I) PURPOSE

Visit a small growing company in the automobile supply business that has benefited from JTPA, will benefit from free trade and that will be harmed by increasing CAFE standards.

II) BACKGROUND

Lowell Guthrie, the founder and part owner of Trace Die Cast Company was once an employee of Ford in Alabama. Laid off due to a plant closing -- and after trying to run the plant under employee ownership -- he moved to Kentucky to start again. He says he was the typical middle-aged guy laid off by a big company that decided to go into business for himself.

In 1988, he started Trace, building his plant in the proverbial green field. Ronald Reagan stopped by his groundbreaking ceremony in a campaign swing.

His first 30 employees were all retrained under JTPA after being laid off by the nearby Holly Carburetor plant and many of the subsequent employees were retrained under JTPA as well. He has been hiring more employees this year -- employment is up to 90 people.

Trace makes aluminum parts by forcing molten aluminum into preset dies. They make small electrical motors for GE and body parts for Ford. Revenues last year were \$10 million -- and growing. They are turning a profit for the 10 investors that originally financed the company. Their plant is about the size of a football field.

Just this year, Trace started exporting to Canada. They are considering expanding operations to Mexico -- though Lowell Guthrie says that would not cost US jobs, it would add to them.

Like other small, growing businesses, Trace is worried about the burden of regulations -- and frightened by the ideas Clinton is espousing. He will tell you that family leave, pay or play health plans, CAFE and so on will all impact his operations and ultimately cost jobs -- either in slower growth or in layoffs.

In particular, if CAFE forces Ford to close the Louisville plant, the consequences for this firm are severe.

Also, Mr. Guthrie tells me that his brother died serving his country in Korea when he was 21 years old. He had a birth defect that would have gotten him out of the war, but he hid it so that he would have the opportunity to serve. His son is a graduate of West Point who left the service shortly before the Gulf War -- he tried unsuccessfully to get back into his old unit, the 101st Airborne to serve in that war.

He is not happy about Governor Clinton's explanation about the draft. He told me, tearfully, that you would do great honor to his family to raise the flag his brother came home in over their plant. I would not be surprised if he raises this issue in his remarks to the employees.

I. PURPOSE

... to address the issues of concern with the National Association of Homebuilders and to meet with the Builders for Bush/Quayle coalition.

II. BACKGROUND

On July 23, you toured the Eastwood Housing development in Lexington, and met with area homebuilders. The median priced home in Lexington is \$74,500 -- that is well under the national average of \$101,000.

In addition to your Lexington visit, you have met with the NAHB on six other occasions this year: March 6 - The Northeast Florida Builders (with the Jacksonville Area Realtors), the Annual Legislative Conference of the NAHB in Washington on March 8. You've visited the "Bravo!" development in Las Vegas; Hatfield Construction Model Homes in Evansville on July 23; Poplar Creek in Hoffman Estates, IL, on July 27, and Larchmont Country Villa in Sacramento on August 11, 1992.

N.A.H.B.

The National Association of Home Builders has 155,000 members firms. The Board of Directors, made up of more than 1,900 members representing more than 800 local and 44 state associations, is the governing body of the NAHB.

ISSUES OF CONCERN

Loan-to-value ratios: In the beginning of the year, Congress passed legislation (the effort lead by Sen. Tim Wirth) that provides for uniform loan-to-value ratios for all four bank regulating agencies.

The uniform ratio is to be adopted by September 30, 1992 and to be in effect by May 1993. The proposed regulation was issued July 16, and was subject to a 45-day comment period; the comment period is now closed. More than 5,000 comments were submitted. It will take a couple of weeks to go through all the comments before a final reg can be in place.

What has been proposed is to have a loan-to-value range (for example: 65% to 75% for a pre-construction land loan) with the lower end of the range to be the benchmark level for the regulators to look at. The NAHB is upset about the provision that the lower end of the range be considered a benchmark. They are considering pushing for a single level that is higher rather than having a range. Treasury has publicly commented that it prefers using a range to maintain flexibility for different institutions and different situations, but it has also stated opposition to the provision that the low end of the range be considered the norm.

