But now, everywhere, we see signs of a warmer, more hopeful peace, like a candle that flickers in a distant window. It beckons, encourages, casts a bright glow in the world's darkest corners.

Change comes, and challenges us. Freedom comes, and lights a candle that can never be put out.

Voices are raised -- some in songs of joy, some in cries for freedom -- but all are heard on God's earth. We speak of a "peace the world cannot give" -- but we know God can give us the strength to find it.

Glasses are raised, hearts are lifted, to toast the dawn of a new Europe. New religious freedoms. New possibilities for prosperity, around the world. A new peace -- within our reach -- within this century.

In corners still shrouded in oppression and darkness, the yearning for freedom still burns brightly within. May all who dare to hope for it, find it.

Let every candle we light, every hand we offer, symbolize the hope of a new century, the hope of mankind: That there will be peace on earth -- good will -- and the blessings of freedom, for all the peoples of the world.
