A GUY BENCH-PRESS AN M-1 TANK.))\\

LET ME SAY, IT'S GREAT TO BE BACK WITH SO MANY GOOD FRIENDS, BACK IN THE GOLDEN STATE. THE PEOPLE WHO CAME TO CALIFORNIA, WOULDN'T STOP LOOKING FOR GOLD AND GLORY UNTIL THE TRAIL STOPPED AT THE EDGE OF THE PACIFIC. THAT'S WHY THIS STATE TODAY IS A PLACE WHERE THE DREAMERS ARE THE DOERS. WHY CALIFORNIA IS LEADING AMERICA INTO THE FUTURE. AND I CAN'T THINK OF ANYONE BETTER QUALIFIED TO LEAD CALIFORNIA INTO THAT FUTURE THAN YOUR NEXT GOVERNOR -- PETE WILSON.\\

I WILL HAVE A LOT TO SAY TONIGHT ABOUT PETE WILSON AND THE REPUBLICAN FUTURE IN CALIFORNIA. BUT FIRST, LET ME SPEAK OF TWO MATTERS CRITICAL TO THE FUTURE OF AMERICA AND THE WORLD.

A WEEK AGO TONIGHT, I WENT BEFORE THE CONGRESS AND THE AMERICAN PEOPLE TO DISCUSS TWO URGENT AND INTERRELATED MATTERS -- AGGRESSION IN THE MIDDLE EAST AND THE FEDERAL BUDGET DEFICIT.

EVEN BEFORE THE PERSIAN GULF CRISIS, WE WERE ALREADY MORE ECONOMICALLY VULNERABLE THAN WE SHOULD EVER BE, ESPECIALLY WITH A PROJECTED FEDERAL DEFICIT OF \$232 BILLION. SO I TOLD THE CONGRESS, (AND I KNOW THAT PETE WILSON AGREES) THAT WE MUST ADDRESS OUR BUDGET DEFICIT -- NOT IN 1991, OR 1992, BUT NOW.\\

WE NEED A BUDGET AGREEMENT THAT MEETS FOUR BASIC TESTS.

IT MUST INCLUDE MEASURES TO INCREASE ECONOMIC GROWTH, AND CUT OUR NATIONAL DEPENDENCE ON FOREIGN OIL. IT MUST BE FAIR. EVERYONE SHOULD BE CALLED UPON TO MAKE A SACRIFICE, BUT NO ONE SHOULD BEAR THE BURDEN ALONE.\\

A BUDGET AGREEMENT SHOULD ADDRESS THE GROWTH OF THE GOVERNMENT'S HIDDEN LIABILITIES AND REFORM THE BUDGET PROCESS. AND ONE THING MORE: WE CAN CUT THIS BUDGET WITHOUT HURTING THE ECONOMY.\\ WITHOUT ANOTHER PHONEY-BALONEY PLAN.\\ WITH AN AGREEMENT THAT IS CREDIBLE, REAL AND ENFORCEABLE -- ONE THAT WILL SAVE AMERICA HALF A TRILLION DOLLARS IN FIVE YEARS.\\

I ALSO TOLD THE CONGRESS IF AMERICA REMAINS STRONG AT HOME, AMERICA CAN CONTINUE TO LEAD ABROAD. BUT THERE IS ANOTHER COMPONENT OF AMERICAN LEADERSHIP THAT HAS NO PRICE TAG -- THE MEN AND WOMEN WHO ARE SERVING THIS COUNTRY IN THE PERSIAN GULF.\\

AMERICA IS A MIGHTY NATION. BUT WE ARE A GREAT NATION ONLY BECAUSE OF THOSE WHO ARE READY TO LEAVE THE COMFORT OF THEIR HOMES\\ IN OCEANSIDE OR SAN BERNADINO\\ TO SERVE ON THE FRONT-LINE HALFWAY AROUND THE WORLD IN DEFENSE OF FREEDOM. AMERICA IS GREAT BECAUSE ITS COURAGE IS GREAT.\\

WE ALL WISH THEIR JOB WAS DONE. BUT WE KNOW THAT IT'S NOT.

CERTAIN OBJECTIVES MUST BE MET. IRAQ MUST WITHDRAW FROM KUWAIT, WITHOUT CONDITION.\\ KUWAIT'S LEGITIMATE GOVERNMENT MUST BE RESTORED. THE SECURITY AND STABILITY OF THE PERSIAN GULF MUST BE ASSURED. AND AMERICAN CITIZENS ABROAD MUST BE PROTECTED.\\

THESE OBJECTIVES ARE NOT OURS ALONE. THEY'VE BEEN ENDORSED BY THE UNITED NATIONS SECURITY COUNCIL FIVE TIMES IN FIVE WEEKS. AND LET ME NOTE THE GOOD NEWS FROM OUR ALLIES. WEST GERMANY HAS PLEDGED TO SUPPORT THE MISSION WITH ALMOST \$2 BILLION, AND PROVIDE TRANSPORT SHIPS AND PLANES, WHILE JAPAN HAS PLEDGED A PACKAGE WORTH \$4 BILLION. FRANCE HAS ADDED ANOTHER 4,000 TROOPS. AND GREAT BRITAIN HAS SENT 120 TANKS, AND 6,000 TROOPS ^{AND} OF THE FAMOUS REGIMENT ~~OF~~ THE DESERT RATS. IT IS TRULY IRAQ AGAINST THE WORLD.\\\

WE'VE ALSO PUT TIGHT SANCTIONS INTO EFFECT, WHILE WORKING WITH THE UNITED NATIONS SECURITY COUNCIL TO ALLOW FOOD TO REACH INNOCENT CHILDREN, MOTHERS, THE SICK AND THE ELDERLY. AND WE'VE BEEN WORKING WITH MANY NATIONS TO GET RELIEF TO THE MOST PITIFUL VICTIMS OF THIS CONFLICT -- THE REFUGEES.

I SPOKE OF OUR FOUR OBJECTIVES. BUT WE HAVE ANOTHER, FINAL OBJECTIVE -- TO CREATE A NEW PARTNERSHIP OF NATIONS. A NEW WORLD ORDER -- FREER FROM THE THREAT OF TERROR, STRONGER IN THE PURSUIT OF JUSTICE, MORE SECURE IN THE QUEST FOR PEACE.

