Thank you, Ray Hunt, for that introduction. I also want to salute my good friends Bobby Holt and Perry Bass. / A special thanks to RNC Chairman Clayton Yeutter, who could not be with us. / Bill Clements, along with Phil Gramm, Tom Loeffler and Bob Mosbacher, are here -- and they, too, have my appreciation. / Most of all, hello to my fellow Texans, and friends. //

((I want to thank you for that outstanding welcome. I don't think your enthusiasm could have been warmer if I had changed my name to "Troy Aikman.")) //

We are here tonight to talk about America's bright hopes for the future -- a future built upon the special values that Americans have always held dear. But we must begin by admitting that a Grand Canyon divides our two major political parties. On one side stands the party of bureaucracy. On the other, stands the party whose initials say it all. "GOP." / Growth, opportunity, and progress. //

Republicans want to unite America -- not divide it into competing camps. // We want to build a nation united in a quest for fairness and opportunity -- not one divided in a fruitless scramble for special benefits.

Since 1981 our party has produced a social revolution / an economic revolution / a political revolution. / Together, these form a mainstream revolution. //

Phil Gramm knows what I'm talking about. He became a Republican because of this mainstream revolution. // So have thousands of other Texans -- and millions of Americans. // Now comes the greatest opportunity to continue our revolution -- the Election of 1992. / Never have the choices been more important. / Never have the differences been more clear. //

Our mainstream revolution means, first of all, an economic revolution. Too often we talk of the economy as if it were some dusty inhuman thing, rather than the canvas on which we paint our lives and dreams. Years ago I learned that economics focuses mostly on people, not numbers. I remember driving a red Studebaker from the East with Barbara and the kids. When I got to Texas, I saw people working hard to achieve their dreams. They started in small homes, they scrimped, they saved. They sent their children to school, and they taught them to love their country. It doesn't take long for anyone to understand that the great strength of the Nation lies not on Pennsylvania Avenue in Washington, D.C. It rests in the main streets of Dalhart and Dallas and Weslaco and Wichita Falls. //

America's strength comes from a simple source, freedom. And freedom remains the lodestone of our economic revolution. Texans know that you don't unleash the genius of the American free enterprise system by binding it in red tape and weighing it down

with nonsensical regulations. / Let liberal Democrats pursue programs that enlarge government. We'll pursue policies that enlarge opportunity. //

We've tried to do just that for years. We have promoted a series of growth initiatives this year to help ease the credit crunch: Banking reform, personal savings incentives, the creation of a permanent R&D tax credit, and increased investment in science, technology, and infrastructure. / This agenda has gone nowhere because it has been blocked by a Congress controlled by a single political party. /

That party has a simple agenda: to block ours. So, Senate leaders won't even permit a vote on our capital gains tax cut to unleash a new wave of opportunity. / Important appointments to key economic positions have gone unfilled because the Senate won't vote on them.

The time has come for Washington to put aside partisan, inside-the-Beltway disputes and to take up the people's business.

The Election of 1992 will involve America's social revolution, too. I don't mean only specific programs, although they matter. I refer as well to this Administration's concern for civility and tolerance. //

You know what I'm talking about. All America has been revulsed by how Congress replaced the policy of advise and consent with the politics of search and destroy. // The spectacle Americans witnessed in the recent Senate Judiciary Committee hearings must never be repeated. Tonight, I ask you:

Help me bring decency and fair play back to the United States Congress. //

Our social revolution seeks to promote decency and civil peace. / My administration has sought unprecedented spending on our drug strategy in order to fight back against drugs. We have pushed through legislation to give parents dramatically increased access to child care without creating a new government bureaucracy. // We demanded -- and got -- the first legislation to guarantee the rights of people with disabilities -- the Americans With Disabilities Act. We put together a pioneering bill -- the Clean Air Act -- to employ market incentives in preserving our environment. //

I seek an America in which people work together for a better future, rather than trying to succeed by taking something from someone else. I have promoted an approach to civil rights based on the values of fair play and cooperation. We all have a civil right to make the most of ourselves, but we should not preach hatred based on race, income, or even political affiliation.

The old politics of class warfare and division are tiresome, corrosive and outdated. The American people deserve something more than posturing and bickering. They want and deserve action on issues that matter to them.

Let's look at crime. Last March 6, I challenged Congress to pass a bill to take criminals off the street -- including a workable federal death penalty. I still don't have a bill. //

[[Let's look at voluntary prayer. Many liberal Democrats want to

keep God out of our classrooms. I want a Constitutional Amendment restoring voluntary prayer to our Nation's schools.]]  
// Look, too, at education. For two years, we have prodded Congress to pass legislation to make us No. 1 in education by the year 2000. // Liberal Democrats want to improve education through groups like the NEA -- throwing money at the problem to keep the status-quo. We believe better education means more local control and more parental choice -- using reform to get the most out of our schools -- and prepare ourselves for a better future. //

If we're going to teach democracy in our schools, let's practice more of it in our education system. //

Finally, we need a political revolution that will restore people's faith in government and desire for public service. We must ensure that government understand its fundamental responsibilities -- including in foreign policy.

