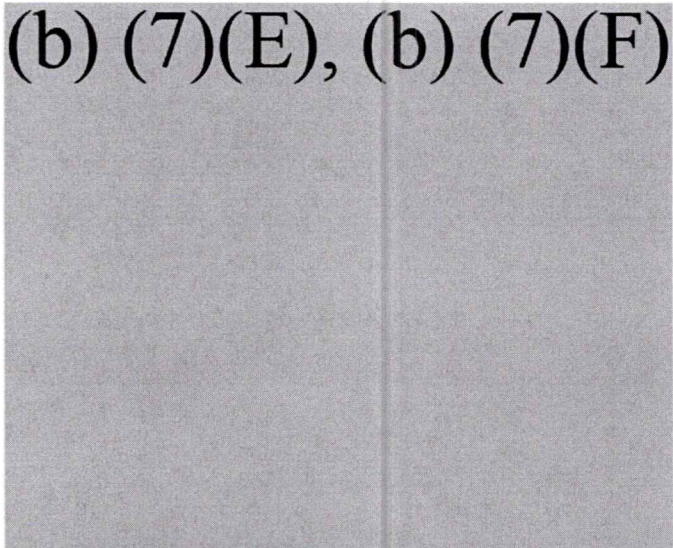

I. PURPOSE

Present the Administration's Civil Justice Reform Model State Amendments and the Model State Punitive Damages Act, to a group of Alaska businesspeople and civic leaders.

This is also an opportunity to learn about Alaska's experience with a limited version of the "Fairness Rule" -- called Alaska Rule 82.

II. BACKGROUND

The Civil Justice Reform Roundtable is sponsored by Mr. Al Tamagni, Chairman of Alaskans for Liability Reform. Mr. Tamagni has been active in the liability reform movement in Alaska for a number of years.

In 1986, some "watered-down" tort reform legislation was enacted. It implemented some minor limits on joint and several liability and collateral damages. It also implemented some minor changes to the Alaska Rule 82 -- the state's limited Fairness Rule. The state legislature, however, frustrated efforts for more significant reform.

In 1988, a coalition for liability reform ran a statewide initiative to toughen the limits on joint and several liability. The initiative, which limited recovery from each defendant to their share of fault, passed with 73% of the vote.

The Alaskans for Liability Reform see this landslide vote as evidence of the popular support for legal reform in Alaska. However, they have not pursued any other significant reforms in the legislature, which remains hostile to legal reform. They believe that the redistricting this year should lead to significant turnover and they expect to rejuvenate reform efforts

next year.

Alaska Civil Rule 82

Alaska Civil Rule 82 requires that the prevailing party should ordinarily recover partial compensation for attorneys' fees. There is, as you might guess, divided opinion about how effective it has been. Some, such as the Alaskans for Liability Reform, do not believe the rule is tough enough. Others, such as the Alaska Bar Association -- which passed a resolution a decade ago urging the repeal of Rule 82 -- think it goes too far.

The rule works differently for plaintiffs and defendants. The plaintiff is entitled to 10% of the first \$100,000 awarded, 8% of the next \$100,000 and so on as attorneys fees. However, contingent fee lawyers usually treat the fees as part of the recovery -- thus only a portion of even this small fee is passed on to the winning plaintiff.

On the other hand, defendants that prevail are usually awarded only \$5,000 to \$10,000 -- far less than the fees a liability insurer would incur defending against the typical tort suit carried through to trial.

As the attached article suggests, Rule 82 has been successful at encouraging parties to settle more lawsuits sooner. On the other hand, the rules have not been completely successful at deterring frivolous claims -- often frivolous suits are brought by plaintiffs who are judgement-proof.

Summary of the Administration's proposals

The Civil Justice Reform Model State Amendments is a ten part proposal for state legislative action that is very similar to the federal Access to Justice Act of 1992. It includes:

- 1) Pre-Complaint Notice of Claims
- 2) Multi-Door Courthouse
- 3) Core Disclosure and Discovery
- 4) Offer of Settlement
- 5) Pretrial Settlement Conference
- 6) Facilitating Summary Judgement
- 7) Expert Testimony
- 8) The Fairness Rule -- Attorney's Fees to Prevailing Party
- 9) Accuracy in Pleading
- 10) Legislation and Regulation Drafting

The Model State Punitive Damages Act presents a six part proposal for state legislative action, including:

- 1) Pre-Complaint Notice of Claims
- 2) Eliminate Pleading for Specific Amounts of Punitive Damages
- 3) Establish "Clear and Convincing" Standard of Proof
- 4) Bifurcate Trials
- 5) Judicial Determination of Amount of Punitive Damages
- 6) Cap the Amount of Punitive Damages

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Evansville : A past and present linked

The date was March of 1812 and a still fledgling democracy was again preparing for war with Great Britain.

