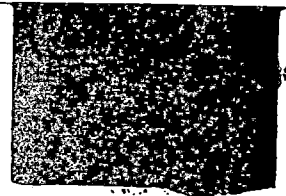
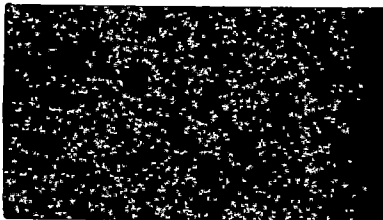



((Senator Stevens, Senator Murkowski, Congressman Young -- it's good to see that in this election-season the all-Republican Alaska delegation is looking fit and loaded for bear.))\\

((And let me give a special, warm greeting to our visitors who've recently arrived from Alaska. You've probably crossed more time-zones for a plate of eggs than anyone in history.))\\

((One other thing -- as a Texan, I would appreciate it if you would humor me -- by not reminding us that if Alaska was cut in two, then Texas would become the third largest state.))\\

I've often visited your state, and I've come to love it. Even those who've never been to Alaska love it, love knowing that somewhere there is still a frontier America -- an Alaska where, in the words of Robert Service: "The mountains are nameless, and the rivers run God knows where" -- a land where gold and glory still await those willing to search for it.

So it is no surprise that Alaska is moving to a position of greater leadership. But this is also a special time of challenge for your state. Alaska needs to diversify, to create new jobs and develop a broader economy.
