IN ALL OF THESE PLACES, YOU WILL DISCOVER THAT WARM TIES OF KINSHIP AND LANGUAGE BIND AMERICANS TO THE PEOPLES OF EASTERN AND CENTRAL EUROPE.

BUT WE ARE ALSO BOUND BY A YEARNING FOR UNIVERSAL FREEDOM, A DEDICATION TO THE RIGHTS OF MAN. THERE WAS A TIME WHEN A GREAT SON OF POLAND HELPED TO LEAD AMERICANS IN OUR FIRST WAR, OUR WAR FOR INDEPENDENCE. AND, OF COURSE, TWICE IN THIS CENTURY AMERICANS FOUGHT IN EUROPE TO PROTECT LIBERTY.

Go to Hamtramack, Michigan, and you will hear Polish spoken in virtually every shop and deli. Go to the little Czech towns of Texas, or the Hungarian, Romanian or Serbian communities of New York City. Or go right here, to ((place)) in Maryland, where there are ((people)).

In any of these places, you will discover that warm ties of kinship and language bind Americans to the peoples of Eastern and Central Europe.

But we are also bound by a yearning for universal freedom, a dedication to the Rights of Man. There was a time when a great son of Poland helped to lead Americans in our first war, our war for Independence. And, of course, twice in this century Americans fought in Europe to protect liberty.

But the last forty-five years have given us a different kind of struggle, a Cold War in which whole nations were fenced in, captive and oppressed.

In Eastern Europe, brave men and women risked prison, even their very lives, to speak the truth about this oppression. But Americans were challenged in a different way -- challenged to stay in solidarity with our friends across the Iron Curtain.

And because we were firm, the world of 1990 is already a far different place than it was in 1989. When I went to Mainz, West Germany, last year to call for the dismantlement of the Berlin

Wall, we never imagined it would come down so soon. And as the Wall tumbled, no one quite foresaw that its collapse would set off a tremor that upended tyrants from Berlin to Bucharest.

She was asked: "How is it possible, after such a short time, to break bread with the men who ordered those imprisonments?"

She replied: "Our joy at what is happening now is greater than memory."

Go to Hamtramack, Michigan, and you will hear Polish spoken in virtually every shop and deli. Go to the little Czech towns of Texas, or the Hungarian, Romanian or Serbian communities of New York City. Or go right here, to ((place)) in Maryland, where there are ((people)).

In any of these places, you will discover that warm ties of kinship and language bind Americans to the peoples of Eastern and Central Europe. *all*

But *we* are also bound by a yearning for universal freedom, a dedication to the Rights of Man. There was a time when a great son of Poland helped to lead Americans in our first war, our war for Independence. And, of course, twice in this century Americans fought in Europe to protect liberty.

But the last forty-five years have given us a different kind of struggle, a Cold War in which whole nations were fenced in, captive and oppressed.

In Eastern Europe, brave men and women risked prison, even their very lives, to speak the truth about *this* oppression. But Americans were challenged in a different way -- challenged to stay in solidarity with our friends across the Iron Curtain.

And because we were firm, the world of 1990 is already a far different place ~~than~~ it was in 1989. When I went to Mainz, West Germany, last year to call for the dismantlement of the Berlin

*from what*

Wall, we never imagined it would come down so soon. And as the Wall tumbled, no one quite foresaw that its collapse would set off a tremor that upended tyrants from Berlin to Bucharest.

Now these nations are forging a new identity -- that of a Europe whole and free. When I last visited Poland and Hungary, I caught a glimmer of this future in small acts of healing and reconciliation. It was in Warsaw, at my lunch for General Jaruzelski and the leaders of Solidarity, that I met a woman who had worked, at great personal risk, for the release of jailed dissidents. She was asked: "How is it possible, after such a short time, to break bread with the men who ordered those imprisonments?"

She replied: "Our joy at what is happening now is greater than memory."

The societies of Eastern Europe were once gray and somber. But the color and ~~creativity~~ of a great and glorious past is returning. Tonight, we celebrate a joy\\ that is truly\\ greater than memory.
