Thank you, Bob [Smith], for that introduction and for this wonderful greeting. ((Sorry I'm late. But we had trouble out back, parking the 18-wheeler.) \\\

With Bob Smith, Warren Rudman, Gordon Humphrey, and Chuck Douglas, New Hampshire has one of the best congressional delegations in Washington. And New Hampshire has first class leadership here at home, too. And of course, I'm talking about my old friend and supporter over here, Governor Judd Gregg.

((A little earlier, somebody was wondering why I didn't bring the new big-shot in the Bush family: best-selling author Millie, our dog. \\\ She's out in the bookstores -- signing autographs. \\\ But we're having a terrible time getting the paw prints off the White House carpets.) \\\

For the Bush family, coming to New Hampshire is like coming home. As John Sununu loves to point out, we can't even get to our place in Kennebunkport without passing through this beautiful state, and I don't mind one bit.

We've spent a lot of time up here, going way back to 1978 and 1979, during my first campaign for President. And 1978 was a turning point in New Hampshire politics, because that was the year you sent a message to Washington. **The message was strong. The message was clear. And the messenger was Gordon Humphrey.**

1978 marked the first wave of what came to be known as the

Reagan Revolution. A set of new ideas that are really as old as the Republic itself. That people, not government, know what's best for themselves and their families. That a strong, diverse economy -- not a strong, centralized government -- is the true source of prosperity. That a firm defense does not threaten peace, but promotes it. And the bottom line is this: We seek to protect the family, empower the poor and reward the creative and the risk-takers. Those are the values of New Hampshire, the values of America, and the values of my friend Bob Smith. \\\

For six years, Bob Smith has also been New Hampshire's "trusted friend" in Congress. The people here know him. They know he's a man of principle, and that he's not running for office to satisfy his own ego. I know he would have been just as happy to see Gordon Humphrey run again. But New Hampshire's going to send a new senator to Washington this year, and today more than ever, the Senate needs leaders in the New Hampshire conservative tradition -- leaders like your own Bob Smith.

Let me tell you why. Late last Saturday night, America stood on the brink of what would have been the most draconian cuts in government services in our Nation's history. The pain would have been real, it would have hit hard, and it would have hit fast -- this week.

It's an old story. For years, the American people demanded a serious response to a serious deficit, and were met with nothing but failure. But last weekend, thanks to hard work and good faith, this old story got a new ending. For the first time

in 10 years, the budget talks concluded not with people shaking fists -- but with people shaking hands.

The breakthrough compromise we announced at the White House is real. It will reduce the deficit by \$500 billion -- half a trillion dollars. That's a victory for common sense. A victory for fiscal sanity. And a victory for the American people. \\\

The budget agreement marks the biggest deficit package -- ever. The toughest enforcement plan -- ever. The largest entitlement savings -- ever. It is tough, balanced, and -- most of all -- it is fair. And as I told your neighbors in Vermont only this morning: This is the right agreement, at the right time, for all the right reasons. \\\

I'm particularly proud of the agreement's growth incentives, designed to launch a new wave of entrepreneurial endeavor that can create new jobs and new businesses in places like New Hampshire. This is no quick fix, no "band-aid" solution, but a long term prescription for long term economic health. It provides a 30 per cent tax credit for research and development. Preferential treatment for investments in scientific equipment. And will reduce the cost of capital for new small businesses, where over 70 per cent of new jobs are created.

Just as important as what it does, is what the budget agreement doesn't do. It doesn't touch Social Security. It doesn't threaten our vital mission in the Persian Gulf -- or the safety of the men and women standing vigil there against aggression. And it doesn't raise individual income taxes. \\\

You know my feelings on taxes. \\ I like new taxes about as much as I like broccoli. \\\

But to reach this compromise -- to come up with any budget at all this year -- I had to work with the Democrats who control Congress. I went to the bargaining table assisted by one of the toughest, most principled negotiators in all of Washington -- New Hampshire's former Governor, John Sununu. But let's face it -- no Democratic Congress is ever going to come up with a Republican dream package.