Though it is not yet concluded, it is likely that the language about the bottom end of the range will be dropped. In other words, the home builders can be told that we understand their concerns, we appreciate their comments during the comment period, we're looking at them closely right now.

Regulations: The home builders are generally concerned with over regulation, including wetlands. In Sacramento, the area home builders told you that government regs increased the cost of a home like the one you visited by 20 percent or more. The Spotted Owl and the Endangered Species Act, they estimated, added \$3,000 to \$5,000 to the price of the homes they were building. Regulations cost our economy \$400,000 per year.

FHA mortgage insurance: THE PRESIDENT ANNOUNCED ON THURSDAY of last week (9/17), the reform and streamline of HUD's regulation on FHA insured 15 year mortgages. That reform will reduce the cost of home ownership and spur residential construction. This change will reduce the up-front costs of a FHA mortgage by an average of \$650. It will reduce the annual insurance premium by \$165 to \$325 per year for a total saving of \$2,500 to \$6,000 over the life of the loan.

Credit Crunch: The Administration continues to press for banks to make sound loans. Treasury officials, all the way up to the Secretary, have held literally hundreds of meetings with bankers and regulators on the credit crunch problems. A total of 3.5 million homeowners have refinanced their mortgages in the first six months of 1992. A total of \$700 billion of Adjustable Rate Mortgages (ARM's) have been adjusted this year which collectively saves the homeowner \$16 billion.

Competitiveness Council: ABC News aired a two-part story on the Competitiveness Council on August 4 and 5. Included in the story was the NAHB role in the council's review of a HUD regulation regarding accessibility for the disabled in multi-family housing. Jay Buchert, President of NAHB, wrote a letter to Peter Jennings of ABC regarding the report. NAHB states that the report was misleading, factually incorrect, and improperly researched as neither NAHB nor the Paralyzed Veterans of America, the two principle groups involved, were contacted for comment.

Economy: Housing starts fell 2.8 percent in July after a 3.8 percent decline in June. The markets had expected a rebound because of falling mortgage interest rates, but there are lags in the process. The August housing starts figures will be released on Tuesday, August 22. The markets expect housing starts to be up about 2.5 percent.

On the positive side, new construction permits are up in July after four straight months of decline. Most of the recovery is multi-family units; single family units are up only .2 percent.

The recent decline in interest rates, including mortgage rates, is hoped to create some more activity in the housing markets. On July 2 (in response to the release of the increase in the unemployment rate to 7.8%), the Fed cut the discount rate from three-and-one-half percent to three percent -- the lowest since 1963. By the week of July 10 the conventional 30-year mortgage rate was down to 8.13 percent -- a 19 year low.

SUBJECT: BACKGROUND INFORMATION ON KENTUCKY

o The July unemployment rate for Kentucky was 6.7 percent; the July unemployment rate for Lexington was 4.3 percent. The June unemployment rate for Bowling Green was 2.3 percent. The national unemployment rate for August was 7.6 percent.

State Issues

o Nine current and former Kentucky legislators have been indicted as part of an FBI investigation (Operation Boptrot) involving alleged bribes to state legislators with regard to harness racing bills. The Speaker of the Kentucky House and the Democratic Floor Leader have received subpoenas and more indictments are expected. The majority of indictments have been against Democrat members.

o Another FBI investigation, known as "Operation Crabgrass," has so far netted an indictment against a Republican state legislator for allegedly extorting money in return for promising early parole to a convicted drug dealer.

o Governor Brereton Jones is planning to call a special session of the legislature in November to consider his health care reform package, known as the "Universal Care" program, which would levy a new tax on health care providers, mandate all employers to provide health insurance to their employees, and provide state-funded health care for the poor and unemployed. Governor Jones was in a helicopter crash in early August that left him with serious kidney damage and a heightened sense of urgency about his health care package. This week, the Kentucky Medical Association unanimously rejected the Governor's plan at its convention in Louisville.

o Tobacco production will be down slightly in 1992, yet prices for the 1992 tobacco crop still will be weaker because of decreasing cigarette production. **Tobacco growers are especially hostile to Secretary Sullivan's anti-smoking crusade.** The tobacco price support program is operated at no-net-cost to the government, other than administrative expenses that are common to all price support programs. There are no government payments made to tobacco producers for producing tobacco. In 1991, tobacco and tobacco products contributed over \$5 billion to a positive trade balance (exports of \$66 billion and imports of \$1 billion). With the advent of North American Free Trade Agreement, a restrictive tobacco import licensing requirement used by Mexico will be eliminated, thereby allowing the U.S. to compete in the Mexican leaf tobacco market free from any trade-distorting barriers.