Thomas Jefferson once said the price of freedom is eternal vigilance. // I say: We must be vigilant in using America's strength to prepare for war -- so that America can help secure the peace. //

We have a record to be proud of in that regard. When a dictator crushed hopes for democracy in his homeland and endangered the Western Hemisphere -- we helped the Panamanian people restore free elections and the rule of law. //

When a brutal tyrant invaded and plundered Kuwait -- we helped build an international coalition that rolled back his aggression and liberated a nation. //

As Communism crumbled, we extended a helping hand and made it clear that America will support those who promote democracy, free enterprise, and individual liberty. // ((Incidentally, someone told me recently that visitors to Lenin's tomb haven't been able to get a good look at him since Communism's collapse. He's still spinning.)) //

I believe in these ideals with every fiber of my being. // But just as I believe in fidelity to principles, I also believe in loyalty to people who serve their nation well.

One man among us has taken more unfair criticism in three years than anyone should have to endure in a lifetime. Yet he remains steadfast in his service to the Nation. I am proud of the job Dan Quayle has done as Vice President. ////

Dan and I believe that we who are free to live our dreams, must support those who dream of living free. So we are working with the Soviet Union -- and in the Middle East -- wherever America can use the leadership that is our duty and our destiny. // Dan has stood up for our administration here and abroad. He even stood up to lawyers and demanded an end to the litigation explosion. He may have infuriated the American Bar Association, but he certainly became a hero to many Americans.

In my view, the Election of 1992 will revolve around this type of leadership -- talking not of hate, but of heroism;

indulging not in character assassination, but encouraging character. // Today, that character lives from Portland, Maine, to Portland, Oregon -- lives, perhaps most of all, from the barrios of San Antonio to the vast expanse of West Texas. //

One hundred and thirty years ago, Abraham Lincoln left Springfield, Illinois, to assume the Presidency. He addressed his home people at the Great Western Railway Station. Here is what he said:

This quest is founded upon a commitment to economic growth, a steadfast respect for the individual, and a proud determination to carry faith in democracy to the rest of the world.

Phil Gramm knows what I'm talking about. So do thousands of other Texans -- and millions of Americans. We have an extraordinary opportunity before us. Together we can cement the gains we have made these last few years. Let me tell you why: Everyday the difference between the liberals' agenda and ours becomes clearer and clearer. //

Liberal Democrats want to burden people for the benefit of government. // We want to use government to ease burdens on people. // They believe America's finest hours are behind us. We believe our finest hours are still ahead. //

We believe that because we have an abiding faith in the American people. We understand that when we talk about issues, what we're really talking about are people. For example, too often we talk of the economy as if it were something dry and technical, rather than what it really is: the lifeblood of the American dream.

Years ago I learned that economics focuses mostly on people, not numbers. I remember my early days here in Texas. I saw how people worked hard for a living. They started in small homes, they scrimped, they saved. They sent their children to school, and they taught them to love their country.

It doesn't take long for anyone to understand that the great strength of our Nation isn't up there on Capitol Hill in Washington, D.C. Not by a long shot. It's in the neighborhoods and the families of Dalhart and Dallas and Weslaco and Wichita Falls. It's a strength that comes from a simple source, freedom. Let liberal Democrats pursue programs that enlarge government. We'll pursue policies that enlarge opportunity. //

We've tried to do just that for years. Right now, we're working to energize a sluggish economy. An economy that did grow last quarter at 2.4 percent, but an economy in which a lot of people are still hurting. The liberals whose tired program of

government mandates has failed now have discovered "growth initiatives".

Let me remind you that I have been pressing the Congress on a growth package for some time. Here, again, are my views of what would help the economy's growth to become far more vigorous:

1) a capital gains tax cut to unleash our entrepreneurs and create jobs, 2) personal savings incentives to boost our national savings rate, 3) the creation of a permanent R&D tax credit to stimulate more cutting edge research,

4) increased investment in science and technology to keep us ahead of the curve in world competition, 5) cutting needless government red tape that frustrates innovation and efficiency, 6) a job-creating transportation bill to ensure our nation's infrastructure is first class, 7) and now one more -- stop passing mindless mandates that tell every state, every county, every town, and every family how to run their lives.

[[ The only thing in surplus about the federal government is the number of regulations it can churn out. Well, I'd say we've had just about enough of this kind of regulatory indulgence. ]]

Why hasn't the economy gotten this kind of shot in the arm? What's happened? In short, the answer is a Congress controlled by liberal Democrats that just plain gets in the way.. [[ Some people ask why we can't take the kind of action, get the kind of results with the economy, that we were able to do in Desert Storm. The answer is easy: In Desert Storm, I didn't have to get an OK from Sec. of State Ted Kennedy, or Sec. of Defense

George Mitchell! When I told Norm Schwarzkopf to move Saddam Hussein out of Kuwait, Secretary of Everything Howard Metzenbaum wasn't standing in the way! ]]

The liberals in Congress have a simple agenda: to block ours. The Democratic leaders in the Senate won't even permit a vote on our capital gains tax cut. Important appointments to key economic positions have gone unfilled because the Senate has dragged its feet. Congress talks a good game about unemployment, but they ought to be doing something about economic growth. This is the same old tired politics of the past, and the American people have about had it. Frankly, so have I.