If America wants economic growth, if America wants to hold the line on taxes and cut spending, if America wants to get serious about reducing the deficit, then America needs to send Republicans like Bob Smith to the U.S. Senate. \\\

But deficit reduction isn't the only challenge that requires tough Republican leadership in Congress. Another priority for this new decade and the coming new century has to be the environment. Bob Smith really cares about protecting the environment and the wild scenic beauty of this state. And as the yellows and reds and golds tinge the leaves of the White Mountains, I only wish I had time to drive up the Kancamagus Highway this weekend. \\ ((But with all the tourist traffic heading up there, the last thing New Hampshire needs is another presidential motorcade)) \\\

As Chairman of the House Republican Task Force on Acid Rain, Bob and I worked closely to put together the first improvement in the Clear Air Act in a dozen years. Launched last year with

bipartisan support, the Clean Air Act has bogged down on Capitol Hill. We can balance the need for economic growth with the need to preserve and enhance the earth we live on. We can clean up the air and rid our lakes of acid rain. But we can't do it unless we get action from Congress.

One of New Hampshire's most famous nature-lovers -- I'm proud to say -- is also America's newest member of the Supreme Court -- Weare's own Justice David Souter. \\\ He was asked a while back how he felt about leaving for Washington. "I don't know anyone that would want to leave New Hampshire," he replied.

Well, Congress could use some of that famous New Hampshire common sense. It's always a sacrifice, I know -- leaving this wonderful state. **But when Mr. Smith goes to Washington, the whole country is going to benefit from his brand of hard work, intelligence, and common sense.** \\\

But as many of you know, Bob's promotion to the Senate won't mark the first time he's left New Hampshire to answer the call of public service. Long before serving in Congress, Bob served our country aboard a ship, and knows what it's like to stand in harm's way. He spent five years in the Navy Reserve, including a year stationed in the Gulf of Tonkin off the coast of Vietnam.

Today, a new generation of this state's finest young men and women are continuing the New Hampshire tradition of patriotism and courage. From New Hampshire's own Air National Guard, the men and women of the 157th Air Refueling Group have flown over 200 missions in support of Operation Desert Shield. Airmen like

Lt. Col. Everett Bramhall of Manchester, who flew 14 missions in 30 days, refueling other planes enroute to the Persian Gulf. Or Sgt. Mark Joyce of Portsmouth, who, on top of his regular work as a civilian helicopter mechanic, has been volunteering for the evening shift with his Guard unit. This uncommon sacrifice, by servicemen and women and their families, has been a common virtue -- in New Hampshire, and all across this magnificent country.

All this month, from ships in the Red Sea, from air bases and tank battalions in Saudi Arabia, absentee ballots will be mailed back to our G.I.s' home states. If they can take the trouble to vote, can't every one of us, from Dover to Dixville Notch, get down to the firehouse or schoolhouse to vote?

It really makes a difference. You can make a difference here in New Hampshire. And Bob Smith will definitely make a difference in the United State Senate.

IF AMERICA WANTS ECONOMIC GROWTH, IF AMERICA WANTS TO HOLD THE LINE ON TAXES AND CUT SPENDING, IF AMERICA WANTS TO GET SERIOUS ABOUT REDUCING THE DEFICIT, THEN AMERICA NEEDS TO SEND REPUBLICANS LIKE BOB SMITH TO THE U.S. SENATE. \\\

BUT DEFICIT REDUCTION ISN'T THE ONLY CHALLENGE THAT REQUIRES TOUGH REPUBLICAN LEADERSHIP IN CONGRESS. ANOTHER PRIORITY FOR THIS NEW DECADE HAS TO BE THE ENVIRONMENT.

MANCHESTER, N.H.
FRIDAY, OCTOBER 5, 1990, 12:30 P.M.