THE INTERNATIONAL COMMUNITY HAS ALREADY TAKEN A GIANT STEP TOWARD THAT DAY. TOGETHER WITH OUR FRIENDS AND ALLIES, SHIPS OF THE UNITED STATES NAVY ARE PATROLLING MIDEAST WATERS. THEY'VE ALREADY INTERCEPTED MORE THAN 700 SHIPS TO ENFORCE THESE SANCTIONS AGAINST IRAQ. THE WORLD IS SIMPLY TELLING SADDAM HUSSEIN: WE WILL NOT GIVE IN TO INTIMIDATION.\\\

ON MATTERS LIKE THESE, WE ARE CALLED UPON TO PUT COUNTRY BEFORE SELF, AND PATRIOTISM BEFORE PARTY. SO IT'S GOOD THAT POLITICS STOP AT THE WATERS EDGE; BUT THAT STILL LEAVES A LOT OF AMERICA IN BETWEEN. FROM LONG BEACH TO LONG ISLAND, WE SHOULD AND WE WILL VIGOROUSLY CAMPAIGN RIGHT UP TO THE NOVEMBER ELECTION. FOR THOSE OF US AT HOME, WE CAN SERVE OUR COUNTRY BY BEING THE BEST CANDIDATES, THE BEST CITIZENS, AND YES, THE BEST REPUBLICANS AND THE DEMOCRATS WE CAN BE.\\\

AND I AM SURE EVERY DEMOCRAT AGREES -- WE WILL NOT ALLOW OUR POLITICAL LIFE TO BE HELD HOSTAGE TO A CRISIS. WHEN CALIFORNIANS GO TO THE POLLS, ABSENTEE BALLOTS WILL BE COMING IN FROM AMERICANS IN UNIFORM, INCLUDING THOSE STATIONED IN THE PERSIAN GULF REGION. IF OUR SOLDIERS, SAILORS, AIRMEN AND MARINES CAN FIND THE TIME TO VOTE UNDER SUCH DIFFICULT CIRCUMSTANCES; SURELY THOSE OF US AT HOME WILL DO OUR CIVIC DUTY AS WELL.\\\

JUST A FEW MINUTES AGO, I SPOKE OF INTERNATIONAL INTIMIDATION. WELL, IT DOES AMERICANS NO GOOD TO STOP AGGRESSION ABROAD, IF BULLIES TAKE OVER THE STREETS AT HOME. ~~AS~~ AS A FORMER U.S. MARINE, AS A SENATE LEADER IN FOREIGN POLICY AND DEFENSE, PETE WILSON UNDERSTANDS THE NEED TO REPEL AGGRESSION ABROAD.

BUT HE ALSO UNDERSTANDS THE NEED TO REPEL
AGGRESSION AT HOME. LET ME TELL YOU A STORY THAT MEANS
A LOT TO HIM, ABOUT AN IMMIGRANT FROM IRELAND NAMED
MICHAEL CALLAHAN, WHO CAME TO THESE SHORES TO FIND
PEACE AND PROSPERITY. MICHAEL CALLAHAN MOVED TO
CHICAGO, STARTED A FAMILY, WORKED HARD, AND ROSE TO THE
RANK OF DETECTIVE SERGEANT ON THE CITY POLICE FORCE.
AND THEN ONE EVENING, WHILE ON DUTY, SERGEANT CALLAHAN
TRIED TO ARREST TWO COCAINE DEALERS. THEY DREW THEIR
GUNS FIRST. ALTHOUGH CALLAHAN MANAGED TO SHOOT ONE OF
THE DEALERS, THE OTHER ONE SHOT HIM. SERGEANT CALLAHAN
DIED IN CHICAGO, AT THE AGE OF 30, FIGHTING THE FIRST
WAVE OF COCAINE TO SWEEP AMERICA.\\ BUT THAT WAS NOT
IN 1990, OR 1980. MICHAEL CALLAHAN DIED FIGHTING
COCAINE IN 1908.\\ AND HIS GRANDSON, PETE WILSON, IS
WITH US TONIGHT.\\

SO WHEN YOUR SENATOR SAYS WE NEED TO PROTECT THE
PUBLIC AND THE POLICE FROM COP KILLERS AND KINGPINS;
WHEN HE SAYS THAT THOSE WHO DEAL IN DEATH SHOULD REAP
WHAT THEY SOW; YOU CAN BE SURE -- PETE WILSON MEANS
BUSINESS.\\

I SHARE HIS SENSE OF MISSION. IN MAY, 1989, SURROUNDED BY HUNDREDS OF LAW-ENFORCEMENT OFFICERS BRAVING RAINY WEATHER, I CALLED ON CONGRESS TO PASS A TOUGH CRIME BILL.

SIXTEEN MONTHS HAVE NOW GONE BY. AND DESPITE THE LEADERSHIP OF PETE WILSON AND OTHERS IN THE SENATE, THE HOUSE DEMOCRATIC LEADERSHIP HAS GONE OFF INTO LEFT FIELD. EVEN WORSE, SEVERAL MEASURES RECEIVING SERIOUS CONSIDERATION IN THE HOUSE LAST WEEK WOULD ACTUALLY WEAKEN LAW ENFORCEMENT; WOULD ACTUALLY MAKE OUR CITIES AND STREETS LESS SAFE THAN THEY ARE TODAY. \\ \\ SUCH A BILL WILL STOP AT MY DESK. \\ \\

PETE WILSON AND I WANT A CRIME BILL THAT WILL STOP THE ENDLESS ABUSE OF HABEAS CORPUS. A BILL THAT GUARANTEES THAT CRIMINALS WHO USE SERIOUS WEAPONS WILL FACE SERIOUS WEAPONS CHARGES AND SERIOUS TIME. A BILL THAT GUARANTEES THAT EVIDENCE GATHERED BY GOOD COPS ACTING IN GOOD FAITH ISN'T BARRED BY TECHNICALITIES THAT LET BAD PEOPLE GO FREE.

