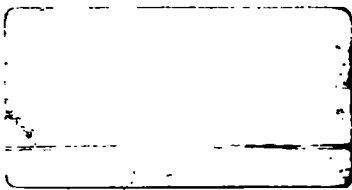
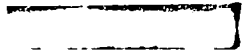

THE PRESIDENT: Your Excellency, Mr. George Bush, President of the United States of America, Excellencies, ladies and gentlemen. It gives me great pleasure to welcome you, Mr. President, Mrs. Barbara Bush, and your distinguished delegation to Singapore. You have greatly honored us by your visit to our island republic.

Mr. President, you lead the United States at an historic turning point of the world. Momentous changes have taken place. The international situation is in a period of flux as a new world order takes shape.

As President of the United States, you will have a decisive role in helping to shape it. Your vision and steadfastness were never more in evidence when you forged the international coalition to force Saddam Hussein out of Kuwait. Your actions during the Gulf crisis demonstrated your resolve that the new world order should be based on the rule of law. The world is in your debt, Mr. President, for your leadership in resisting aggression and asserting the rule of law.

Mr. President, although the Cold War has ended and the communist ideology is discredited, the United States' presence in the Asia Pacific and continuation of the United States-Japan security alliance remain vital for regional peace and stability.

Any significant change in the United States interest or capability will set off reactions that can only increase uncertainties and instability. Singapore will do what it can under the memorandum of understanding between us to facilitate the continued American presence and interest in the region.

Mr. President, the United States and Singapore have traditionally enjoyed close and warm relations. This is, in a large measure, because we share the United States' strategic objectives of a world where peace, stability and security allow all nations to concentrate on economic development in order to improve their people's well-being through free trade and investments.

The United States has been Singapore's major trading partner for many years, and is also our biggest investor. Many American companies are in business in Singapore.

Some use Singapore as the operational headquarters for the entire region. They have made substantial contributions to Singapore's economy. They have helped to transfer technology and develop our managerial talent.

Because of an enlightened outlook in these companies, Singaporeans have risen to become chief executive officers of the Singapore operations of major firms like IBM and Hewlett Packard.

MORE

Singapore companies have now begun to invest in the United States. They are small players, but they illustrate how the free market works to the advantage of all participants.

The conclusion of a trade and investment framework agreement between Singapore and the United States in October 1991 will give added impetus to the floor of trade and investment between our two countries. The Asia Pacific is the most vibrant region in economic growth in the world. It was the United States policies after World War II that made this possible. It started with the rehabilitation of Japan during the Korean War in 1950 to '53, followed by the reconstruction of Korea and Taiwan.

The growth spread into ASEAN with ever-increasing trade and investments. The potential is enormous, as is apparent from the volume of America's transpacific trade -- now about one-third larger than its transatlantic trade.

The United States can play a significant part in strengthening economic ties across the Pacific. APEC can hasten the pace at which these links grow to the benefit of all. Mr. President, despite America's present economic difficulties, we believe that the United States has the intellectual vigor and the economic weight to lead the way to what's a better future for the world.

Ladies and gentlemen, may I now invite you to rise and join me in a toast to the health and success of President George Bush and Mrs. Barbara Bush; to the prosperity of the people of the United States of America; and to the continuing friendship and close ties between our two countries.

You know how free markets and free trade can further opportunity. You've shown us. You've led the way. You know, too, how opportunity can enhance the new world order that President Wee referred to.

Mr. President, I salute you for helping shaped that order, for working with America to promote stability and prosperity. And as a friend, Singapore's grant of access for our forces has helped ensure the security of this area. And I also want to note the role ASEAN has played in working for peace in Cambodia.

Your national anthem proclaims, "may Singapore progress." And let us vow to achieve progress for democracy for this entire area of the world. Twenty-five centuries ago Confucius said, "Wisdom, compassion and courage, these are the three universally recognized moral qualities of men." Well, in that spirit, I would invite all of our guests to rise and raise their glasses to these very qualities that Confucius spoke of which promote peace and human

dignity; to the friendship, and it is a genuine one, between the people of Singapore and the people of the United States of America; and to your health, Mr. President, and that of your nation, now and in all the years to come. And once again, our thanks for a wonderful visit.

To you, sir, and to the people of Singapore.
