I. PURPOSE

To highlight the Administration's Immunization Initiative.

II. BACKGROUND

This summer you launched with Secretary Sullivan an unprecedented Immunization Initiative aimed at reducing the number of unvaccinated preschoolers. At that time, you called upon Secretary Sullivan to ensure that all children receive their immunizations on schedule. San Diego is one of six cities targeted to raise immunization levels.

The Logan Heights Family Health Center was founded by Laura Rodriguez in 1969 (she was the 595th Daily Point of Light recipient). The center is bi-lingual and serves about 75,000 patients each year, about 60% of which are families. The center has over 100 volunteer "lay-teachers" who do community outreach -- targeting individuals and families and promoting the need for immunization.

I. PURPOSE

To tour the new Primary Children's Medical Center and to announce the Healthy Start grants to 15 communities designed to reduce infant mortality.

II. BACKGROUND

The Primary Children's Medical Center is the foremost pediatric care center in the Intermountain West region. Primary Children's is a favorite charitable institution among the residents of the Intermountain area. For 78 years, the hospital has been helping sick children and the community has shown strong support in providing both volunteer service and donations. In 1990, the hospital received \$2.6 million in community donations. This year, the Center received the health care industry's highest honor for quality -- The Healthcare Forum/Witt Award.

Primary Children's is owned by Intermountain Health Care (IHC), a nonprofit organization of 24 hospitals serving Utah, Idaho and Wyoming. IHC provides financial support to several clinics for the homeless and indigent in Salt Lake City. One half of their hospitals are small and rural, providing a network of care across a vast service area.

The Healthy Start Program is an initiative to reduce infant mortality by 50% over the next five years through additional support for comprehensive service in 15 high risk communities. A national public information program will accompany Healthy Start to raise awareness of the American public, health providers and women at-risk. Salt Lake City will not be one of the recipients of a Healthy Start grant since it has one of the lowest infant mortality rates in the country.

Healthy START

The *Healthy Start* Program is a Presidential initiative to reduce infant mortality through additional support for comprehensive service delivery in approximately 10 high risk communities. A national public information program will accompany *Healthy Start* to raise awareness of the American public, health providers, and women at-risk.

Background

The 1988 United States infant mortality rate is 10.0 deaths per 1,000 live births, or approximately 40,000 American infant deaths under age one. Although the U.S. infant mortality rate has been cut in half since 1970, the percent of babies who are more likely to die or face a lifetime of serious health problems essentially has remained constant. At least 10,000 infant deaths occurring each year are believed to be preventable with current knowledge. A key factor in preventing low birth weight and related infant mortality is early and continuous health care for all pregnant women and their infants. In addition, cigarettes, alcohol, and substance abuse account for approximately 20% of infant deaths.

- Underweight babies are 20 times more likely to die than babies weighing over 5.5 lbs. at birth.*
- For those low birth weight infants who survive, the cost of intensive care is greater than \$1,000 per day.
- The U.S. ranks 24th in the world for infant mortality rates.

The Healthy Start Communities

Through grants administered by the Health Resources and Services Administration, approximately 10 Healthy Start communities with high infant mortality rates (15.7 per 1000 live births) will develop innovative approaches to reducing infant mortality. Local and state government, the private sector, schools, and other community and social organizations will be expected to contribute resources.

Collaborative community efforts will focus on the needs of pregnant women and infants to assure that the appropriate comprehensive package of medical, social, educational, and other non-medical services is accessible. These may include:

- improving participation in Medicaid among eligible pregnant and low-income women
- increasing the number of pregnant women and infants who obtain adequate nutrition and health care referrals through the Women, Infants, and Children (WIC) supplemental nutrition program
- integrating smoking and drug abuse cessation programs into prenatal care and nutrition programs

The Healthy Start National Public Information Campaign

The Healthy Start National Public Information Campaign will:

- focus national attention on the problem
- create awareness of behaviors to provide all infants with a healthy start
- encourage pregnant women to seek health care for themselves and their babies.

This effort will include a five year national advertising campaign sponsored by the Ad Council and targeted information efforts in the 10 Healthy Start communities.

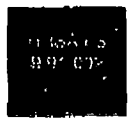

We cordially invite you to tour our new Primary Children's Medical Center during your visit to Salt Lake City on September 18. Primary Children's is the foremost pediatric care center in the Intermountain West, and it is much loved by the citizens of this region.

Even though Primary Children's moved into its new 226-bed facility only one year ago, the hospital continues to expand, and we would be honored to have you participate in the ground-breaking ceremony of our new Northwest wing.

Primary Children's is a favorite charitable institution among the residents of the Intermountain area. For 78 years, the hospital has been helping sick children get well, and the community has shown strong support in providing both volunteer service and donations. In 1990, for instance, the hospital received \$2.6 million in community donations.

Primary Children's is owned by Intermountain Health Care (IHC), a charitable, nonprofit organization of 24 hospitals serving Utah and parts of Idaho and Wyoming. Our organization has received national and international recognition for our commitment to quality health care. This year, we received the health care industry's highest honor for quality--The Healthcare Forum/Witt Award.