I CANNOT SIGN A BILL THAT OVERTURNS SUPREME COURT DECISIONS LIMITING FRIVOLOUS HABEAS CORPUS PETITIONS; EXPANDS THE COVERAGE OF THE EXCLUSIONARY RULE; AND WEAKENS CAPITAL PUNISHMENT. AND I WILL NOT SIGN A BILL THAT HANDCUFFS THE POLICE.\ \ \

BUT IF SOME IN THE HOUSE HAVE BEEN AN OBSTACLE TO TOUGHER LAWS, PETE WILSON HAS BEEN AN ADVANTAGE IN THE SENATE. HE PLAYED A KEY ROLE IN PASSING THE DEATH PENALTY PROVISIONS OF THE 1988 ANTI-DRUG ACT; ONE THAT ALLOWS CAPITAL PUNISHMENT FOR THE MURDER OF A LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICER WORKING ON A DRUG-RELATED CASE.

PETE WILSON SAYS, "I WILL NOT HAVE CALIFORNIA UNDER SIEGE TO RAPISTS AND THUGS AND DRUG DEALERS." HE WANTS TO GOVERN A CALIFORNIA WHERE WOMEN NEED NO LONGER FEAR THE NIGHT, BECAUSE DRUG DEALERS AND CRIMINALS WILL FEAR THE LAW. AND HE WOULD START BY EXTENDING CAPITAL PUNISHMENT IN CALIFORNIA TO MAJOR DRUG TRAFFICKERS, THE SAME AS MY PROPOSALS BEFORE CONGRESS.

SO I HAVE TO ASK: IS IT ANY WONDER THAT THE ENDORSEMENT OF A DOZEN LAW ENFORCEMENT ORGANIZATIONS HAS GONE TO THE GRANDSON OF MICHAEL CALLAHAN?

TOMORROW, IN SAN FRANCISCO, I WILL SPEAK OF PETE WILSON'S FISCAL PHILOSOPHY AND, ESPECIALLY, OF HIS LONG-STANDING ENVIRONMENTAL LEADERSHIP. HE IS, AND ALWAYS HAS BEEN, A CONSERVATIVE. BUT PETE WILSON ALSO IS, AND ALWAYS HAS BEEN, AN ACTIVIST WHO WANTS TO USE GOVERNMENT CREATIVELY, TO IMPROVE OUR QUALITY OF LIFE.

THIS BALANCED APPROACH IS THE KEY TO HIS SUCCESS AS A LEGISLATOR IN WASHINGTON AND SACRAMENTO, AND AS MAYOR OF SAN DIEGO. IT AS WAS AS MAYOR THAT PETE WILSON FIRST SHOWED A FLAIR FOR EXECUTIVE LEADERSHIP. NOW HE SEEKS THE LARGEST EXECUTIVE JOB IN AMERICA, SECOND ONLY TO MY OWN.

HE FACES A CALIFORNIA SKEPTICAL OF ALL RHETORIC, IMPRESSED ONLY BY ACTION. BUT HE HAS FACED THE VOTERS BEFORE, RETAINING A SENATE SEAT THAT SIX PREDECESSORS LOST. PETE WILSON BROKE THE JINX, AND MADE HISTORY BECAUSE HE DELIVERS ON HIS PROMISES.

((Let me convey the apologies of a very close member of my
family who couldn't make it tonight.\ \ \ But, as it turns out,
Millie is on the road promoting her new book.))\ \ \

((Always impressive to have an author in the family.))\ \ \

((I am sorry that our national fitness czar, Arnold
Schwarzenegger, could not be with us tonight.\ \ You know, Arnold
really wanted to entertain the troops in Saudi Arabia, but we had
to turn him down. Turned out they didn't think it was very
entertaining to watch a guy bench-press an M-1 tank.))\ \ \

Let me say, it's great to be back with so many good friends,
back in the Golden State. The people who came to California,
wouldn't stop looking for gold and glory until the trail stopped
at the edge of the Pacific. That's why this state today is a
place where the dreamers are the doers. Why California is
leading America into the future. **And I can't think of anyone**

better qualified to lead California into that future than your next governor -- Pete Wilson.

I will have a lot to say tonight about Pete Wilson and the Republican future in California. But first, let me speak of two matters critical to the future of America and the world.

A week ago tonight, I went before the Congress and the American people to discuss two urgent and interrelated matters - - aggression in the Middle East and the federal budget deficit.

Even before the Persian Gulf crisis, we were already more economically vulnerable than we should ever be, especially with a projected federal deficit of \$232 billion. So I told the Congress, (and I know that Pete Wilson agrees) that we must address our budget deficit -- not in 1991, or 1992, but now.\\

We need a budget agreement that meets four basic tests.

It **must** include measures to increase economic growth, and cut our national dependence on foreign oil. **It must be fair.** **Everyone should be called upon to make a sacrifice, but no one should bear the burden alone.**\\

A budget agreement should address the growth of the government's hidden liabilities and reform the budget process. And one thing more: We can cut this budget without hurting the economy.\\ Without another phoney-baloney plan.\\ With an agreement that is **credible, real and enforceable** -- one that will **save America half a trillion dollars in five years.**\\

I also told the Congress if America remains strong at home, America can continue to lead abroad. But there is another

component of American leadership that has no price tag -- the men and women who are serving this country **in the Persian Gulf.**\\\

America is a mighty nation. But we are a **great** nation only because of those who are ready to leave the comfort of their homes\\ in Oceanside or San Bernadino\\ to serve on the front-line halfway around the world in defense of freedom. **America is great because its courage is great.**\\\

We all wish their job was done. But we know that it's not.

Certain objectives must be met. Iraq must **withdraw** from Kuwait, **without condition.**\\ Kuwait's legitimate government must be restored. The security and stability of the Persian Gulf must be assured. **And American citizens abroad must be protected.**\\\

These objectives are not ours alone. They've been endorsed by the United Nations Security Council five times in five weeks. And let me note the good news from our allies. West Germany has pledged to support the mission with almost \$2 billion, and provide transport ships and planes, while Japan has pledged a package worth \$4 billion. Great Britain has sent ~~120~~ tanks and 6,000 more troops to the Persian Gulf, and France has added another 4,000 troops. It is truly Iraq against the world.\\\

We've also put tight sanctions into effect, while working with the United Nations Security Council to allow food to reach innocent children, mothers, the sick and the elderly. And we've been working with many nations to get relief to the most pitiful victims of this conflict -- the refugees.

