Symphony executive vice president and managing director Gideon Toeplitz said it has been carefully scripted to have tight segues in the manner of television shows.

Two videos, "Salute to Senator John Heinz" and "Heinz Hall and the Community," will recognize the contributions of both the Senator and his father, Henry J. Heinz, II. Among celebrities paying tribute to the Senator during his video will be Fred Rogers and Arnold Schwarzenegger.

In addition, Andre Heinz, the Senator's son will read from his father's

Other musical favorites of the Senator will be heard. The Chris Brubeck Trio will play jazz, some based on music of Bach. And Kirk Muspratt will conduct John Williams' "Liberty Fanfare."

Maazel also will narrate a section that salutes the arts that have made Heinz Hall their home. Barbara Yahr

will conduct music by Tchaikovsky, Jerry Herman, Verdi and Morton Gould as Maazel speaks.

After intermission, Maazel will conduct Beethoven's "Consecration of the House Overture," the first music played at Heinz Hall. This masterpiece was inspired by the composer's encounter with the music of Handel, but Maazel said that the overture is difficult to prepare and, therefore, rarely performed.

A festive and humorous piece which ends triumphantly, Maazel described it as "a piece that should be played when consecrating an area of this nature. It was a good choice then and it is a good choice now," when the auditorium will be reconsecrated in the memory of one of its most loyal friends.

Thank you, Dick. It's great to see that some of the Thornburgh clan could join us today ... Ginny Thornburgh, and John Thornburgh. Good to see my friend Senator Arlen Specter. And what a tremendous job our State G.O.P. Chairwoman, Ann Anstine [AN-steen] is doing. /// And I would be remiss if I didn't say hello to my dear friend Elsie Hillman.

((It's great to be here in the City of Champions ... home of the four-time Superbowl champs, the Pittsburgh Steelers ... this year's Stanley Cup winners, the Pittsburgh Penguins ((I don't know if Mario Lemieux [Le-MYOO] is here, but I'll tell you -- I know him when I see him)) ... and of course, the big champs right now, the N.L. East champion Pittsburgh Pirates. // And come this November, we'll have one more champion to add to the list ... Pittsburgh's own ... Dick Thornburgh. ////))

We're also in the hometown of a man known to everyone here: Senator John Heinz.
