we noted just one week ago on the tenth anniversary of Egypt's historic Treaty of Peace with Israel, my Administration will remain committed to the goal of achieving a just and lasting peace in the Middle East. Its achievement will not come easily -- it will test our reserves of patience and determination. But, I can think of no better way to honor those who gave us peace between Israel and Egypt than to see it extended to the entire Middle East.

There is a tale that Napoleon, upon first seeing the Pyramids, galloped to their base and exclaimed to his troops: "Consider, from the summits of these Pyramids forty centuries have their eyes fixed on you." I believe that the eyes of forty centuries are fixed on us to see what we will do with these opportunities before us. With patient endurance, I believe we will attain our ends and distinguish ourselves before the watching centuries.