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AND G.B. has sent 250 tanks, 6,000 more troops AND the FAMOUS REGIMENT THE DESERT RATS.

I spoke of our four objectives. But we have another, final objective -- to create a new partnership of nations. A new world order -- freer from the threat of terror, stronger in the pursuit of justice, more secure in the quest for peace.

The international community has already taken a giant step toward that day. Together with our friends and allies, ships of the United States Navy are patrolling Mideast waters. But if some in the House have been an obstacle to tougher laws, Pete Wilson has been an advantage in the Senate. He played a key role in passing the death penalty provisions of the 1988 Anti-Drug Act; one that allows capital punishment for the murder of a law enforcement officer working on a drug-related case.

Pete Wilson says, "I will not have California under siege to rapists and thugs and drug dealers." He wants to govern a California where women need no longer fear the night, because drug dealers and criminals will fear the law. And he would start

by extending capital punishment in California to major drug traffickers, the same as my proposals before Congress.

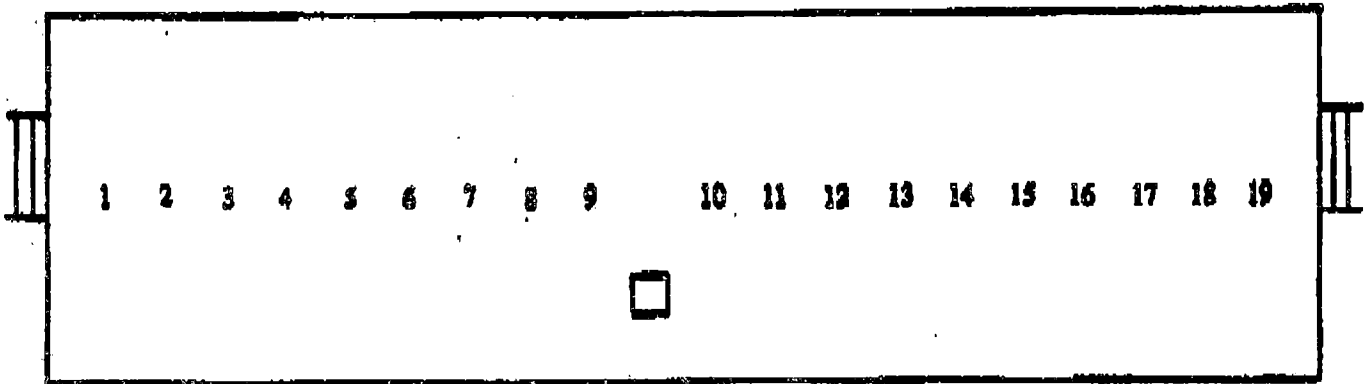

FRANCOIS Mitterrand announced the dispatch of 4,000 more French combat troops to Saudi Arabia yesterday in a swift and angry response to the violation of the diplomatic immunity of the French ambassador's residence by Iraqi troops in Kuwait.

In a day of several military and diplomatic developments, Iraq unexpectedly opened the Kuwaiti border and allowed hundreds of Kuwaitis to cross into Saudi Arabia, Saudi Arabian police said. One refugee at the Saudi border town of Khafji said that Iraqi troops had confiscated the passports, identity cards and car papers of the fleeing Kuwaitis. A Saudi police officer confirmed that the border was open on the Iraqi-held side for the first time since early August, when Iraqi troops occupied Kuwait. There was no official explanation of the Iraqi move but it appeared to be aimed at stalling growing international pressure for fresh moves against Baghdad.

The French decision to send more troops capped a week of announcements of new deployments to the Gulf, including Britain's statement on Friday that it would send 120 tanks and up to 8,000 ground troops to the kingdom. More Egyptian and Syrian troops and tanks are also to be deployed, and it emerged in Washington yesterday that Saudi Arabia's own forces are to be considerably strengthened. The United States has struck a \$ 20bn arms deal with the kingdom, the biggest in American history, which includes the delivery within weeks of the first of 48 F-15 fighters.

While the military pressure continues to mount, moves are afoot to tighten the economic noose around Iraq. Several countries indicated they would like to ban trade with countries that help Iraq evade UN sanctions. Last night, France called for an immediate Security Council meeting to discuss such moves. Soon after, Saddam Hussein, Iraq's President, ordered the release of old and sick French nationals in Iraq and Kuwait. Baghdad radio said the decision to free them from tomorrow followed an appeal by the former Algerian president, Ahmed ben Bella.

Iran's National Security Council also told Iraq to withdraw from Kuwait and said Tehran was committed to enforcing sanctions against Baghdad. The Iranian news agency said a council meeting chaired by President Ali Akbar Hashemi Rafsanjani had discussed ways of forcing Baghdad to leave Kuwait. It was the latest in a series of contradictory Iranian signals. President Rafsanjani

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represents moderates seeking better ties with the West. Radicals want to support Iraq.

In another development, West Germany said it would give DM3.3bn (pounds 1.1bn) to the allied effort, Helmut Kohl, the Chancellor, said after meeting James Baker, the US Secretary of State. In West Germany, Brigadier Patrick Cordingley, commander of 7th Armoured Brigade, said his men would be on the move in two weeks. 'We are probably the most famous division in the British army. Exactly 50 years ago, they were preparing for a fight in the Western Desert. It somehow seems very appropriate that we should be chosen to go back to the Middle East in a time of crisis and rising tension there,' he said.

The French announcement followed Friday's incident in which Iraqi soldiers burst into the French residence in Kuwait and detained four Frenchmen, three of whom are still missing. Mr Mitterrand said Iraq's aim had been 'to test allied solidarity'. He said Iraq was a 'bellicose state which seems to estimate poorly the risks' it is running. France plans to send 48 combat helicopters, an armoured regiment of 48 AMX-10 tanks, an infantry regiment with anti-tank weapons, a company of engineers from the Mistral anti-air missile section and 30 combat aircraft.

