PRESIDENT'S TRIP (Portland/UPI) -- President Bush said Monday the federal government should consider economic consequences of reducing logging in Northwest forests before listing the northern spotted owl as a threatened or endangered species. "I reject those who would ignore - totally - ignore the economic consequences on the spotted owl decision," Bush told about 800 people at a fund-raising breakfast for Oregon Republican gubernatorial candidate Dave Frohnmayer. "It's a human equation," the president said. "The jobs of many of thousands of Oregonians and whole communities are at stake." Outside the hotel where Bush was speaking, a few hundred protesters, many protesting the administration's environmental policies, burned American flags and spat on people arriving for the presidential breakfast. Police said at least 27 people were arrested. Bush said the federal government needs to find a balance for protecting both logging jobs and spotted owls. "Common sense tells us to find a needed balance," he said. "Together, I am convinced that we can work to find that balance."

ARMS TALKS/SOVIETS (Bonn/Reuter) -- A Soviet disarmament expert said Monday he believes talks in Vienna on reducing conventional forces in Europe would be completed this year. Speaking at a conference of legislators from more than 100 countries, Gen. N.F. Chervov painted an optimistic picture of arms talks after last weekend's agreement in principle between the superpowers to reduce long-range nuclear weapons. "If both sides manage - as we are sure to do - to remove some remaining problems, 1990 will witness the signature of a multitude of agreements," said Chervov, head of disarmament in the Soviet armed forces general staff. Referring to the talks on conventional forces, Chervov added: "At the negotiations in Vienna we are very well placed to reach agreements this year, too."

CONVENTIONAL FORCES TALKS (Reuter) -- The U.S. is still hopeful for an East-West agreement this year to slash troops and conventional weapons in Europe despite slow negotiations on aircraft, Bush administration officials said Monday. They spoke on the eve of a two-day meeting of NATO defense ministers in Brussels to discuss where and how reduced Western forces would be deployed following cuts of conventional forces in Europe. "We wish the Eastern bloc side was more energized to move toward a CFE agreement. We hope to get an agreement this year, but things are dragging," said one of the administration officials, who asked not to be identified. "Probably the most difficult issue is aircraft - how the reductions will be made," said another official.

GORBACHEV/SUMMIT (Helen Thomas, UPI) -- Brown University will present an honorary degree to President Gorbachev, who will also receive the Martin Luther King award at next week's summit, administration officials said Monday. As the final details of the May 30-June 3 visit are being worked out, officials also reported that Gorbachev will meet with congressional leaders on the morning of June 1.

BAKER TALKS/GERMANY/LITHUANIA (Brussels/Reuter) -- Soviet leaders told Secretary Baker in Moscow they were solidly opposed to a united Germany joining NATO and that their hands were tied over the Lithuanian crisis, alliance sources said Monday. Senior U.S. officials gave this message to NATO ambassadors in a briefing on Baker's trip at the Western alliance's Brussels headquarters, the sources said.... The sources said Foreign Minister Shevardnadze and President Gorbachev told Baker firmly that a united Germany should not be in NATO, dashing recent Western hopes that the Soviet position might soften. "Both Shevardnadze and Gorbachev were very clear that a united Germany could not join NATO," said one source close to Monday's U.S. briefing. "There's no loosening of their position at all, no solution in sight." ... Soviet officials also told Baker that Moscow would continue to insist on a suspension of Lithuania's declaration of independence, another source said. "The Soviets said their hands were tied because Lithuania was a test case for other republics that might want to break away," said the source, who asked not to be identified.

BALTICS/SOVIET NUKES (Stockholm/Reuter) -- Moscow has started to remove nuclear weapons from three Baltic republics due to concern over their drive for independence, a Western military expert said Monday. "I've been told within the last week by a very senior Soviet official that because of the problems in the Baltic states the Soviets are taking steps right now to remove all their nuclear weapons from the three Baltic states," said Hans Binnendijk, director of studies at the International Institute for Strategic Studies on London.

ECONOMIC FORECASTS (UPI) -- A survey of economists Monday predicted no U.S. recession through 1991, which would set a postwar record for an economic expansion, but warned of slowing growth and a worsening federal budget deficit. The poll of 68 professional forecasters, conducted by the National Association of Business Economists, said despite a surge in food and energy costs after the December cold snap inflation will finish the year at 4.7% and fall to 4.3% in 1991. "Four out five forecasters (82%) predicted that there will be no recession through 1991," the group said.... Interest rates are expected to remain at current levels through the end of the year and decline slightly in 1991, while unemployment should hover in the 5.4% range during both years, the economists predicted. Inflation-adjusted growth is expected to run at 2.1% in 1990 and 2.5% in 1991, following a gain of 2.6% last year.... But the economists cautioned the federal budget deficit will reach \$154 billion in fiscal 1990 and \$135 billion in fiscal 1991, vs. the \$100 billion and \$64 billion targets set by Gramm-Rudman-Hollings.

