

- Page 2, para. 1, sent. 1: Insert the word "criminal" before "polluters". This is from Barry Hartman, Deputy Assistant AG for Land Resources.
- Page 2, para. 1, sent. 2: Tense of the verb "help" is used in two different ways. Maybe "it also helps" should be "they also help". Or, that sentence could be broken into two.
- Page 2, para. 1, sent. 3: Change "or" to "and".
- Page 2, para. 1, sent. 3: I suggest changing the word "consequences" to something else. That word is often interpreted as negative, and what these law enforcers are doing is positive.
