I. SUMMARY

On Thursday, December 6, at 3:45 p.m., you will address the Chilean National Congress. On the dais with you will be President of the Senate Gabriel Valdes, President of the Chamber of Deputies Jose Viera Gallo, Secretary of the Senate Rafael Eyzaguirre, and Secretary of the Chamber of Deputies Carlos Loyola. President Valdes will introduce you.

There are 47 senators and 120 deputies in the National Congress. The speech (15 minutes/teleprompter) will be simultaneously translated, and is being broadcast live on Chilean National Television.

I. DISCUSSION

The remarks discuss Chile's remarkable transformation to democracy, and the impressive performance of their economy so far. The Enterprise for the Americas initiatives are outlined, along with the hope that free markets and the hard work of countries like Chile will help the Americas to become the first fully free hemisphere in history.

Page 2, top paragraph: This paragraph could be seen as an implicit criticism of Eastern European developments. I would suggest a less direct comparison, e.g., "And in spite of the remarkable events unfolding in Europe, we should not lose sight of the fact that here -- here in the Americas -- democracy stands on the threshold of a new era. It is here that the triumph of the democratic ideal promises to make the Americas a fully free hemisphere for the first time in its history."

Page 5, next to last paragraph. We have signed a "framework agreement." Calling it a framework free trade agreement could be misleading. However, our policy on the issue of a free trade agreement is: building on the framework agreement, we want to continue to strengthen our bilateral ties, and we look forward to exploring (in 1991) the possibility of an free trade agreement. There should be language to that effect in the speech. Otherwise, this section looks weak, with no promise of possible future improvements in Chilean-U.S. relations.


