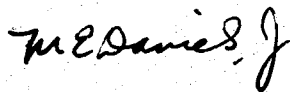
Discussion

The Joint Economic Committee (JEC) of the Congress is composed of Members from both the Senate and the House of Representatives. The JEC was created by the Employment Act of 1946, which also established the President's Council of Economic Advisers. The primary tasks of the JEC are to review economic conditions and recommend improvements in economic policy.

The JEC is composed of ten Members of the Senate, appointed by the President of the Senate, and ten Members of the House, appointed by the Speaker of the House. Under current law, the majority party of each House is represented by six Members and the minority party of each House is represented by four Members. The enrolled bill would provide that, for so long as the majority party and the minority party have equal representation in the Senate of the 107th Congress, the Senate is to be represented on the JEC by five Members of the majority party and five Members of the minority party.

Conclusion and Recommendations

We recommend approval of S. 279, which passed both the Senate and the House by unanimous consent.