Thank you, Bob [Smith], for that introduction and for this wonderful greeting. ((Sorry I'm late. But we had trouble out back, parking the 18-wheeler.) \\\

With Bob Smith, Warren Rudman, Gordon Humphrey, and Chuck Douglas, New Hampshire has one of the best congressional delegations in Washington. Bill Zeliff will soon be joining them, I hope, to replace Bob in the 1st District. And New Hampshire has first class leadership here at home, too. And of course, I'm talking about my old friend and supporter over here, Governor Judd Gregg.

((A little earlier, somebody was wondering why I didn't bring the new big-shot in the Bush family: best-selling author Millie, our dog. \\\ She's out in the bookstores -- signing autographs. \\\ But we're having a terrible time getting the paw prints off the White House carpets.) \\\

For the Bush family, coming to New Hampshire is like coming home. As John Sununu loves to point out, we can't even get to our place in Kennebunkport without passing through this beautiful state, and I don't mind one bit.

We've spent a lot of time up here, going way back to 1978 and 1979, during my first campaign for President. And 1978 was a turning point in New Hampshire politics, because that was the

year you sent a message to Washington. The message was strong. The message was clear. And the messenger was Gordon Humphrey.

1978 marked the first wave of what came to be known as the Reagan Revolution. A set of new ideas that are really as old as the Republic itself. That people, not government, know what's best for themselves and their families. That a strong, diverse economy -- not a strong, centralized government -- is the true source of prosperity. That a firm defense does not threaten peace, but promotes it. And the bottom line is this: We seek to protect the family, empower the poor and reward the creative and the risk-takers. Those are the values of New Hampshire, the values of America, and the values of my friend Bob Smith. \\\

For six years, Bob Smith has also been New Hampshire's "trusted friend" in Congress. The people here know him. They know he's a man of principle, and that he's not running for office to satisfy his own ego. I know he would have been just as happy to see Gordon Humphrey run again. But New Hampshire's going to send a new senator to Washington this year, and today more than ever, the Senate needs leaders in the New Hampshire conservative tradition -- leaders like your own Bob Smith.

You know my feelings on taxes. \\
I like new taxes about as much as I like broccoli. \\\

But to reach this compromise -- to come up with any budget at all this year -- I had to work with the Democrats who control Congress. I went to the bargaining table assisted by one of the

toughest, most principled negotiators in all of Washington -- New Hampshire's former Governor, John Sununu. But let's face it -- no Democratic Congress is ever going to come up with a Republican dream package.

If America wants economic growth, if America wants to hold the line on taxes and cut spending, if America wants to get serious about reducing the deficit, then America needs to send Republicans like Bob Smith to the U.S. Senate. \\\

But deficit reduction isn't the only challenge that requires tough Republican leadership in Congress. Another priority for this new decade has to be the environment. Bob Smith really cares about protecting the environment and the wild scenic beauty of this state. And as the yellows and reds and golds tinge the leaves of the White Mountains, I only wish I had time to drive up the Kancamagus Highway this weekend. \ (But with all the tourist traffic heading up there, the last thing New Hampshire needs is a another presidential motorcade.) \\\

As Chairman of the House Republican Task Force on Acid Rain, Bob and I worked closely to put together the first improvement in the Clear Air Act in a dozen years. Launched last year with bipartisan support, the Clean Air Act has bogged down on Capitol Hill. We can balance the need for economic growth with the need to preserve and enhance the earth we live on. We can clean up the air and rid our lakes of acid rain. But we can't do it unless we get action from Congress.

One of New Hampshire's most famous nature-lovers -- I'm proud to say -- is also America's newest member of the Supreme Court -- Weare's own Justice David Souter. \\\ He was asked a while back how he felt about leaving for Washington. "I don't know anyone that would want to leave New Hampshire," he replied.

Well, Congress could use some of that famous New Hampshire common sense. It's always a sacrifice, I know -- leaving this wonderful state. But when Mr. Smith goes to Washington, the whole country is going to benefit from his brand of hard work, intelligence, and common sense. \\\

But as many of you know, Bob's promotion to the Senate won't mark the first time he's left New Hampshire to answer the call of public service. Long before serving in Congress, Bob served our country aboard a ship, and knows what it's like to stand in harm's way. He spent five years in the Navy Reserve, including a year stationed in the Gulf of Tonkin off the coast of Vietnam.

