We would like to request that the President audio tape one sentence for inclusion in one of the stories Mrs. Bush will read for the radio program "Mrs. Bush's Story Time."

"Mrs. Bush's Story Time" is a national radio program co-produced by ABC Radio and Children's Literacy Initiative, a non-group in Philadelphia. The program aired on ABC affiliates last fall, and a new series will be heard this year beginning on Thanksgiving day with a four hour special, followed by four half hour segments, the special aired again at Christmas, followed six more half hour segments.

The purpose of the program is to convey the importance of reading aloud to children and to give parents and caregivers practical tips on reading aloud.