In Rome before flying to West Germany, Mr Baker welcomed a call by Giulio Andreotti, Italy's Prime Minister, to take action against any country helping Iraq to break the UN trade embargo. 'To enforce the embargo completely, one should think of imposing economic sanctions also against those countries which violate it,' Mr Andreotti said.

U.S. Treasury Secretary Nicholas Brady said he was pleased with Japan's decision to boost its non-military aid to U.S. and multinational forces in the Gulf and to send a large non-military force there.

"We are pleased that the government of Japan has come forward with a significant contribution to the multinational effort to counter the effect of Iraqi aggression in Kuwait," Brady said in a prepared statement.

"This contribution will help address the immediate needs of the front-line states and assist in the defense of Saudi Arabia," he added.

A Japanese government spokesman said earlier that Japan would send non-combatants to the Gulf to provide medical, technical and back-up services. But government leaders were still arguing over whether to send troops.

Prime Minister Toshiki Kaifu and his cabinet also approved two billion dlrs in economic assistance to the Middle East, adding to a Gulf aid package first announced Aug 29.

The government also doubled to two billion dlrs the amount of non-military aid to U.S. and multinational forces in the Gulf after criticism by U.S. legislators, who have taken steps to withdraw 5,000 U.S. troops a year from Japan.

French President Francois Mitterrand announced his nation would also expel all Iraqi military advisers and send a squadron of 30 warplanes to join its forces already in the gulf in response to Iraq's forced entry of a French diplomatic mission in Kuwait on Friday.

"We will do what must be done," an angry Mitterrand said after an emergency Cabinet meeting in Paris. "But we won't be taking hostages."

Secretary of State James A. Baker III, completing a 10-day trip to the Middle East and Europe that garnered some \$16 billion in allied pledges, welcomed France's decision and hailed West German Chancellor Helmut Kohl for providing more material and economic assistance than the U.S. had requested.

"The whole world is responding and responding in an unprecedented way to Iraq's aggression," Baker said.

The announcements widened the scope and capability of the still small international force assembling in the gulf alongside some 150,000 American personnel in Saudi Arabia and the region.

The European actions also gave the administration fresh ammunition for use against congressional complaints that U.S. allies in Europe and Japan, who are more dependent on gulf oil than the U.S., have not contributed enough to the American-led effort against Hussein.

Receiving Baker in his southwestern hometown, Kohl apologized that West Germany's constitution prevents it from sending combat forces to the gulf but said the soon-to-be-united nation is determined to do its fair share in the crisis.

Baker said the German contribution, along with previously announced pledges of money, manpower and equipment from European and gulf nations, tightens the noose around Iraqi President Saddam Hussein.

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"Our goal on this trip was to strengthen the international consensus and sustain it," Baker said. "We also wanted to show Saddam Hussein that the pressure on him will only increase, not diminish."

Baker thanked Kohl for what he described as a generous and valuable contribution. Germany will provide some \$1.9 billion in new money to the gulf effort, splitting it between the U.S. and helping to offset the financial losses of poor nations in the area hurt by the United Nations embargo against Iraq.

In addition, Kohl said, Germany is contributing another \$271 million to the European Economic Community joint aid program for nations such as Egypt, Jordan and Turkey.

The French forces going to the gulf include a 1,100-man helicopter regiment with 48 attack aircraft, a light armored regiment with 48 tanks and an infantry regiment with anti-tank and anti-aircraft missiles.

They join 300 French troops already on the ground in Saudi Arabia and the United Arab Emirates as well as nine warships to give France some 3,800 military personnel in the gulf region.

The French action came after Iraqi troops forced their way into France's diplomatic compound in Kuwait, kidnapping a diplomat and three French citizens who had taken refuge there. The diplomat was later released, but the whereabouts of the French citizens was not known.

On Friday, Britain announced it would dispatch 6,000 combat forces and 120 tanks to the gulf from that nation's 7th Army Brigade, the successors to the famous Desert Rats that fought German Gen. Erwin Rommel's forces across the North African desert in World War II.

Before coming to Germany, Baker met with Italian Prime Minister Giulio Andreotti and other top officials in Rome and received pledges that the Italians would send one squadron of Tornado jet fighters, the first deployment of Italian warplanes outside the NATO alliance's area of operations since World War II.

Italy also contributed an additional warship, bringing to four the number it has in the gulf area.

Canada announced it is sending 12 CF-18 fighters to the gulf to provide air cover for three Canadian warships en route to the region.

In a news conference in Bonn, Baker confirmed the U.S. had asked the Soviet Union to provide transport to Saudi Arabia for Syrian troops. He said Moscow was considering the idea. Other senior officials said the Soviets were also pondering a quiet U.S. request for Soviet roll-on, roll-off ships to transport American M-1 tanks to Saudi Arabia.

Baker indicated that Germany had come through its first real test of reliability as Western partner in the post-Cold War era, but warned it would assume greater international responsibilities after its unification Oct. 3.

Kohl repeated his vow that he will seek an amendment of the German constitution after unification to allow German troops to serve and fight outside the country in actions authorized by the United Nations Security

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Council. The document is an outgrowth of postwar fears of a repetition of German aggression in Europe.

The German chancellor also acknowledged that West German chemical firms played a major role in supplying Iraq with deadly chemical weapons, an action he denounced as immoral and said would never happen again.

"I deeply regret the fact that there were German companies that over the past few years did put in programs in their field (in Iraq)," he said, calling the practice "utterly despicable."

WHILE United States politicians have been denouncing Japan's contributions to the defeat of Iraq as inadequate, Tokyo politicians have been haggling furiously over what to do next.

Yesterday, the cabinet finally came off the fence. In addition to commitments made on 30 August, it will give \$ 3bn (pounds 1.6bn) to the multinational force, bringing Tokyo's total contribution to about \$ 4bn, divided equally between direct military support to the multinational forces and aid to the Middle East countries that will suffer from the embargo of Iraq.

Though it is the largest donation from outside the Middle East, the \$ 4bn is unlikely to cool tempers in the US Congress. Nevertheless, the money Japan has now promised is roughly in line with what Nicholas Brady, the US Treasury Secretary, is said to have asked for during a visit to Tokyo on 7 September.