ROMANIAN ELECTION (Bucharest/Reuter) -- Foreign observers including a team from the White House gave Romanian elections that confirmed the country's interim revolutionary leaders in power a largely clean bill of health Monday. But some said the country's first free vote for more than 50 years was flawed by instances of rigging.... "The Romanians have taken a very giant step toward a democracy," New Mexico Gov. Carruthers, leader of an observer team sent by President Bush, told a news conference. "In our view it was a proper election.... We were unable to discover anywhere in our observations obvious, systematic fraud in the electoral process." Haggard officials were still counting votes Monday and an election organizer said computer projections might be available Monday night.

(Bucharest/Reuter) -- Romanian President Iliescu, riding high on a landslide election triumph, vowed Monday to work to put his backward nation in the ranks of the world's most advanced countries by the end of the 1990s. In his first interview since provisional results assured him and his National Salvation Front of victory, Iliescu said he wanted to turn his once communist-ruled country into a social democracy, along the lines of Sweden. Speaking to Reuters and to the French TF1 television network, Iliescu, 60, said: "We want to rise to the level of the world's advanced countries by the end of the century."

KASHMIR (Sringagar, India/AP) -- Security forces fired today on a crowd of 100,000 Moslems carrying the body of a slain Kashmir religious leader and at least 30 people were killed and 200 injured, witnesses and doctors said. Thirty bodies and at least 200 people with bullet wounds were brought to Soura hospital. Many of the injured said 40 more bodies still lay on the streets in the Sringagar neighborhood where the firing occurred. The city was under curfew and their reports could not be confirmed immediately. Government officials could not be reached for comment.

MIDEAST VIOLENCE (Jerusalem/Reuter) -- Enraged Palestinian rioters defied Israeli troops with stones, iron bars and bottles Monday and Arab fury over the cold-blooded murder of seven Gaza Strip workers exploded in Israel itself. The army confined a million Palestinians to their homes in the occupied territories, struggling to check the fiercest outburst of Arab nationalist violence since the early days of the intifada. But the two-day death toll surged to 17 - the murdered seven and 10 shot by Israeli troops. Hospitals have reported at least 700 Palestinians wounded. Underground leaders of the Palestinian revolt proclaimed that "the hour of retribution has arrived." "Let the occupation army and the settler gangs pay with their blood the price that is due," said a leaflet distributed by the Unified National Leadership, which supports the PLO. Israeli leaders fear the killings of the Arab workers Sunday will renew the uprising and further damage the Jewish state's world stand. "This was the last thing we needed," said an aide to caretaker Prime Minister Shamir.

MIDEAST VIOLENCE/STATE (Reuter) -- The U.S. said Monday it was disturbed by the high number of Palestinians killed and wounded by Israeli troops in the violent aftermath of the killing of seven Arabs by an Israeli gunman. "We're disturbed by the number of casualties inflicted by the Israeli army," said State Department spokesman Boucher. "We've repeatedly called on the government of Israel to exercise restraint in these situations in order to avoid heavy casualties such as took place yesterday," he said.

MIDEAST VIOLENCE/HOSTAGES (Beirut/Reuter) -- A leader of the pro-Iranian Hezbollah group said Monday the killing of seven Arabs in Israel would rebound negatively on Western hostages and Israeli servicemen held in Lebanon. "The killings of the Palestinian workers will have a negative effect on the fate of Israeli prisoners...and Western hostages in Lebanon," Hussein Musawi told Reuters. He did not elaborate.... Musawi said the shooting of the seven Arab workers...was aimed at "terrorizing Arabs to force them to leave their land and replace them with Soviet Jewish emigrants." He called for more attacks inside Israel, the Arab world and in Europe against all those who "facilitate and support" the influx of Soviet Jews to Israel.

MIDEAST VIOLENCE/U.N. (U.N./Reuter) -- The Security Council will meet Tuesday to discuss the situation in the Israeli-occupied territories after renewed violence there in the past two days. After closed-door consultations among Council members Monday, a U.N. spokesman said a public session would be held Tuesday morning. The 22-member Arab group had requested an immediate meeting. The PLO's deputy U.N. observer, Riyadh Mansour, said the council was being asked to consider meeting in Geneva, if that proved necessary to enable PLO leader Arafat to take part in the debate.

SALVADOR REPORT (UPI/adv. 2:30 pm EDT) -- El Salvador's military leaders share a tolerance of human rights abuses and a penchant for corruption, suggesting efforts to reform the country's armed forces have failed, a congressional report showed Monday. The staff of the bipartisan Arms Control and Foreign Policy Caucus examined the records of the top 15 Salvadoran military officials and found that 14 of them had led troops with documented records of repeated human rights abuses. The caucus report did not try to determine whether the commanders took part in the abuses, but said the fact that they rose to their current posts shows there is "little accountability" in the military and sends "an unmistakable message to soldiers that misbehavior is tolerated." The findings were released as the House was set this week to consider a Democratic proposal opposed by President Bush that would cut in half U.S. military aid to El Salvador in 1990 and 1991. "We in Congress are hearing that the United States should keep the money flowing to the Salvadoran army lest we cause unimaginable suffering in that country," said Sen. Hatfield, vice chairman of the caucus, made up of Democrats and mostly moderate Republicans. "This report reveals the complete failure of U.S. attempts to reform and restructure the Salvadoran military. The truth is, things keep getting uglier down there and it is time to change our policy."

