It seems like only yesterday that I attended your first annual dinner, back in 1989 -- and while I'm sorry I couldn't be with you this year, it's an honor to offer a few words of thanks and encouragement to a special breed of Americans.

Nobody shows a finer patriotism than the volunteers and career professionals of our Fire and Emergency Services community: firefighters / rescue workers / paramedics / emergency room physicians and staff. 



SUBJECT: THE GRAND OLE OPRY AMERICAN TOUR

BACKGROUND: In the spring of 1991, the Grand Ole Opry will take to the road for the first multiple city tour in over 40 years. The Tour, complete with a radio broadcast, will travel to ten cities in ten states in the Midwest, Southeast, and the Northeast and will include more than 20 performers in recognition of the 65th anniversary of the Grand Ole Opry.

THE GRAND OLE OPRY: Since its inception in 1925, the Grand Ole Opry's popularity has grown with each succeeding year. Today with a roster that features over 60 music stars from the newest sensations to members of the Country Music Hall of Fame, the Grand Ole Opry is truly an American institution.

As the world's longest running radio show, the Grand Ole Opry has not missed a Saturday night broadcast in its 65 year history. The Opry began as an hour long program that featured old-time fiddlers, banjo pickers and string bands playing traditional "folk" or country music. This musical hour quickly grew in popularity such that today the Opry is broadcast live into hundreds of thousands of homes every Friday and Saturday night of the year over 50,000-watt clear-channel WSM radio.

THE AMERICAN TOUR: In 1941, Camel cigarettes and the Opry joined forces, when the Grand Ole Opry unit of the Camel Caravan toured military bases. In 1991, the Grand Ole Opry American Tour is made possible through sponsorship by True Value Hardware.

In each of the ten cities, four different members of the Grand Ole Opry will participate in a two to three hour concert with one-half hour broadcast in the traditional Opry format. Due to the support of the artists and sponsorship by True Value, the ticket for each performance will approximate the cost of a ticket at the Opry House in Nashville.

The cities along the Grand Ole Opry's American Tour include: Detroit, Michigan; Mobile, Alabama; Jacksonville, Florida; Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania; Little Rock, Arkansas; Kansas City, Missouri; Charlotte, North Carolina; Richmond, Virginia; Columbus, Ohio; and Chicago, Illinois. A partial list of performers include Ricky Skaggs, Minnie Pearl, Holly Dunn, Bill Monroe, Garth Brooks, Patty Loveless, Riders in the Sky, Mike Snider, Clint Black, Ricky Van Shelton, Porter Wagoner, and The Whites.

WHITE HOUSE INVOLVEMENT: Since the first concert occurs on Thursday, April 4th, the day before the "National Days of Thanksgiving" and since the Opry is traditionally a radio show, perhaps the President would deliver a short message from The White House that would be broadcast into the hall and over the radio. The concert occurs at the legendary Fox Theatre and features Ricky Skaggs, Minnie Pearl, Holly Dunn, and Bill Monroe. Through this historic night of the Grand Ole Opry, The President joins in speaking directly to the homes and the hearts of millions of Americans.

It seems like only yesterday that I attended your first annual dinner, back in 1989 -- and while I'm sorry I couldn't be with you this year, it's an honor to offer a few words of thanks and encouragement to a special breed of Americans.

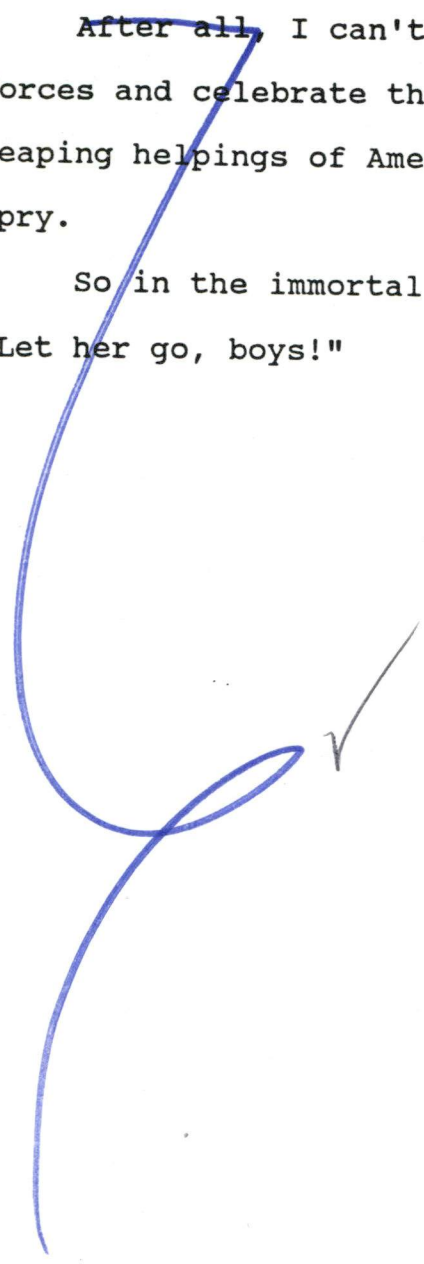