But Toshiki Kaifu, the Japanese Prime Minister, has staked his reputation on doing more than just sending money. The other plans he announced two weeks ago - supplies, transport and civilian manpower - have proven harder to realise than he expected. So far, the only supplies that have left Japan are a shipment of 800 four-wheel drive vehicles.

Mr Kaifu promised a group of 100 doctors and nurses. Yesterday, 17 had left Japan for Saudi Arabia. But they are not going to visit the front line, nor to tend the wounded: their job is to assess future needs and report back to Tokyo. Underlying these details is a serious question: why did it take Japan so long to come up with such an apparently modest proposal?

The official explanation is that Tokyo had to pay for something it had no hand in planning. 'When asked to pay the bill, we have to check the contents of the invoice,' a Foreign Ministry spokesman, said yesterday. 'That is something quite natural.'

What actually happened is rather more alarming. Understandably, given Japan's bellicose past and its present tribal fear of rising militarism, precious few Japanese want to send troops to fight abroad. Political parties and bureaucrats are disputing the 'meaning' of the pacificist constitution that was imposed by the US on Japan after the war.

In fact, the meaning is quite clear: Article IX says Japan renounces the right to settle international disputes by force, and affirms that it will never maintain military forces. Encouraged by the US, Tokyo has in flat

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contradiction of Article IX built up a Self-Defence Force 247,000- strong - supported by the world's third or fifth largest defence budget, depending on how it is counted. But because the subject of remilitarising Japan has been taboo, pragmatic defence policies have had to be evolved under the guise of changing 'interpretations' of the constitution.

Some politicians argue that the Constitution should be changed. Yet that cannot happen in time for the Gulf crisis, and reluctant bureaucrats have been able to slow down the government's response by complaining that what they were asked to do was illegal.

Private companies and citizens have been equally slow to co-operate. Japan Airlines and All Nippon Airways were reluctant to have their cargo planes used to ferry weapons from the United States to Saudi Arabia - so Tokyo has had to charter American planes to meet its promises of transport help.

Politicians have been no better. The Japan Socialist Party controls the upper house of the Diet and Mr Kaifu faces stiff opposition from within his own Liberal Democratic Party. His rivals, jealous of the popularity which a good relationship with the US has given Mr Kaifu, have used the crisis to undermine his authority.

The strongest restraint of all, however, comes from the Ministry of Finance, which has resolutely refused to come up with new money for the Gulf crisis. Yesterday's extra cash for the forces is likely to be squeezed out of existing budgets for this year, and may mean cutting the rest of the Japanese aid budget - even though the government ran a budget surplus of Y2 trillion (pounds 7bn) last year.

Tokyo is only just beginning to acquire confidence on the world stage. But if Japanese politicians present these arguments in their defence, then they cannot resist the conclusion: that Japan is not yet ready to take up a permanent seat on the UN Security Council.

Chancellor Helmut Kohl of West Germany told Secretary of State James A. Baker 3d today that his country would fulfill its responsibilities in the multinational effort to confront Iraq by providing military equipment and economic assistance worth \$1.87 billion.

But the German Chancellor said that because of restrictions in the German Constitution, which prohibit West Germany from sending troops outside of the NATO theater, Bonn would not be sending any men to join the American and other European forces stationed in and around Saudi Arabia. The Chancellor promised that as soon as the two Germanys are unified and elect an all-German Parliament in December he will introduce an amendment to the Constitution so that Germany could dispatch troops to the Persian Gulf and similar crises.

Chancellor Kohl made his commitment in a 90-minute meeting with Mr. Baker in his Ludwigshafen country home, in south central Germany. The West German offer comes in the wake of mounting Congressional criticism of Bonn's reluctance to commit resources to the multinational effort to roll back the Iraqi invasion of Kuwait.

Baker Expresses Appreciation

Similar Congressional criticism of Japan was quieted somewhat this week when Tokyo promised a package worth \$4 billion. It was unclear whether the West German announcement would mollify the critics.

Mr. Baker said he was "very appreciative of these contributions, both economic and military."

"We see them as very positive and very forthcoming," Mr. Baker said. "They go beyond what we privately discussed in earlier communications and substantially so. The President will be pleased, and I know the American people will be pleased as well."

Foreign Minister Hans-Dietrich Genscher, who met with Mr. Baker in Petersberg, near Bonn, earlier in the day, said he was sure that in light of the West German contribution "the critical voices will be silent."

Kohl Regrets Restrictions

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Although the German offer was valued at \$2 billion by Mr. Baker, that figure includes West Germany's share of a European Community aid package. The assistance is actually made up of military equipment, transport and logistical aid and financial help totaling \$835 million.

Speaking to reporters after meeting with Mr. Baker in Ludwigshafen, Mr. Kohl said: "We would like to make it very clear that we would like to give full support within the limits available to us to our American friends and partners, who are active in the gulf and who are also defending our interest in the region."

Regarding Germany's refusal to commit troops, Mr. Kohl explained: "We very much regret that our Constitution does not allow us at the present to assume our full responsibility in the area, something that I regret very much. I hope that right after the elections we will be able to initiate a change in our Constitution and fully assume our share of responsibility."

Little Enthusiasm from Germans

Until today, Bonn's contribution has been limited to warmly endorsing the multinational effort in public statements, sending five mine sweepers and two supply ships to the Mediterranean so that the American ships stationed there could be transferred to the gulf and granting Washington permission to use its bases in West Germany as way stations for transferring troops.

Opinion polls in Germany show little enthusiasm for any extensive involvement in the gulf crisis, which comes at a time when West and East Germany are preoccupied with their pending unification on Oct. 3. West German officials argue that they are going to have to pay billions of dollars in order to integrate East Germany into their economy. Also, West Germany gets virtually all of its oil from the North Sea and Norway, and 0.3 percent from Iraq.

The limited West German contribution up to now stood in stark contrast to that of other major Western industrialized countries. On Friday, Britain committed 8,000 combat troops to the gulf force. France has sent naval forces and promised 4,000 troops today, while Italian officials informed Mr. Baker in Rome Friday that they were dispatching a squadron of eight Tornado fighter aircraft and a frigate.