Today, a new generation of this state's finest young men and women are continuing the New Hampshire tradition of patriotism and courage. From New Hampshire's own Air National Guard, the men and women of the 157th Air Refueling Group have flown over 200 missions in support of Operation Desert Shield. Airmen like Lt. Col. Everett Bramhall of Manchester, who flew 14 missions in 30 days, refueling other planes enroute to the Persian Gulf. Or Sgt. Mark Joyce of Portsmouth, who, on top of his regular work as a civilian helicopter mechanic, has been volunteering for the evening shift with his Guard unit. This uncommon sacrifice, by

servicemen and women and their families, has been a common virtue -- in New Hampshire, and all across this magnificent country.

All this month, from ships in the Red Sea, from air bases and tank battalions in Saudi Arabia, absentee ballots will be mailed back to our G.I.s' home states. If they can take the trouble to vote, can't every one of us, from Dover to Dixville Notch, get down to the firehouse or schoolhouse to vote?

It really makes a difference. You can make a difference here in New Hampshire. And Bob Smith will definitely make a difference in the United State Senate.

Thank for this warm greeting on this chilly New England day.

And as the yellows and reds and golds tinge the leaves of the White Mountains, I only wish I had time to drive up the Kancamagus Highway this weekend. \\ ((But with all the tourist traffic heading up there, the last thing New Hampshire needs is another presidential motorcade)) ///

As Chairman of the House Republican Task Force on Acid Rain, Bob and I worked closely to put together the first improvement in the Clear Air Act in a dozen years. Launched last year with

bipartisan support, the Clean Air Act has bogged down on Capitol Hill. We can balance the need for economic growth with the need to preserve and enhance the earth we live on. We can clean up the air and rid our lakes of acid rain. But we can't do it unless we get action from Congress.

One of New Hampshire's most famous nature-lovers -- I'm proud to say -- is also America's newest member of the Supreme Court -- Weare's own Justice David Souter. \\\ He was asked a while back how he felt about leaving for Washington. "I don't know anyone that would want to leave New Hampshire," he replied.

Well, Congress could use some of that famous New Hampshire common sense. It's always a sacrifice, I know -- leaving this wonderful state. But when Mr. Smith goes to Washington, the whole country is going to benefit from his brand of hard work, intelligence, and common sense. \\\

But as many of you know, Bob's promotion to the Senate won't mark the first time he's left New Hampshire to answer the call of public service. Long before serving in Congress, Bob served our country aboard a ship, and knows what it's like to stand in harm's way. He spent five years in the Navy Reserve, including a year stationed in the Gulf of Tonkin off the coast of Vietnam.

Today, a new generation of this state's finest young men and women are continuing the New Hampshire tradition of patriotism and courage. From New Hampshire's own Air National Guard, the men and women of the 157th Air Refueling Group have flown over 200 missions in support of Operation Desert Shield. Airmen like

Lt. Col. Everett Bramhall of Manchester, who flew 14 missions in 30 days, refueling other planes enroute to the Persian Gulf. Or Sgt. Mark Joyce of Portsmouth, who, on top of his regular work as a civilian helicopter mechanic, has been volunteering for the evening shift with his Guard unit. ^{Such} ~~This~~ uncommon sacrifice, by servicemen and women and their families, has been a common virtue -- in New Hampshire, and all across this magnificent country.

All this month, from ships in the Red Sea, from air bases and tank battalions in Saudi Arabia, absentee ballots will be mailed back to our G.I.s' home states. If they can take the trouble to vote, can't every one of us, from Dover to Dixville Notch, get down to the firehouse or schoolhouse to vote?

It really makes a difference. You can make a difference here in New Hampshire. And Bob Smith will definitely make a difference in the United State Senate.
