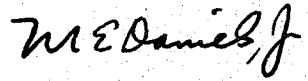

By law, a Board of Regents with seventeen members governs the Smithsonian Institution. Of the seventeen regents, eight are designated officials and members of the House and Senate. The nine other regents are appointed by Joint Resolution of Congress. H.J.Res. 19 would appoint Walter E. Massey as a citizen regent for a term of six years, beginning on the date that the joint resolution is enacted. 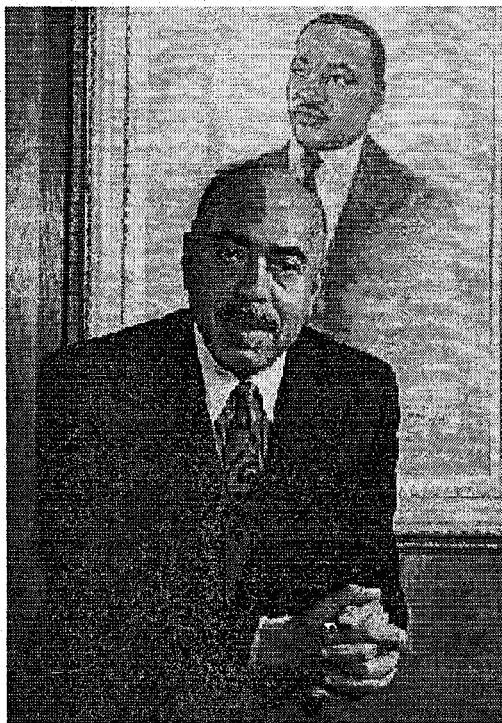

WALTER E. MASSEY, Ph. D. President of Morehouse College

VITAE

Dr. Walter E. Massey is the ninth president of Morehouse College, the nation's only historically black, all-male, four-year, liberal arts institution.

Morehouse College, located in Atlanta, Ga., offers a full range of academic programs from arts and humanities to science, engineering, and business administration. Housing the Journal of Negro History and the Morehouse Research Institute, the College boasts a Phi Beta Kappa chapter, Honors and Study Abroad programs, and a longstanding tradition of producing outstanding leaders. Morehouse annually enrolls approximately 3,000 students, typically representing more than 40 states and a dozen foreign countries. Graduating classes in recent years have averaged about 500.

Massey has held a range of administrative and academic positions, including provost and senior vice president-academic affairs of the University of California. In this position, the second most senior position in the UC system, he was responsible for the development of academic and research planning and policy, budget planning and

allocations, and programmatic oversight of the three national laboratories the University manages for the U.S. Department of Energy.

Massey is also former director of the National Science Foundation, a position to which he was appointed by former President George Bush. The Foundation is the government's lead agency for support of research and education in mathematics, science, and engineering. Massey has served also as vice president for research at the University of Chicago and director of the Argonne National Laboratory, dean of the college and full professor of physics at Brown University, and assistant professor of physics at the University of Illinois.

After earning a bachelor of science in physics and mathematics in 1958 from Morehouse, Massey received his master's and doctorate in physics in 1966 from Washington University, St. Louis, Mo. Massey's research has involved the study of quantum liquids and solids. His written work has also addressed science and math education, the role of science in a democratic society, and university-industry interactions and technology transfer in the international setting.

Active with a range of organizations, Massey has served as the chairman and president of the American Association for the Advancement of Science, served as the vice president of the American Physical Society, served on the National Science Board and the President's Council of Advisors on Science and Technology (PCAST). He is also the recipient of over 20 honorary degrees from institutions such as Washington University, Amherst College, and Yale University. He is currently a member of several corporate boards.

VITAE

Dr. Walter E. Massey is the ninth president of Morehouse College, the nation's only historically black, all-male, four-year, liberal arts institution.

Morehouse College, located in Atlanta, Ga., offers a full range of academic programs from arts and humanities to science, engineering, and business administration. Housing the Journal of Negro History and the Morehouse Research Institute, the College boasts a Phi Beta Kappa chapter, Honors and Study Abroad programs, and a longstanding tradition of producing outstanding leaders. Morehouse annually enrolls approximately 3,000 students, typically representing more than 40 states and a dozen foreign countries. Graduating classes in recent years have averaged about 500.