Mr. Baker said this evening that he had asked the Soviet Union to provide air and sea transport for the 10,000 troops and 300 tanks that the Syrians promised Saudi Arabia last week. Mr. Baker said the Soviets are considering the request.

Before arriving in Germany from Rome, American officials traveling with Mr. Baker made little effort to disguise their extreme disappointment with the behavior of the West Germans. They felt that Bonn, America's richest European ally, has been remarkably unforthcoming in the gulf crisis.

What made Bonn's unresponsiveness, up to now, even more galling, said Administration officials, was the fact that President Bush and Secretary Baker felt they had bent over backward in the last year to convince their European allies and Moscow that a united Germany would not be a threat.

Mr. Baker's stop in Germany ended a 12-day tour of Europe and the Persian Gulf, which raised more than \$16 billion in financial support for the multinational coalition in the gulf as well as extensive commitments of military support.

In light of those commitments, the United States and its allies can sustain the quarantine of Iraq, Mr. Baker said, "a lot longer than a lot of people thought when this thing first started."

Let me say, it's great to be back with so many good friends,
back in the Golden State. The people who came to California,
wouldn't stop looking for gold and glory until the trail stopped
at the edge of the Pacific. That's why this state today is a
place where the dreamers are the doers. Why California is

leading America into the future. And I can't think of anyone better qualified to lead California into that future than your next governor -- Pete Wilson.\\\

I will have a lot to say tonight about Pete Wilson and the Republican future in California. But first, I would like to speak of two matters that are critical to the future of America and the world.

A week ago tonight, I went before the Congress and the American people to discuss two urgent and interrelated matters - - aggression in the Middle East and the federal budget deficit.

Even before the Persian Gulf crisis, we were already more economically vulnerable than we should ever be, especially with a projected federal deficit of \$232 billion. So I told the Congress, (and I know that Pete Wilson agrees) that we must address our budget deficit -- not in 1991, or 1992, but now.\\\

((And we did act. Within a week after the Joint Session, Administration and Congressional negotiators reached a budget agreement that meets four basic tests.

*** Our agreement includes measures to increase economic growth, and cut our national dependence on foreign oil.

*** It is fair. Everyone will be called upon to make a sacrifice, but no one will bear the burden alone.\\\

*** It addresses the growth of the government's hidden liabilities and our agreement reforms the budget process.

And one thing more: We can cut this budget without hurting the economy.\\\ Without another phoney-baloney plan.\\\ And we

can do this because we have an agreement that is credible, real and enforceable. This agreement will save America half a trillion dollars over the next five years.\\ \\ \\ \\

I also told the Congress if America remains strong at home, America can continue to lead abroad. But there is another component of American leadership that does not have a price tag - the men and women who are serving this country in the Persian Gulf.\\ \\

America is a mighty nation. But we are a great nation only because of those who are ready to leave the comfort of their homes\\ in Oceanside or San Bernadino\\ to serve on the front-line halfway around the world in defense of freedom. America is great because their courage is great.\\ \\

We all wish their job was done. But we know that it's not. Certain objectives must be met. Iraq must withdraw from Kuwait, without condition.\\ Kuwait's legitimate government must be restored. The security and stability of the Persian Gulf must be assured. And American citizens abroad must be protected.\\ \\

These goals are not ours alone. They've been endorsed by the United Nations Security Council five times in five weeks. It is truly Iraq against the world.\\ \\

And as the world unites to prevent aggression, it opens the way to our final objective -- to create a new partnership of nations. A new world order -- freer from the threat of terror, stronger in the pursuit of justice, more secure in the quest for peace.

The international community has already taken a giant step toward that day. Together with our friends and allies, ships of the United States Navy are patrolling Mideast waters. They've already intercepted more than 700 ships to enforce these sanctions against Iraq. The world is simply telling Saddam Hussein: **We will not give in into bullies.**

On matters like these, we are called upon to put country before self, and patriotism before party. So it's good that politics stop at the waters edge; but that still leaves a lot of America in between. From Long Beach to Long Island, we should and we will vigorously campaign right up to the November election. For those of us at home, we can serve our country by being the best candidates, the best citizens, and yes, the best Republicans and the Democrats we can be.\\\

And I am sure every Democrat agrees -- we will not allow our political life to be held hostage to a crisis. When Californians go to the polls, absentee ballots will be coming in from Americans in uniform, including those stationed in the Persian Gulf region. If our soliders, sailors, airmen and Marines can find the time to vote under such difficult circumstances; surely those of us at home will do our civic duty as well.\\\

Just a few minutes ago, I spoke of an international bully. Well, it does Americans no good to stop aggression abroad, if bullies take over the streets at home. Pete Wilson, as a former United States Marine, as a Senate leader in foreign policy and

defense, Pete Wilson understands the need to repel aggression abroad.

But he also understands the need to repel aggression at home. Let me tell you a story that means a lot to him, about a policeman named Michael Callahan, an immigrant from Ireland who came to these shores to find peace and prosperity. Michael Callahan moved to Chicago, started a family, worked hard, and rose to the rank of detective sergeant on the city force. And then one evening, while on duty, Sergeant Callahan tried to arrest two cocaine dealers. They drew their guns first. Although Callahan managed to shoot one of the dealers, the other one shot him. Sergeant Callahan died in Chicago, at the age of 30, fighting the first wave of cocaine to sweep America.\\ But that was not in 1990, or 1980. Michael Callahan died fighting cocaine in 1908.\\ And his grandson, Pete Wilson, is with us tonight.\\

So when your Senator says we need to protect the public and the police from cop killers and kingpins; when he says that those who deal in death should reap what they sow; you can be sure -- Pete Wilson means business.\\

I share his sense of mission. In May, 1989, surrounded by hundreds of law-enforcement officers braving rainy weather, I called on Congress to pass a tough crime bill.

Sixteen months have now gone by. And despite the leadership of Pete Wilson and others in the Senate, the House Democratic leadership has gone off into left field. Even worse, several

measures receiving serious consideration in the House last week would actually weaken law enforcement; would actually make our cities and streets less safe than they are today.\\\ Such a bill will stop at my desk.\\\

Pete Wilson and I want a crime bill that will stop the endless abuse of habeas corpus. A bill that guarantees that criminals who use serious weapons will face serious weapons charges and serious time. A bill that guarantees that evidence gathered by good cops acting in good faith isn't barred by technicalities that let bad people go free.