CHINA/FANG (UPI) -- Human rights and scientific groups, joined by American academics and prominent Soviet dissidents Monday launched a campaign to free Chinese physicist Fang Lizhi, currently taking refuge in the U.S. Embassy in Beijing. And one of the Soviet Union's most prominent dissidents, Yuri Orlov, in a stinging rebuke of U.S. policy toward China, said the Bush administration "is not ready for democracy" in the rest of the world.... Orlov, also a physicist and a founder of Amnesty International, told a news conference it is important to "try to push the opportunistic and insensitive U.S. administration in the right direction." "The problem of this administration is that it is not ready for democracy - in Russia, in China, and elsewhere far from the United States," Orlov said. "They can't understand that people there are more ready for democracy than their leaders."

PAN AM/LOCKERBIE REPORT (London/Reuter) -- A Pan Am executive said Monday a top-level U.S. report last week on the December 1988 bombing of a jumbo jet over Lockerbie had treated the airline very unfairly. Pan Am senior vice-president Peter McHugh said he disagreed with the report's finding that the airline could have done something to prevent the bombing.... "I don't think there is anything that could have been done that day at the airport to stop that bomb getting on board," McHugh told reporters in London.... "We think the report has treated us very unfairly in terms of the facts and in terms of our dealings with the FAA," McHugh said. "We think we were doing more than was required and we should not have been subjected to the criticisms in the report."

U.S./IRAN/CLAIMS (The Hague/Reuter) -- The U.S. and Iran opened a fresh round of talks Monday to try to settle Iran's \$11 billion claim over U.S. military contracts broken after the 1979 Iranian revolution, a U.S. diplomat said. Abraham Sofaer, the State Department legal adviser, will meet his Iranian counterpart Goudarz Eftekhari-Jaromi during two of the three days of talks.

AFGHAN CABINET (Kabul/Reuter) -- The Soviet-backed Afghan government was reshuffled Monday but the ruling party kept a grip on the main portfolios. "When the war is still going on it's difficult for non-party members to hold such ministries," a government spokesman told reporters. The key foreign, defense, state security, interior, transport, and information and culture ministries were retained by members of the ruling People's Democratic Party of Afghanistan.

Here is a brief outline of Denny's efforts to fight crime and drugs. Please call if you have any questions.

- o **1988 OREGON ANTI-CRIME INITIATIVE:** In 1987, Oregon had the 4th-highest per capita violent crime rate in the nation. Oregon was first in marijuana growth...first in methamphetamine labs...third in bank robbers...and the FBI listed Portland on its "most dangerous cities" list.

✓ Congressman Denny Smith took a leadership role in the fight against criminals who had made Oregon neighborhoods unsafe. He formed Oregonians Against Crime, a citizens' crime-fighting group of 115,000 law-abiding Oregonians.

Oregonians Against Crime successfully passed the anti-crime initiative that requires repeat, violent career criminals to serve their full sentences behind bars. No parole. No temporary leave. No time off for "good behavior." No weekend passes.

✓ Close to 1 million Oregonians -- the highest vote total ever for an initiative in Oregon -- supported Smith's measure. It passed with 77 percent of the vote.

After the Oregon Legislature passed a full slate of anti-crime legislation in 1989 -- more prison cells, tougher sentencing, etc. -- a county sheriff gave Denny and his ballot measure full credit for driving those important changes.

- **THURMOND-SMITH LEGISLATION:** Denny is sponsoring the House version of Sen. Strom Thurmond's bill to reform habeas corpus procedures. It would also put a cap on the number of years murderers have to appeal death sentences. This legislation is very close to the President's, and the President has said positive words about the Senate version of this bill. Denny will be a part of a House leadership task force to craft the strategy to get the main parts of the President's bill through the House.

- **HELPING OREGON FIND PRISON SPACE:** When the State of Oregon wanted to utilize a former Air Force radar station on the Oregon Coast for a 200-bed prison, Denny negotiated the land transfer. Without his intervention, 200 criminals would be out on the streets instead of in prison.

- **SUPPORTS THE PRESIDENT'S ANTI-DRUG PACKAGE:** As Chairman of the House Republican Task Force on Crime, Denny is a key force in backing the President's anti-drug package in the House.

But I also reject those in industry who do not recognize their obligation to protect our delicate ecosystem.

Common sense tells us to find a needed balance. Together, we will work to find that balance.\\

At my invitation, Dave came to the White House last fall to talk about these and other issues. He is a forceful and passionate spokesman for the people of this great state.