Federal Issues

o A Gephardt/Rostenkowski proposal, known as the "Trade Expansion Act," which would require foreign car companies that manufacture cars in the U.S. to increase their procurement of U.S. parts to 70 percent is unpopular with many in Kentucky, including the workers at the **Georgetown Toyota Plant (near Lexington)**, which employs 4,300 workers and is expected to add 1,700 more in the upcoming months. The plant, which makes the Toyota Camry, has recently more than doubled its output from \$800 million to \$1.9 billion, annually. The auto workers have also recently won a customer satisfaction award, ranking them ahead of their Japanese counterparts. The bill was passed by the House on July 8 and is currently awaiting action in the Senate Finance Committee.

Reform Agenda Issues -- State Facts

JTPA: 11 SDA's. Kentucky will receive \$50.5 million this year; last year 62,139 people were served by the JTPA program in Kentucky.

EDUCATION: Kentucky has not launched a statewide America 2000 program, however there are fifty America 2000 communities in Kentucky that have embraced the President's education reform plan. There is no statewide choice plan, although Louisville is experimenting with a pilot choice program this year which allows ninth graders to choose their high school. An education reform package, passed in 1990, included a provision that allows parents to pull their children out of failing schools, but does not allow them to choose an alternative school.

EXPORTS/NAFTA: Kentucky exports more than \$3.8 billion worth of merchandise, placing it twenty-fifth among the fifty states. Kentucky's largest trading partners are (in order): Canada (\$930 million); France (\$463 million); Japan (\$423 million), and the United Kingdom (\$256 million).

o Manufactured exports accounted for 97 percent of Kentucky's \$1.1 billion in exports to Canada and Mexico in 1991. Kentucky exports more than \$930 million worth of merchandise to Canada; an increase of 50 percent since 1987. In addition, Kentucky's exports to Mexico have quadrupled since 1987 and now total more than \$164 million, annually. Exports to Canada and Mexico have created 7,000 new jobs in Kentucky since 1987.

DRUGS AND CRIME: Marijuana and cocaine are the most abused illegal drugs in Kentucky. Marijuana surpasses even tobacco as the state's largest cash crop.

o Since President Bush took office and created the Office of National Drug Control Policy, federal drug grants to Kentucky have increased 106 percent from \$10.6 million in 1989 to an estimated \$21.9 million for 1993.

CIVIL JUSTICE REFORM: The Kentucky constitution currently forbids the enactment of caps on damages, however the Tort Reform Association of Kentucky is actively involved with efforts to change the constitution. The group is also seeking to promote alternative dispute resolution techniques. No substantive tort reform bills were considered by the Kentucky legislature this year.

WETLANDS: Kentucky has 300,000 acres of wetlands that comprise 1.2 percent of the state's total surface area.

SCHEDULE: You were last in Kentucky on January 29, 1992, when you visited Louisville.

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He takes the Administration's pro-life position on abortion, and supports school choice. Williams has not taken a position on term limitations at the request of Senator Mitch McConnell who does not support term limits. Senator McConnell has actively campaigned on behalf of Williams.

Williams has raised over \$60,000 to date and has been promised full funding by the National Republican Senatorial Committee.

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Mrs. Quayle attended a fundraiser for Williams in Bowling Green, Kentucky on July 1, 1992.

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After redistricting, Kentucky went from 7 congressional seats to 6. The Democratic Governor and State Legislature have made every attempt to protect Democratic incumbents. The State Party will try to protect Congressman **Hal Rogers** (R-5) and **Jim Bunning** (R-4) who both picked up substantial Democrat territory. Congressman **Larry Hopkins** (R-6) announced his retirement after losing a large part of his previous electoral base through redistricting.