The latest go-around on unemployment compensation is a perfect example of liberal politicking standing in the way of helping people who really need it. Let's get the record straight. First, I want to help those whose unemployment check has dried up. Families are hurting, and I have said for months I want to help them. I want a bill that does not break the budget agreement.

Second, the only safeguard we have against more and more federal spending is last year's budget agreement. Every time I turn around liberal democrats want to bust the agreement -- add to the deficit and thus eventually add to the tax burden of present generations and the debt burden of future generations. We have a proposal before Congress that extends benefits -- gets the checks going to those families that are hurting and does it within the budget agreement.

Third, let me be clear, I will not hesitate to again veto any bill that busts the budget agreement. The Democrat leaders of Congress can try to play political games all they want. I was disappointed to read that some Democratic leaders have agreed to work with us -- get those checks to people now -- but that George Mitchell for pure partisan gamesmanship was holding them back. This is not the time, it's not the issue for partisan points. Let's get those checks moving now.

Finally, I challenge Congress again tonight -- send me a bill that will help those families and send me a bill that also protects the taxpayers. I call on Congress to stop doing business as usual, and start doing the people's business. If they can't do that, then it's time we got ourselves a new Congress. //

Other issues need immediate attention as well. We all know there's much more to do. But we can't do it when the Congress won't deliver. Last March 6, I challenged Congress to pass a bill to take criminals off the street -- including a workable federal death penalty. I still don't have a bill. That same day I asked Congress for a job-creating transportation bill. Same answer -- still no bill.

For two years, we have prodded Congress to pass legislation to help make us No. 1 in education by the year 2000. // Liberal Democrats want to throw money at the problem -- keep the status-quo. That answer won't do either. We need education reform to get the most out of our schools -- and prepare ourselves for a

better future. If we're going to teach democracy in our schools, let's practice more of it in our education system. That means more local control and parents being allowed to choose where their kids go to school. // And finally, just yesterday, Liberal Democrats with their special interest allies, blocked our National Energy Strategy in the Senate.

Yes, like most Presidents, I've had my share of problems with the Congress. But I believe the American people are smart enough to see through all the bluster and bravado that's come to symbolize Capitol Hill. A few days ago I nudged Congress to pay a little more attention to its own backyard.

I would wager that most Americans don't know that Congress regularly exempts itself from those same laws Congress passes for everyone else. Laws like the Equal Pay Act of 1963 or Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 -- that's the title that prohibits sexual harassment, as well as discrimination on the basis of race, color, sex, religion and national origin. And the list goes on. Just recently, we heard an extraordinary chorus about sexual harassment up on Capitol Hill, and yes, we all should do more to stamp out this ugly and obscene practice. But as we do that, let's also resolve that those who make the laws, live by the laws they make.

Finally, Thomas Jefferson once said the price of freedom is eternal vigilance. // I say: We must be vigilant, we must be strong, we must be principled.

We have a record to be proud of in that regard. When a dictator crushed hopes for democracy in his homeland -- we helped the Panamanian people restore free elections and the rule of law. When a brutal tyrant invaded and plundered Kuwait -- we helped build an international coalition that rolled back his aggression and liberated a nation. //

As Communism crumbled, we extended a helping hand and made it clear that America will support those who promote democracy, free enterprise, and individual liberty. // We who are free to live our dreams, must support those who dream of living free.

You know, every day our world becomes a little bit smaller. What happens in Beirut or Bonn or Bogota really does have an effect right here in our own communities. Watching CNN during the Gulf War brought that home to me, just as it brought those events into our living rooms, right as they were happening. This makes the line between foreign policy and domestic policy much less distinct than just a few short years ago.

So when I hear some liberal Democrat carping about our engagement in world affairs -- asking why I should spend 36 hours in Madrid on behalf of peace in the Middle East, I'm a little stunned. I have to ask the question, when I sit down with Latin and South American leaders to keep crack cocaine off our streets, is that foreign policy or domestic policy?

When I meet overseas with the best customers for America's farmers, is that foreign policy or domestic policy? Or when Desert Storm reignited America's faith in itself was that just

foreign policy? I have a responsibility to advance and promote America's interests -- at home, and abroad -- and often they are one and the same. Beyond that, America does have a special responsibility to lead -- and I guarantee you, lead we will.

One hundred and thirty years ago, Abraham Lincoln left Springfield, Illinois, to assume the Presidency. He addressed his home people at the Great Western Railway Station. Here is what he said: "To this place, and the kindness of these people, I owe everything. I now [go to assume] a task...greater than that which rested on Washington. Without the assistance of that Divine Being who ever attended him, I cannot succeed. With that assistance, I cannot fail."

What Lincoln felt about Illinois, I feel about Texas. Without God's help, we cannot succeed. With it, we cannot fail. Thank you for this occasion, and for your loyalty and love. God bless the United States of America.
