1) p. 1, graph 2: "down the road from where I was born"  
Burlington is nearly an hour's drive from Milton, POTUS' birthplace--not quite down the road. How about "not far from where I was born."

2) p. 1, graph 3: Rep. Silvio Conte will **not** attend.

3) p. 2, graph 4: "one party that has ruled Congress for almost 40 years.."

If by "Congress" we mean both houses, note that Republicans had a majority in the Senate from 1981-87. Despite that brief interlude, however, the Democrats have had a majority in **both** houses for "almost 40 years," 35 to be exact. I suggest that this discrepancy might be resolved by saying "the one party that has had a virtual deadlock on Congress," rather than "the one party that has ruled Congress."

4) p. 4, graph 3: "only four billion came from the so-called 'surtax'"

Ed Dale at OMB said this figure is incorrect. What Dan has decided to do with similar language is to disregard mention of the surtax and focus rather on the "\$40 billion in income taxes on working Americans."

5) p. 7, graph 2: the word "bi-partisan" has no hyphen and is one word.

6) p. 7, graph 4: similarly, the word "criss-cross" has no hyphen and is one word.



At that very moment he sent his armor and his troops south to mass along the Saudi border, threatening yet another member of the U.N. and Arab League.

Subsequently, the United Nations Security Council passed <sup>10</sup> ((~~mine~~?)) resolutions of condemnation and disapproval. On <sup>Aug-5</sup> ((date)) I stated Saddam Hussein's aggression will not stand.

Today I am more determined than ever: This aggression will not stand. ///

Today an estimated <sup>300-400</sup> ((number)) Americans, innocent civilians, are held against their will in Iraq. Many of them reportedly staked out as human shields, near possible military targets -- brutality not seen since Adolf Hitler.

Another <sup>300-400</sup> ((number)) Americans are in Kuwait, many in hiding, their lives at stake; <sup>27</sup> ((number)) imprisoned in the U.S. Embassy in Kuwait City. They are cut off from food and other supplies. They are surrounded by Iraqi troops. Our flag still flies but the rights of these American citizens are, at this very moment, being denied by Iraq's brutal dictator.

Let me be clear -- we have no argument with the Iraqi people. We bear no hostility to the Iraqi people, nor do any of the other <sup>25</sup> ~~22~~ countries represented on land and sea in the Gulf area. Our problem is with Saddam Hussein -- **alone.**

I want a peaceful resolution to this crisis. Indeed, we have worked closely with the United Nations in putting sanctions into effect, in passing resolutions and in speaking with one voice against the invader's aggression.

We are giving <sup>the</sup> sanctions time to work. I hope there will never be a shot fired in anger, but let me be very, very clear:

There will be no compromise on the stated objectives of the United Nations Security Council resolutions -- none at all.

-- The brutality against innocent civilians will not be tolerated and will not stand.

-- Saddam's clear violations of international law will not stand.

-- And that means, yes, Saddam Hussein's brutal aggression will not stand.

Lastly, a word about our own forces, and our strong partners. <sup>25</sup> Twenty-three countries are side by side -- on land and at sea ready to enforce the U.N. resolutions. Saudi Arabia is now safe from Iraqi invasions and <sup>over 1000</sup> ((number)) Iraqi ships have been interdicted on the high seas to enforce the economic embargo. They are Arab countries, Third World countries, Western European countries, Australians, contingents from South America, Canada, and the subcontinent ((check)).

And at the U.N., China and the Soviet Union have joined the rest of the world in condemning the invader. They are with us because they are as concerned as we are that a fundamental principle be upheld -- unchallenged brutal aggression today might

well lead the world to conflict tomorrow.

As to our own forces deployed in the Gulf, we have the finest young men and women over there ever to serve in our armed forces. They are all volunteers, they are all well trained, they are all highly motivated -- and we owe them an enormous vote of thanks.

As your President, I want you to know these facts.

I will strive for a peaceful solution. Having said that, I will not compromise nor shirk our solemn obligation to turn back this invasion. We will not -- we must not -- permit this aggression to stand. We will not fail in our moral mission.