I cannot sign a bill that overturns Supreme Court decisions limiting frivolous habeas corpus petitions; that expands the coverage of the exclusionary rule; and weakens capital punishment. And I will not sign a bill that handcuffs the police.\\\

Florida Awarded \$941,639 to Aid Gainesville Investigation

Attorney General Dick Thornburgh today announced the award of \$941,639 to Florida for emergency law enforcement assistance in the Gainesville serial murder investigation.

"The brutal murders of five college students in Gainesville late last month have created an atmosphere of fear for the students, the parents, the community and the residents of the state of Florida," the Attorney General noted. "Indeed, the entire nation is appalled by these slayings. It is imperative that the perpetrator or perpetrators of such heinous crimes be swiftly apprehended and held accountable. The Bush Administration is committed to using Federal emergency law enforcement assistance to help Gainesville and Florida meet the extraordinary and unanticipated expenses that this investigation has entailed."

Explaining that the money will come from a special Emergency Federal Law Enforcement Assistance Fund administered by the Office of Justice Programs, Thornburgh said, "I have

concluded that Florida's application for assistance meets the applicable criteria for granting the request. This aid is necessary to provide an adequate response to a law enforcement emergency."

One thing that seems conspicuous by its absence in this draft -- perhaps by design -- is any mention of the other great issue in California besides the crime/drug issue: the environment. If space permits, a passage lauding Wilson's support for environmental safeguards would seem to us to be a sine qua non.

We would even go so far as to suggest that the President could take the opportunity to point out that the Persian Gulf crisis and the need for energy independence in no way means that we intend to sacrifice a prudent policy of environmental stewardship. Our pre-existing "there is no mutual contradiction between economic growth and environmental protection" language is an appropriate model.

There are four crucial aspects of the Bush domestic policy message as we enter the campaign home stretch. To the extent they can appropriately be worked into drafts, particularly for political events, we will really strike home with the public as well as the voters in November.

The four overarching topics which are necessary for articulating the President's message are as follows:

- o Pro-growth/Anti-recession Agenda
- o Empowerment (including Educational Choice)/ A Kinder, Gentler Nation
- o Crime and Drugs
- o Environment/Energy

PRESIDENTIAL ADDRESS: PETE WILSON FUNDRAISER, ((Place)),
7:30 p.m., Tuesday, Sept. 18, 1990

((Acknowledgements)) Its a pleasure to be here.

((Let me convey the apologies of a very close member of my family who couldn't make it tonight.\\\ But, as it turns out, Millie is on the road promoting her new book.))\\\

((Always impressive to have an author in the family.))\\\

((On my way over here, I saw a billboard advertising a movie, which I mistakenly thought was about the new liberal vision for America.\\ It's called, "Postcards from the Edge."))\\\

But it's great to be back in the Golden State, with so many long-time friends. This is, in fact, the fourth time this year I've been back to California. According to the U.S. Census, you already have the largest Congressional delegation in America, and should receive seven more seats in the U.S. House: Seven more reasons why California is leading America into the future. And I can't think of anyone better qualified to lead California into that future than your next governor -- Pete Wilson.\\\

I will have a lot to say tonight about Pete Wilson and the Republican future in California. But first, I would like to speak of two matters critical to the future of America and the world.

A week ago tonight, I went before the Congress and the American people to discuss two urgent and interrelated matters - the federal budget deficit, and aggression in the Middle East.

Even before the Persian Gulf crisis, we were already more economically vulnerable than we should ever be, especially with a projected federal deficit of \$232 billion. So I told the Congress, (and I know that Pete Wilson agrees) that we must address our budget deficit -- not in 1991, or 1992, but now.\\

((And we did act. Not [[hours]] after the Joint Session, Administration and Congressional negotiators reached a budget agreement that meets four basic tests.

*** Our agreement includes measures to increase economic growth, and cut our national dependence on foreign oil.

*** It is fair. Everyone will be called upon to make a sacrifice, but no one will bear the burden alone.\\

*** It addresses the growth of the government's hidden liabilities.

*** Our agreement reforms the budget process.

And one thing more: We can cut this budget without hurting the economy.\\ Without another phoney-baloney plan.\\ And we can do this because we have an agreement that is credible, real and will save America half a trillion dollars.\\))

I also told the Congress if America is strong at home, America can continue to lead abroad. But another component of American leadership is priceless -- our servicemen and women in the Persian Gulf.\\

America is a mighty nation. But we are a great nation only because of those who are ready to leave the comfort of their homes\\ in Oceanside or San Bernadino\\ to serve on the front-line halfway around the world. **America is great because their courage is great.**

We all wish their job was done. But we know that it's not.

Certain objectives must be met. Iraq must **withdraw** from Kuwait, **without condition.**\\ Kuwait's legitimate government must be restored. The security and stability of the Persian Gulf must be assured. **And American citizens abroad must be protected.**\\

These goals are not ours alone. They've been endorsed by the United Nations Security Council five times in five weeks. **It is truly Iraq against the world.**\\

And as the world unites to prevent aggression, it opens the way to our final objective -- **to create a new partnership of nations.** A new world order -- freer from the threat of terror, stronger in the pursuit of justice, more secure in the quest for peace.

The international community has already taken a giant step toward that day. Together with our friends and allies, ships of the United States Navy are patrolling Mideast waters. They've already intercepted more than 700 ships to enforce these sanctions. **The world is simply telling Iraq: We will not give in to intimidation bulfies.**\\

On matters like these, we are called upon to put country before self, and patriotism before party. But I am sure every

Democrat agrees -- we won't allow our political life to be held hostage to a crisis. Politics should stop at the waters edge; but that still leaves a lot of America in between. From Long Beach to Long Island, we will vigorously campaign right up to the November election. For those of us at home, we can serve our country by being the best candidates, the best citizens, and yes, the best Republicans and ~~the~~ Democrats we can be.\\\

And here in California, the best candidate for governor is Pete Wilson.\\\