Little attention was likely paid when Kentucky-born frontiersman Hugh McGary purchased 200 fertile Southern Indiana acres from the territory's government land office in Vincennes.

The unsettled property was situated on the north shore of a sweeping bend in the mighty Ohio River.

By the summer of 1812, a crude lean-to cabin soon appeared at the intersection of what is now Main Street and Riverside Drive, and our city, named after a prominent territorial leader of the day, Robert Evans, enjoyed its humble beginnings.

With Evans' influence, Evansville was named the seat of government in 1819 for the newly created jurisdiction of Vanderburgh County. At the time the city's population stood at a whopping 100 residents.

In the 1830's when the city was designated as the southern terminus of the Wabash and Erie Canal, an inland waterway connecting Lake Erie with the Ohio River, property values soared and the

sleepy little town grew by 600 percent over the next five years.

Although the Wabash and Erie Canal never proved to be the economic generator most assumed it was destined to become, it did provide the impetus for many thousands of people to settle in the Evansville area.

The next decade brought the first of several waves of immigrants from southern Germany to the area, many of whom were skilled woodworkers.

With the vast hardwood resources native to Southwestern Indiana, woodworking industries quickly blossomed, industries which provided quality jobs and brought the city national recognition well into the next century.

Evansville's strategic location on the Ohio River quickly resulted in its becoming one of the state's leading commercial centers.

By 1847 when Evansville was incorporated as a city, river traffic had exploded to the point where it became necessary to construct a five-block-long wharf along the riverfront.

By the turn of the century, the agricultural cornucopia produced by its fertile soil and moderate climate enabled the city to develop into a major producer of flour, cigars, cotton textiles, meat and other tobacco products.

Simultaneously, with the utilization of abundant local supplies of ore and coal, thriving iron and steel manufacturing industry surfaced.

With the dawning of a new century Evansville's economy reached a crossroads. Diminishing supplies of hardwood timber and increased competition from other more raw-material rich areas of the country forced a further diversification of the local economy.

When Mead Johnson and Co., which specialized in the production of infant nutritionals, moved to Evansville prior to World War I, Evansville's lot to become a major center of consumer non-durable production was cast.

Manufacturing of automobiles and refrigerators soon followed. Chrysler, Briggs, Servel, Sunbeam and Secger all thrived for a time between the two wars.

The outbreak of World War II brought a manufacturing boom to Evansville with the production of LST's, munitions, tanks and aircraft parts.

Evansville was home to Republic Aviation, which produced the war's most versatile and durable airplane, the P-47.

In the 1950's, Seeger merged with Whirlpool, which purchased the former Republic Aviation manufacturing facility on U.S. 41. By this time, a plastics industry, established in the 1930's was beginning to expand and play a more significant role in economy of the metropolitan area.

Evansville commerce today

While Evansville's employment landscape retains some significant names from its past, George Koch Sons, Inc., Charles Leich & Co., Karges Furniture and Whirlpool, to name but a few, the economy is more diverse and less reliant on a small core of employers.

While more recent additions such as GE Plastics, ALCOA and American General Finance have carved out important niches in the local economy, a local economic snapshot reveals a healthy amalgamation of manufacturing, service, financial, retail, wholesale and agricultural industries.

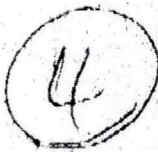
The city is now a major service center for needs as diverse as state-of-the-art health care to specialized retail shopping.

Besides providing an array of exceptional services, the city's two universities, four technical colleges and three hospitals function as professional magnets attracting people from throughout the Midwest to Evansville.

True to the city's historical roots, transportation still plays a key role in Evansville's economic vitality.

A new airport terminal is complemented by the local operation of 40 trucking companies, four railroad systems and a full range of port services provided by the Southwind Maritime Centre.

A Chairman's Retrospection

Annual Report - FY 1991

As Chairman, I learned a lot about the Chamber's role in our community and the way the Chamber carries out its work.

The Chamber clearly is an important institution in our community. It has a broad enough perspective to serve the interests of the business community, as well as the community as a whole.

It has the organizational skills and the ability to tap the knowledge and know-how of many able volunteers to see needs and develop solutions. It has the persistence to shepherd important projects from inception through the complexities of our age to completion and to pursue them for decades, if necessary. I can attest that the Chamber is an effective organization worthy of your support.

This year the Chamber continued to work on the many projects started in prior years. Among others, we continued our vigorous support of the extension of Interstate 69 south from Indianapolis through Evansville to the Gulf of Mexico.

For many years we have been working to heighten public concern about education. Among other things, we held a successful community retreat on education, highlights of which were subsequently broadcast on Channel 9.

We continued our liaison with the schools. Though much remains to be accomplished, progress occurred this year and plans were put in place that should lead to further improvements.

We have also now focused on one community goal: to develop a cooperative, competent world-class workforce.
